

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


This Is Wisconsin Women's Hockey...

On April 17, 1998, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Board unanimously voted to add women's ice hockey to the intercollegiate athletic program. In the eight seasons since it became a varsity sport, Wisconsin has built itself into a program that other schools measure themselves against, winning the last two NCAA championships.

While women's hockey was brand new to the athletic department when it was added in 1998, it already had a longstanding history at the UW. A women's hockey club had been on the Madison campus for more than 25 years. Founded in 1973 by three women—Marianne (Anderson) Larson, Jill Steinberg and Karen Schwarz—the UW Women's Hockey Club has had hundreds of players take to the ice over the years.

The first head coach for the varsity Badgers was announced on July 9, 1998, when Julie Sasner was introduced to the Madison media and public. A former member of the first U.S. National Team in 1990, Sasner came from Cornell University, where she had coached for five years and mentored current Wisconsin assistant coach Tracey Cornell.

The Badgers officially opened their history on October 8, 1999, when 3,892 people watched the Badgers face Minnesota Duluth at the Kohl Center. With Olympic gold medalists Cammi Granato, Karyn Bye and head coach Ben Smith, along with Governor Tommy Thompson in attendance, the game was televised around the state on Wisconsin Public Television.

Five years later, the team notched its 100th program win during the 2003-04 season. Continuing to exceed the previous year's standard, the Badgers started another chapter in Wisconsin history with the 2004-05 season. After winning a record 28 games during the season, Wisconsin earned its first NCAA tournament berth on March 13, 2005.

The last two years have seen the Badgers reach the pinnacle of college hockey, claiming the first WCHA regular season, playoff and NCAA championships in school history in 2005-06 and successfully defending all three titles in 2006-07.

Girls hockey in the Madison area has grown along with the UW women's hockey program. The city of Madison is now fortunate to have five rinks and a wealth of enthusiasm for the sport of hockey. Attendance at Wisconsin women's hockey games grows larger every year, with UW leading the nation in attendance in 2006-07.

2007 NCAA Champions!

After posting the most successful season in program history in 2005-06, the Badgers set the bar even higher during the 2006-07 campaign, breaking or tying 18 NCAA records on their way to a second consecutive national championship. Playing in the Frozen Four at Herb Brooks Arena in Lake Placid, N.Y., site of the 1980 'Miracle on Ice' and head coach Mark Johnson's heroics 27 years earlier, UW players lived out their own dream by defeating Minnesota Duluth, the only team to beat the Badgers all season, 4-1 in the national championship game.

In order to reach the Frozen Four, Wisconsin outlasted Harvard in a four-overtime marathon at the Kohl Center. Junior Jinelle Zaugg finally broke the scoreless deadlock 127 minutes and 9 seconds into the contest, ending the second-longest game in women's college hockey history. An enthusiastic crowd of 5,125 was on hand for the game, just 42 fans shy of the NCAA women's hockey attendance record.

The Badgers also successfully defended their WCHA regular season and playoff championships en route to an overall record of 36-1-4. The team boasted arguably the greatest defense in college hockey history, allowing just 36 goals in 41 games while posting a team goals-against average of 0.85 and 18 shutouts, all NCAA records. Sophomore Jessie Vetter and senior Christine Dufour became the first goalies in NCAA men's or women's history to finish a season with a goals-against average below 1.00 while seeing significant time in the net. Vetter's goals-against average for the season was 0.83 while Dufour's was 0.88.



Beyond Wisconsin



Competing beyond college is the dream of many women's hockey players and Wisconsin is rapidly becoming a pipeline for national teams. In the last three years alone, eight current and former Badgers have earned spots on their country's senior national team for either the IIHF World Women's Championship or the Four Nations Cup.

Olympians

During the 2006 Winter Olympics in Torino, Italy, Molly Engstrom and Carla MacLeod became the first two former Badgers to represent their countries in the Olympics. MacLeod, who was named to the all-tournament team, helped lead Canada to the gold medal while Engstrom and Team USA claimed the bronze.

World Champions

MacLeod earned another gold medal with the Canadian national team at the 2007 IIHF World Women's Championship. In the gold medal game, Canada defeated a United States team that included an astounding seven current and former Badgers on its roster and was led by UW head coach Mark Johnson. Included in those seven players was Engstrom, who earned the Directorate Award as the top defenseman of the tournament.

Engstrom also made history with the U.S. national team at the 2005 World Women's Championship in Sweden. She tallied a goal and an assist to help Team USA win its only world championship.

Every great program is built on the shoulders of outstanding players. It is no different at Wisconsin. The remarkable success the hockey program has enjoyed has come with national recognition for a number of Badger players.

In just the second year of the program, Meghan Hunter and Kerry Weiland became the first Badgers to be named All-Americans in 2001. Since then, six more UW student-athletes have been added to the nation's list of top collegiate hockey players, including Sara Bauer, who became the first two-time, first-team All-American in UW history in 2007.

The 2007 season saw a school-record four Badgers earn All-American status as Meaghan Mikkelsen and Jessie Vetter joined Bauer on the first team and Bobbi-Jo Slusar was named to the second team. Bauer and Mikkelsen were also each finalists for the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award, which Bauer won in 2006.

In addition to the student-athletes, head coach Mark Johnson was named AHCA Division I Coach of the Year in each of the past two seasons. Johnson is also a three-time WCHA Coach of the Year,



2006 NCAA Champions!


The 2005-06 season was a dream year for the Wisconsin women's hockey team as it captured the program's first national championship with a 36-4-1 record. Along the way, the Badgers also won their first WCHA regular season and playoff championships. Postseason awards reflected UW's special season as Sara Bauer became the first Badger to receive the Patty Kazmaier Award as national player of the year and head coach Mark Johnson earned the 2006 American Hockey Coaches Association Division I Coach of the Year award.

Wisconsin became the first school to post a shutout in the Frozen Four with a 1-0 win over St. Lawrence on March 24. The Badgers then went back and repeated the feat two days later in a 3-0 victory against Minnesota to win the national championship. Freshman Jessie Vetter, who started all three NCAA tournament games and allowed one goal in over 200 minutes of NCAA tournament action, was named the Frozen Four Most Outstanding Player.


The Badgers faced a difficult challenge to reach the Frozen Four when Mercyhurst was assigned to play against UW in a quarterfinal at Capitol Ice Arena in Middleton, Wis. The game marked the first time that Wisconsin earned the right to host an NCAA tournament contest. Although Mercyhurst struck first, the Badgers responded quickly to tie the game with six minutes left in the opening period. It took more than 75 minutes for the next goal to come, but Tia Hanson's goal 10:10 into the second overtime sent UW on to the Frozen Four.




The Badgers celebrate Tia Hanson's double-overtime goal against Mercyhurst in the NCAA quarterfinals.



Badgers in the Community



As part of the overall experience at the University of Wisconsin, student-athletes are encouraged to give back to the community through volunteer activities. The Madison area is truly supportive of UW athletics and the department returns that support via outreach programs. Whether it's working with other UW students or getting out in the community, the Badgers contribute to making Madison and Dane County a better place to live.

During the past few seasons, members of the UW women's hockey team have taken part in many different community service events, including trips to the Ronald McDonald House to carve pumpkins with area children and to local elementary schools to talk to the students about being student-athletes.

Women's hockey players also take part in on-ice events. Wisconsin hosts an annual kids clinic where the players and coaching staff serve as the instructors. Over 60 children attend the event, which allows the student-athletes to share the ice with kids. Badger players also participate in wheelchair hockey games throughout the season.

Prime Time Players

Last season, 24 of Wisconsin's 41 games were shown live on television or through free internet webcasts. In addition, six games were aired live on the WIBA family of radio stations in the Madison area. Beyond game coverage, the Badgers were also featured on CSTV, ESPNU and Fox Sports Net. The team was the subject of an hour-long documentary that aired on both the regional Fox Sports Net North and the national Fox College Sports.

Wisconsin's reputation as the major athletic program in the state also attracts a lot of media attention. Madison is home to four television stations, 18 radio stations, two daily newspapers and two student newspapers. In addition, media from around the state, including the Milwaukee area, also cover the Badgers on a regular basis.

Beginning last season, all UW home games were seen live on uwbadgers.com. The free internet webcasts gave Badger fans a new way to follow their favorite team when they could not make it out to the Kohl Center themselves.

uwbadgers.com is the official Web site of Wisconsin Athletics, maintained internally by a dedicated team of technical experts and an experienced editorial staff. Visitors from all over the United States and the world (an average of 119 different countries monthly) continue to log on to catch the latest Badger athletics news.

LAKE PLACID, N.Y. — In the center of addressing a flattened pace, Mark Johnson used the opportunity to make the most of his time.

Asked if he could name the players he had seen in 1980, when he came to this upstate village and helped create the first NCAA women's hockey team, he said he couldn't think of much around the world back then.


"You can be here," he said, minding the all-incredible events that led up to the 2007 NCAA title.

Johnson, a gold medal with U.S. men's hockey team, wants the same kind of experience that he had 27 years ago: an overwhelming sense of excitement and achievement, one the Badgers did after Sunday afternoon at the Olympic Center to win their second consecutive NCAA title.

"They've got something that they can cherish," Johnson said.

The WCHA

College hockey's top conference

With a noteworthy past that now spans six decades, three overriding characteristics continue to define the Western Collegiate Hockey Association over the league's 55 seasons: history, tradition and success.

A new chapter of that history began in 1999-2000 with the founding of the women's WCHA. Since that time, member teams have gone on to win all eight national championships, including the last seven NCAA titles.

That excellence on the national stage extends to the men's side as well. Since 1951, teams representing the WCHA have earned an amazing 36 NCAA (national) championships, including five straight to open the new millennium, finished as the national runner-up another 27 times, and qualified for a berth in collegiate hockey's national championship—the NCAA Men's Frozen Four—in 52 of 55 seasons overall.

In addition to its successes in national championship tournament play over the years, the WCHA owns an enviable reputation for producing outstanding coaches and student-athletes, with hundreds of its alumni moving on to noteworthy professional and Olympic playing careers, including 20 Olympians on the women's side.




The Kohl Center

Opened in 1998, the Kohl Center is one of the premiere facilities in all of college hockey. Since the 2004-05 season, the Kohl Center has been the permanent home for women's hockey games. In the last two years at the Kohl Center, the Badgers are 46-5-2 at home for a winning percentage of .887. The arena, which also hosts the men's hockey team as well as the men's and women's basketball teams, seats 15,237 when set up for hockey, making it the second-largest college-owned hockey arena in the country. The facility also holds 17,142 for basketball.

The Kohl Center is named after U.S. Senator Herb Kohl, a 1956 UW-Madison graduate who donated \$25 million towards the construction of the arena. Kohl's gift is the single-largest private donation in UW history.

Recent additions to the Kohl Center include a new scoreboard and ring beam. The main Kohl Center scoreboard includes 9-by-14-foot video boards on all four sides that provide Wisconsin fans the chance to watch video replays. The ring beam, which runs the circumference of the arena at the first balcony level, makes Wisconsin one of a select few college venues with a ring beam, creating a unique and exciting game atmosphere.

The most recent round of additions, completed prior to the 2006-07 season, included a new and expanded weight room as well as an on-site satellite office for the Fetzer Academic Center. Student-athletes also make use of the Kellner Club as a dining hall. Located on the second floor of the Kohl Center, the Kellner Club is an exclusive dining club available on event days.



NATIONAL ATTENDANCE LEADERS

Wisconsin is annually among the nation's leaders in attendance average. Since averaging 808 fans per contest to ranks third in the nation in the program's inaugural season of 1999-2000, the Badgers have steadily added to their fan base.

In 2006-07, the Badgers led the nation in average attendance with more than 1,300 fans per game and a total of 26,131 fans throughout the entire season.


The Shell and The McClain Athletic Facility




The Wisconsin women's hockey team utilizes a number of top-class facilities in and around Camp Randall Stadium. The primary home for the Badgers is the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center, more commonly referred to as the Shell.

The Shell is located on the east side of Camp Randall Stadium and houses the main women's hockey locker room as well as an NHL-sized practice rink. The locker room was built before the 2002-03 season as an addition to the south end of the practice facility. The complex includes a skate sharpening room, coaches' room, classroom complete with practice goals and boards, as well as dress down and locker rooms.


The Dave McClain Athletic Facility is another important complex to Wisconsin women's hockey. Located adjacent to the northeast side of Camp Randall Stadium, the McClain Facility features a 90-yard indoor practice field with artificial turf. The lower level of the complex houses a fully-equipped weight room, the Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center and the Sports Medicine headquarters. The second level includes a 150-seat theater-style auditorium, classrooms and a players' lounge. The 166,264-square-foot facility was completed in 1988 and is named in honor of former UW football coach Dave McClain.



The UW women's hockey locker room is located at the south end of the Shell. It was constructed as part of an addition to the Shell prior to the 2002-03 season.



The Lund Student-Athlete Dining Hall is another one of the fine facilities used by members of the Wisconsin women's hockey team. The dining hall was built under the stands on the east side of Camp Randall during the recent renovation project. It is located near the Shell and the McClain Athletic Facility, meaning that it is just a short distance from the practice rink, the locker room, the weight room and the Fetzer Academic Center.

The dining hall offers a chance to build friendships with student-athletes from other sports because it is a natural gathering place. Players from most of Wisconsin's 23 different teams utilize the dining hall, creating a unique environment for all student-athletes.

Quality food and service is provided by the Department of Athletics' food and beverage staff.

Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center

The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center and the satellite Kohl Fetzer Center provide for the academic needs of more than 700 student-athletes at the University of Wisconsin. The state-of-the-art centers, named after Wade and Beverly Fetzer, are home to both the academic advising and learning support staffs of the Office of Academic Services.

The original Fetzer Center is a 15,000-square-foot facility. The center is fully wireless and features a large open study area that is surrounded by nine small to mid-sized classrooms, a 55-seat auditorium, staff offices, a computer lab and a canteen area. The open study area has 30 individual carrels as well as several study tables. The state-of-the-art computer lab, under coordinator Jim Eisenmann, allows student-athletes to work on assignments, access online library or course materials and check their email. The computer lab also has several checkout laptop computers for student-athletes who are traveling for competitions and other team-related activities.

The Kohl Fetzer Center was opened in October of 2006 to serve the needs of the student-athletes who practice and compete on the southeast end of the campus. The KFC, as it is fondly called, is a third of the size of the original Fetzer but still serves all of the needs of the student-athletes. It features five classrooms, an open study area and a computer lab. An academic advisor and a learning specialist are available full time for the teams that use the KFC.

The two academic centers feature a staff of six advisors, four learning specialists, a life skills coordinator and a tutor coordinator. The staff monitors academic eligibility and progress while providing study groups for selected courses, access to tutors and hosting a variety of academic and career planning events throughout the year.

Under the direction of assistant athletic director Doug Tiedt, the advising staff of Chris Butler, Jill Hadfield, David Sedor, Bridget Warren, Mary Weaver-Klees and Alan Zussman as well as tutor coordinator David Mattison work along with learning specialists Dan Ott, Toni O'Keefe, Denise Kalscheur and Nancy Gatyas to render quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assist coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience. CHAMPS/ Life Skills Coordinator Kelli Richards oversees pro-

grams in career and personal development as well as community outreach.

The staff, including program assistants Nancy Kreklow and Laurel Holgerson, has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin and a permanent line of communication with all university departments.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and learning specialists. Sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the student-athlete. Athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The staff takes a personal approach to each student-athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.


Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways on the national, conference and university level. The annual Student-Athlete Academic banquet recognizes student-athletes off the field of play by honoring more than 200 student-athletes with a 3.5 or better grade point average. Additionally, the annual CHAMPS Cup competition recognizes the teams that succeed academically and are involved in community and campus events.



The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component in all of the Badger success on the playing field. The goal of the program is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.


Strength and conditioning coordinator John Dettmann and his six assistant coaches, including hockey's Mike Potenza, work with members of the Wisconsin coaching staff to develop training programs to enhance each athlete's performance.

Badger hockey players work on their strength programs in the McClain Center, the Kohl Center, and the departments' other weight training facilities.

The McClain Center weightroom is the largest of the facilities and features more than 45,000 pounds of free weights and more than 50 weight machines. The room has seven squat racks, eight bench press stations, eight flat-to-incline benches, six Olympic lift platforms and numerous other free weight stations.

The new Kohl Center weight, outfitted by Magnum Fitness Systems, contains more than 10,000 pounds of free weights to go along with eight power racks. The roomy 5,500-square foot work out area also houses exercise bikes and other equipment to build better Badgers.

The Badger Den has five power stations with each consisting of a platform for Olympic-style lifting as well as a squat rack, bench press, incline bench press, pull-up station and a dip station. There are three lat-pull machines and seated row machines, a complete set of dumbbells and a complete set of plyometric boxes.

Sports Medicine

The sports medicine staff provides all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and a full-time nutritionist. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Badger athletes is supervised by a staff of 13 full-time and three graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.


Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Full-time athletic trainers Karen Bloch, Tricia DeSouza, Bill Gierach, Chuck Hart, Andy Hrodey, Jesse Donnenwerth, Mike Moll, Clark Pearson, Henry Perez-Guerra, Ashley Parr, Jen Pepoy, and Kristy Walker as well as graduate assistant trainers Kayla Schipman, Jenna Street and Stephanie Westrick utilize functional measures, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.

Full-time nutritionist Patrick Welscher, RD, provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.

The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospital and Clinics. Medical director Dr. Ben Graf, an orthopedic surgeon, is responsible for all services provided to student-athletes. Orthopedic care is also provided by team physicians Dr. John Orwin, Dr. Lee Kaplan and Dr. Geoffrey Baer. General medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry, and he is joined by Dr. David Bernhardt, and Dr. Kathleen Carr.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in Camp Randall Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.




The UW Sports Medicine facility features a 50-foot, two-lane rehabilitation pool (top) and an on-site x-ray facility in the McClain Center.



With strong ties to Wisconsin as a coach's son, player and assistant coach, Mark Johnson stepped into the role of head women's hockey coach beginning with the 2002–03 season. In five seasons, Johnson and the Wisconsin women's hockey team have continued to shatter both school and national records. Johnson, the 2006 and 2007 American Hockey Coaches Association Division I Coach of the Year, has led the Badgers to back-to-back WCHA regular season, playoff and NCAA championships while winning more games in a two-year period (72) than any other team in women's college hockey history.

During the 2006–07 campaign, Johnson's team broke or tied 18 NCAA team and individual records including wins in a season (36), fewest losses (one), best winning percentage (.927) and most shutouts (18). Johnson leads all active women's college hockey coaches with a winning percentage of .815 after compiling an impressive record of 147–28–14 in his five years at Wisconsin.

Johnson's impact on women's hockey has extended well beyond Madison in large part due to his involvement with USA Hockey. During the 2006–07 season alone, Johnson led the U.S. women's national team at the 2007 IIHF World Women's Championship in Winnipeg, Manitoba as well as the 2006 Four Nations Cup in Kitchener, Ontario.


As an accomplished athlete, coach and humanitarian, Johnson continues to be honored with awards year after year. He

received the NCAA Silver Anniversary award, one of the most prestigious honors given by the NCAA, in 2005 for his accomplishments in the 25 years following his days as a student-athlete. In 2004 he was inducted into the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame for his individual accomplishments

as a player and coach. He was previously inducted as a member of the 1980 U.S. Olympic hockey team in 2003. Vince Lombardi Charitable Funds honored Johnson's volunteer work by presenting him with the 2004 Award of Excellence.

Named the 2003 WCHA Co-Coach of the Year and one of eight finalists for the AHCA Division I Coach of the Year award, Johnson guided Wisconsin to a 22–8–5 overall and 14–6–4 WCHA record in his first season with the team.

After going 25–6–3 in 2003–04, the Badgers made history in Johnson's third season, winning a program-record 28 games (28–9–1) and earning the program's first-ever NCAA tournament berth. The team climbed as high as second in the national rankings by defeating then-No. 2 Minnesota Duluth in the WCHA tournament semifinals and dramatically forcing overtime by scoring two goals in the final minute of regulation vs. No. 1 Minnesota in the championship game.



Johnson carried the momentum into the 2005-06 campaign as Wisconsin debuted at No. 1 in the USCHO.com preseason poll and then went on to validate that distinction with a 36-4-1 record and a national championship. As an encore in 2006-07, the team successfully defended all three championships while posting a record of 36-1-4 and solidified its status as one of the elite women's college hockey programs in the nation.

Leadership

37-30-7 mark in the 1995-96 season and earning Colonial Hockey League coach of the year honors. He also led a pair of area high schools, serving as the head coach of Verona from 1994-95 and as the assistant coach for Madison Memorial from 1993-94.

Beyond collegiate and professional experience, Johnson has often worked at the international level. In September 2001, Johnson served as an on-ice assistant coach at the U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Orientation Camp in Colorado Springs, Colo., featuring 38 of the top American players in the National Hockey League.

Johnson served as an assistant coach with the 2002 U.S. Men's National Team that competed in the International Ice Hockey Federation World Championship in Gothenberg, Jonkoping, and Karlstad, Sweden. He had previously served in a similar capacity for the 2000 World Championship in St. Petersburg, Russia.

In 2007, Johnson led the U.S. Women's National Team to a silver medal at the World Women's Championship in Canada. He was once again behind the bench for the U.S. during the Under-22 select series between the U.S. and Canada this past August.

On the Ice

In his playing career, Johnson helped Wisconsin to the 1977 national championship during his freshman campaign. The first Badger ever to win WCHA Rookie of the Year honors, he went on to become the school's second all-time leading scorer with 256 points on a school-record 125 goals and 131 assists in just three seasons.

The 1978-79 WCHA MVP, Johnson was a two-time, first team All-WCHA pick and a two-time All-American. In 2002, he was also selected as one of the WCHA's "Top 50 Players in 50 Years."

Johnson has represented USA Hockey as a player in 13 international tournaments, with his most recent appearance as part of the U.S. national team at the 1998 IIHF (A-Pool) World Championship Qualification Tournament in Austria. Most notably, he led the 1980 U.S. Olympic Team's gold medal-winning effort with 11 points, including two

goals in the "Miracle-On-Ice" against the Soviet Union and an assist on the game-winning goal against Finland in the final contest.

The team attended opening ceremonies of the 2002 Olympic Winter Games to light the flame and was honored by *Sports Illustrated* as giving us the 'Greatest Sports Moment of the Century.' In 2004, Disney produced the blockbuster movie, "Miracle," chronicling the 1980 USA hockey team's unlikely climb to the top.

The Next Level

Following his Olympic experience, Johnson embarked on a successful 11-year NHL career. He began his pro tenure with the Pittsburgh Penguins (1980-82), before moving onto the Minnesota North Stars (1982).


He also enjoyed stints with the Hartford Whalers (1982-85), St. Louis Blues (1985) and New Jersey Devils (1985-90). Over his 669 career NHL contests, the forward collected 203 goals, 305 assists and 508 points, highlighted by his 87-point season as captain of Hartford in 1983-84. He also tied an NHL All-Star Game record with three assists that season.

A Hockey Family

A 1999 inductee into the International Ice Hockey Federation Hall of Fame, Johnson is the son of legendary Wisconsin men's head coach Bob Johnson (1966-82) and brother of former men's assistant coach Peter Johnson (1987-91).

One of Wisconsin's most decorated athletes in any sport, Johnson was inducted into the State of Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame in 2003 and is also a charter member of Wisconsin's National W Club Hall of Fame.

Johnson, 49, earned his bachelor of science degree in kinesiology from Wisconsin in 1994. He resides in Verona, Wis., with his wife Leslie and has five children: Douglas, Christopher, Patrick, Mikayla and Megan.




Johnson Through The Years


Johnson scores in his last game as a Badger to close out his UW career with 125 goals, tops in school history.





As only a freshman, Johnson helps lead Wisconsin to the 1977 NCAA title. He sets a UW record with 36 goals in his rookie season, including two in the championship game, on his way to becoming the first Badger to be named WCHA Rookie of the Year.

Johnson leads the 1980 U.S. Olympic Team's gold medal run as he tallies 11 points in the tournament including two goals in the memorable "Miracle On Ice" game against the Soviet Union in Lake Placid, N.Y.

Johnson appears in the 1984 NHL All-Star Game in New Jersey representing the Hartford Whalers, the team he captained from 1983-85. Johnson's Wales Conference team defeats the Campbell Conference 7-6.

The energetic Cornell came to Madison after spending the previous year as girls hockey head coach at Cushing Academy in Ashburnham, Mass. Cornell led Cushing Academy to a 24-4-2 mark, the most successful season in the history of the program. Her team captured second during the regular season and advanced to the NEPSAC Championship. Most recently, Cornell volunteered as a Team Leader at Canada's Under-22 Selection Camp in August 2005.


Cornell's playing experiences include four years at Cornell University, as well as one year as a professional in Switzerland for the SC Reinach Lions. While at Cornell, she co-captained the hockey program her senior season and earned Academic All-Ivy honors both her junior and senior years. Cornell helped the Big Red to the Ivy League hockey title during the 1995–96 season and served as assistant captain during the title run. The one-time Cornell rookie of the year also earned team honors as most inspirational player as a sophomore and senior.





Paul Hickman begins his ninth season with the women's hockey program. Hickman, who graduated in 2002 from the UW with a degree in zoology, serves as director of operations and equipment manager for the Badgers.

Hickman, a native of Oakton, Va., spent three seasons as a student equipment manager with the program prior to his full-time position. A former Reston Raiders goaltender in Reston, Va., he is in charge of the business operations of the program. His duties as director of hockey operations include the coordination of all elements of team travel and scheduling. He also handles the purchase and maintenance of equipment.

Hickman has been chosen to represent the University of Wisconsin and the United States on a number of occasions. In 2007, Hickman went with UW head coach Mark Johnson and seven current and former Badgers to assist the United States women's national team at the IIHF World Women's Championship in Canada. The team went on to claim the silver medal. This past August, Hickman served as the equipment manager for the U.S. Under-18 select team during a three-game series against Canada. He will work with the same team during the 2008 Under-18 World Championship in January. Hickman also worked with the Under-22 select team in 2003 and 2006.

Hickman has been selected to help at the U.S. women's player development festival on two additional occasions. Hickman is a third-generation Badger; his father Jack and grandfather John both graduated from the UW. Grandfather John Hickman also holds a master's degree and Ph.D. from Wisconsin and is a UW Hall of Fame member and former swimming coach and associate athletic director.

Mark and his wife Amy reside in Madison with their three daughters: Drew, Ella and Maria.




Athletic Communications Assistant Adam Augustine

Dean's Council.



2007-08 Season Outlook

In 2006, the Wisconsin women's hockey team tied an NCAA record with 36 wins and claimed its first national championship in program history. Last season, UW returned to the Frozen Four to defend its title. Playing in Lake Placid, N.Y., home to the 1980 "Miracle on Ice" team, Mark Johnson's Badgers won the 2007 National Championship, breaking or tying 18 NCAA records along the way to conclude one of the greatest seasons in women's college hockey history.

The 2007-08 edition of the Badgers will look to three-peat, as they return 15 letterwinners from last season's championship squad which set an NCAA record with a .927 winning percentage. Leading the team's march to the 2008 Frozen Four in Duluth, Minn., will be captain Emily Morris, and assistant captains Jessie Vetter and Jinelle Zaugg.


Gone is Sara Bauer, a two-time first-team All-American, who leaves UW holding 17 single season and career records as well as being named the 2007 Frozen Four's Most Outstanding Player. The Wisconsin record holder for career points and assists, Bauer was a finalist for the Patty Kazmaier trophy last season, a year after winning the award in 2006.

Bauer is one of six departing seniors whose leadership helped guide the program to the pinnacle of college hockey including forwards Phoebe Monteleone and Heidi Kletzien. The defense, which set

NCAA records for fewest goals allowed per game (0.88), fewest goals allowed (36) and most shutouts (18) last season, will have to deal with the losses of captain Bobbi-Jo Slusar, WCHA Defensive Player of the Year Meaghan Mikkelson and goaltender Christine Dufour.

Stepping in to fill those spots will be seven newcomers that will compete for playing time this season including forwards Mallory Deluce, Hilary Knight and Kelly Nash. On defense are Anne Dronen, Olivia Jakiel and Malee Windmeier while goaltender Krista Tatum will also be joining the Badgers in 2007.

After a year where UW became the first school in NCAA men's or women's hockey history to have two goalies finish the season with a goals against average below 1.00, the goaltender position will again be a strong point for the Badgers in 2007-08. Jessie Vetter, a member of the Frozen Four All-Tournament Team and first-team All-American, will again be between the pipes for the Badgers. Vetter's 15 career shutouts leaves her only three behind the school record of



Senior assistant captain Jinelle Zaugg enters the 2007-08 season needing just 20 goals to eclipse the UW record for career goals, held by Meghan Hunter with 84. Zaugg also needs only 11 points to move into the top five in school history in career points.

18. Last season she ranked first nationally in goals-against average (0.83), second in save percentage (.953) and third in winning percentage (.896) with a record of 20-10-3. Also returning will be sophomore Alannah McCready, while freshman Krista Tatum will also look for time in net for the Badgers.

In front of Vetter, four skaters return to a defense that allowed only 10 goals in the final 21 games last season including seniors Mikka Nordby and Emily Morris, and juniors Alycia Matthews and Rachel Bible.

Matthews, who recorded her first career postseason point on the game-winning goal against Harvard in the NCAA quarterfinals, contributed eight assists in 41 games last season. Morris and Bible will both be staples of the defense after appearing in every game for the Badgers in 2007-08. Also on defense will be redshirt freshman Ally Strickler and newcomers Anne Dronen, Olivia Jakiel, and Malee Windmeier.

In the offensive end, senior Jinelle Zaugg will lead a Badger attack that led the nation in power play conversion rate last season and averaged more than 4.00 goals scored per game. Zaugg has steadily improved since arriving in Madison as she has scored over 20 goals in the past two seasons, including a team-high 29 last year. It could also be a record-setting sea-

son for the second-team All-WCHA member as Zaugg is currently fourth on the career goals list with 65, just 19 shy of the school record.

Joining Zaugg up front will be a slew of juniors that includes Erika Lawler, Angie Keseley, Kayla Hagen and Tia Hanson. Lawler and Keseley had very impressive years in 2006. Lawler lead all UW sophomores with 38 points while recording seven multi-assist games and one multi-goal game. Keseley also impressed, as she scored 12 goals and recorded six multi-point games.

Also returning will be sophomore Meghan Duggan who will be looking to build upon her impressive rookie season. The WCHA Rookie of the Year was second on the team in points with 52, while earning second-team All-WCHA honors.

Three freshmen, Mallory Deluce, Kelly Nash, and Hilary Knight, will also vie for playing time up front. A native of Hanover, N.H., Knight headlines head coach Mark Johnson's 2007 recruiting class. The 5-10 United States senior national team member was the youngest player on the U.S. squad at the 2007 IIHF World Women's Championship last April and also earned a spot on the roster for the Four Nations Cup. Johnson led both of those teams, which each claimed the silver medal.

Johnson, the AHCA National Coach of the Year in each of the last two seasons, will be in his sixth year as the head coach of the Badgers. Since taking over in 2002, he has an astonishing 147-28-14 record, making him the winningest active coach in NCAA women's hockey by winning percentage (.815).



Sophomore Meghan Duggan is Wisconsin's leading returning scorer. As a freshman, Duggan recorded 26 goals and 26 assists for 52 points.

The Badgers will need Johnson's leadership to guide them through a tough non-conference schedule that includes a trip to Durham, N.H., to face the Wildcats of New Hampshire, who ended last season ranked fourth nationally.

Wisconsin, which tied an NCAA record with 19 home wins last season, will try to defend its WCHA title when it opens up the season at Union. The team then makes its 2007-08 debut at the Kohl Center for conference play with weekend series against Minnesota State and Minnesota. Last year, the Kohl Center was home to the high-

est average attendance in the nation with 1,362 fans per game.

After a 2007 NCAA Championship rematch versus Minnesota Duluth, the Badgers spend seven weeks away from the Kohl Center before facing North Dakota at home to end the first half of the season. The WCHA regular season title could go down to the wire as the Badgers visit rivals Minnesota Duluth and Minnesota in the final three weeks of the regular season. impeccable playing and coaching career with USA Hockey.

2006-07 Season Review

◆ Playing at Herb Brooks Arena in Lake Placid, N.Y., site of the 1980 'Miracle on Ice' and head coach Mark Johnson's heroics, the Wisconsin women's hockey team lived out its own dream by claiming its second straight NCAA title with a 4-1 win over Minnesota Duluth.

◆ The Badgers also successfully defended their WCHA regular season and playoff championships en route to a final record of 36-1-4, breaking the NCAA record for winning percentage at .927.

◆ The last program to win back-to-back NCAA titles at Wisconsin was the women's cross country team in 1984 and 1985.

◆ Four Badgers earned AHCA All-American status. Senior Sara Bauer became the first Badger to be a two-time, first-team All-American and was joined on the first team by sophomore Jessie Vetter and senior Meaghan Mikkelsen. Team captain Bobbi-Jo Slusar was named a second-team All-American after earning a spot on the first team last season. Bauer and Slusar are two of only five UW players to earn All-American status twice in their career.

◆ The Badgers ended the season on a 26-game unbeaten streak (23-0-3), matching the longest streak in program history set earlier in the 2006-07 campaign. Wisconsin enters 2007-08 just four games away from the NCAA record of 30 games.

◆ Head coach Mark Johnson was named the AHCA Women's Division I Coach of the Year for the second straight season. Johnson has a career record of 147-28-14 (.815) in five seasons as head coach of the Badgers. His winning percentage ranks him first among active NCAA Division I women's head coaches.

◆ With 72 wins in the last two seasons, the Badgers have won more games in a two-year period than any other team in NCAA women's hockey history. The only other Division I program to post 72 wins in two seasons is the Michigan State men's team, which did so three times (1983-85 or 1984-86 and 1988-1990). However, the fewest games that MSU ever needed to reach 72 wins was 89 while the Badgers did so in just 82 games.

◆ Wisconsin saw multiple impressive shutout streaks end in the NCAA championship game against Minnesota Duluth. UW had not allowed a goal in 422 minutes and 36 seconds of NCAA tournament play. Of that 422:36 streak, Vetter was in net for all but eight seconds. Vetter was pulled briefly for an extra attacker on a delayed penalty in the third overtime against Harvard.

◆ In all games, Vetter also boasted a personal shutout streak of 448 minutes and 32 seconds which included five straight shutouts. In playoff games, Vetter had not allowed a goal in 542 minutes and 28 seconds, or just over nine hours of game time.

◆ The Badgers reached the Frozen Four by outlasting No. 6 Harvard 1-0 in four overtimes in an NCAA quarterfinal March 10 at the Kohl Center. Junior Jinelle



The Badgers successfully defended their NCAA, WCHA regular season and WCHA playoff titles in 2006-07. Along the way, the Badgers broke or tied 18 NCAA team and individual records.

Zaugg ripped a one-timer over Brittany Martin's shoulder to end the game after 127 minutes and 9 seconds of play.

◆ The game was the second longest in NCAA women's hockey history behind only a five-overtime, 145:35 marathon between New Hampshire and Providence in 1996. It was also the longest NCAA tournament game in women's hockey history.

◆ A Kohl Center women's hockey record crowd of 5,125 was on hand for the game. That total was just 42 fans shy of the record since the NCAA sponsored women's hockey in 2000-01. In 2003, a crowd of 5,167 watched Minnesota Duluth defeat Harvard 4-3 in double overtime in the NCAA championship game.

◆ In 21 games after Jan. 1, Wisconsin out-scored its opponents 81-10 while posting 13 shutouts.

◆ The Badgers allowed just 36 goals in 41 games this season, an average of 0.88 goals against per game. The NCAA record for fewest goals allowed per game was 1.14 by both Mercyhurst in 2004-05 and New Hampshire in 2005-06.

◆ Although she did not win her second straight Patty Kazmaier Award, senior Sara Bauer instead claimed Frozen Four Most Outstanding Player honors along with the national championship. She finished her career owning 17 single season and career records at Wisconsin, including career points (218), assists (138) and games played (152).



The Western Collegiate Hockey Association



With a noteworthy past that spans six decades and marks its 56th season overall in 2007-08, three characteristics that continue to define the Western Collegiate Hockey Association are history, tradition and success.

From the founding days as the Midwest Collegiate Hockey League (MCHL) from 1951-53, to the Western Intercollegiate Hockey League (WIHL) from 1953-58, and ultimately on to the Western Collegiate Hockey Association in 1959, this prestigious athletic conference has developed and maintained a tradition of excellence that truly is second to none.

In fact, no collegiate conference—in any sport—can top the impressive list of national scale accomplishments of the WCHA and its member teams. Since its founding in 1999-2000, teams representing the women's WCHA have now captured eight consecutive national championships in 2000, 2001, 2002, 2003, 2004, 2005, 2006 and 2007. And since 1951, teams representing the men's WCHA have earned a record 36 NCAA (national) championships, finished as the national runner-up another 27 times, and qualified for a berth in collegiate hockey's national championship round—the NCAA Men's Frozen Four—in 52 of 55 seasons overall.

In addition to its successes in national championship tournament play over the years, the Western Collegiate Hockey Association owns an enviable reputation for producing outstanding coaches and student-athletes, with hundreds upon hundreds of its alumni moving on to successful professional and Olympic playing careers. On top of the more than 100 league alumni who have Olympic experience playing for the likes of the United States, Canada, Italy, Norway, Austria and France, conference-member teams and players have also received additional international exposure on a regular basis since 1951. The women's WCHA has regularly put together all-star teams. In 2005-06 the WCHA All-Star Team played games against the U.S. National Team at

both Xcel Energy Center and the Duluth Entertainment & Convention Center. In 2004-05, a total of 16 conference players participated in the annual women's IIHF World Championship in Sweden, including five on the gold medal-winning U.S. Team. The conference will again be represented at the 2007 IIHF Women's World Championships with Wisconsin women's head coach Mark Johnson set to lead the U.S. National Team.

The WCHA also continues to lead the way in college hockey attendance—for both men and women—as member teams, who regularly play in some of the sport's finest facilities, regularly top the Division I ranks in average home attendance. In 2006-07, the women's WCHA marked its eighth straight season at the top of the national rankings while the men's conference drew more than one million fans for the 14th consecutive season.

Over the last decade, the WCHA has been able to showcase its exciting brand of hockey to an ever-increasing number of fans, thanks to such impressive facilities as Ralph Engelstad Arena in Grand Forks, Colorado Springs World Arena, the Kohl Center in Madison, Magness Arena in Denver, Mariucci Arena and Ridder Arena in Minneapolis, the National Hockey Center in St. Cloud, and Midwest Wireless Civic Center in Mankato.

Under the leadership and guidance of Commissioner Bruce M. McLeod and Associate Commissioner Sara R. Martin, the Western Collegiate Hockey Association will proudly celebrate its 56th season of men's competition and ninth in women's competition in 2007-08.




Student Life








Above: Henry Mall anchors the agricultural end of the UW campus.







John D. Wiley is the 27th chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He assumed office Jan. 1, 2001.


Wiley has served the university community in a variety of roles, including an associate dean in engineering, dean of the graduate school and the university's senior research officer, and most recently, the university's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs.

In his campus-level positions, Wiley has represented the institution for a variety of external constituencies. He also has been deeply involved in fundraising from individual and corporate donors, and charitable foundations.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964; attended graduate school at UW-Madison as an NSF Fellow and received master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He spent a year at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany as an awardee of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Training.

Wiley joined the UW-Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in August 1975. His research and teaching focused on a variety of topics related to semiconductors and other materials and processes important to the electronics field.

Wiley currently serves as the president of the Big Ten Conference Council of Presidents/Chancellors.



Athletic Director Barry Alvarez


Barry Alvarez is in his fourth year as UW Director of Athletics and his second without the additional title of head football coach.

Under Alvarez's leadership, Wisconsin has won eight national titles, including five NCAA championships. The Badgers have also had record-setting seasons academically, with UW student-athletes recording a record-high grade point average in the fall of 2006. The UW has prospered in its facilities with the recently completed Camp Randall renovation and several additions to the Kohl Center as well as record-setting ticket sales.

From 1990-2005, Alvarez guided Wisconsin's football fortunes. He piloted the Badgers to three Big Ten Conference and Rose Bowl titles en route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (118-73-4 record). Alvarez was just the 10th coach in Big Ten history to win 100 games at one conference institution. He was the 1993 national coach of the year and a two-time Big Ten coach of the year.

He is a 1969 graduate of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. Alvarez received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, are the parents of three children, Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson), Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer), and Chad (wife Stephanie). Barry and Cindy are grandparents to Joe and Jake Ferguson, Grace and Jackson Delzer, and Scarlet and Barry John Thomas Alvarez.



A Winning Athletic Program

In 2006-07, the University of Wisconsin continued its winning ways, claiming two NCAA championships. The Badgers also added two individual national titles and won four conference crowns.

Wisconsin won the 2007 NCAA Indoor Men's Track & Field Championship, crowning the first national title for a UW track and field team. The title was also the first-ever for a Big Ten Conference team.

Senior Chris Solinsky earned two individual national titles in 2007. He won the 5,000 meters at the NCAA indoor championships and claimed his second consecutive title in the 5,000 meters at the NCAA outdoor championships.

The women's hockey team became the first UW program to repeat as NCAA champions since 1985 when it won the 2007 title. The Badgers claimed their second straight title, becoming the third school to repeat as national champions.

Wisconsin also won Big Ten titles in men's cross country, men's indoor track and field and men's outdoor track and field as well as the WCHA title in women's hockey.

Five UW programs also set records for most wins in a season—men's basketball (30), women's basketball (23), football (12), women's hockey (36) and wrestling (19).



Wisconsin Traditions

Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter


The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student-athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.

The Big Ten Conference is an association of 11 world-class universities whose member institutions share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. Intercollegiate athletics has an important place within the mission.

Founded in 1896, the Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics in student-athletes' lives and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness. Big Ten universities provide approximately \$94 million in direct financial aid to more than 8,400 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women. Conference institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.

Big Ten Universities

- are members of the nation's only conference whose constituency is entirely composed of institutions that are members of the AAU, a prestigious association of major academic and research institutions in the United States and Canada.
- have more than four million living alumni and over 300,000 undergraduate students attending Big Ten universities.
- house on their campuses 10 of the nation's 35 largest academic libraries. Collectively, conference libraries hold nearly 70 million bound volumes and the institutions work collaboratively to build and share their resources with other league members.

Big Ten Athletics

- Over the past two years, the Big Ten has reached a series of milestone media agreements to provide the conference with its greatest television exposure ever, including extensions with CBS (for basketball) and ABC/ESPN (for football, basketball and volleyball) and the creation of the Big Ten Network, a national network devoted to Big Ten athletic and academic programs.

The Big Ten Network operates 24 hours a day, 365 days a year since it launched in August of 2007. It will showcase a wide array of sports as well as original programming produced by conference institutions and represents a 20-year partnership between the Big Ten and Fox. The conference's new media agreements will result in the broadcast of more than 500 events nationally and regionally beginning with the 2007-08 academic year, compared to 300 events in the final year of the previous agreements.

- Since 1992, the Big Ten has created in excess of 2,000 new opportunities for women student-athletes and established 28 new women's teams.
- The NCAA collects two types of graduation rates—the federal graduation rate, which accounts for all entering freshmen who receive aid and graduate within six years, and the Graduation Success Rate (GSR), which reflects the mobility of student-athletes by accounting for transfers. Based on the most recent federal graduation rate average for the 1996-99 entering freshmen classes, Big Ten student-athletes graduated at 71 percent. In comparison, the student body at conference institutions graduated at 73 percent while all Division I student-athletes graduated at 62 percent. The Big Ten's GSR was 82 percent compared to the Division I average of 77 percent.
- The Big Ten recognized 2,018 Academic All-Big Ten honorees during the 2006-07 academic year, the highest total in the last decade. Over the past five years, the Conference has annually acknowledged more than 1,800 student-athletes as Academic All-Conference honorees.

BIG TEN NETWORK

Launched in August 2007, the Big Ten Network is dedicated to covering the Big Ten Conference and its 11 member institutions.

The Big Ten Network will provide unprecedented access to an extensive schedule of conference sports events and shows; original programs in academics, the arts and sciences; campus activities; and associated personalities. Sports programming will include live coverage of more major men's and women's events than ever before, along with news, highlights and analysis, all complemented by hours of university-produced campus programming.

The network is available to all cable and satellite carriers and television distributors nationwide, with most programs offered in stunning high-definition television. The Big Ten Network is a joint venture between subsidiaries of the Big Ten Conference and Fox Cable Networks.



• The Big Ten claimed seven team national championships during the 2006-07 season, just one shy of the conference record of eight national titles established during the 1955-56 campaign, while also finishing as the runner-up in five other sports. The Big Ten has earned at least four national crowns in eight of the last 10 seasons. Big Ten national champions in 2006-07 included Michigan State men's ice hockey, Minnesota wrestling, Northwestern women's lacrosse, Penn State fencing and men's gymnastics and Wisconsin women's ice hockey and men's indoor track and field. The conference has also produced team national crowns in the sports of basketball, cross country, field hockey, football, golf, soccer, softball, synchronized swimming, tennis and volleyball over the last decade.

• Big Ten Conference schools are among the national attendance leaders in football, men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball. During 2006-07, more than 8.7 million fans attended Big Ten home contests in those sports.

UW CHAMPS: A Program of Excellence

CHAMPS (Challenging Athletes' Minds for Personal Success) is a total development program that uses athletics as a preparation for success in life. Under the direction of Kelli Richards, the goal of the CHAMPS program is to support student development initiatives that enhance the quality of the student-athlete experience within the university setting.

The UW's CHAMPS program was selected as one of four 2005 Program of Excellence recipients. The award is presented annually to schools that have displayed a highly effective and pervasive program benefiting their student-athletes in the five components of the program.

CHAMPS provides support and opportunities for UW student-athletes in the following areas:

Athletic Excellence

- The student-athlete advisory committee (SAAC) works with the CHAMPS program to make sure all of the student-athletes' needs and concerns are being addressed.

Academic Excellence


- Through the Fetzer Academic Center, advisors, tutors, mentors and learning specialists are available to all student-athletes.
- A one-credit, 10-week course available to freshman and sophomore student-athletes discusses issues of transitioning to college such as career interests, diversity on campus, as well as identity development.
- Scholarships and internships are available through the NCAA for student-athletes continuing their education.
- The Academic Excellence Banquet is held each April to recognize the many academic achievements of our student-athletes.

Personal Development

- The UW CHAMPS program requires all student-athletes to attend three personal development activities each year.
- Workshops are offered for teams and larger groups on topics such as safe sex, fiscal responsibility, alcohol, peak performance, multiculturalism and many others.
- Opportunities for team and individual leadership development are also available through both the UW and the NCAA.

Career Development

- Workshops on various career topics are offered to student-athletes throughout the year. Topics include writing resumes and cover letters, interviewing tips, networking strategies, dining etiquette and job search strategies.



- Career assessment and career counseling is available for individuals as they work to declare a major and gain experience within their career field.



Did You Know?

► Madison is one of only a few cities in the world built on an isthmus. Downtown Madison is set on a narrow strip of land between two glacial lakes—Lake Mendota and Lake Monona. A total of five area lakes, plus more than 250 parks and 120 miles of designated bike routes within the city limits provide an abundance of year-round outdoor activities, from hiking, biking, swimming and sailing to cross-country skiing, ice skating, and ice fishing.

► The Wisconsin State Capitol is the city's signature landmark. No building in Madison may be built higher than the 284-foot white granite dome of the Capitol, which is modeled after our nation's Capitol.

► State Street, a one-mile pedestrian mall linking the Capitol Square to the beautiful lakeside campus of the University of Wisconsin, is lined with diverse ethnic eateries, eclectic boutiques, galleries, coffeehouses and more.

► Famed architect Frank Lloyd Wright spent his childhood years in Madison and returned to live in the area at the height of his international fame. The Madison area is home to a generous selection of Wright-designed buildings.



► Ecologist Aldo Leopold, conservation pioneer John Muir, playwright Thornton Wilder, novelist Jacquelyn Mitchard, actor/comedian Chris Farley, Olympians Beth and Eric Heiden, composer/performer Ben Sidran, professional golfers Jerry Kelly, Sherri Steinhauer and Steve Stricker and NASCAR's Matt Kenseth are other notable people associated with Madison.
