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MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING of the BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN SYSTEM

Upon motion made and properly seconded, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System held on December 8, 1978, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

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REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

At the request of President Hales, Regent Lavine reviewed the report of the Higher Educational Aids Board meeting held on January 26, 1979 (copy attached as EXHIBIT A). Regent Lavine noted that the Governor's budget team is recommending approval of the Board's request of the basic grant program of financial aids in Wisconsin of \$1,800 but did not support a sum-sufficient funding for the program. The budget team is recommending a reduction of GPR funds for the program by \$2,600,000. Regent Lavine recalled that the United Council of Students at the previous Board meeting was concerned with the reduction of \$50 in the financial aid packages. He noted that sum-sufficient financing will eliminate that problem and not put the students in a position where they have to come up with what for a student is a considerable sum, especially when they are going to school full-time and find out about it in the middle of the year. He stated that the federal government has indicated that it will have a new program of loan monies available. He stated further that there will be no need analysis required for students to qualify for loans under this new program and that virtually any student who walks in the door could obtain a loan. Regent Lavine said the amount available will be very large, enough to meet all student needs, and this raises the initial question as to whether or not it is prudent to have these needs met by total loans. He continued that some people argue that the monies are likely to be limited, but much larger than at present, but since any student can walk in and qualify for them, they simply won't go as far as under the present procedure, because if you increase dramatically the number of students in the pool, you can use up the money very quickly. Regent Lavine said apparently the Governor's budget team's response, on the face of it, is to cut the state's grant program. He said the most recent word he had from Washington is that the federal government is not looking kindly at any state which responds to adding to financial aid

monies from the federal level by cutting them at the local level. He said some of the HEAB members were concerned, not only by the dollar cut, but by going to a sum-certain amount of financing that we would possibly end up with far fewer students served with far less dollars and no way to meet the situation. He continued that the HEAB staff said that they were concerned that the Legislature might set an equity level, which, if we had sum-sufficient financing by setting a paid equity level with lower amounts of money, would make the results for students less attractive and would be less wise public policy than if we had total funds available. He said the whole matter has been laid over until the March or April meeting in hopes that better information is made available.

Regent Lavine said he was concerned that this would end up cutting grant money for needy students, cutting total monies available to students, and creating a worse situation than at present.

Regent Lavine reported that the Governor's budget team recommended not to raise the Indian assistance program level from \$1,500 to \$1,800, there being comments to the effect that the Bureau of Indian Affairs had money for this, but it turned out that there are no BIA extra monies available; so the HEAB moved to reaffirm its position to raise the grant to \$1,800. Regent Lavine stated that the entire administration of HEAB is now funded out of the profits from servicing of loans, and this is the first time the state has not funded the administration of the agency. He said some of the HEAB members raised the concern at Board meetings that it looks like the agency is indeed turning to look at this as the only way to go and is part of the driving force of the agency. He said the Regent recommendations on work/study were set aside and some of them were not responded to with the same information that the Regents sent down. They will be considered at another meeting.

Regent Erdman noted that the federal government has not concluded action on the federal assistance program and inquired if the state budget should not be responsive to the indecisiveness on the part of the federal government. Regent Lavine responded that it appeared that at the very least the state should go on with the limited, successful grant program it now has. He stated that the Basic Educational Opportunity Grant is targeted for needy students who qualify and are working hard in school to get this limited grant money, and it seemed that in a year or two from now, if there is a federal program, cutting the state program would be one thing, but to do that in advance and to set a sum-certain cuts off the availability of funds for the students presently in school, which makes no sense whatsoever. Regent Lavine noted that we haven't always used all of the work/study monies from the federal government on some campuses because they are sum-certain funds, and, if you overexpend, you have nothing to deliver; so for fear of going over the limit, everybody goes a little under the target. If the state had a program, then you could go out and provide work and know there would be funds available to supplement those who are getting aid from the federal government.

President Hales introduced the recently appointed members of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System, Mr. Thomas Fox, Madison, Wisconsin, and Mr. Raymond Majerus, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and welcomed them to the Board.

President Hales referred to the report on the January 23, 1979, meeting of the Wisconsin Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education (attached as <u>EXHIBIT</u> <u>B</u>). There was no discussion, and the report was ordered placed on file.

President Hales noted that the July 13, 1979, meeting of the Board of Regents conflicts with a meeting scheduled by the Higher Educational Aids Board on the same day. Regent McNamara moved that the date of the July 13 Board of Regents meeting be rescheduled for July 20, 1979, and the motion was seconded by Regent Beckwith. After a short discussion, with the consent of the maker of the motion and of the second, the motion was withdrawn, the consensus being that the matter would be left as it now stands to see what develops in the future.

President Hales reported the following appointments to various search and screen committees relating to positions that are to be filled in the University System:

Regent Erdman stated that inasmuch as the Veterinary Medicine matter is to be considered by the executive and legislative branches of the government, it would appear that we might continue to have an Acting Dean in order to avoid a collision course with the Governor and the Legislature. President Young stated that he did not feel it appropriate to announce a meeting of the committee until the Legislature has acted.

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Regent McNamara moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Erdman, and it was voted:

Resolution 1814: WHEREAS, Ody J. Fish of Pewaukee served for nine years as a Regent of the University of Wisconsin and the University of Wisconsin System, until December 1978, and

> WHEREAS, for seven years he headed the Physical Planning and Development Committee, with primary responsibility for the University System's physical plant, which under his competent and effective leadership grew to a total of 15,000 acres of land and 1,500 buildings valued at nearly two billion dollars and containing 40 million square feet of space, and

WHEREAS, in his dedicated, thorough and businesslike service on the Board of Regents he put into practice the advice he gave to a 1978 graduating class when he said: "Order your priorities to structure the accommodation between the desirable and the possible. Your reach should always be exceeded by your goal."

BE IT RESOLVED, that this Board hereby acknowledges the truly exemplary service of Ody J. Fish to the people of Wisconsin and grants him the status of Regent Emeritus.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Walter, and it was voted:

Resolution 1815: WHEREAS, Milton E. Neshek of Elkhorn served as a Regent on the governing boards of the Wisconsin State Universities and the University of Wisconsin System from April 1965 to December 1978, providing strong leadership in the positions of Business and Finance Committee chairman for five years and as Vice President for five years, and

> WHEREAS, his service spanned a 14-year period of unprecedented growth and development of higher education in Wisconsin, beginning with approximately 30,000 students enrolled at the nine Wisconsin State Universities and ending with nearly 150,000 students enrolled at the 27 campuses of the University of Wisconsin System, and

WHEREAS, Mr. Neshek brought to his role as Regent a broad knowledge of the law, education and business, a calm and analytical approach to Board discussions, and a conscientious devotion to his responsibilities,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Regents commends and thanks Milton E. Neshek for his important contributions to the University System and for his generous service to his fellow citizens of Wisconsin, and grants him the status of Regent Emeritus.

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REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE SYSTEM

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was properly seconded, and it was voted:

Resolution 1816: That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed. (EXHIBIT C, attached)

President Young stated that we have not seen the budget the Governor is recommending to the Legislature but there have been many reports on parts of it in the press and there have been discussions between our staff and the Governor's staff. He said we know that they will have to find some other way to get rid of the surplus besides what they are giving to us or recommending for us. He recalled that we put our emphasis very heavily on helping the students and keeping the costs to the students down. We made a number of proposals--one that student costs be based on prior year actuals rather than estimates. We argued for that as a sound practice and at the same time it would help hold down the cost somewhat. He said that is not being recommended by the Governor. He continued that we recommended a work program--the same one that we recommended to the previous Governor, who said it was a change of policy and is a great idea and we ought to do it, but it should be brought forward in the biennial budget. He said the present task force appears to feel that it is a great idea, but the federal government is going to do it anyway, and we won't need to do it. President Young said he felt that is a serious mistake and that Governor Schreiber was wrong in not recommending it for an experiment. He said we do not know how well it would work, but the basic idea is that we know that students, almost unanimously, prefer work to loans -- that is the kind of assistance they would like to have. He said we are hoping to have a relatively small but unique program in which the work would be related to the educational goals of the students. He said there are very few people who do not feel it is a good idea, but there is some reason or other for not doing it. He noted that he had said over and over again publicly that he assumed it would be done for all schools in Wisconsin, but he could not recommend it beyond our System, because that is not his business. President Young said he had talked with leaders of the private sector and they think it is a good idea, but they have told him that there was a higher priority--getting grants for students, rather than work/study. He said he had discussed the matter with Governor Schreiber and his staff and the matter of a \$25,000 limit wherein we would start with the neediest students and work up to that as we need some flexibility to match the students and the kind of jobs that are available. He said that he was still as convinced as ever, as was Mr. Weaver before him, that one of our greatest concerns has to be access, and if ever there is a time when the state can afford to provide easier access, it is now. He noted that we made a request for special considerations for Platteville and for Superior, and they were not included. We made a request to the Governor that some part of the enrollment funding which requires us to pay back be suspended --we would hope for the biennium that at least some part of this suspension would be considered. We are in the very difficult situation of having more students than we have ever had, but the FTEs have gone down so that the money that comes in comes in on an FTE basis. He noted that more and more students are working part-time, job opportunities are good, and students take five or six years

instead of four years to complete their education, and we are in the very difficult situation of paying back money to the state and therefor taking money from the base budget at a time when the faculty and Chancellors believe that they have more work to do than ever. He said he would say that we have not made great progress in the budget but there are some things in there that we did request that we are very grateful for.

Regent Beckwith stated that he hoped that in this process of the next few weeks the Governor's staff can be persuaded to reconsider some matters -two that he would call attention to without making them necessarily more important. He said that to cut off the request for the basic skills program was in his judgment a serious error, and the reason given for it was utter nonsense. He said he did not think the suggestion was that this University ought not to be in the high school business, and he was sure that all on the Board would agree, but that really is not the point--the point is that we have here a generation of high school students coming to the University through no fault of their own not equipped for the University. They should not be sacrificed while the elementary and high schools catch up. Regent Beckwith said the reason for cutting out the Platteville experiment, quoting from a newspaper story, "That there is no evidence that the kids would go there", flies in the face of the concept of an experiment. That is precisely why we presented this as a test case. He stated that he hoped this can be considered as well as the item mentioned above.

President Young stated that he gathered from the newspapers that there will be no money for additional medical students to expand the size of the class from what it is now. He said our request was for the second year, whereas the Medical College of Wisconsin request was for the first year, and they are going to get some money for that first year. He said this is a matter almost as susceptible to scientific study as whether we need a School of Veterinary Medicine or not. Some authorities tell us we need more physicians, and some say there are too many. He said this is a judgmental matter, and he assumed the judgment has been made that we don't need to increase the size of the Medical School classes.

Regent Barkla stated that she understood from Dean Brown of the Medical School that he is tied down to some kind of contract where we have to increase the size of the classes or lose the contract. President Young stated that again there seems to be confusion in Washington--the contract is with HEW, and yet the Secretary of HEW is saying that we should not have more physicians than in the President's budget. They are cutting back on capitation, and there is no need to subsidize increases in health manpower; so, do you listen to the Secretary or do you read the law? He said it was a pure guess on his part that the Governor's staff believes that if the Secretary of HEW says we shouldn't increase the size, they will not hold the state liable for millions of dollars, but it is really anybody's guess as to what might happen.

Regent DeBardeleben inquired if he was correct in inferring from what President Young had said that there is still some hope of changing the Governor's mind about the matters he had mentioned. President Young responded that he felt that on the enrollment funding we have some opportunity not to pay back as much. He said our hope for the work/study program is that we are going to Joint Finance --we have to ask them. He said he did not know what the Governor will do, whether he will veto it or not, as the Governor is very much concerned about students also. Perhaps by the time that comes before him the federal situation will be clarified. He continued that, as Regent Lavine said, we don't know what the feds are going to do, but the assumption of Governor Dreyfus' task force is

that the additional assistance that we are asking for would be more than made up by the feds, but we don't know that. He said there is some hope, and he felt that, if it should be discovered down the road while the Legislature is still in session that the federal funding is going to be far short of the estimate that has been made, the Governor would change his mind.

Regent Lavine noted that students come out of school after four years of college with indebtedness of \$5,000, \$10,000 or \$15,000 and questioned whether in this society, where everyone needs credit, they will be able to buy automobiles, start families, buy houses, and keep the whole economic cycle going. He said it would be advisable for the Legislature and the Executive staff to study that question because it would look reasonably ominous for its impact on jobs and on the economy of the state. He said he also felt that we have to look at what that will do to the whole premise of education. He observed that disadvantaged and minority students have had a history of dealing with loans that culturally and fiscally make them very unwilling to take out loans, which is a trap they are trying to get out of. He stated that if the state, the Legislature and the Governor are going to be serious about affirmative action, he felt they are going to have to publicly rationalize how they are going to promote a program which in his view will undercut affirmative action.

Regent DeBardeleben stated that the unfortunate thing is that no one seems to be really making the kind of study that Regent Lavine suggested. He noted there was an attempt made to get the HEAB to do it a couple of years ago, and it was turned back. He said he did not believe anyone in the University System has made this kind of study, and it is a real problem. He said he did not know whether we should renew our efforts to get HEAB to do it or whether we should be doing something about it ourselves so that we have some data to take to the Governor and the Legislature.

President Young referred to the report on the Legislative Fiscal Bureau analysis of enrollment, which had been distributed to the members of the Board. He noted that we prefer to use best estimates rather than worst case, and they prefer to use the worst case basis. He said he felt that best estimates lead to better planning. He noted that attention was called to the fact that ten years after enrollments decline they will go up again, and we need to have the institutions in place. President Young said the enrollment decline is real, is coming, and we are working very hard to plan for it. We want to work with the Governor's office and the Legislature in doing so, but our problem is that even before the decline in enrollment our budget went down because the change in the pattern of behavior of students, which really is unpredictable, caught us in this situation.

Regent DeBardeleben stated that he felt this was an especially good paper, and he was pleased to note the emphasis on qualitative improvements and the pointing out to the state government the need for additional support of research and the advancement of knowledge. He said the problem that we have with keying our budget to enrollment funding is that it simply does not take cognizance of the need in an institution such as UW-Madison for funds to broaden research. He said it seems that people think that if your enrollments are going down, you don't need any more facilities, you don't need any more capital assets, you don't need any more staff; so we will cut back on everything. It completely ignores the idea that at this particular time, nationally and as an institution we are in need of spending more money for

the advancement of knowledge. He said he was sure that that message is not being made with sufficient force and he felt that it should be. He continued that he hoped that as we go before the Governor and the Joint Finance Committee, we will use all the force that we can muster in this matter. He said he did not think there is anything more we can do right now, but he wanted to indicate that he supported what we are doing and thought it is very good.

President Young called upon Paul Rusk, President, United Council of Student Governments. Mr. Rusk noted that in November the WHEG program was frozen, and students who were receiving support from the WHEG program were told they were not going to receive their WHEG grants. He stated that has been rescinded and he understood that approximately 1,000 University of Wisconsin students who were caught in that bind will receive their WHEG grants but they will be minus the \$50 reduction previously made. He reported financial aid officers are now in the process of repackaging loans and grants, which has been a rather common occurrence. He said he didn't know what the answer is but it makes it very, very difficult for students to do sensible financial planning.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The report of the Education Committee was presented by Regent Lawton.

Regent Lawton moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Grover, and it was voted:

Resolution 1817: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Stout, the existing Entitlement to Plan an M.S. in Personnel Training and Manpower Development at UW-Stout be changed to B.S./M.S. Personnel Training and Manpower Development.

Regent Lawton reported that the Committee received the University of Wisconsin Field Station Report: Pigeon Lake 1960-1978. He reported that in the discussion in the Committee Regent DeBardeleben questioned whether what was occurring at the Field Station from an academic point of view could not be accomplished as well elsewhere, referring to instruction and research. He also reported that Regent Lavine commented upon the low cost of the Field Station to the state and upon the significant educational advantages it provides.

Regent Erdman stated that she thought it was a most informative and helpful report, but she wondered why there was no use of the light building industry students throughout the state in this program, architectural and engineering students, in constructing the two additional small buildings. She inquired if this is a learning laboratory, why not make it total instead of hiring our architectural branch of administration, and instead of bringing in outside contractors, why not a total learning experience? Senior Vice President Smith stated that these departments will be involved in the Library Learning Classroom Building. Regent Lawton observed that the Committee discussion focused more on whether this is just a spa for tired faculty members.

Regent Lawton reported that the Committee received the Annual Report to the Regents on 1977-78 Progress and Achievement of Goals for American Racial and Ethnic Minority Students. He stated that Committee members expressed displeasure with the small and inadequate progress made on some campuses and a concern that the System goals contained in AP 7.2 should not be lowered.

Regent Lawton moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Fitzgerald:

Resolution 1818: That the Regents reaffirm the goals of AP #7.2 and request that the committee to be established diligently explore and report how to get there.

The committee referred to in the above resolution is a Systemwide committee created to review the minority student enrollment history and projections and to propose a new set of long-range goals to the Regents. Regent Lavine stated that there is serious concern that the campuses throughout the System have considered new targets with the result that the report indicates 180 students below the Regent goals. He said it was not his understanding that the Board had changed its policy in this respect. He said he was bothered by the reference that a premise of the policy relating to minority graduates from Wisconsin high schools, which was never a premise of the hearings, was a sole premise, and, most important, that the campuses feel free to decide not to stay within the Regent policy even though it is Regent policy. He said in his view some of the campuses have to look pretty seriously at what they are doing as some of them have programs that are about ready to blossom and show significant progress while others have not done as well.

Regent DeBardeleben noted that the reference to the committee is on page 52 of the report, where it states, "The primary next step is to create a systemwide committee to review the minority student enrollment history and projections and propose a new set of long-range goals to the Regents".

Regent Erdman inquired if the report was purposely designed to deceive, to be fuzzy, to be vague, and not to give any answers. She said the report did not analyze why we did not meet our goals set in January 1976. She inquired if we are underfunded, are the recruiting methods of the University inadequate, or is it simply that we don't have enough minority students in the state or anywhere in the country to reach our original goals? She noted that the report nowhere differentiates the figures for graduate and undergraduate students so that you never really know which of the students were actually in a pool to receive the baccalaureate degree or if they already had received a degree and were into Graduate School. She continued that the report did not tell in any way where the minority students are coming from, and the implication was that they were coming from Wisconsin. She said this was implied in the report when it said that 4.4% of all the students in the state of Wisconsin are minority students and that we in the System are meeting that goal; yet the actual facts as we know them are that we do have many out-of-state students and one of the institutions referred to the fact that they have students from Minnesota and Illinois. She continued that we know that graduate students are from all over the country and that we encourage them to come here, but when she read this report and saw implications that were misleading, saw no answer to our questions why we could not reach the goals, she was extremely disappointed. Regent Erdman noted that the Regents had conducted hearings two years ago and two years before that, and we need

to know the actual figures--do we have enough minority students in the state of Wisconsin to fill up our quota, or are very bright minority students going out of state by way of scholarships, grants and inducements, to other schools. She stated the report is disappointing and wondered if the committee which is now being set up by this resolution will answer some of the questions that she felt the Regents would like to have answered.

Regent Lawton reported that it was suggested by Regent Lavine and confirmed by Vice President Smith that our efforts have improved rather dramatically in the past year. He said he did not feel that we have anything to be proud of and the Committee was rather disappointed, as was Regent Erdman, although they did not make accusations of fuzziness or deceit. He stated that the information requested by Regent Erdman can be referred to the committee for answers.

Senior Vice President Smith stated that he felt a number of the questions that Regent Erdman raised are precisely the questions the committee seeks to address. He reported that we already have analytical work underway on the question of relationships of resident and nonresident students. However, Vice President Smith stated it is going to be extraordinarily difficult to get data tracing the out-migration of minority students. He said we can trace the out-migration of Wisconsin residents generally, but he was certain we will have the data people taking a look at that to see whether or not we have made any ethnic breakdown on that kind of data.

President Hales said that an organization in the City of Racine has a good handle on tracing the out migration of minority students and know where they are going. He said that since 1972 the Board has gone on record fairly strongly with far-reaching policies concerning the education of minority and disadvantaged students. We have had two Regent committees that have held hearings throughout the state to try to get a handle on what can be done to do something in this area, and it still appears that we are having a difficult time after all that effort, including the creation of a special office in the academic affairs area, in getting a handle on what is going on and what we are doing in this area. He was especially disappointed at some of the campuses seeing fit to change some of the projections previously made and said that it appeared to him that their efforts are less than even modest in terms of trying to do something. He shared the sentiment that we are still not doing enough and we are not putting forth enough effort, and maybe we just don't have the will to do it. He said that if the people in those positions don't have the will, perhaps we ought to do something about getting some different people in those positions.

Regent Beckwith stated that in all fairness to the people involved, this committee ought to also look at some of the factors that may be beyond our control, such as tuition and loans. He said he did not feel the report is really defensive, and did not think it is trying to make a lot of excuses, and if there are some factors that are beyond our immediate control, they ought to be identified and presented to the Legislature as things to be corrected. With respect to out-migration, he said he felt an interview or a letter to placement counselors to the highschools in the state would produce 80 to 90% of the answers from which extrapolations could be made, as he was sure they know where their students are going. President Hales noted that since 1976 Racine, Wisconsin,knows where every minority student has gone. He said it may be more difficult elsewhere, such as in Milwaukee, but most areas have the information available. Regent Walter stated she too was disappointed in the report.

Regent DeBardeleben inquired as to the basis for designating Stevens Point the native American campus in the state. He was advised by Vice President Smith that they have established a Native American Center at Stevens Point and there are some federal grants connected with the Center. Regent DeBardeleben noted that northern Wisconsin has probably the largest concentration of native Americans in the nation and he did not get the message from Chancellor Fort that we are doing enough about that in that area of the state. He said it appeared that the goals are exceedingly modest and that the language of the report concerning the four-year campus in that area would continue its efforts to meet the needs of all those individuals who seek its services. He stated that is not quite enough--we really should be doing more than waiting for people to seek the services and there is not enough aggressive effort made in that area of the state.

Regent Lavine stated we do have a handle on some of the problems such as financial aids, etc., but the simple fact is that all the outside factors notwithstanding, we are not where we were in 1971. We do have answers to many of the questions and some of them do not require money, do not require a committee, do not require study, and he would be upset if the message from this discussion is to merely establish another committee. He said in his view some of the campuses have done a good job, and others have not. This is one of the few policies that this Board initiated, and in his view some of the campuses have done a shameful job--they are understaffed, they don't make it a matter of the entire faculty, and they have not said from the top down that this is a serious priority. Regent Lavine said the one thing that really makes this go is the degree to which you make it the responsibility of the faculty, and not just an adjunct committee, across the board to the greatest degree possible. He said the thing that bothered him the most about the report is that it tied itself to secondary school graduates, which was not the premise upon which the Board acted, and the Board policy has been changed without even coming to us and saying we want to change the policy, which is not satisfactory. He said that some of the administrators in this room have the responsibility to go home and find out why their campuses individually can't each do better, and then make it happen. He said he felt the way it should operate is that we set the policy and the people here carry it out. He said he hoped that the Education Committee would look fairly seriously at getting some response from some of these campuses as to how they are going to get their goals up--it will only happen if the people at the bottom make it happen or are made to make it happen.

President Hales stated he would like to commend the Board for the policy and for its patience on this question. He said that the Board has been unequivocal in its support of establishing a far-reaching policy that no other academic institution in this country has, and that he felt it speaks well for the membership of this Board.

President Young said that some of the things that were mentioned yesterday ought to be repeated. One of the reasons these figures, which in some places are very good, and in some places are not better, is a matter of retention, and if we are constantly cutting back our support for the total program, it is very difficult to do the kind of job that needs to be done in order to retain. He continued that that is part of the problem and we need basic skills money in order to do it, and that he hoped that all that are concerned about this will help to get it.

Regent Fitzgerald stated we are dealing with some very serious problems and generally the schools are doing a good job. She said that if the Platteville Campus has ten minority students and keeps them and graduates them, they have done an excellent job. She noted there are no minorities in the town nor in the surrounding area and the campus has to bring the students in and keep them and encourage them to graduate. In response to Regent Erdman's question as to the composition of the Committee, Vice President Smith stated he supposed we would bring in some of the most able directors, concerned faculty, and concerned students, and it would have to have staff support.

The question was put on Resolution 1818, and it was voted.

Regent Lawton reported that there had been a first reading in the Committee meeting on the previous day of new academic programs, as follows:

The matter will be considered again at the March meeting of the Board.

Regent Lawton reported that campus representatives were present to respond to questions from the committee about each of the programs. In response to a specific question by Regent Lavine, UW-Eau Claire representatives agreed to adjust the language of the MS Environmental and Public Health proposal which stipulates prerequisites of "a bachelor's degree in an allied field, or a bachelor's degree with six years of experience in the field of environmental health" to indicate the intention of flexible interpretation to avoid the possible exclusion of qualified candidates on purely technical grounds. The adjusted language will be included in the materials brought for Regent consideration and action in March.

Regent Lawton reported that System administration will take steps to comply with the request made by Regent DeBardeleben that copies of the Everett Ladd/Seymour Lipsett survey reported in the January 15, 1979 <u>Chronicle of Higher</u> <u>Education</u> be made available to the members of the Board. The survey reports rankings of university faculties in 19 fields by 4,000 professors over the nation.

It was reported to the Committee that Vice President Smith announced five additional Undergraduate Teaching Improvement Grant awards, bringing the total number of grants for 1979-80 to 23.

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REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The report of the Business and Finance Committee was presented by Regent Grover.

Regent Grover reported that during the review of the Gifts, Grants, and U.S. Government Contracts in the Committee meeting on the previous day. attention was called to the January report which listed 46 grants from the National Institutes of Health for a total of \$1.7 million and the February report which listed 25 grants from NIH totalling \$2.6 million. He noted President Carter's fiscal year 1980 budget proposes a reduction in the funding level for new competitive NIH awards to \$279 million which compares with an allocation of \$494 million during the 1979 fiscal year or a reduction of nearly 50% in new grants from NIH. Many NIH grants are continuing grants; so the impact of the reduction in funds for new awards may not become apparent for several years. Regent Grover reported for the year the System is approximately \$8 million ahead of the previous year with research and instruction each having increased by approximately \$6.5 million; however miscellaneous is down about \$4.8 million. Student aid now is down approximately \$1 million compared to last year and it is anticipated that the fiscal year will end with an approximate increase of \$2.2 million over last year.

Regent Grover moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Beckwith:

Resolution 1819: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the gifts, grants and contracts presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

Regent DeBardeleben noted that the Carter Administration proposal for the upcoming budget includes about a 13% increase in funds for basic science research. Vice President Lorenz stated there was an increase in basic research from \$1.3 million to \$1.4 million, and a decrease in new awards. He said the net effect will probably result in an overall increase to the University basically because we have a large increase in the current year and most grants are for three-to five-year periods. He stated one of the alternatives NIH has considered is to reduce the continuing awards by as much as 10% in order to allow for new continuing awards. Regent DeBardeleben inquired to what extent we are likely to participate or be the beneficiary of the increase in basic research allowances. Vice President Lorenz stated we would like to think we would continue to get the 13% increase and the net effect will be that we should keep pace with inflation. He agreed with Regent DeBardeleben that the effect of NIH will be somewhat muted by the fact that we have long-term contracts.

The question was put on Resolution 1819, and it was voted.

Regent Grover stated that the late Kathryn E. Kernan bequeathed 20% of the residue of her estate to the University of Wisconsin-Madison for a scholarship for a Mining Engineering student in the names of Thomas H. Kernan and Kathryn E. Kernan.

Regent Grover moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Walter, and it was voted:

Resolution 1820:

That the bequest of the late Kathryn E. Kernan, Los Angeles, California, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Kathryn E. Kernan, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Grover reported that the late Evelyn Wise Dowling bequeathed \$10,000 to the University of Wisconsin-Madison for a loan or scholarship fund for students in mathematics, and upon recommendation of the Mathematics Department, the money will be used for a scholarship, to be known as the Professor Linnaeus Wayland Dowling Scholarship.

Regent Grover moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Beckwith, and it was voted:

Resolution 1821: That the bequest of the late Evelyn Wise Dowling, White Plains, New York, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Evelyn Wise Dowling, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Grover reported that Vice President and Controller Lorenz reported the year-end projected balances reflect a contingency reserve of \$273,000. He stated that the Committee expressed concern that with a budget of \$464,000,000, this represents a very minimal reserve. The Vice President also reported that second semester enrollment figures are incomplete at this time; so fee income levels are not certain. He also noted that a new problem identified to the Committee relates to an inability to generate money from the approximately 250 Iranian students enrolled in the System. The Vice President also presented a summary of second semester dormitory occupancy for the System, which indicates the highest number of students ever in residence halls in the second semester of any year.

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REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee was presented by Regent Gerrard.

Regent Gerrard noted the two Mechanical and Electrical Monitoring projects at UW-LaCrosse and Stevens Point are part of a \$3.15 million project to provide expansion of the installations at Platteville, Milwaukee, and Madison and new installations at the remaining ten four-year campuses. With the approval of these two requests, the new installations at Oshkosh and Whitewater and expansion of the Madison system will remain to be submitted for approval of the Concept and Budget Reports. The systems, upon completion, are projected to reduce the heating cost by 17% and the electrical cost by 12%, resulting in a payback of the cost of the project in less than 3 years.

Regent Gerrard moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Barkla, and it was voted:

Resolution 1822: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-La Crosse and Stevens Point Acting Chancellors and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the concept and budget reports be approved and authorization be granted to plan, bid and construct the following projects, at the cost and from the funding source indicated:

Regent Gerrard reported the Committee reviewed the report prepared by System Administration summarizing the roof repair projects included in the next two resolutions. The report indicates that the insulating fill material used in the two residence halls at UW-Stout, along with inadequate drainage, was the primary reason for these premature roof failures. The balance of the projects request either repair of roofs to prolong their life or replacement after a reasonable period of time. Regent Gerrard indicated that during the discussion of the report in the committee meeting, he indicated his concern to seek Legislative change to permit negotiations for roof work and the need for more supervision of construction. He said this will be pursued by System administrative staff with the Higher Education Sub-Committee of the State Building Commission.

Regent Gerrard moved adoption of the following resolutions, the motion was seconded by Regent Barkla, and they were voted: Resolution 1825:

Regent Gerrard noted the next resolution relates to a building to provide storage space for a joint research project on carrots, onions, and cucumbers. In addition to the joint use of the facility, under terms of the supplemental agreement, the federal government provides the construction cost of the building and the cost of its maintenance and repair during the period of the agreement, as well as the cost of relocation and removal. The Regents are to provide the site and cover utility costs during the period of the agreement.

Regent Gerrard moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Barkla, and it was voted:

Resolution 1827:

That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the UW-Madison Chancellor or his designee be authorized to sign Supplement No. 31 to the Master Memorandum of Understanding with the United States Department of Agriculture. Said supplement will provide a site for the installation of a temporary building, at the expense of the federal government, for a joint research project on carrots, onions and cucumbers, on the UW-Madison campus.

Regent Gerrard reported the next Committee agenda item relating to authority to accept a gift-in-kind of an Alumni Center on the UW-Whitewater Campus from the UW-Whitewater Foundation, Inc., was deferred until the March meeting due to the fact that Chancellor Connor was unable to attend the meeting due to the death of his father. The Committee had several concerns regarding the design and cost of the project with which only Chancellor Connor is familiar.

Regent Gerrard reported that the parcel of land referred to in the next resolution had an average appraised value of \$29,833 and an option to purchase the land had been obtained for \$29,000.

Regent Gerrard moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Barkla, and it was voted:

Resolution 1828: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Stout Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authorization be granted to purchase the following parcel of land to permit northern expansion of the Nelson Field playing field area for physical education and intramural activity:

Regent Gerrard reported that Jack Ellery, Acting Chancellor at UW-Stevens Point, briefed the Committee on the campus development plan and indicated that the 1979 plan recommends substantially less land acquisition and only limited building expansion. This is due to the fact that existing facilities, except for specialized areas such as libraries and physical education are adequate to accommodate the projected enrollment for the foreseeable future; that no additional state-owned, on-campus housing is needed; and that the availability of former building sites can be used to accommodate additional off-street parking. The primary area of land expansion is immediately south of the Library and Fine Arts Building to take care of parking needs for that area of the campus. Regent Gerrard moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Barkla, and it was voted:

Resolution 1829: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Stevens Point Acting Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Campus Development Plan, as updated, be approved to document physical facilities and campus boundaries for UW-Stevens Point.

Regent Gerrard reported the advance planning requests that may be considered for advance planning approval during the 1979-81 biennium was deferred by the full Board at the December meeting primarily due to concerns relating to the scope of the original request, which totalled \$872,500. He noted the revised recommendation totals \$517,100, the reductions being due primarily to the reduction in scope of planning for the Commerce Building Remodeling and Addition, the Law Building Remodeling and Addition, and the deletion of the Camp Randall Stadium Interior Space Renovation project, all at UW-Madison.

Regent Gerrard moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Barkla, and it was voted:

Resolution 1830: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, Table VIII--Advance Planning Projects by University, 1979-81 Biennium as revised, be approved and the System Administration be authorized to submit this listing to the State Department of Administration and the State Building Commission as a part of its 1979-81 capital budget. (Table VIII attached as <u>EXHIBIT</u> D)

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UNFINISHED AND MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

Regent Erdman noted that the Hospital Council of Trustees had met on the previous day and invited all Regents to attend the dedication of the new Center for Health Sciences to be held on February 23, 1979, at 3:00 P.M., with Governor Knowles scheduled as the main speaker.

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Regent Beckwith moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was properly seconded, and it was voted, with Regents Barkla, Beckwith, Elliott, Erdman, Fitzgerald, Fox, Gerrard, Grover, Hales, Lavine, Lawton, McNamara and Walter voting "Aye". Regent DeBardeleben entered the closed session after the vote was taken.

The Higher Educational Aids Board met in room 415 N.W., State Capitol, Madison, on January 26, 1979. Regent members Herbert Grover and John Lavine were present.

Report of the Executive Secretary

Mr. Jung reported that the Student Loan Revenue Bond program was doing well and that no problems were involved in meeting the first six month's obligations. However, he cautioned the Board in noting they needed to consider activities of the Wisconsin Higher Education Corporation (WHEC) with more deliberation and care.

The likelihood of substantial federal support for student aid programs was suggested by Mr. Jung despite the initial lack of support by OMB. He requested the Board to keep in mind the unknown but potentially substantial impact of the new federal money.

Budget realism was requested of the Board by Mr. Jung as they reviewed recommendations. He offered the staff recommendations as reasonable and realistic with the objective of obtaining all of them.

Report of the Council on Financial Aids

Mr. Wally Douma, new chairperson of the Council, reported to the Board that the Council on Financial Aids endorsed a resolution calling for the adoption of the five financial aid proposals recommended by the University of Wisconsin Board of Regents. The Council is concerned about reducing the amount of borrowing being required of students. He noted that no one knows the impact nor the amount of funding that will result from the new federal money and suggested that it is difficult to consider recommendations on state programs. However, the Council supported a state funded work study program and a program for part-time students, at least on a pilot basis.

1979-81 Biennial Budget Update

The Board reviewed the recommendations of the Governor's Budget Transition Team and considered alternatives and staff recommendations on those budget decision issues in conflict with the Board's original request.

EXHIBIT A

Wisconsin Tuition Grant

The Board approved the staff recommendation that it concur in the Budget Team's recommendation to index the maximum Tuition Grant equal to the weighted average of the instructional costs paid by GPR in the UW System Doctoral and University Clusters. Assuming an annual nine percent increase in fees, the recommendation would raise the maximum Tuition Grant from the present \$1,500 to \$2,150 in 1979-80 and \$2,350 in 1980-81. This index will allow the maximum Tuition Grant level to rise as UW System instructional costs rise. The estimate of the GPR required is \$10,600,000 for 1979-80 and \$10,950,000 for 1980-81.

The Budget Team is recommending that Tuition Grant eligibility be extended to students enrolled at least half-time for a period not to exceed ten semesters. The estimated GPR requirement is \$82,200 for 1979-80 and \$105,000 for 1980-81.

Wisconsin Higher Education Grant

The Budget Team is recommending approval of the Board's request for an increase in the WHEG maximum grant to \$1,800 but did not support the request for a sum-sufficient appropriation. Further, the Budget Team is recommending a reduction of GPR funding for the WHEG program amounting to \$2,627,300 for 1979-80 and an additional \$60,200 for 1980-81 from the 1978-79 base year GPR funding of \$11,691,300. Increased federal funding in the Middle Income Assistance Act was given as the reason for the reduction in state support for WHEG.

The HEAB staff recommended that the Board recognize the projected impact of MISA and request that WHEG be funded in 1979-81 at its 1978-79 base level and drop the sum-sufficient appropriation request so the Board could set the equity levels after it has had the opportunity to determine the impact of BEOG.

Regent Lavine argued that the staff's recommendation enhanced the perception that the HEAB was increasingly shifting its support away from grants to loans. HEAB's shift to supporting its administration by loan generated and related revenues and now support for reductions in grant programs suggests that loans are the way to go. He indicated that there may be a broader base of recipients for the federal funds and that HEAB should fight for its original position in seeking more grant funds rather than sit back because the federal government has offered more loan money. Noting a report that it costs the federal government \$54 to deliver \$100 in loans, questioning the future societal impact of large student debts on graduation, and the return in income taxes the state gets from its investment in higher education, he pushed for more support for grant programs.

Mr. Jung said he was not concerned about federal intent but about implementing a program that was developed at another governmental level.

Paul Rusk, United Council President, suggested that the congressional intent of MISA was to improve student aid programs and noted the need to guard against state efforts to capture federal dollars, raise tuitions and reduce state funding for student aid programs. Jerry Madison noted that MISA would result in increases in grant and loan funds in the state but indicated that he was primarily interested in gaining a sum-sufficient appropriation as a means of solving the WHEG formula problem.

Elizabeth Wright suggested the MISA program was aimed at the impact of inflation on middle income people and that the increased maximum grant for BEOG was a catch-up in real dollars. To pull back when the federal government recognizes the impact of inflation would be wrong.

The Board decided to table action on recommendations related to the WHEG program due to the unknown impact of the federal student assistance due to MISA that can be expected in Wisconsin. A special executive or board meeting may be called in March to act on the issue when information is available; otherwise it will be considered at the April meeting.

TIP Level of Funding

The Board also tabled action on the staff recommendation to concur in the Budget Team's recommendation that GPR funding for the TIP component of WHEG be reduced from the Board's original request until more information is available on the impact of the federal programs.

Indian Student Assistance Program--Maximum Grant

The staff recommended that the Board concur in the Budget Team's recommendation to not raise the maximum Indian Student Assistance Grant from \$1,500 to \$1,800 with the understanding that the matter be reevaluated as part of the 1980 Annual Review. Regent Lavine stated that if the program was worth having it should keep up with inflation and it would be inappropriate for Wisconsin, which has commitment to Native Americans, to reduce support for the program. Mr. Marten registered his concern that the recommendation did not appear to be a question of money but an implied attack by the Budget Team on the program. He also was concerned about possible merger of the program into the TIP program as it would lose identity. The Board approved Mr. Lavine's motion to reaffirm the Board's original position and its intent to keep the program separate from other grant programs.

Revenue Bond Authority

Recognizing the removal of the income ceiling on eligibility of students for interest benefits on loans in MISA and the potential impact on loan demand, the Board approved a staff recommendation that it increase its request for additional revenue bond authority from \$20 million to \$50 million. It is understood that the actual implementation of this proposal will come back to the Board for justification and approval.

The Board also reaffirmed its request, not supported by the Budget Team, for the authority to use revenue bond proceeds to purchase loans made by private lenders.

Agency Administration

The Budget Team supported the Board's request for administrative positions needed to meet management requirements identified in audits but not those which would maintain present levels of service. The Board reaffirmed its original request for a GPR supplement to offset the loss of special allowance revenues to the Bond Reserve Accounts.

The Board's request for GPR funding for the Educational Opportunity and Educational Information Center program was not supported by the Budget Team. The Board, on recommendation by staff, concurred with the Budget Team's recommendation as the 1980 Annual Review will offer an opportunity to reevaluate the matter.

NDSL Servicing

The Board approved the staff recommendation that a request be made of state government to relieve HEAB of its NDSL servicing responsibilities and that existing positions be reallocated to expand the GSL collection operation. The Budget Team did not support the Board's request for 17.25 positions to administer the NDSL Servicing Program. The University of Wisconsin System will reassume this responsibility should this action be approved by state government.

Response to Financial Aid Recommendations of the Board of Regents

Board response to the UW System proposal that HEAB seek an increase in the WHEG appropriation adequate to offset inflation and to fund maximum grants at the same level as that of BEOG was deferred in view of the earlier discussion on WHEG. For the same reasons, action was also deferred on the UW System proposal to seek a state funded work study program to supplement the federal college work study program.

The Board deferred action on the HEAB staff recommendation that HEAB take no action at this time on the UW System proposal that HEAB examine its position relative to part-time students and seek appropriate financial assistance for direct educational costs of needy students enrolled less than half-time. Regent Lavine indicated that the HEAB agenda report did not address the same issue discussed by the Regents and requested that UW System staff prepare a report for the HEAB agenda in April which records the problem and provides supporting information.

Because the UW System proposals that reciprocity compact opportunities be maintained and extended and that legislation be sought to enable HEAB to consolidate loans for heavily indebted multiple loan borrowers were consistent with ongoing policy and practice, HEAB took no action.

Status of WHEG Expenditures

Due to an overcommitment of WHEG, HEAB implemented the following corrective steps:

- 1. WHEG award commitments for 1978-79 were terminated after November 13;
- All existing awards for the second semester were vouchered at \$50 less than the commitment;
- 3. TIP awards remain available to students adversely affected by termination of WHEG;
- 4. Any funds resulting from an overadjustment will be distributed to VTAE institutions to distribute to those students who applied after the termination date.

Financial Need Analysis Service Agreement

The Board approved the staff recommendation that the College Scholarship Service (CSS) be selected as the need analysis service agency for state programs for 1979-80 and 1980-81. Board members expressed concern that no alternative existed and directed the Chairman to contact American College Testing (ACT) to explain the Board's position.

Minnesota-Wisconsin Interstate Compact 1979-80

The Board approved the Minnesota-Wisconsin Reciprocity Agreement for 1979-80 in its present form to permit implementation if Minnesota also agrees to the existing agreement. Representatives of Minnesota have expressed dissatisfaction with the present balance of payments formula and also have proposed phase-out of the student spaces in veterinary medicine allocated to Wisconsin. Wisconsin representatives hold that the tax and education components of the agreement between the states should remain linked. It appears that unless Minnesota agrees to continue the existing compact for at least another year, the two Governors should discuss the matter.

SUBJECT:	Report on the January 23, 1979 Meeting of the WBVTAE

The Wisconsin Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education met January 23, 1979 at the Gateway Technical Institute in Kenosha. This report summarizes agenda items which appear to be of interest to the UW System.

Report on Federal Legislation and Regulatory Issues

The early reports of severe cuts by HEW in the proposed federal Vocational Education budget did not materialize as President Carter's budget proposal was expected to be near the 1979 appropriation level. Along with the impact of inflation, budget cuts of \$9.5 million were made in Adult Education. The President's budget also was expected to contain a \$2.5 million reduction in the 1979 appropriation level for student aid programs.

Proposed guidelines regarding spending levels for male and female athletic programs, issued by DHEW, are being reviewed as to their impact on VTAE athletic programs.

HEW Office of Civil Rights published guidelines for eliminating discrimination by race, color, national origin, sex, or handicap in vocational education programs receiving HEW funds. The VTAE staff reported that VTAE was essentially in compliance with the guidelines and that they were examining its means of handling complaints relative to discrimination; they also reported funds were needed for additional staffing, Regent Lavine recommended that the WBVTAE move voluntarily and early to establish review mechanisms to handle complaints as immediately as possible at the local level. The Board passed a resolution requesting the staff to examine review mechanisms in place, make recommendations which would improve review mechanisms, and to annually report to the Board the number and types of discrimination complaints that have occurred. HEW has proposed general regulations on age discrimination to be used in guiding the development of specific regulations by each agency.

Vocational educators have been working on rules and regulations which would strengthen the involvement of educational institutions in the planning and delivery of Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) programs and services to eligible individuals.

EXHIBIT B

Board President James Elliott reported that 49 applications had been received for the State Director's position by the Search and Screen Committee. They expect to complete this process by April 1, 1979.

Status Report on Biennial Budget

Discussions with the Governor's Budget Task Force indicated that categorical aids including the request for the Emergency Medical Technician program will not be supported. Other cuts expected are in auditing of Vocational Education Act funds, bus driver training, and the improved fire services program.

School District Representation on VTAE District Boards

The School District Administrator in the statutes governing VTAE District Board appointments has been interpreted to be the Superintendent of Schools of that District. The Board instructed the staff to seek introduction of legislation to allow the Assistant Superintendent of Schools or high school principals, where either is clearly second in command, to serve on the District VTAE Boards. This action was done recognizing that there are no women Superintendents of Schools and only two high school principals are women. The opportunity to place women and minorities on District VTAE Boards would be enhanced as more women and minorities are in Assistant Superintendent positions.

Vocational Education Data System

The Board approved a resolution to have VTAE comply with the implementation of Vocational Education Data System in Wisconsin. The system's purpose is to improve federal reporting and state and local analysis of information.

Agriculture--Secondary, Postsecondary, and University

The Board passed a resolution requesting the University of Wisconsin System to convene a small group of high level individuals representing the public education systems to deliberate upon issues facing agriculture in the future and to make recommendations concerning the direction of educational programming needed to meet the challenges. The group, representing DPI, VTAE, UWS and perhaps the State Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection, is invited to report to the Board in one year concerning their recommendations.

Energy Program

The Board approved a resolution directing the staff to establish a state advisory committee to assist in developing the role of the VTAE system in solar energy programming.

Educational Services Provided by UW-Madison and Milwaukee Area Technical College

A letter by President Young responding to State Representative Mordecai Lee concerning a study of the evening courses in Milwaukee offered by the two institutions was shared with the Board.

1979-80 Program Fee Rates

The Board approved 1979-80 per credit program fees and tuition as follows:

\$18 for Wisconsin resident and \$52.70 for nonresident tuition for **college** parallel courses; and

\$10 for district resident, \$31.20 for inter-district tuition and \$66.50 for out-of-state tuition for postsecondary and vocational-adult courses.

Facility Development

Environmental clearance and permission to construct was granted to District One for a 37,000 square foot addition for classroom and laboratory facilities. Gateway District was permitted to construct a 2,800 square foot facility for a farrier science program at Elkhorn. Milwaukee Area VTAE Board was granted environmental clearance to construct a TV tower in Milwaukee. North Central VTAE District was permitted to construct a 7,500 square foot health occupation facility. A permit to lease 3,000 square feet of space was granted to District Four VTAE Board.
