THE PREVIEW

The 40th season of Wisconsin hockey marks the Dawn of a New Era for the Badger hockey program as first-year head coach Mike Eaves assumes the reigns of one of the most successful and storied programs in college hockey history.

The 45-year-old Eaves is no stranger to Badger hockey. After a four-year playing career at Wisconsin (1974-78), he still remains the top scorer in Badger history with 94-173=267. The three-time team captain is also a two-time first-team All-American.

Eaves begins the third era of Wisconsin Hockey, succeeding Jeff Sauer, the 20-year head coach of the Badgers who retired following the 2001-02 campaign, and 'Badger' Bob Johnson, who Eaves played for in the 70s.

Said Eaves, "These gentlemen have come in and created a rich tradition of coaching here. They were here a long time and were very successful. The tradition that has been created here is something you can draw on for strength and inspiration."

Despite the changes in store for this group of Badgers, one thing that benefits this team is the coaching staff assembled by Eaves in Troy Ward and John Hynes.

Said Eaves, "We have been to war together and back. We have slept together on busses. We've eaten more fast food together than we ever thought we could. We have won and lost tough games together."

"There is an innate trust that comes with going through those experiences together. We can look at each other and know right away what we need to do. Our verbiage is the same. So, this staff has that trust and loyalty that doesn't have to be built up. We can go right to work and be effective with the boys."

Hardest hit by graduation was the forward position as the experience and leadership of seven departed seniors must be dealt with. Defensively, the Badgers lost just one letterwinner, entering the year with five of the six top blue-liners from a year ago. Goaltending will be the Badgers' strength in '02-03 as two of the country's best wear the Cardinal and White.

The coaching staff isn't the only group of new faces. With the departure of those nine seniors off the 2001-02 version

of UW hockey, there are eight new faces on the 2002-03 Badger roster as well.

This injection of youth combines with a returning group of players with a lot of energy entering the season and renewed optimism to return to the country's elite.

Up front the Badgers lost a group of seven forwards who combined to play in over 900 games. That experience can only be made up over time, but ready to step

in and lead the group are a handful of very talented returnees.

Senior Brad Winchester (Madison, Wis.), the leading scorer from last season, is one of those players. Winchester, a second-round pick of the Edmonton Oilers in 2001, is set to lead the charge offensively and with 10 pounds added to his 6-5 frame will be one of the most physically intimidating players in the league.

Classmate Erik Jensen (Madison, Wis.) has improved his game every year since becoming a Badger and this season hopes to be no different. The Madison-native is one of the more physical forwards not only on the team, but in the WCHA. Jensen has become a noticeable presence on the ice, especially given his strength (he benches 340).

Among the junior class, Rene Bourque (Lac La Biche, Alberta) is the top-scoring forward. He tallied 12-7=19 a year ago, his highest goal output in a season at the UW. With Bourque's skill and ability, those numbers could double.

John Eichelberger (Glencoe, Ill.) and Jake Heisler (Bloomington, Minn.) earned a lot of experience in their sophomore campaigns. Eichelberger began last sea-

son with seven points in the first 10 games, showing his ability to contribute offensively. Heisler, the team's Most Improved Player from 2001-02, is one of the team's top penalty killers.

Sophomore Alex Leavitt (Edmonton, Alberta) returns from a rookie season where he put up 11-13=24. One of the top-scoring freshmen in the league a year ago, Leavitt was one of just five WCHA rookies to reach the double-figure mark in goals scored.

Second-year transfer Pete Talafous (Hudson, Wis.) will make his debut for the Badgers this year after transferring from the University of Alaska Anchorage following the 2000-01 season. Talafous is the son of UW alum Dean Talafous, a member of the 1973 NCAA Championship team and a former coach at UAA.

Other returnees include Joe Simon (Grosse Pointe, Mich.), who played in his first UW game last season, and John Funk (Mendota Heights, Minn.).

Five of the seven newcomers are at the forward position. With just seven letterwinners back at forward, Adam Burish (Madison, Wis.), A. J. Degenhardt (La Crosse, Wis.), Brent Gibson (Calgary, Alberta), Nick Licari (Duluth, Minn.) and Ryan MacMurchy (Regina, Saskatchewan) will all get plenty of playing time early on.

Both Burish and MacMurchy were drafted this past summer in the NHL Entry Draft.

ON DEFENSE

A nearly intact Badger blueline returns this season, losing one letterwinner in Rob Vega who graduated in May.

Returning letterwinners on defense include seniors Brian Fahey (Glenview, Ill.) and Mark Jackson (St. Albert, Alberta). Fahey has been a steady influence during his career, missing just five games to date. He is the most experienced blueliner entering his senior season with 116 games played. Jackson's skill level and size afford him the potential to be a dominant force from the blueline.



The Badgers' top-scoring defenseman, and one of three top-returning blue-line scorers in the league, is junior Dan Boeser. Diagnosed with non-Hodgkins lymphoma over the summer, Boeser hopefully enters the season cancer-free after a series of radiation treatments in the month of September. He was fourth in team scoring as a sophomore with 5-23=28 and one of the WCHA's top offensive defensemen.

Despite seeing action in all 80 career games to date and playing on both the top power-play and penalty-kill units, Boeser has been whistled for just three penalties in his career and holds the longest penalty-free streak in school history having gone 33 games as a freshman without visiting the penalty box.

Jon Krall (Temperance, Mich.) and Andy Wozniewski (Buffalo Grove, Ill.), both products of the NAHL, round out the list of returning upperclassmen on defense.

Both Krall and Wozniewski are key members of a Badger defensive unit that wants to improve on its 3.08 scoring defense average from a year ago (fifth place in the WCHA). The pair is integral in what quality of depth the Badger defensive bench will have.

Also back for his second season is Madison native Chris Julka and sophomore Joe Campbell, who played in seven games as a rookie.

New faces to the blueline are Tom Gilbert (Bloomington, Minn.) and Tom Sawatske (Duluth, Minn.). Gilbert is one of three freshmen taken in the NHL Draft over the summer.

IN GOAL

Newcomers (0):

Arguably the best goaltending tandem in college hockey returns for the Badgers this season in senior Scott Kabotoff (Strathcona, Alberta) and sophomore Bernd Bruckler (Graz, Austria). Starter Kabotoff emerged as one of the best in the WCHA as a junior, after serving as a back up to Graham Melanson as a freshman and sophomore.

All Kabotoff did was register a 2.87 goals-against average and .920 save percentage last season while starting 24 contests. It is the 10th-best goals-against average in UW history (season) and his .920 save percentage ties him with Marc Behrend (1981-82) for the school record. His teammates voted him their Most Valuable Player for the 2001-02 season.

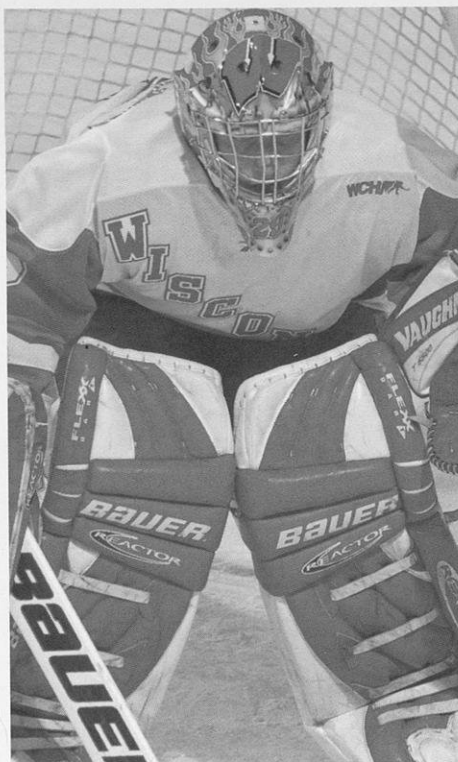
He earned WCHA Defensive Player of the Week honors in back-to-back weeks (Nov. 9-10; No. 16-17) while making a career-high 56 saves in a 3-3 overtime tie (the Badgers won the game in a shootout) against Colorado College (Dec. 28) in the third-place game at the Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown.

Kabotoff is back at full strength after seeing action in just five of the final 14 games last year. He injured his knee on Jan. 25 against St. Cloud State and missed the next five games. He and Bruckler split playing time to finish the season.

A 2001-02 WCHA All-Rookie team member, Bruckler was 6-8-2 with a 3.08 goals-against average and a .917 save percentage in his first year. That save percentage is the third-best for a season and ranks fourth all time at the UW.

In his first-ever start as a Badger, Bruckler shutout Wayne State, 5-0 on 25 saves. He became the first goaltender since Jim Carey (1992) to earn the shutout in his UW debut.

The only Austrian-born player to ever wear the Cardinal and White, led all league rookies in goals-against average, save percentage and win percentage. His 3.08 GAA was the fourth-best recorded among all goaltenders in the WCHA a year ago.

The Schedule

The Badgers' 38-game regular-season schedule features 16 games against teams ranked in the final 2001-02 USA Today / American Hockey Magazine top-15. The UW opens its season on Oct. 11-12 hosting the Ice Breaker Invitational. The tournament is in its fifth season (the Badgers were the hosts of the inaugural Ice Breaker in 1997) and signifies the official beginning of the college hockey season.

In addition to the UW, this year's field includes Boston University (Hockey East), Northern Michigan (CCHA) and RPI (ECAC).

The UW closes the month of October with its first road trip of the year to Boston, playing Boston College and Northeastern.

The WCHA opener for Bucky is Nov. 1-2 against Denver. The 28-game league slate includes four games vs. arch rival and defending NCAA champion Minnesota.

The College Hockey Showcase, in its 10th year, returns to Madison, as the Badgers play Michigan (Nov. 29) and Michigan State (Nov. 30) over the Thanksgiving weekend.

In exhibition play, Team Italy makes it swing through the WCHA facing off against the Badgers on Thursday, Dec. 12. It is the first time a UW team has faced an Italian team.

Its been 14 years since the inaugural Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown in Milwaukee. This year's field includes ECAC members Colgate and Harvard and CCHA representative Northern Michigan.

Preseason Notebook

- Juniors John Eichelberger and Rene Bourque sport new numbers this season. Eichelberger has switched to No. 9, while Bourque will wear No. 23.
- Alex Leavitt is the top-returning power-play point-getter for the Badgers. He tallied 4-6=10 a year ago, tied for second on the team in that category.
- Junior blueliner Dan Boeser leads all returning players with seven multi-point games during the 2001-02 season. He also enters his third season with the UW having played in 80 consecutive games.
- The Badgers have drawn 963,487 fans to their games in four seasons in the Kohl Center. The 36,513th fan to attend a UW game this season will be No. 1,000,000 since the 1998-99 campaign.
- The UW has had three sons follow in their father's footsteps and wear the Badger uniform. Murray (1968-71) and Dany (1999-2001) Heatley and Gary (1970-74) and Brad (1999-current) Winchester were the first father-son duos to both play for the Badgers. With the start of this season a third family will add their name to that list — Dean (1971-74) and Pete (2002-current) Talafous.
- Ten players on the 2002-03 roster are products of the United States Hockey League (USHL).
- Rookies Adam Burish and sister Nikki are the first brother-sister combo to play hockey at Wisconsin.
- Junior Rene Bourque enters the season with eight of his 22 career goals coming against Colorado College teams. Fifty percent of his goal scoring has come against teams from Denver (has three scores vs. DU).



Badger fans have led the nation in attendance 28 times since 1969-70, including the last four straight since moving to the Kohl Center. This year, the Kohl Center will witness its 1,000,000th fan pass through its turnstiles in just over four seasons.

THE KOHL CENTER



College Hockey's Top Facility The Kohl Center

On Oct. 3, 1998, the UW hockey team opened play in its new home – the 15,237-seat Kohl Center. The second-largest college-owned hockey arena in the country marks its fifth year as the home of Wisconsin hockey program.

The facility is named after U.S. Senator Herb Kohl, a 1956 UW-Madison graduate who donated \$25 million towards the construction of the arena. Kohl's gift is the single-largest private donation in UW history.

Albert "Ab" Nicholas, a former all-Big Ten basketball player for the Badgers, and his wife, Nancy Johnson Nicholas, pledged \$10 million toward the project. For their generosity, the facility's basketball practice gymnasium is called the Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion.

The Kohl Center, which costs \$76.4 million, is also the home of the Badger men's and women's basketball teams (seats 17,142 for basketball), as well as concerts, guest speakers, shows and sporting events.

This past March, the Kohl Center and the University of Wisconsin hosted one of the "Sweet 16" Final Four regionals of the men's NCAA basketball tournament.

Entertainers who have already performed at the Kohl Center include Elton John, Faith Hill and Tim McGraw, Shania Twain, Cher, The Moody Blues, The Dave Matthews Band, Matchbox 20 and the Backstreet Boys. The Dalia Lama has also made an appearance at the Kohl Center.



Fun Facts

- There are eight locker rooms within the Kohl Center – home hockey, home men's and women's basketball, visiting basketball, visiting hockey, officials and two tournament locker rooms ...
- No tax dollars were used in building the Kohl Center ... \$49 million was raised from private donations and \$27 million in State bonding will be paid back in operational revenues ...
- The 40,000 cubic yards of concrete used in constructing the Kohl Center could build a sidewalk from Madison to Chicago ...
- Eleven miles of coolant pipe is embedded in the hockey floor ...
- It would take 1,351,990,520 hockey pucks to fill the Kohl Center ...
- There are 15 pay phones, 26 rest-rooms and 36 luxury suites located within the Kohl Center



Badger Hockey has led the nation in attendance 28 years, including 24 straight (1969-93). Since moving into the Kohl Center, Wisconsin has once again regained the position as the country's top attendance getters.

MIKE EAVES

Mike Eaves begins a new era of Wisconsin hockey with the start of the 2002-03 season. He became the fifth coach in the modern era of Badger hockey on March 19, 2002 when he was officially named the successor to Jeff Sauer, who retired following the '01-02 campaign.

The Badgers' all-time leading scorer, Eaves returns to his alma mater 25 years after helping the 1977 team to the NCAA Championship.

The 46-year-old Eaves has played and coached at nearly every level of hockey, from Division III UW-Eau Claire to the NHL's Pittsburgh Penguins and Philadelphia Flyers to Helsinki of the Finnish Elite League to Shattuck St. Mary's High School.

He returns to the UW after spending the past two seasons as the head coach of USA Hockey's National Team Development Program (NTDP). A

program designed to accelerate the development of the elite under-20 American hockey players.

Eaves' coaching days began in 1985 with the Calgary Flames (assistant) and since then he has held assistant coaching positions with the NHL's Pittsburgh Penguins and Philadelphia Flyers, and head coaching posts with the Helsinki Finnish Elite League, Shattuck (Minn.) St. Mary's High School and the Hershey Bears of the American Hockey League (AHL). He also spent one season at St. Cloud State (assistant coach) and one season at UW-Eau Claire (head coach).

Eaves has also represented the U.S. in international competition both as a player and coach. He skated as a forward for Team USA at both the 1981 and 1984 Canada Cup tournaments and was a member of the 1976 and 1978 U.S. National Teams at the International Ice Hockey Federation (IIHF) World Championships. As a coach, he served as an assistant under Bob Johnson for Team USA at the 1991 Canada Cup and was also an assistant coach for the 1991 U.S. National Team at the IIHF World Championship in Finland.

In the Beginning

Eaves was recruited to play at Wisconsin by the legendary "Badger Bob" Johnson. He became both a standout student-athlete and one of the greatest players in Badger hockey history in his career (1974-78). A first-team All-American as a junior and senior, he is still the UW's career scoring leader with 267 points (94-173) in 160 games. He helped lead the Badgers to the 1977 NCAA title by scoring 28 goals and adding 53 assists for 81 points during that championship season. He assisted on three goals in that championship game, including the game-winner just 23 seconds into overtime, a 6-5 win over Michigan.

Eaves was a three-year team captain for the Badgers, earning Wisconsin's Big Ten Conference Medal of Honor, given to the athlete who best demonstrates proficiency in both academics and athletics, in 1978 and being inducted into the UW Athletic Department's Hall of Fame in 1992. He ranks eighth on the WCHA's all-time scoring list and this past season was named one of the WCHA's "Top 50 Players in 50 Years" as part of the league's celebration of its 50th Anniversary.

Following college, Eaves made the jump to the NHL, playing eight seasons for the Minnesota North Stars (1978-83) and Calgary Flames (1983-86), accumulating 226 points (83-143) in 324 games. He was the North Stars' rookie of the year in 1979-80 and was the Flames' 1984-85 nominee for the NHL's Bill Masterton Award, given annually to the player who best exemplifies the qualities of perseverance, sportsmanship and dedication to the game.

■ USA Hockey

As head coach of the NTDP, Eaves coached the nation's elite U-20 players the past two seasons (2001-02). These U-18 and U-17 teams represent USA Hockey at international events, such as the World U-17 Challenge, the World U-18 Championship and the World U-20 Championship, while playing a variety of games against junior, college and international competition throughout the year.

The NTDP experienced its most successful season this past spring when the U-18 team won the gold medal at the IIHF World Championships in Slovakia. Eaves and his team clinched the gold with a 3-1 victory over Russia to end the tourney with a 7-1-0 record. Excluding the Olympics, it is the only gold medal won by a U.S. National team at an IIHF World Championship since 1933.

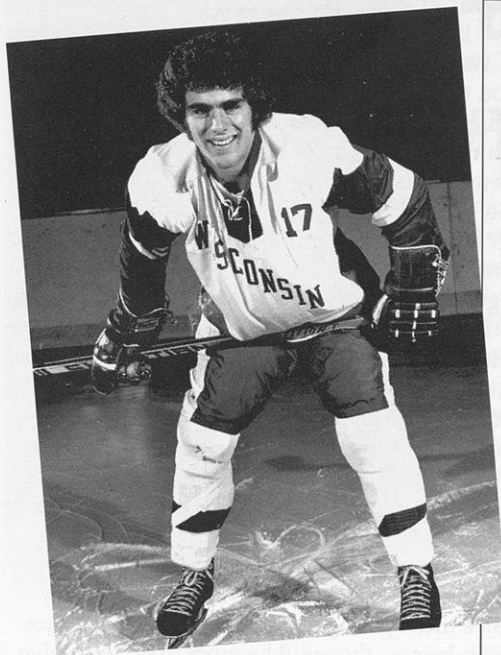
Over 15 of his players from the NTDP the past two years have been drafted by the NHL and 40 are playing Division I college hockey.

■ Behind the Bench Professional

His professional coaching career consists of stints with three different NHL teams, beginning with Calgary in 1985-86. During his final season as a player, Eaves also became an assistant coach under Bob Johnson with the Flames. That year the Flames finished second in the Smythe Division with a 40-31-9 record, losing to Montreal in the best-of-seven Stanley Cup finals, 4-1.

He returned to the NHL in 1988 when he joined the Philadelphia Flyer staff for two seasons, during which the Flyers made it to the conference championship in 1989 before losing to Montreal in the finals. Eaves returned to Philly in 1993-94 again as an assistant coach (to Terry Simpson).

His most recent pro coaching job was at Pittsburgh. From 1997-2000 Eaves served as an assistant under Kevin Constantine (1997-2000) and Herb Brooks (1999-2000). The Penguins won the Northeast Division (1997-98) with a 40-24-18 record, but lost in the conference quarterfinals. The next two seasons, Pittsburgh placed third in the Atlantic Division, ending its season in the conference semifinals both years. The Penguins had records of 38-30-14 (1998-99) and 37-31-8 (1999-2000) during those two campaigns.

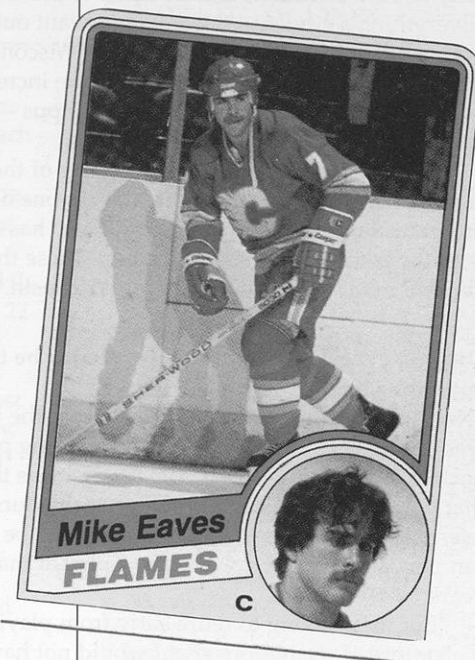

College

Eaves' first collegiate coaching job was as the head coach at UW-Eau Claire (1986-87) in the Northern Collegiate Hockey Association (NCHA). Current assistant UW coach Troy Ward served as an assistant coach under Eaves for that season.

From the Division III ranks, Eaves moved to the Division I level the next season (1987-88) becoming an assistant to Craig Dahl at St. Cloud State. The Huskies were in their first season as a Division I college independent that year, ending the season at 11-25-1.

High School

At the prep level, Eaves took over the program at Shattuck (Minn.) St. Mary's from 1994-96. He coached both the Midget AAA team (1994-95) and the high school (1995-96) teams while at Shattuck.

All in the Family

Hockey and coaching were two things Eaves grew up around. His father, Cecil, played hockey at the University of Denver (1956-57) and is also credited with helping to start the hockey program at Ohio State. He was the head coach at the University of Windsor (Ontario) and is a past director of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association (CAHA).

His brother Murray, lettered two years at Michigan (1978-80) before playing for the Winnipeg Jets (1980-86) and the Detroit Red Wings (1987-88). He currently is the head coach at Shattuck St. Mary's High School.

A native of Denver, Colo., Mike and his wife, Beth, are the parents of two sons—Ben and Patrick—who both attend Boston College. Ben will captain the BC hockey team this season as a junior, while Patrick will be a freshman on the Eagle hockey squad.

Ben became the second member of the Eaves family to win a national title when Boston College won the 2001 NCAA Championship.

Eaves graduated with honors from Wisconsin in 1978 with a B.S. degree in physical education.

Q&A WITH COACH EAVES

Why should a student-athlete come to the UW?

"Everything a student-athlete would want out of their collegiate experience is here at the University of Wisconsin. From the first-class education, the faculty and staff, the incredible social experiences, top-rate facilities, a beautiful campus — this University has it all.

"As a student, you are attending one of the finest institutions around. As a student-athlete, the UW is one of the top athletic programs in the nation. The campus also has so much to offer with the lakes and its natural beauty. These things are why I decided many years ago to attend Wisconsin."

Did you ever think you would someday be the head coach at your alma mater?

"Not right away. When I graduated from the UW, my next step was to the NHL and trying to make a living playing professional hockey, so coaching wasn't something I was thinking about at that point in my life. Once you establish yourself as a pro athlete, you want to know how good you can be and how long you can play at that level. I was able to play at that level for eight years.

"But then having to retire early from playing, my education then afforded me options that I would not have had otherwise. Instead of being limited because of not having an education, I had several options. My education allowed me to get into coaching and at one point in the early 90s, I did think it would be nice to get back to Madison and coach. After a few years of coaching at various levels, you are able to understand the scope of the coaching world and what path is best for you."

"Then with the way things unfolded last year the opportunity arose again, so I decided to put my name in the hat to see what happened."

What is your coaching philosophy?

"That's a tough question to answer concisely. Over time, I've come to realize that your coaching philosophy can come down to how other teams talk about you. If other teams are saying, 'Man they are hard to play against. They play hard and compete. They play smart and don't hurt themselves. They play as a team', when teams talk about you in these terms with those comments then you have something that can become a great foundation for a successful program. That is what our philosophy is. We want to play hard, play smart and play as a team."

What are some of the characteristics you want to see out of your players?

"Playing hard and having good work habits is at the base of what we want to get established here and what we will try to do right away with these young players. Once we've got that in place, we will teach them what our definition of playing smart is. We'll put them in game situations and give each player feedback on playing smart in key situations and creating opportunities we can take advantage of.

"If you have a group of players that aren't necessarily the most talented but they play as a team, you are going to be successful. If you can forecheck as a unit of five, if you can forecheck in the neutral zone as a unit of five, if you can play defensive hockey as a unit of five, you are collectively better than if you had five superstars on the ice."

What are the strengths of this staff?

"Well, first of all, we know each other. We have been to war together and back. We have slept together on busses. We've eaten more fast food together than we ever wanted to. We have won and lost tough games. There is an innate trust that comes with going through those experiences together. We can look at each other and know right away what we need to do. Our verbiage is the same. So, right away this staff has that trust and loyalty that doesn't have to be built up. We can go right to work and be effective with the boys.

"Another strength of this staff is that we come from such varied backgrounds. Troy and I have been fortunate enough to have worked with a wide range of hockey players from prep-age athletes to the professional player. Because of this, our awareness of hockey and what is out there is vast and we can draw on those experiences. Because we as a staff have that awareness, we can create more awareness among the team. When you have awareness, you can make changes in people's lives. The players will be able to make changes in their own lives with this awareness.

"Most importantly, Troy and John are very good people. These kids won't care about what these guys know until they know they care. Once these young men see how much we care about them as human beings, they will be more open to receive what we are saying and will go to the wall for us."

What's it feel like to succeed 'Badger' Bob Johnson and Jeff Sauer?

"First of all, it's an honor. These gentlemen have come in and created a rich tradition of coaching here. They were here a long time and been very successful. The tradition that has been created here is something you can draw on for strength and inspiration. But, after that it goes back to day-to-day functions and what we can control day in and day out. If we are successful in our day-to-day activities we give ourselves the best chance of doing what these gentlemen did and have a long prosperous career and be successful."

What is your greatest moment or experience as a coach?

"As a coach, even though this happened just recently, it would have to be the U-18 World Championship we won in Slovakia this past April. We were playing in Europe in a hostile environment and were always the visiting team.

"Our captain stood up in our locker room before the first game and started talking about Flight 93 on Sept. 11 and how the passengers regained control of the plane and crashed it, saving who knows how many more lives. The last transmission from that plane was 'Let's roll', which became one of our sayings. This 18-year old young man is trying to tell this story and choking back tears. That was really special to be a part of.

"Then the fact that we did end up winning the gold medal. When they played the national anthem, the fans were booing and whistling as they do in Europe and it gets very loud. Our kids were standing arm in arm on the blueline singing the national anthem and the volume of noise started to decrease to the point where you could hear our boys singing above any other noise that was in the arena. These people saw and felt how proud these boys were and how important this was to them. That coaching moment and being a part of that with those young men was probably my coaching highlight up to this time in my career."

ASSISTANT COACH



TROY WARD

Troy Ward returns to the collegiate coaching ranks this season as an assistant coach for Wisconsin. He will be the Badgers' recruiting coordinator off the ice, while dealing primarily with the defense and penalty-killing units on the ice. He has been involved with hockey at all levels — NCHA, USHL, IHL, AHL, ECHL, NHL— either as a player or coach for 22 years.

Last season he was Senior Vice President and Director of Hockey Operations for the East Coast Hockey League (ECHL). In this capacity, Ward was in charge of all the league's hockey operations and officiating departments and served as the primary liaison with the NHL, AHL and all other pro leagues.

During the 2000-01 season, Ward was named the ECHL's Coach of the Year as he led the Trenton Titans to a 61-26-4 record and the

Northern Conference title in his only season with Trenton.

From 1997-2000, Ward was an assistant coach for the NHL's Pittsburgh Penguins. He was the team's defensive coordinator which involved working with the penalty killing unit. Ward also oversaw video coordination and off-ice improvement sessions with players. During the 1997-98 season, the team set a franchise record for penalty killing (86.7 percent) and lowest goals-against average. Among the players he coached were Jaromir Jagr and Ron Francis.

His start in pro hockey came in 1995 as an assistant coach for the International Hockey League's (IHL) Indianapolis Ice, who won the Eastern Conference Championship in his final season (1997) with the franchise. Prior to Indianapolis, Ward was the general manager and head coach of the Dubuque Fighting Saints of the United States Hockey League (USHL), a Junior A League. He led the Saints to a 63-45-5 mark and coached 18 players that received Division I scholarships in his two seasons there.

No stranger to the WCHA, Ward got his start in Division I hockey as an assistant coach at the University of Denver from 1990-93, under head coach Frank Serratore. He was responsible for the weight training and nutrition programs while also coaching the defensemen and special teams. Ward's start in coaching came at his alma mater, UW-Eau Claire, where he served as the head coach from 1987-90 and as an assistant to Mike Eaves for the 1986-87 season.

In the offseason, he is very active in summer camps, including being the owner and camp director of his Hockey and Sons Skill Camp. He also directed the Pittsburgh Penguins' Hockey Camp (1997-99) and has been involved with USA Hockey's Masters Symposium and Select 16 camps. Since 1994 Ward has been a coach at the C&O High Altitude Hockey Camp (Denver) which is a conditioning camp for professional players (NHL, IHL and AHL).

Ward, 40, earned a bachelor's degree in comprehensive physical education (1985) from UW-Eau Claire and a master's degree in athletic administration from UW-Eau Claire in 1989. The native of North St. Paul, Minn. has two sons -- Taylor (11) and Nathan (7).

JOHN HYNES

John Hynes begins his first year as an assistant coach with the Badger hockey program. His duties include overseeing the strength and conditioning program and assisting with recruiting. On the ice, he will work with both the forwards and defensemen.

Last season, Hynes was a member of the coaching staff for the Under-18 Team within USA Hockey's National Team Development Program (NTDP). He helped guide that team to its most successful season in program history, winning the gold medal at the World U-18 Championships in Trnava, Slovakia this past April. The gold medal won by the U-18 team was the first United States national team to take gold at an IIHF tourney (excluding the Olympics) since 1933. That team finished with a 7-1-0 tourney mark, defeating Russia 3-1 in

the championship game.

Additionally, he served as an assistant coach for the USA National Junior Team which finished with a 4-1-2 mark at the world junior championships in Prague, Czechoslovakia.

The native of Warwick, R.I., graduated from Boston University in 1997 with a bachelor's degree in health and physical education. He played three years for the Terriers, lettering all three years and taking part in four straight NCAA Frozen Fours. BU won the 1995 NCAA Championship in Providence.

His first stint as an assistant coach was at his alma mater. After graduating in May of 1997, Hynes stayed on to serve as an assistant coach at BU under Jack Parker. That year the Terriers won the Hockey East regular-season title and made the NCAA tournament.

From there, Hynes joined the National Team Development Program in Ann Arbor, Mich., as a graduate assistant coach under Jeff Jackson. His duties included directing the strength and conditioning programs while working with both the Under-17 and Under-18 teams. He coached those teams in two U-18 world championships.

During the 2000-01 season, he was an assistant coach at the University of Massachusetts-Lowell. Hynes supervised and developed the recruiting system and also designed and ran the strength and conditioning program for the River Hawks. That year the team went from finishing in last place the year before (1999-2000) to the Hockey East finals.

Hynes is also very active within USA Hockey, having served as the head strength and conditioning advisor and lecturer for USA Hockey's Select 15, 16 and 17 camps. In that capacity, he was responsible for all off-ice training, testing and education of players. He's also been a guest speaker at coaching symposiums and an instructor at various summer camps. His coaching has taken Hynes from Slovakia to Sweden and from Finland to the Czech Republic as he has been an assistant coach for three gold medal and two silver medal-winning U-17 and U-18 teams.

BILL HOWARD

Bill Howard returns to the UW hockey staff for his 29th season as an assistant coach in 2002-03. He is a veteran of all five Wisconsin NCAA championship teams and continues to be the man behind the goaltending success of Badger teams.

During the off-season, Howard is actively involved in numerous summer hockey camps and seminars, including intensive goaltending schools in Chicago, Madison, Milwaukee, Minneapolis and St. Louis. After 34 years of teaching business law at Madison Memorial High School, Howard retired in the Spring of 2000 from teaching.

In addition, Howard has also served as color commentator, both on radio and television, for Badger hockey.

During his tenure at the UW, Howard has helped develop All-Americans Julian Baretta (1977), Roy Schultz (1980), Duane Derksen (1992) and Kirk Daubenspeck (1997) plus eventual NHL standouts Mike Richter (New York Rangers), Curtis Joseph (Detroit Red Wings) and Jim Carey (Boston Bruins). His most recent standout in goal was Graham Melanson (1997-2001), who finished his career at Wisconsin with school records in wins (81), games played (140), saves (3,850) and minutes (8,179). Current Badger goaltenders Scott Kabotoff and Bernd Bruckler recorded .920 and .917 save percentages a year to rank tied for first and fourth, respectively, in the UW record books for best save percentage (season).

Before joining the UW staff full-time, Howard started the high school hockey program at Madison Memorial and was the Spartans' head coach for 10 years (1967-77). His teams won two state titles and posted a 136-72-1 (.653) record, including a perfect 44-0-0 mark from 1975-77.

Howard enjoyed a distinguished career at Colorado College as a goaltender, where he played for Bob Johnson. He lettered two years for the Tigers in 1964-65 and 1965-66 and was the starting goaltender during the '65-66 campaign. Howard, a two-sport athlete at CC, was also a member of the Tiger baseball team.

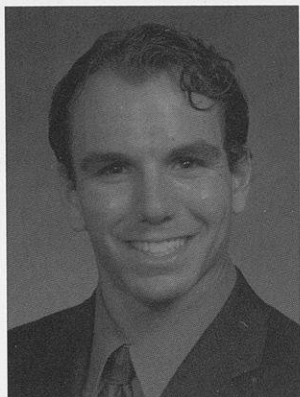

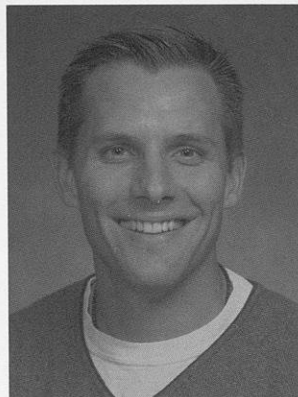
Goodman, a member of the National Strength and Conditioning Association, is a certified strength and conditioning specialist as well as being a certified USA Weightlifting Club Coach.

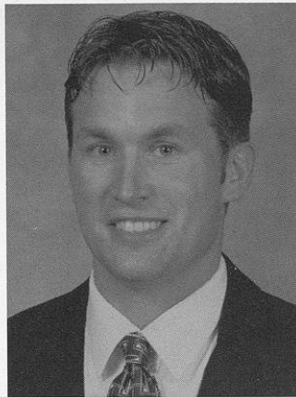
He returned to Wisconsin from the United States Military Academy where he served as a full-time athletic trainer for both the hockey and football teams.

Video Coordinator

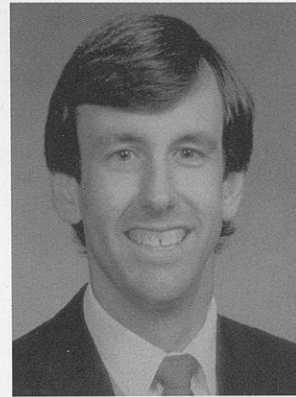

A native of Waupun, Wis., Malnory's duties include the planning and coordinating of all hockey road trips and serving as equipment manager.

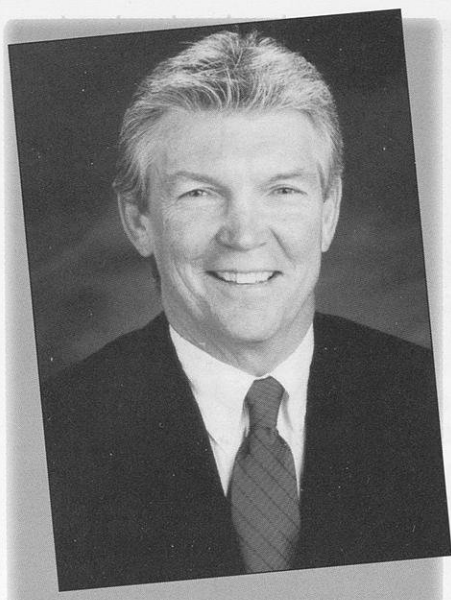

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



PAT RICHTER

The Dean of Big Ten Directors of Athletics, Pat Richter, begins his 14th year heading the athletic department at his alma mater. The former all-star student-athlete not only rescued the Badger athletic department in the early 1990s, but has also charted a plan for a prosperous future in the new millennium.

When Richter accepted then-Chancellor Donna Shalala's offer to run the division in '89, he inherited a \$2.1 million debt, a downtrodden program on the field, subpar facilities and deteriorating fan support.

During his administration, the Badgers have eliminated the red ink on the financial ledgers, won on the playing field, built new facilities, added three new women's sports and made it fashionable to "be a Badger."

The cumulative effect of Richter's efforts are appreciated in a 2001 survey conducted by The

Sporting News which ranked the Badgers as the 10th-best program in the nation.

Every program has flourished during his administration. Some of the highlights include:

- the football team, which has three Big Ten titles, six bowl wins and filled Camp Randall Stadium for the past nine years.
- the men's basketball team, which has played in six NCAA tournaments and three NITs and produced the two winningest teams in school history. In 2000, the Badgers made their second Final Four appearance in school history.
- the women's hoops team, which has played in five NCAA tournaments and three NITs.
- three teams -- men's hockey (1989-90), men's crew (1989-90) and men's soccer (1995) -- have won national titles during Richter's tenure.

Richter's own college athletic prowess is well-documented. He earned all-America (1961-62) and academic all-America (1962) honors as a tight end. Richter led the Big Ten in receiving twice and topped the nation as a junior. As a senior, Richter won the prestigious 1963 Big Ten Medal of Honor. Richter was recognized for his college gridiron exploits in 1997 with his induction into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame.

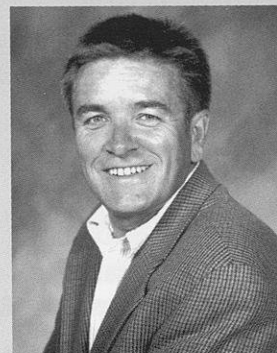
He also earned all-league honors in baseball at UW as a power-hitting first baseman, but the 6-5 center received his scholarship for basketball. Pat was a first-round draft pick of the Redskins and played professionally from 1963-71. Richter earned his B.S. degree from the UW-Madison in landscape architecture (1964).

Upon retirement from the NFL, he earned a law degree (1971) from UW-Madison. After working at a Madison law firm, he joined Oscar Mayer where he was V.P. of personnel. Richter was honored with an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award for post-college achievements in 1988. He is a member of the State Athletic and Madison Sports Halls of Fame and the NFL Player Alumni Association.

Pat was enshrined into the UW Athletic Department and Rose Bowl Halls of Fame in '91 and '94, respectively. In 1995, he gained induction into the GTE Academic All-America Hall of Fame. The Sales & Marketing Executives of Madison named Richter their "Executive of the Year" in 1997.

Pat and his wife, Renee, have four sons: Scott (wife Khaki and grandsons J.P. and Cole), Brad (wife Chrissy and grandson Max and granddaughter Samantha), Barry (wife Kim and grandson Blake and granddaughter Alexandra) and Tim.

DAVID MCDONALD



David McDonald, the former chair of the UW Athletic Board, serves as a special assistant to the Chancellor for Athletics. In that role, McDonald oversees some day-to-day operations of the Department of Athletics, including academics and rules compliance.

McDonald, a history professor first appointed to the 22-member UW Board of Athletics in 1994, served as its chairman one year succeeding Jim Hoyt.

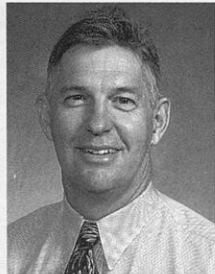

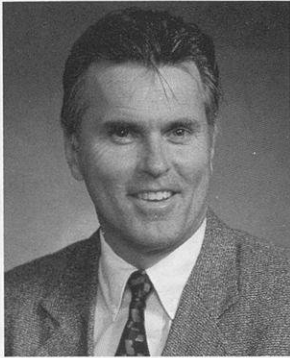
Jamie Pollard Chief Financial Officer

The first annual College Hockey Showcase took place at The Palace of Auburn Hills, Mich., on Nov. 26-27, 1993. The tournament was created by the schools of the Big Ten Conference — Michigan, Michigan State, Minnesota, Wisconsin — to showcase some of the nation's best talent over the Thanksgiving weekend.

CCHA schools (Michigan, Michigan State) play WCHA schools (Minnesota, Wisconsin) in a round-robin format.

The Showcase was not designed to determine an individual champion, but to give fans a chance to witness some of the most competitive teams and individual talent in college hockey, while preserving Big Ten rivalries.

The first four years of the Showcase were played at neutral sites — The Palace, The Target Center, The Bradley Center, Joe Louis Arena — with each school getting a chance to host the event. After the 1996 showcase, the event was moved to campus sites, rotating among the four Showcase schools.

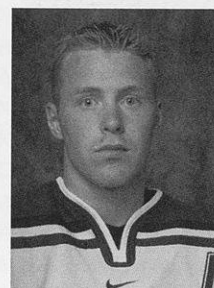

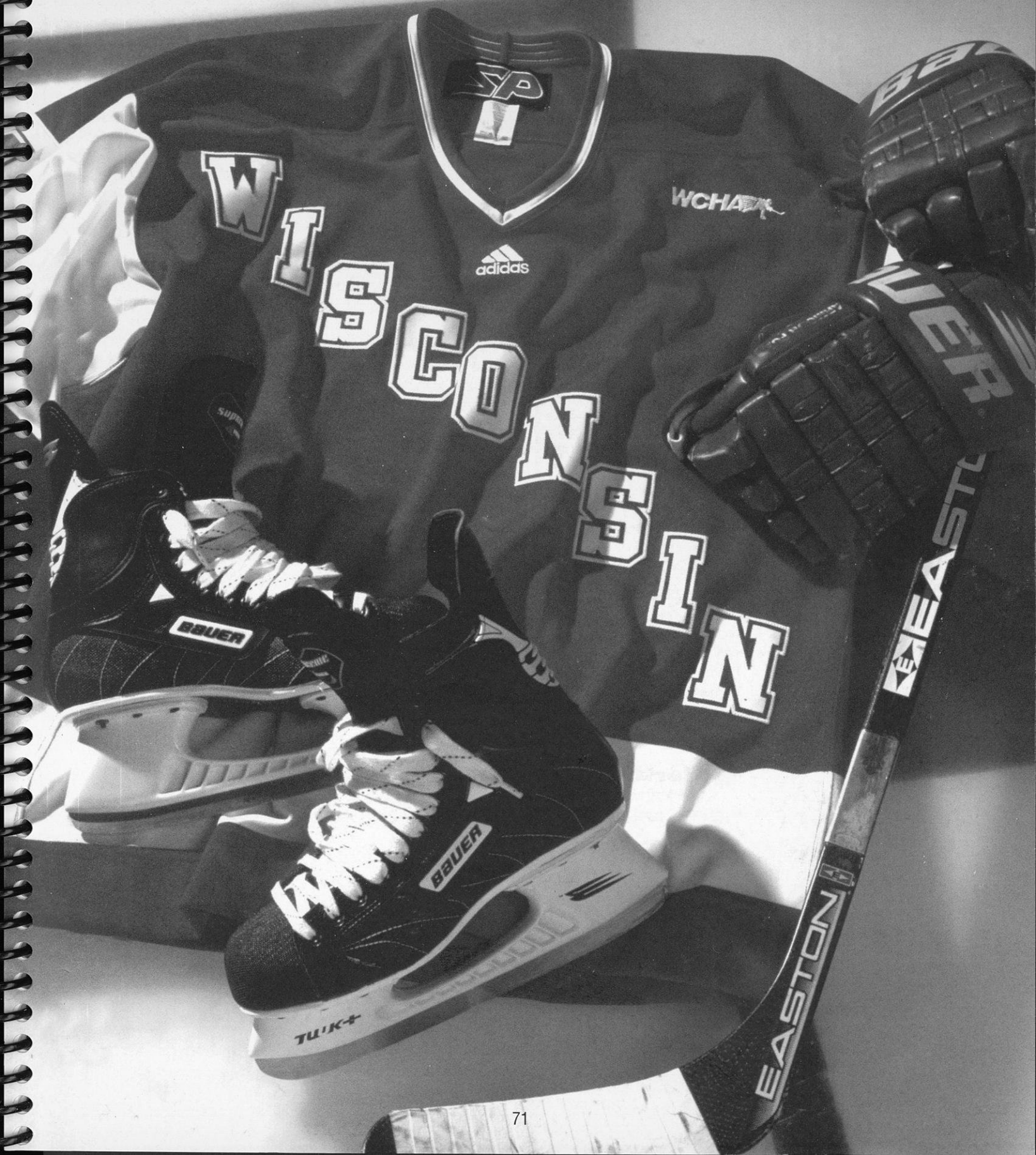

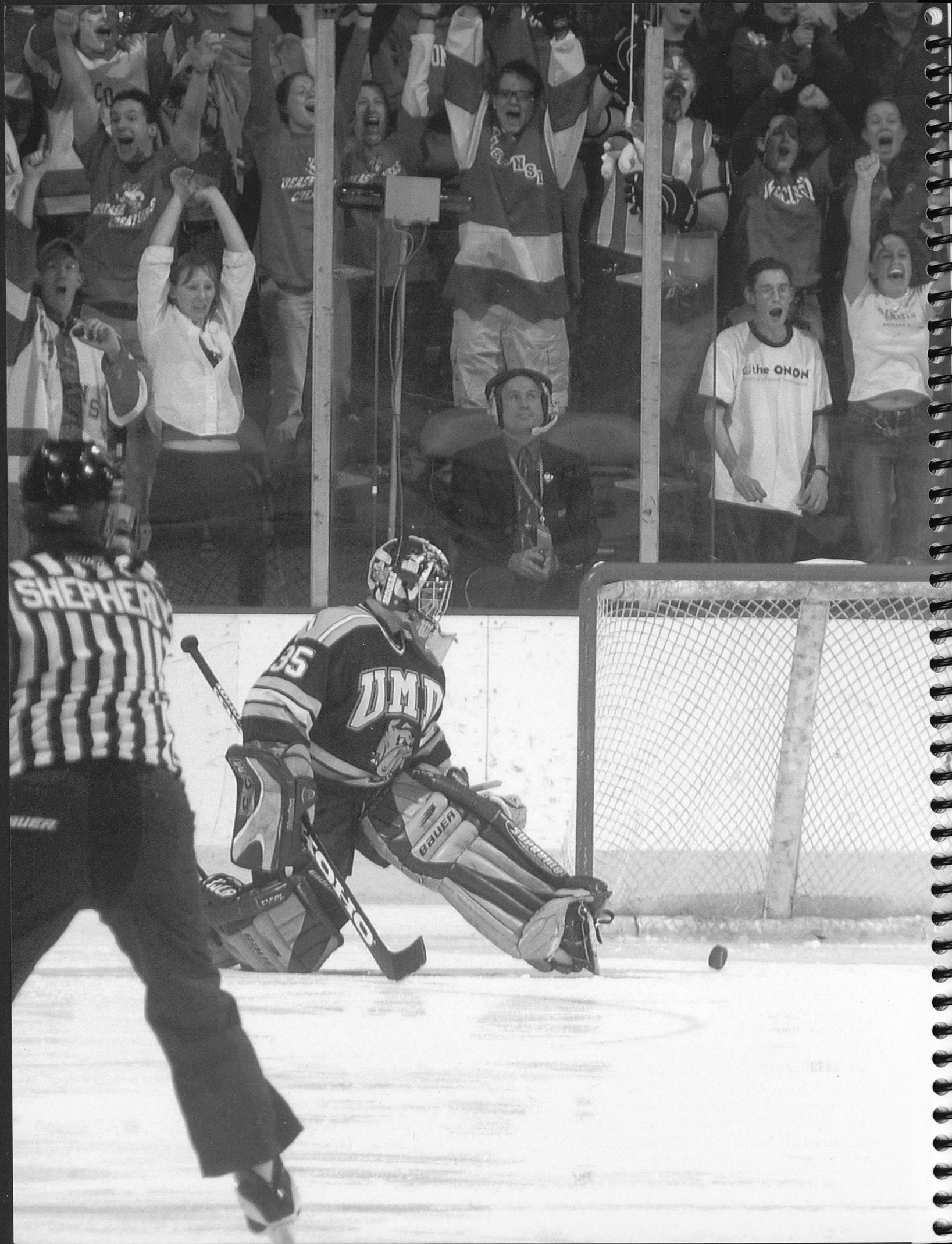

THE 2001-02 SEASON

Final Records

Wisconsin finished the season with a 16-19-4 overall record and a 12-13-3 mark in WCHA play. The Badgers' fifth-place finish was the 29th time (in 33 years) since joining the WCHA a UW team has finished among the top five.

No.1 Again

Since moving to the Kohl Center with the start of the 1998-99 season, the Badgers have re-claimed the top spot in Division I college hockey attendance. This past season, for the fourth straight season and 28th time overall, was no different as the UW drew 236,140 fans to 20 home dates for an average of 11,807 per game. Those numbers lead the nation in total attendance and average attendance.

In four years of hockey at the Kohl Center (82 dates), the hockey team has played in front of 963,487 fans for an average of 11,750 per game.

Wins & Losses

The Badgers won the most games (13) when scoring first (13-8-2), when ahead after two periods (13-1-1) or giving up three or fewer goals (13-8-3).

Conversely, 17 of the 19 losses this past season came in games where the UW offense was held to less than four goals.

That's A Lot of Games

The Badgers' nine seniors combined to play in 1,095 games during their careers. All but one senior — goaltender Mark Baranczyk — saw action in over 100 games. That list includes Matt Hussey (143), Matt Murray (140), Kent Davyduke, Matt Doman and Andy Wheeler (135), Rob Vega (134) and Dave Hergert (118).

Sauer Honored for Community Service

Jeff Sauer added yet another award to his list this past season when the Hockey Humanitarian Award Committee presented him with the Citation of Merit.

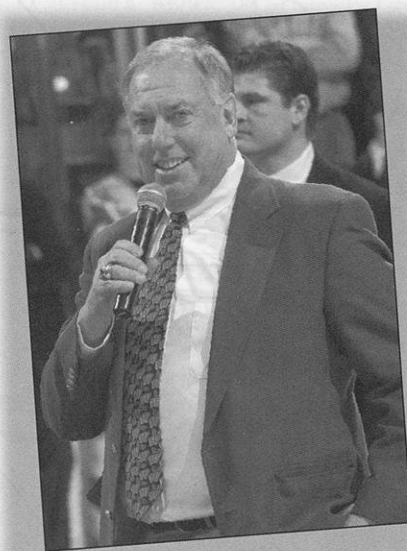
Here and There

Junior Scott Kabotoff (Strathcona, Alberta) and freshman Bernd Bruckler (Graz, Austria) teamed up to be one of the nation's top goaltending tandems in 2001-02. Both finished the year with save percentages over .900 and both established themselves in the Wisconsin recordbooks, while also combining to hold

The End of an Era



After leading the Badgers to two national titles (1983 and 1990), two regular-season and five WCHA playoff championships and 12 NCAA appearances, head coach Jeff Sauer stepped down from college hockey following the 2001-02 campaign. He leaves as the fourth-winningest coach in NCAA history with 655 career wins and is the winningest coach in WCHA history.

Sauer spent 31 years as a head coach in the WCHA — 11 years at Colorado College and 20 at Wisconsin. He leaves with an overall record of 655-532-57 (.552) and a Badger mark of 489-306-46 (.609).

THE SAUER LIST

- Not only is Sauer the WCHA's winningest coach, his 31 years in the league are also the most of any coach in WCHA history.
- He is one of just eight coaches in the history of the WCHA who has won multiple NCAA titles. The other league coaches that have more than one national title are Murray Armstrong (5, Denver), Vic Heyliger (4, Michigan), Bob Johnson (3, Wisconsin), John MacInnes (3, Michigan Tech), Herb Brooks (3, Minnesota), Gino Gasparini (3, North Dakota), Dean Blais (2, North Dakota) and Jeff Sauer (2, Wisconsin).
- Sauer ranks fourth on the all-time NCAA coaches win list with 655.
- He won 20 or more games 15 times, including four 30-win seasons.
- His UW teams have made 12 NCAA appearances, including three Frozen Four showings and two national titles (1983, 1990).
- At the league level, Sauer has two regular-season titles (1990, 2000) and five WCHA playoff championships.
- He coached 13 Olympians, 17 All-Americans and over 30 players who have seen action in the NHL, including names like Chris Chelios, Pat Flatley, Tony Granato, Dany Heatley, Sean Hill, Curtis Joseph, Scott Mellanby, Brian Rafalski, Paul Ranheim, Steve Reinprecht, Mike Richter, Gary Suter and Dave Tanabe.
- Was the head coach for the WCHA's inaugural All-Star Team in 1998 which traveled to Europe, playing games against German and Swiss elite teams.
- Was the head coach of the 1990 U.S. Team at the Goodwill Games.
- In 1989, Sauer coached the USA Select Team at the Pravda Cup in Leningrad.
- Coached the 1985 U.S. National Team at the World Championships in Sweden.
- Received the 2000 JOFA/USA Hockey Distinguished Achievement Award.

- Bruckler became the first goaltender since Jim Carey (1992) to get a shutout in his first-ever start ... a 5-0 win over Wayne State.

- Kabotoff was the only goaltender in the WCHA last season to record two 50-plus save games.

- Bruckler's first 50-save effort as a Badger came vs. Colorado College on Feb. 8 ... he made 50 saves in a 5-5 overtime tie.

- Kabotoff made a career-high 56 saves (Dec. 28) vs. Colorado College at the Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown.

■ Blueline Leader

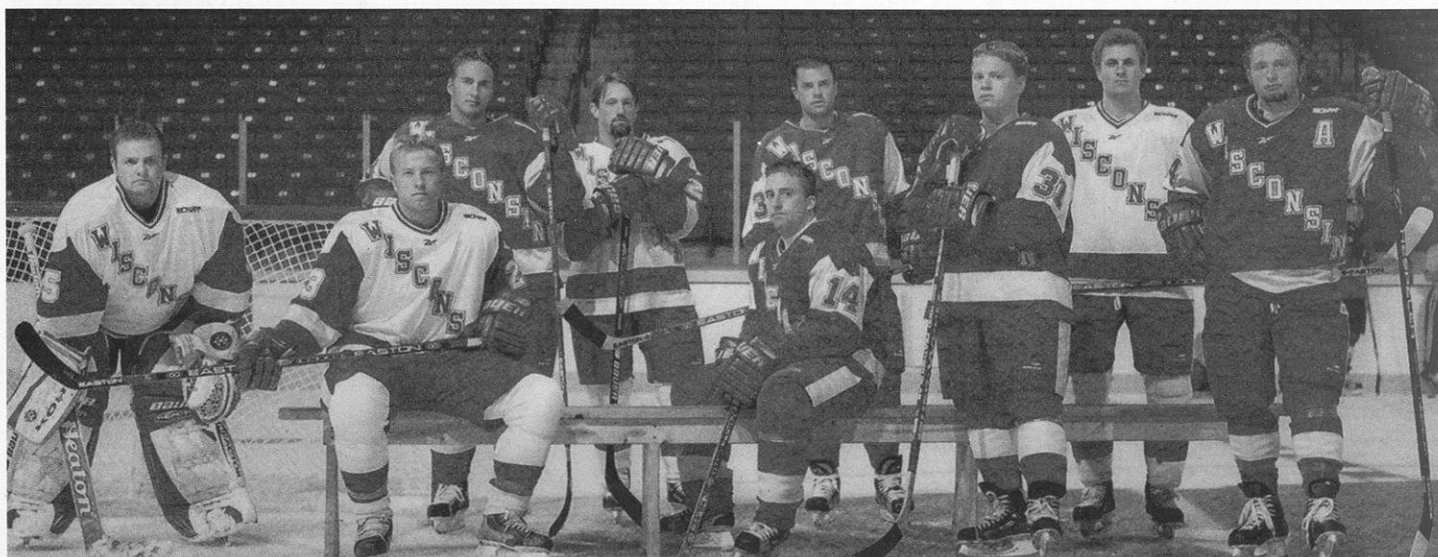

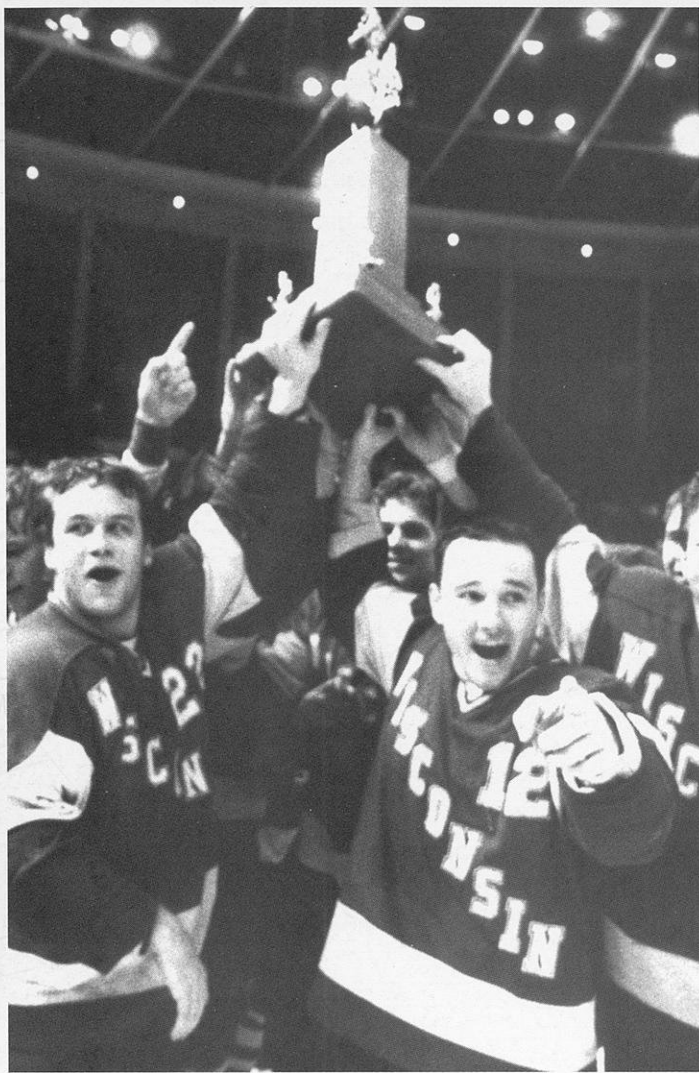

THE BROADMOOR TROPHY

Since 1985, teams winning the WCHA playoff championship have been awarded the Broadmoor Trophy, which was first presented to the conference in 1981 by the world-renowned Broadmoor Hotel and Resort in Colorado Springs, Colo. The Broadmoor hosted the NCAA Ice Hockey Championship 11 times between 1948 and 1969.

For the first three seasons (1981-84) of its partnership with the WCHA (due to the departure of league member and MacNaughton Cup custodian Michigan Tech to the CCHA), the trophy was presented to the Association's regular-season champion. When the Huskies returned to the WCHA for the 1984-85 season, the Broadmoor Trophy became and has since been the symbol of the league's post-season tournament championship.

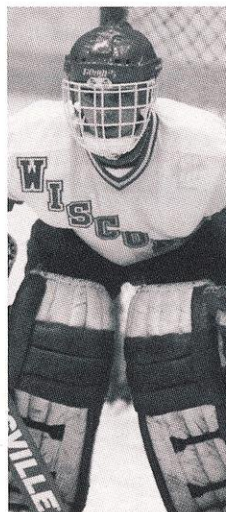

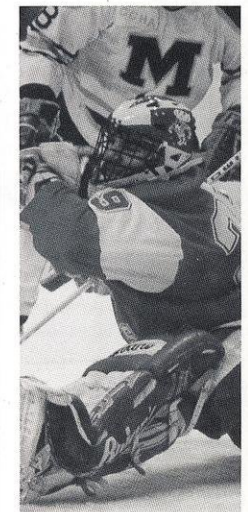

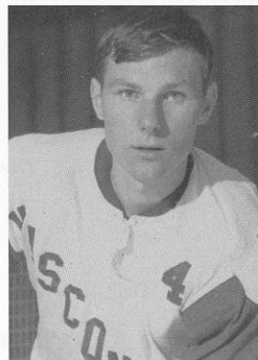

• The eight first-team All-America forwards scored 626-758=1,384 in their Badger careers in 854 games. That averages out to 1.6 points a game between the group.

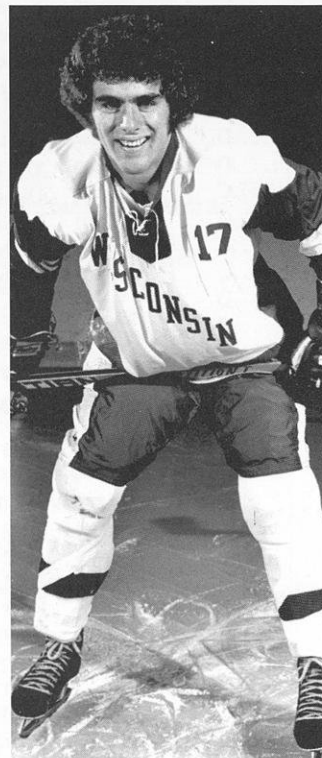

• The first five UW All-Americans were defensemen.

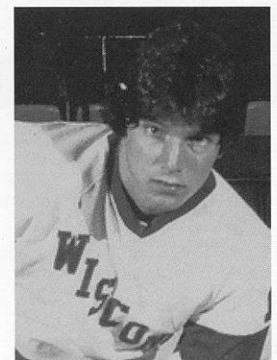

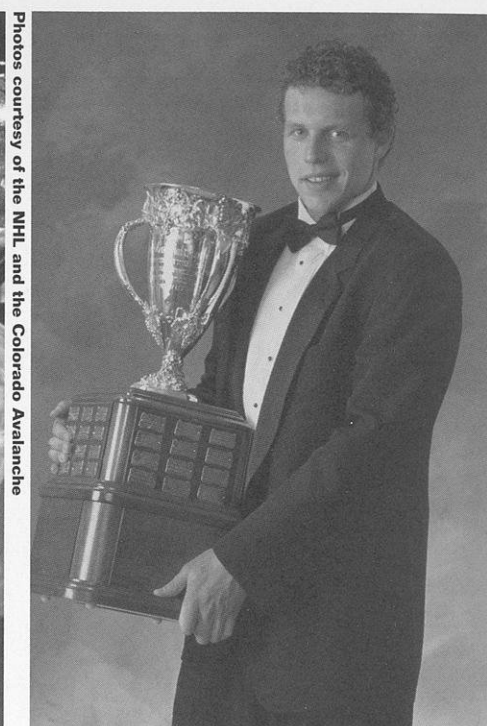

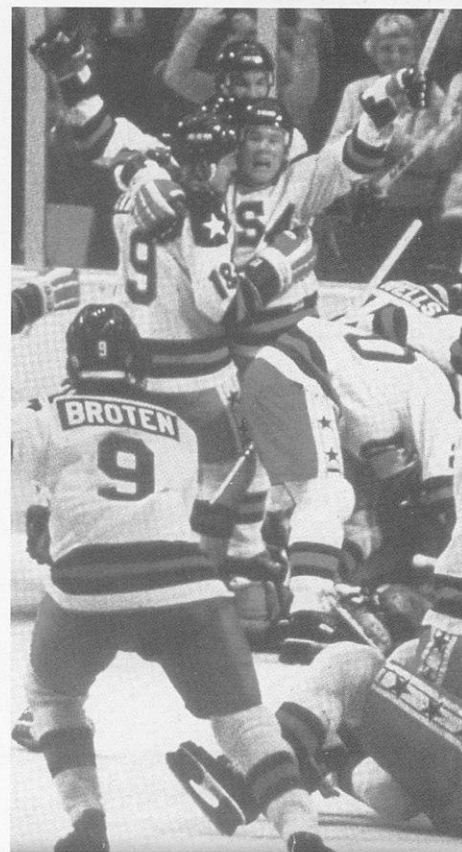

■ WCHA Student-Athlete of the Year

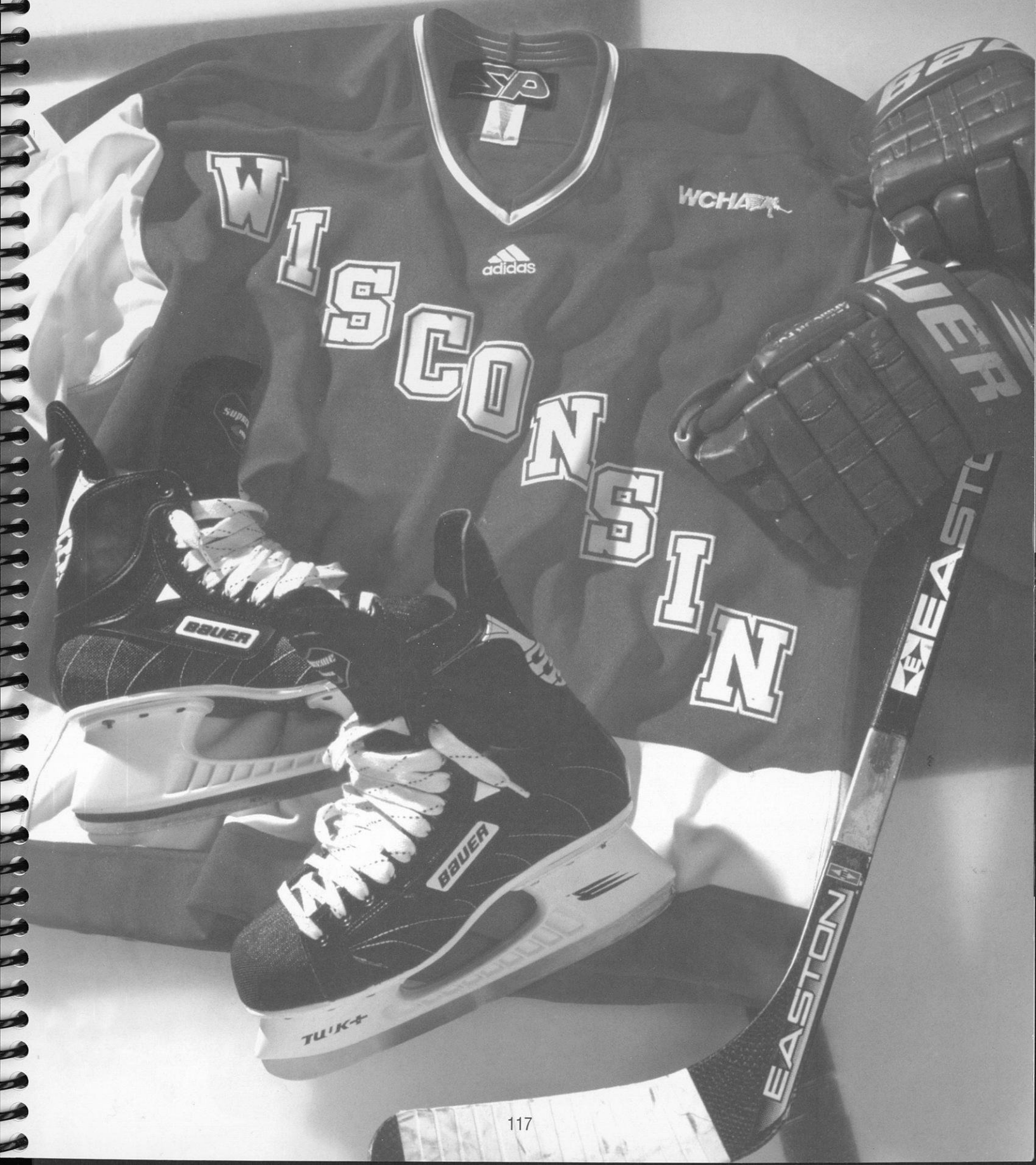

When the UW athletic counsel voted to officially recognize ice hockey as a varsity sport (1921-22), Dr. A.C. Viner was named the UW's first varsity ice hockey coach. But hockey at the UW was organized at the club level as far back as 1892. In the years leading up to that first season, Joe Steinauer coached Badger club teams from 1916-1919. His name is the earliest mention of a UW hockey coach, club or varsity level.

THE DECADE OF THE 60s



The first UW hockey team (1963-64) went 8-5-3 in its first season, with wins over Macalester, Illinois Club, Lake Forest, Carleton and Hamline that year. John Riley (below) was one of the main forces behind the return of hockey to Wisconsin.

In March of 1962 at an athletic board meeting, then-Athletic Director Ivan B. Williamson reinstated ice hockey as an intercollegiate sport at the University of Wisconsin. A year-and-a-half later, behind co-coaches Art Thomsen and John Riley, Badger hockey made its 'second debut'.

On November 29, 1963, seven days after the tragic death of President Kennedy, the Badgers faced off against St. Mary's College of Winona, Minn. That game signaled the return of hockey to Wisconsin after a 28-year absence.

The first Badger team of the modern era was formed by posting flyers around the campus during the Fall of 1962. The flyers asked any university students wishing to play ice hockey to report to an initial organizational meeting in Agricultural Hall. Only about 15-20 students showed up and because there were no scholarships, the team was molded from kids who did not receive offers from any other schools and a lot of local kids who just wanted to play the game.

So, from those humble beginnings, co-coaches Riley and Thomsen laid the foundation for what would become one of college hockey's winningest programs.

During the first full season (1963-64), a TOTAL of 8,937 fans watched 15 games at Kelsey's Hartmeyer Ice Arena. That number tripled just one year later as in the Badgers' second season, nearly 28,000 people came out to watch the 17-game home slate.

Said Riley, "We had great enthusiasm from those who came out to see what was going on. Although small in number, they were very dedicated, very loyal, very excitable and very vocal." These were the first of the now famous Wisconsin hockey fans.

From the start, the Badgers boasted strong goaltenders producing such names as Jim Duffy, Gary Johnson, Bob Vroman and Wayne Thomas between the pipes in the 60s. The first 20-goal scorer (season) was Ray Clegg, who led the team in scoring during the 1964-65 campaign with 27-22=49. Bert Dehate was the decade's most prolific scorer with 108 goals, 80 assists for 188 points from 1966-70. He left with UW records for career goals and points, and season goals and points, to

name a few. On defense, John Jagger became the school's first All-American when he was named to the first team following the 1969-70 season. Don Addison paced the team in defensive scoring three straight seasons (1964-67) and led the team in scoring with 12-28=40 in 1966-67.

THE HIGHLIGHTS

March 1962 – Athletic Director Ivan B. Williamson announces the return of hockey as an intercollegiate sport after the sport was dropped in 1935.

November 29, 1963 – In the first game of the modern era, the Badgers lose a 13-6 shootout to St. Mary's (Winona, Minn.). The game was played in front of 695 fans at Hartmeyer Ice Arena.

The first modern-era goal came off the stick of Tom French (Ann Arbor, Mich.) on a penalty shot.

December 6, 1963 – A rebound goal by Chan Young (Madison, Wis.) gives the UW its first win in the modern era. In overtime, the Badgers defeated Macalester, 3-2.

December 11, 1964 – The UW takes a major step in the future of the program, scheduling eight games against teams from the WCHA, but the Badgers lose all eight.

February 22, 1966 – The UW breaks a 13-game winless streak versus WCHA teams, when it posts a 5-4 overtime win over the Minnesota Gophers.

April 1, 1966 – Following the retirement of John Riley, the UW hires Bob Johnson as its ninth coach in the history of the program.

March 1968 – Sophomore center Bert DeHate (St. Paul, Minn.) became the first Badger to win the national scoring title. He tallied 47-30=77, including a school-record seven hat tricks.

March 30, 1969 – Wisconsin joins the WCHA, becoming the ninth member of the most prestigious league in Division I college hockey.

November 14-15, 1969 – The first-ever WCHA series was played against the Fighting Sioux of North Dakota. The Badgers upset UND, sweeping the series 8-4 and 7-4.

March 1970 – Wisconsin makes its first NCAA tournament appearance, finishing third. Defenseman John Jagger (Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario) is the first UW All-American.

THE DECADE OF THE 70s

The decade of the 70s established the University of Wisconsin hockey program as one of the nation's elite. After winning the WCHA playoff championship in its first season as a WCHA member (1969-70) and also making its first NCAA tourney appearance that year, Wisconsin entered the next decade with confidence and determination to take the program to the next level.

It didn't take long for the Badgers to make that step and return to the NCAA championship. In March of 1972, the UW lost to Boston University, but defeated Denver to place third at the NCAA tournament. It was the second championship appearance in three years for a Badger team. Then came the 1972-73 campaign – the 10th anniversary of the UW hockey program in the modern era. That year proved to be the best yet for a Wisconsin squad as the Badgers finished 29-9-2 and gave themselves the best anniversary present available in the college hockey world – an NCAA championship. It would be the first of three for Bob Johnson as the UW's mentor.

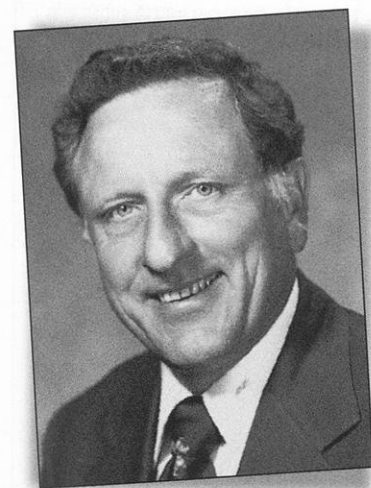
Just four years later, arguably the best college hockey team assembled, notched the first 30-win season in the school's existence ending the year 37-7-1. That team produced four

first-team All-Americans in forwards Mike Eaves and Mark Johnson, defensemen Craig Norwich and goaltender Julian Baretta and Wisconsin's second NCAA title. The Badgers came from behind in both semi-final games to defeat New Hampshire and Michigan in overtime in two of the greatest comebacks in UW history. Both games were tied late in regulation by the UW and then won in overtime.

Wisconsin made another NCAA championship appearance in '77-78 (the fourth of the decade), finishing fourth after losing to Boston University and Bowling Green.

The UW watched two of its team members take part in the 'Miracle on Ice' during the 1980 Lake Placid Olympics. Mark Johnson and Bob Suter were both members of the United States' goal-medal winning team. Johnson led the team in scoring with 5-6=11.

The Badger hockey program had earned the respect of the college hockey world with the



accomplishments and success during the 70s. Wisconsin made four NCAA appearances, won two NCAA championships, four WCHA playoff titles and one WCHA regular-season crown. Six 20-plus win seasons, including a 30-win campaign, were recorded. Individually, six players earned nine first-team All-America honors, while five players (and one coach) were Olympians during the decade of the 70s. Steve Alley, Bob Lundeen, John Taft and head coach Bob Johnson were members of the 1976 U.S. Olympic team, while Johnson and Suter played on the 1980 U.S. team.

THE HIGHLIGHTS

March 1972 – The Badgers make a second appearance in three years at the NCAA championships, finishing third.

March 16, 1973 – Wisconsin stuns Cornell, 6-5 in overtime, to advance to the finals of the NCAA championship. A goal with five seconds left in regulation (by Dean Talafofus) ties the game. Then with 33 seconds left in overtime, Talafofus gets the game-winner to give the Badgers their first national title.

February 19, 1977 – Wisconsin captures its first-ever MacNaughton Cup with a 6-4 win over Minnesota-Duluth at the Dane County Coliseum.

March 25, 1977 – The Badgers make it to college hockey's final four for the third time in school history. In semi-final action, Les Grauer ties the game and Mike Eaves get the game-winner to give the UW a 4-3 overtime win over New Hampshire.

March 26, 1977 – The best season in UW history is culminated when Steve Alley's goal at 0:23 into overtime gives Wisconsin a 6-5 win over Michigan for the school's second NCAA title in five seasons.

The Badgers finish the season at 37-7-1, becoming the first team to capture the Big Ten, WCHA and NCAA titles in the same season. Bob Johnson is named national coach of the year, while his son, Mark, is named the freshman of the year.

March 25, 1978 – Wisconsin fans take Providence, R.I., by storm for the 1978 NCAA Championship and are proclaimed the "World's Greatest Hockey Fans," by the city.

Mike Eaves ends his UW career as the school's all-time scoring leader, while he and Mark Johnson earn first-team All-America honors.

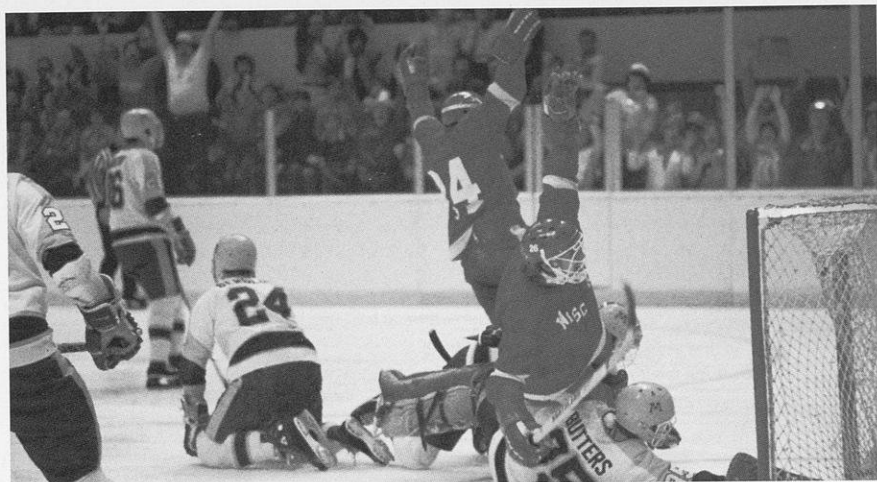
March 1979 – The Badgers play before 21 sellout crowds, averaging 8,654 (just eight short of a sellout) fans a game at the Dane County Coliseum.

Mark Johnson, the collegiate player of the year, closes out his UW career as the top goal scorer (125) in school history.

THE DECADE OF THE 80s



Ted Pearson (#24) gives the Badgers a 4-0 lead over the Minnesota Gophers at the 9:23 mark of the second period. That goal proved to be the game-winner as the UW went on to a 6-3 win and the 1981 NCAA title.

Wisconsin opened the 80s with three straight NCAA championship appearances (1980-81, 1981-82 and 1982-83) and two national titles (1981 and 1983). With three NCAA championships in seven years, Badger hockey had become the most successful collegiate hockey program in the nation.

Those three teams produced some of the best athletes to play the game. Consider that five members of those teams went on to distinguished NHL careers, including Bruce Driver (15 seasons/1,030 games), Pat Flatley (14/850), Brian Mullen (11/1,205), Dave Maley (9/512) and Chris Chelios, who marked his 20th season in the NHL in 2001-02 as a member of the Stanley Cup-winning Detroit Red Wings. Chelios, who has been named the NHL's best defenseman on three separate occasions, has played in 1,370 career NHL games.

In addition, four players – Flatley, Driver, John Newberry and Theran Welsh – were named first-team All-Americans. Welsh remains the Badgers' all-time leading defensive scorer (24-194=228) and is one of only four players in school history to reach the 200-point plateau.

Wisconsin won 20-or-more games every season in the decade of the 80s, including two 30-win campaigns. And, just as the UW entered the 80s, winning a national title, that is how it ended the 80s. The 1989-90 squad won the school's fifth NCAA title and posted the second-best record in school history (36-9-1).

The list of players that came out of the Badger hockey program during this decade is second to none. John Byce, Tony Granato, Sean Hill, Curtis Joseph, Scott Mellanby, Paul Ranheim, Barry Richter, Mike Richter, Gary Shuchuk, Gary Suter and Chris Tancill are just a few of the top players that came out of the 80s.

The Badgers became just the fourth school to win three or more titles in the same decade. Denver (60s) and Boston University (70s) won three and Michigan five (50s) championships in its respective decade.

THE HIGHLIGHTS

March 27, 1981 – For the sixth time in school history, the Badgers return to the NCAA tournament. After advancing past Clarkson in quarterfinal action a week earlier, the Badgers defeat Northern Michigan to earn the right to play for the national title.

March 28, 1981 – With a 6-3 win over arch-rival Minnesota, the Badgers grab the school's third NCAA title. The UW defeats the No. 1 teams in ECAC (Clarkson), the CCHA (Northern Michigan) and the WCHA (Minnesota) in its championship run.

March 27, 1982 – The Badgers make a second consecutive appearance in the NCAA title game, but lose to North Dakota, finishing second.

June 1, 1982 – Bob Johnson resigns after 15 years at Wisconsin. He led the program to three national titles, seven NCAA appearances and the highest attendance in the country.

July 8, 1982 – Jeff Sauer becomes the fourth coach (10th all time) in the modern era of Badger hockey.

March 5, 1983 – Wisconsin defeats North Dakota, 6-5 in triple overtime, to advance to the WCHA playoff championship. Chris Chelios ties the game with just 12 seconds left in regulation and Paul Houck wins it with a shorthanded goal in the third overtime. To date, it was the longest game in school history.

March 12-13, 1983 – With a sweep of the Gophers at Williams Arena, the Badgers earn the league playoff championship and the No. 1 seed in the West.

March 26, 1983 – For the third straight year, Wisconsin plays for the national title and wins the championship with a 6-2 victory over Harvard.

January 7, 1984 – Wisconsin becomes the only American collegiate team to defeat the 1984 U.S. Olympic squad (4-2) on its preparation tour.

November 23, 1985 – Wisconsin records the program's 500th modern-era victory with a 6-2 win over North Dakota at the Coliseum.

December 30, 1987 – The Badgers claim the Great Lakes Invitational tournament with wins over Michigan and Michigan State in front of 19,482 at Joe Louis Arena.

March 6-7, 1988 – A win over North Dakota (2-1) and Minnesota (3-2) at the St. Paul Civic Center nets the first-ever WCHA Final Four Playoff Championship.

December 28-29, 1989 – Wisconsin hosts its inaugural Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown at the Bradley Center in Milwaukee, Wis. The UW defeats Notre Dame (9-3) and Boston College (6-5) to capture the Pettit Cup.

February 16, 1990 – The Badgers play their 1,000th game since the resumption of the program in 1963. A 6-3 victory over Minnesota.

March 24, 1990 – The UW completes its sweep of Maine in the NCAA quarterfinals at the Dane County Coliseum. The Badgers advance to Detroit with a 4-3 overtime win.

March 30, 1990 – In front of 8,000 Badger fans in Joe Louis Arena, the Cardinal and White defeat Boston College 2-1 to advance to the 1990 NCAA Championship game.

April 1, 1990 – Head coach Jeff Sauer guides his Badger team to a second NCAA title, with a 7-3 victory over Colgate. It is the school's fifth national title as the UW's 36-9-1 mark is the second-best in UW history.

THE DECADE OF THE 90s

The Badgers entered the 1990s as the defending NCAA champions, coming off a decade which saw a Wisconsin team play for the national title four times. Trying to match that feat would be a challenge.

The 1991-92 team did its part, becoming the lowest seeded team (sixth) in NCAA playoff history to advance to the championship game (The Badgers lost to Lake Superior State, 5-3).

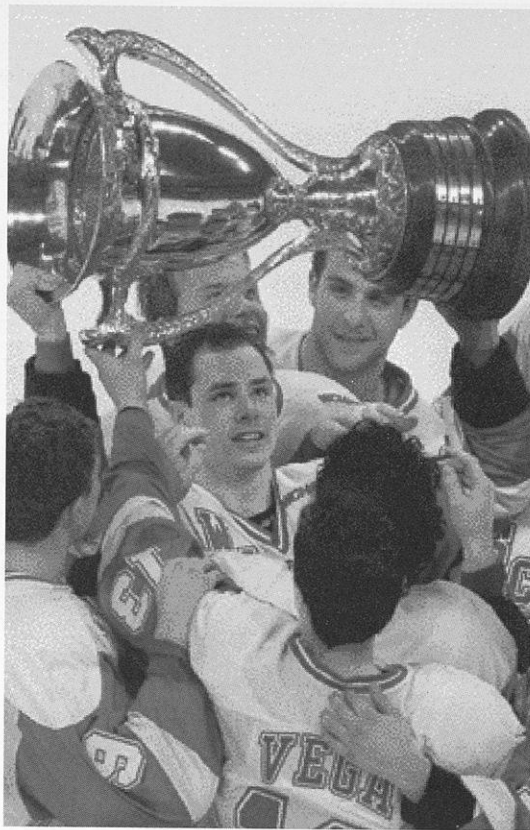
The following year, the 1992-93 squad came within inches of making it to Milwaukee and the 1993 NCAA Championships, but dropped a heart-breaking 4-3 decision to Michigan in overtime. Wisconsin managed NCAA berths in the next two years, but did not earn a trip to the NCAA's Frozen Four, despite additional NCAA bids in 1997-98 and 1999-2000.

The 1999-2000 squad boasted two of the most talented forwards that have played for the Badgers in Steve Reinprecht and Dany Heatley. Both helped lead the UW to the 2000 WCHA regular-season Championship and the MacNaughton Cup. It was the third time in school history a UW team had won the league title and the first since 1990.

Reinprecht earned first-team All-America honors, the first Badger forward since Gary Shuchuk (1990) to receive that distinction. He also finished his senior season as the runner-up (the highest finish ever for a Badger) for the Hobey Baker award, given to the nation's top player. Heatley, a second-team All-American as a freshman, was named a first-team All-American (2001), giving Wisconsin its first back-to-back All-America first teamers since Mike Eaves and Mark Johnson (1978 and 1979).

Three UW defensemen were named All-Americans – Barry Richter (1993), Brian Rafalski (1995) and Jeff Dessner (2000). In goal, Duane Derksen (1992) and Kirk Daubenspeck (1997) were second-team All-Americans.

Wisconsin made the 12-team NCAA tourney seven of 10 years in the 90s, averaging over 23 wins a season. The decade ended with the '99-00 team posting the third-best mark in school history, 31-9-1.

THE HIGHLIGHTS

April 2-4, 1992 – Wisconsin defeats Michigan, 4-2, to move into the national championship game against Lake Superior State. The Badgers lose 5-3, but become the lowest-seeded team to ever advance to a national title contest.

March 26-27, 1993 – The Badgers receive a sixth consecutive bid to the NCAA tournament. After a 3-1 win over Miami University, the UW drops a heart-breaking 4-3 decision to Michigan in overtime, missing the chance to appear in its third Frozen Four in four seasons.

March 25-26, 1994 – In its seventh straight NCAA appearance, the Badgers handle Western Michigan (6-3), but lose to top-ranked Boston University, 4-1.

March 17-18, 1995 – Wisconsin recorded wins over Denver and league champion Colorado College to claim the 1995 WCHA Playoff Championship, the school's 10th playoff title. The championship earns the Badgers an automatic NCAA berth, the eighth straight for the UW.

March 8, 1997 – Wisconsin and Colorado College make college hockey history playing in the longest game on record – 5 hours and 24 minutes. The first-round WCHA playoff game lasts until the 9:30 mark of the fourth overtime as the Tigers win the game, 1-0.

Badger netminder Kirk Daubenspeck sets a league and school record with 75 saves.

January 4, 1998 – Head coach Jeff Sauer becomes the WCHA's winningest coach when the UW defeats Denver 7-3. The victory is Sauer's 556th as a league coach and surpasses the legendary John MacInnes.

March 14, 1998 – With a 6-2 win over Alaska-Anchorage, the Badgers play their last regular-season game in the Dane County Coliseum. It had served as the home to Badger hockey for over 30 years.

March 20-21, 1998 – The Badgers take the 1998 WCHA Playoff Championship, with 5-2 and 3-2 wins over Colorado College and North Dakota, respectively. The win also gives Bucky an automatic spot in the 12-team NCAA tourney.

October 3, 1998 – Wisconsin opens the Kohl Center in the College Hockey Hall of Fame game vs. Notre Dame. Despite a 3-2 loss to the Irish, a record 13,398 fans turn out to see the Badgers' debut in their new home.

February 25, 2000 – For only the third time in school history, a Badger team wins the coveted MacNaughton Cup. The WCHA regular-season league championship is clinched with a 4-2 win over the Minnesota Golden Gophers at Mariucci Arena.

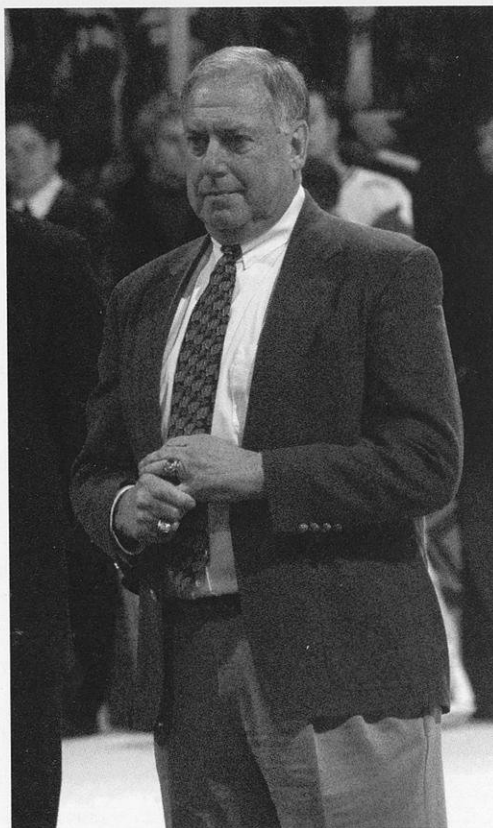
A NEW CENTURY BEGINS — 2000

Wisconsin hockey began the 21st century as it had its previous three decades — with a 20-win season and a berth in the NCAA tournament. It was the 16th 20- or 30-win campaign for head coach Jeff Sauer and the 12th NCAA appearance for the Badgers under Sauer.

The Badger fans were also treated to a second year of watching Dany Heatley play as he opted to return for a second season (2000-01) with the Badgers instead of turning pro. Heatley, one of the most talented and gifted players to ever wear the Cardinal and White, was named the NHL's Rookie of the Year following the 2001-02 season. Drafted No. 2 overall in the 2000 NHL Entry Draft by the Atlanta Thrashers, he led all league rookies in scoring this past season.

Two seasons into the fifth decade of Badger hockey, the program said goodbye to the Jeff Sauer era as former Badger Mike Eaves became the fourth coach in the modern era of UW hockey. Sauer announced his retirement from coaching on Jan. 9, 2002 after 31 years coaching in the WCHA and 20 seasons behind the Badger bench. He is the winningest coach in league and school history and the fourth-winningest coach all time.

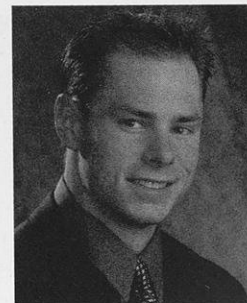
The Eaves Era began on March 19, 2002 when he was hired to replace Sauer. After 25 years, Eaves still remains the school's all-time scoring leader with 94-173=267 in 160 games during his four-year career as a Badger. He led the team in scoring during his freshman, sophomore and senior seasons and in his junior year, was the top-scoring Badger forward (28-53=81) on the 1977 NCAA Championship squad.

June 24, 2000 — Dany Heatley, taken second overall in the 2000 NHL Entry Draft, becomes the highest player to be drafted in Badger history.

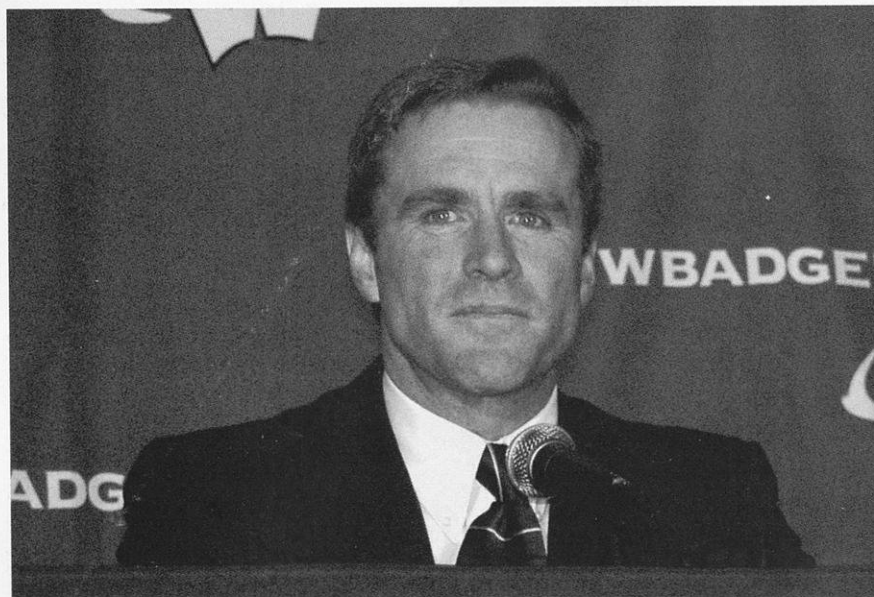
January 9, 2002 — Jeff Sauer announces he is retiring as the head coach of the Badgers after 20 years behind the UW bench and 31 years as a head coach in the WCHA.

March 19, 2002 — Mike Eaves is announced as the Badgers' fifth head coach in the modern era at a press conference in the Kohl Center.

October/November, 2002 — The Badger hockey program will see its 1,000,000th hockey fan come through the turnstiles at the Kohl Center this season. After four years calling the Kohl Center home, Wisconsin has drawn a total of 963,487 fans for an average of 11,750 per game (82 home dates).

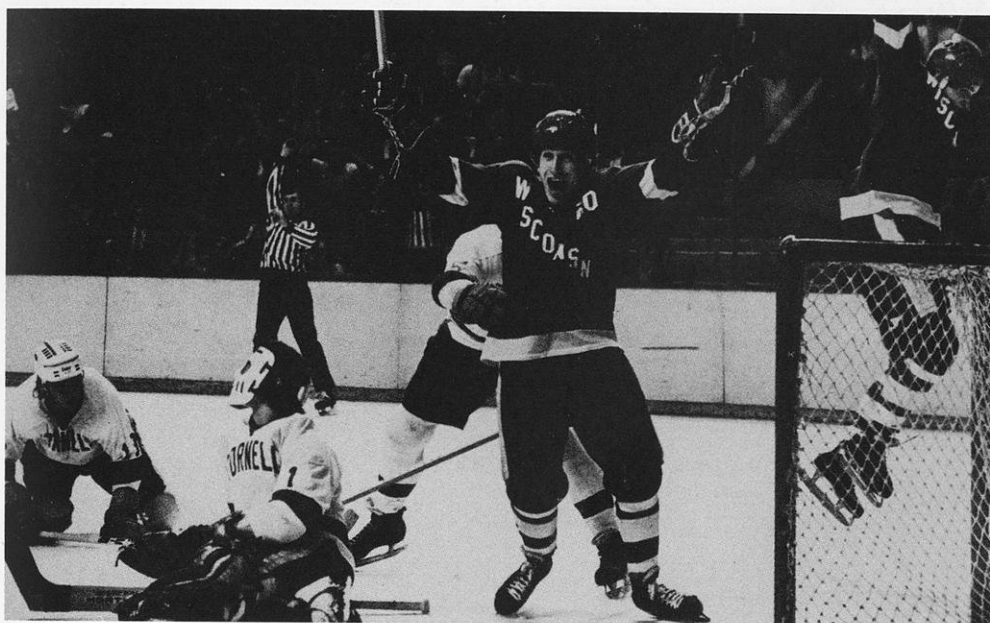

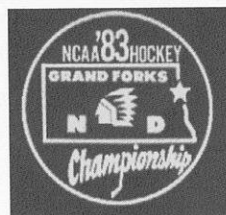

The Showdown Turns Fourteen

This December, the Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown marks its 14th event since the inaugural Showdown in December of 1989. The tournament has grown into one of the most successful and highly-attended college tournaments in the nation. Every year Banc One Corporation, the Bradley Center and the University of Wisconsin combine to bring top-rate teams, first-class competition and superb individual talent to Milwaukee for the annual holiday affair.

The brainchild of former Badger head coach Jeff Sauer, the Showdown has featured defending NCAA champions, Hobey Baker winners and finalists and numerous future NHL stars. Praised by coaches, players and fans as one of the best showcases of college hockey talent in the nation, the tourney has become one of the most successful in the college hockey history.

Since 1989, over 350,000 fans have witnessed the December spectacle in Milwaukee, averaging over 27,000 fans per year and 14,000 spectators a day.

The Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown is contested at the state-of-the-art, 17,800-seat Bradley Center, which was the site of both the 1993 and 1997 NCAA Hockey Championships and will host its third NCAA Frozen Four in 2006. Considered by many to be the premier hockey facility in the nation, the Bradley Center is located in the heart of downtown Milwaukee.

Wisconsin has enjoyed much success at the Showdown, winning seven of the 13 championships. The Badgers have defeated hockey powers Boston College (1989), North Dakota (1990), Maine (1991), Northern Michigan (1993 and 1997), Bowling Green State (1994) and Boston University (2000) to win titles. Hockey East members Boston University (1992 and 1995) and New Hampshire (1996 & 2001) have each won the Showdown twice, while Bowling Green State was the first CCHA team to win the Showdown in 1998. At the 1999 event, North Dakota became the first WCHA team other than the Badgers to win the Pettit Cup.

Showdown 2002

This year Northern Michigan (CCHA) makes its third appearance in the Showdown with a 2-2 record. The Wildcats are the only team which has competed in the tournament as a member of two different conferences. In 1993 NMU was still a member of the WCHA, but subsequently joined the CCHA and was a member of that league when it played in 1997.

The ECAC is represented by two teams in Colgate and Harvard. Colgate is a first-time participant, while the Crimson also appeared in the 1997 event. Wisconsin and Colgate met for the 1990 NCAA Championship in Detroit, with the UW coming out 7-3 winners to claim the title.

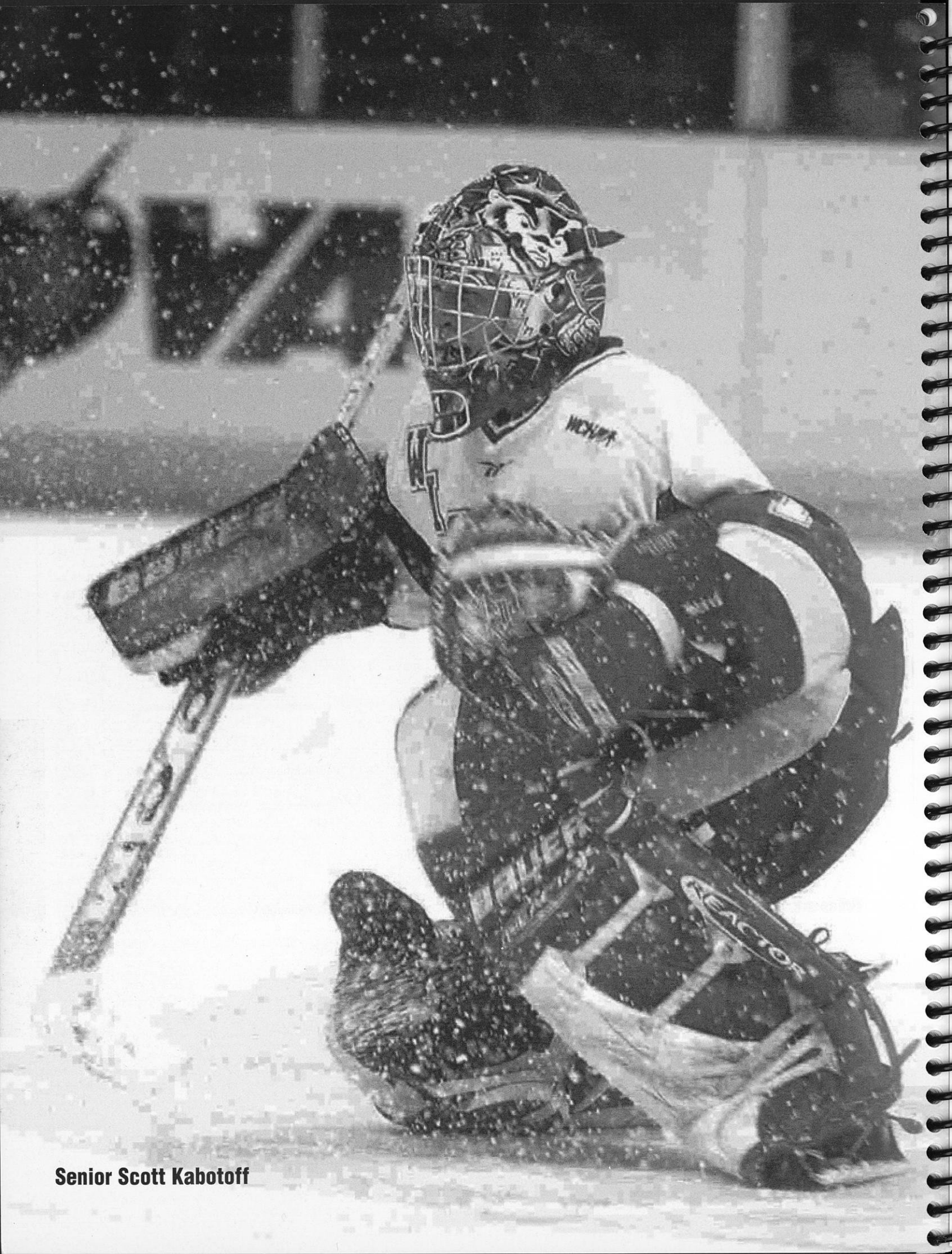

The Hat Trick

There have been 182 hat tricks in UW history, including 154 three-goal, 25 four-goal and three five-goal 'tricks'. Listed below are the most recent players to record a three-, four- or five-goal game.

Three goals

Dany Heatley scored the most recent Badger hat trick at Alaska Anchorage on Feb. 19, 2000.

Four goals

Blaine Moore was the last player to score four goals in a game. On March 13, 1993, Moore scored four goals in a 10-3 win over Colorado College in the first round of the WCHA playoffs at the Dane County Coliseum.

Five goals

First-year Badger women's hockey coach\ Mark Johnson is one of only three players in UW history to score five goals in one game. On Jan. 27, 1978, Johnson hit the back of the net five times in a 10-2 win over Michigan Tech in Madison. (Bert DeHate, 2/24/67 and Mike Meeker, 10/29/77 previously accomplished the feat.)

Natural hat trick

Only seven players have notched a natural hat trick. The most-recent Badger to accomplish a pure hat trick Dany Heatley at Alaska Anchorage on Feb. 19, 2000. He scored the first three goals in a 5-0 win by the Badgers.

BADGER COVERAGE

■ Credentials

Requests for credentials must be placed with the UW Sports Information Office in writing (on your company's letterhead), at least one week in advance of the game(s) you wish to cover. Requests should be made by the media agency's sports editor or director and addressed to Julie Kluge, Assistant Men's Sports Information Director, 1440 Mon-roe Street, Madison, WI 53711. If faxing your credential request, the fax number is (608) 262-8184. Media covering the Badger beat may request credentials for road games through Kluge.

Credentials are issued according to the following guidelines:

1. National publications and newspapers filing for the following day's publication.
2. All newspapers designated by the visiting sports information director.
3. Television and radio stations originating a live broadcast.
4. Television and radio stations covering for nightly news.
5. All other requests will be evaluated on a space-available basis, with preferences given to those who regularly cover Wisconsin hockey.

Note: Spouses, dates, children and other non-workers are not allowed in any of the media areas.

■ Photographers

Requests should be submitted on your company's letterhead to the UW Sports Information Office and are granted on a priority first-come, first-served basis. Photographers are free to shoot from most locations in the Kohl Center but are reminded to be considerate of patrons. Credentials must be prominently displayed at all times.

Strobes are available for use by photographers and will be granted on a first-come, first-served basis. Cost per event is \$200.

■ Radio Originations

Radio stations wishing to broadcast Badger hockey games should contact the UW Sports Information Office at least one week in advance to place their credential requests. Radio talent work from the top row of the press area in section 208 of the Kohl Center.

■ Credential Pick Up

Upon receipt of applications, appropriate credentials are either mailed, made available at the Sports Information Office or left with the parking attendant at the entrance to Lot 91 off of Bedford Street on gamedays. A map showing parking locations is on page 170.

■ Video Services

Television stations desiring highlights of Badger players should contact Mark King of the UW Video Department in Camp Randall Stadium. Phone: (608) 265-6146.

■ Phone Lines

All requests for installation of phone lines should be made to Rex Owens at (608) 265-4705. Cost per line per event is \$100 (\$140 for an unrestricted analog line or an ISDN line). Broadcast locations are assigned by the UW Sports Information Department based on involvement with the co-op line arrangement. If you are not part of the WCHA co-op agreement, you must make your phone line requests (especially if you need ISDN lines) at least one week in advance of the game(s).

There are two standard phone lines as well as ISDN lines for visiting radios which are part of the co-op line arrangement. Numbers for those lines are (608) 257-3416/4824 (standard lines) and (608) 250-2552/2634 (ISDN).

There are also courtesy phones made available by the UW Sports Information Office in the press area and in the media room located on the ice level of the Kohl Center.

■ Media Workroom

The Kohl Center features a large media workroom that contains the following:

- post-game interview area
- numerous working locations from which media can file stories
- platform for video cameras
- copy machine
- pre-game dining area
- photo darkroom
- men's and women's restrooms

Game programs, line charts, game notes and media guides are available in the workroom.

Media may store personal belongings in the workroom from the time they arrive at the Kohl Center until after the game.

The workroom is located at the northeast corner of the arena at ice level. To access the workroom from outside the arena, enter through the media gate and proceed down the stairs on your right.

■ Practice

The Wisconsin hockey team has three different practice locations — the Kohl Center, the Dane County Arena and occasionally the Dane County Coliseum. Please call the UW Sports Information Office for site and specific times of Badger practices.

Many times the Badgers conduct split practices and most players only participate in one of those sessions. If you need to interview a specific player, please call ahead to make sure he will be available.

Typical practice times are from 3:00-5:15, Monday-Wednesday. Thursday practices (during weeks of home games) normally run from 3:15-5:00. Practice times are subject to change.

Media attending practices should be aware that the Badger locker room and lounge area is closed.

■ Scouting Tickets

Per the Western Collegiate Hockey Association's policy, professional hockey scouts must purchase tickets through the UW Ticket Office at 1-800-GO-BADGERS or (608) 262-1440.

■ Interviewing Coach Eaves

Head coach Mike Eaves will be available for interviews after practice sessions, Monday-Thursday.

Eaves also holds a weekly media conference throughout the season. These sessions begin at 1 p.m. and will be held in the "W" Club Room in Camp Randall Stadium (through the football season) or the media room in the Kohl Center. Audio cuts from the conferences are available after 4 p.m. on Mondays by calling (608) 263-3100 (option 3).

On the road, Eaves is available at the Badgers' hotel or following practice sessions.

Those media wishing to conduct a phone interview with Coach Eaves should call the hockey office directly at (608) 262-3932. It is easiest to reach Eaves by phone in the mornings, Mondays through Wednesdays.

■ Player Interviews

Badger players are available for interviews AFTER practices (except on game days). Practices are generally held from 3:00-6:00 p.m. regardless of the site.

All player interviews should be arranged through the UW Sports Information Office. Please contact Julie Kluge at the SID Office (608-262-1811) prior to the start of practice each day to secure interviews.

It is the policy of the UW Sports Information Office not to give out home telephone numbers of student-athletes. For out-of-town media members, requests for collect-call telephone interviews with players may be made through Kluge.

■ Fax-On-Demand

The Big Ten Conference and member schools offer 24-hour access to the latest news releases, statistics, notes and box scores via a fax-on-demand service. This service is for media use only. Instructions for accessing information follows.

2000-01 Rule Changes

15-Second Faceoff Procedure (2-5-b): The procedure for all stoppages, except during games with television timeouts, is as follows:

1. When play is stopped, the referee will signal to the visiting team at his or her discretion, that they may change players. This starts the 15-second clock.

2. After five seconds, the referee will put up his or her hand to the visiting team, signaling that the home team has five seconds to change players.

3. When the hand is dropped for the home team's change, the official conducting the drop will blow a quick whistle.

4. After five seconds, the puck is dropped.

Penalty — If a team intentionally delays a faceoff by means of an illegal act, the official conducting the faceoff shall not allow the offending team's center to take the faceoff. This serves as that team's warning for the remainder of the game. If that team intentionally delays a faceoff later in the game, a bench minor penalty shall be assessed.

Player Change (2-5-c / i): A player serving a penalty on the penalty bench, must step on the ice and proceed to the respective player's bench before a change may be made. **(2-5-i):** Penalty shot/optional minor. If the illegal substitution comes from the penalty bench, an additional minor shall be assessed on that player.

Reinforced Jewelry Rule (3-5-b): Jewelry shall not be worn, except for religious or medical medals, which shall be taped to the body under the uniform. **Penalty** — Misconduct. Returning to the game without correcting the equipment shall result in a game misconduct.

Awarding of Goals (4-7-f, g): If a player shoots the puck and it hits the stick, preventing an obvious and imminent goal, a goal shall be awarded. This includes the goaltender for the defending team deliberately displacing the goal to prevent an obvious / imminent goal. If the puck would've entered the goal had it not been displaced, a goal shall be awarded.

Three-person Officiating System (5-1): Beginning with the 2003-04 season, a three-person system must be used for college ice hockey.

Charging Defined (6-7): A player shall not skate more than two steps or jump into or charge an opponent. Charging is the action of a player, who as a result of distance travelled, checks an opponent violently in any manner.

Clipping Penalty (6-8): A player may not deliver a check or attempt to check an opponent at or below the opponent's knees. An illegal low hit is a check that is delivered by a player who may or may not have both skates on the ice, with the sole intent to check the opponent at or below the knees. A player may not lower his or her body position to deliver a check to an opponent's knees. **Penalty** — Minor or major at the discretion of the referee.

Diving Rule Clarified (6-11): A player shall not attempt to draw a penalty through any exaggerated or deceitful action ("diving"). **Penalty:** minor.

15-Second Faceoff Procedure (6-14-b): If either of the players fails to take the proper position for the face-off, the official shall be entitled to proceed with the face-off.

Goal During Delayed Offside Call (6-34-d): If the puck enters the defending team's goal during a delayed offside, the goal is disallowed. The faceoff will be in the neutral zone.

Shooting the Puck After the Whistle (6-44-b): A player shall not shoot the puck at the goaltender or bench after the whistle. **Penalty** — Minor or misconduct, game misconduct or disqualification at the discretion of the referee.

Shootout Allowed: For regular-season tournaments and post-season consolation games only, any game that results in a tie may be broken by use of a shootout under the following conditions: 1. Teams must play a five-minute overtime; 2. If game remains tied, it shall officially be recorded as a tie; 3. Teams participating in the tournament must be notified no later than Oct. 1 of the upcoming season that the shootout option will be used.

Video Replay (6-54-c(j)): When using video replay in regular-season or post-season tournaments, the video replay judge has the power to disallow a goal illegally played by a hand pass or high stick.

Teams Taking the Ice (8-1): A note has been added to allow the order of the teams entering the ice to be altered if a common entrance/exit is used.

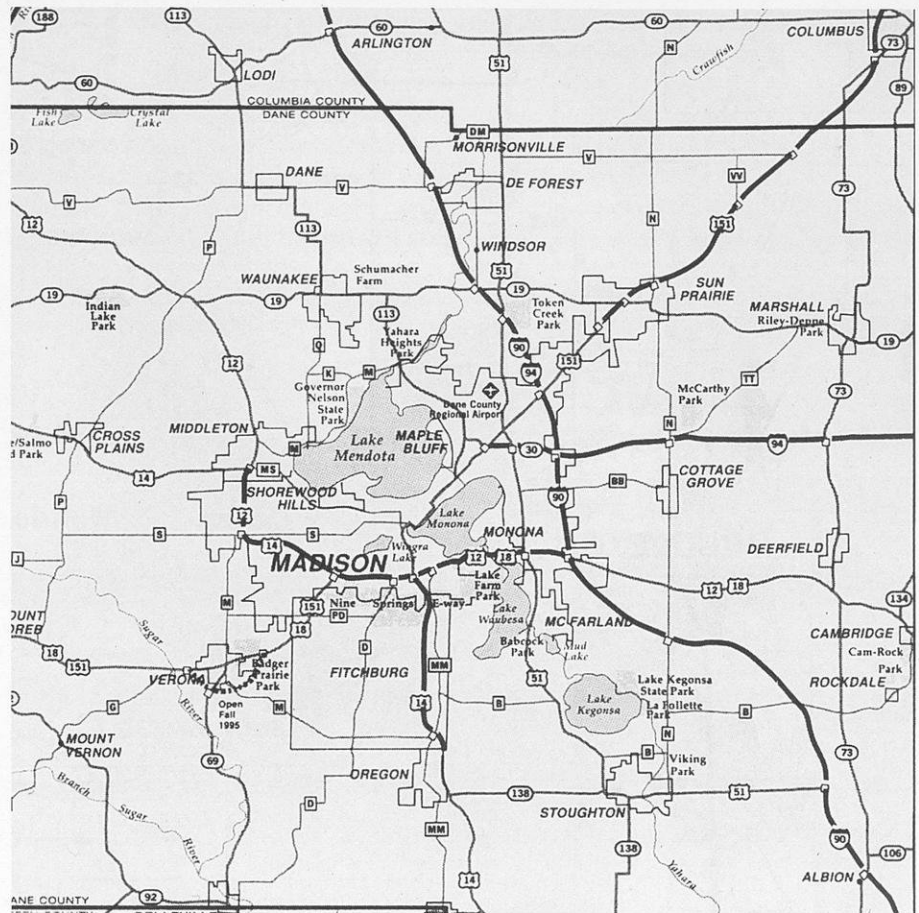

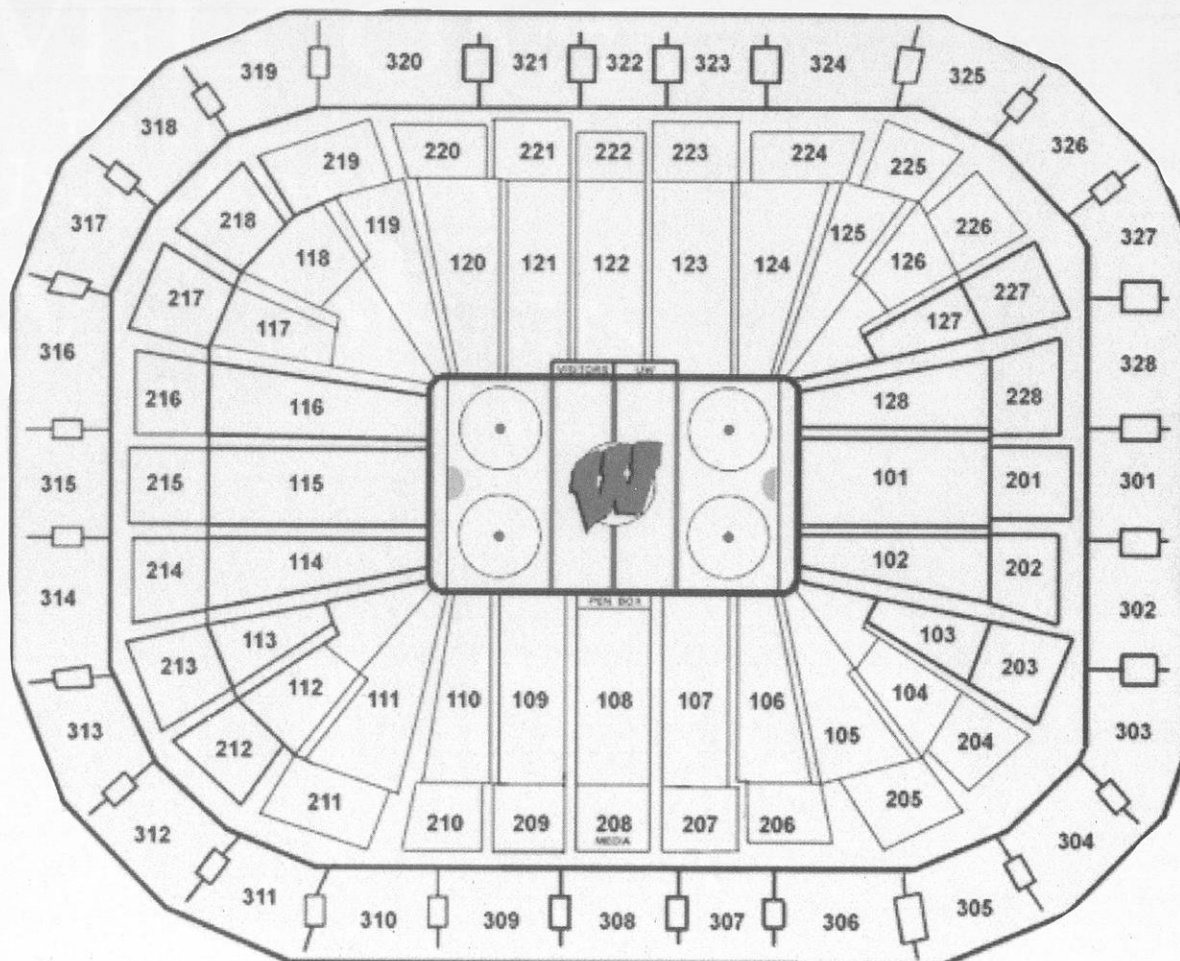
Madison Area Map

From the Dane County Airport

Exit airport via International Lane to Packers Avenue (Hwy. 113). Turn left on Packers Avenue, which changes to Pennsylvania Avenue – Johnson Street – Gorham Street and then University Avenue. Stay on University Avenue into the campus until you reach Frances Street. Turn left onto Frances Street and proceed two blocks to Dayton Street. The Kohl Center will now be in view.

From West I-90 / 94 (from Minneapolis)

Take I-90 / 94 to Highway 151 South (East Washington Avenue). Continue on East Washington Avenue to the State Capitol Building. Turn right onto Butler Street, proceed to Gorham Street and turn left. Continue on Gorham Street, which becomes University Avenue. Stay on University Avenue into the campus until you reach Frances Street. Turn left onto Frances Street and proceed two blocks to Dayton Street. The Kohl Center will now be in view.

From South and I-90 (from Chicago)

Take I-90 to the Madison beltline (Highway 12/18). West on the beltline to Park Street (Hwy. 151). Exit right (north). Take Park Street to Dayton Street. Turn right onto Dayton Street, then approximately three blocks to the Kohl Center, which will be on the right.

From East and I-94 (from Milwaukee)

Take I-94 to Highway 30 West. Take Highway 30 to its end at Highway 113 South. Turn left onto 113 South, which becomes Packers / Pennsylvania Avenue. Continue on Packers / Pennsylvania Avenue, which changes to Johnson Street – Gorham Street and then University Avenue. Stay on University Avenue into the campus until you reach Frances Street. Turn left onto Frances Street and proceed two blocks to Dayton Street. The Kohl Center will now be in view.

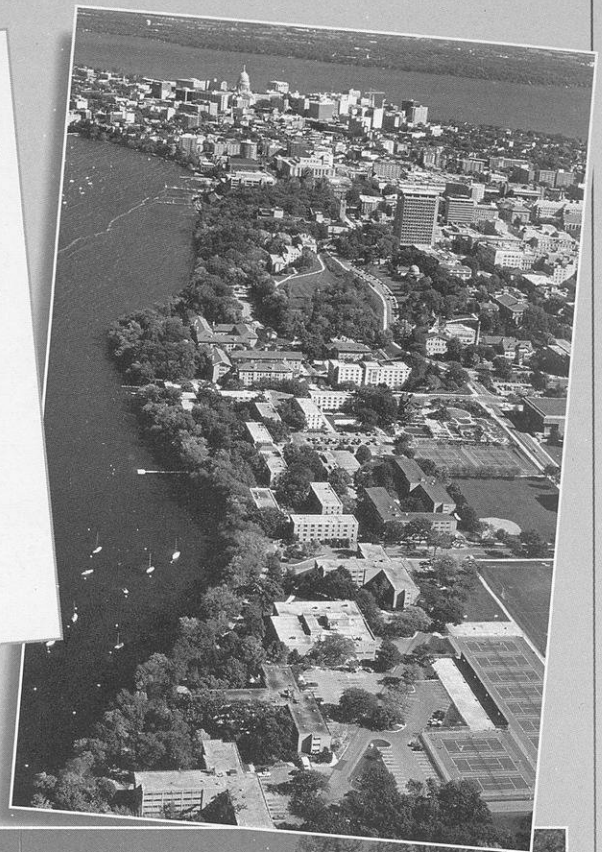

The University Residence Halls provide you with a comfortable, smoke-free living environment and many resources to help you succeed academically at the university.

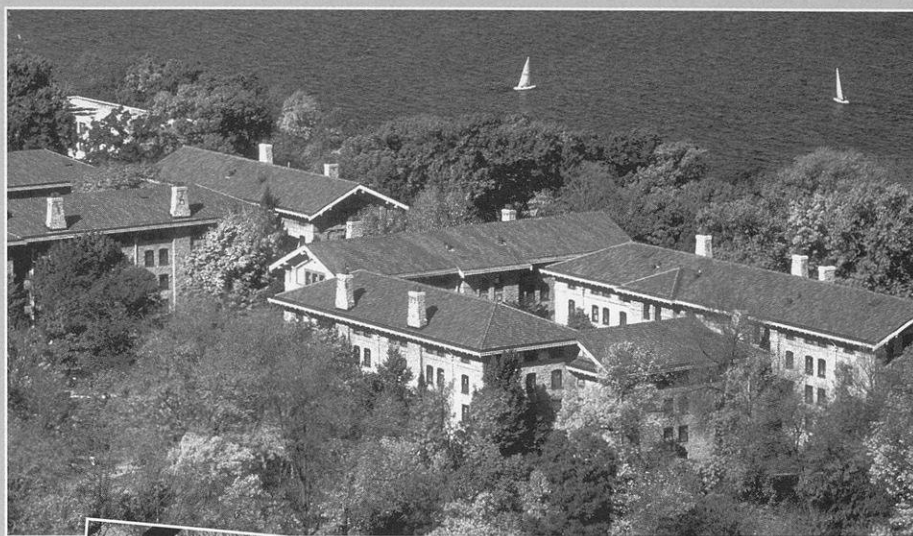

The undergraduate residence halls are divided into smaller units called "houses" where 50 to 80 residents live and form a community. The tradition of the "house" as the nucleus of the community is a unique feature of the university residence halls. Since the earliest days of on-campus housing, student peer advisors called house fellows have lived among the students, fostering a sense of community and self-government. Most students share a double room with one other student. All students share same-gender bathroom facilities conveniently located on each residence hall floor.

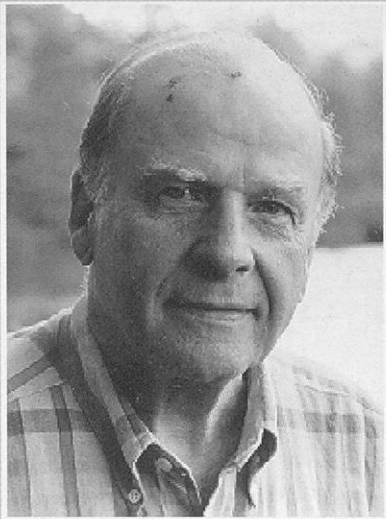

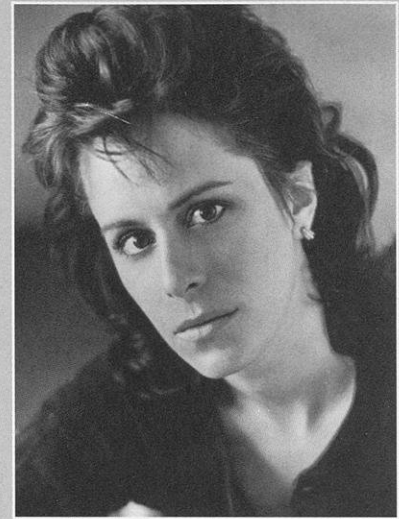

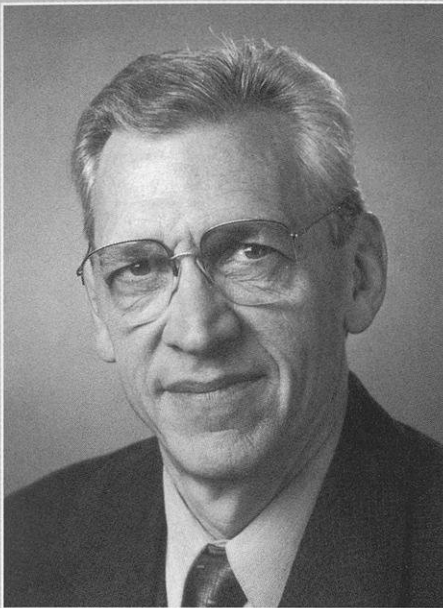

John Wiley was named chancellor of Wisconsin in January 2001, becoming the university's 27th leader.

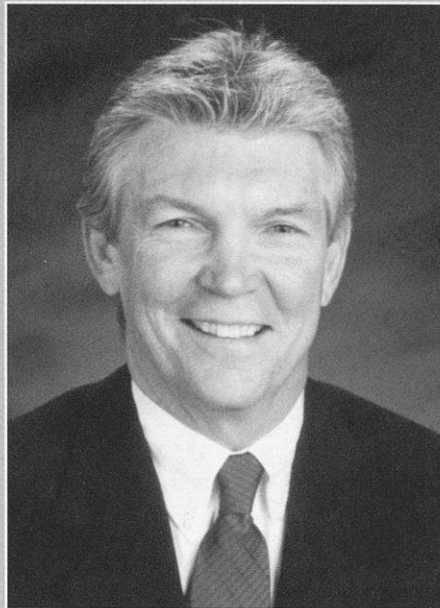
Prior to being named chancellor, Wiley served as the university's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. He was also the dean of the Graduate School and the university's senior research officer.

In his positions, Wiley has represented the institution for a variety of external constituencies. He has also been deeply involved in fundraising.

As provost, Wiley was chief operating officer and deputy chancellor working in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at Wisconsin as a National Science Foundation fellow and received master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively.

Wiley joined the Wisconsin faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in 1975. He was the co-founder of several highly successful research centers.



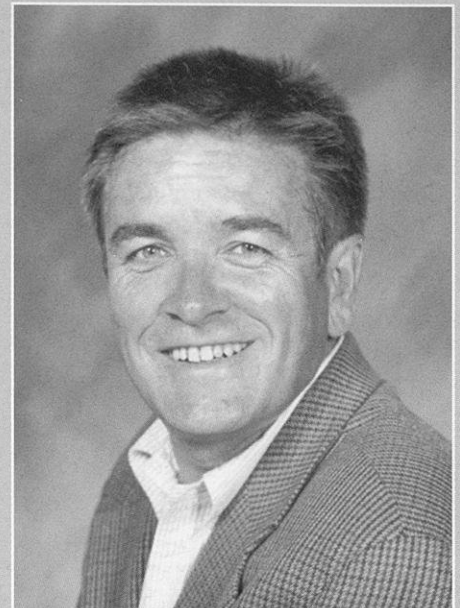
■ PAT RICHTER

Pat Richter, a former UW student-athlete, professional football player, and successful businessman, became Wisconsin's athletic director in December of 1989.

An All-America tight end for Wisconsin's 1963 Rose Bowl football team, Richter had a distinguished career with the National Football League's Washington Redskins from 1963-71. He was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame and the Rose Bowl Hall of Fame.

Richter earned his bachelor's degree in landscape architecture from the UW in 1964, earning Academic All-America honors in 1962. He was named Wisconsin's Big Ten Medal of Honor recipient in 1963. Richter received his law degree from the UW in 1971. In 1995, he was inducted into the Verizon/CoSIDA Academic Hall of Fame, and was honored as an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award winner for post-college achievements.

After employment with a Madison law firm, he joined the Oscar Mayer Foods Corp., becoming vice president of personnel prior to joining the athletic department staff.



■ DAVID MCDONALD

David McDonald, the former chair of the UW Athletic Board, is in his second year as the special assistant to the chancellor for athletics.

McDonald, a professor in the history department, was a member of the board since 1994 and chaired the personnel committee for one year.

A UW professor since 1988, McDonald offers courses in the history of pre-revolutionary Russia, as well as modern Europe. His research and publications cover a variety of topics including: bureaucratic politics in the early twentieth century, nineteenth century Russian thought, and the social history of the eighteenth century nobility.

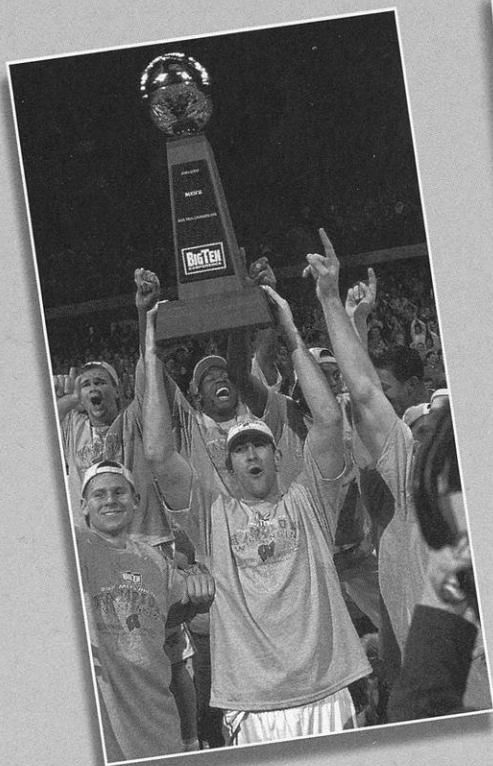

In the last eight years, the University of Wisconsin has hosted five NCAA Championships.

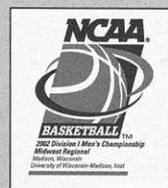
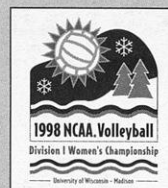

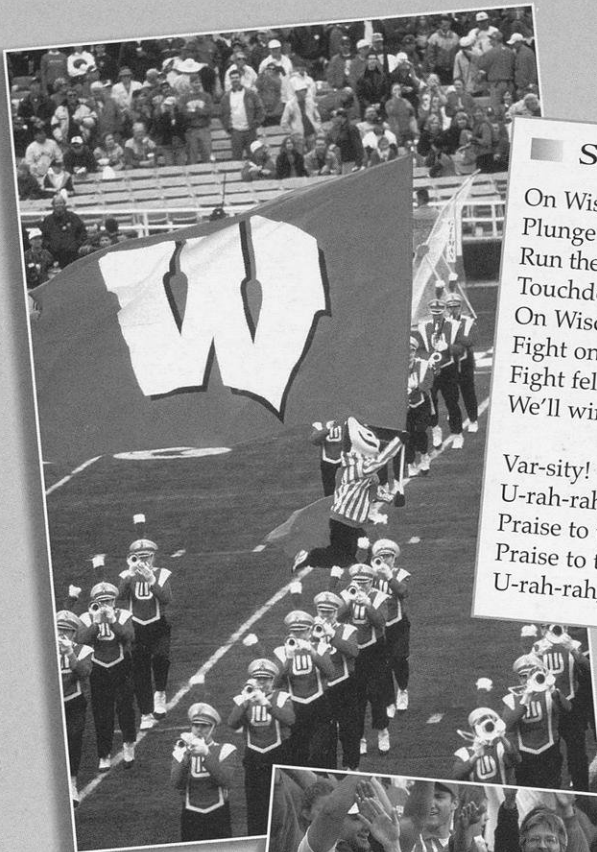


The NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament came to Wisconsin in 2002 when the Badgers played host to a regional in the Kohl Center.

BADGER NICKNAME

The nickname "Badgers," was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

BUCKY BADGER

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

BUD SONG

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

FIFTH QUARTER

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

ON WISCONSIN

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

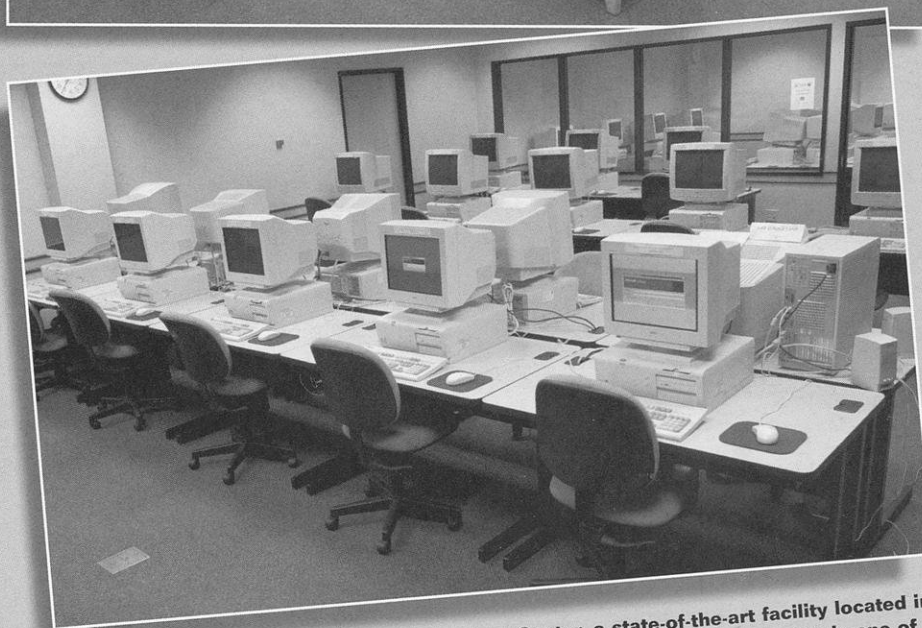
ACADEMIC & STUDENT SERVICES

Director David Harris supervises a staff of five advisors and three learning specialists who conduct the program offered to the nearly 750 student-athletes. The advising staff of Mary Weaver-Klees, Thomas Browne, Chris Butler, Jerry Darda and Alan Zussman along with learning specialists Doug Tiedt, Maryellen Rock and Nancy Gatyas, have a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments. The staff renders quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assists coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience.

For those student-athletes who request assistance, advising sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. Athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The advising staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways. The Big Ten Conference honors scholar-athletes with Academic All-Big Ten honors while the UW Athletic Board recognizes Athletic Board Scholars for the highest grade point average in each sport. In addition, student-athletes may be nominated for Academic All-America honors through the sports information office.



The Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Services Center, a state-of-the-art facility located in the lower level of the McClain Center, opened in 1997. The \$2.1 million center is one of the best in the nation and includes 11 study rooms, a computer room, and a 55-seat auditorium.

FETZER STUDENT-ATHLETE CENTER

The Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Center has been helping Wisconsin student-athletes to achieve their academic goals since 1997.

The 15,000 square-foot, state-of-the-art facility serves the needs of all men and women student-athletes. The center features an open area with carrels that can accommodate up to 30 students. There are 11 study rooms of different

shapes and sizes, including a 55-seat auditorium. A computer room houses 40 PCs while the entire center is wired with voice/data jacks and power ports.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and grant-in-aid staff whose offices are also located in the center.

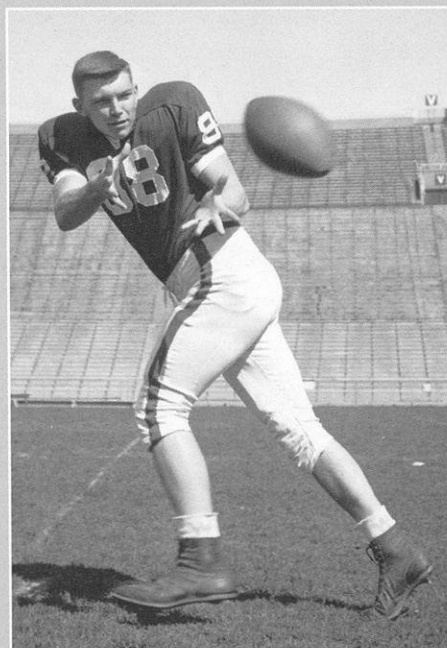

SPORTS MEDICINE

The sports medicine staff provides all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and other medical and allied health professionals. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Wisconsin athletes is supervised by a staff of 11 full-time and two graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.

Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members Beth Cranley, Chuck Hart, Andy Hrodey, Jan Helwig, Mike Moll, Henry Perez-Guerra, Laura Walluk, Ian Wood, and Chad Gabbard utilize functional measures, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility. Full-time nutritionist Jeremy Isensee provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.

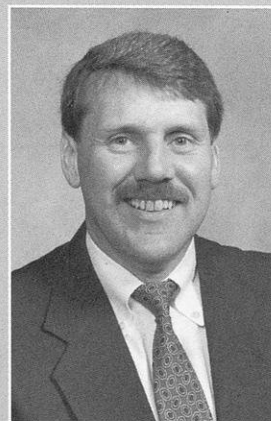
The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool, and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care, and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospitals and Clinics. Medical director Dr. Ben Graf is responsible for all services provided to student-athletes. Orthopedic care is directed by team physician Dr. John Orwin while general medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in Camp Randall Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House, and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component of all of the Badger teams' success on the playing field. The program's goal is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.

Head strength and conditioning coach John Dettmann along with assistant coaches Brian Bott, Ryan Feek, Paul Goodman, Scott Hettenbach, Kerri Ariens, and Jim Snider work with the UW coaches to develop training programs to enhance each athlete's performance.

Badger athletes work on their strength programs in weight rooms in the McClain Center, Camp Randall Stadium and Kohl Center.

The McClain Center weight room is the largest of the facilities and features more than 45,000 pounds of free weights and more than 50 weight machines. The room has seven squat racks, eight bench press stations, eight flat-to-incline benches, six Olympic lift platforms and numerous other free weight stations.

The Badger Den is comprised of purely free weight equipment. There are five power stations with each station consisting of a platform for Olympic style lifting as well as a squat rack, bench press, incline bench press, pull-up station and a station to do dips. There is also three lat-pull machines and seated row machines. The Stadium weight room has a complete set of dumbbells from five pounds to 85 pounds. There is also a set of plyometric boxes for plyometrics and for alternative leg exercises.

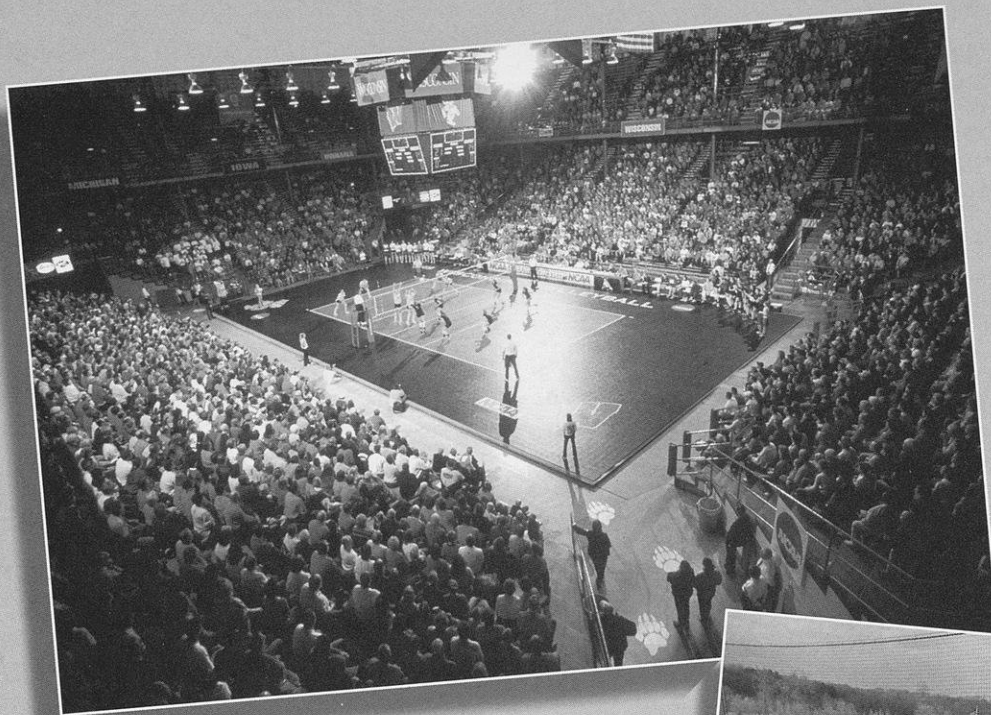

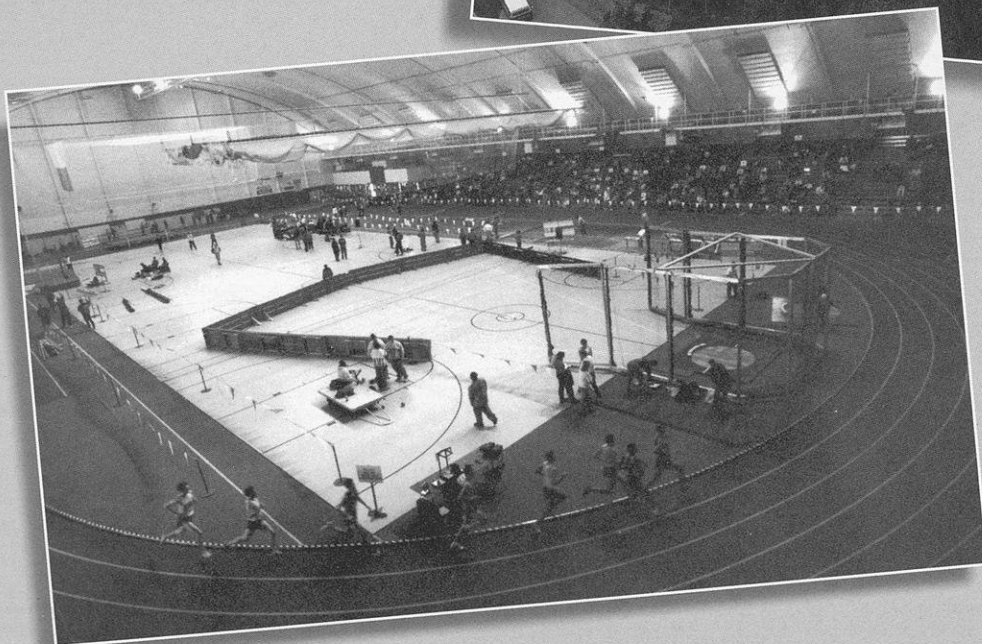
