Sir: As has been our practice in recent years, most of this report is made by the Chief Clerk over his own signature.

In the past we have aimed to keep the school fund earning interest to the greatest possible extent. This year, however, the hazardous condition of the banking business has caused us to hesitate to withdraw our funds from banks for the purpose of making loans except where absolutely necessary or where such loans would materially benefit stringent unemployment conditions. We believe we have met the situation to the satisfaction of all concerned.

The policy of withholding state lands from sale, which has prevailed since 1913, has been continued. Nearly all of the land now owned by the state, over 200,000 acres being lands received under the swamp land grant of September 28, 1850, little of which is of agricultural value, and 158,001.20 acres of purchased lands for forestry purposes, (now under jurisdiction of the Conservation Commission) the continued holding of which is implied by the statutes, there appears to be no good reason for selling.

There have been a few exceptions where some scattered burned over forties were wanted for completing adjoining farms.

Several small areas of blown down timber were sold.

Trespass of timber has been investigated during the past two years in increased energy and success.

For the first time demands for loans for the calendar year 1932 have been sufficient to absorb the available cash of the department without going into the market for the purchase of bonds.

#### 4 REPORT OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE PUBLIC LANDS

This commission has been pleased with the completeness with which its employes in the land office have handled their work—thus relieving us of much work which otherwise would have fallen upon us under our constitutional duties.

## REPORT OF CHIEF CLERK

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Dec. 1, 1932.

TO THE HONORABLE COMMISSIONERS:

Two years ago I made an important part of my report to you the work looking to obtaining from the Federal Government the value of the swamp lands in the Wisconsin Indian Reservations. This had been a matter of contention between the state and government for more than 60 years. As far back as 1865 the Secretary of the Interior held that such lands belonged to the state under the swamp land grant of September 28, 1850, and actually patented to the state 15,737.54 acres in the Menominee reservation. His immediate successor declared this patent invalid and demanded its return. The state refused and that patent is now a part of the records of this office. A cruise of these lands under an act of the 1929 session of the legislature found their value to be \$611,108.85. This patent is now conceded by the government to be valid and incontestible, under a decision of the U. S. Supreme court in the case of U. S. versus Minn., which was also applied to Wisconsin.

The above is only one of the many contests in other states as well as Wisconsin in efforts to secure their rights to land under the swamp land grant. That grant imposed upon the Secretary of the Interior the duty of preparing lists of such land, supplying them to the governors of the respective states and upon their request issuing patents thereto. His failure to do so caused Congress to pass acts in 1855 and 1857, commanding him to issue patents to all lists then in his hands from the various states. The acts mentioned covered only such lists as were in the hands of the secretary on the date of passage. Immediately delay was renewed. This state made continuous effort to get the swamp lands due it. By 1880 the pressure became so strong that the state and government agreed that a commission be created to consist of one man appointed by the state and one by the government should make a list of the remaining lands to which the state was entitled, which was completed after more than a year of work. A large acreage was obtained under this report, but the government refused to include 4,167.54 acres within the Menominee Indian Reservation, the value of which was found by our cruisers in 1929 to be \$126,843.03. Two townships in the Menominee Reservation (Townships 28 and 29, Range 15 East) were not surveyed until 1890, and in 1898 a list of 6,634.56 acres was prepared and sent to the government, the value of which was found by our cruisers to be \$267,763.41. This makes a total value of the swamp lands in the Menominee Reservation of \$1,005,715.29.

You will remember that immediately after the appropriation for this work in September, 1929, I went to Neopit for a conference with Forester Kinney of the Indian Service at Washington, and Manager Hammer of the lumbering operations on the Menominee Reservation; that Mr. Kinney objected to the 1880 and 1898 lists on the ground that some of the forties were not swamp under the terms of the grant, to which I answered that these lists were made by a commission created by both state and government, that they had been in the hands of government 49 and 31 years respectively without protest, that they were made on a plan imposed upon the state against its protest, and that if the government insisted on omitting forties on the list the state would insist upon adding any shown by the government maps as swamp that our cruisers might find to be swamp under the grant. This last point was impressive and caused us to agree to recommend to our departments, that a joint resolution by the Wisconsin legislature stating that when the lists as they then stood should be patented no more land would be asked for under the swamp grant, then patents would issue. In the fall of 1931, Mr. Kinney was sent here by the Indian Service for a final conference on the proposed joint resolution, the resolution was adopted by the legislature, but the government refused to abide by it.

Without any notice, and regardless of the position of Secretary Bliss on January 5, 1899, that the lands listed by the commission of 1880 should be patented, we received in 1931 a new list reducing that commission's acreage from 4,167.50 acres to 2,146.59 and the list in 28 and 29—15 East, from 6,634.56 acres to 3,676.67 acres, with an accompanying letter to the effect that even that list should not be deemed final. When we began this work in the fall of 1929, we found the Indian Service prejudicing the Menominees against us by informing them that the state was trying to deplete their tribal fund by taking \$1,000,000 from it for the purchase of the state's land, although we insisted from the start that, the government having granted the land to the state and then to the Indians, it must buy with its own funds and not that of the Indians. The Indian Council finally got our side of the case and are friendly. A propaganda letter was sent in packages to women club officers, but they came directly to this office and got the facts which convinced them that the state was right.

At the beginning of this negotiation in 1929, I urged upon the Indian Service, which operates a large sawmill, that economy demanded the promptest solution of the matter, to save going around the state's scattered areas, and ultimately going back after it—that it was unthinkable to have two ownerships within this area. I repeated this argument on every occasion, but it is only recently that it has been favored.

### OTHER RESERVATIONS

In addition to the Menominee, the important reservations are the Lac du Flambeau and Bad River. The timber on these reservations was cut by contract between the government and private companies.

One of two plans had to be adopted—get the government to open its books of sale of timber or estimate from the badly burned and decayed stumps—the latter an almost impossible task. Constant effort for a year and a half finally gave access to the books. William Heritage of the Indian Service and J. J. McDonald, this commission's cruiser, spent two months examining the books at Ashland and Flambeau. In the Bad River Reservation they found from lists of swamp lands furnished by the government to Mr. Heritage, the value received by the government for sale of timber, \$156,822.06. The value of the land was found by the state's cruisers to be \$15,877.39 and of the timber still standing \$574.00, making the total due the state in the Bad River Indian Reservation \$173,273.45.

On the Lac du Flambeau Reservation the amount received by the government for timber sold by the government from the list of swamp lands furnished by it to Mr. Heritage was \$243,188.37. The state's cruisers found the value of the land to be \$36,706.32, making the total value of the timber and land \$279,894.69.

### THE GOVERNMENT'S OBLIGATION

In the case of each of these Indian Reservations, the government is in the position of an individual who has conveyed the same to two different parties. It must buy from one in order to make good its conveyance to the other. In this case it is manifest that the purchase should be made from the state, to avoid the disturbance of the Indians.

The total amount (without interest) due the state is as follows:

With the cooperation of the government this transaction could have been closed in the spring of 1930. I submit that a conclusion should be urged at the earliest possible date.

### THE MISSISSIPPI ISLANDS

During the last two years much time has been consumed on islands in the Mississippi river. This is a later phase of contention that began shortly after the passage of the swamp land grant on September 28, 1850. Many of the islands were well timbered and were in the line of advancing settlement of the state. Our governors attempted to induce

the government to survey them so that the state could get those that were "more than half too wet to cultivate" as the swamp grant required.

After long delay the government (refusing to accept the state's survey) surveyed some of these islands and left many unsurveyed. In common with other states that were aggravated by the government's slowness, Wisconsin sold as swamp land some areas on these islands that the government is now claiming. Two of these areas are now being contested. How many more there will be cannot be told from the poorly kept records of those early days. In 1857 an island of nearly two hundred acres was sold near the city of Dubuque. The state must now make its title good or refund the purchase price plus 6% interest for 76 years.

Another such sale was near Alma, made the same year, that will require a similar refund unless the state can show it to be of the character granted by the swamp act.

Another matter in contest is what is known as Lost Island at Buffalo City in Buffalo county. The Upper Mississippi Wild Life Refuge officers claimed this island under an executive order of the president; the state objected on the ground that it was of the character contemplated by the swamp grant and had belonged to the state since the date of that grant in 1850. In 1929, the General Land Office sent a surveyor who found that the entire island inured to the state by the grant. Nevertheless the agricultural department at Washington has demanded a hearing which has been fixed at La Crosse for December 12, 1932. This island contains about 1,500 acres. We are confident of success.

#### WIND LAKE ISLAND

An island was created by the lowering of the water in Wind Lake in Racine county. It contains about 10 acres of land. It was declared by the government to belong to the state because of its ownership of the lake bottom and the general land office declined to survey it as public land. The state land office found that a man had platted the south end of the island and built three cottages there at a cost of about \$5,000. Investigation developed the fact that he was entirely innocent of trespass, having made the investment under advice of an experienced attorney that his title was good. An action was started to clear title and under provision of law, the case was compromised by payment to the state for less than an acre of \$900.00. The remaining ten acres is low, but parties are negotiating for it.

For many years the city of Milwaukee has been retaining the personal property portion of escheats under a statute granting it to a private institution. The validity of that statute was successfully contested by the commission. Altogether more than \$130,000 is involved.

A suit against McLeod and Kopplin for timber trespass was tried at Washburn and will yield from \$500 to \$1,000, dependent on whether the court allows the defendant certain offsets.

A hearing was held at Ashland August 29, 1932, on an appeal of H. D. Laughlin from the ruling of the General Land Office in favor of the state of 137.18 acres of swamp land in a recent extension survey on the shore of Lake Namekagon. We are confident that the decision will be favorable.

#### CONFLICTING CLAIM IN MUNSEE-STOCKBRIDGE

Two townships of the original Menominee Indian Reservation were released by them to the Munsee-Stockbridge tribe, and later abandoned by the latter. In the meantime some conflicting patents were issued by the government to swamp lands already patented to the state. Some of this was on good water fronts. This department is now considering what action is most appropriate in these cases.

#### TRESPASS OF TIMBER

We have succeeded in collecting several thousands of dollars for trespass of state timber during the last biennium. There are a large number of admitted trespasses by parties whom the depression has made unable to settle. We are watching these cases to see that they do not outlaw. The trespasses are smaller now that the lumbering industry has subsided, but the number of smaller ones have correspondingly increased, and with it an increase in the work of this department. This work is under our Chief Timber Cruiser, J. J. McDonald.

#### CLEARING RECORDS TO LAND TITLES

The General Land Office has been sending to this office long lists of land, sometimes two or three lists in a single day involving more than a thousand acres each. These titles are affected to some extent by several grants. Where swamp under the grant of 1850, and sold by the government after March 1857, there is no relief to the state except by a possible act of Congress. If of the swamp character and patented under the Military Bounty law, the state is entitled from the government the amount received by it. There are some other possible sources of relief. These lists are so voluminous, the situation so complicated and the early land records so scattered, that the work has been delayed to a time when conditions permit continuous work on the problem.

#### THE 1925 PATENTS

Reference was made in my last report to patents issued by this department in 1926 under a statute of 1925, which has proved to be invalid. When the writer took charge August 1, 1927, he investigated this matter and with the concurrence of the Attorney General, adopted the policy of cancelling these 1925 patents and replacing them with new ones as applications came in. These patents were on lands granted to the Fox and Wisconsin Improvement Company and the 1925 patents were issued to the present apparent owners, leaving no legal head to the line of title. We are issuing patents to the original gran-

tee, the Fox and Wisconsin Improvement Company. As there are more than 2,500 such erroneous patents, it will be a long and laborious job.

### SMALLER MATTERS

Escheats are small in number and not large in volume, but they consume a large amount of time both by the commissioners and the clerical force. These properties are usually in a run down condition and unless sold must be repaired, which the state is in poor position to do. The depression has reduced the opportunities of sale. The chairman of the commission is from Milwaukee and has done a large amount of work to accomplish sale of several pieces of escheated property.

An increased number of applications have come in for the purchase of state land and timber, but values of both are too low to warrant sale, even if there were no other reasons.

Applications for lease of areas of hay on state lands has greatly increased and this department favors such leases, as the removal of annual growth of grasses lessens fire hazard, while the decay of annual growth results in a deep mass of highly inflammable material.

Applications for dead wood for fuel in the northern counties involves a large amount of work by our Chief Cruiser and the revenue scarcely pays expenses—but the people must have fuel and unless watched green timber will be cut.

Hundreds of letters and many calls have been made to this office during the last year by people wanting homestead lands in Wisconsin. They have been inspired by unwise press reports. The only proper answer has been that there are no homestead lands in the state worth the cost of examination.

### ROUTINE WORK

The examination of applications by school districts, towns, villages and city loans is handled by this office, corrections made so that the work of the attorney general and the commissioners is reduced to a minimum. This work in connection with the placing of \$1,722,712.74 in loans annually consumes much time.

The preparation of an increasing amount of field notes to land owners and surveyors noticeably increases the work of the office. Tracings or photostats are in increasing demand. Since our last report several dozen old field note books have been copied where the originals through decay were falling apart.

The issuance of patents and certified copies has been greater during the last year than in recent years.

If times were normal we would ask a moderate increase in our appropriation, in order to clean up delayed matters. As it is, we do not ask it.
