## THIRTY -FOURTH ANNUAL FLOWER SHOW

On September 27th, 1934 the Lake Geneva Gardeners and Foremen's Association celebrated its 30th Anniversary with a reception, speakers, dinners and dance. It was a very happy occasion as it recalled many of those who had served so well in helping to make the beautiful estates on Lake Geneva out of primitive forests.

Four years more have passed and several of those who were active at that time have passed to the beyond and are only memories in the minds of their former associates.

Mr. William P. Longland, who is still in active service as the Foreman at Wychwood, well remembers the evening in the Fall of 1903 when at a card party the suggestion was made that some organization be formed of those who were occupying similar positions on the estates on the lake. At that card party were Axel Johnson ( Jerseyhurst), A.J. Smith ( Ceylon Court), Frank Kuehne (O.W. Potter), Raymond Niles ( W.S. Mc Crea), John Tiplady ( H.H. Potter), Wm.P. Longland (O. Hutchin-son) and Frank Augeske , a guest, and their wives.

It had been the custom of this group of Foremen to have those card parties during the long winter months and a real fellowship had developed between them and their families, and many of the young people of the groups found their life's partners within the circle.

Naturally the Foremen were proud of the flowers which they were raising and a friendly rivalry was natural. As an outlet for the display and probably the settlement of some of the disputes as to who had the best of this or that the Flower Show developed the next year.

A meeting was called at the office of the Lake Geneva News, with F.M. Higgins the editor present. It was decided that the idea was a good one and Charles French drew up the Constitution and ByLaws for the Association.

The first Flower Show was held at the Levi Leiter place. A Chrysanthemum Show was also held at the Old Theatre ( where the present Theatre now stands), others were held at the Catholic Church Parish House and different places until the permanent quarters were built, that's another story in another article in this number.

Some of those who are remembered by the few remaining members of that original group are: Jack Barry( Beidler), James Barrett (John M. Smyth), William Hurrey( C.K.G. Billings) Henry Martin( Geo. 

The cooperative work of the Foremen and Gardeners in putting on the Flower Shows and the fine exchange of ideas which come from fellowship of kindred minds and the resultant effect on the beautification of the lake shore estates, naturally interested the owners of the estates and Mr. Charles L. Hutchinson one day suggested to Mr. M.A. Ryerson, Mr. S.B. Chapin and Mr. R.T. Crane that a permanent home be secured for the Association. A Corporation was formed by Charles L. Hutchinson, Martin A. Ryerson, S.B. Chapin, John J. Mitchell, A.C. Bartlett, William P. Longland and A.J. Smith.

REGARDING THE IMPROVEMENT OF HI-WAY  
36 THRU WILLIAMS BAYBELFRY PLAYERS SET NEW STANDARD  
OF PRODUCTION

At the regular meeting of the Village Board of Williams Bay held on Monday night, August 1, a letter signed by six residents of Williams Bay and presented by Geo. R. Hotton, Secretary of the Geneva Lake Home Owners Protective Association, was read requesting that the plans for the rebuilding of Highway 36 through Williams Bay, be presented to the residents of Williams Bay and community so that they might understand just what is to be included in the plans and the general layout of just what the improvement calls for.

Just why these plans have not been presented to the citizens of Williams Bay is- the plans are still in the making at the State Highway Department in Milwaukee. Surveys for the Highway are still being made; the State Highway Department engineers were surveying from County Trunk B east of Walworth to Fontana just last week Wednesday; all of which must be taken into consideration in developing the project. The entire cost to be borne by the state and county.

When the plans are completed and the drawings made everyone in Williams Bay and Walworth County will be given an opportunity to have a say in the approval and acceptance of the plans.

The village board meetings are, and always have been open to anyone wishing to attend the same, and all village records are open for inspection by persons wishing information pertaining to village affairs.

As the members of the Board were duly elected to their respective offices by the voters of the village, it is their desire in every way to prove themselves worthy of the confidence shown by the citizens in them.

At the proper time the citizens of Williams Bay and community shall have an opportunity to inspect the plans for improving the highway and nothing is to be concealed from the public regarding the same.

The Belfry Players, with three successful productions to their credit, are well on their way to making this, their fifth season, the best ever. Altho given before in Lake Geneva and as a guest production in Winona, the present version of this light English comedy has none of the earmarks of a revival. The stage setting is being supervised by Hudson Van Ess, new stage Manager of the Theatre, and is taking advantage of most of the Belfry's new-acquired equipment. The cast, with the exception of Mr. Pim, remains intact. Taking part will be- Esther Higgins, Joe Diegnan, Lorraine Reynolds, George Hotton, Louise Callaway, Betty Singer and Eli Popa. Mr. Popa will be remembered for his outstanding work as director of, and performance in "POST ROAD", an earlier production. He will play Mr. Pim. Mr. Wm Ziegler Nourse, of Chicago, directs.



It is proposed to repair the damaged seawall along the walk opposite the village park, and then to fill in outside the wall with enough sand to make a first class beach. The additional beach facility will relieve the congestion on the south beach on crowded days, and will be more convenient to the parking space back of the village park.

The property which was acquired by the village during the past few years, lies west and north of the village park and is now being filled in and will be developed into a first class recreation park. Tennis courts, softball field, horseshoe and shuffle board courts will be included in the development. The parking facilities will be systemitized to eliminate the congestion caused by random parking.

### LAKE GENEVA FISHING DEEP

from Chicago Tribune- by  
Bob Becker

"The fishing at Lake Geneva at this time of the year is rather deep. We usually drift with the wind (if it isn't too strong) over a bar on deep weed bed. Sometimes we get close to a big weed bed that is just out from the shore a few yards. These places are good for

large mouthed black bass. Small mouths are caught farther out in the lake in about 12 feet of water.

The most common deep water bait is the crawfish. The guides recommend a rather small hook with a gut leader attached to it. Up North we commonly fish for bass (in midsummer, when it's deep water fishing) with a small wire trace and a little gold spinner ahead of a minnow. On Lake Geneva the boys quickly squelch any such tackle rig when they take you out fishing!"
