
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### the wisconsin salon of art

It was 50 years ago this week that the Wisconsin Union started to operate on the first floor of "Association Hall" (the then new YMCA). Three weeks later, on December 14, 1907, the Cardinal proudly announced: "The nucleus for an art collection for the Wisconsin Union has been formed through the kindness of Dr. J. C. Elsom. Dr. Elsom has donated his collection of athletic pictures to the Union. They are about 40 in number and consist of views of various athletic meets, and interiors and exteriors of the gym."

This may well have been the measure of "art" on the campus 50 years ago. In any event, the idea that there could be an inter-relationship between the campus social center and "art" persisted through the years, because when the present Union opened in 1928, it included an art gallery—the first Union to devote a room exclusively to gallery purposes. And

it was only a short span of time until imaginative students, in 1934, conceived the possibility of a "Wisconsin Salon of Art" as a mutually strengthening bond between the University and the art life of the state.

When the Salon was undertaken, no one knew who the artists of Wisconsin were. There was not so much as an address list. From the sheer necessity of knowing who our artists were if they were to be invited to enter the Salon, the Union students and staff began to bring the names together. And as it turned out, this led to research interest in Wisconsin art and artists and the ultimate publication in 1936 of the first book on "Art in Wisconsin."

Since these first exploratory efforts—certainly since 1907—times have changed. Now the Union is known as the center of a distinguished art program. Some 500-800 persons visit the

gallery each day. And in a recent survey it was learned that more students on this campus (72% of all students) made use of the gallery in the course of a year than of any other single Union facility with the exception of the general lounges.

The Salon itself has become the high point of the art year, offering as it does the opportunity to observe the contribution the visual arts are making to the culture of our state.

Not the least significant part of the whole enterprise is the method of conducting the Salon, which is perhaps unparalleled anywhere in the field of large competitive art exhibitions.

From beginning to end the arrangements are handled by students, working voluntarily as a committee of the Union and aided by the Union staff. Many have gone on to become gallery directors, organizers of other salons, and art leaders in their communities.

So does the influence of the Salon expand, reaching a consummation hardly imagined when the Union hung its first "art collection" 50 years ago.

## judging

For the judging of this show each entry was placed in the gallery and given a number. Jury members working independently of each other, voted on each entry as being "in" or "out." One "in" vote resulted in an entry being exhibited, regardless of how the other two judges voted. In addition, each judge marked those entries he felt were particularly meritorious. Any entry having a meritorious vote or three "in" votes automatically became eligible for awards. From this group the three judges, working together, chose the award winners.

In this catalog, after each title is a code telling how that particular entry was judged. The letters "SW" are for William Schwartz, "SC" for Freeman Schoolcraft, and "G" for Elizabeth Geiken. An asterisk before an initial indicates a meritorious vote from that judge.

### comments of the jury

The jury of selection and awards has worked to select an exhibition of works which is representative of all styles of art submitted. We have worked to include the best of each style and to make awards for the most outstanding accomplishments in each style. It is entirely possible that another jury might have included other works which this jury has rejected and have rejected some of our inclusions. We believe we have selected a strong, vital, and inspired segment of the art produced in the State of Wisconsin. The jury could have, and would have, made a greater number of selections, were we not restricted by gallery space limitation.

### statistics

306 artists submitted 430 works of art in oil, watercolor, graphics, and sculpture with a limit of two entries per person.

101 works by 91 artists were selected by the jury for exhibition in the Salon.

The contributors who were eligible have had three years' residence in Wisconsin including the past year, or were tenyear residents in Wisconsin if now living outside the state, or are faculty or students now in Wisconsin art schools.
