FRESHMAN WERE DEFEATED

EXCITING CONTEST BETWEEN
'97 AND '98.

THE SCORE WAS FIVE TO TWO.

Good Material for the 'Varsity Brought
Out.

Although the weather was threaten-
ing a large crowd gathered at Randall
Field Saturday afternoon to witness
the ball game between the freshmen
and sophomores. The game was called
at 2:30 by Empire Overson with '97 at
the bat. For five innings '98 did not
score a run and the enthusiasm of the
sophomores ran high as five runs had
already been made. At this point
someone started a move from the
grand stand and soon the spectators
were lined by on opposite sides of the
diamond; sophomores on one side and
the freshmen with their junior sym-
pathizers on the other. From this time
on till the end of the game there was
not a quiet moment. Class yells,
cheers and hoots rent the air in one
confused uproar. But the freshmen
team was not easily "rattled" and
scored twice before the game closed
at the end of the seventh inning.

The game was well played through-
out. Hagerman and Mannson of '97
and Swaty, '98, did excellent work in
the field. Perkins pitched a good game
for the sophomores, striking out seven
men. Parkinson, '97, was hit hard and
retired towards the end of the game,
his place being taken by Aston who
struck out one man. Fabrick, '98, who
caught for the Beloit Preparatory
school last year, did very creditable

The charge that the standard at Wisconsin is lower than that at Lawrence is too preposterous to notice. But we wonder who the alleged "agents" of the university are who are making such statements in regard to the university. As far as we know there are no "agents" sent out by the university to solicit students. No one could give a prospective student information as to where he would rank in the university except the authorities at the university.

The number of new students entered this year is far greater than was expected and the outlook for the school year is most gratifying. Our freshman class will rank as one of the largest in the country this year and at present it looks very much as though the total attendance this year would reach fifteen hundred. The number of students admitted to advanced standing is also a very gratifying fact and always means a good deal for a university. On the whole we can feel very well satisfied with our showing.

COLLEGE CONTROVERSY.

The following correspondence of interest to university students was published in the Milwaukee Sentinel on Friday and Saturday last. The first letter was sent to the Sentinel by President Plantz of Lawrence College, at Appleton, Wisconsin. He first quotes the following letter from Prof. Williams:

Madison, Sept. 13, 1894.—Lawrence University, Appleton, Wis.—Dear Sir: One of your friends has handed me your name as that of one interested in Biblical study. It has been my aim since the organization of this department to offer courses which would be equivalent to the work done in theological seminaries and so to conduct the work that the students of the department may have a stronger hold of the languages of the Bible than is usually the lot of the men who have done the work in seminaries. By the kindly forethought of the P. E. the students of the university who are candidates for the M. E. ministry may be assigned to such churches, not far from Madison, as they are fitted to serve. We are to have a scholarship fund also and students who do Biblical work of unusual excellence are to receive therefrom the amounts to be determined by the rank, etc. We should be pleased to have you with us and to do for you anything in our power. It would be well for you to notify me of your coming prior to the time of the conference."

President Plantz calls this a remarkable letter and adds:

"We wonder if the state is to be as generous to all other denominations and if the professors are seeking generally to undermine the work of all our colleges by influencing their students in this underhanded way. We wonder how much money the regents have set aside out of state funds to assist candidates for the ministry in the prosecution of their education? We wonder, finally, how this new departure can be reconciled with the decision of the supreme court that the Bible cannot be as much as read in the schools of the state, one person objecting. We judge that some way this ruling has been set aside, and that the great state of Wisconsin has not only concluded to allow the Bible to be read, but taught, and so thoroughly that students had better attend our university at Madison than seek the theological seminaries and institutions founded by the various denominations. * * *

"Really we wish to file a protest. We did not say anything when some of our students told us in registering that agents of the university had urged them to come to Madison instead of Lawrence, on the ground that they would be admitted freshmen when we could only give them senior preparatory, for that was a plea of inferiority; but this attempt to get students from under our shadow on the ground of state help and better training than our Methodist theological seminaries can give, is carrying the matter a little too far."

Saturday Prof. Williams replied with the following letter:

"The man referred to, was represented to me as a graduate of Lawrence university holding a charge in northern Wisconsin. His reply to my letter was written and mailed at a town within thirty-five miles of the northern state line of Wisconsin. I am confident that he is not a student residing at Lawrence university."

"The letter published by President Plantz was headed 'University of Wisconsin, Department of Hebrew and Hellenistic Greek.' This the president suppressed presumably because it would show the fact that the department is linguistic and literary, not theological."

The scholarship fund referred to is contributed by the friends of the department, not by the state.

"I have no arrangement with the presiding elder. He knows the duties of his office, and it is for the best interest of his church and if it is best for the future of its ministry he will doubtless not refrain from using the services of capable Methodist Episcopal students in stations not distant from Madison, while they, with many others, are pursuing the study of these important languages and literatures at the state university."

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
