HISTORY OF CAMP RANDALL STADIUM

They call it Camp Randall.

That's important.

Every now and then some hurried out-of-town sports announcer will call it "Randall Field," but he is corrected quickly.

The University of Wisconsin is proud that its sports center is more than just an athletic field—and that the drama and excitement of football seasons are set against a backdrop of colorful Wisconsin history.

In its 79 years of ownership, the University has expanded the facilities there until they include a large stadium, fieldhouse, memorial practice building and football practice fields.

But the University didn't name it. The name was decided long before that by veterans of the Civil War who knew it was a great military camp named for a wartime governor. When the University took it over they insisted that the name be preserved forever as a memorial to their fallen friends.

In the days before the Civil War, the site was owned by the State Agricultural Society whose yearly state fairs attracted holidaying throngs there. With the outbreak of the war, however, the society turned the place over to the government to become the state's major training center.

The display halls were transformed into white-washed barracks and the hall used for flower shows became a hospital. A total of 70,000 troops was drilled—usually about 7,000 being stationed there at a time—and 500,000 relatives and friends came to visit them.

Later in the war part of the camp became a prison where a group of sick Confederates, captured by Gen. Pope at Island No. 10 in the Mississippi, was brought. Many died in the drafty prison hospital on the knoll and were buried in what is now Confederate Rest at Forest Hill cemetery.

The land again became the state fair grounds when peace returned and when Gen. U. S. Grant visited it 15 years later he hailed the transformation as "a symbol of beating the spears of war into the plowshares of peace."

Other visitors to the grounds were Gens. Sherman and Sheridan and Pres. Hayes. When the state fair was moved to Milwaukee and a few years later even the Dane County Agricultural society stopped using it for fairs, the Civil War veterans were furious to learn the land was to be sold for building lots.

Blasting the "sordid sacrilege," they urged the legislature to buy it and in 1893 the state presented it to the University as a memorial athletic field.

When the question of a name arose, the veterans promptly carried the day for "camp" instead of "Field."

Intercollegiate athletics had been started at Wisconsin in 1881 and the University has had a football team since 1889. The school won its first great victory in 1894, defeating Minnesota 6-0 in a game on the lower campus that part of the crowd watched from fringed surreys. The great teams of '96, '97, and '01 were among the first to play at the new field.

Charles Van Hise, who became president of the University in 1903, was a sports enthusiast as well as a great president and he used to ride his horse nightly out to watch the football practice. Games were played before the old wood fairstand and many Madison business and professional men still boast of the holes they found as boys to insure a free look at the fun.

The University had a "real" stadium by 1913 but its stands were still wooden. The legislature declined to pay for concrete—and consequently, was promptly blamed when a large section collapsed Nov. 21, 1915, at the climactic Wisconsin-Minnesota game.

Twenty people were injured, some seriously, and only the fact that the seats fell slowly prevented more casualties among the 1,800 in the area.

So in 1917 the present stadium—following completion of the past year's addition—was started with a grant of \$15,000 from the legislature. The rest of the money was earned by athletic events and the stadium, which now seats 77,280, is the only one in the Big Ten to "pay its own way" that way. Permanent dormitories were built, housing 150 men, but this space now is used as athletic department offices and training quarters.

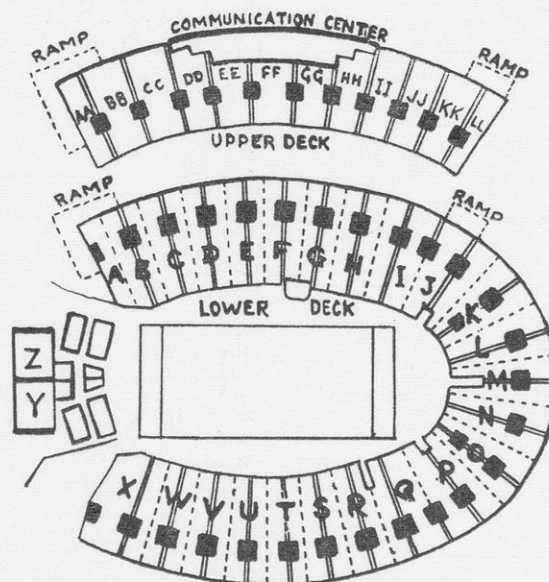
The first game to be played in Camp Randall Stadium was the 1917 homecoming game against Minnesota's Golden Gophers. The Badgers won the game 10-7 to hand the Gophers their only Big Ten loss, relegating them to second place in the final conference standings. A week later, Ohio State visited Camp Randall and inflicted a 16-3 defeat on the Badgers; the Ohioans won the title that year with an unbeaten record. Wisconsin placed in a tie for third place with Northwestern.

The fieldhouse at the open end of the stadium horseshoe was built in 1930 for almost \$500,000 and has a seating capacity of 13,800 for basketball games and other events.

The original capacity of the stadium when first utilized in 1917 was 10,000, with permanent seats being added in stages to increase seating capacity.

The current construction project is the third since the end of World War II which began with the completion of the horseshoe at the north end in 1950 and 1951.

The running track was eliminated in 1958 expansion which saw the playing field of Camp Randall lowered by ten feet to add almost 12,000 seats to the stadium capacity which grew to 63,435 at that time.

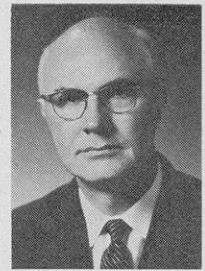

"MAN ON THE GO"—

Elroy Hirsch

Elroy Hirsch is in his sixth year as Wisconsin's Director of Athletics and is the guiding force behind one of the finest athletic programs in the nation for men and women.

He came to Wisconsin from the Los Angeles Rams on February 28, 1969, and his original appointment as athletic director — scheduled to end in 1979 — was extended last winter by the school's athletic board to June 30, 1984.

Professor **Frederick W. Haberman**, Athletic Board chairman, pointed out, "**Elroy richly merits our confidence. His dynamic personality has infused our entire operation with that indefinable quality we usually call spirit. His good sense and hard work has contributed substantial achievements to the progress of the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics.**"

"He has established rapport with the faculty, the alumni throughout the country, the people of the state, and the coaching personnel of the high schools. Despite lack of funds for maintenance of the physical plant, he has brought about remarkable improvements in our facilities. Total attendance at our athletic events has never been surpassed. Organization and morale within the Division have never been better.

"Last year, the teams in our thirteen intercollegiate sports compiled one of the best overall records in our history and in 1972-73 Wisconsin was one of three schools in the land to win two national championships (hockey and crew).

"**Elroy Hirsch** is the best person we can think of to handle the harsh problems — especially those of finance — with which our athletic program will be faced in the months immediately ahead."

His career has been one of success.

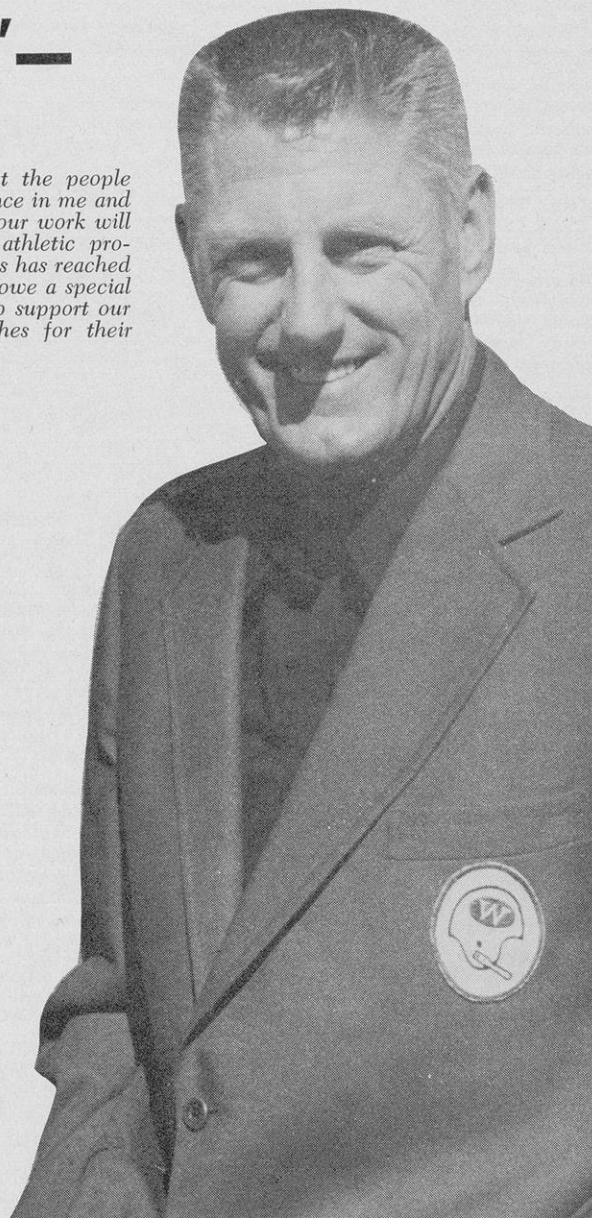
He is a living legend to followers of Wisconsin football and to sports fans and people throughout the entire state even though he played just one season — as a sophomore in 1942 — for the Badgers.

Wisconsin fans, especially the older generation, remember him as the great triple threat halfback on Harry Stuhldreher's 1942 football team that won eight games, lost only to Iowa, and tied Notre Dame.

He played at Michigan in 1943, as a Marine trainee, and he not only played football, but basketball, track and baseball. He won his "M" in each sport, the only athlete ever to accomplish such a feat at Michigan.

He had a successful professional football career, first as halfback with the Chicago Rockets of the post-war All-America Conference, and later

with the Los Angeles Rams for nine seasons as one of the all-time great ends.

He was a successful executive with the Rams, first as general manager of the team, and later as assistant to the president of the team, a job he relinquished to accept the job as Wisconsin athletic director.

Elroy retired from active NFL play following the 1957 season.

He's been named to the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame (1965), to professional football's Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio (1968), and will be included into the National Football Hall of Fame on December 10, 1974 in New York City.

He's also a member of the all-time NFL All-Star team for his play as end and flanker with the Los Angeles Rams that served to change the game from one of two-way players to

offensive and defensive specialists under free substitution.

In 1951, **Hirsch** displayed all his talents as he put together one of the finest seasons in National Football League history. He gained 1,495 yards on receptions, an all-time record approached only by **Bobby Mitchell** of the Washington Redskins (1,436 yards in 1963) and **Hirsch** had only twelve games to set the record, not 14, like **Mitchell**!

That same season **Hirsch** caught 17 touchdown passes to tie the league record set by **Don Hutson** of the Packers in 1942. He also caught at least one touchdown pass through 11 consecutive games over the 1950 and 1951 seasons.

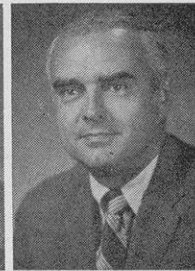

OTTO BREITENBACH Assistant Athletic Director

Otto Breitenbach joined the Wisconsin Athletic Department staff July 1, 1973 following an highly successful tenure as athletic director and football coach at Madison's LaFollette High School.

The new Badger assistant athletic director is a native Madisonian and graduated in 1941 from Edgewood High school, where he was a three-sport star.

He enrolled at Wisconsin in the autumn of 1941 and was a halfback on the school's 1942 football team which posted an overall 8-1-1 record while placing second in the Big Ten and third nationally that year.

World War II service in the Air Force as an instructor-pilot interrupted his schooling until 1946 when he returned to Wisconsin to continue work on his Bachelor of Science degree in physical education which he obtained in 1948.

The 50-year-old Breitenbach began his coaching career at Chilton High School in 1948 serving four years as football assistant and two years as head basketball coach.

He moved to Middleton High School in 1952 for an eleven year stay as head football coach and he moved to LaFollette as head football coach when the school opened in 1963.

His Middleton High school teams won three Badger Conference championships, and at LaFollette he produced Big Eight Conference titles in 1967 and 1969 with the 1967 team being rated the state's No. 1 team at season's end. His 1969 LaFollette track team won the state Class A championship with 20 points.

He completed work on his master's degree in Physical Education at Wisconsin in 1955.

He is a past-president of the Wisconsin High School Coaches Association 1968-69, served as secretary-treasurer of the Wisconsin Athletic Director's Association in 1971 and is a past member of the Board of Directors of the National "W" Club.

Otto and his wife Pat are the parents of two married daughters — Sarah and Jane — and a son, Bill.

KIT SAUNDERS Director, Women's Intercollegiate Athletics

Katherine 'Kit' Saunders serves as Wisconsin's first Director of Women's Intercollegiate Athletics. She was named to the job in May, 1974 by action of the Athletic Board effective July 1, 1974.

A native of Teaneck, New Jersey, she is a 1962 graduate of Trenton (N. J.) State College with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Health and Physical Education. She came to Wisconsin in 1964 as a teaching assistant in women's physical education and obtained her Master of Science degree in Physical Education here in 1966.

Ms. Saunders, who has been active in all phases of Women's athletics on the UW-Madison campus, commented, "There's a great deal of work to be done. It's an exciting future. I'm looking forward to working with the men in the Intercollegiate Department and in building a solid women's program at Wisconsin."

The eleven sports comprising the women's intercollegiate program at the present time include badminton, basketball, crew, fencing, field hockey, golf, gymnastics, swimming, tennis, track and field, and volleyball.

Ms. Saunders played field hockey and lacrosse while in college and played on club teams in both sports following graduation, gaining all-Sectional honors in field hockey.

She was active nationally with the US Women's Lacrosse Association and held a national umpire's rating in the sport prior to coming to Wisconsin.

She began teaching at Teaneck, N. J., High School following graduation from college in 1962 instructing in physical education and coaching field hockey, basketball, and lacrosse.

Kit initiated the beginning of the Big Ten Women's Tennis Tournament in 1972 and it has been held at Nielsen Tennis Stadium each of the past three years. Wisconsin's women's team placed second in 1972, third in 1973, and fourth in 1974.

She helped to found the Wisconsin Women's Intercollegiate Conference — it includes Wisconsin, the nine state universities, Carthage College and Carroll College — in 1971 and served the Conference as Secretary-

Treasurer its first two years of existence.

She currently serves as President of the Wisconsin Association for Girls' and Women's Sports.

Ms. Saunders is an active participant in skiing, golf, tennis, badminton, sailing and canoeing.

HAROLD E. 'Bud' FOSTER Director, Grant-In-Aids

Harold E. 'Bud' Foster has served as Wisconsin's grant-in-aids director since 1959 when he completed a 25-year stint as the school's head basketball coach.

A native of Newton, Kansas, Bud prepped at Mason City, Iowa and enrolled at Wisconsin in 1926 majoring in Economics.

He was an All-Big Ten center in the 1929 and 1930 seasons and capped his career by winning All-American honors in the latter year. Wisconsin teams won 43 and lost eight games during his varsity career.

He was named freshman coach of basketball in 1933 and a year later stepped into the head coaching job when Dr. Walter E. Meanwell resigned, and guided Wisconsin to the conference co-championship in his first year on a 9-3 record.

Wisconsin's 1941 team reigned as Big Ten and NCAA champions on a 20-3 record, and the 1947 team won the conference title and lost in the NCAA eastern regionals.

Bud's 25 Wisconsin teams posted an overall 265-267 record with a conference record of 143-182.

He served as president of the National Association of Basketball coaches and was a member of the Basketball Rules Committee from 1957 to 1966.

He's a Hall of Fame member as well — National Basketball, Wisconsin State, Madison Sports, and Helms Athletic Foundation.

JIM MOTT Sports Information Director

Jim Mott was appointed Wisconsin's Sports Information Director in March, 1966, after serving as assistant to Art Lentz 1954-56 and George Lanphear 1956-66.

The 44-year-old journalist was born in Madison in 1929 and spent (continued on page 11)

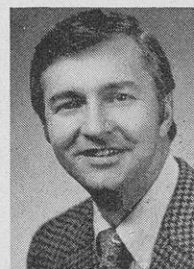

John Jardine Heads Wisconsin Football Program

Wisconsin's football program is headed by **John Jardine**, a 1958 graduate of Purdue University, now in his fifth season as the school's 23rd head football coach.

His overall record for four seasons as Wisconsin's head coach is 16-25-2 and in those four seasons, the Badgers' home attendance has totalled 1,631,744 or an average of 65,270 for 25 games.

Wisconsin's home attendance figures ranked eighth in the nation in 1970 (377,335); third in 1971 (408,885); fourth in 1972 (422,721), and seventh in 1973 (422,803) as fans responded eagerly to the exciting style of Jardine-coached football.

Jardine came to Wisconsin from a highly successful assistantship at UCLA where he was offensive line coach under **Tommy Prothro** for five seasons, a period in which UCLA posted an overall record of 35-13-3.

The 39-year-old **Jardine** prepped at St. George High School in Evanston, Illinois, lettering in football, basketball and swimming in the rugged Chicago Catholic League. He was not eligible to play as a senior — due to a transfer rule — and was team manager as St. George won the 1953 Chicago city title.

He pursued his collegiate career at Purdue and was a tough, 186 pound guard for the Boilermakers in 1955, 1956, and 1957. He was captain of Purdue's 1954 freshman football team and a starter his junior and senior years.

John began his coaching career at Central Catholic High school in Lafayette, Indiana, in 1958 and then moved into the head coaching job at Fenwick High school in Oak Park, Illinois, where in five seasons his teams won 51 games, lost 6 and tied one. He guided Fenwick into Chicago Catholic League title games in 1959, 1960 and 1962, winning in 1959 and 1962. His 1959 team lost to Lane Tech in the Chicago city championship game, but his 1962 team compiled an unbeaten record and blanked Schurz High school 40-0 in winning the Chicago city title.

He was enshrined into the Chicago Catholic League's Hall of Fame in ceremonies earlier this year for his coaching exploits in the league from 1959-63.

He left the prep ranks following the 1963 season to join Purdue's football staff under **Jack Mollenkopf** as offensive line coach, where his assignment covered working with the guards and centers and he was also assigned to recruit the Chicago area.

After spending 1964 at Purdue, he joined **Tommy Prothro** at UCLA in 1965.

The native Chicagoan is the son of James Jardine, recently retired as Water Commissioner of the nation's second largest city.

His brother **Len**, a starting end, co-

captain, and most valuable player on Purdue's 1959 football team, coached six years at Brown University before resigning at the end of 1972 season.

John is married to the former Janice Ensign of River Forest, Illinois, and they have four children: Dan 14, Jennifer 12; John 10, and Jill 8.

Jardine has been active in post season All-Star game coaching. He was head coach of the Blue team in the 1971 Blue-Gray Classic at Montgomery, Ala., and served as an assistant coach in the 1972 Hula Bowl (North) and 1973 East-West Shrine games.

From the moment the new Badger head coach arrived in Madison he was heralded as somewhat of a mixture between **Vince Lombardi** and **Zorro**—a man who in the eyes of most fans could perform the miracle of bringing Wisconsin football back to respectability. An enormous amount of pressure was created by enthusi-

astic fans talking about winning football, and Rose Bowl, and one local sportswriter seeing him as a young **Knute Rockne**.

Coach Jardine, however, remained more "down to earth" than most of the Badger backers. He emphasized that he is no miracle worker; that it will be a long tough climb toward the top.

Jardine's contract was extended through 1976 by the school's athletic board last December. Professor Fred Haberman, board chairman, commented on Jardine's contract extension thusly, **"We wanted him to know he's appreciated. We wanted him to know we have confidence in him and his staff and we wanted John to stay at Wisconsin."**

"He's concerned with the welfare of his players and has great rapport with them. We think he is an excellent administrator of the football program."

Schedule Is Rugged

Wisconsin's 1974 Football Outlook Bright

Wisconsin football is better and getting better!

Coach **John Jardine's** fifth Wisconsin team has an experienced nucleus of 32 major "W" awards winners from last year's 4-7 team — four of the defeats were by a total of ten points — available with eight starters returning on each of the offensive and defensive teams.

Major keys to Wisconsin's 1974 success on the gridiron will be improvement on the defensive perimeter and depth in the offensive backfield.

The Badgers are two-deep at the offensive skill positions and this augurs well for a diversified attack.

Junior tailback **Bill Marek** is one of the best running backs and as hard a runner to tackle as there is in the country today.

He won All-Big Ten honors last year as he rushed for a near school record of 1,207 yards and set an all-time Wisconsin scoring record of 84 points on 14 touchdowns.

Behind **Marek** is sophomore **Ron**

Pollard, 5-8, 176, from Columbus, Ga., who made vast progress in the spring and demonstrated tremendous explosiveness, especially when close to pay dirt. He saw action mainly as a flankerback as a 1973 freshman.

There's good news for Badger fans at fullback, too, where junior **Ken Starch**, 5-11, 207, Madison — the team's second leading rusher in 1973 — and sophomore **Larry Canada**, 6-1½, 216, waged a torrid spring duel for the starting assignment at that position.

The competition between **Marek** and **Pollard** at tailback and **Starch** and **Canada** at fullback is such that **Jardine** points out, "I just wish we had that same kind of depth at every position."

Gregg Bohlig, last year's quarterback starter and second in Big Ten passing and total offense, is back and the experience gained in 1973 has made him a confident signal caller this year. He's backed up by sophomore **Bob Falk**, a transfer from Kansas, though a Madison native, who shook off a shakey start and developed rapidly as the spring drills progressed.

Jardine is particularly high on **Bohlig's** play at quarterback. "He's an entirely different person this year. He's running the option well, which he never did before. He's making the right decisions. It's going to be most difficult for anyone — unless they improve drastically — to beat **Bohlig** out."

With **Bohlig** at the controls in 1973 the Badgers ranked third in Big Ten total offense with 326 yards gained per game — 206.9 rushing and 119.1 passing — and the Wisconsin attack this year should match or surpass those figures.

Bohlig completed 78 of 172 pass attempts for 1,211 yards and eight touchdowns in 1973 with just six interceptions. Only **Neil Graff** with four interceptions in 197 passes in 1970 has ever posted a better interception avoidance record at Wisconsin.

Flankerback **Jeff Mack**, the Badgers' top pass catcher the past two seasons, heads an experienced corps of Badger receivers that includes split ends **Art Sanger** and **Rodney Rhodes**, tight ends **Jack Novak** and **Stan Williams**, and **Randy Rose**, a Green Bay sophomore who showed plenty of spring promise, pressing **Mack** at flankerback.

Wisconsin's offensive line features junior **Dennis Lick**, 6-4½, 255, from Chicago, Illinois, who is rated as one

of the finest offensive tackles in the collegiate game today. He can do it all. He has started 20 straight games since breaking into the starting lineup as a freshman at LSU in 1972.

Madison senior **Bob Johnson** (6-4, 240) holds down the left tackle position opposite **Lick** and lettermen **Rick Koeck** (6-1, 225), senior from Fond du Lac, and **Terry Stieve** (6-2, 240), Baraboo junior, appear set at the guard positions.

All-Big Ten center **Mike Webster** has graduated and finding his replacement may be **Jardine's** biggest problem offensively.

Strength of Wisconsin's defensive alignment appears to be at the ends where seniors **Mark Zakula** and **Mike Vesperman** return along with a fine sophomore prospect **Carl Davis**, 6-1, 209, who played enough as a fresh-

man last year to earn a major "W" award.

Middle guard **Mike Jenkins** returns for his final year after missing the second half of 1973 with a knee injury that required surgery following the Michigan game.

Top linebackers will be senior **Rick Jakious** and junior **Jim Franz** with sophomore **Andy Michuda** and senior **Mike Benninger** adding depth.

There's strength and depth in the Wisconsin defensive secondary, too, headed by lettermen **Alvin Peabody** and **Greg Lewis** at the corners, with **Steve Wagner**, **Mark Cullen**, and **Terry Buss**, all lettermen, battling for the safety positions.

Wisconsin's kicking game should be the best in the Big Ten with **Ken Simmons**, the Big Ten's punting leader last year, returning — he's also a veteran cornerback — and **Vince Lamia** is available for extra points and short range field goal tries.

Randy Rose is also available for punting and will lend his talents, as well, to the punt and kickoff return phases of the game along with senior **Selvie Washington** — he has a 96-yard kickoff return for a touchdown at Nebraska to his credit — and **Ron Pollard**.

Wisconsin's schedule remains tough. It includes Nebraska, Colorado, and Missouri from the Big Eight, and the

George Chryst

Assistant Coach — 3rd Season

George Chryst, highly successful Edgewood High school football coach and athletic director, joined Wisconsin's football staff in July, 1972. His coaching duties will include working with the offensive line this season.

Chuck McBride

Assistant Coach — 5th Season

Chuck McBride, 33, joined the Wisconsin staff in 1970 after serving the previous three years as offensive line coach at Arizona State University. In his three years at Arizona State the Sun Devils under coach Frank Kush compiled a 24-6 record, including 42-16 and 55-7 victories over Wisconsin in 1967 and 1968, respectively.

He's the offensive line coach and serves as the staff's out-of-state recruiting coordinator.

Chuck prepped at Morgan Park

High School in Chicago, winning eleven varsity letters in football, basketball, baseball and track and achieving all-Illinois and All-American honors in football as a senior.

After graduating from Morgan Park in 1958, Chuck turned down an offer to sign with the Chicago White Sox and enrolled at the University of Colorado. He won three letters in football at Colorado as an end and punter, gaining all-Big Eight honors on the Buffalo team that won the conference championship and played in the 1962 Orange Bowl.

McBride signed a professional contract with the Denver Broncos in 1962, but a recurring knee injury kept him out of action and he returned to Colorado to obtain his degree in physical education.

McBride then joined the Arizona State staff where his tenure was highlighted in 1969 when he completely rebuilt the ASU offensive line as the Sun Devils finished 8-2 with no starters returning to the offensive line.

Chuck is married to the former Deborah Anne Denniston of Barrington, Ill. and they have three sons — Mike 11, Jeff 8, and David 7.

Assistant Coach — 2nd Season

Ellis Rainsberger joined Wisconsin's Football staff in January as offensive coordinator following six years as an assistant coach at the University of Illinois.

The 40-year-old Rainsberger is a native of East St. Louis, Illinois, and was an all-state high school player while attending Christian Brothers High School in St. Louis, Mo.

He moved to St. Laurence High School in 1962 and in 1963 joined Loyola Academy as an assistant to **Len Jardine**, then the school's head football coach. **Bob** served as an assistant coach on **Bob Naughton's** staff at Loyola Academy for three years — 1964-66 — and became head coach in 1967.

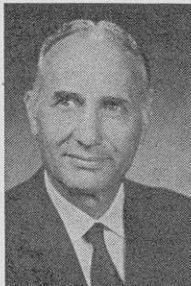
LaVern VanDyke

Two time All-Big Ten quarterback **Dennis Franklin** will once again operate the potent Wolverine offense after a good spring indicated that he has fully recovered from a broken collarbone suffered in the final game of 1973. He has 2,288 yards in total offense his two seasons as a starter. He runs the option play to perfection and when needed he can unleash the bomb. **Gil Chapman** will be blazing out of the backfield too, as this 9.5 sprinter rushed for 542 yards last year and should carry the ball more this year. He also averaged 22.1 yards on kickoff returns. **Chuck Heater** will move from halfback to fullback. The power runner was the second leading rusher last year with 666 yards and is an effective blocker. On defense middle linebacker **Steve Strinko** is the big hitter. He led the team in tackles last season with 137 stops and had seven tackles for minus yardage. Linebacking partner **Carl Russ** ranked number two in stops with 94 tackles giving the Wolves a great tandem. All-American **Dave Brown** patrols the defensive backfield and the senior did it all in '73. He ranked fourth in tackles with 76, picked off two enemy passes, and recovered three opponent fumbles. The Wolves will again be a hungry pack, and this year they will be eyeing the Big Ten title outright.
