## SECRETARY'S ANNUAL REPORT

---

While the financial report for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1913, shows a net gain of \$2,971.68 over operating expenses, we cannot help but feel that this is disappointing to the Board. It is unquestionably so to your officers.

From the standpoint of exhibits the Fair was a success, and the Board has received many notices of commendation from the press and public. The weather was all that could be desired. The attendance and receipts, however, fell far short of expectations, and show a decrease from the figures of last year.

We believe three of the principal reasons for lack of attendance can be attributed to, first, the refusal of the railroad companies to grant reduced rates, and lack of coöperation on their part. Second, the advertising and boosting for counter attractions by certain business interests of the City of Milwaukee during the week of the Fair and the week immediately following, and the lack of interest shown by the citizens of Milwaukee in general. Third, a great many of the farmers were busily engaged in threshing grain and harvesting their tobacco crop, the work having been retarded by reason of a cold backward season and heavy rains.

With thousands of acres of agricultural lands in Northern Wisconsin awaiting development, the Wisconsin State Fair can and does do more to attract homeseekers to these lands than all other institutions combined. In view of these conditions it would seem to us most unreasonable on the part of the railroad companies to refuse special rates during the State Fair. Our interests are and should be mutual, and the good work being done by the State Board of Agriculture should receive the hearty support and coöperation of the railroad companies. We are free to say that we have been unable to work out any solution as regards the lack of interest on the part of the business interests and citizens in general of the city of Milwaukee. We would suggest, however, that a committee of three members of this Board be appointed to confer with the different business associations of Milwaukee in an effort to solve this perplexing question.

We were handicapped to a considerable extent by reason of appointments to vacancies on the Board being held up until late in the season. At your annual meeting the officers, superintendents of the various departments and committees to handle the work for the coming year were selected. All of these gentlemen took up their work with a will

and had some of the most important matters well in hand when it became necessary for your Board to re-arrange your committees. Important work that had been started had to be referred to new committees and a new start made. This retarded the work of preparing for the 1912 State Fair. Some of the State Fair stationery and advertising matter that should have been placed in circulation directly after the annual meeting, was not received from the state printer until about the first of June.

Special efforts were made to curtail the expenses of operating the State Fair, and, while we believe that success was attained in some directions, there are still opportunities for improvement. Exhibitors at the recent State Fair were invited to offer such criticisms of the present methods of handling the department in which they were interested and suggestions that would tend to improve these conditions. Few have taken advantage of this request, and a majority of those who have reported have spoken only in commendatory terms. The Board and officers have been criticised by some publications that are evidently not familiar with the work that is being done, and in no case have they offered any solution or suggestions that would tend to improve the defects of which they complain.

An effort has also been made to establish a more complete accounting, and a thorough card index system in the office. The necessity of moving the office effects three times during the year has prevented us from completing this work. We have endeavored to keep in close touch with all parties having business with this department. Every communication to the office has received personal attention, and an increase of over nine thousand pieces of first class mail matter has been sent out from the office as compared with the previous years.

In collecting and compiling the crop statistics for Wisconsin, we have endeavored to make it worth while. The demand for these reports has increased over two hundred per cent the last year, which is an indication that our efforts were not unavailing.

The reports of the superintendents of the various departments have been filed in the office as required by the rules and regulations of the Board, together with the financial statement, books and records of the various revenue producing departments, with the exception of the Hospital and Rest Room. The party in charge of this department failed to make use of the official duplicate receipt book that was furnished for the purpose of keeping a complete check on said department. The amount reported as having been collected by the Matron of the Woman's Rest Room was \$207.54, and this amount has been turned into the treasury. There is no reason to think that all of the money paid to the Matron of this department was not paid to the Secretary, but the rule as to official receipts and the publicity attending transactions by reason of their use, would remove an opportunity for suspicion that all money received may not have been reported. I quote from Prof. Gilman's report as follows: "To report that a certain amount was collected and furnish no affirmative data that the amount was all that was

collected, results in great dissatisfaction and opens the door to adverse comment."

The report of the expenditures in detail from the Publicity Department, which was filed subsequent to the Fair, was somewhat misleading by reason of the fact that it did not give the total amount of money expended by said department. While a less sum of money was expended for certain purposes than the amount appropriated by the Board, in one instance at least there was considerable more expended than the amount appropriated.

In connection with the work for the coming year, we would report that an effort has been made to increase the exhibits by the several counties of the State, and at the present time the indications are that there will be a large increase in the number of exhibits in this department. The Educational Premium List has been received from the state printer and is being sent out to the various institutions of learning throughout the state. The classifications have been changed to a considerable extent, and many interesting features have been added that should prove to make this department more attractive and popular. We are also communicating with different associations with the view of encouraging the offering of special premiums in the Live Stock classes the coming year. Many of these associations have already taken favorable action, and we have been advised of the amount appropriated for the Wisconsin State Fair. We would suggest that the Board make provisions the coming year for operating the Publicity and Promotion Department direct from the office of the Secretary. Also that the renting of space in Machinery Hall be placed in the hands of the Secretary until the Superintendent of said department takes direct charge. We would further suggest in connection with operating the private dining hall that the tickets furnished parties who are entitled thereto, be paid for upon delivery. We believe it advisable that the Board make provision for a private telephone system upon the grounds in place of the present method of installing ten telephones at an expense of \$180.00 annually, and that it would be advisable to investigate the matter of installing an electric lighting and power system plant upon the grounds. It is also necessary that further improvements be made upon the grounds relative to sanitary and sewerage work.

In conclusion I wish to thank the President of this Board for his valuable assistance and words of encouragement when the task seemed beyond our limited abilities, and to each and every member of this Board my hearty appreciation for their united support and assistance. Sincerely hoping that success will attend your every effort the coming year.
