



Badgers Host Hawkeyes in Final Home Game for Alvarez

Wisconsin (8-2, 5-2 Big Ten) will host Iowa (5-4, 3-3) today at 80,321-seat Camp Randall Stadium. Kickoff is set for 2:30 p.m. CST.

The game will be televised live by ESPN (Mark Jones, Chris Spielman and Erin Andrews).

The game also can be heard live on the 45-city Wisconsin Radio Network (Matt Lepay and Mike Lucas). WIBA (1310 AM, 101.5 FM) is the rightsholder in Madison. Wisconsin Public Television (Mike Heller and Scott Nelson) will also air its tape-delay telecast of the game tonight at 10:30 p.m. CST.

Wisconsin fell out of a first-place tie in the Big Ten after its 35-14 loss at Penn State last Saturday. RB Brian Calhoun scored his school-record 22nd TD of the season, while QB John Stocco threw for 313 yards. Penn State jumped out to a 21-0 lead and the Badgers never got closer than 14 points.

Iowa, under the direction of seventh-year head coach Kirk Ferentz, dropped a last-minute 28-27 decision at Northwestern last Saturday. The Wildcats scored two touchdowns in the final 2:10 of the game to pull out the victory. The loss dropped the Hawkeyes to 5-4 overall and 3-3 in conference play.

UW-lowa Series Info

The all-time series between the two schools is tied at 39-39-2 ... UW head coach Barry Alvarez, an Iowa assistant coach from 1979-86, is 5-8 vs. the Hawkeyes (he lost his first five against Iowa, then won the next five and has lost the last three) ... UW defensive coordinator Bret Bielema played (for Hayden Fry) and coached (for Fry and Kirk Ferentz) at Iowa ... the two schools battle annually for the Heartland Trophy ... Wisconsin freshman LB Elijah Hodge is the younger brother of Iowa LB Abdul Hodge ... some of the most significant games in Wisconsin history have come against the Hawkeyes: in 1969 UW snapped a 23-game winless streak with a 23-17 win over Iowa ... in 1997 the Badgers ended an 18-game losing skid vs. Iowa with a 13-10 win ... in 1999 the Badgers clinched the Big Ten title and Ron Dayne set the Division I NCAA rushing record during a 41-3 win over Iowa.

Senior Day

Today is "Senior Day" at Wisconsin. Sixteen Badger senior players will take part in their final game at Camp Randall Stadium.

The current senior class (past four seasons) owns a 32-17 (.653) record with appearances in the 2002 Alamo Bowl,


2003 Music City Bowl and 2005 Outback Bowl.

Good Run

Despite last Saturday's loss at Penn State, the Badgers can still gain a share of the Big Ten title if both Ohio State and Penn State lose another conference game and the Badgers defeat Iowa.


A win today over Iowa would give Wisconsin a combined 12-4 conference record over the past two seasons. If that happens, Michigan, which enters this weekend with a two-year mark of 11-3, is the only Big Ten school that could equal or better the Badgers.

End of an Era

Today marks Wisconsin head coach Barry Alvarez's final game on the sidelines at Camp Randall Stadium.

Alvarez will attempt to become the first Badger coach to win his final home game since John Coatta did so in 1969 (55-14 over Illinois).

UW is looking for its sixth nine-win season of coach Barry Alvarez's 16-year tenure. Wisconsin has won nine games in a season eight times in its history. The Badgers still have a chance to tie the school record for wins in a season with 11.

For the second consecutive season. Alvarez is a semifinalist for the George Munger national coach of the year award, presented by the Maxwell Football Club.

Barry Alvarez: In His Own Words

To commemorate his final home game as the Badgers' head coach. Barry Alvarez sat down with the Gameday Program for a Q&A. The transcript follows:

What are your memories from your first game at Camp Randall?

I remember coming to the game sitting with Dan McCarney and driving down a street that looked like it was vacated on the way to the stadium. Lalso remember playing a good Cal team. Our kids were really cranked. We jumped on them early. Two officials' calls really hurt us. We probably should have been up 14-0. I don't know if they could have come back. We had some things happen to us. An interception as we were going in for a touchdown, things we couldn't overcome. That Cal team went on to win seven games that year. Our kids played hard and really started fast but we just couldn't overcome some adversity.

Has the feeling you get when you run out of the tunnel before a game changed from that first game until now?

I still get excited. The fact that you have big crowds now. You have people in the tunnel waiting for you. Back then it was you through the tunnel. It was a different feeling back then. But I still get excited taking the field for a big game. I still get the butterflies like I did when I was a kid playing.

What has changed the most from when you started?

I just think the fans that come to the games are into the game. We've turned this into a happening, it's not just a game. You know the place is going to be full. The students, really from the time we took over until now, the student section has grown to the point where they're really a big part of it and are really engaged in the game. That gives a personality to the rest of the stadium and the rest of the

Probably the first time was when we beat Ohio State in '92

B arry Alvarez, the winningest football coach in Wisconsin history, has completed 15 seasons at the head of the program he transformed from a perennial second-division finisher to one that is nationally respected and is a fixture on the postseason bowl scene.

Alvarez, whose overall record with the Badgers is 108-70-4, became Visconsin's Director of Athletics in April of 2004. He is one of just two people (UAB's Watson Brown) at the Division I level who serves as head football coach and athletic director.

Alvarez's list of accomplishments at Wisconsin is remarkable. Consider just a few of the most notable ...

- winningest coach in school history
- coached three Big Ten and Rose Bowl champions
- only Big Ten coach ever to win the Rose Bowl in consecutive seasons
- just the 10th coach in Big Ten history with 100 victories at one conference institution
- has coached five national award winners, including Ron Dayne (Heisman, Doak Walker, Maxwell), Jamar Fletcher (Jim Thorpe) and Kevin Stemke (Ray Guy)
- guided UW to back-to-back Big Ten titles in 1998 and 1999 (hadn't happened at Wisconsin since 1896-97)
 bowl record of 7-3 (.700)
- bowl record of 7-3 (.700)



coached the three winningest teams in school history

When Alvarez arrived in Madison in 1990, Wisconsin had compiled a 9-36 record during the previous four seasons and attendance at Camp Randall Stadium had dipped to an average of 41,734 per game (54 percent of capacity). The program sorely needed a boost and got it when new Director of Athletics Pat Richter hired Alvarez from Notre Dame, where he had been an assistant coach under Lou Holtz.

Alvarez's coaching career began at the high school level. He served as an assistant at Lincoln (Neb.) Northeast High from 1971-73 before taking over as head coach at Lexington (Neb.) High from 1974-75. His last prep coaching stop was at Mason City (Iowa) High where he was head coach from 1976-78 and where his team won a 4A state title in his final year.

Iowa's Hayden Fry hired Alvarez as an assistant coach in 1979. The Hawkeyes played in six bowl games (two Rose Bowls) during Alvarez's eight years in Iowa City, compiling a 61-33-1 mark in the process. Alvarez's standout player with the Hawkeyes was LB Larry Station, a two-time All-American and two-time Academic All-American.

Alvarez left Iowa after the 1986 season to become linebackers coach at Notre Dame. He was promoted (linebackers to defensive coordinator to assistant head coach) by Holtz each of his three seasons as the Fighting Irish went 32-5 and won the 1988 national title. While in South Bend, Alvarez coached All-America linebackers Michael Stonebreaker, Ned Bolcar, Cedric Figaro and Wes Pritchett.

Alvarez grew up in Langeloth, Pa., a small town among the coal mines and steel mills in western Pennsylvania. He starred as a prep linebacker and went on to play at Nebraska (1965-67) for leg-

endary head coach Bob Devaney. Alvarez was the leading tackler for the 1967 Cornhuskers, who led the nation in total defense and created a school-record 40 turnovers. Alvarez played in both the Sugar and Orange Bowls at Nebraska (the Cornhuskers were 25-7 during his three varsity seasons). Alvarez earned his bachelor's degree in 1969 and added a master's degree in 1971, both from Nebraska.

Alvarez's family includes his wife, Cindy, daughters Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson) and Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer), son Chad (wife Stephanie), grandsons Joe and Jake Ferguson and Jackson Delzer, and granddaughter Grace Delzer.

- Alvarez set a goal to become a collegiate head coach by his 42nd birthday and was named to the Wisconsin post three days after he turned 42.
- Alvarez added administrative duties to his job description in 2000 when he was named Associate Athletic Director. He became Wisconsin's Director of Athletics in April 2004, operating in a dual role as football coach as well.
- Alvarez grew up in a small mining town (Langeloth) in western Pennsylvania. He played all sports as a kid and idolized former Pittsburgh Pirates outfielder Roberto Clemente.
- Babcock Hall, which houses the UW-Madison's nationally acclaimed

- dairy school, developed an ice cream flavor in honor of the Badger head coach in 1994. It was named Berry Alvarez, and the flavor was a mixture of raspberry, strawberry and blueberry.
- Alvarez, a big baseball fan, helped honor former Chicago Cubs' announcer Harry Caray by singing "Take me out to the ballgame" during a seventh-inning stretch in May of 1999.
- Alvarez was a finalist for ESPN's
 College Football Coach of the
 Decade Award in 1999. He was one
 of 18 coaches named to a new position in 1990 and is the only one still
 at the school that hired him.
- Barry Alvarez got his college coaching start with Hayden Fry at Iowa in 1979, one season after leading Mason City High School to the 4A state championship. One of the staffs of which Alvarez was a member featured six men who went on to lead their own college programs: Alvarez; Kirk Ferentz, Iowa; Dan McCarney, Iowa State; Del Miller,

CHANCELLOR JOHN D. WILEY



hancellor John D. Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at the Jniversity of Wisconsin-Madison and eceived master's and doctoral degrees n physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He joined the technical staff of Bell Telephone Laboratories at Murray Hill, N.J., from 1968 to 1974, and then spent a year at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany, as a recipient of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Teaching.

Wiley joined the UW-Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in 1975. His research and teaching focused on a variety of topics related to semiconductors and other materials, and processes important to the electronics field. He is a co-founder of several highly successful research centers, including the Center for X-ray Lithography and the Engineering Research Center for Plasma-Aided Manufacturing. From 1982 to 1986, he chaired the Materials Science Program, a graduate-level, interdepartmental-committee program for master's and doctoral degrees.

From 1986 to 1989, Wiley served as associate dean for research in the College of Engineering, with oversight responsibility for all aspects of graduate study, grant submission, agency liaison, research infrastructure and centers, and technology transfer. From 1989 to 1994, he was dean of the UW-Madison Graduate School and the university's senior research officer.

Prior to his appointment to the university's top position, Wiley served as provost and vice chancellor for academ-

ic affairs, which carries the responsibility of chief operating officer and deputy chancellor. As provost, he worked closely with deans, faculty, academic staff and student committees in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution.

Wiley was named UW-Madison's 27th chancellor on January 1, 2001. As chancellor, he has aimed to enhance the university's role in creating a new, more viable economic future for Wisconsin while opening avenues to innovation and learning. He also has worked to amplify the Wisconsin Idea—the belief that the boundaries of the campus are the boundaries of the state and beyond—and to build on the research and teaching strengths that have made the university so rich in accomplishment and tradition.

Wiley has presided over unprecedented growth on the west side of the campus, which is being transformed into one of the nation's great health-sciences centers. He also has mapped an east-side redevelopment that will create a vibrant arts-and-humanities district to anchor the lower State Street area, with an expanded Elvehjem Museum of Art, new classroom buildings and additional music-performance space. Wiley believes that the arts and humanities are an integral component of the research enterprise.

"Nurturing an environment of creativity—encompassing industry, the arts and individual expression—is important for attracting and keeping these very mobile, highly sought, knowledge-based workers within our borders," Wiley says.

The chancellor has been a leader in efforts to expand on-campus student housing to meet demand, stem high-risk drinking and integrate athletics into the mainstream of university life. Wiley has reached out to the private sector by creating the Office of Corporate Relations to serve the increasing needs of the business community and to help build a more prosperous Wisconsin economy.

"The Wisconsin Idea offers a shared medium through which we can help the state achieve its maximum potential as a participant in a world economy that embraces learning and the advancement of knowledge as much as it does material production," he says. Camp Randall Stadium has the look of a winner, with its updated fan-friendly atmosphere. The stadium is a source of Wisconsin pride, but it is our fans and their rich history of loyalty that makes any Badger sporting event a truly special occasion.

Our student-athletes are also winners – on and off the field. On the playing fields, we've had many victories and championships to celebrate. And in the classroom, 186 Badger athletes registered a grade-point average of better than 3.5. Nearly one-quarter of our student athletes were Academic All-Big Ten honorees in 2004-05.

I am committed to helping ensure that our teams achieve the highest standards of excellence, not just in competition, but also in integrity, values and character.

In addition, athletics offers the university another opportunity to connect with alumni and friends.

GREAT MOMENTS IN CAMP RANDALL HISTORY

CAMP RANDA GELEBRATO LEGACY

Each week this season, Wisconsin will be celebrating the Greatest Moments in Camp Randall Stadium history as voted on by you, the fans. The winning memories will be depicted on commemorative six-packs of Coca-Cola bottles in stores around the state this fall. This week, we remember Nov. 13, 1999 as Ron Dayne broke the NCAA all-time rushing record and UW clinched its second consecutive Rose Bowl berth.

To help us look back on this great moment, we have reprinted an excerpt from "Tales From the Wisconsin Badgers," a new book written by UW Director of Athletic Communications Justin Doherty detailing some of the best stories from UW football history.

The Perfect Day

Former Wisconsin director of athletics Pat Richter said it was like theater. That may be, but what scriptwriter could possibly have dreamed up the chain of events that took place in Camp Randall Stadium on an unseasonably warm November afternoon in 1999?

Everyone—coaches, players, fans, media-knew what was at stake as the ninth-ranked Badgers prepared all week to host Iowa. A Michigan victory over Penn State, combined with a Wisconsin win over the Hawkeyes, would give the Badgers their second straight Big Ten title (this time undisputed) and send them back to the Rose Bowl. In addition, tailback Ron Dayne, his drive to the Heisman Trophy continuing to gain momentum, needed just 99 yards to become the NCAA Division I-A career rushing leader. The sense of anticipation in Madison that week was undeniable.

"Coming in [toward the stadium] on the bus, you could feel the excitement," assistant coach Jeff Horton recalled. "It was just different coming in. You could tell it was cranked up even more than normal. People were on the streets and were well into their



partying. When we stepped off the bus, there was a big crowd there to see us."

The game was set for a 2:30 p.m. start. ABC was in town to televise the game, and the contest began with a clear sky and 67-degree weather at kickoff.

The Badgers had not even scored yet when the first cheer of the day swept through the crowd of 79,404.

Early in the first quarter it was announced that Michigan had upset Penn State, giving the Badgers the chance to win the league title outright.

Wisconsin struggled to move the ball on its first possession of the game but moved out to a 13-0 first-quarter lead after scoring drives of 80 and 73 yards. Iowa opened the second-quarter scoring with a field goal before quarterback Brooks Bollinger hit Chris Chambers with a 24-yard touchdown pass for a 20-3 Wisconsin lead. Next up was the record.

Dayne had rushed for 76 yards when Wisconsin took possession of the ball with 4:40 remaining in the first half. On first-and-10 from the Wisconsin 17-yard line, the Badgers called a 23 Zone play, and 31 yards later Dayne had bypassed the career rushing record that had been set by Texas's Ricky Williams just a year earlier.

"[Fullback] Chad Kuhns told me, 'You can't do it without me.'" Dayne said after the game. "We ran 23-something, we got a couple names for it. When I broke out and then got up, Chad and everybody was around me."

Fans at the game that day will also recall a streaker who raced the length of the field during the stoppage that immediately followed Dayne's record run.

All that remained was finishing off the Hawkeyes, and the Badgers did that

by scoring once more in the first half for a 27-3 lead at the break before adding a pair of touchdowns in the second half.

Dayne rushed for 216 yards on 27 carries. Bollinger, who later called the game "the best football atmosphere I've ever been around," added 113 rushing yards and a touchdown to go along with 9-for-12 passing for 144 yards and three touchdowns. Wisconsin limited Iowa to just 247 yards in total offense.

As the clocked ticked down, head coach Barry Alvarez, who had spent much of the season watching games from press boxes due to knee problems, made his way to the field on crutches. Alvarez and Dayne found each other on the Badger sideline and embraced.

"I'll never forget that big smile of his," Alvarez said after the game. "When you go down to the sideline and see him smiling and trying to work his way over to me, you'll always have that picture in your mind."



- KSU was 22-6 (11-2 in '02 and 11-4 in '03) during Bielema's two years there.
- Helped Kansas State to its first-ever Big 12 title in '03.

UW ATHLETIC DEPARTMENT SENIOR STAFF

Jamie Pollard Deputy Athletic Director



Jamie Pollard was named Deputy Athletic Director for the UW-Madison in 2003 and in that role serves as the No. 2. administrator in the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics. He is responsible for the overall administration

of the Badgers' 23-sport, \$72 million athletic department. In addition, he represents Barry Alvarez at all national, conference and university meetings when necessary.

Prior to being named Deputy Athletic Director, Pollard served as the division's Chief Financial Officer and Senior Associate Athletic Director. He developed a comprehensive strategic financial plan ("Keeping Big Red in the Black") that increased the division's operating reserve to \$7 million and allowed the university to move forward on the \$109 milion renovation of Camp Randall Stadium. He also assisted with the development of the school's inaugural preferential seating program

that is generating more than \$9 million annually for the athletic program and he helped negotiate a multi-year, multi-million dollar contract for media and marketing rights that is one of the largest collegiate contracts in the country.

Pollard has also been the sports administrator for the men's and women's basketball programs since 2001-02. During that time the men's basketball program won back-to-back Big Ten championships, the 2004 Big Ten Tournament and advanced to the 2005 Elite Eight. He also served as the Tournament Manager when the university hosted the 2002 NCAA Men's Basketball Midwest Regional.

In the fall of 2003, Pollard was selected by Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal as a recipient of its "Top Forty Under 40" Award. It is given annually to the 40 most influential and creative individuals in sports under the age of 40. Pollard is the first intercollegiate sports administrator ever honored by the magazine.


Pollard has served as the President for the Collegiate Athletic Business Managers Association (CABMA) and was chosen by his peers as the 2002 Business Manager of the Year.

He was appointed by UW-Madison Chancellor John D. Wiley to serve as the campus chair of the Partners in Giving campaign that benefits more than 300 non-profit organizations. Pollard led the 2004 campaign for the University, which resulted in 4,500 employees donating \$1.46 million. Both the number of donors and donation levels were records for the institution.

His other intercollegiate administration experience came as Associate AD for Administration at Maryland (1994-98) and Associate AD for Internal Operations at St. Louis (1989-94). In both roles, he assisted with balancing budgets and creating reserves while helping implement gender equity plans.

In addition to his role at Wisconsin, Pollard founded Collegiate Financial Services, LLC, a private data research company that provided strategic financial planning and research services to athletic administrators, university presidents and conference commissioners

Pollard, who was the 1987 NCAA Division III national champion in the 5,000meter run and a two time Division III All-American, has a B.S. degree in business administration from UW-Oshkosh (1987). He is in that school's athletic hall of fame. Pollard and his wife, Ellen, have four children, (Thomas, Annie, Maggie and James).

Doug Beard begins his fourth year on the UW senior-level administrative team as associate athletic director for administration. Beard supervises the men's and women's hockey, event operations, food and beverage service,

business and finance, human resources, compliance and sports medicine units.

Beard joined the UW staff in 2001 as assistant AD for event management as well as helping administer the departments internal operations. He was promoted to associate AD in 2002. Before coming to Wisconsin, Beard worked at UW-Milwaukee from 1989-2001 and UW-Stout from 1987-89.





THE BARRY ALVAREZ YEARS



In His Own Words

(continued from pg. 5) - That was our first big win over a ranked team. I think we were 4-1 at that time with still a lot of young guys. I felt we really were very close at that time, real close to turning it around.

When did talks of a stadium renovation start?

I think Pat [Richter] and Al Fish started talking about that, I can't even remember. Al and I were just talking about it the other day. He did something on a napkin, I would guess around '97 or '98, somewhere in that area, where he had some initial ideas on a napkin that he saved and he has saved next to a picture of the renovation.

Was there a point in the time between those initial discussions and when the renovation was completed where you got frustrated with the process?

They dug a hole right outside my office and it seemed like forever. You'd hear the jackhammers and you'd see a big hole and a month later they would fill it up. You never saw any progress, you just saw different holes being dug and wiring and different things. I didn't know what they were doing. You never really saw anything done, you just saw different places being torn up. And then all of a sudden it just stopped and it looked like a half completed job.



Head coach Barry Alvarez will be coaching in his 102nd and final game at Camp Randall today. Wisconsin has compiled a 67-31-3 home record under Alvarez.

To commemorate the final season under head coach Barry Alvarez, the Badger Gameday Football Program has highlighted coach Alvarez in each of the publications this season. The final installment is a Q&A with the head coach as he prepared for his final home game, today vs. lowa.

It got frustrating for a while and you wondered if this was ever really going to happen. And then when we shut it down after 9/11, then you really wondered whether it would ever happen.

Do those memories make it sweeter to see how it all turned out?

Yeah, it really does. Because after having some doubt and really being in question, to all of a sudden sit back and see the finished product being even better than I would anticipate really is satisfying.

What are your impressions about how the renovation turned out?

I think it turned out just fabulous. The thing that sticks out in my mind is that it really services a large group of people. The renovation services our fans, provides a tremendous service for our coaching staff, the administration, all the other coaches, our athletes. Not only with the playing facility but also the training table and all the things that come with it. And then the fans for years and years to come. That's the thing that touches me. This really affects a lot of people.

When you started did you think you could bring back the fans and what was your plan to do so?

The students were first. In the early years we really tried to work the student body. I had coaches assigned to every dorm, fraternity and sorority house, just to get their interest. One summer I sent out my grad assistants to high school coaches in the state that had players playing for us with ticket information and encourage them to put a bustogether and support their athlete. We tried everything. We tried to get people in the stands, fannies in the seats. But it all started with the students.

When you got here what kind of fan base was there to work with?

We were starting from scratch really. I think people were really disgruntled with the program. They didn't have a good taste in their mouth. We weren't going to be a good team for a while. They weren't going to come and see great football. It was a work in progress when we first started.





How important has the fan support been to the growth of the program?

It's invaluable. It's very important. Without the fan base that we have we couldn't do the things in our athletic department that we've been able to do in all sports, not just football. But this is the engine that drives the train. We're able to do it because of the tremendous fan base we have.

When you came in as football coach, you had to work from the ground up. Moving to Director of Athletics, the department is in pretty good shape. What are the biggest challenges facing the department in the coming years?

I think not being complacent and continuing to move the department forward and being progressive thinkers. We need to continually try to make improvements where they're needed, to strive for excellence in the department and never be satisfied.

Do you have any idea what your emotions will be like today when you walk out of the tunnel?

The way I've tried to approach this season is that I've tried to take it one game at a time. We still have two more games after this one but it is the last one in this stadium. I'm sure there will be some special feelings just because of the time that's been spent here and some of the memories and experiences that we've had here that have been so special. But right now I'm just trying to concentrate and focus on getting our guys ready to play a good Iowa team.

People say the mark of a successful coach is leaving the program in better shape than you inherited it. How important is that to you?

That's the reason that I took the route that I did in announcing my retirement, because I didn't want the program to take a step backwards. I wanted it to continue. I didn't want to lose a recruiting class. I wanted to make it an easy transition for the players, as easy as possible. And I think we've been able to do that. It's been very important to me especially since I'm staying. As Pat told me, "If you want to be a good athletic director, make sure the football program doesn't slip."

What are some of the games at Camp Randall that really stick out for you?

The Dayne game (in 1999). He breaks the record and we clinch the Rose Bowl, an outright Big Ten championship. Probably the Penn State game the year before that when we clinched the championship. The night we broke Ohio State's winning streak (in 2003). I think the Michigan game this year was a big win for us. Those are some that come right off the top of my head. The Michigan win in '93, with the student avalanche. I think that really showed that we could be a championship-caliber team.

Will you have any time to take a step back and reflect on what you've accomplished here?

Some time when the season's over I'll just sit back and kind of think about it a little bit and reflect on all the players and all the coaches and all the people that had a hand in all we've accomplished here.

What will you miss most about coaching?

The thing I'll probably miss most is celebrating big victories. Being with the people and the players and coaches and enjoying a big victory.

Who are some of the people that have helped you during your time here?

The person I lean on most is my wife. She's the one that doesn't let me get too high or too low. She always tries to keep me grounded. I've always tried to bounce things off of other coaches. Lou Holtz is one. Frank Solich and I have been friends and shared things with each other. I've had some close friends in the community that have always been very supportive. And my staff. I've always had a good relationship with my staff and relied on them for a lot of input.

Is there anything you would like to say to the fans?

I think probably more than anything else is that it's been a good run. I can't thank them enough for the support they've given us and the opportunity they've given me and my family and this program because they've allowed us to accomplish what we have accomplished. It's been a heck of a run and they've been a vital part of it.

WISCONSIN TRADITIONS

Badger nickname

The athletic teams' nickname (Badgers) was borrowed from the state. The territory was initially dubbed the "Badger" state. The reason for the moniker was not because of badgers in this region, but instead because of an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Prospectors came to the state looking for minerals. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides according to folklore.

Bucky Badger

Badgers in various forms have been recognized as the school mascot for decades. The version currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white striped sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by artist Art Evans. At that time, the badger went by names like Benny, Buddy, Bernie, Bobby and Bouncey. Art Lentz, the department's publicity director, had the idea to bring the mascot to life.

The original badger mascot was too vicious to control. On more than one occasion, the live badger escaped his handlers. It was decided in the interest

of fan and player safety that Wisconsin's mascot be retired to the Madison Zoo. The Badger Yearbook replaced the live badger with a small raccoon named Regdab (badger spelled backwards) and passed it off as a "badger in a raccoon coat."

In 1949, a student in the university's art department, Connie Conrad, was hired to mold a paper-mache badger head. Cheerleader Bill Sagal, of Plymouth, Wis., was directed by homecoming chair Bill Sachse, to wear the outfit at the homecoming game. A contest was staged to name the mascot. The winner was Buckingham U. Badger, or Bucky. The name came from the lyrics in a song which encouraged the football team to "buck right through that line."

Bucky Badger has persevered through the years, even surviving a threat by then assistant attorney general, Howard Koop, in 1973. He suggested that Bucky be replaced by Henrietta Holstein, a loveable cow. Koop argued that "kids love cows. A generation could grow up supporting the university and Henrietta Holstein." Koop's effort to overthrow Bucky failed.

Bucky even survived a cameo appearance by former Sports Illustrated writer Rick Telander. In preparation for a book about the department, Telander wore the Badger costume at a 1991 volleyball game. Telander overcame "terminal claustrophobia" in his first and only act as Bucky.

Bud song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've Said It All," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karmen for Budweiser beer commercials.

The song has become legendary at the University because of its polka-like rhythm. Band director Michael Leckrone said the song's popularity got started at a 1975 hockey game. "The crowd wanted to hear a polka," he said. "I didn't have any polkas. We had, just by accident, added this beer commercial to the tunes we play. I told the band if we substituted the word 'Wisconsin' for 'Budweiser' it would work."

Leckrone said the song became a football tradition after a 1978 come-from-behind victory over Oregon. "Wisconsin was behind by three touchdowns, and the crowd was really dead. I played the song to get everyone pepped up. About 20 seconds after that, Wisconsin scored a TD. I played it again, and we scored another touchdown. From then on, the band could never play enough 'Bud,'" said Leckrone.



Motion W

When Coach Barry Alvarez came to Madison, he decided that the helmet logo needed to be updated to signal a new era. He entertained 15-20 designs in 1990 before Rayovac artist Rick Suchanek developed the "Motion W," which originally included a tail at the back of the logo. Alvarez thought the tail was a bit much, but when it was removed, decided to go with it. The University bought the rights to the design, and the logo has been adopted by all other UW sports.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer with the band as they play traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song. Originally, the post-game concert was designed to give the fans something to listen to on their way out, but it developed into a post-game party as the band built in audience-participation activities.

"On, Wisconsin"


The school's fight song was originally composed in 1909 by Chicago's William Purdy, and the words were written by Carl Beck. Purdy and Beck had been fraternity brothers at Hamilton College (Clinton, N.Y.) and were roommates in Chicago. Purdy was going to submit the song for consideration to win a \$100 prize that the University of Minnesota was offering for a new football song. When Beck heard the music, he offered to write words and suggested that Purdy offer it to Wisconsin, where Beck had once studied. The song was an instant hit on campus and spread throughout the world.



Some 2,500 schools have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs. "On, Wisconsin" was sung for the first time at the 1909 homecoming game vs. Minnesota.

The music was adapted by Band Director Michael Leckrone in 1969. The original version had been played virtually unchanged since its inception. "I got a

lot of flak for the change," Leckrone said.
"The old version was one you had to wait on. I wanted to generate immediate crowd reaction, so I stepped it up a bit."



The most-played rivalry in Division I-A football continues this fall when Wisconsin and Minnesota meet. The UW-UM series is the nation's oldest and has been played continuously since 1907. The game has alternated sites between the university campuses since 1946. Much prestige was always associated with the game, and the significance was emphasized with its place on the schedule. Between 1933 and 1982, the Wisconsin-Minnesota game was always the final regular-season contest for each school.

The series took an added twist in 1948 when more than state bragging rights were on the line. After a 16-0 setback that season, the Wisconsin letterwinners group, the National "W" Club, presented Minnesota with an axe wielded by Paul Bunyan. He was the mythical giant of midwestern lumber camps. Each year since, the winner of the annual battle between the Big Ten rivals is presented with the axe, complete with scores inscribed on the handle, for display on its campus.

"Varsity"

The traditional arm-waving at the end of the song, "Varsity," was the 1934 brainstorm of then-band leader Ray Dvorak. He saw Pennsylvania students wave their caps after losing a game. Dvorak later instructed Wisconsin students to salute UW-Madison President Glenn Frank after each game.

Slab of Bacon

The Slab of Bacon trophy was the precursor to Paul Bunyan's Axe as the prize in the Wisconsin-Minnesota football series. Apparently, the trophy was presented to the winning school by a sorority from the losing institution. The trophy was discontinued in the 1940s and was discovered by UW Sports Information intern Will Roleson in a storage room at the UW Department of Athletics in 1994. It is currently housed in the football office at Wisconsin. "We took home the bacon," Coach Barry Alvarez said, "and kept it."

Each week in the Badger Gameday Program, senior wide receiver Jonathan Orr will give us an inside look at what it's like to be a UW football student-athlete. Orr, who will be playing in his final home game today, has seen action in every game during his career. Through 10 games this season, Orr leads the team with six touchdown receptions and is second with 545 receiving yards.

Off the field, Orr and teammate Joel Nellis have spearheaded a service project called "Yes, We Can." The project, run in conjunction with some Madison-area elementary schools, aims to increase donations to local food pantries.

The Last Go-Round in the Camp

The moment has come, the time has arrived, the occasion is at hand. That's right it is my last go-round in Camp Randall. Although it has been a long time coming, it has gone by rather quickly. I remember the way I felt back in the fall of 2001 when I took the field for the first time against Virginia. The game was delayed because of lightning but when we finally made it to the field it was like a movie. Electricity was in the air, fans were fired up, ESPN cameras, the works.

I must admit, although I was redshirting at the time and the most action I would see on the field was stretching during pre-game, I was still a little nervous. That was just my first gameday experience in the Camp out of 34. There are so many memorable moments I could share about gamedays at the Camp, from big games to unforgettable celebrations but I decided to discuss three aspects that people might not be that familiar with.

Before kickoff, we leave the locker room in preparation to take the field. With every step the adrenaline increases regardless of who we are playing. As we make our way through the tunnel you hear the roar of the crowd getting louder and louder. The fans are reaching out and hitting us on the pads. You catch eyes with another teammate and you see a look of determination and, regardless of what has gone on through the week, you know and they know that for this period of time we are all on the same page, have the same agenda, and that we can count on each other.

Before you know it the tunnel has ended and we are right at the doorway to the field, waiting for Coach Alvarez to lead us onto the battle field. And just when you think you can't stand the anticipation any longer, we charge the field like warriors ready to defend our territory.

The Fans

Not too long ago *Sports Illustrated on Campus* named Madison the number one college sports town. A big reason for this has to do with the fact that our athletic programs are pretty successful. But I am convinced that another big reason for this is because of our fans.

If you are not sure about what I mean, just use any football gameday as an example. I will never forget how week in and week out our opponents had to deal with a 12th man (the fans). During my career here I have had the opportunity to play in many different stadiums around the country and some have been what you would call a hostile environment but none of their fans get as loud or present as much of a problem for opponents as ours.

In my mind there will always remain a clear picture of how the stadium looks before the start of the fourth quarter when the great ritual "Jump Around" takes place. I will remember the chants that our student section says for years to come, although I probably won't tell my children about some of them. Lastly, I will remember how our fans enjoy and respect the games and both teams. For example, we have been places where fans take it too far by throwing bottles, attempting to start physical altercations, etc. Not only does it disrespect the visiting team it also makes themselves, their school, and their community look bad.

So in conclusion, I would like to thank you and commend our fans on behalf of our seniors, and the entire football program for making the experience of playing in Camp Randall an enjoyable one.

winningest men's hockey coach,
Mark Morris, Emily and her three siblings—Michael, Leah and Kevin—
were all required to take up figure
skating before hockey. The idea was
to help them become proficient
skaters and thereby better hockey
players.

Still, Morris' parents were supportive of both disciplines. Morris started both figure skating and hockey at the ripe old age of three. After figure skating practice she would head to the locker room and get her hockey gear on for that practice. She continued juggling both until she was 11 years old and made the decision to focus on hockey.

"It was a tough choice for me because I liked both," said Morris. "My dad actually sat me down once and told me that I would have to choose one, that I couldn't do both forever. I made my decision pretty soon after that talk. My parents were always very supportive of both, but I think they secretly wanted me to do hockey."

Despite being successful in local figure skating competitions, Morris cited the social challenges of managing both sports as a major drawback. As she got older, the girls in figure skating started teasing her for playing

with boys in hockey. Meanwhile, the boys did their best to pick on her when they would see her get off the ice in her figure skating gear before changing into her hockey equipment for practice.

After choosing hockey, Morris quieted those that might tease her with her performance on the ice. As a coach's daughter she recalls the unique environment she had in her childhood.

"I definitely had a different childhood than a lot of hockey players and kids in general," said Morris. "I grew up watching game tape and seeing and hearing all the behind the scenes stuff that a coach deals with. I feel like you can't help but pick up on that when it's always around and I have a better knowledge of the game because of it."

In general, Morris is positive about her situation, though she will admit it was a challenge to take advice and ask help of coaches that were not her dad.

"I always asked my dad first and it was hard to accept the opinions of another coach," admitted Morris.

Luckily, she found a coach that is beyond question in his hockey cre-

dentials to skate for now. Wisconsin women's hockey head coach Mark Johnson is a household name in the hockey community. With an NCAA national championship and 11 years in the NHL as a player, over 10 years of coaching experience and two inductions to the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame to his credit, Morris couldn't ask for much more.

"He's so knowledgeable and I really respect him and his coaching style," said Morris. "I know he knows what he's talking about."

"Emily is a good student of the game," said Johnson. "Growing up in the house she did helped make her very perceptive of some of the details in a hockey game. She works hard and has played well for us. We are all happy she chose hockey, that's for sure."

And for the most part, Morris is too, "I do miss figure skating sometimes and wish I had stuck with it, but it's more of the nostalgia of it. I have great memories from that time. But I don't regret choosing hockey at all. I love this game."





UW'S RETIRED NUMBERS



#40 Elroy Hirsch

Elroy Hirsch played only one season (1942) at UW, but he was one of the most beloved sports figures in school history. Hirsch, nicknamed "Crazylegs," rushed for 786 yards for Wisconsin's 8-1-1 team in 1942. He starred for nine years with the L.A. Rams and later served as UW's Director of Athletics (1969-87).



#83 Allan Shafer

The memory of former quarterback Allan Shafer is continued with the "Living Memorial" Scholarship that is given in his name. Shafer was fatally injured during the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa game. Shafer is one of two Badgers (Jay Seiler is the other) to die from a football-related injury.



#35 Alan Ameche

Alan Ameche, the 1954
Heisman Trophy winner, was a three-time All-American and ended his career as the NCAA's all-time rushing leader. He led the Badgers to the 1953 Rose Bowl and rushed for 133 yards in that game. The four-time NFL Pro Bowl pick was inducted into the College Hall of Fame in 1975.



#80 Dave Schreiner

Dave Schreiner, the two-time All-America end, was named Western Conference Player of the Year in 1942. Schreiner lettered three years at the UW as an end, both on offense and defense. He is a member of the National Football Foundation and W Club Halls of Fame. He was voted to the UW's all-time team in 1969.










CAMP RANDALL STADIUM POLICIES

Conduct Code

In order to keep Wisconsin football games as enjoyable as possible for our fans and their families, we ask that you respect others around you. If a ticket holder's conduct endangers or disrupts players, coaches, officials or other patrons, the University reserves the right to remove the ticket holder from the premises. No refund will be made in such cases. Stadium violations (body passing, throwing objects, and possession of alcohol 21 or older) and object passing may result in a \$181 fine.

Smoke-Free Facility

Smoking is prohibited in all state-owned buildings, including Camp Randall Stadium. Designated smoking areas are located within the stadium perimeter.

Entry / No Re-entry

P ease enter the gate printed on your ticket to allow for the most efficient entry to the stadium. Gates open 90 minutes prior to kickoff. Fans may not

leave the stadium and then re-enter during the game. If an emergency arises, check with gate security.

Alcohol

No alcohol may be brought into the Stadium. Possession may result in police arrest and a fine of \$181. The fine for first offense for underage possession/consumption of alcohol is \$243.





Emergencies

In the event of a medical emergency, immediately notify a security guard, usher, police officer or paramedic in your area. UW Health First Aid Stations are located in the upper deck at Section FF, in the 5th level concourse behind Section T, and under Section YZ in the south end zone concourse.

It is possible to contact a patron during a game if you know their exact seat location by calling (608) 265-8676. No announcements will be made over the stadium sound system.

Lost and Found

If you lose an article on game day, please go to the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse, or call (608) 265-8676. For lost-and-found inquiries on non-game days, please call or visit the Kohl Center Gate B reception desk (608-263-5645).

Items Not Permitted

For the safety and security of all patrons, certain items are prohibited, including, but not limited to: any food or beverage items, cans, bottles, coolers, thermoses, backpacks (gym, duffel and tote), luggage, strollers, laser pointers, banners, flags, signs, noisemakers, weapons, balloons, beach balls or umbrellas. All patrons entering Camp Randall Stadium are subject to search. Storage facilities are not available for checking prohibited items.





CAMP RANDALL STADIUM RENOVATION

NEW LOOK, SAME OLD CHARM FOR CAMP RANDALL

One of college football's legendary facilities-Wisconsin's Camp Randall Stadium-has just undergone a four-year, \$109 million renovation. The improvements are plentiful: new FieldTurf, suites and club seats, new video scoreboards, new offices, increased seating capacity and better fan amenities like concession areas, restrooms and traffic flow.

The enhancements, however, have not detracted from Camp Randall's charm; rather, the stadium's character has been enhanced greatly by the improvements, ensuring that future generations of Badger fans will have a first-rate facility at which to watch their beloved Badgers play on Saturdays in the fall.

Camp Randall was originally used as a Civil War training site. In fact, some 70,000 soldiers trained at the camp, which also included a hospital and a prison for Confederate soldiers on its grounds.

Named for Alexander Randall, the state of Wisconsin's first wartime governor, Camp Randall Stadium opened in 1917 and was officially dedicated when the Badgers defeated Minnesota, 10-7, on Nov. 3, 1917.

The Big Ten Conference is an association of 11 world-class universities whose member institutions share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. Intercollegiate athletics has an important place within the mission.

Founded in 1896, the Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics in student-athletes' lives and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness. Big Ten universities provide in excess of \$82 million in athletic scholarship aid to more than 8,500 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women. In 2004-05, the Big Ten distribted over \$116 million in revenues to its 1 member institutions, Conference

institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.

- Big Ten Universities are members of the nation's only conference whose constituency is entirely composed of institutions that are members of the AAU, a prestigious association of major academic and research institutions in the United States and Canada.
- Big Ten Universities host more than 70 Nobel laureates as faculty, students or researchers.
- Big Ten Universities enroll students of whom more than 41 percent have graduated in the top 10 percent of their high school class, while 74 percent graduated in the top quarter of their class.
- The Big Ten showcased more than 300 events that were televised national-



ly, regionally and locally last year, representing over 600 hours of programming.

- Since 1992, the Big Ten has created in excess of 2,000 new opportunities for women student-athletes and established 28 new women's teams.
- Throughout the conference, the Big Ten had more than 8,400 student-athletes playing on over 270 teams in 2003-04. Those student-athletes received in excess of \$82 million in direct financial aid
- Big Ten student-athletes graduate at a rate of 10 percent higher than all Division I student-athletes.
- The Big Ten recognized 1,952 Academic All-Big Ten honorees during the 2004-05 academic year, the highest total in the last decade. Over the past five years, the Conference has annually acknowledged more than 1,700 studentathletes as Academic All-Conference honorees.
- In the past 10 years (1995-96 through 2004-05), the Big Ten claimed 40 NCAA team championships and 155 individual titles.

BIG TEN CONFERENCE FOOTBALL INSTANT REPLAY FACTS

The Big Ten Conference will begin year two of its college football instant replay program in 2005. In addition, other leagues will also implement their own instant replay system after the NCAA approved the Big Ten's proposal to allow all NCAA conferences and independent institutions to experiment with the use of video replay for the 2005 season.

The goal of the Big Ten's football television replay plan is to: See, Review, Change (if warranted). Only specific plays are reviewable, and only those plays where the absolute standard of indisputable video evidence is met can a play be overturned.

Only the Technical Advisor serving as the review official for the game. Neither the game officials nor the coaches may ask for a review. The Technical Advisor will have the sole authority to change a call, or no call, on the field. Unlike the NFL model, officials working Big Ten games will not have the ability or capacity to view the replay(s).

The Big Ten Conference replay system allows for specific types of officiating mistakes to be immediately reviewed and corrected once the standard of indisputable video evidence is met. The replay system will not guarantee that all officiating mistakes are identified and corrected.

During the 2004 campaign, play was stopped in only 28 of 57 contests (49 percent) for a total of 43 stoppages and 21 overturned calls (49 percent of stoppages). The length of the 57 games utilizing instant replay in 2004 was only three hours and 16 minutes, compared to three hours and 13 minutes in all 2003 contests. Less than one stoppage occurred per game in 2004, as the Big Ten's average length of review was only two minutes and 39 seconds, compared to the National Football League average of three minutes and 20 seconds for its instant replay system.



National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame

These seven former Badgers have received the highest honor the game of football affords. They have been inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame. They are the greats of the game and their achievements are documented at the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, Ind.



Pat O'Dea (elected in 1962), nicknamed "The Kangaroo Kicker," was a two-time All-America fullback and punter between 1896-99. He also was a two-time team captain.



Robert Butler (elected in 1972) was a three-year letterwinner at tackle and won all-league (1912-13) and All-America (1913) laurels.



Pat Harder (elected in 1993), an All-America fullback, was the Big Ten's scoring and rushing champion in 1941.



Dave Schreiner (elected in 1955), the two-time All-America end, was the Western Conference MVP in 1942.



Pat Richter (elected in 1996) was a two-time All-America end and led the nation in receiving as a junior.




Marty Below (elected in 1988), a rugged right tackle, earned All-America praise as a senior.





LEGACY OF CAMP RANDALL



Today's Camp Randall experience is one of boisterous cheering, fan camaraderie and first-class football among a sea of red. This, however, was not always the case. On the same ground that today's young student-athletes do battle on the gridiron, young soldiers-to-be prepared for battle in the Civil War. From 1861 to 1865 the area where Camp Randall Stadium stands served as Civil War training grounds. In this season's game programs this page will be dedicated to the legacy of Camp Randall and its history in its pre-football days.

n April 9, 1865, Confederate General Robert E. Lee surrendered his troops to Gen.
Ulysses S. Grant at the courthouse in Appomattox, Va., signaling the end of the Civil War and a Union victory. Camp Randall was still actively training soldiers at the end of war though nine regiments had left Camp Randall in the months leading up to the end of the war. They were sent west to St. Louis and the Dakotas to guard barracks and other army posts.

Wisconsin's troops were spread over the south and east at the end of the war with several regiments in Mississippi, Alabama, Louisiana, Virginia and North Carolina. The 36th infantry was near Appomattox on the day the South surrendered and had fought in a small skirmish with some of Lee's troops the week before.

Though the war had ended, Wisconsin's soldiers could not immediately head home. Depending on their location when the war ended they were mustered out, or deactivated, in various places. Most of Wisconsin's troops from the south visited Louisville, Ky., for their disbanding. From there they took the train to Madison where they were met by the governor and other officials and often a large public gathering to welcome them home. Some infantries, however, requested less of a fuss be made so as to expedite their trip home to their families.

The infantries stationed further east traveled to Washington, D.C., for their mustering out. As part of the victory celebration, Washington hosted the Grand Review of the Army along the Potomac River. This event was a popularly attended spectacle and a unique experience for those who were able to participate. After the review, Wisconsin's infantries would make their way back to their home state where they were received by officials and public gatherings.

For most, the end of the war meant the return to normality. Soldiers returned to their farms, businesses, homes and families. Still, the bonds that were formed during the war were strong and in April of 1866 a veterans group was founded as the Grand Army of the Republic or GAR. Originally founded in Illinois, Wisconsin was the second state to receive a charter. Shortly, Wisconsin had over 200 local posts of the GAR.

A national movement, the GAR was first meant to be a social group with no political discussion, but soon became a very political force in the United States. Five presidents and seven Wisconsin governors were members of the GAR, including Wisconsin's first three-term governor, Lucius Fairchild. From the time he

took office in 1865 until 1901, when Robert LaFollette was elected, a GAR member had governed Wisconsin.

As a social and political power, the GAR worked for veteran rights and commemorating their triumphs and sacrifices. In 1868, the group established Decoration Day which was renamed Memorial Day in 1882. The GAR also worked to preserve the historical integrity of battlefields, instituting the Pledge of Allegiance in schools as well as placing flags in classrooms.

The group also called for a veterans museum to be created in the state's capitol building. After a fire in 1904 destroyed the Capitol, the museum was moved across the street from the west wing where it stands today.

Cross Country

The men's and women's cross country teams compete in the NCAA Great Lakes Regional Championship today in Bloomington, Ind. The top two team finishers earn automatic bids to the NCAA meet.

The men's team won its seventh straight Big Ten title on Oct. 30, scoring a Big Ten-record 16 points by placing eight runners in the top 10, including a sweep of the top four spots. Senior Simon Bairu won his third consecutive individual title. The women finished sixth with a team score of 146, trailing Michigan's winning tally of 42 points.

Men's Hockey

No. 9/10 Wisconsin (6-1-1, 5-0-1 WCHA) returns home for a battle with No. 1 Colorado College (9-1-0, 4-0-0 WCHA) this weekend ... UW is riding a six-game unbeaten streak (5-0-1) and sits in first place in the WCHA with a three-point lead over Colorado College ... the Badgers earned their first road sweep at North Dakota this past weekend since sweeping UND in the 1996 WCHA playoffs ... junior goaltender Brian Elliott is 8-0-1 with just 11 goals allowed, a 1.21 goals-against average and .948 save percentage in his last nine WCHA contests.

Women's Hockey

Wisconsin will be traveling to Winona, Minn., on Nov. 9 for a make-up game against Minnesota State. The game will be hosted by St. Mary's University and admission is free ... the Badgers closed out their 2005 home schedule by sweeping St. Cloud State over the weekend. The team will embark on a two-month road trip and will be back on its home ice Jan. 20, 2006.

Men's Soccer

The men's soccer team (8-10-0, 2-4-0) will take on Indiana (11-1-6, 2-1-3)in the first round of the 2005 Big Ten Tournament. Wisconsin is the sixth seed while Indiana is the third seed ... UW and Michigan finished the regular season tied for fifth in the

conference standings, but with a tiebreaker going to the Wolverines, Wisconsin will take the sixth seed in the tournament. ... if the Badgers win Thursday, they will take on the winner of the Ohio State/Northwestern game in the semifinals.

Women's Soccer

Wisconsin (13-8-2) won the 2005 Big Ten Tournament Sunday with a 3-1 win over Michigan to earn the conference's automatic bid to the NCAA tournament ... senior Amy Vermeulen posted six goals in the tournament and was named the offensive MVP. Teammate Jessica Ring was named the defensive MVP. Marisa Brown also was named to the all-tournament team .. Vermeulen also had five points in three games to reach 100 for her career.

Men's Tennis

The men's tennis team will wrap up the fall season at the Big Ten singles championships this weekend in East Lansing, Mich. ... four of the nation's Top 20 players in the preaseaon poll will compete ... Jeremy Sonkin and Nolan Polley each went 3-1 in singles play at the Midwest Regional in Ann Arbor two weeks ago.

Volleyball

No. 10 Wisconsin (18-5, 10-4 Big Ten) takes to the road for Big Ten Conference matches at Iowa (14-13, 4-10) and 17th-ranked Minnesota (20-5, 10-4) this weekend ... tonight Wisconsin and Minnesota battle for second place in the Big Ten. The match will be broadcast by Fox Sports Net North tomorrow at 1 p.m. ... the Badgers fell into a three-way tie for second place in the Big Ten with Minnesota and Purdue after splitting in action last weekend. Wisconsin downed Illinois, 3-2, on Friday but fell to 15th-ranked Purdue, 3-1, on Saturday.

Wrestling

The Wisconsin wrestling team heads to Stevens Point, Wis., today for the Pointer Open. UW has been sending wrestlers to compete at the Pointer Open since its start in 2003 ... in 2004, Wisconsin sent 16 wrestlers to the competition, including 10 freshmen. The Badgers came away with seven top-three finishes in the gold division and seven in the silver division.



New Name for Medical School

The Medical School has a new name -the School of Medicine and Public Health. The name change reflects part of a decade-long process to expand the public health mission of the school.

Philip Farrell, dean of the school, says the school is seeking to fulfill its public-health mission through partnerships and private dollars. In addition to its Center for Urban Population Health, the school also directs programming and field study in the state's rural areas.

Farrell said UW-Madison has the connections, infrastructure, faculty, staff and students to properly support and grow a school of public health. "We are a statewide medical school, and we will be a statewide school of medicine and public health," Farrell says. "We are eager to close the so-called gap between medicine and public health. This is really the Wisconsin Idea in action."

Colossal Grant for Nanostudies Awarded

The National Science Foundation has awarded the UW-Madison Materials

Research Science and Engineering Center (MRSEC) nearly \$14.8 million over the next six years to continue its research on materials at the nanoscale

At this scale, materials are so tiny that scientists often study or manipulate them atom-by-atom. The work could have wide-ranging applications in electronics and biology, including the use of atomic-scale materials to direct the growth and differentiation of embryonic stem cells.

The center combines the expertise of more than 30 faculty in 13 UW-

Madison departments and includes nearly 40 graduate students and post-doctoral researchers and about 20 undergraduate students.

"These are extremely, extremely competitive grants," says Juan de Pablo, a professor of chemical and biological engineering and the center's director. "Every major university would like to have a center like this."

At MRSEC, the traditional boundaries of science disciplines are all but nonexistent.

"We bring people from physics, chemistry, engineering, biology, pharmacy and the veterinary school to work together on these projects of common interest," he says. "And we provide a forum for all of these people to interact and for all of the students to work together and advance these areas."

Hospital Has Excellent Check-up

UW Hospital and Clinics has been named the top-performing academic hospital in the United States, based on a national benchmarking study by the University HealthSystem Consortium (UHC).

Other top-performing hospitals include the Mayo Clinic, Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston, Rush University Medical Center in Chicago and Truman Medical Centers in Kansas City.

The study focused on quality and safe patient care and rated safety, mortality, effectiveness and equity.

While UW Hospital and Clinics ranked well in each area examined, the hospital outperformed all other UHC organizations in the category of patient mortality — a factor many would consider the most important for patients when choosing a hospital. UW Hospital and Clinics also received the top composite score.

NCAA GUIDELINES

What Every Badger Fan Should Know

With increasing numbers of NCAA rules governing outside intervention in recruiting, coaches cannot afford to have any extra "help" in recruiting elite student-athletes to the University of Wisconsin. The penalties are too severe.

Here are some tidbits of information concerning you and Badger athletics ... You are a "representative" of the UW's athletics interests (i.e., booster) if any of the following apply:

a) you are an alumnus of the University of Wisconsin;

b) you have ever made financial contributions to the athletics department, to an athletic booster organization of the UW, or to a UW athletics program;

 c) you have ever helped to arrange employment of enrolled student-athletes and/or National Letter of Intent signees;

d) you have ever been involved in any way promoting the Badger athletic program.

Once an individual is identified as an athletics representative/booster," the peron retains that identity forever, even if that person no longer contributes to or supports he athletics program.

VCAA Bylaw 13.01.5 states: In Division I, representative of the UW's athletics interests is prohibited from making in-person, on-or-off campus recruiting contacts, or written or telephonic communications with a prospect or the prospect's relatives or legal guardians.

A prospect is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade. In addition, any student younger than ninth grade could become a "prospect" if they receive any benefits from an institution or a booster. Student-athletes enrolled in preparatory school or two-year colleges are also considered prospective student-athletes.

What Can You Do?

If you know of a high school or junior college student-athlete who might want to attend the UW, the only permissible activity for a representative is to call the appropriate UW coach.

Extra Benefit Rule

A representative of UW athletics interests cannot provide an "extra benefit" to a prospective or enrolled student-athlete. An extra benefit is any special arrangement by



an institutional employee or a booster to provide for a student-athlete or a studentathlete's friend or relative not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. Some examples of prohibited activities are:

a) providing gifts or reduced cost services;

b) providing a loan, or arranging for or co-signing a loan;

 c) employing relatives or friends of a prospective student-athlete as an inducement for the enrollment of the prospect;

d) providing use of an automobile;

e) providing rent-free or reduced-rent housing;

f) providing tickets to an athletic, institutional or community event;

g) entertaining or contacting a prospective student-athlete or a prospective student-athlete's family on or off campus;

h) promising to provide any of the above;

According to NCAA rules, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department reserves the right to withhold any benefit or privilege associated with their athletic department (i.e., booster clubs, ticket privileges, etc.) from individuals that are involved in a violation of NCAA legislation

Employment

NCAA rules are such that opportunities for your interaction with student-athletes are very limited. One of the best opportunities for alumni or friends of the program to assist student-athletes financially and provide them with a valuable internship experience is through employment. A representative of athletics interests is permitted to provide employment for student-athletes under the following conditions:

• Compensation can't include any remuneration for value or utility that the student-athlete may have for the employer because of the publicity, reputation, fame or personal following that he or she has obtained because of athletics ability;

• Compensation for only work actually performed; and

 Compensation at a rate commensurate with the going rate in that locality for similar services.

With more than 700 student-athletes competing at the UW, the Department of Athletics encourages businesses to hire Badger student-athletes. They may have been told by many nonbelievers in their senior years of high school that they weren't big enough or fast enough to contribute to a Big Ten football program. However, a number of individuals have gone on to make their mark on the University of Wisconsin football program during the Alvarez era by originally joining the team as a walkon

Below is a partial list of some of the individuals that joined the Badgers as non-scholarship players, only to make major impacts at the UW and beyond.

- Matt Davenport, placekicker: semifinalist for Lou Groza Award: consensus first-team All-Big Ten in 1997 and 1998; scored 99 points as a senior, the most in school history for a placekicker; career field goal percentage (868) is No. 1 at UW.
- Jason Doering, safety: team captain in both 1999 and 2000; led Badger defensive backs in tackles his final three seasons; ranks fourth all-time in career

solo tackles (250); starter on two Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion teams; currently plays for the NFL's New York Giants.

- Joe Panos, offensive tackle: team captain in 1993; starter on the Badgers' 1993 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion team; first-team All-Big Ten and second-team AP All-American in '93; played for the NFL's Philadelphia Eagles and Buffalo Bills.
- Mark Tauscher, offensive tackle:
 three-year letterwinner; member of two
 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion
 squads, including a starter on the 1999
 team; helped Ron Dayne become NCAA
 all-time leading rusher; currently a
 starter for the NFL's Green Bay Packers.
- Donnel Thompson, linebacker: team captain in 1998 and 1999; starter on a pair of UW Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion teams; ranks 10th all-time in career tackles; two-time team-leader in tackles; played for NFL's Pittsburgh Steelers and Indianapolis Colts.
- Mike Schneck, long snapper: threeyear letterwinner at Wisconsin; member of 1998 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion team signed free agent contract with Pittsburgh and currently plays for the Steelers.
- Sam Veit, punter: four-year starter and letterwinner: member of UW's 1993 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion squad; ranks third all-time in career punts (209) and career punting yards (8,016); three-time Academic All-Big Ten selection.

LEONHARD WAS ULTIMATE WALK-ON SUCCESS STORY

Jim Leonhard's (pictured left) football accomplishments are worth noting all by themselves: three-time first-team All-American, three-time first-team All-Big Ten, holder of several Big Ten and school records for his play as both a defensive back

and punt returner. But that's only half the story.

Leonhard's accolades off the field are just as impressive. A 2004 first-team ESPN The Magazine Academic All-American as selected by CoSIDA, Leonhard was honored in New York as one of 15 National Football Foundation Scholar-Athletes (with that goes an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship).

The 5-8, 186-pound Leonhard (who once won a team basketball slam dunk competition), a native of tiny Tony, Wis. (pop. 105), will go down as one of the most decorated players (let alone walk-ons) of the Alvarez era.


