**PRESENT:** Regents DeBardeleben, Friedrich, Greenquist, Kahl, Pasch, Renk,  
and Werner. Regent Gelatt entered the meeting at 9:58 A.M.

**ABSENT:** Regent Nellen, due to absence from the state; and Regent Ziegler,  
absent due to a death in the family.

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There being no objection, President Greenquist ordered that the  
minutes of the Regular Meeting of the Board held on December 15, 1967, stand  
approved as sent out to the Regents.

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## REPORTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY

President Harrington noted that the Regents had scheduled a public hearing at 1:30 P.M. on proposed changes in Section UW 1.07 of the Wisconsin Administrative Code, which had been prepared by the Administration at the request of the Regents. President Harrington explained that there were a few legal questions in connection with the proposed changes, which the administration would like to explore further; that the faculty committee, of which Professor Mermin is Chairman, and which is studying student demonstrations, and a comparable committee at the UWM, and the University Committee in Madison, would like additional time for further discussions in order to make further suggestions regarding changes in the proposed rules; and that Regents Nellen and Ziegler were absent at this meeting, and several other Regents might not be in attendance during the entire afternoon session. Therefore, he suggested that the Regents move forward with the public hearing at 1:30 P.M., but that the actual consideration of the proposed rule changes by the Regents be deferred preferably to the March meeting of the Regents, which would be the next Regent meeting to be held in Madison. There being no objection, President Greenquist stated that the public hearing would be held at 1:30 P.M., but that consideration of the proposed rule changes by the Regents would be deferred to a later meeting.

President Harrington reported that the public hearing to be held at 1:30 P.M., would be followed by a meeting of the Regents with the University Faculty Council. He also reported that there had been some indications that a considerable number of individuals, including representatives of student organizations, might appear at the public hearing at 1:30 P.M.; and he suggested that the Regents might want to move the public hearing to a larger room, if a much larger group than fifty individuals showed up for the hearing. It was agreed that the matter of moving the hearing to another location would be determined when the hearing was convened.

President Harrington, in presenting the list of Gifts, Grants, and U.S. Government Contracts, referred to the summary on page 25 of the list, and noted the continuation of the trend, which he had called to the attention of the Regents for several months and particularly at the last meeting, of the decline of funds from the federal government. He pointed out that the decline of federal funds consisted of both a slowing up of new grants and of releasing approved funds. He stated that this was obviously a serious situation, although the total funds received this year were ahead of the previous year. He explained that this problem was more acute because of the state budget situation, which permitted no leeway in budget adjustments, because the budget had been kept down to avoid the need for additional taxes. He pointed out that the budget situation was aggravated by increased costs such as the increase in postal rates, which would cost the University many thousands of dollars. He stated that it might be necessary to make some difficult budget adjustments during this calendar year. He informed the Regents that the administration would discuss with them, at a subsequent meeting, possible efforts to raise more funds from the larger alumni givers and from foundations.

In calling attention to a number of specific items in the list of Gifts, Grants, and U.S. Government Contracts, President Harrington referred to the gift of \$115,000 from the Wisconsin Student Aid Foundation, Inc., for athletic scholarships. In this connection, he suggested that the Regents might have noticed a newspaper report about the financial problems of the University Athletic Department, including discussion of the possibility of dropping minor sports, or grants-in-aid for minor sports, and the difficulty of meeting special obligations. He explained that the newspaper report had reference to a preliminary discussion of this situation; and that the Central Administration and the Madison Campus Administration were looking into this financial problem, and would report to the Regents at a later meeting. He noted that the financial difficulties of the Athletic Department had been anticipated months ago. He explained that one of the difficulties was the falling off in outside giving. On behalf of himself and Chancellor Sewell, President Harrington stated that there was no thought of dropping minor sports. In answer to a question as to whether it would be necessary to increase the price of football tickets to \$6.00, President Harrington stated that that possibility would have to be determined not later than the April meeting of the Regents. Regent Pasch, who had inquired about the possibility of an increase in the ticket prices, suggested that, when this matter is brought to the Regents, it would be desirable to have a comparison of the ticket prices of the other schools in the Big Ten. President Harrington suggested that that information could be provided for the Regents, as well as other Big Ten comparisons, such as funds raised from outside sources; but he emphasized that some of that information might have to be kept confidential.

Regent DeBardleben stated that he would like to comment on President Harrington's remarks about the budget stringency which this University faces, and his example of the increase in postal rates. He stated that it seemed to him that saying that this increase could not be anticipated was charging this Board and the University Administration with neglect of which they were not guilty and exonerated the Governor and the Legislature from the responsibility that was solely theirs. He recalled the University request, in our budget hearings before the Joint Finance Committee of the Legislature, to restore the 5% inflationary factor; and he recalled that it was pointed out to the Joint Finance Committee that to not approve that factor would result in cutting the budget beyond repair. He stated that this was an example of the failure of the Governor and the Legislature to recognize the economic facts of the situation, to the detriment of the University.

President Harrington called attention to an additional gift, on page 26 of the list of Gifts, Grants and U.S. Government Contracts, which had come in too late to be sent out with the list sent to the Regents in advance of the meeting, and which related to a gift of \$400 from Professor Karl Paul Link to establish the University of Wisconsin Student Defense Fund. President Harrington recommended that this item be amended by substituting the words "Madison Campus Administration" for the words "Office of Student Affairs on the Madison Campus". President Harrington stated that this gift from Professor Link was by no means his first gift to the University of Wisconsin, since the amount that he has made available for University research totals in the seven figures, by reason of his development of Dicumarol and Warfarin. He also explained that Professor Link has long been interested in the question of the defense of people who are engaged in protesting and demonstrating, and who may consequently run into legal difficulties. He stated that Professor Link had given

this as a first gift toward the establishment of a fund to be used for the defense of such students; and explained that the late Professor Howard Beale, of our History Department, had suggested the establishment of such a fund, but had died before he was able to set one up. Regent Renk questioned the acceptance of this gift, inquiring why Professor Link did not help such students individually. He questioned helping students pay for the cost of defending themselves against violation of University regulations. President Harrington stated that the University shared the view that all persons are entitled to have legal defense, which is a principle of the American legal system. He also explained that Professor Link could have provided these funds through some other organization, such as the American Civil Liberties Union, but that he had chosen to set up a fund in the University, which would be available for use in the future and to which other individuals could make contributions from time to time, either by gifts or by bequests in their wills. President Harrington suggested that the Regents might wish to separate the question and have a separate action regarding the acceptance of the gift from Professor Link.

Upon motion by Regent Werner, seconded by Regents Friedrich and Renk, it was

VOTED, That the gifts and grants listed in the statement of Gifts, Grants, and U.S. Government Contracts, presented at this meeting (Copy filed with the papers of this meeting), with the exception of the item on page 26 of the statement, be accepted and the appropriate officers of the University be authorized to sign the agreements; and that the Federal contracts listed therein be approved, ratified and confirmed.

Regent Werner moved acceptance of the item on page 26 of the statement of Gifts, Grants, and U.S. Government Contracts, presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting), as amended in accordance with the above suggestion by President Harrington, and the motion was seconded by Regent Pasch.

Regent DeBardleben stated that he was very pleased with this gift and hoped that there would be additions to this fund, but stated that he was somewhat concerned about the manner of administration. He stated that he would have no hesitation in this regard with respect to the Madison Campus Administration as now constituted, but was concerned that a subsequent Madison Campus Administration might have a different interpretation as to the use of the fund. He hoped that the administration of this fund would be done in liberalness, rather than restrictiveness. President Harrington explained that the initial choice of the Administration regarding the administration of this fund was the Office of Student Affairs, but, after further consideration, had decided it would be better to make the acceptance broader and place the administration in the hands of the Madison Campus Administration. He suggested that the Madison Administration could move forward in setting up the procedures for administering this fund, and that the procedure decided upon could be reported later to the Regents for their information.

The question was put on the above motion, and it was voted, with Regent Renk voting "No".

Upon motion by Regent Friedrich, seconded by Regent Kahl, it was VOTED:

1. That the approximately 900 actions by the President of the University since the last meeting of the Regents, relating to appointments, resignations, leaves of absence, and changes of status of faculty personnel with rank less than that of Associate Professor and other non-classified civil service personnel with salaries at the annual rate of \$12,500 or less, on file with the Central Business Office and the Secretary of the Faculty; and to non-resident tuition remissions, be approved, ratified, and confirmed.
2. That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions By Administrative Officers To The Board Of Regents and Informational Items Reported For The Regent Record (EXHIBIT A attached) be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed.

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Vice President Clodius presented the following recommendation:

That, upon the recommendation of the faculty of the College of Agriculture, the Madison faculty committee on Naming University Buildings, the Madison Campus Administration, and the Central Administration, the Agricultural and Life Science Library be named the Harry Steenbock Memorial Library.

Regent Renk moved approval of the above recommendation, the motion was seconded by Regent Werner, and it was voted.

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Regent DeBardleben moved approval of the following recommendations relating to the granting of degrees and certificates, and the motion was seconded by Regent Kahl:

1. That degrees and certificates be granted and confirmed as of the end of the first semester of 1967-68, for candidates at the University of Wisconsin in Madison and for candidates at the University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee, to such candidates as are certified by the appropriate Registrar as having met the requirements for their appropriate degrees and certificates; and that honors and awards be awarded, as shown in the Commencement Programs.

2. That degrees and certificates be granted and confirmed for candidates at the University of Wisconsin in Madison and at the University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee, from time to time prior to the end of the second semester of 1967-68, to such candidates as are certified by the appropriate Registrar as having met the requirements for their appropriate degrees and certificates.

Vice President Clodius noted that, in accordance with the previous action by the Regents, the certificates and diplomas to be issued at the Mid-Year Commencement, for the first time, will also carry the name of the Chancellor of the appropriate campus, in addition to the name of the President of the Regents and the President of the University.

The question was put on the above motion and it was voted.

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President Harrington presented the following recommendation:

That authority be granted to prepare plans and specifications and to advertise for bids for the addition of a greenhouse and connecting link to the Walnut Street Greenhouses, at a total estimated project cost of \$112,488, to be financed with \$56,244 from Gift and Grant funds and \$56,244 from University matching funds.

Director James Edsall explained the above recommendation, showed the location of the project, which consisted of an additional greenhouse range and the completion of an existing one on the Walnut Street Greenhouses. He explained that the funds for this project would be provided one-half from Agricultural funds and one-half from gifts and grants.

Regent DeBardleben moved approval of the above recommendation, the motion was seconded by Regent Renk, and it was voted.

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President Harrington reported that the next item on the agenda was a progress report on academic planning for the University of Wisconsin - Green Bay and the University of Wisconsin - Parkside; and stated that brief reports would be made by Chancellors Weidner and Wyllie.

Vice President Clodius stated that it was appropriate to have this discussion with the Regents at this time in preparation for the consideration of this subject by the Plans and Policies Subcommittee of the Coordinating Committee for Higher Education on the following Tuesday. He indicated that, following the consideration of this subject by the Plans and Policies Subcommittee of the Coordinating Committee for Higher Education, the administration would bring in a recommendation to the Regents in February, and then submit the

Regent recommendation on this subject to the Coordinating Committee for Higher Education in March. Vice President Clodius referred to a series of documents relating to the academic planning for the University of Wisconsin - Green Bay and the University of Wisconsin - Parkside, copies of which had been sent to the Regents in advance of this meeting, under date of January 9, 1968 (copies of which are filed with the papers of this meeting). Vice President Clodius stated that Chancellors Wyllie and Weidner, in that order, would discuss the materials that had been sent out to the Regents relating to their campuses.

(Regent Gelatt entered the meeting at 9:58 A.M.)

Chancellor Wyllie briefly reviewed the material which had been sent to the Regents in advance of this meeting regarding the academic planning for the University of Wisconsin - Parkside.

Regarding the analysis of student interest in the academic program for the Parkside Campus, Regent Kahl inquired whether it was based on the opinions of the few Center students in that area. Chancellor Wyllie explained that the data did not rely only on Center students, but also included a study of Milwaukee students and also considerable data on a national basis.

Regent Pasch inquired whether the planning for the University of Wisconsin - Parkside was on schedule; and Chancellor Wyllie stated that he believed it was on schedule, and hoped that approval of the academic program by the Regents and the Coordinating Committee would be obtained in time to permit the offering of the majors a year from next September.

Chancellor Weidner reviewed the material sent to the Regents in advance of this meeting on the academic planning for the University of Wisconsin - Green Bay.

Chancellor Weidner explained in some detail the proposed innovation of a 4-1-4 semester system for the Green Bay Campus, under which the first semester of the academic year would start the first of September and finish before Christmas, with the second semester starting about February 4 or 5 and finishing before Memorial Day, and with the month of January being devoted to individual study and off-campus study activities. There was considerable discussion of the activities the student would pursue and the extent of involvement of the faculty during the January period under this proposed system.

There was discussion of the probability of the large percentage of the students at the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay moving into graduate programs, because of the types of programs proposed for that campus. Chancellor Weidner estimated that a substantial number of the students would go on to professional school work, noting that, in all cases a bachelor's degree is not considered a terminal degree. He pointed out that the purpose of the program was to train people to be useful to society.

Vice President Clodius reminded the Regents of the reasons for the two new campuses being established and the rationale that lies behind their creation. One was to provide an educational opportunity close to home. Another was the need for new campuses to meet the needs of a University kind of program in other areas of the state, involving the characteristics of the University, namely, teaching, research and public service; and also the purpose of managing

enrollments to control the rampant growth that had been forecast for the Madison Campus. He pointed out that an attempt had been made to be faithful to these goals in drawing up these new campuses, which are to be initially four year programs, with graduate work and research to follow as needs and resources become available. He also noted that fees at the new campuses should be at the level of the fees at the University Centers until the new campuses develop to full level University programs. He also stated that it was contemplated that there would be students in residence (housed) on these new campuses.

President Harrington stated that the statements by Vice President Clodius were a summary of the thinking of the Regents on the development of these two new campuses. He suggested that, if there were any disagreements on the part of the Regents regarding the points made by Vice President Clodius, that he would like the Regents to so indicate at this time. He emphasized that the thinking had been that the two new campuses, in due course, would include graduate study, research work, and resident dormitories, which would aid in keeping the Madison Campus from moving forward too rapidly. Referring to the later aspects of the development of the two new campuses, as expressed by Vice President Clodius and President Harrington, Regent DeBardeleben expressed the opinion that they represented the thinking of the Regents, and inquired whether it would be helpful for the Regents to take an action in support of the eventual development of graduate programs, research work, and resident dormitories at the two new campuses. President Greenquist, indicating that this report at this time was for information purposes only, pointed out that on the following Tuesday the academic planning for the two new campuses would be considered by the Plans and Policies Subcommittee of the Coordinating Committee for Higher Education. It was agreed that the question of whether or not the Regents should take an action at this time with respect to the long range development of the two new campuses should be deferred until later in the meeting.

At the request of President Harrington, University Counsel Charles Stathas reported on the recent decision by Dane County Circuit Judge Jackman rejecting the claims of the plaintiffs in the case, relating to the site for the campus of the University of Wisconsin - Parkside, that the President of the University was not properly a representative of the Regents on the Site Selection Committee, and that the amount of land being acquired by Kenosha County for the Parkside Campus was excessive. Mr. Stathas and Chancellors Weidner and Wyllie also explained the status of the other court actions regarding the sites for the University of Wisconsin - Green Bay and University of Wisconsin - Parkside.

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President Greenquist announced that the meeting would be recessed for the holding of committee meetings; and noted that the meeting would be reconvened following the public hearing at 1:30 P.M., on the proposed revisions in Chapter UW 1.07 of the Wisconsin Administrative Code. President Greenquist appointed Regent Werner Chairman pro tem, of the Business and Finance Committee, in the absence of Regent Ziegler. The meeting recessed at 10:45 A.M.

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During the recess of the formal Regent meeting, a public hearing was held at 1:30 P.M., January 12, 1968, in Room 1820 Van Hise Hall, Madison on the Proposed Order Of The Regents Of The University of Wisconsin Amending Rules (EXHIBIT B attached), relating to the revision of Section UW 1.07 of the Wisconsin Administrative Code. At the beginning of the public hearing, President Greenquist announced that the Regents, in the morning session, had agreed that final action on these proposed rule changes would not be taken by the Regents until probably the March meeting of the Regents. He announced that the public hearing was held pursuant to the provisions of the Wisconsin Statutes relating to the adoption of rules in the Wisconsin Administrative Code. There were no appearances in favor of the proposed rule changes. Professor Eugene Cameron, Chairman of the Madison University Committee, made a statement suggesting that the University Committee be given the opportunity to further examine the proposed rules before they are adopted. Eight individuals, consisting of students, former students, non-students, and one member of the faculty appeared at the hearing and made statements in opposition to adoption of the proposed rule changes. Seventeen additional individuals registered in opposition to the proposed rule changes. Regent DeBardleben asked that he be recorded as opposing the proposed sections UW 1.07(9), (18), (19), and (20), as set forth in the Proposed Order for revision of Section UW 1.07 of the Wisconsin Administrative Code.

The public hearing was closed at 2:50 P.M.

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The meeting reconvened at 3:05 P.M., with President Greenquist presiding.

PRESENT: Regents DeBardleben, Friedrich, Gelatt, Greenquist, Kahl, Pasch, and Renk.

ABSENT: Regents Nellen, Werner, and Ziegler.

Consideration of the Reports and Recommendations of the President of the University was continued with a meeting of the Regents and the members of the University Faculty Council. Professor James Villemonte, Chairman of the University Faculty Council, introduced to the Regents the members of the Council who were present. President Greenquist introduced the Regents who were present.

Professor Villemonte brought the Regents up to date on the organization of the University Faculty Assembly, and distributed to the Regents copies of Chapter 3 of the Laws and Regulations Governing the University of Wisconsin,

which had been adopted by the University Faculty on May 1, 1967 and approved by the Regents on May 5, 1967, relating to the University Faculty Assembly.

Professor Villemonte announced that the first meeting of the University Faculty Assembly would be held on February 3, 1968; that copies of the agenda of the meeting would be sent to each Regent; and that the Regents were cordially invited to attend the meeting, which would be opened by a statement by President Greenquist. He indicated that the main items to be considered at the first meeting of the Faculty Assembly would be the organization of the Assembly and consideration of additions to several chapters of the Laws and Regulations Governing The University of Wisconsin. He stated that one of the main thrusts of the University Faculty Assembly during the first year would be to consider and bring to the Regents suggestions relating to possible revisions in Chapter 36 of the Wisconsin Statutes, relating to the government of the University of Wisconsin. There was considerable discussion by the Regents and members of the University Faculty Council relating to possible revisions in Chapter 36 of the Wisconsin Statutes. The revisions in Chapter 36, which had been proposed by the Select Committee of the Senate, but had not been enacted by the Legislature, prior to its adjournment, were discussed. President Greenquist urged careful consideration by the faculty and the Regents of possible revisions in Chapter 36, in order to be prepared for any possible proposals by the next session of the Legislature, or by the Select Committee of the Senate, which probably would be holding meetings between now and the time of the next session of the Legislature. With reference to revising Chapter 36, the Regents reiterated their support of maintaining the long standing tradition of the involvement of the faculty in the government of the University. Professor Villemonte stated that the faculty well recognized the support of the Regents of that tradition. Both members of the Board of Regents and members of the University Faculty Council indicated that, upon further study, it might well be determined that no revisions in Chapter 36 would be desirable; and indicated that wholesale revisions and compromises should not be made in considering revision of Chapter 36 of the Wisconsin Statutes.

The members of the University Faculty Council left the meeting, and the meeting was recessed at 4:00 P.M.

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The meeting reconvened at 4:07 P.M.

Vice President Clodius introduced an additional item. He noted the increase in the problems of the University resulting from the increasing growth and complexity of the University. He pointed out that one of these was the whole area of problems that relate to protection, security, and safety. He recalled his long standing concern with aspects of protection and security, particularly with reference to expensive laboratory equipment and explosive and volatile chemicals, as well as the protection and safety of individuals working with them. He noted that, in the earlier days of the universities, these matters were far removed from the offices of the University administration, but now fell more in the purview of the Chancellors' offices. He explained that the administration now proposed that

a part time position be set up in the office of the Chancellor of the Madison Campus for a person to advise with respect to establishing policies and setting up programs relating to the protection and security of facilities, equipment, and individuals. He stated that this part time position should be an academic rather than a classified civil service position, and he presented the following recommendation:

That the position of Assistant to the Vice Chancellor for Administration, Madison Campus (part time) be approved.

Chancellor Sewell indicated that there was no one presently on his staff who is qualified to counsel in this area of protection and security.

Regent DeBardeleben interrogated Vice President Clodius at some length regarding this recommendation; and expressed the opinion that the administration intended to recommend someone for appointment to this position later in the meeting; and stated that he opposed the recommendation because the intent of it was to take someone out of the classified civil service and put them on the academic staff at a higher salary level. He stated that he did not believe a police chief should be a policy maker; he stated that he would vote against the recommendation. He questioned that the duties of the individual to be recommended for this position would be changed in any way. Vice President Clodius stated that the individual would take on additional responsibilities, but would be acting in an advisory capacity in the Chancellor's office and would not be establishing policy on his own initiative. Regent Friedrich questioned the part time aspect of the proposed position; and inquired when the individual holding the position would be an assistant to the Vice Chancellor and when he would not. President Harrington indicated that this recommendation had been very carefully considered by the administration; that the problems involved were becoming increasingly important; and that he recommended approval of the recommendation.

Regent Renk moved approval of the above recommendation, the motion was seconded by Regent Pasch, and it was voted, with Regents DeBardeleben and Friedrich voting "No".

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The Secretary reported for the record the acceptance, prior to December 31, 1967, on behalf of The Regents of the University of Wisconsin, of an additional one-eighth undivided interest in the property owned by Mrs. Elinor G. Pritzlaff, on Newberry Boulevard, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, bringing the interest of the Regents in this property to an undivided three-fourths interest.

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President Greenquist presented the Report of the Executive Committee (EXHIBIT C attached).

Upon motion by Regent Friedrich, seconded by Regent Pasch, it was VOTED, That the resolutions adopted by the Executive Committee since the December 15, 1967 regular meeting of the Board, as set forth in EXHIBIT C attached, be included in the record as official actions of the Executive Committee.

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Regent Pasch presented the Report of the Educational Committee.

Upon motion by Regent Pasch, seconded by Regents Friedrich and Renk, it was

VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the Faculty of the College of Agriculture and of the Madison Faculty, the name of the College of Agriculture be changed to the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences.

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Upon motion by Regent Pasch, seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, it was VOTED:

That the 1968-69 stipend schedule for graduate teaching, research, project and program assistants be established as follows:

Regent Pasch moved approval of the following recommendations of the Educational Committee, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardleben, and it was voted:

1. That Eugene L. Hartley be appointed Dean of the College of Community Sciences and Professor of Psychology, University of Wisconsin - Green Bay, effective September 1, 1968, at an annual salary of \$23,750.
2. That Herbert O. Kubly be appointed Professor of English, Parkside Campus, beginning with the academic year 1969-70, at an academic year salary of \$18,000.
3. That Juan I. Valencia be appointed Senior Scientist, Department of Zoology, College of Letters and Science, Madison Campus, at an annual rate of \$13,500, effective January 13, 1968.

EXHIBIT A

ORDER OF THE REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN  
AMENDING RULES

Pursuant to authority vested in The Regents of the University of Wisconsin by Section 36.06 Wisconsin Statutes, The Regents of the University of Wisconsin hereby amends and creates rules as follows:

Section U.W. 1.07(4) of the WISCONSIN ADMINISTRATIVE CODE is repealed and recreated to read:

UW 1.07(4) The use of university union buildings and union grounds is restricted to members of the union, university faculty, university staff, and to invited guests as defined by the Union Council or Union Policy Board, except on occasions when the Union Council or Union Policy Board may invite the general public to open events. The university reserves the right to require evidence of qualification for such use of anyone using its union buildings and union grounds and to deny such use to anyone who is not a member of the union, on the university staff, or on the university faculty. Any persons not qualifying for use of union buildings and union grounds as herein provided may be removed from the premises and be subject to the penalties provided in this chapter.

Section UW 1.07(9) of the WISCONSIN ADMINISTRATIVE CODE is amended to read:

UW 1.07(9) The use of public address systems for advertising or other purposes upon university property is prohibited at all times except that the chancellors or deans of the various campuses and the university officials in charge of arboretums, experiment stations, and other university areas are authorized to permit the use of such equipment in rooms or areas designated by them for specific program needs.

Sections UW 1.07(18), UW 1.07(19), and UW 1.07(20) of the WISCONSIN ADMINISTRATIVE CODE ARE created to read:

UW 1.07(18) Normal closing hours and closed periods for all university buildings shall be determined by the chancellors or deans of the respective campuses and by the university officials in charge of other areas, unless hours are specifically provided in this code. All persons, other than those assigned to work in such buildings are prohibited from entering or remaining in any university building after the normal closing hours.

UW 1.07(19) Intentional blocking of hallways, rooms, entrances to rooms or buildings, sidewalks or roadways on university grounds is prohibited.

EXHIBIT B

UW 1.07(20) Any law enforcement officer, security employee, or other employee whose duties include controlling the operation of a building or area of a campus may require persons on university property to identify themselves.

The amendments to rules and the created rules contained herein shall take effect as provided in section 227.026(1), Wisconsin Statutes.
