The Horticultural Dept. of the State, through its extension service, is offering to five Wisconsin Garden Clubs a special educational program. The primary object of this particular type of extension work is to help the amateur gardener arrive at a more complete understanding of the garden in relation to the home grounds.

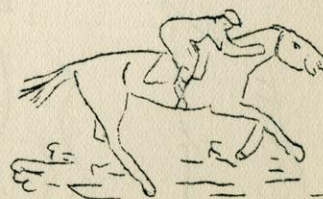

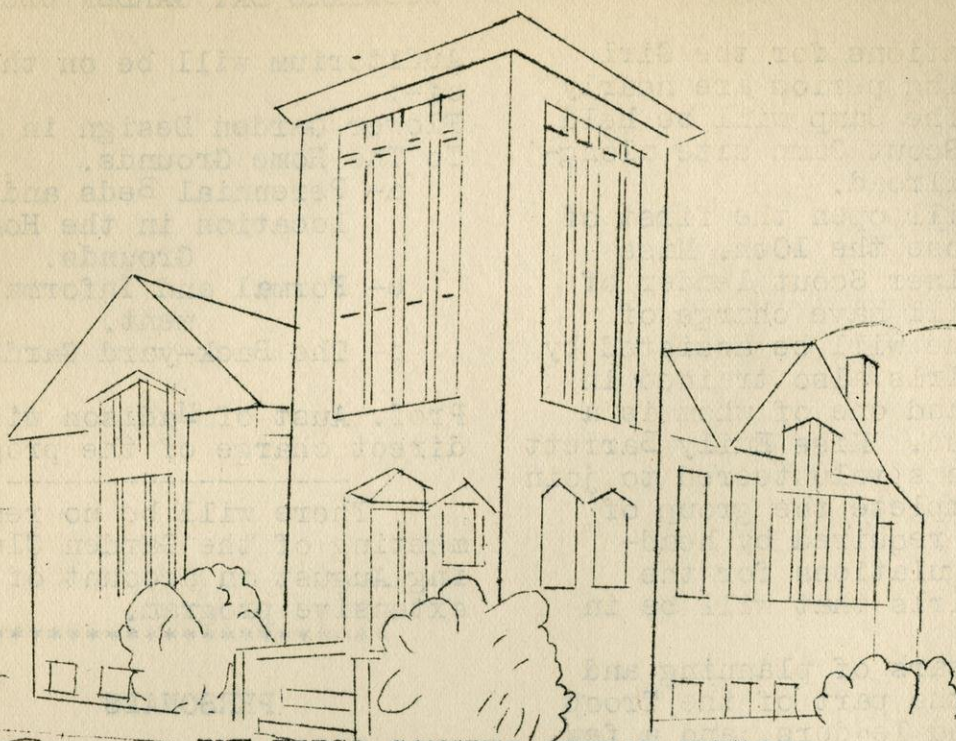

## SAIL BOATS POPULAR THIS YEAR

The Jewell Boat Company reports an extremely good demand for sail boats this season. Walter Beauvais is shipping Beauvais Built Boats to many of the inland lakes. There is a big demand also for second hand Class "C" sail boats.

There seems to be a reason for the increase in the ancient sport of sailing due to the depression. A good sail boat costs from \$300 to \$600 and lasts for 25 years and costs nothing for operation, while a motor boat costs from \$1000 to \$3000 and burns up a lot of gasoline and oil.

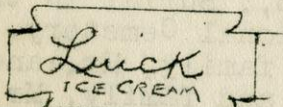

## CHAUNCEY GRIMM SOLVES A PROBLEM

The supply of water for sprinkling at Gentzel's "Shack" on the Lake Shore was inadequate to care for the spacious lawn. Grimm experimented with the little stream of water which runs back of the house and found that a siphon made of hose would carry a half inch stream from an additional spring into the creek. Later he made a siphon with the lawn hose from the creek and can now reach the entire lawn with a constant 3/4 inch stream for twenty-four hours a day. He also has found by measurement that about 3600 gals daily are thus spread over the lawn.

There probably are other little streams which can be utilized for sprinkling in a similar manner, during this extreme drouth.
