PRESENT: Regents Clusen, Davis, Doughty Luckhardt, Dreyfus, Flores, Gelatt, Grover, Gundersen, Hassett, Krutsch, Lyon, Schilling, Steil, Vos and Weinstein

Regents Nicholas and Vattendahl ABSENT:

It was announced that Regent Vice President Nicholas would not be able to attend this meeting, and Regent Schilling was unanimously elected Vice President Pro Tempore, upon motion by Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Steil.

Upon motion by Regent Vos, seconded by Regent Flores, minutes of the regular meeting held on May 10, 1991, were unanimously approved as mailed.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

nequesta for Report on the May 17, 1991, Meeting of the Educational Communications Board Thomsfer of licenses & funds for hadcasting to EVB, R

Regent Clusen called attention to action by the Joint Finance Committee which would require transfer of broadcast licenses from the UW System to the Educational Communications Board and also would require transfer of associated budget and staff. The Board of Regents had opposed such a transfer, and the Educational Communications Board had formed a working group to propose alternative ways of organizing public broadcasting. But, the Joint Finance Committee took action before that group was able to meet. ECB Executive Director Paul Norton sent a letter to all members of the Legislature, asking them to delay action until the working group has an opportunity to make recommendations.

Regent Dreyfus moved and Regent Gundersen seconded adoption of the following resolution:

desolution 5803: That, the Board of Regents opposes the June 6, 1991 recommendation of the Joint Committee on Finance, directing the Board of Regents, in cooperation with ECB, to: a) apply to the FCC for the transfer of licenses for the broadcasting stations owned by UW-Extension as part of Wisconsin Public Television and Wisconsin Public Radio to the ECB, effective July 1, 4451992; b) to formulate plans for budget and staff integration for the 1992-93 fiscal year; and, c) to formulate plans and submit requests for the transfer of funds from UW System appropriations to ECB appropriations, effective July 1, 1992.

Regent Dreyfus recalled that, in 1962, when the state broadcasting system was established, the Legislature specifically intended to guarantee that there would not be statewide control by a single agency. This concern was based on memory of the effect of state control of broadcasting in World War II Germany. Federal regulations, he noted, do not permit such concentration in commercial broadcasting. - Ellenser - ( same as alme)

Put to the vote, <u>Resolution 5803 was adopted unanimously</u> by the Board.

Regent Weinstein suggested that the resolution be distributed to the Legislature and the Governor.

Regent Clusen added that the many supporters of public radio and television also would urge reversal of the Joint Finance Committee action.

#### SReport on the May 24, 1991, meeting of the Higher Educational Aids Beard JP.2

President Lyon called attention to the written report of the meeting, which had been distributed with the agenda materials.

Crunce of Trustes - Report on finencial climate adoption of Report of the Chair of the Council of Trustees. UN Hospital and Clinics Spartal.

Regent Flores reported that at the previous day's Council meeting, Superintendent Derzon reported on financial results and patient activity for the fiscal year through May. Hospital admissions overall had increased 5.2 percent over 89-90. Outpatient activity for the year also had increased 5 percent over the previous year.

The Council discussed the proposed budget for 1991-92, which included a requested rate increase of 3.5 percent, the hospital's lowest rate increase in five years and is lower than the average rate increase of 9.6 percent for all Wisconsin hospitals in the first half of this year. For the second consecutive year, the room rate would remain at \$193.00. Mr. Peter Crispman, Financial Director, noted that overall financial results for 1990-91 have been favorable, with higher than anticipated revenue due to patient volume that exceeded expectations by 4 to 6 percent. In addition, deductions from revenue were lower, primarily due to less than expected medicare reductions and decreases in length of stay by patients. However, some expenditures were higher because additional staff were required to accommodate the increased

patient activity. Projections for 1991-92 patient volume and patient revenue were modest, with patient admissions and patient days estimated to increase 1 percent over 1990-91. Outpatient visits were projected to increase 2 percent over 1990-91. Total net revenues were projected to be \$251 million with total expenditures of \$240 million, leaving a net income of \$11 million for fiscal year 1991-92. Following discussion of the budget and rate increase proposal, the Council adopted a resolution recommending approval of the budget in July by the Board of Regents.

The Council then heard a presentation from Vice Chancellor Noren regarding a proposal to lease space for the Sports Medicine/Spine Center/Cardiac Rehabilitation Preventive Cardiology Program. Following discussion, the Council approved a resolution authorizing the Center for Health Sciences Administration to negotiate a lease for submission to the Board of Regents in July.

Regent Flores presented retiring Medical School Dean Arnold Brown with a framed certificate of appreciation for his contributions during 13 years of service to the Medical School and the Council.

Regent Flores introduced Resolution 5804, which would amend the bylaws of the Council to make provisions regarding medical staff appointments consistent with the medical staff bylaws.

Upon motion by Regent Flores, seconded by Regent Weinstein, the following resolution was adopted unanimously by the Board:

Resolution 5804: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Chancellor of UW-Madison, and the Council of Trustees of the UW Hospital and Clinics, the revision to the bylaws of the Council of Trustees of the UW Hospital and Clinics be approved as proposed.

Supplementing his written reports, Vice President Bornstein indicated the State Assembly was to begin deliberations on the Joint Committee on Finance budget recommendations the following week. It was hoped there would be restoration of some of the Joint Committee on Finance reductions as well as additional funding consistent with the Board's priorities.

Report on Undergraduate Education Study - Report on study, p.3

Regent President Lyon reported that the undergraduate education study continues to proceed well, with the Regent working groups having met and reported progress at the previous day's Education Committee meeting. The hearings held around the state provided excellent background information, including examples of many of the successful programs in the System. The testimony provided by the faculty, staff and students at those hearings was helpful and much appreciated. President Lyon thanked the participants in the hearings and the Regents for the time and effort devoted to the study.

Regent President Lyon reported that initial steps had been taken to begin the search, pursuant to the Regent discussion at the May meeting in Milwaukee. Since that meeting, he had sent letters to all chancellors asking them to work with the governance groups at their institutions to submit nominations of administrators, faculty, academic staff and students for membership on the Presidential Search Committee. A similar letter was sent to United Council asking for student nominations. All had responded and were ready for consideration later in the meeting.

President Lyon reported that he had sent letters to individuals and firms which expressed interest in the Executive Director position, as well as to members of the American Council on Education's list of firms which work extensively with colleges and universities on executive searches. The next steps in the process will be determined after reviewing responses to this letter.

#### Compensation for President and Doctoral Chancellors

Thanking the Regents for reviewing the materials on compensation sent after the last meeting, President Lyon reported that responses indicated Regent preference for using GPR funds, rather than gift or grant monies, to permit the Board to set salaries for the President and possibly the doctoral institution chancellors at the maximum of Executive Salary Group 10 plus up to an additional 35 percent, based on the market for comparable higher education institutions. As a follow-up step, Regents Lyon, Nicholas, and Steil discussed the matter with the Governor, Secretary Klauser, and with legislative leaders. Based on these consultations, it appeared that the best course of action would be to seek support for a budget amendment which would allow the Board of Regents to set only the President's salary up to 35 percent above the maximum dollar value of the salary range for Executive Salary Group 10, based on the competitive market for comparable positions. The amendment would not have a fiscal effect because the Board of Regents would fund adjustments through base GPR funds.

In discussions with elected officials, Regent Lyon said it had been made clear that the doctoral cluster chancellorships also are seriously below market and there are strong and convincing arguments for addressing all these issues together. In the current budget environment, however, he became convinced that an amendment focused exclusively on assisting the national presidential search had the strongest possible support. There was recognition that this narrower amendment would not solve all of the problems caused by the restrictive executive salary group structure and that further modifications would have to be sought later. It is not realistic, President Lyon commented, to conduct a serious national search with the current salary constraints. Flexibility above current levels will be needed in order to attract a top quality leader.

In response to a question by Regent Vos, President Lyon indicated that 35 percent would amount to \$157,000, the median of the comparable institutions.

Regent Vos expressed the view that 35 percent would be too large an increase, given the state's current fiscal situation and in view of the fact that the President also receives a house, a car and other benefits.

Regent Lyon noted that the Board would retain authority to set compensation below the maximum level, depending on market competition, and that benefits in Wisconsin are approximately equal to those in other states.

Regent Schilling thought Regent Vos' point would be more aptly debatable if a raise were being discussed. However, the issue was a salary that will attract candidates, with the current level being far below the market rate.

Stating his appreciation for the opportunity to serve on the Board, Regent Vos noted the positive role the Board of Regents gives to students. One of the ideas of shared governance, he continued, is that students, faculty and administration work together in the best interests of the consumer. In that regard, he urged the Board to keep foremost in mind the interests of student consumers and to solicit their opinions before making decisions.

In closing, he thanked his colleagues on the Board who had provided very positive examples of public service and urged them to keep striving for the best university system possible.

Whereas, his direct style and probing analysis have helped us to get to the heart of many difficult issues; and

Whereas, the countless hours and boundless energy he has devoted to Regent duties have amply demonstrated the depth of his dedication to the Board and to the UW System;

Therefore, be it resolved that the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System hereby commends and expresses appreciation to Laurence A. Weinstein for all his accomplishments on behalf of the UW System, its students, and the people of Wisconsin; and

Regent Lyon noted that the Legislature had adopted a special resolution honoring Regent Weinstein for his seven years of service. He also thanked Regent weinstein for all his advice and assistance during the five years they had served together on the Board.

Referring to the written statement he had provided, Regent Weinstein summarized several key points with regard to advice he would offer to newly appointed Regents. His first suggestion was to become thoroughly familiar with Chapter 36 of the Statutes, which explains the concept of shared governance on the one hand and clearly defines the role of the Regents on the other. That role, he commented, is considerably greater than many believe and carries with it very substantial power and responsibilities. Secondly, he urged a detailed review of the major Regent initiatives of the recent past, including Design for Diversity, Administrative Code Chapter UWS 17, gender equity, enrollment management, admissions standards, extension planning, and faculty catch-up pay, since these initiatives have laid a foundation for future Board decisions. The major issue to be confronted, he commented, will be maintaining the quality of the System, particularly during the tough financial times ahead. How the Board deals with the size of the System, the faculty, facilities, campus environment, and student admissions standards will determine the quality outcome. In that regard, he commended President Shaw and Executive Vice President Lyall for saying publicly that it will be necessary to downsize even if that means closing a campus.

Regent Weinstein expressed gratitude for his appointment to the Board by Governor Earl and for having an opportunity to make a contribution to the UW System to which he owed great gratitude for contributing to his education and that of his family. As a Regent, he continued, he had, come to know the "dedicated and talented people who manage this incredibly good institution": President Shaw, System officers, staff, chancellors, and campus administrators. He gained new insight into the world class faculty and academic staff and was always impressed with the caliber of student leadership and with the work of Regent staff. In addition, he was grateful for the friendships he had developed with other Regents.

The UW System, he said, is the state's most important asset, because of the unique contribution it makes to Wisconsin's special quality of life. "But it is a fragile institution. It is easier to diminish it than to nurture it.

"I conclude by wishing this and future Boards the very best, because you to a very large extent have it in your power to ensure the quality of the System. You have a double obligation. On the one hand, you must be credible, enthusiastic and involved advocates for the needs of the System; and on the other hand, you must be willing to make difficult choices in order to preserve and enhance the quality of the System regardless of the level of funding. In carrying out these responsibilities, you will always have my respect, understanding, my appreciation and my support."

Regent President Lyon presented plaques to Regents Weinstein and Vos in recognition of their service on the Board.

#### Approval of Nonpersonnel Actions

Resolution 5809 was adopted unanimously by the Board, upon motion by Regent Davis and seconded by Regent Steil.

Presentations to the Board-) Presentation on Designer Drugs, UW-Madison yp 10-11

President Shaw introduced Professor Daniel H. Rich, UW-Madison School of Pharmacy, who explained that the term "designer drugs" means that computers are used to generate new entities for treating disease, including AIDS.

With the use of slides, Professor Rich explained the development of drugs. He said that pharmaceutical chemists examine approximately 10,000 compounds for every one that is finally marketed. Of those 10,000 surveyed, approximately 20 are considered significant and promising enough to be tested with animals; approximately half of those are then tested by humans; and only 10 percent of the human tests produce a drug that is ultimately marketed. With a time frame for this process typically being 10-12 years, the cost is about \$231 million. Because the pharmaceutical industry is under tremendous constraints to develop drugs and constantly in search of new methods for shortening the time span and decreasing costs, the computer is playing an important part to accomplish these goals.

In 1991, approximately 162,000 people in the United States have full-blown cases of AIDS, 120,000 of whom have died. Mortality is essentially 100 percent with no known survivors over long periods of time. An additional 200,000-300,000 people have an AIDS-related complex, with another one million people in the United States probably infected. Approximately 40 million people in Third World countries are expected to be infected by the year 2000. In the absence of any therapy, all of these people will die. The financial cost is enormous because AIDS people remain very ill for a long period of time, and those costs are expected to quadruple over the next decade.

Outlining the history of the AIDS situation, Dr. Rich explained that the disease was first recognized in 1981, in part due to work done by Professor Howard Temin in the early 1960s. Currently Dr. Rich's group is trying to shut down the enzyme which is essential for replication of the virus by developing inhibitors, a process discovered in his laboratory in the mid 1970s. Using inhibitors developed for hypertension, anti-hypertensive drugs could be used in controlling the HIV virus. The first enzyme inhibitors were reported at UW-Madison and elsewhere in 1990, and in collaboration with the National Institutes of Health (NIH), a method was designed and synthesized to be an extremely potent inhibitor of the enzyme. He showed a slide illustrating an inhibitor in the active side of the enzyme which results in the AIDS virus not being able to replicate.

In response to a question by Regent Dreyfus, Dr. Rich explained that the picture he showed was not a model and that what was generated on a computer screen showed the positions of the atoms as they are exactly in reality. He stated that this picture is used as a structure to design new types of inhibitors. In an attempt to speed up the timetable and not wait until the year 2000 for results, several compounds were taken into healthy humans for safety assessment last fall, and many showed sufficient safety to be tested by affected humans next year.

In reply to a question by Regent Dreyfus, Dr. Rich explained that this work does become public. The research currently being conducted in this regard is sponsored by the NIH and a pharmaceutical company, thereby guaranteeing availability of the findings.

Regent Dreyfus asked if a sponsoring pharmaceutical company could receive restricted information, and Dr. Rich explained that it is dictated by the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation restrictions, but in this particular situation with NIH support the information is public.

President Shaw asked what the time frame would be if one of the options currently being tested on infected humans proves more promising. Dr. Rich said that the normal date would be late 1990s but because AIDS is a critical disease, it is given a fast track status, and the time frame would be shorter.

There was further discussion about the percentage of research dollars involved in these projects.

In response to a question by Regent Schilling, Dr. Rich confirmed that the cost for the AIDS patient in the United States far surpasses that of the standard cancer case.

Regent Dreyfus asked where the virus was prior to 1981. Dr. Rich stated that the first identification of the virus was when it caused the death of a British sailor in 1959. Regent Dreyfus further inquired whether the virus could mutate, and Dr. Rich said it absolutely does. The problem with AZT is that the virus mutates very quickly and the drug loses its effectiveness over a period of one-to-two years, necessitating the need for a new and stronger drug.

Replying to Regent Krutsch's question about why AIDS is more prevalent in foreign countries, Dr. Rich explained that it is because of life styles, cultures and medical practice. As an example, he said other countries often give flu shots to 100 people with the same needle.

In reply to a question from Regent Schilling about whether AIDS existed prior to 1959, Dr. Rich stated that in all probability it existed but simply was not recognized until that time.

In thanking Professor Rich for his presentation, President Shaw said that, in spite of the justifiable emphasis on undergraduate teaching, we should not neglect the importance of basic research and public service. "This presentation exhibits how basic research has some direct applications about which we should not lose sight."



1990-91 Academic Program Designations and Related Academic Approval Items p,18

Regent Davis reported that the Committee was provided the annual informational year-end report on academic program changes approved by System Administration during 1990-91. These actions are authorized under Academic Informational Series 1. Most of the actions involved approvals of submajors, renaming or restructuring of existing degree authorizations and/or academic departments and budgetary accounting changes with academic implications. It was the consensus of the Committee that in the future this report should be more brief and, where applicable, should include relevant cost information.

International Education - Report on artiste's in Japan and, Study Abroad Programs of the UW System, p.19

Vice President Portch presented the report on Study Abroad Programs of the University of Wisconsin System, which was prepared at the Committee's request. Regents questioned the amount of student demand in relation to the opportunities offered. Responding to a question, Vice President Portch indicated that students may not be accepted into these programs for a variety of reasons, including rigorous admissions standards in some programs.

In response to a question by Regent Lyon, the Vice President replied that many campuses allow financial aid to apply to students participating in such programs and also make adjustments in aid recognizing the increased cost to students studying abroad. Scholarships for undergraduates, however, are quite limited.

Regent Lyon further asked whether any degree programs require study abroad. Dr. Richard C. Sutton, Director of International Education, UW-La Crosse, and Chair of the UW System Council on International Education, indicated that Department of Public Instruction requirements, effective by 1992, require all foreign language instructors to have studied in a foreign country. Currently, however, he was not aware of any programs with such a requirement.

Regent Hassett suggested that business people be contacted to solicit support for foreign study scholarship aid.

pan - Auport on UW System Activities in Japan, p. 19

Executive Vice President Lyall discussed with the Committee the report of the Working Committee on UW System Activities in Japan. The conclusion was that it would be premature for the UW System to start a joint academic venture in Japan and that the UW System instead should build on existing programs. The report also recommended that availability of Japanese language study be increased for undergraduates throughout the UW System, that existing UW programs for study in Japan be supported more generously, and that credit acceptance policies for study in Japan be examined.

Executive Vice President Lyall stated that the major impediments to student participation in the programs are the high costs of such programs and the need for Japanese language fluency. It was the consensus of the Committee that the report's conclusions were appropriate.

al Opportunities - Dumann of -Equal Opportunities in Employment Report, pp 19-20

Regent Davis reported on a presentation by Dr. Marian Swoboda of the Equal Opportunities in Employment report which concluded that, although hiring statistics have improved, the greatest concern is retention rate of women and minority faculty and the net effect this rate has on the total number. Regent Davis asked about the degree of UW System management that addresses the retention problems, what was being done about hostile environments, whether the problems were being analyzed and if there were directions for improving the situation and holding management at all levels accountable.

In discussion at the Board meeting, Regent Krutsch noted data in the report which showed that 62 percent left for more attractive opportunities and another 17 percent left because their appointments were not renewed. The data did not seem to indicate negative conditions within the UW System as a reason for lack of retention.

Regent Davis replied that there is a need to collect more data on that point, since anecdotal information clearly suggests that problems exist.

Regent Krutsch noted that women were hired in approximate relationship to their availability, while minority candidates were hired significantly in excess of availability. There would be cause for concern about the fairness of the process, she felt, if they were hired significantly below availability. Noting that at some campuses there are monies available to departments if minority candidates are hired, she commented that these should be educationally-driven decisions. If there is an educational need, she did not believe money should be provided if there is a minority candidate and not be provided if there is not a minority candidate. The openness of process, she felt, is drawn into question by deciding to seek a particular kind of candidate. She inquired about the operational definition of affirmative action and whether it is legal and fair to provide only for the hiring of minority candidates.

In response, President Shaw noted that Design for Diversity has specific goals, but not quotas, to increase the number of minority students, faculty and staff. To increase the number of minority students, sufficient numbers of minority faculty and staff are needed to provide role models and some comfort level for minority students. That means being proactive in recruitment of minorities, but it does not mean lowering standards or hiring people to do unneeded work. While some campuses gave departments where need for staff exists more flexibility in receiving dollars if they found a minority candidate, there was no campus that would allow hiring of minority or other faculty or staff if the educational need does not exist. The goal of affirmative action, he explained, is to attempt to improve representation of underrepresented classes, by making choices among equally strong candidates. Persons are not hired who do not fit the particular job description. Goals are based upon market availability. While having overachieved goals in terms of availability may be a natural consequence of Design for Diversity, it is not a consequence of campuses hiring women and minorities in unneeded areas.

Stating that the process is legal, President Shaw added that he also considered it fair to take proactive measures to address a recognized societal need. What would be unfair would be to put people into positions in which they could not be effective, and UW System campuses would not do that.

Noting that the report on tenure included the percentage of women receiving tenure, Regent Vos commented that it should not become a "numbers game" in which the percentage is expected to rise each year.

Committee members engaged in lengthy discussion about the proposed policy on consensual relationships when there is a definite power differential between the parties involved and when there may be an issue of conflict of interest. While there was general agreement on the problem involved in conflict of interest situations, there was less agreement on what role, if any, Board policy should address in situations of unequal power. Deciding to take no action on the proposed resolution at this time, the Committee asked Dr. Swoboda to return with a proposal that refines the language, incorporates those base issues about which there was agreement and which includes students in the process of developing future statements.

### REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

Regent Gelatt, Chair, presented the report of the Committee.

1991-92 Base Budget Review, p. 22

In a session to which all Regents were invited, President Shaw outlined the annual budget review process, focusing on the steps that System Administration follows and those taken by the institutions to establish their annual budgets. Budget officers from three institutions described the process followed to reallocate base budget funds in the annual budget cycle.

Budget - Annual Budget Management Conditions and Tentative Decision Rules for Annual Budget Allocation, p. 22 4 R 5828, pp 22-23

President Shaw discussed the proposed decision rules for allocating the annual budget. Funds are allocated based on legislative intent, Regent policy and System policy. In addition, much of the new funding is institutional specific. If the biennial budget is not finalized by the July meeting, the Board will have to adopt an annual budget based on available information, in order to establish tuition and fee schedules for the Fall session. There was considerable discussion which focused on the Regents' concern over passing a resolution which appeared to support legislative action which is not yet in final form and which was not included in the Regent budget submission. The Business and Finance Committee agreed to address a restricted resolution in its regular Committee meeting. At that time, a revised resolution was approved to provide tentative budget decision rules for those items originally included in the Regent budget.

### Consent Agenda Items

Having been revised in Committee, Resolution 5828 was presented as a consent agenda item, along with Resolutions 5829 and 5830. Adoption of these resolutions was moved by Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Steil and carried unanimously by the Board.

for UW System President to Set Salaries, R 5830, Jp 23-25

Resolution 5830:

- (1) Unless otherwise specified by executive/legislative action, the effective dates for the payment of the 1991-92 pay plan rates will be July 1, 1991 for annual basis employees, the start of the academic year pay period for those on academic year appointments, and other dates as set by the Chancellors for persons with appointment periods commencing at times other than July 1 and the beginning of the academic year.
  - (2) Compensation adjustment allocations shall be distributed to the institutions as soon as possible after executive/legislative action and in conformity with state law and policy, and System policy.
- (3) Within the state pay plan authorization, the Board, after consultation with the President of the System, shall establish systemwide salary minima and maxima and guidelines for awarding merit increases. If the Regents' meeting schedule does not afford an opportunity for timely action in this regard, the Board authorizes the Executive Committee, after consultation with the System President, to act on these matters.

Merit determinations for faculty should be based on positive contributions by the faculty member to teaching, research, public service and/or the support functions inherent in the institution's mission. Assessment of teaching faculty shall include consideration of student evaluations (Regent Policy Document 74-13, October 4, 1974).

Merit determinations for academic, limited and other unclassified staff shall be based on supervisory assessment of meritorious performance in their areas of assigned responsibility.

- (4) An amount equal to .25% of the October 1991 payroll base for faculty and instructional academic staff shall be allocated to reward distinguished teaching in 1992-93.
- (5) Each institution shall complete its merit evaluations of continuing unclassified staff prior to July 1 and establish factors for each person which can be applied expeditiously to determine salary increases among individuals, given later information on state compensation policies for faculty and academic staff for 1991-92.
- (6) Each institution shall complete its actions on stipend schedules for nonrepresented graduate assistants prior to July 1 and shall establish a factor for adjustments which can be applied expeditiously to determine stipend increases. Stipend schedules for each graduate assistant category shall be separately established.
- (7) The Board affirms the delegated authority of the President of the System and the Chancellors to establish individual salaries at or below the Group 6 maximum of the State Executive Pay Plan for 1991-92 within state policy and the funds appropriated for that year, with appropriate annual budget documentation to be reported to the Regents for information.
- (8) The Board directs that any mandated pay plan adjustments applied to individuals in the State Executive Pay Plan and others above the Group 6 maximum shall be effective on the dates determined in the executive/legislative review. If the Regents' meeting schedule does not afford an opportunity for timely action on any discretionary pay adjustments for these individuals by the full Board, the Board authorizes the Executive Committee of the Board, in consultation with the System President, to approve any discretionary salary adjustments effective for 1991-92. Appropriate information shall be provided to all members of the Board.

(9) Compensation actions related to the unclassified pay plan and delegated to the Chancellors at or below 75% of the Group 6 maximum shall be completed in accordance with statutory requirements, legislative intent and Regents' policy and shall be reported to the President of the System by August 1, or within three weeks after the approval of the unclassified pay plans, whichever is later, to make possible the preparation of payrolls and reporting to the Board of Regents.

Disabled Student Auditors, R 5831 4 EX A, p. 25

Presenting Resolution 5831, Regent Gelatt noted that at the May meeting the Committee discussed restoration of the policy to not require needy, disabled Wisconsin residents to pay fees for auditing courses. This group would be defined as those residents who receive Old Age Survivors and Disabilities Insurance benefits under 42 USC 412.33. A change was made to the proposed resolution, Exhibit A, to clarify that only those Wisconsin residents who are themselves disabled would be able to audit courses without a fee. ### Annual Report on MIS Strategic Planning, p. 25

Presenting to the Committee the annual report on Management Information Systems strategic planning, Vice President Poellnitz discussed the accomplishments made, including implementation of WISCNET and CENTERSNET and the plans for the 1991-93 biennium which include the planning and implementation of the Central UW System Computing Facility, as required by recent Department of Administration policy. He also discussed establishing a disaster recovery plan in cooperation with the Department of Administration and acquiring funding for a number of major purchases. The recent DOA policy is a state strategic plan for information technology, which is opposed to the Regent policy on strategic MIS planning adopted in 1988. It was Regent Gelatt's opinion that the DOA policy is misguided, given current circumstances.

#### Quarterly Financial Update

Regent Gelatt reported that the financial update showed funds are being utilized to maximum extent possible. Given the forced GPR freeze lapse of \$7 million, there will be very few GPR funds carried forward to the next fiscal year. It was estimated that fees collected will exceed the budget by \$4.7 million, and these excess revenues will be used as an offset against academic fee increases in future fiscal years, in accordance with Regent policy. The only area of concern was the Athletic Department financial status.

### Status Report on Funding for Consortial Telescope Project, UN-Madison

The Committee received a status report on funding of UW-Madison's consortial telescope project. UW-Madison Dean Wiley reported that the construction of the telescope project is on target, with UW-Madison's 26 percent share to be funded from the UW Foundation Capital Campaign. If the fund raising effort falls short, there are two options open: first, the National Optical Astronomy Observatory and Yale University would both consider larger shares of the project; and second, back-up funding for the UW-Madison portion is available from the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation.

Di Madigon Athletic Department Financial Update, 26

Clast Land -

Regent Gelatt reported the Committee was advised by Athletic Director Richter that the Athletic Department still plans to end this fiscal year at a break-even point, after significant reallocation of funds. Contributions were down in the traditionally low months of February and March. Mr. Richter outlined additional measures the Athletic Department is taking to improve their financial picture. This was a status report for the current year, not a discussion of plans for the next year.

Sick Leave Policy for Faculty and Academic Staff, pp 26-27

Associate Vice President Wright discussed with the Committee proposed changes to the administrative code which would allow staff to use sick leave for parental leave and make initial eligibility requirements to earn sick leave parallel to eligibility requirements for participation in the retirement

Regent Gelatt reported that Vice President Poellnitz presented an update on implementation of a number of recommendations of the Supplies and Expenses Task Force. Vice President Brown reported on those recommendations relating to outside contracting for buildings and grounds maintenance. The Committee asked for additional information on cost savings realized from contracting out services, rather than providing services internally.

Indirect Costs - Npdale, p. 27

In a report to the Committee on indirect costs, Vice President Poellnitz outlined some of the proposed changes in circular A21. In addition to defining unallowable costs, the proposal may limit administrative indirect costs to 26 percent. There is also a proposal that would require institutions to charge the same indirect cost rate to private sources as charged to the federal government, or else lower the federal rate to that charged to private sources. There are a number of private foundations which support research, but refuse to pay indirect costs. The federal government is objecting to subsidizing these private contracts through indirect cost payments.

# A. AUDIT-ONLY ENROLLEES

The academic fee charge for individuals who register for <u>only</u> non-credit, audit-type attendance of credit classes shall be:

Wisconsin Residents - 30% of the normal per credit academic fee Nonresidents - 50% of the normal per credit academic fee

Audit fees shall be removed for all disabled Wisconsin residents who are receiving federal old age survivors and disability insurance benefits (OASDI) under 42 USC 401 to 433.

Subject to the institution's nonresident tuition remission authorization, the chancellor may waive the nonresident portion of the per credit charge for nonresidents;

The ability of a person to register only for non-credit audit-type attendance is subject to these understandings:

- a) that there be no additional classroom/laboratory space requirements or increased instructional costs resulting from the implementation of this policy;
- b) that the approval of the faculty member in charge of the class must be obtained by the auditor;
- c) that auditors receive only provisional permission to attend classes until course registration is completed at the end of the add/drop period;
- d) that any special costs for course instruction other than normal tuition charges be assessed auditors availing themselves of this opportunity;
- e) that a student who opts to enroll on an auditor basis under this policy may not change to a credit basis during the term of enrollment;
- f) that students who later seek credit by university examination for a course that they have audited must be enrolled in the university at the time the examination is taken and are subject to appropriate tuition charge and special course fees;
- g) that the UW System's general policy on the refund of academic fees will apply to audit fees;
- h) access for individual who are auditors-only will be limited to the library and non-segregated fee funded activities of the student union. A special identification card would be issued the auditor permitting such access. NO FEE SHALL BE CHARGED FOR SUCH ACCESS. Except for library and non-segregated fee funded activities of the student union, auditors-only shall not be afforded any preferential access to university facilities which is not afforded to the general public.

EXHIBIT A

- i) that Regent, university and student government regulations applying to students apply equally to audit enrollees;
- j) that the universities may determine which credit classes are open to auditors under the terms of this policy;

# B. DEGREE-SEEKING STUDENTS

The ability of degree-seeking students to audit classes is subject to the academic policies of the institution. The normal per-credit tuition will be assessed audit credits until the degree and audit credits equal the plateau where academic fees are level. When the combination of degree and audit credits exceeds the full-time credit plateau additional fees shall be assessed.

Subject to the institution's nonresident tuition remission authorization, the chancellor may waive the nonresident portion of the per-credit charge for nonresidents.
