New York Indians.

Albany Sept. 26<sup>th</sup> 1839

Sir

I have the honor to transmit herewith, a treaty with the Stockbridge & Munsie tribes of Indians completed on the 2nd. Sept. current.

You will at once perceive, that I have not followed the letter, although I believe I have the spirit, of my instructions.

The Indians declined to treat upon the basis laid down in ~~the~~ instructions, i.e. to cede their lands, & receive therefor, the amount they might bring less the expenses of surveying & selling.

I strove hard to induce them to come to a different conclusion, but could not succeed. After becoming satisfied that the United States must purchase outright, or not at all, & being also satisfied that it would cost no more to make a treaty than to return without one, I came to the conclusion to treat with them on the best terms I could induce them to agree upon. I think you will not hesitate to agree with me in the opinion, that in so far as the U. S. are concerned, the present treaty is quite as favorable, as one would have been, if framed upon the basis, indicated by your letter of instructions.

The lands ceded, are of the first quality, well watered by springs, & the tract has on it some of the best mill sites in all that part of the country. There are no broken lands on the tract; they are all susceptible of cultivation, & will I doubt not, bring much more than \$1.25/100 per acre. Should they fail to bring more than 10¢ there will be still 25 cts difference between the price paid, & the minimum price of public lands, which will richly pay the expenses of surveying & selling.

The Emigrating party declined to receive stock & farming utensils in part payment for their lands. They have several mechanics among them, & are all well acquainted with the value of farming implements & cattle.



You may be somewhat disappointed that so few of the Stock-  
bridges & Muncos proper are inclined to emigrate - The emigrating  
party having ~~been~~ misrepresented their strength to the In-  
dependent & perhaps deceived themselves -

For the purpose of strengthening themselves, the Missouri  
party some two years since, sent two of their head men  
Hendrick & Konomahot to Canada, & invited some of the  
Muncos & Delawares, then residing there, to come over & settle  
down among them, saying as they were a band of the Muncos  
tribe, they had rights in common with the New York Muncos  
& Stockbridges in the lands on the east side of Winnebago  
Lake - Thus Canada Indians to the number of some 115 or 120  
came over, & squatted down among the Stockbridges & Muncos.  
The anti emigrating party, headed by the Sachem & all the  
councillors of the tribe objected to their right to do so; because  
they said, those persons were never New York Indians for  
whom & whom alone these lands were obtained - that at the  
time of the cession & long before, these Canada Indians had been  
residents of the British provinces, they having <sup>from Ohio & Indiana</sup> emigrated to  
Canada in the early stage of the last war, joined the British  
& fought for them: that they for many years had been known  
only as British Indians, & had been recognized as such by the  
British authorities. After about two weeks consultation the  
claims of the Canada Indians were withdrawn & that obstacle  
removed - They are very anxious to go west with those who  
have agreed to emigrate from Stockbridge, & were desirous that  
some provision should be made for their removal in the treaty.  
To this I objected, not feeling authorized to make any agreement  
for the removal of these Indians - I however agreed to forward  
the paper marked A herewith annexed, which will explain their  
wishes, & to request that they might be allowed to go west, with  
the Hendrick party of the Stockbridges & Muncos -

I also send a letter from John Peter head of the Canada  
Indians & others of the same party, & also a sketch made by  
Peter which was written down by me as it was interpreted

A portion of the Omahas at Dutch Creek are very anxious to sell  
out their lands & go West-

Much difficulty has grown up among  
them in relation to their government- There are two parties, one  
desirous to emigrate called the Missouri party, the other prefer-  
ing to remain known as the Grand party- The former is headed  
by Henry Beard, & the latter by — Beard-

On my arrival at Green Bay a delegation of both parties  
met me & requested me to visit their settlement & hold a  
talk with them- I replied that I could do so only as a private  
individual, & not as an agent of the U.S., having no authority  
no authority from the Govt- to meet or talk with them  
They replied, that they were much disappointed by the infor-  
-mation, having been assured that a Com<sup>rs</sup> would be sent to  
treat with them- I finally consented to visit them & did  
so on the 7th Sept. & met them in Council- They evinced a  
strong desire to dispose of so much of their land as would  
amount to the shares of those who are of the Missouri party  
I remarked to them that I could not say whether or not the  
U.S. would treat with them for the purchase of a portion of  
their lands; but that if it should incline to do so, it would  
never consent to treat with a faction, no matter to which of the  
parties it might belong- That the only way to bring about a treaty,  
would be for both parties to unite in the application, that if they  
did so, the U.S. might possibly be inclined to treat with them.  
The chiefs of both parties then agreed to ask the Govt to send  
a Com<sup>rs</sup> to purchase so much of their lands as would be the  
share of the Missouri party, who number as you will see by  
a roll or census herunto annexed & marked B, to 192 souls.  
This number will be increased whenever the Indians can  
become satisfied that there will be any certainty of their  
going West. The share of those whose names are contained  
in the accompanying list is 18,200 acres- I was authorized  
& requested by both parties to make this statement & to request  
you to take the necessary steps to bring about a treaty- & to  
ask you to inform me, or them whether their request will be  
complied with-

Articles of a Treaty

Sept 3<sup>d</sup> 1839

Proclamation,  
May 16<sup>th</sup> 1840.

Made at Stockbridge in the Territory of Wisconsin on the third day of September in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty nine, between the United States of America, by their Commissioner Albert Gallup, and the Stockbridge and Munssee tribes of Indians, who reside upon Lake Winnebago in the Territory of Wisconsin. —

Land ceded  
to the U. S.

Article 1. The Stockbridge and Munssee tribes of Indians (formerly of New York) hereby cede and relinquish to the United States, the east half of the tract of forty six thousand and eighty acres of land, which was laid off for their use, on the east side of Lake Winnebago, in pursuance of the treaty made by George B. Porter commissioner on the part of the United States, and the Menominee nation of Indians, on the twenty seventh day of October eighteen hundred and thirty two.

The said east half hereby ceded, to contain twenty three thousand and forty acres of land: to be of equal width at the North and South ends, and to be divided from the west half of said tract of forty six thousand and eighty acres, by a line to be run parallel to the east line of said tract,

The United States to pay therefor, one dollar per acre at the time and in the manner hereinafter provided. —

Payment to

Art: 2. Whereas a portion of said tribes, according to a census or roll taken, and hereto annexed, are desirous to remove west and the others to remain where they now are; and whereas the just proportion of the emigrating

party in the whole tract of forty six thousand and eighty acres is eight thousand seven hundred and sixty seven and three fourths acres of land; it is agreed that the United States pay to the said emigrating party, the sum of eight thousand seven hundred and sixty seven dollars and seventy five cents, as a full compensation for all their interest in the lands held by the party who remain, as well as in the lands <sup>heretofore</sup> ceded to the United States.

Improvements

Art. 3. Whereas the improvements of the emigrating <sup>party</sup> are all on that part of the original tract which is reserved and still held by the party who remain in Stockbridge, and it is but equitable that those who remain should pay those who emigrate for such improvements; it is agreed that the United States shall pay to the emigrating party the sum of three thousand eight hundred and seventy nine dollars and thirty cents, the appraised value of said improvements; and it is hereby agreed and expressly understood, that the monies payable to the emigrating party shall be distributed among the heads of families according to the schedule hereunto annexed, the whole amount to be paid to the emigrating party under this and the preceding article being the sum of twelve thousand six hundred and forty seven dollars and five cents.

Art 4. The balance of the consideration

Balance of money for the lands hereby ceded (after deducting the consideration money to be invested, &c.) amounting to the sum of ten thousand and three hundred and ninety two dollars and ninety five cents, is to be paid to, and invested for the benefit of such of the Stockbridge and Munsee tribes of Indians (numbering three hundred and forty two souls) as remain at their present place of residence at Stockbridge on the east side of Winnebago Lake, as follows.

Six thousand dollars of said sum to be invested by the United States in public stocks at an interest of not less than five per cent per annum as a permanent school fund; the interest of which shall be paid annually to the sachem and councillors of their tribes, or such other person as they may appoint to receive the same, whose receipt shall be a sufficient voucher therefor; and the balance thereof amounting to four thousand three hundred and ninety two dollars and ninety five cents, shall be paid to the said sachem and councillors, or to such person as they may appoint to receive the same, whose receipt shall be a sufficient voucher therefor.

The moneys to be paid in one year.

Art. 5. The monies herein secured to be paid by the United States to the Stockbridge and Munsee tribes amounting in all to twenty three thousand and forty dollars, are to be paid in manner aforesaid, in one year from the date hereof, or sooner if practicable.

Exploring

Art. 6. It is agreed that an exploring party not exceeding three in number may visit the country west, if the Indians shall consider it necessary, and whenever those who are desirous of emigrating shall signify their wish to that effect, the United States will defray the expenses of their removal west of the Mississippi and furnish them with subsistence for one year after their arrival at their new-homes. The expenses of the exploring party to be borne by the emigrants.

Mode of settling

Art. 7. Whereas there are certain unliquidated claims and accounts existing between the emigrating party, and those who remain where they now are, which it is now impossible to liquidate and adjust, it is hereby agreed that the same shall be submitted to the agent of the United States who shall be appointed to make the payments under this treaty, and that his decision shall be final thereon.

## MARTIN VAN BUREN,

PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

**To all and singular to whom these presents shall come, Greeting:**

WHEREAS, a treaty was made at Stockbridge, in the Territory of Wisconsin, on the third day of September, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, between the United States of America, by their Commissioner, Albert Gallup, and the Stockbridge and Munsee tribes of Indians, who reside upon the Lake Winnebago, in the territory of Wisconsin; which treaty is word for word as follows, to wit:

### ARTICLES OF A TREATY

*Made at Stockbridge in the Territory of Wisconsin, on the third day of September in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine, between the United States of America, by their Commissioner Albert Gallup, and the Stockbridge and Munsee tribes of Indians, who reside upon Lake Winnebago, in the territory of Wisconsin.*

#### ARTICLE I.

The Stockbridge and Munsee tribes of Indians (formerly of New York) hereby cede and relinquish to the United States, the east half of the tract of forty-six thousand and eighty acres of land, which was laid off for their use, on the east side of Lake Winnebago, in pursuance of the treaty made by George B. Porter Commissioner on the part of the United States, and the Menominee nation of Indians, on the twenty-seventh day of October, eighteen hundred and thirty-two. The said east half hereby ceded, to contain twenty-three thousand and forty acres of land, to be of equal width at the north and south ends, and to be divided from the west half of said tract of forty-six thousand and eighty acres, by a line to be run parallel to the east line of said tract. The United States to pay therefor, one dollar per acre at the time and in the manner hereinafter provided.

#### ART. II.

Whereas a portion of said tribes, according to a census or roll taken, and hereunto annexed, are desirous to remove west, and the others to remain where they now are; and whereas the just proportion of the emigrating party in the whole tract of forty-six thousand and eighty acres, is eight thousand seven hundred and sixty-seven and three-fourths acres of land, it is agreed that the United States pay to the said emigrating party, the sum of eight thousand seven hundred and sixty-seven dollars and seventy-five cents, as a full compensation for all their interest in the lands held by the party who remain, as well as in the lands hereby ceded to the United States.

#### ART. III.

Whereas the improvements of the emigrating party are all on that part of the original tract which is reserved and still held by the party who remain in Stockbridge, and it is but equitable that those who remain should pay those who emigrate for such improvements; it is agreed that the United States shall pay to the emigrating party the sum of three thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine dollars and thirty cents, the appraised value of said improvements; and it is hereby agreed and expressly understood, that the moneys payable to the emigrating party shall be distributed among the heads of families according to the schedule hereunto annexed, the whole amount to be paid to the emigrating party, under this and the preceding article being the sum of twelve thousand, six hundred and forty-seven dollars and five cents.

ART. IV.

The balance of the consideration money for the lands hereby ceded, (after deducting the sums mentioned in the second and third articles) amounting to the sum of ten thousand three hundred and ninety-two dollars and ninety-five cents, is to be paid to, and invested for the benefit of, such of the Stockbridge and Munsee tribes of Indians (numbering three hundred and forty-two souls) as remain at their present place of residence at Stockbridge on the east side of Winnebago lake, as follows. Six thousand dollars of said sum to be invested by the United States in public stocks at an interest of not less than five per cent. per annum as a permanent school fund; the interest of which shall be paid annually to the sachem and counsellors of their tribes, or such other person as they may appoint to receive the same, whose receipt shall be a sufficient voucher therefor; and the balance thereof amounting to four thousand three hundred and ninety-two dollars and ninety-five cents, shall be paid to the said sachem and counsellors, or to such person as they may appoint to receive the same whose receipt shall be a sufficient voucher therefor.

ARTICLE V.

The moneys herein secured to be paid by the United States to the Stockbridge and Munsee tribes amounting in all to twenty-three thousand and forty dollars are to be paid in manner aforesaid, in one year from the date hereof, or sooner if practicable.

ART. VI.

It is agreed that an exploring party not exceeding three in number may visit the country west, if the Indians shall consider it necessary, and that whenever those who are desirous of emigrating shall signify their wish to that effect, the United States will defray the expenses of their removal west of the Mississippi, and furnish them with subsistence for one year after their arrival at their new homes. The expenses of the exploring party to be borne by the emigrants.

ART. VII.

Whereas there are certain unliquidated claims and accounts existing between the emigrating party, and those who remain where they now are, which it is now impossible to liquidate and adjust; it is hereby agreed that the same shall be submitted to the agent of the United States who shall be appointed to make the payments under this treaty, and that his decision shall be final thereon.
