VOTED, That the amendments to the Summer Session budget be approved as presented.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

#### -Agriculture-

- 1. That E. G. Schmidt be appointed half-time assistant in  $\Omega_{c}$  agricultural chemistry for six weeks' summer service and for the year 1922-23; salary at the rate of \$75 for summer service and \$600 for the academic year; charge to research allotment to Professors Fred and Peterson. Adopted.
- 2. That Lucy A. Case be appointed extension specialist in home economics (rank of instructor) for the year 1922-23; salary \$1500, payable in tenths: charge to vice Miller (budget p. 70). Adopted.
  - 3. That A. L. DuRant be appointed assistant in animal husbandry for the months of July and August, 1922; compensation \$100 a month; charge to item for summer service of Professor Humphrey. Adopted.
- 4. That Walter H. Ebling be appointed assistant to the dean, administration, for summer service, beginning July 20, and for the year 1922-23; salary \$170 for summer service and \$1500 for academic year; in place of W. S. Smith (budget p. 59). Adopted.

5. That Lee Stewart be appointed county agricultural agent for Forest County, beginning June 19, 1922; compensation at the rate of \$2000 per annum, payable in twelfths; divided as follows: University \$1700, Forest County \$300; in place of A. W. Schmutzer, resigned.

Adopted.

6. That the appointment of N. T. Nelson, part-time assistant in agronomy, be changed from \$600 on ten-month basis for the year 1922-23, to \$500 on ten-month basis and \$100 for summer service. Summer Adopted.

7. That the salary of L. G. Denis, mechanician in the dairy department be increased from \$100 to \$125 a month, beginning July 1, 1922; provided in the budget.

Adopted.

- 8. That readjustment be made in the salaries of the following persons, beginning July 1, 1922; made necessary by reduction in amount of funds received from U.S.Dept. of Agriculture; increase to be charged to Smith-Lever funds:
  - Nellie Kedzie Jones, associate professor of home economics, compensation from University increased from \$2000 to \$3350 for year 1922-23; summer service from \$250 to \$400; total salary for full year \$3750.
  - J. F. Wojta, state leader, county representatives, compensation from University increased from \$2400 to \$2700. (The amount from the U.S.D.A. is decreased from \$500 to \$1200.)
  - wice Cooper position (asst. state leader, ag. extension) \$500 from University; amount from U.S. Dept. of Agriculture reduced from \$1500 to \$1200.

Adopted.

9. That G. A. Peterson be continued as assistant in agricultural economics on half time for the month of July and full time from August 1 to September 15, 1922; \$50 a month for July and \$100 a month thereafter; charge to Labor and Tenancy item agricultural economics.

Adopted.

- 10. That W. P. Smith be appointed half time assistant in agricultural bacteriology for the year 1922-23; salary \$600 per annum; charge to research allotment to Professor Hastings.

  Adopted.
- 11. That the salary of L. P. Whitehead, instructor in economic entomology for the year 1922-23, be changed to \$900 for the academic year and \$100 for summer service, the additional \$100 to come from contingent instruction in agriculture.

  Adopted.
- 12. That James Johnson be promoted to the rank of professor of horticulture, and that his salary for the year 1922-23 be increased from \$3,600 to \$4,000; \$2,600 to be paid by the university, and \$1400 by the U.S.D.A.; the increase to be charged to contingent instruction.
