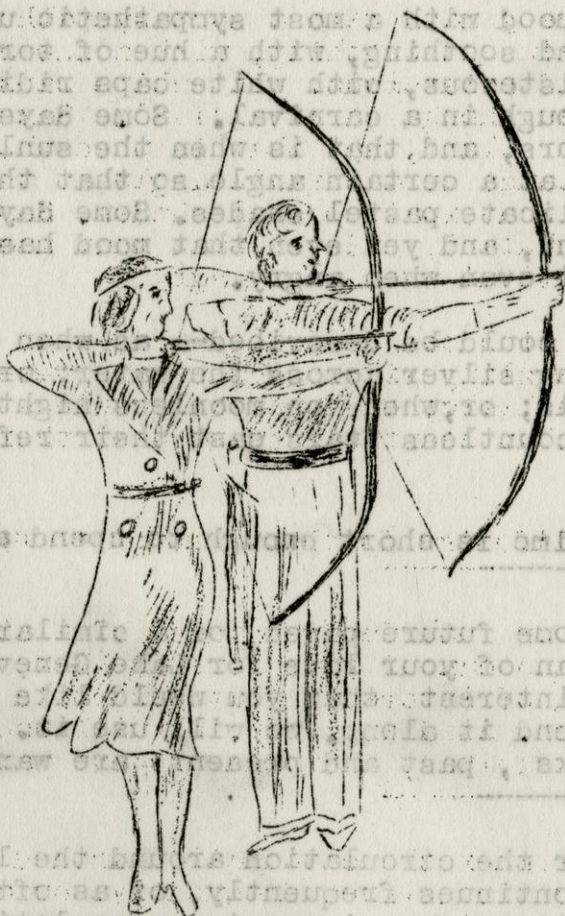

GOV. HEIL IS GUEST SPEAKER AT BANQUET IN WILLIAMS BAY

The annual guest night dinner of the Men's Community Club of Williams Bay was held on Monday evening at College Camp. Four hundred persons attended, representing all communities of Walworth County, and many summer visitors.

Governor Julius P. Heil was the guest speaker. A boat trip around the lake in the yacht "Murietta", Mr. S.B. Chapin's boat, had been planned for part of the entertainment for the Governor, but owing to weather conditions the ride was cancelled.

At 6:30 p.m. as the guests were assembling, Mr. Cassius W. Gould, Camp organist, played an organ recital in the Auditorium. Dinner was served at 7:15. M.T. Peterson acted as toastmaster; Rev. Francis Drake, pastor of the Congregational church of North Hadley, Mass. said grace. Music was furnished by the College Camp String Trio, College Camp Singers, directed by Claire John Thomas and the Men's Octet, the latter greeted the Governor with a special song "How Do You Do Governor Heil". Mr. Harry Cadwell, radio entertainer, who has been directing the social activities at the Camp this summer, lead the group in a Badger State Songfest.

R.E. Burton, President of the Men's Community Club, was general chairman of arrangements, members of the committee were, Myron Piel, M.T. Peterson, F.L. Van Epps, Dr. Wiswell, Lawrence Hollister, R.R. Vernon., William Freytag. Mr. S.B. Chapin and Rev. Francis Drake were special guests.

All who attended the banquet went home with the feeling that they had enjoyed an informal visit with the Governor. of Wisconsin. He told of his early life and hardships, the struggle he and his wife had made during the first twenty-five years of their married life, which helped to make him a master in industry.

He touched on the affairs of state, telling of the difference between running a private and looking out for the rights of 3,000,000 people. Politics is a big business

so the governor of the state is busy looking out for the people, as many who hold public office are there working as propagandist. If a tax is proposed on one thing, a train load of persons arrive at the capital to protest its unfairness, and so on. A Tax is alright for the other fellow but not for them, but as Governor Heil said-"If I find any who are not honest with the tax payers money, out they will go." The Governor is a statesman, not a politician.

One felt as he listened that the Governor was sincere in his efforts to run the state on a business basis. A Purchasing Agent had saved \$237,000 in the first six months and his salary was \$2500, was given as an example of the possible saving in government by using business methods. Governor Heil praised the citizens of Walworth County for their splendid cooperation in State affairs.

The Governor very kindly autographed programs for many as they greeted him. On some he wrote a salutation.

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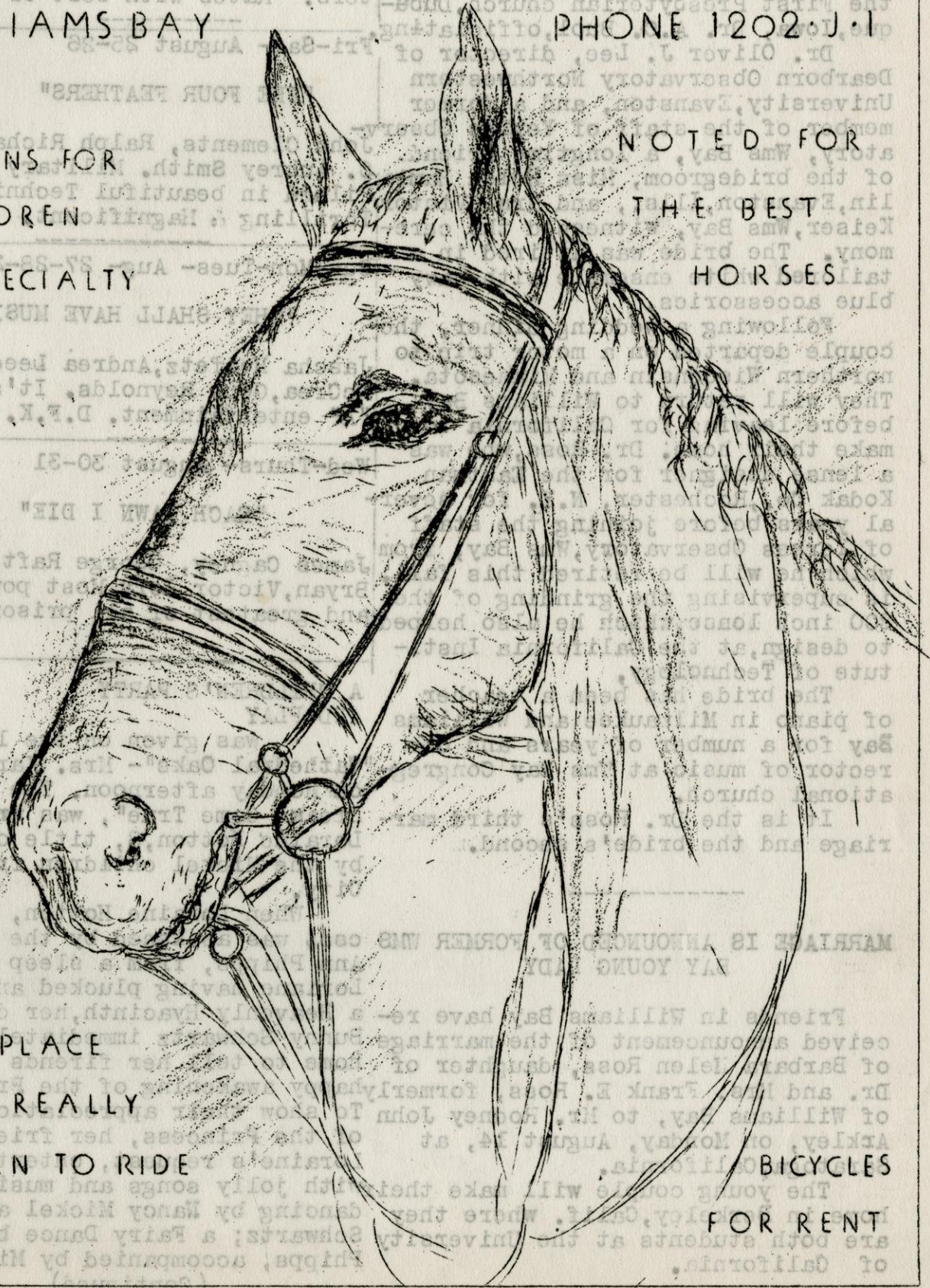
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ANNA LEE, MUSIC TEACHER OF WMS BAY
