Upon motion of Regent Backus, seconded by Regent Sholts, the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on April 27, 1932, were approved as sent out to the Regents.

It is the business of the Regents to represent the citizens and tax payers of Wisconsin in directing the policies of the University and I know I will have your full cooperation in meeting that responsibility.

sity, I interpret the attitude of the Regents to be in keeping with the founders of this great institution, pro-American and pro-religious but anti-partisan and anti-sectarian. We endorse the statements of the President to that effect."

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The Faculty of the Law School submits for approval the following change in entrance requirements. The existing requirements which read:

"Applicants for admission to the Law School who expect to become candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Laws are required to have satisfactorily completed three full years of college work, equivalent to the first three years of either the General Courses (B.A. or Ph.B.) in the College of Letters and Science of this University. The satisfactory completion of three years of work in a general course toward a bachelor's degree in arts, philosophy, or science in any college or university officially recognized by the University of Wisconsin will be regarded as satisfying this requirement."

to be amended to read:

"Applicants for admission to the Law School, who expect to become candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Laws, are required to have satisfactorily completed:

(1) Three full years of college work, the equivalent of the first three years of either of the General Courses (B.A. or Ph.B.) in the College of Letters and Science.

The satisfactory completion of three years of work in a general course toward a Bachelor's degree in Arts, Philosophy, or Science in any college or university officially recognized by the University of Wisconsin, will be regarded as satisfying this requirement.

OR

(2) Three full years of work leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in the College of Engineering of the University of Wisconsin. The work offered under this provision must include at least six hours from the field of social sciences."

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The Faculty of the School of Education recommends the establishment on a trial basis of three integrated four-semester courses in Education for selected groups of students majoring respectively in English, Mathematics, and the Sciences.

The prescriptions agreed upon for these courses are as follows:

1. Each of these four-semester courses shall be as thoroughly integrated as possible.
  - a. It shall explicitly and functionally connect theory and practice, general and special methods.
  - b. It shall be continuous and cumulative. The four semesters of work shall constitute one course.
  - c. It shall throughout bear as directly as possible on the needs of teachers of a specific subject.
  - d. It shall employ the total of 15 hours now allotted to Education in the preparation of teachers.
  - e. Student rating shall be determined in part by a comprehensive examination given at the end of the course.
2. To facilitate integration each course shall be developed and administered jointly by two instructors, one from the Department of Education and one from the Department of Educational Methods.



3. These pairs of instructors shall be free to invite such cooperation from other members of the Departments as may seem desirable for carrying out their plans.
4. These six instructors together with the Principal of the Wisconsin High School and the Dean of the School of Education, as chairman, shall constitute a committee for the general supervision and guidance of the several enterprises.
5. The general supervisory committee named in No. 5 above shall assume responsibility for evaluating the trial courses and for making reports on them from time to time to the Departments and the School of Education.
6. Students for these courses shall be selected, in number not to exceed 25 for each course, from first-semester juniors who have had no work in Education, who are enrolled in the School of Education, and who fully expect to remain in the University until graduation. (Some exception may be made for students who have had Education 31 only, insofar as the course plans may allow this as a substitute for one of the semesters of work.)
7. Provision shall be made through the Office of the Dean of the School of Education for crediting the work of students in these courses in such ways as to satisfy certification requirements now operative in the case of the University Teacher's Certificate.

ELIGIBILITY RULES

Exh. H.

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The Committee on Student Life and Interests recommends below a revision of the eligibility rules governing participation in extra-curricular activities, excepting intercollegiate athletics and initiation into fraternities and sororities.

1. The regulations at present apply to membership in the organizations and to participation in the activities listed below:

Athletic Board, Badger Board, Cardinal Board, Forensic Board, Union Board, Union Council, Union Assisting Staff, Elections Committee, Interfraternity Executive Board, W.S.G.A. Office, Women's Judiciary Committee; Editorial and business staffs of the student publications; Chairmen and assistant chairmen of Prom, Military Ball, Homecoming, Father's Day and Mother's Day Committees; Productions of the Wisconsin Theater (member of cast with more than 10 sides; member of production staff); Haresfoot (all participants in the trip); intercollegiate debates; men's and women's Glee clubs; student managers and assistant managers of athletic teams or crews and cheer leaders.

The revised regulations will apply also to other activities as they may develop which involve public representation of the University or participation in a public performance or trip.

Freshmen

- a. Freshmen may hold class office and participate in freshman athletics and in freshman forensic events.
- b. Freshmen in their second semester who are not on probation may, by permission of the Committee on Student Life and Interests, to be obtained in advance, try out for positions for which they hope to be eligible in their sophomore year.

Sophomores

- a. Regular enrollment, a program of not less than 14 credits and no unsatisfied probation.
- b. Transfers must have one semester of residence at Wisconsin before becoming eligible under (a) above.

Juniors

- a. Regular enrollment.
- b. Transfers must have one semester of residence at Wisconsin.

Seniors

- a. Regular enrollment.

2. These eligibility regulations do not apply to intra-mural sports, to office or membership in social or religious organizations, literary societies, societies conducted by any department, foreign language plays, and bands and the orchestra.

Neither do these eligibility rules apply to participation in intercollegiate athletics which are under the regulations of the Western Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association and special rules of the Faculty, see page 15 of the Rules and Regulations in the First Semester, 1931-32 Time Table. Membership in fraternities and sororities is also governed by separate regulations, see page 11 of the First Semester, 1931-32 Time Table.

COURSE IN PHARMACY

Ex. 72

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The purpose of the Course in Pharmacy is to furnish a scientific foundation for the pursuit of the profession of pharmacy in all its branches; to prepare students not only to operate drug stores but to fit them as well for other lines of pharmaceutical activity, - to enter hospital practice, to take up pharmaceutical manufacturing, to engage in pharmaceutical research and the teaching of pharmaceutical subjects, or to enter the government service.

Beginning with the academic year 1932-1933 a minimum four year course will be offered. Those who entered the three year course in 1930 and 1931 will be carried through to graduation if they pursue the course without serious interruption, but no new students will be accepted in the three year course.

The Course in Pharmacy is designed to provide a broad foundation in pharmacy and the related sciences. To this end the first two years are devoted almost exclusively to the study of languages and the fundamental sciences. A full year's course of each English, general biology, general chemistry and general physics is required. Since an ability to read foreign languages, especially French and German is demanded for any advanced work in science, a reading knowledge of these two languages is required.

All of the strictly pharmaceutical subjects, with the exception of an orientation course in the first, and an elementary course in prescription practice in the second year, are given in the last two years of the course. These include pharmaceutical botany, pharmaceutical and plant chemistry, pharmacognosy and pharmacy. A thesis is required.
