Pacifism Versus Militarism Polling, Says Nelson
That the ballot taken by the
Daily Cardinal on the recent state
department move in Central Ameri-
ca has not achieved the results in-
tended is the attitude taken by
James M. Nelson '27, managing
editor, in an editorial which is
printed this morning on the editor-
ial page.
Want Policy Opinions
"Students have misinterpreted
the original intent of this paper in
conducting the poll," Nelson said
yesterday, "as evidencel by the bal-
lots received in the past few days
stressing the war element. The
Daily Cardinal is desirous of get-
ting student opinion on the activit-
ies in Central America and is not
conducting a poll of pacifism versus
militarism," he coneluded.
Continue Batloting
The ballots recorded yesterday,
put the figure at 282 voting "yes"
and 53 voting "no." So many of
the ballots indicated that the vot-
er was disapproving or approving
war that the editors decided that
the poll was not in accord with the
original intent of the Daily Card-

It is unfortunate that the stand of the Daily Cardina we advocate is worthy of the scrutiny and approval of every student.
In the first place there has been a misinterpretation of the ballot which is being conducted by this paper
Hundreds of students have been under the impression that the Daily Cardinal was asking the question as to Whether they did or did not want war. That is o intelligent student never wants war, that he expect that that course will only be adopted as $z_{\text {a tast resor }}$ establish the rights of this nation.
The question that was asked of students was:
Do you think that the state department is jus-
tified in assuming a policy of armed intervention in Nicaragua which may lead to war with Mexico? opinion following a series of editorials in the Dail, Carainal on the subject. Some have objected that this

## Nicaragua

The follong editorial is taken from a previous edition of the Daily Cardinal. It is of the situation).
Somehow or other there seems to be a bit of difficulty these days in the région of Nicaragua. Yesterday the oress reported that the state department had sent six more warships toward that country making a grand total of 15 battleships and 4,670 men in Central American waters. The game is being played in a very pe culiar fashion and it is particularly hard to understand the situation between conflicting state department reports, news items, and editorials in various newspa-
The United States has argued the right that "a thority shall only be given at the consent of the govorned" and de facto governments were recognized in accordance with that policy. But suddenly it is not to our best interests that the people of Nicaragua should have that sacred right. Immediately we send battleships and Marines into the region to maintain neutra cause of our paternalistic attitude toward our southern beighbors, but elie to to to maintain his authority. Shortly it is discovered that we were making a mistake in establishing neutral zones because that is the one thing Dr. Sacasa desires-limiation of the battle area. Result-our troops are withdrawn, and we are put in a bad light. After a few drawn, and we are put in a oad light. After a few

of the word and that we are merely maintaining rights and properties of our citizens, we cannot look upon action in any other light than direct intervention in inment.
