
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# DIVERSITY OF PROGRAMMING MARKS UNION'S 50TH CELEBRATION

"The Wisconsin Union: A Half-Century of Constructive Involvement" is the theme which will carry through the next year as the Union marks the 50th Anniversary of its opening.

All of the Union's interest and programming areas will contribute to the year's festivities, with a diverse range of activities planned for Union members.

scale afternoon and evening outdoor birthday party on Sat., Sept. 9. The gala party, slated from 1 p.m. to 1 a.m., will include the area's top folk musicians and bands, square dancing, sailing, kayaking and other demonstrations by the Hoofers, street theater, art demonstrations and, according to the sponsors, the Memorial Union Social area and the Hoofers, the world's largest milkshake.

In a different vein, the Union will continue its tradition of providing an open platform for free discussion with a lively program of forums, debates, lectures and symposia planned by the Ideas and Issues interest area. The program will include symposia on "Our Bodies, Ourselves," which will deal with "Human Sexuality" in the fall semester and will continue in the spring with the topic, "Taking Care of Ourselves."

The discussion of "Human Sexuality" will be presented in a series of workshops, lectures, films and debates beginning Sept. 14. Subjects to be covered in the three-week program include abortion, contraception, genetics and heredity, male sexuality, motherhood, divorce, gay parents, planned parenthood, rape, battered women, gay rights and overpopulation. The program will conclude October 4 with "Everything you wanted to know about sexuality but ver asked" Fair.

The Ideas and Issues interest area will also sponsor a lecture by noted television newsman and author Edwin Newman on Sunday, Oct. 9, in the Union Theater.

### FUND RAISING TOPS \$1,000,000

The Union set forth in 1974 to raise \$1,000,000 to expand, up-date, and decorate its 50-year-old building in preparation for this year's golden anniversary.

In September, cash and pledges for all sources had passed the \$1,070,000 mark. The funds have come principally from class gifts, a nation-wide campaign among alumni, and student life membership subscriptions.

#### ANNIVERSARY CONT.

Adding yet another dimension to the celebration will be the Art and Craft interest area, which will present several special exhibitions during the anniversary year.

"National Glass Invitational: New Directions" is the opening exhibition for the semester in the Main and Class of 1925 galleries. Artists selected by David Willard, asst. professor in the UW-Madison department of art, include those whose interests lie in the aspects that go beyond the usual concept of the material. Painted glass, neon installations, slumped and molded glass will be included.

Photography as an artistic medium is the subject of the Camera Concepts exhibit opening in November. The 30th edition of the annual exhibition, scheduled for the Susan B. Anthony Gallery in Union South, will feature work by students and staff on the Madison campus as selected by a panel of experts.

The 50th Anniversary year will also feature the annual Wisconsin Designer-Craftsmen exhibition, to be held in Madison for the first time. The exhibition, scheduled for November in the Main and Class of 1925 galleries, will feature work in all craft media, metal, fiber, clay and wood by professional craftspeople from all over the state.

The student committee is also working with the Elvehjem Art Center to present the first exhibition of work from the Hooper Print Collection. The exhibit, scheduled during the Union's Anniversary week, is outlined in another story in this issue. The Theater's gala anniversary season, including the five-week residency of the Alwin Nikolais Dance Theatre, is also featured in other stories.

All of this is just a beginning, with each of the Union's student interest areas contributing its own expertise to the anniversary year. Among the other activities now being planned are an extensive series of family programs, a special celebration at Union South, a women's conference, a wide range of social events, and a second semester open house. - The Harry Blackstone, Jr., Magic Show, one of the season's special theater events, will bring illusion, sorcery, sleight of hand—and more than a few surprises—to the Union Theater stage for two performances on Friday, October 6. Also featured as a special event this fall will be renowned sitarist Ravi Shankar on November 3.
- The Theater will welcome a new Affiliate Artist, composer and 12-string guitarist Mitchell Korn, who will be in Madison for a total of eight weeks during the year. Korn's residency, supported by The Sears-Roebuck Foundation and the National Endowment for the Arts, will include visits with campus and community groups at schools, churches, libraries, hospitals and retirement centers.

#### HOOPER EXHIBITION

In its 50th year, the Wisconsin Union continues to bring the finest art available to the Madison viewing audience. In conjunction with the Elvehjem Museum of Art, the Memorial Union will present the first exhibition from the Helen and Mark Hooper Print Collection, recently donated to the University.

The exhibition, featuring works by renowned American and European printmakers including Picasso, Miro and S.W. Hayter, is scheduled to open Thursday, October 5 during the Anniversary Reunion Weekend in the Main and Class of 1925 Galleries.

One of the nation's most extensive print collections of American and European artists resides in the Hooper's Door County gallery. Although the Hoopers have been collecting prints since 1940, it wasn't until 1968 that they opened their collection to the public for retail sale.

There are well over 1,000 prints now in the Hooper Collection. Many of the works including the American prints have been purchased at the Atelier 17 printmaking workshop in France.

The Memorial Union exhibition will run through November 5 with an opening reception on the Wednesday of the 50th anniversary week, October 4, at 8 p.m. in the Memorial Union Main Gallery.

# NIKOLAIS DANCE TROUPE WILL PREMIERE NEW WORK DURING UNION RESIDENCY

The premiere performance of a new dance piece by renowned choreographer Alwin Nikolais will be one of the Union's very special 50th birthday presents. Nikolais, director, choreographer, composer and designer for his own dance theater for some 30 years, will create the new work during a five-week residency with the Union Theater this fall. Following the Madison premiere, the work will become part of the company's standard repertoire.

Nikolais, his dancers and technicians will teach classes, give lecture-demonstrations, open rehearsals and other educational programs throughout the visit, slated from November 6 through December 9.

The Nikolais Dance Theatre had its beginnings in Manhattan's famous Henry Street Playhouse in 1948 when Nikolais, the theater's new director, assembled a small unit of student dancers to give programs for underprivileged children. As the young company developed, Nikolais accomplished a revolution in dance, moving from earlier traditions to an entirely new form of multimedia or total theater and making dance a visual art as well as a kinetic one.

Support for the residency includes a grant of \$40,000 from the National Endowment for the Arts, the largest arts grant ever awarded the UW-Madison campus.

# ACTOR FREDRIC MARCH TO BE HONORED IN UNION CEREMONIES

"A star of the first magnitude," "a career without parallel in the entertainment world" -- such was the praise accorded actor Fredric March in 1959 when the University of Wisconsin awarded an honorary degree to one of its most famous graduates.

The renowned star of screen and stage will be honored again this fall when the Play Circle, the Memorial Union's small experimental drama and film theater, will be dedicated in his name. The ceremony and a special Fredric March Film Festival are planned in conjunction with the 50th Anniversary of the Union. Funds raised by the Class of 1920 and by other friends of March have underwritten the refurbishing of the 39-year-old facility for the Anniversary.

March actually began his illustrious career on the UW-Madison campus where he appeared in student plays and in "Union Vodvil," the Union's variety show. A student member of the Union Board, March also served as president of his Class of 1920. The actor never forgot his Union involvement and the encouragement he received and when the Union Theater wing was planned in the mid-1930's, March was instrumental in raising funds for the Play Circle. Later he served as a Trustee of the Memorial Union Building Association, the alumni-faculty group which guides the long-term development of the Union.

March, a native of Racine, died in 1975, but his contribution to film and the theater stands as a rich legacy. Among his most acclaimed roles are his Academy Award winning performances in ''Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde'' and ''Best Years of Our Lives;'' ''Death of a Salesman,'' for which he was named best actor at the Venice Film Festival; and ''Years Ago'' and ''Long Day's Journey Into Night'' which earned the actor Broadway's coveted Tony awards.

In many of his performances, March co-starred with his wife, Florence Eldridge, who will be a special guest at the Play Circle dedication ceremonies. The March's daughter, Mrs. Umberto Fantacci of Florence, Italy, will also attend the ceremonies.

The March Film Festival will open October 3, with "A Star is Born," a 1937 film with Janet Gaynor. Other Festival films are October 5, "Nothing Sacred," 1937, Carole Lombard (Union South); "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde," 1932, Miriam Hopkins; October 11, "The Iceman Cometh," 1973, Lee Marvin and Robert Ryan; October 18, "Best Years of Our Lives," 1946, Myrna Loy and Dana Andrews; and October 25, "Inherit the Wind," 1960, with Spencer Tracy. All of the films will be presented free, with the exception of "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" which will be shown as a regular Movie Time feature, with \$1.00 admission. The Film Festival is sponsored by the Wisconsin Union Directorate Theater Arts Area, the 50th Anniversary Coordinating Committee and the Memorial Union Rathskeller.
