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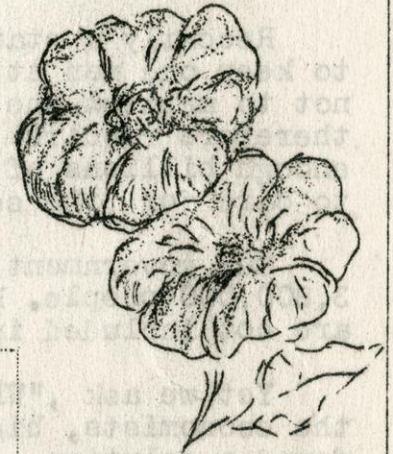

OUR YOUNG FOLKS

One of the tragedies of our present economic situation is the inability of our country to make use of our young men and women with their eager minds and pent up energies.

A recent investigation showed that 70 percent of this year's high school graduates have no job or no hope of getting any. The percent of those who have completed special training in colleges and universities is also appallingly large who have no jobs.

What are we going to do about it? It is purely an economic problem. Our business, large and small, must be given an opportunity to expand so as to take in these young people. That sounds simple but for a decade now business has been standing still.

Recently a statement was made that it takes \$4000 capital goods to keep one man at work. To absorb these millions of young people not to mention the other millions of older men and women would therefore require 16 billions of dollars. There are probably enough billions of capital goods now in existence if put in order to care for the seven and one-half other millions unemployed.

Our government has the largest payroll in its history, totalling 3,800,000 people. Emergency labor is employing 2,918,000. All these are not included in the 11,500,000 called unemployed.

Yet we ask, "What are we going to do about it?" The New Deal, the economists, big business, little business has not yet anywhere found a solution, so it is not expected that you and I can solve it. We might have our ideas, however, and it is the summation of all these ideas which will some day find the solution.

It must be remembered that America was until recent years looked to as the "bread basket" of the world. Just as America during the World War found that she could supply many of her own needs, so many other countries from necessity found that they could produce many things which they formerly bought from us. A survey should be made to find out what other countries need which we can supply better and cheaper than other countries might supply.

In turn there might be many things which we can buy at much better advantage than we can produce. Sure it will mean in many cases the diversion of our plants or fields to other products than that for which they are now used.

With the radio, the airplane, faster going vessels, the World is growing very small. Without discussing Leagues of Nations or other political affairs, we must be all one great family of nations when it comes to economics. We have the same Mother Earth from which to wrest our existence. The Great Creating Force, whom we call God has placed here and there its minerals, its various kinds of vegetation. It is Man's Job to make use of them to the best advantage of the most people who live on the face of the Earth.

Twenty years from now, these young people whom we are thinking about today will be taking care of our railroads, our steamships, our radio stations, our business big and small. Let's forget our racial hatreds, our prejudices, our jealousies, and work to better find a way to use the God-given fruits, grains, metals, et cetera.

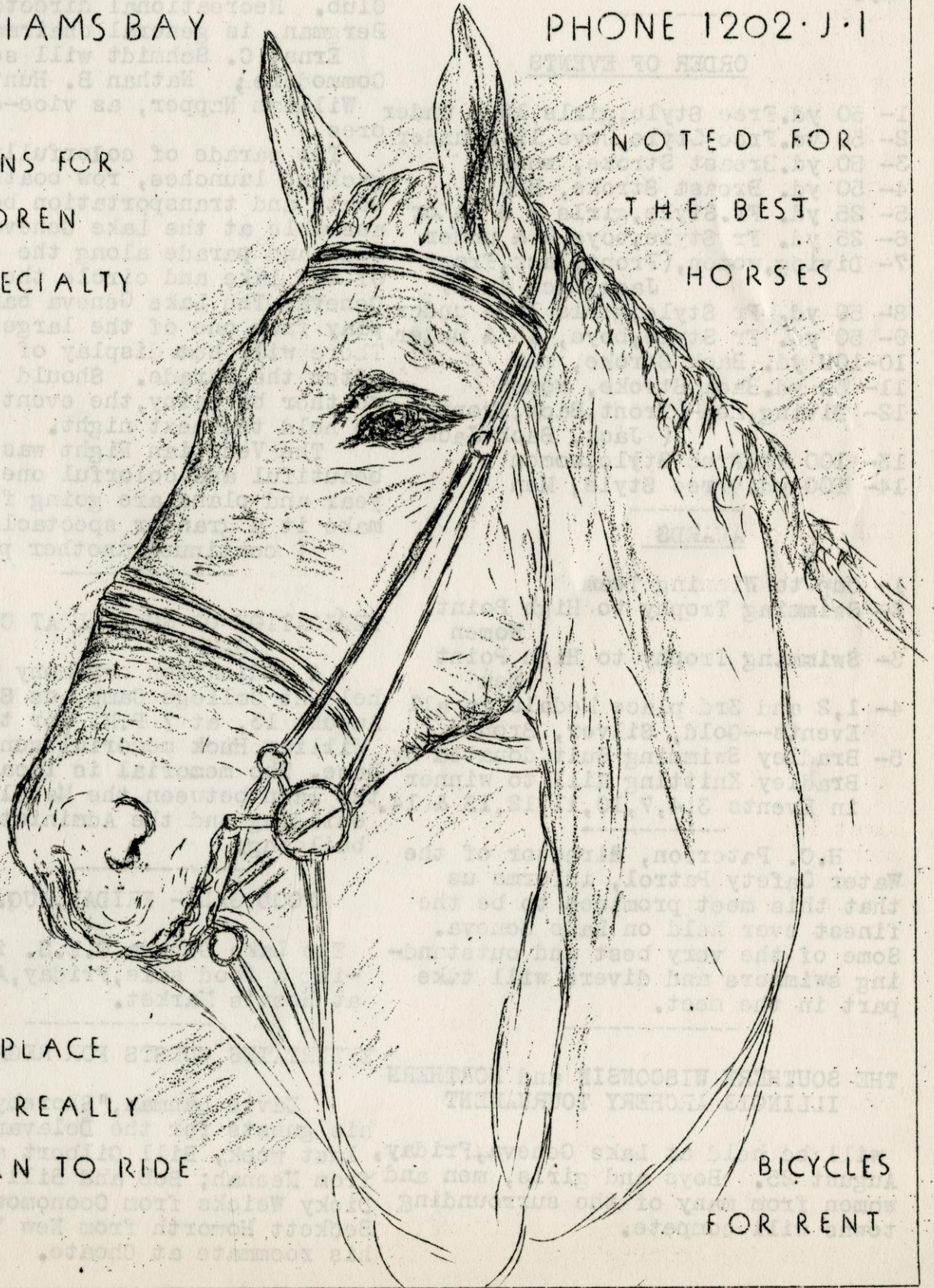

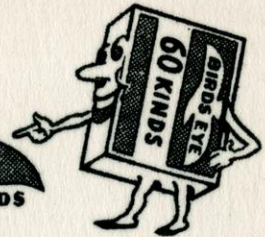

IT SEEMED AS IF ALL WALWORTH COUNTY ACCEPTED THE INVITATION TO INSPECT THE NEW WALWORTH COUNTY HOSPITAL.

Reports vary from five to seven thousand visitors. There was a continuous procession through the beautiful building on Saturday and Sunday afternoons.

On the first floor we saw the reception rooms, doctors' and nurses' offices, kitchen and dining room. The pure white walls and the various colored marbleized rubber tiling used in the floors are very attractive.

The second floor will comfortably accommodate 42 patients, most of the rooms having two beds and four wards in the east ell.

The third floor is the splendidly equipped maternity ward, with its large nursery, two delivery rooms, one finished in delicate peach color tile and the other in dainty green.

While inspecting this part of the hospital many wondered who the first baby would be to have the privilege of being born in it.

FIRST BABY

The first baby was born in the new hospital at 11:35 on Tuesday to Mrs. George Hubbard, East Troy who was also the first entry.

On the fourth floor are two operating rooms, equipped with all the latest equipment. A nurse demonstrated the new lamp which directed the light where needed during an operation.

An elevator is located in the center of the building easily accessible to the ambulance entrance.

The large enclosed porches at the south of the second, third, fourth floors open onto a beautiful pastoral scene which should do much to help the convalescent.

Miss Margaret Schloemer, head nurse, has reason to be especially proud of

the kitchen where everything except the garbage receptacle is electrical.

Genoa City citizens furnished a room in the hospital in memory of Dr. B.J. Bill, who was the oldest practicing physician in Walworth County at the time of his death.

The Lake Geneva Woman's Club has furnished a private room. A private room furnished in memory of John T. Jennings, by the Jennings family of Lake Geneva.

A delivery table was donated by the Lynn Neighborly Club.

A floor fountain was a gift of the Williams Bay Woman's Club. Walworth and Fontana citizens have made donations to the hospital.

The equipment and the 45 patients were removed from the old hospital on Monday to the new one, but it is expected to take a week to complete the transfer.

Members of the Lake Geneva Woman's Club and the Auxiliary of the Walworth County Medical Association acted as hostesses on Saturday and Sunday. Among them were Mrs. Chas. Brady, Mrs. H.W. MacDonald, Lake Geneva; Mrs. T.L. Kroyer, Walworth; Mrs. J.D. Warrick, Sharon; Mrs. C.Y. Wiswell, Wms Bay; Mrs. H.J. Kenny, Mrs. N.F. Crowe, Delavan; Mrs. G.H. Young, Mrs. Rawlings, Elkhorn, the latter acted as general chairman for the auxiliary. James Matthew Patton, C.H. Bender and Harry Lowry, represented the Lake Geneva Woman's Club.

On the nurses staff of the hospital are two Williams Bay young ladies- Miss Birdie Anderson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Anderson, and Miss Ethel Palm, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Palm.

The garden clubs of Walworth County are sponsoring a public card party Tuesday, afternoon, August 22, at Big Foot Country Club. Mrs. H.L. MacDonald, Lake Geneva, is general chairman. The benefit is for the landscaping of the grounds for the new hospital. After this is done it is hoped to make a drive to have trees planted, each subscriber to have a plate on the tree showing who donated it. (continued)

ROBERT WILLIAM HUCK MEMORIAL
SUNDIAL TO BE DEDICATED SUNDAY

A bronze sundial, set upon a base of weathered-edge Wisconsin limestone, is to be dedicated at George Williams College Camp on Lake Geneva, Wisconsin, next Sunday, August 13, during a 7:00 P.M. Vesper program. Erected as a memorial to her son, Robert William Huck, the sundial is the gift of Mrs. Grace E. Bruns of Chicago, a long-time friend of the Camp and for many years a summer resident upon the shores of Lake Geneva.

Participating in the dedicatory service, a portion of which has been prepared for the occasion by Dr. Rolland W. Schloerb, pastor of the Hyde Park Baptist Church of Chicago, will be Mr. Robert R. Vernon, director of College Camp, Mr. S. B. Chapin a member of the Board of Trustees of George Williams College, and Associate Professor Franz A. Aust of the Horticultural Department of the University of Wisconsin. The unveiling of the memorial will be performed by Mrs. Ethel Kester of Chicago, and Mr. Harrison Kincaid of Williams Bay, close friends of Mrs. Bruns.

The memorial was designed and its erection supervised by Mr. Aust as a member of the firm of Aust and Aust, landscape architects of Madison, Wisconsin. The slabs of limestone which make up the pedestal and bench-like base for the sundial were carefully selected from a Fondulac quarry for their appropriateness in an out-of-doors Lake Geneva setting. The main slab which forms the upper bench surface has distinct glacial markings visible upon it. The slab has been so cut and set as to permit these scratches to disclose the actual direction taken by the Wisconsin glacier as it passed over this area fifty thousand years ago.

Another unique feature contained in the design of this memorial is found in the bronze collar which encircles the sundial proper. Upon it are shown the names of many of the cities from which College Camp guests come each year and the correct airline distances to the respective cities. The marks which point them out have been accurately located. The exact angles and computations as to distance were determined with the assistance of Professor Georges Von Diesbroeck of the Yerkes Observatory staff of the University of Chicago. The airline distance to Chicago is shown as 67 miles.

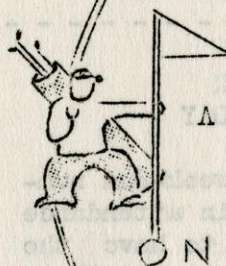

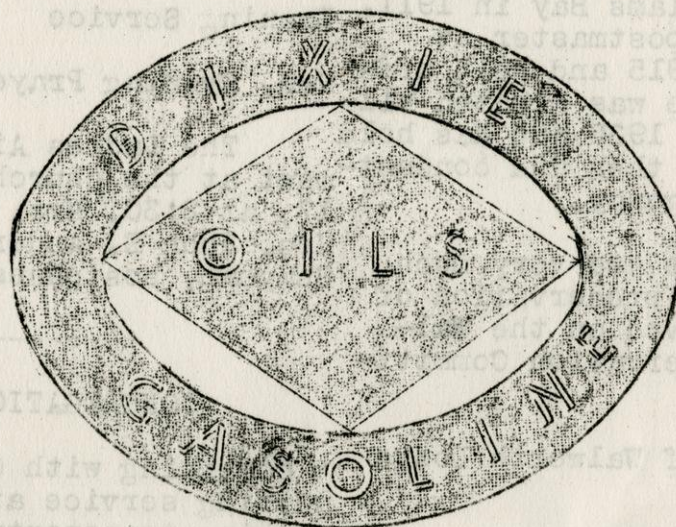
