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REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS

Madison, Wisconsin

Wednesday, October 11, 1933, 9 A.M.

PRESENT: President Frank; Regents Backus, Callahan, Christopherson, Combs, Drexler, Eimon, Grady, Gundersen, Mead, Runge, Sholts, Ullsperger, Wilkie.

ABSENT: Regents Baker, Berger, Clausen.

Regent Baker was present for the committee meetings on October 10 and communications were received from Regents Berger and Clausen in explanation of their absence.

The reading of the minutes of the meeting held on August 2, 1933, was dispensed with and the minutes were approved as sent out to the Regents.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

- General -

1. V That Professor M. Palyi, formerly of the Handelshochschule of Berlin, be appointed <u>Carl Schurz lecturer</u>, during the first semester of 1933-34; salary **250** net for the period; charge to Carl Schurz fund. Adopted.

- Letters and Science -

1. That the salary of Hazel Grace Ramsay, assistant in history, be increased from \$500 to \$600 for the academic year 1933-34, less

waiver \$76, net \$524, on account of increased teaching; charge increase, \$84, to Regents' Unassigned. Adopted.

The matter of cooperating with the State and United States Government in a building program was discussed and upon motion of Regent Backus, seconded by Regent Christopherson, the following resolution was adopted, Regent Grady voting "No":

RESOLVED, That the construction projects and approximate costs described in annexed schedule are hereby authorized and approved subject to being financed as part of the National Recovery Act program by the United States Govern-The Executive and Finance Committees are authorized ment. through any proper agent or agencies to complete in cooperation with the Governor of this state and other state officials all necessary arrangements to secure the necessary funds from the United States Government and to fix and establish such fees or charges in connection with said buildings and for the use of same as shall insure the repayment to the United States Government of the sums advanced for such construction to the extent that same may be required to be repaid together with interest thereon. At this point Regent Wilkie requested Regent Callahan to Regent Wilkie then presented the following resolution:

preside.

MOVED, That the schedule of salary waivers as adopted by the special committee on waivers on August 4, 1933, shall be changed and modified so that the scale of waivers shall be graduated from 12% to $27\frac{1}{2}\%$ in total effect on salaries according to the schedule hereto attached, the maximum waiver on the first \$1,000 of any salary not to exceed 12% and the maximum waiver in total effect on any salary not to exceed $27\frac{1}{2}\%$ and the rate on the \$1,000 between \$7,000 and \$8,000 to be approximately 36.5 and above \$8,000 the graduation to ascend so that the total actual waiver on any salary shall not exceed $27\frac{1}{2}\%$.

Exemptions shall be allowed substantially as follows:

On salary or compensation of married men whose wives are not employed and who have one or more dependent children under 18 years of age, an exemption from waiver of annual compensation of \$500 and \$300 for each such dependent child, said amounts to be taken from lowest part of salary and waiver applicable thereto.

Same exemption for women who have dependent children and who do not have employed husbands.

On salaries or compensation of those whose time or compensation has been reduced during 1933 and applicable to the year 1933-34 no waiver shall be exacted if the cut in earnings for 1933-34 has been equal or greater than the waiver under above schedule and if less than such waiver then the waiver shall be for the difference.

In adjusting the waivers of compensation of janitors, any conflict with Sec. 36.07 Wis. Statutes shall be avoided.

The executive committee and finance committee arc directed to modify the waiver schedule so as to comply as near as may be with above directions and shall make adjustments on all salary or compensation payments since July 1st to conform to the revised schedule. The matter of establishing the final schedule of waivers in accordance with above directions for the year 1933 to 1934 and making adjustments so that same shall relate back to July 1, 1933, is referred to executive committee with power to act.

The matter of adjusting time cuts or cuts in compensation is likewise referred to executive and finance committees with power to act by way of revision of the budget in this respect with the direction that so far as possible the underlying spirit and principles of the National Recovery Act shall be applied.

The motion was seconded by Regent Drexler.

Upon motion of Regent Ullsperger, seconded by Regent Backus, the following resolution was presented as a substitute for the Wilkie resolution:

MOVED, That the Executive Committee, and the Finance Committee if deemed advisable by the Executive Committee, be empowered, in cooperation with the President and the Business Manager to correct as far as possible any undue hardships that may occur in the present budget.

Called vote was then taken upon the adoption of the substitute resolution. Regents voting "Aye", Backus, Callahan, Christopherson, Combs, Drexler, Eimon, Grady, Gundersen, Mead, Runge, Sholts, Ullsperger; Regent Wilkie voted "No".

The substitute resolution was adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Mead, seconded by Regent Ullsperger, it was

VOTED, That the Department of Dormitories and Commons be authorized to sell 3.2 beer in the Union and VRefectory. Regent Sholts voted "No".

The Regents then went into executive session.

President Frank discussed the matter of retirement of members of the faculty and stated that he had no definite recommendation for retirement at this time. Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded Regent Sholts, it was

 $\sqrt{$ VOTED, That the Dean of the Extension Division be directed to submit a balanced budget at this time, not taking into account the matter of retirement of a member of the staff.

Regent Gundersen, as chairman of the Medical Committee, presented a recommendation of the Medical School providing for additional service in the student health department. Upon motion of Regent Gundersen, seconded by Regent Ullsperger, the recommendation was disapproved, Regent Grady voting "No".

Regent Grady then presented the following motion, seconded by Regent/Callahan:

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That the President and the Dean of the Medical School be requested to effect budgetary adjustments in the staff and salaries so as to create a sum sufficient to provide for a chief of the student health department and that the President of the University be requested to promptly fill such position by appointment.

The motion was lost.

Regent Backus presented the request of the Dean of the Law School for an additional appointment for next year. It was VOTED, That this matter be referred to the Law Committee for report at the next meeting of the Board.


