- 12. "My Wild Irish Rose"
- 13. "After The Ball"

- 1. "The Bright May Month." Another "school song."
- 2. "Bring Flowers of the Rarest." To the Virgin Mary.
 Talks about Irish women school teachers in Polish settlement at
 Jennings. (See Ben Logan on Irish teachers.)

His family's Bohemian heritage, eight sisters and no brothers in family, the trip to Jennings, Wisconsin; move to Moquah in 1911.

Description of relationships with Chippewas.

Mentions father of Tom Johanik and how he played for dances; speaks of directing and managing a Slovak and Bohemian singing group that performed at fairs (Donna Kramolis has the sheet music, she's daughter of his relative).

3. A Bohemian song - a love song about a girl leaving her grieving lover.

Trans. "I walk through a shady grove,
And the nightengale sang
A song of love, a song of pain (or suffering)

- 6. "You Mustn't Pick Plums From My Plum Tree." Love between school children.

1. Lumberjack's Alphabet
Worked one winter at lumber camp on Bad River in 1914;
That's the only song he knows.
Plenty singing in camps; some of those songs were "not nice."
Liquor in the camps.

Talks about parents' singing.

- 2. Hums tune for dancing the "Czardas" (pronounced "Chardosh"). Hungarian & Slovak "Chardosh" danced to accordion band.
 - On local farmers working in lumber camps, mines, later the Barksdale munitions plant during WWI.
- 3. A song from his father gives only a fragment and forgets
- 4. Another Bohemian fragment / a parting between a girl and boyfriend.
- 5. Another Bohemian fragment / I'm an orphan without a father and mother...
 I'm all alone.
 On father singing and playing harmonica.

- 11. "Boil Them Possum Down" a "coon song;" picked up in Michigan 1910. localizes to Ashland, Washburn, Moquah.

Discusses his education, old timers in Moquah, local schools.

Discusses his history of Moquah of community.

Dances in the community; mentions waltzes.

12. Hums "Annie in the Cabbage Field" - a special dance with clapping.

- 1. Hums another tune for a "Czardas"

 A rapid, fast dance with increasing tempo and fancy steps, sings words
- 2. Trans. 'Marry me Johnny, take me for your wife,
 I'll be a very good worker; I'll get up early in the morning.
