Regent Arveson attended the committee meetings on September 26 and submitted an explanation of his absence for the meeting on September 27.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board held on August 16, 1947, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Gelatt, Action No. 1 listed under the recommendations of the Director of Business and Finance (II. Report of Actions Taken) was accepted and approved.

ADDITIONAL RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE DIRECTOR OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

1. That the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign a letter of agreement with the Milwaukee Young Men's Christian Association covering the use of facilities in the Milwaukee YMCA Building by the University of Wisconsin Extension Division for physical education and recreational purposes during the period October 1, 1947 to April 1, 1948, at a rental of \$600 for the period.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Callahan, recommendation No. 1 listed under the additional recommendations of the Director of Business and Finance was adopted.

2. That the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign a cooperative agreement with the United States Geological Survey for a cooperative investigation of the water resources of the State of Wisconsin during the period July 1, 1947 to June 30, 1948. The agreement provides that each party will pay a maximum of \$14,000 for the work.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Callahan, recommendation No. 2 listed under the additional recommendations of the Director of Business and Finance was adopted.

The Secretary reminded the Regents that the regular meeting of the Regents to be held in October had been postponed to October 25, 1947.

The Secretary stated that communications had been received from the McCaffrey family expressing their thanks and appreciation for the Regents' kind expression of sympathy.

The Secretary stated that a letter had been received from Emeritus Professor Thomas L. Bewick expressing his appreciation to the Regents for his appointment as Emeritus Professor.

Regent Werner submitted the report of the Finance Committee. Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was

VOTED, That the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign contracts and leases in behalf of the Regents when the consideration is not in excess of \$2500 and is within the budget, and subject to the understanding that such actions will be reported to the Regents at each subsequent meeting.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to pay a fee of \$1500 to G. R. Willet & Company, Chicago, for services rendered to date as communications consultants and to employ G. R. Willet & Company as communications consultants on a per diem basis as needed, not exceeding ten days, at a fee of \$100 per day, including expenses.

Regent Jones submitted the report of the Constructional Development Committee. Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the request of the City of Madison for authority to construct a storm sewer from Arbor Vitae Drive to Lake Wingra through Arboretum property be approved, and that the President and Secretary be authorized to sign an easement or agreement granting such authority and setting forth such conditions under which the storm sewer may be constructed as the administrative officers of the University shall determine.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the recommendation of the Campus Planning Commission to locate the Enzyme Building on the eastern half of the present poultry area immediately west of the Blackhawk Garage on University Avenue be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Callahan, it was VOTED, That upon the recommendation of the State Chief Engineer, Mr. Lewis Siberz of Madison, Wisconsin, be employed as architect for the Enzyme Building.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the Wisconsin University Building Corporation be authorized to proceed with the construction of the Enzyme Laboratory Building and to borrow \$300,000 from the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation for this purpose to be amortized over a period of thirty years at an annual interest rate of 4%; that the President and Secretary be authorized to sign a memorandum agreement with the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation providing for the loaning of \$300,000 to the Wisconsin University Building Corporation for the construction of the Enzyme Building and providing for annual grants by the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation to the University sufficient to cover the amortization of the loan over a period of thirty years; that the President and Secretary be authorized to sign a lease to the Wisconsin University Building Corporation for a term of thirty years covering the site to be used for the Enzyme Building; and that the President and Secretary be authorized to sign a lease covering the leasing of the land and the Enzyme Building from the Wisconsin University Building Corporation to The Regents of the University of Wiscon sin at an annual rental sufficient to amortize the principal and to pay the interest over a period of thirty years.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That upon recommendation of Dean Baldwin, the contract for a drilled well at the Gugel Farm be awarded to Mr. E. L. Niffenegger of Monroe, Wisconsin, on the basis of his unit price bid with an estimated total cost of \$2020, and that the transfer of \$2500 from Fund 3-K to Fund 11 Revolving Fund Surpluses to cover the cost of this project be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the action taken by the Director of Business and Finance in rejecting the bids for a steam tunnel and piping on Linden Drive be approved, and that authority be granted to re-advertise for bids for replacing the piping in the present tunnel on Linden Drive.

Regent Kleczka submitted the following report of the Personnel Committee:

"The Personnel Committee of the Board of Regents has given careful consideration to the recommendation of the President that Professor John Guy Fowlkes be appointed Dean of the School of Education.

The Committee endorses the recommendation of the President and now recommends to the Board of Regents that Mr. Fowlkes be appointed Dean of the School of Education and Professor of Education, this appointment to be effective October 1, salary to be at the rate of \$10,500 on a twelve months' basis."

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Grady, it was VOTED, That John Guy Fowlkes be appointed Dean of the School of Education and Professor of Education, effective October 1, 1947, at a salary of \$10,500, on the twelve months' basis.

Regent Werner presented the following testimonial to the life and services of the late M. E. McCaffrey.

"Maurice E. McCaffrey served as Secretary of the Regents of the University of Wisconsin from 1906 to 1946, and at the request of the Regents, continued to serve as Trust Officer in charge of investments and property acquisitions until his sudden death on August 24, 1947.

Mr. McCaffrey served the University and the State with an efficiency and faithfulness that knew no limit. His effective and prudent management of University trust and loan funds produced substantial income for student aid and other University purposes while at the same time safeguarding and augmenting the principal of the funds.

One of Mr. McCaffrey's most cherished objectives for the University was the acquisition and development of the Arboretum. The land for this great out-door laboratory was acquired largely through his untiring efforts. He loved to tramp through the Arboretum fields and woods, to drive over its winding roads, and to listen sympathetically to the plans and reports of University scientists who use the Arboretum for scientific research. Significantly, on the morning of the day of his death he and Mrs. McCaffrey enjoyed a pleasure drive through the Arboretum.

It was in his public and personal relations that Mr. McCaffrey best portrayed his sterling character and his love for his fellow men. People naturally turned to him for advice and counsel. He was never too busy to give generously of his time to students, faculty, business office colleagues, and fellow citizens who sought his counsel. He was the confidente of the Regents for more than forty years and in that capacity contributed immeasurably to the growth and development of the University.

The Regents express their heartfelt tribute and deep appreciation for Mr. McCaffrey's long and inspiring record of faithful service to the University and the State. Therefore, be it resolved that this testimonial be spread upon the official records of the University and that the Secretary present a properly attested copy to Mr. McCaffrey's widow."

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, the above testimonial was unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

Regent Campbell suggested to the members of the press who were present that in order that it would be clearly understood that the University did not have funds available for such special projects in the regular budget, they indicate in their press releases that the funds for the construction of the Enzyme Building are being provided by the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation. Regent Jones observed that the members of the press had in the past provided accurate reporting of the actions taken by the Regents, that he felt confident they would continue to do so, and that Regent Campbell's suggestion was well taken.
