

Some days she is regally bedecked with rich colors, and that is when the sunlight is filtered thru the white clouds at a certain angle so that the clear waters below reflect the delicate pastel shades. Some days she is grey and rough and turbulant, and yet even that mood has its charm for us, for she is beautiful even when angry.

A score more of beautiful studies could be described—as when the full moon throws a path of dazzling silver across the water; or when the sun sets over the western hills; or, when on moonless nights, the air is usually so clear that countless stars cast their reflection in the clear waters.

Little wonder then that a lifetime is short enough to spend at.




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RIBBONS FOR LAKE GENEVA FLOWER SHOW 1939

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
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


