SAIL BOATS POPULAR THIS YEAR

The Jewell Boat Company reports an extremely good demand for sail boats this season. Walter Beauvais is shipping Beauvais Built Boats to many of the inland lakes. There is a big demand also for second hand Class "C' sail boats.

There seems to be a reason for the increase in the ancient sport of sailing due to the depression. A good sail boat costs from \$300 to \$600 and lasts for 25 years and costs nothing for operation, while a motor boat costs from \$1000 to \$3000 and burns up a lot of gasoline and oil.

To care for the increase in boat building and storage, Jewell Boat Co. will build an addition 35x80 feet this Fall, with concrete floors and modern facilities for handling boats will be installed.
