

HISTORY OF CAMP RANDALL STADIUM

They call it Camp Randall.

That's important.

Every now and then some hurried out-of-town sports announcer will call it "Randall Field," but he is corrected quickly.

The University of Wisconsin is proud that its sports center is more than just an athletic field—and that the drama and excitement of football seasons are set against a backdrop of colorful Wisconsin history.

In its 76 years of ownership, the University has expanded the facilities there until they include a large stadium, fieldhouse, memorial practice building and football practice fields.

But the University didn't name it. The name was decided long before that by veterans of the Civil War who knew it was a great military camp named for a wartime governor. When the University took it over they insisted that the name be preserved forever as a memorial to their fallen friends.

In the days before the Civil War, the site was owned by the State Agricultural Society whose yearly state fairs attracted holidaying throngs there. With the outbreak of the war, however, the society turned the place over to the government to become the state's major training center.

The display halls were transformed into white-washed barracks and the hall used for flower shows became a hospital. A total of 70,000 troops was drilled—usually about 7,000 being stationed there at a time—and 500,000 relatives and friends came to visit them.

Later in the war part of the camp became a prison where a group of sick Confederates, captured by Gen. Pope at Island No. 10 in the Mississippi, was brought. Many died in the drafty prison hospital on the knoll and were buried in what is now Confederate Rest at Forest Hill cemetery.

The land again became the state fair grounds when peace returned and when Gen. U. S. Grant visited it 15 years later he hailed the transformation as "a symbol of beating the spears of war into the plowshares of peace."

Other visitors to the grounds were Gens, Sherman and Sheridan and Pres. Hayes. When the state fair was moved to Milwaukee and a few years later even the Dane County Agricultural society stopped using it for fairs, the Civil War veterans were furious to learn the land was to be sold for building lots.

Blasting the "sordid sacrilege," they urged the legislature to buy it and in 1893 the state presented it to the University as a memorial athletic field.

When the question of a name arose, the veterans promptly carried the day for "camp" instead of "Field."

Intercollegiate athletics had been started at Wisconsin in 1881 and the University has had a football team since 1889. The school won its first great victory in 1894, defeating Minnesota 6-0 in a game on the lower campus that part of the crowd watched from fringed surreys. The great teams of '96, '97, and '01 were among the first to play at the new field.

Charles Van Hise, who became president of the University in 1903, was a sports enthusiast as well as a great president and he used to ride his horse nightly out to watch the football practice. Games were played before the old wood fairstand and many Madison business and professional men still boast of the holes they found as boys to insure a free look at the fun.

The University had a "real" stadium by 1913 but its stands were still wooden. The legislature declined to pay for concrete—and consequently, was promptly blamed when a large section collapsed Nov. 21, 1915, at the climactic Wisconsin-Minnesota game. Twenty people were injured, some seriously, and only the fact that the seats fell slowly prevented more casualties among the 1,800 in the area.

So in 1917 the present stadium—following completion of the past year's addition—was started with a grant of \$15,000 from the legislature. The rest of the money was earned by athletic events and the stadium, which now seats 77,280, is the only one in the Big Ten to "pay its own way" that way. Permanent dormitories were built, housing 150 men, but this space now is used as athletic department offices and training quarters.


The first game to be played in Camp Randall Stadium was the 1917 homecoming game against Minnesota's Golden Gophers. The Badgers won the game 10-7 to hand the Gophers their only Big Ten loss, relegating them to second place in the final conference standings. A week later, Ohio State visited Camp Randall and inflicted a 16-3 defeat on the Badgers: the Ohioans won the title that year with an unbeaten record. Wisconsin placed in a tie for third place with Northwestern.

The fieldhouse at the open end of the stadium horseshoe was built in 1930 for almost \$500,000 and has a seating capacity of 13,800 for basketball games and other events.

The original capacity of the stadium when first utilized in 1917 was 10,000, with permanent seats being added in stages to increase seating capacity.

The current construction project is the third since the end of World War II which began with the completion of the horseshoe at the north end in 1950 and 1951.

The running track was eliminated in 1958 expansion which saw the playing field of Camp Randall lowered by ten feet to add almost 12,000 seats to the stadium capacity which grew to 63,435 at that time.

Athletic Director Elroy Hirsch

Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch is dynamic, enthusiastic, direct, forceful, and a practical leader!

He is the man chosen to be the University of Wisconsin's seventh athletic director and the man who is leading the school's athletic program back to a position of national prominence. Hirsch accepted the position February 28, 1969, and was the overwhelming choice of Badger Alumni and fans for the job.

His boundless energies have taken him into every area of the State of Wisconsin and the nation in the past year meeting high school coaches, administrators, athletes, fans and followers on their home grounds. "Operation Turn-Around" carried the Badger leader into over 60 communities encompassing over 80 high schools personally visited.

He is a living legend to followers of Wisconsin football and to sports fans and people throughout the entire state even though he played just one season — as a sophomore in 1942 — for the

Badgers.

His career has been one of success.

Wisconsin fans, especially the older generation, remember him as the great triple threat halfback on Harry Stuhldreher's 1942 football team that won eight games, lost only to Iowa, and tied Notre Dame.

He played at Michigan in 1943, as a Marine trainee, and he not only played football, but basketball, track, and baseball. He won his "M" in each sport, the only athlete ever to accomplish such a feat at Michigan.

He had a successful professional football career, first as halfback with the Chicago Rockets of the post-war All-America Conference, and later with the Los Angeles Rams for nine seasons as one of the all-time great ends.

He was a successful executive with the Rams, first as general manager of the team, and later as assistant to the president of the team, a job he relinquished to accept the job as Wisconsin athletic director.


Hirsch's play as a 19-year-old sophomore on Wisconsin's 1942 football team carried the Badgers to the brink of the national championship that season. Only a 6-0 defeat by Iowa at Iowa City deprived the Badgers of Big Ten and national championships. The Wausau native rushed for 766 yards on 141 carries — his best was 174 yards on 22 attempts vs. Missouri — and his overall contribution added 226 yards passing, 390 yards on receptions and runbacks of punts, kickoffs, and interceptions plus eight touchdowns, five by rushing and three by passing.

His play on Michigan's 1943 football team helped the Wolverines to a 6-0 conference record and a share of the Big Ten title with Purdue. The team's only loss was to Notre Dame and again the team he played for was ranked No. 3 in the final Associated Press poll behind Notre Dame and Iowa Seahawks.

Hirsch signed with the Chicago Rockets of the All-America Conference after the war, but the three years he spent carrying the ball for the Rockets—1946-48—were not happy ones. Hirsch suffered a fractured skull, a back injury, a badly torn right leg ligament, and enough other aches and sprains to keep him immobilized on the bench or in the hospital for the major portion of his three years with Chicago.

Hirsch broke with the Rockets in the summer of 1949 and signed with the Los Angeles Rams. Because of his injury-weakened right knee, Clark Shaughnessy, then Rams' head coach, put Hirsch on a daily running routine, dreamed up a special headguard to protect Hirsch from further injury, and switched him to an end position.

It was at end that "Crazylegs" was to attain new heights in his career. The Rams, in transition to the modern passing game, often split him wide as a receiver and finally moved him permanently to

end — establishing him as the first flanker.

Hirsch was one of the athletes—like Otto Graham and Sam Huff and Gino Marchetti—who brought special talents to the sport in the 1950's as it changed from two-way players to offensive and defensive specialists under free substitution.

The flankers have done much to provide glamor for the sport, their lithe bodies racing rapidly downfield to haul in a pass, and **Hirsch's** talents insured

his place in that development.

In 1951, **Hirsch** displayed all his talents as he put together one of the finest seasons in National Football League history. He gained 1,495 yards on receptions, an all-time record approached only by **Bobby Mitchell** of the Washington Redskins (1,436 yards in 1963) and **Hirsch** had only twelve games to set the record, not 14, like **Mitchell**!

That same season **Hirsch** caught 17 touchdown passes to tie the league record set by **Don Hutson** of the Packers in 1942. He also caught at least one touchdown pass through 11 consecutive games over

the 1950 and 1951 seasons.


Hirsch grabbed 343 passes for 6,299 yards and 53 touchdowns during his career with the Rams.

He retired in 1957. He was named into the Wisconsin Hall of Fame in 1965 and to professional football's Hall of Fame at Canton, Ohio in 1968.

More recently, he was honored by being named to the all-1950's team commemorating the National Football League's 50th anniversary season and subsequently, to the all-time All-Star NFL team as selected by designated voters in cities holding NFL franchises.

HEAD FOOTBALL COACH JOHN JARDINE



John Jardine

John Jardine is Wisconsin's 23rd head football coach; he came to Wisconsin from an highly successful assistantship at UCLA where he was offensive line coach under Coach Tommy Prothro for five seasons, a period in which UCLA posted an overall record of 35-13-3.

The 34-year-old Jardine prepped at St. George High school in Lafayette, Ind., in 1958 and then tough Chicago Catholic League — where he lettered

in football, basketball and swimming.

He pursued his collegiate athletic career at Purdue, and, although weighing just 186 pounds, John was a good, tough guard for the Boilermakers in 1955, 1956 and 1957 and was a starter in both his

junior and senior years.

John began his coaching career at Central Catholic High school in Lafayette, Indiana, in 1958 and then moved into the head coaching job at Fenwick High school in Oak Park, Illinois, where in five seasons his teams won 51 games, lost 6 and tied one. He guided Fenwick into Chicago Catholic League title games in 1959, 1960 and 1962, winning in 1959 and 1962. His 1959 team lost to Lane Tech in the Chicago city championship game, but his 1962 team compiled an unbeaten record and blanked Schurz High school 40-0 in winning the Chicago city title.

He left the prep ranks following the 1963 season to join Purdue's football staff under Jack Mollenkopf as offensive line coach, where his assignment covered working with the guards and centers and he was also assigned to recruit the Chicago area.

After spending 1964 at Purdue, he joined Tommy Prothro at UCLA in 1965.

The native Chicagoan is the son of James Jardine,

the city's water commissioner; his brother Len, head coach at Brown, also played football at Purdue. John is married to the former Janice Ensign of River Forest, Illinois, and they have four children - two sons and two daughters.

From the moment the new Badger head coach arrived in Madison he was heralded as somewhat of a mixture between Vince Lombardi and Zorro man who in the eyes of most fans could perform the miracle of bringing Wisconsin football back to respectability. An enormous amount of pressure was created by enthusiastic fans talking about winning football, and Rose Bowl, and one local sportswriter seeing him as a young Knute Rockne.

Coach Jardine, however, remained more "down to earth" than most of the Badger backers. He emphasized that he is no miracle worker; that it will be a long tough climb toward the top. The following are some of John Jardine's comments on the task ahead, the Wisconsin team and his philosophy on

how athletics pertain to college life.

ON ACCEPTING THE JOB AT WISCONSIN—"I actively sought the position at Wisconsin. I went after it with reckless abandon, so to speak. I wanted it and I didn't care if I was first choice or ninth choice. I'm not the least bit interested in the past. I'm interested in the future. I'm not interested in how things were, I'm interested in how things are going to be. I said we'd win. I didn't say how many games we'd win, but I sure hope I never go into a season thinking it's going to be a losing season.

ON STYLE OF FOOTBALL - "We will place the emphasis on speed and quickness rather than weight. That's one thing we're bringing from UCLA. We will probably go overboard on speed as much as anything. After seeing Wisconsin films our coaches told me we have got to quicken up. We plan to put the ball in the air quite a bit, but I would love to find a running quarterback."

ON RAPPORT WITH PLAYERS - "I hope my athletes will confide in me with their non athletic problems as well as athletic problems. It's been that way everywhere I've been. I demand respect. I want to get to know my players' problems and I want them to know I'm interested in helping them solve them. I don't plan to make an issue over long hair, because that's the style today among youngsters. The only thing I've said is that the helmet should fit close to the head for safety."

The most important thing in with the great

football is mental attitude. The team with the great mental attitude and concentration is going to win. We made the policy that nothing will interfere with the football program." Coach Jardine indicated he will be a disciplinarian on the field but the players will be given more latitude off the field. "We hope it is such that the kids have pride and live like athletes. As long as they don't do anything to bring disgrace on the University and football team, they can do anything they want."

ON RECRUITING "We feel there are fine football players in the State of Wisconsin and these are the boys we are going after. Naturally we are interested in the so-called blue chip athlete where-ever he is in the United States, but we aren't going to spin our wheels waiting for him to make up his mind about coming to Wisconsin. Our plans are not to talk about any other school, but to talk about our own university. I think it's taken for granted that it's a fine academic institution. Our only thought in selling a boy on coming here is that this is going to be an exciting era at Wisconsin and we want them to be part of it. We believe we are going to be a winning football team and we'd like them to be a part of something new and exciting. I think this appeals to young men, to be in on the groundwork, so to speak, of a rejuvenation."

WISCONSIN FOOTBALL OUTLOOK FOR 1970

The Badgers returned to the win column in 1969 on a 17-yard scoring pass from **Neil Graff** to **Randy Marks** with 2:08 left to play in gaining a 23-17 decision over Iowa here on October 11.

The play capped a 23-point fourth period rally and ended frustrations that had built up over a string of 23 straight games without victory since the start of

the 1967 season.

The overall record in 1969 turned out to be 3-7 and the Badgers tied for fifth place in the final Big Ten standings, achieving their highest finish in the league since a similar record (3-4) in 1963.

Departures by graduation took seven offensive and three defensive starters among the sixteen lettermen who have played their final game for Wisconsin.

The rebuilding material available to Coach John Jardine and his staff is present in the form of 27 returning "W" men plus some outstanding sophomores that figure highly in Jardine's overall concept for success in 1970.

Attention in the spring by the new Wisconsin staff centered around rebuilding the offensive line and backfield and in placing each player available in his

proper position.

There were numerous changes of personnel assignments — both veteran and sophomore — to wit:

Roger Jaeger, who had started 1969 as a linebacker and concluded the year as the regular right tackle on offense, was switched to strong guard while **Dennis Stephenson**, a linebacker who saw enough action to win a major "W" as a junior college transfer, was moved to weak guard in the offensive line.

Other offensive switches saw Terry Whittaker—he played at three positions in 1969—claim the regular split end assignment and Darrel Logterman and Terry Scheid gain back-up positions at weak guard and strong tackle, respectively, after being

defenders in 1969.

Defensively, **Bill Gregory** moved to left end from his right tackle position and his response to playing end freed **Gary Buss**, another two year veteran for duty as the left linebacker in Wisconsin's 4-3-4 alignment.

Reserve tackles **Ted Jefferson** and **Bill Poindexter** moved in readily at right end and enabled the coaching staff to switch sophomore **Bob Storck** from linebacker and senior **James Johnson** from end to de-

fensive tackle positions.

The deep secondary was strengthened by moving **Danny Crooks** to left cornerback from offensive halfback where he performed brilliantly in the spring. Other changes saw **Dick Hyland** move from safety to left corner (behind **Crooks**); **Lee Wilder** and **Bill Yarborough** move to safety from right corner and linebacker, respectively; and **Tom Shinnick** from cornerback to safety.

Wisconsin's 1969 offensive attack ranked 53rd among the major colleges last year producing 337.7 yards per game — considerably improved over 1968's 239.0 yards per game which ranked the Badgers 110th — and the two big reasons for last year's improvement — Alan "A-Train" Thompson a 6-1, 210 fullback, and Neil Graff, 6-3, 187 quarterback — return for their junior year of competition.

Thompson's 907 yards rushing represented 48 per cent of the Badgers ground attack of 1895 yards last year — the 1968 rushing attack gained just 1262 yards — while **Graff's** passing netted 1,086 yards on 91 completions in 191 attempts good for seven touch-

downs.

Both **Graff** and **Thompson** started every game a year ago as sophomores with **Graff's** return for play this year marking the first time since 1961 that the Badgers have had their regular quarterback of the previous season (**Ron Miller**) back to start another season. The Sioux Falls, S.D. native enters 1970 as the top returning passer in the Big Ten (4th) from last season.

Jardine is especially high on Thompson and flatly

predicts, "Barring injury, he'll be one of the finest in the country."

Thompson rushed for 220 yards in his first collegiate outing against Oklahoma and Heisman trophy winner **Steve Owens** — outgaining the Sooner by 31 yards — and threatened **Alan** 'The Horse' **Ameche's** school mark of 946 yards set in 1952, also as a sophomore.

Alan's nine touchdowns last year have been surpassed only by **Lou Holland's** eleven in 1962 and **Pat Harder's** ten in 1941 in Wisconsin school history.

In the offensive line only junior **Elbert Walker**, a 6-5, 290 tackle, and **Jim Fedenia**, a 6-1, 229 pound senior center, return from 1969's starting line.

Mike Smoleich, a 6-3, 228 junior who missed competition last year when he withdrew from the squad, will open at weak tackle opposite Walker, while Larry Mialik, a 6-2, 212 junior found a home at tight end after battling Thompson for the starting fullback job up until the Oklahoma game last year.

Running backs available to pair with **Thompson** in the backfield — **Joe Dawkins** and his 612 yards are gone — include sophomore **Rufus** 'Roadrunner' **Ferguson**, 5-6, 190; **Greg** 'Grape Juice' **Johnson**, a 6-1½, 188 junior, and **Randy Marks**, a 5-11, 206

senior.

Top receiver returning is junior **Albert Hannah**, a 6-4, 195 flanker with great moves who caught ten passes for **261** yards and three touchdowns a year

The defensive line has been rebuilt with only two year veteran **Jim DeLisle** retaining his position at left tackle following the personnel switches mentioned above. **Bill Gregory** and **Ted Jefferson** are the ends, while sophomore **Keith Nosbusch**, 6-2, 220, takes over at right tackle. He spent much of the spring at offensive tackle before moving to defense.

The linebacking features three two-year veterans — Gary Buss, on the left, Chuck Winfrey in the

middle, and Ed Albright on the right.

Seasoned veterans are available in the secondary with Danny Crooks and Nate Butler at the corners and Lee Wilder and Tom Shinnick at the safeties.

Immediately behind the top four in the deep defense are seasoned lettermen **Dick Hyland** and **Neovia Greyer** at the corners, and **Greg Brunette** and **Randy Safranek** — an outstanding newcomer — at safeties.

The kicking game appears strong with **Gary Buss**, who averaged 36.1 yards per kick last year, an experienced punter with **Rudy Steiner**, **Albert Hannah**, and **Randy Marks** all capable punters, too. **Roger Jaeger**, who tallied 46 kicking points a year ago, will handle extra points (19-19) and field goals (9-12).

Wisconsin's depth is not great and injury avoidance could give the Badgers a highly respectable

Jardine describes the 1970 schedule as "An athletic director's dream and a football coach's nightmare."

Wisconsin opens at Oklahoma, then plays Texas Christian and No. 2 rated Penn State at Madison on consecutive weeks before opening the Big Ten season at Iowa.

Michigan (9th) and Ohio State (4th) were 1969 Big Ten co-champions and they play in Madison on consecutive week-ends. Minnesota and Northwestern are also foes here while Indiana and Illinois will be met on the road.

Assistant Coach — First Season Offensive Backfield and Coordinator

Paul Roach, a native of Spring Green, Wisconsin, served as offensive backfield coach at the University of Wyoming for the past nine seasons where he helped

the Cowboys to an unprecedented three straight Western Athletic Conference championships in 1966-67-68.

In 1969 Wyoming was 6-4 and third in the WAC and compiled the following offensive statistics: 6th in conference rushing, 145.7 yards per game; 2nd in conference passing, 165 completions in 340 attempts for 1,874 yards, an average of 187.4 yards per game; 4th in conference total offense, 331.1 yards per game and 2nd in conference scoring averaging 23.2 points per game.

The Cowboys used a multiple offense running from an "I" formation and a "Pro Set" always employing a flanker and a split end.

Roach, 42, attended high school in Rapid City, S. D., participating in football, basketball and track before graduating in 1945. The new Badger assistant is a graduate of Black Hills State College in Spearfish, S. D., where he lettered in football, basketball and track and captained the football team in his senior year. He received a master's degree in physical education from North Dakota University in 1962.

His first coaching job was at Hettinger, N. D., High school where he spent two years as head football and track coach. He then coached three years at Dickinson, N. D., High school as head football and basketball coach. In 1957, Roach joined the North Dakota University staff as backfield coach and helped the Sioux win the North Center Conference championship in 1958 and finish second twice. He joined the Wyoming University staff in 1962.

JIM MARTIN

Assistant Coach — First Season Centers and Guards

James L. Martin served as Racine Case High school football defensive coordinator the past three seasons with specific work in the defensive secondary and

was in charge of scouting for Head Coach Gene Veit, He also served as baseball coach.

The new Badger assistant coach is a 24-year-old native of Racine where he graduated from Washington Park High school in 1963. He graduated from the University of Dubuque, Iowa, in 1967 with a bachelor of science degree in physical education and in his senior year was named to the dean's list for outstanding academic achievement.

He began work on an advanced degree in physical edu-

cation at Indiana University in 1968.

Martin starred athletically at Dubuque, winning four letters in football, three in basketball and three in baseball. He was named the school's outstanding athlete in both his freshman and senior years and as a sophomore was selected to the All-Iowa Conference and NAIA district football honor teams.

LEW STUECK

Assistant Coach — First Season Linebackers and Defensive Coordinator

Lew Stueck, 34, finished his seventh year on the UCLA staff in 1969 serving as freshman coach under former UCLA Head Coach Bill Barnes and as coach

of the ends and linebackers as well as being the administrative assistant to current Bruin Head Coach Tommy Prothro. As UCLA freshman coach, Stueck had a two-year record of 5-1-1.

Prior to joining the UCLA staff, Stueck was head coach at St. Anthony's High school in Long Beach, Calif., for one year and head coach for five years at Los Angeles Loyola High school where he compiled a 33-12-3 record. His 1960-61-62 teams at Loyola won Catholic League championships and his 1962 team

won the Southern California large school prep title. The new Badger assistant coach attended Loyola High school in Los Angeles and won three letters in football and received All-Catholic League honors as a halfback in 1952. He matriculated at Washington State University for two years, playing football there as a freshman and sophomore, then transferred back to UCLA where he graduated in 1957.

He originally enrolled at Notre Dame before transferring to Wisconsin where he was a standout backfield performer—both offensively and defensively—in 1957, 1958 and 1959 on Badger teams that won 20, lost six and tied one in regular season play. The 1959 team played in the Rose Bowl on Jan.

1, 1960, losing to Washington, 44-8.

Zeman played fullback in his sophomore season here and rushed for 236 yards on 58 carries and scored three touchdowns. He played right halfback his junior and senior year gaining 275 yards in 66 carries and he was named to the All-Big Ten Academic team in 1958.

Following graduation Bob was drafted and signed by the San Diego Chargers of the then budding American Football League. He played seven seasons in the AFL—five with San Diego and two with the Denver Broncos. A premier defensive back, he was named to the All-AFL team on several occasions.

CHUCK McBRIDE

Assistant Coach - First Season Offensive Line

The 28-year-old McBride, a Chicago native, has never been associated with a loser. He won a total of eleven varsity letters in football, basketball, baseball and track while attending Morgan Park High school in Chicago. As a prep football player he won All-Chicago, All-Illinois and All-American honors and as a senior served as president of the student body.

He graduated from Morgan Park in 1958 and enrolled at the University of Colorado where he

chose to play football over baseball. He had turned down an opportunity to sign a professional baseball contract with the Chicago White Sox upon graduation from high school.

At Colorado he won three letters while playing end and doing the punting and gained All-Big Eight honors on the league championship team that played in the 1962 Orange Bowl game.

Coach Frank Kush called his work this past year when he rebuilt the Sun Devils' offensive line completely as no offensive starters returned—a truly remarkable job. "It was a great job of coaching," Kush noted.

NORMAN DOW

Freshman Coach — First Season

Norman Dow, 24, just completed his second year in charge of the UCLA freshman team where he compiled a 6-2 record including a 1968 perfect 4-0 record.

He graduated from UCLA in 1968.


STAN KEMP

Dick enrolled at Wisconsin and played center and linebacker on the school's 1956, 1957 and the 1958 team which posted a 7-1-1 mark finishing second in Big Ten play.

He is the younger brother of Deral Teteak, an All-Big Ten linebacker on Wisconsin's 1951 "Hard Rocks" that posted a 7-1-1 record and who later served as a Badger assistant football coach

for eleven years.
Following the 1958 season Dick played in the East-West and Hula Bowl post-season all-star games and was drafted by the Green Bay Packers. 
His 1968 Beloit College team posted a 3-5 record and tied for sixth place in the Midwest Conference while his 1969 team lost all nine games in league play.






