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## **Exhibition of Michael Kienitz Photographs at Chazen**

On view September 8-October 28, 2007, Mayer Gallery Opening Reception, Friday, September 7, 6:30-8:00 p.m.

The Chazen Museum of Art is pleased to present *Small Arms—Children of Conflict: Photographs by Michael Kienitz*, an exhibition of thirty-six photographs of children taken during some of the fiercest conflicts since the Vietnam War, in places such as Belfast, Lebanon, and Central America. The works will be on view September 8 through October 28 in the Mayer Gallery.

Michael Kienitz started making photographs as a student at the University of Wisconsin–Madison during the Vietnam War. A political philosophy major, Kienitz was particularly interested in what he saw at the time as "the revolution" outside the classroom windows. Seeing the political struggles on campus and studying revolutionary movements in books, he was motivated to investigate and document revolutions around the world. During the late 1970s, gripped by news of the ongoing Nicaraguan revolution, Kienitz traveled to Managua. In the northern city of Esteli, he saw charred buildings and military vehicles lining the streets, and Red Cross volunteers were forced to burn corpses with gasoline to prevent the spread of disease.

For the next 10 years, on assignment for *The Capital Times*, *The Milwaukee Journal Sunday Magazine*, and *U.S. News & World Report*, among others, Kienitz carefully observed how daily life continued despite the destruction and grief. As a freelancer he was able to branch out beyond capturing the dramatic war shots demanded by editors and pursue his own curiosity about the everyday lives of the people living in these embattled places. He was interested in the power of an image to create a connection between photographer and subject and then with the viewer, and the possibilities those connections might have to promote change. He ventured into neighborhoods and areas on the fringes of the main action, drawn to the children, in particular, out of interest in how they coped with and survived the adult-made conflicts that defined their lives. He was struck, over and over, by their determination, playfulness, hard work, and mischief.

In 2006, news reports of turmoil in Lebanon prompted Kienitz to reconsider his photographs from the 1980s. He was struck by the similarities between the photographs from the current conflict and his own images captured more than twenty years earlier in the same country. He assembled a collection of black-and-white photographs from a ten-year period of assignments, focusing on

children. The resulting exhibition, *Small Arms–Children of Conflict*, is both a testament to the resilience and fortitude of children and a powerful call to action for adults.

**Preview lecture and reception: Friday, September 7.** Lecture: 5:30 p.m., room L140. Reception, 6:30–8 p.m., with the Tony Castañeda Latin Jazz Sextet, refreshments, and a cash bar. The artist will talk about his career as a photojournalist and relate stories of taking the photographs in this exhibition. He will discuss working in areas of economic and political conflict and reflect on why a photographer risks his life to tell a story with images.

The artist will talk about how he transformed images shot with color film nearly 30 years ago into stunning 19-x-13-inch, black-and-white digital archival prints. - Gallery talk by Michael Kienitz: "A Personal Look at *Small Arms—Children of Conflict*." Sunday, October 14, 2:30 p.m., Mayer Gallery. In conjunction with the Wisconsin Book Festival, the photographer will talk about the events surrounding his photographs and why he often risked his life to chronicle the lives of children immersed in economic and political conflict. A signing will follow the gallery talk.
