REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

Regent Beckwith, Chairman of the Council of Trustees of the UW Hospital and Clinics, summarized the Council's review on the previous day of an audit report which was essentially favorable, with some improvements suggested in the areas of accounts receivable, billings and purchasing. Hospital administrator Gordon Derzon had reported that patient days were down somewhat from those budgeted, resulting in a slight loss for the past two months, and about a break-even position for the fiscal year to date. The reduction was attributed to a shortage of nursing in the intensive care unit, a problem that many hospitals were experiencing, and steps were being taken to hire more nurses and train them for ICU service. It was expected that the reduction in patient days could be offset in the balance of the fiscal year. In conclusion, Regent Beckwith said the Hospital was in sound condition fiscally and medically.

President Erdman referred to the written report of the October 16, 1981 meetings of the Higher Educational Aids Board and Wisconsin Higher Education Corporation, a copy of which is on file with the papers of this meeting.

President Erdman announced that at future meetings, Regent Hendrickson, President of the Wisconsin Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education, would give reports on the activities of that Board.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE SYSTEM

It was moved by Regent Fox, seconded by Regent Fitzgerald and carried unanimously, that the following resolution be approved:

Resolution 2500: That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record (copy on file with the papers of this meeting) be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified and confirmed.

MacArthue Foundation - report on receipt of \$1.2 million Sharet, p.2.

Referring to receipt of a \$1.2 million grant from the MacArthur Foundation, President O'Neil stated that the select group of institutions to which such grants were made confirmed the magnitude of the honor, and that it could not have come at a better time or in a more welcome form than the endowment of a senior professorship. While the initial notification came to him as President of the System, he noted, the object of the grant and statements made by the Foundation's president left no doubt that the chair should be filled at the UW-Madison, inasmuch as the goal was to recognize and reinforce scholarship at several eminent research universities. On that assumption, he had asked Chancellor Shain to develop a process which would bring to the President, and then to the Board, a recommendation for initial appointment to the MacArthur professorship. It was hoped that the chair could be filled for the 1982-83 academic year.

Admin Code - hegis comme to hold heavings on proposed amend to Ch. UWS.8.

The President reported that the Assembly Education Committee and the Senate Judiciary and Consumer Affairs Committee planned to hold hearings on proposed amendments to <u>Wis. Admin. Code</u> Ch. UWS 8, adding that there was no indication of any substantive problem but simply a desire to review the proposals.

With respect to activities of System groups, President O'Neil noted that the Faculty Representatives recently held their first meeting of the year and that the Advisory Committee on Minority Student Affairs would reconvene in the near future. The College Skills Council (which in the past was called the Basic Skills Council) had been appointed for the current year and included representatives of the Department of Public Instruction, the Vocational, Technical and Adult Education System, and one representative of independent higher education. A major initiative of the Council was the annual Basic Skills Conference held the previous week.

Dr. Katharine C. Lyall, UW System Vice President for Academic Affairs designate, was introduced by President O'Neil. In her remarks, Dr. Lyall stated that it was a great honor to be associated with a first-rank institution having the reputation and renown of the University of Wisconsin System.

The President then introduced Dr. Vernon E. Lattin, who had been appointed UW System Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs. Dr. Lattin commented briefly, expressing his commitment to assist universities in the areas of quality programming and equality of access for students.

Fees-opposition by United Council to 2nd semoster surcharge, p. 3+8 VCX-rep-surcharge & United Council

Speaking in opposition to the proposed surcharge for the second semester, Robert Kranz, President of the United Council of UW Student Governments, asked the Board to consider whether it was only a short-term solution to problems of the current biennium or whether what was being developed was a permanent mechanism for future tuition increases. He thought it was the latter and expressed concern that many students would no longer be able to afford higher education. As tuition increased, students would have to rely more heavily on loans, which meant that they would leave the university burdened with debts, he continued, adding that the effect on the economy of this lack of purchasing power should not be ignored. In conclusion, he emphasized that such long-term concerns outweighed the short-term gains to be realized from the surcharge.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Chairman Beckwith presented the Committee's report.

At a portion of the meeting to which all regents were invited, President O'Neil introduced Dr. Katharine E. Lyall, UW System Vice President for Academic Affairs designate, and briefly reviewed her academic background including her current position as Professor of Political Economy and Senior Research Scientist at the Johns Hopkins University Center for Metropolitan Planning and Research, as well as Director of the Graduate Program in Public Policy. She was to assume full-time responsibilities in the UW System on January 1, 1982. Dr. Lyall then presented Dr. Vernon E. Lattin who had been appointed Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs. He was a member of the faculty of Northern Illinois University and Director of the University Center for Latino and Latin American Affairs. Previously, he had held teaching appointments at the Universities of New Mexico and Tennessee.

Regent Beckwith reported that the Committee, with all regents invited, heard a presentation by Chancellor Alan Guskin and Vice Chancellor Lorman Ratner, which was entitled "Institutional Planning and Decision Making at UW-Parkside: The Setting of Priorities and the Reallocation of Resources" (outline on file with the papers of this meeting). In his opening remarks, Chancellor Guskin described the planning and decision-making process as a continuous interaction of administrators and faculty, administrators and students, and

Reallocation of Resource - Presentation by UD-Pankside, p. 324 among administrators. Emphasizing the importance of an environment of general

confidence in key administrators, in which decisions were regarded as consistent and predictable over time, he said the intent was that, through formal and informal collaboration among faculty, administration and students, clear priorities would be developed followed by specific programs to implement them. He indicated that three general priorities had formed the basis for major reallocations of resources at UW-Parkside: (1) striving for excellence in programs, faculty and students; (2) commitment to a mission to provide both strong professional programs and liberal arts programs in order to serve the needs of students in the Kenosha-Racine area; and (3) commitment to community outreach.

Vice Chancellor Ratner then described, in Committee, the process of reviewing institutional priorities with the Dean of the Faculty's Advisory Committee, the result of which was a plan for program budget reductions and reallocations considered to be consistent with defined priorities. While he noted that it was possible to make reductions and reallocations by techniques such as keeping unfilled faculty positions vacant for a year, reducing supply and expense budgets in all units by a fixed percentage, increasing class sizes, reducing numbers of classes and eliminating or reducing some programs or services, he also observed that UW-Parkside sought to achieve program reductions and reallocations by examination of priorities rather than by across-the-board cuts. Concluding their remarks, Chancellor Guskin and Vice Chancellor Ratner referred to a graphic representation of the model employed in making budget and reallocation decisions which indicated that funds necessary to create a new program could not be traced specifically to the reduction of another program, but rather were made available by reallocation from a number of sources. Chancellor Guskin observed that success of the reallocation decision process depended on three factors: (1) a viable consensus regarding the university's priorities; (2) the capacity to control resources; and (3) a highly developed collaborative relationship among administrators and between administrators and faculty. The object of the planning process, he stated, was to make the budget the servant of academic goals.

After the presentation, the Chancellor and Vice Chancellor had responded to questions from Board members which dealt with the use of a planning process to achieve productivity increases, the development of new programming under the planning process described, the degree to which the UW-Parkside planning process might be unique among System institutions, and the importance of protecting significant university programs such as philosophy and history which, at certain times, might experience moderate or low demand. Regents expressed appreciation for the report and suggested that similar presentations would be useful additions to future agendas.

A new academic program proposal for a master of science degree in medical technology at UW-Milwaukee was presented to the Committee for a second reading. Regent Erdman raised questions concerning the need for advanced training in medical technology and expressed concern that the program might contribute to the increasing costs of medical care. In response, Chancellor Horton and Professor Stephen Sonstein spoke about increasing sophistication in the field and the program's function in the development of human managerial and educational skills, as well as its focus on clinical laboratory scientist aspects. Regent Lawton commented on the needs of medical technologists for additional training and indicated strong support for the proposed program.

Regent Beckwith moved adoption of Resolution 2501 and the motion was seconded by Regent Finlayson:

Resolution 2501: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System and the Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, the M.S., Medical Technology be approved for planning and implementation.

Regent Fox noted that three other new degree programs at UW-Milwaukee had just been approved and that this one would require three new faculty members and two graduate assistants, with no additional funds being allocated for those programs. In which general areas, he inquired, would reductions be made in order to provide funding for the medical technology program.

In reply, Chancellor Horton indicated that funds probably would come from a variety of sources, including reduction in supplies and equipment budgets and retrenchment of faculty positions in some areas of the university. Noting that the three new positions requested would be added at the rate of one position per year, he said that, out of the total number of positions at UW-Milwaukee, each year a position would be reallocated in order to provide faculty for the new program. With respect to the number of new programs, he remarked that, because there had been none the previous year and due to some delays in bringing forward new programs in the School of Allied Health, four programs came to the Board of Regents at one time rather than over a period of years as usually would have been the case.

Regent Fox asked if the Chancellor could identify those areas from which positions might be taken. Chancellor Horton responded that approximately 30 positions had to be kept open that year in order to provide for a one million dollar reduction required by the two percent budget cut, and that, because of the one percent reduction the following year, an additional half million dollars would be available. Explaining that 20 of those open positions were in physical plant areas and 10 were academic staff and faculty positions, he said none had yet been specifically designated for the new program inasmuch as that determination would be made through institutional processes in January.

Put to the vote, Resolution 2501 was unanimously adopted.

Regent Beckwith continued the report of the Education Committee, summarizing Committee consideration of a model school special education program for children with exceptional educational needs. UW-Madison Chancellor Irving Shain introduced Dr. Jon Miller, Acting Director of the Waisman Center on Mental Retardation and Human Development, and Mr. Harvey Stevens, of the Center staff. Professor Miller responded to questions dealing with the location and number of children to be served by the model school, the source and amount of funds to be required, the location of similar programs that have been successful elsewhere, and the extent to which, if at all, the proposed model school would offer services that might be provided less expensively by the public schools. The principal reason for adopting the resolution, he said, was to facilitate planning of the school which would permit the charging of tuition to school districts in order for them to discharge their responsibility under federal law to provide appropriate educational experiences for exceptional children. When the school was developed and if there was a demand to be filled, the Board of Regents would be asked to approve contracts between school districts and the Waisman Center

for providing services in return for tuition. The main purposes of the program would be to support research and the training of teachers and to provide services to children which local school board districts could not provide. Tuition charges would be borne by school districts according to rates determined by the Center (based on the net costs of providing special education and related services) and approved by the Board of Regents. It was noted that the school must be approved by the Department of Public Instruction as a condition for charging tuition.

The model school would be housed in the Waisman Center on the Madison campus and, initially, would have the capacity to serve 80 children from Madison and nearby school districts. Chancellor Shain advised the Committee that declining federal and state funding for special education programs contributed to assurance of a client base for the school, since the Center could provide services in a group setting less expensively than individual schools might be able to accommodate their own small numbers of eligible children with special needs. Regent Lawton had pointed out that the potential of the program for preparing teachers needed in other parts of the state was important and that research capacity of the Waisman Center would be enhanced by the program. Similar programs, Professor Miller added, were operating successfully in several other locations, including the University of Washington, the University of Miami and Vanderbilt University. The proposed program had been endorsed by the Department of Public Instruction.

Upon motion by Regent Beckwith, seconded by Regent Jesinski, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolution 2502: School special education prostum R.2502, p.5-6.

That, upon the recommendation of the President of the Waisman Center - Auth University of Wisconsin-Madison, the University of University of Wisconsin System and the Chancellor of the Wisconsin-Madison be authorized to establish a Model School Special Education Program at the Waisman Center on Mental Retardation and Human Development as enabled by Section 36.25(19), Wisconsin Statutes.

<u>Collectore Burganing</u> - status report on collective burganing legislation, p. 6-7

President O'Neil reported to the Committee that a tie vote on Assembly Bill 452 had been reversed on October 13 by a 8-7 vote of the Assembly Education Committee recommending passage of the bill. Amendments adopted by the Committee made the following changes: (1) provide for a two-step election procedure; (2) eliminate the provision that department chairpersons be included in the unit but instead require that their status be determined by the Wisconsin Employment Relations Commission; and (3) establish a sunset provision for the legislation as of July 1, 1987. AB 452, in the form of a substitute amendment, would next go to the Joint Committee on Finance for review and analysis of the bill's fiscal impact, and the President indicated he had written to members of the Committee reminding them of the Board of Regents' position with regard to collective bargaining.

Associate Vice President Lemon advised the Committee that, in the proposed legislation, the employer was still defined as the Department of Employment Relations, that the bill identified eight bargaining units which was at variance with the Board of Regents' position that each campus be recognized as a bargaining unit, and that it stated that the rights and responsibilities of faculty at each institution to actively participate in governance, policy development and academic affairs, as provided in Chapter 36, were not subjects of bargaining.

The three collective bargaining bills in the State Senate were: (1) a companion bill to Assembly Bill 452; (2) a bill to allow collective bargaining by academic staff only; and (3) a bill which would permit collective bargaining by teaching assistants only.

Resolutions 2503-2505 had been approved by the Committee in closed session.

Adoption of the following resolution was moved by Regent Beckwith, seconded by Regent Fitzgerald and voted unanimously:

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

Chairman Fox presented the Committee's report.

At a portion of the meeting to which all regents were invited, President O'Neil presented his recommendation for a second semester surcharge. Noting that there had been considerable support for a surcharge proposal during the summer but that it had been deferred, he said the administration carefully studied data which included enrollment increases that exceeded expectations, thus increasing operational costs for which revenues were inadequate. There were critical needs, identified by chancellors at the October meeting, which remained unmet for the current year. An additional item of uncertainty, he added, was the prospect of some shortfall in state revenues later in the fiscal year which might cause a reduction in appropriations.

The President's recommendation had three parts: (1) a \$23 surcharge for the university cluster and \$30 for the doctoral cluster; (2) the commitment that the proceeds would remain with the institutions from which they were generated; and (3) a request to the Secretary of the Department of Administration for authorization to expend funds collected through the surcharge. If it was approved, the Joint Committee on Finance would then either act on the recommendation or decide to take no action.

decide to take no action. UN-Millo-Comment's by Ch. (HON ON ON Need for 1nd Semester Suchts Three chancellors spoke, in Committee, of the need for the proposed surcharge. Chancellor Frank Horton referred to his comments to the Board earlier in the year regarding the impact of budget reductions for the 1981-83 biennium OPPOSITION and those which took place the previous year, stating that access for students of Students was a problem at UW-Milwaukee. He stressed that the surcharge would provide improved access to courses, to better equipment, to more hands-on experiments in Prilaboratories, and to counseling the Must of Need for 2nd Semester Surchuster; Opplisition by WSH of Po Pointing out that the UW-Madison budget for 1981-82 was \$1.2 million less

Pointing out that the UW-Madison budget for 1981-82 was \$1.2 million less than the previous year, even though there was a record enrollment, Chancellor Irving Shain said the goal for the first semester was to carry on in an orderly manner, which meant "mortgaging" second semester revenues. He recalled that problems of access and the impact of closed sections on students became serious two years previously when freshmen could not get into certain required courses. Last year, sophomores filled up many freshmen sections, and this year juniors and seniors filled up freshmen and sophomore classes. Some students would, therefore, be unable to complete degree requirements on time, he stated, and would need to remain in school longer in order to complete their educations.

In his remarks to the Committee, UW-Oshkosh Chancellor Edward Penson emphasized six points: (1) Budgetary difficulties had developed gradually over 8-10 years and most particularly during the past six semesters. (2) Problems related to inadequate funds for library acquisitions were worsening. (3) There was an increasing need for instructional equipment. (4) It was necessary to begin immediately to recruit quality faculty for the second semester. (5) The university should not have to choose between access and quality; it would be better to ask if the state were willing to provide sufficient resources to meet requirements. (6) Budget shortfalls were recognized not only by chancellors but throughout the campuses and communities as well.

The following student representatives appeared before the Committee in opposition to the proposed surcharge: Eric Jernberg, Vice President, UW-Milwaukee Student Association; Alison Rice, President, and Gene Weil, Vice President, UW-Madison Wisconsin Student Association; Robert Kranz, President, United Council of UW Student Governments; and Bonny Hawley, President, UW-Green Bay Student Association.

In Committee discussion, Regent Erdman stated that decisions of access versus quality should be made by the Board of Regents--not by any other body. Regent Knowles felt that the proposed surcharge amounted to the imposition of a tax and that only the Legislature should take such action.

Regent Fox moved adoption by the Board of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Heckrodt:

Resolution 2506: That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, a surcharge fee of \$30 be assessed each full time student enrolling in a doctoral cluster institution for the second semester 1981-82, and a surcharge fee of \$23 be assessed each full time student enrolling in a university cluster institution or Center System campus for the second semester 1981-82, with an appropriate conversion for academic quarters and an analogous per credit surcharge fee for all part time students.

Regent Beckwith stated that, while the Board did not wish to increase student costs, the System was faced with a deteriorating financial situation which created quality and access problems within the universities. Pointing out that the increase in tuition, including the surcharge, would be 4 percent as contrasted with an 11 percent rise in the consumer price index, and that tuition increases in previous years also had been less than the consumer price index, he emphasized that in real dollars the cost of tuition, fees, room and board had actually declined for UW System students in the last decade. In comparison to other universities, he noted that UW System tuition was next to the lowest among Big Ten institutions--about half of that charged by the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor and approximately two-thirds of the tuition at Ohio State. Commenting on financial aid, he observed that, even with recent reductions in grant and loan funds, those resources were still much larger than what had been available in the past. Students had for generations borrowed money to help finance their educations, he noted, indicating he found nothing basically wrong with doing so, as long as the debt incurred was not unmanageable. Stating that he would vote for the surcharge, he said it would help to meet urgent student needs, "so that when they matriculate in our institutions, they can expect to graduate with proper courses in four years' time and to receive a quality education. That is what the enterprise is all about."

Regent Erdman remarked that student plans to lobby in the Legislature against the surcharge were irresponsible. Instead, she stated, they should work for increased funding for the university, in order to preserve access and quality.

The question was put on Resolution 2506, and it was adopted, with Regents Fitzgerald and Knowles voting "No."

WisPIRG - report on funding request, p. =9-10

Regent Fox stated that the Committee, with all regents invited, then received a status report on the funding request by Wisconsin Public Interest Research Group (WisPIRG) organizers. Executive Vice President Kauffman outlined results of meetings and deliberations which had occurred since the Committee discussed the matter in July, indicating that System Administration and chancellors continued to agree that any funding for WisPIRG should be obtained through the SUFAC process. September 1990 - Neport IN WisPIRG funding Nequest; P-10 Mr. James Koenig, of the WisPIRG Organizing Committee, described activities at UW-Madison, UW-Green Bay and UW-Stevens Point, stating that a recommendation would be presented to the Board at the December meeting.

Federal fundins - decline in research funding reported, p. 10.

In reviewing gifts, grants and U.S. government contracts, the Committee was advised by Vice President Lorenz that the month's activity was approximately \$6 million less than during the same period in the previous year, while the year-todate figures approximately equaled those of the previous year. He remarked that the month's shortfall was almost entirely in federally-funded research and that other large research institutions were having the same experience, indicating that the granting agencies, being unsure of the magnitude of further budget reductions, were deferring action on large numbers of proposals.

Upon motion by Regent Fox, seconded by Regent Finlayson and voted unanimously, the following resolution was adopted.

Resolution 2507:

7: That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the gifts, grants and contracts presented at this meeting (copy on file with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

Auxiliary Operations - 1980-81 report presented, p.10

Regent Fox reported that Associate Vice President Douglas Osterheld summarized, in Committee, the <u>Report on 1980-81 Auxiliary Operations</u> (copy on file with the papers of this meeting). Due to higher than anticipated enrollment levels, higher occupancy in residence halls, energy savings, and greater than anticipated interest earnings, the System's auxiliaries were very successful in that year, with funded reserves totaling \$17 million for building repairs and maintenance and \$9 million for equipment replacement. It was noted, however, that costs for athletics had been increasing at a greater rate than inflation, which, together with budget pressures, would make it difficult to maintain the same level of activity in the future. Mr. Osterheld also called attention to the high debt service cost per student and excess dormitory space at UW-Superior, suggesting that the systemwide subsidies being provided to prevent undue hardship on students at that institution might not be the best long-range solution.

In Board discussion, Regent Knowles stated that the report was a remarkably good one. Referring to a graph which showed that increases in student costs for board and room had been well below the consumer price index since 1977, he said it demonstrated that the auxiliaries were being extremely well run and were a real bargain for students.

Regent Lawton expressed appreciation to Associate Vice President Osterheld, who was to retire in January 1982 after more than 40 years of service to the university.

Vice President Lorenz reported to the Committee that a year-end balance could not be projected due to uncertainties in the fee allocation process and a possible shift in federal support, but that current projections indicated higher than budgeted fee and tuition receipts.

The Committee was advised that annual budget conferences with each of the System institutions would begin the following week.

REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The Committee's report was presented by Chairman Gerrard.

The Committee first considered approval of the policy statement on implementation of the Wisconsin Environmental Policy Act (WEPA) in the University of Wisconsin System, presented for a first reading in October. The statement had been revised to include a new section requested by representatives of the Wisconsin Environmental Decade and the Public Intervenor's Office.

Adoption of the following resolution was moved by Regent Gerrard and seconded by Regent O'Harrow:

Resolution 2508: Environ Policy Act, MiscinsinImplementation Miscinsin Miscinsin

Regent Beckwith requested an explanation of the reason for adding section III.A.3.

Mr. Donald Gerhard, System Director of Environmental Affairs/Campus Planning, replied that during the past month hearings had been held at which state agencies and other organizations were invited to comment on the document. Indicating that responses received were very favorable, he said that the State Public Intervenor's office and The Environmental Decade had suggested the revision because of a 1977 State Supreme Court decision. In reviewing the recommendation, it was found that other state agencies incorporated such statements into their guidelines and that there was no objection to including it in the System statement, inasmuch as the suggested procedure was already being followed as part of the standard operational process.

Although he did not wish to go into the matter further, Regent Beckwith felt in the additional statement was unnecessary.

Put to the vote, Resolution 2508 was unanimously adopted.

Regent Gerrard reported that a request was presented to the Committee for an indication of willingness to accept a gift-in-kind of \$50,000 for funding an art gallery and ticket center remodeling project at UW-Green Bay, with authorization to plan, bid and construct the project. It was pointed out that the present facility could not adequately meet user demands and that the gift-in-kind would greatly benefit the University as well as the public using the art gallery and theater.

It was moved by Regent Gerrard, seconded by Regent Hendrickson and unanimously carried, that the following resolution be adopted:

Resolution 2509: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Green Bay UW-GB-Bldgsthunds -Chancellor and the President of the University of Indicition of Willing Wisconsin System, the board of Accept a "gift-in-kind" of to accept a "gift-for remodeling its willingness to accept a "gift-in-kind" of art gallery thicket center \$50,000 for funding for an Art Gallery and Ticket Center Remodeling Project at UW-Green Bay and authorizes planning, bidding and construction of the project.

> The Committee reviewed a request for release of advance planning funds to develop concept and budget reports on installation of coal-fired boiler systems at UW-Green Bay and UW-Parkside--both of which were currently limited to either gas or oil. In determining the type of installation which would be made, Regent Gerrard said, careful consideration would be given to environmental impact. The request conformed with previous regent action directing that multi-fuel burning boilers be installed on all four-year campuses, and it was noted that substantial reductions in fuel costs would be realized by installation of coal-burning equipment.

Regent Gerrard moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent O'Harrow:

Resolution 2510: W-6B-BHOSKhunds .-Forfunds to study

That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Green Bay and UW-Parkside Chancellors and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authorization be granted al fired bullers, R. 2510 funds for the development of concept and budget reports involving installation of a coal-fired fluidized bed <u>UW-Purkside-Bhasthund</u> Sume entry Sume entry coal-fired steam generator systems that will operate below minimum EPA standards at UW-Green Bay and UW-Parkside.

> Regent Beckwith questioned the wisdom of pursuing the fluidized bed combustion option, inasmuch as it was relatively new to the United States and still an experimental type of unit. He thought it might not turn out to be the most cost-effective way of providing coal burning systems at UW-Parkside and UW-Green Bay.

Indicating that there would be a study to determine the feasibility of such a system, Regent Heckrodt remarked that the installations themselves would cost approximately \$3 million. The study, he said, would help to insure that the best decision would be made.

Vice President Winter added that the fluidized bed combustion boiler would not be the only alternative considered and that the intention was to proceed very cautiously.

Noting that the situations at UW-Green Bay and UW-Parkside were different, Regent Hendrickson said \$55,000 would be used for one campus and \$45,000 for the other.

Regent Beckwith expressed the hope that the System would not become too heavily committed to the fluidized bed concept, since another alternative might prove to be preferable.

The question was put on Resolution 2510, and it was adopted unanimously.

Regent Gerrard stated that the Committee considered the granting of an easement at UW-Stevens Point to the Diocese of La Crosse for access to and from Illinois Avenue over University lands to the Newman Center. In return, the Diocese would quitclaim a parcel of land to the Board. The Committee was advised that the UW-Stevens Point administration and representatives of the Diocese were in full agreement with the proposal.

Adoption of the following resolution was moved by Regent Gerrard and seconded by Regent Fitzgerald:

<u>WW-SP-Bldgsthinds</u> Withdriwal og motion togvinntag Ensemant for accessto Nowman Center, p.13-14.

That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Stevens Point Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, an easement be granted to The Diocese of La Crosse, Wisconsin for vehicular access to and from Illinois Avenue over the parking lot access road located on vacated Fifth Avenue in Block 3, T. Helminski and Others Addition to the City of Stevens Point.

In consideration for the granting of the aforementioned access easement, The Diocese of La Crosse, Wisconsin will release and quitclaim to the Board of Regents the following tract of land in Portage County, Wisconsin:

That part of vacated Fifth Avenue abutting lots 9 and 10, Block 3, T. Helminski and Others Addition to the City of Stevens Point

Regent Fox asked if the easement and the other property had been appraised.

Regent Gerrard replied that they had not, but that it was considered a fairly equal trade. <u>ENSEMENT</u> - Lisc. of giving without Compensation and giving to religious organizations, p.13-14; p. 16-20 (X-rep-Beligious Organizations In response to a question by Regent Fox as to whether the University or the Diocese would be giving up more land, Regent Gerrard indicated that he thought the parcel to be quitclaimed by the Diocese was somewhat larger.

Regent Fox stated that, particularly when a religious organization was involved, it was important to ascertain the value of the properties in question in order to insure that compensation was adequate. Because there were no appraisals, he said he intended to vote against the resolution.

In response to the concern expressed by Regent Fox, Regent Gerrard said he would withdraw his motion and ask for appraisals. Regent Fitzgerald then withdrew her second.

Regent Gerrard continued his report, summarizing review by the Committee of the proposed purchase of a 0.25 acre parcel of land at UW-Stout. The property, which was located immediately north of the University's general services area, would be used for expansion of physical plant and general services activities. Identified for purchase in the approved campus plan, the property was appraised at \$16,000 and \$20,000, with an option secured for \$18,000.

Upon motion by Regent Gerrard, seconded by Regent O'Harrow, Resolution 2511 was adopted unanimously.

> An agreement formalizing the sale of steam by UW-Superior to the Wisconsin Indianhead VTAE District was considered by the Committee. Similar to agreements approved by the Board in July and October for UW-Eau Claire, this agreement also would be in effect ten years.

It was moved by Regent Gerrard, seconded by Regent Hendrickson and carried unanimously, that the following resolution be adopted:

Resolution 2512: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Superior UW-Superior - Approval for Sule of steam to inclumine al VTAE- indifference Df steam Approval of Steam TAP Proval of Steam by UW-Superior. That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Superior Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, approval be granted to the agree-Wisconsin Indianhead VTAE District for the sale of steam to the Wisconsin Indianhead Technical Institute by UW-Superior.

Regent Hendrickson said that studies had been completed for each VTAE district and that he would send a letter regarding further means of inter-system cooperation. <u>Hensystem Coordingtion</u> - comments in Connection w/ Sale of steam to Indianhead VTHE, p. 18-15-

Regent Erdman added that this overall approach to coordination between the VTAE System and the UW System would be very helpful.

Energy auservation - presentation on fume hoods, p. 15

Regent Gerrard reported that the Committee heard a presentation by Mr. Alan Schultz, of the System's energy management team, on energy-conservation modifications involving fume hoods in buildings throughout the System.

A request to approve the concept and budget report for the Chemistry Building fume hood/energy modifications project at UW-Madison was presented to the Committee. The fume hood system needed to be changed in order to satisfy code requirements, and because of heavy energy consumption resulting from the programs housed in that building, it was a prime candidate for energy conservation. A separate package of energy-related work, therefore, also had been identified, it being estimated that the cost for the energy portion of the project would be recovered in less than seven years, based on projected annual energy savings of \$187,000.

Regent Gerrard moved adoption of Resolution 2513. The motion was seconded by Regent O'Harrow and voted unanimously.

That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the concept and budget report for the Chemistry Building Fume Hoods/Energy Modifications Project be approved and authority be granted to plan, bid and construct the project at a total estimated project cost of \$4,106,000 (\$2,479,000--General Obligation Bonding and \$1,627,000--1981-83 Energy Conservation Allocation).

Adoption of the following resolution was moved by Regent Gerrard, seconded by Regent O'Harrow and unanimously carried:

Resolution 2514:

That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the following minor projects be approved and authority be granted to plan, bid and construct, at the cost and from the funding source indicated:

Vice President Winter reported to the Committee that the State Building Commission would seek short-term bonding to replace cash funding previously available for statewide major maintenance, safety, health, and handicapped access programs.

Regent Gerrard stated that the Committee approved the granting of three easements to the Committee for Campus Ministry at UW-Green Bay. In a presentation by Chancellor Weidner and his staff, it had been explained that the organization had approximately a half million dollars in gift money available for construction of an ecumenical center on foundation land adjacent to university land. It was requested that two easements be granted to allow access to the building in addition to a utility easement.

It was moved by Regent Gerrard and seconded by Regent Hendrickson that the following resolution be adopted:

That, upon the recommendation of UW-Green Bay Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authorization be given to grant the Committee for Campus Ministry, University of Wisconsin-Green Bay, Inc., two right of way easements for driveways/entranceways and sidewalks over the lands of the grantors in the City of Green Bay, County of Brown, State of Wisconsin, more particularly described as follows:

Part of the Northwest ¼ of the Northeast ¼, Section 26, T24N,R21E, City of Green Bay, Brown County, Wisconsin described as follows: Commencing at the North ¼ corner of Section 26, T24N,R21E; thence S89° 01'18"E, 371.17 feet along the north line of Section 26 to the point of beginning; thence continuing S89° 01'18"E, 40.00 feet along said north line; thence S0° 07'56"W, 73.44 feet; thence N89° 02'34"W, 40.00 feet; thence N0° 07'56"E, 73.45 feet to the point of beginning. In addition, authorization is given to grant an easement for utility purposes across university lands, with the detailed legal description to be reflected in the easement to be filed in the Office of the Board of Regents.

Regent Lawton requested information about the Committee for Campus Ministry.

The Committee was an ecumenical group representing more than thirty denominations, Chancellor Weidner replied, adding that it had been operating as the only religious organization on the campus since 1969. He explained that two of the three easements were in the interests of developing housing on the campus, while the third had no such purpose.

Regent Fox asked if the easements would be given without compensation.

Referring to a map which outlined the properties involved, Chancellor Weidner pointed out a 42-acre parcel owned by the Foundation on which the University wished to develop housing through Foundation auspices, parcels which the Campus Ministry and the Foundation were trading, and locations of the proposed easements.

Regent Heckrodt noted that there was a tie-in with the day-care center as well. Indicating that the University hoped eventually to enlarge the center, Chancellor Weidner showed the Board its location and that of additional property which could be obtained.

Regent Beckwith then asked if there would be no compensation for the easements, and Chancellor Weidner responded in the affirmative.

In reply to a question by Regent Beckwith as to whether there was a structure on the property, Chancellor Weidner indicated that there was not, but that one was planned.

Regent Fox stated that he did not think it would be proper to give away an easement to a religious group.

Noting that the organization was nondenominational, Regent Gerrard felt the resolution should be adopted. The transaction was primarily between the Campus Ministry and the Foundation, he said, and the project should not be delayed by the request for a small easement from the University.

Regent Fox questioned why the project would be hampered if the easement were appraised and sold instead of granted without compensation.

Regent Schilling asked if Regent Fox considered it improper as a matter of policy or unlawful to give away the easement.

As a matter of policy, Regent Fox replied, he did not think the University should give away easements to anyone. Inasmuch as the only beneficiaries of one of the easements in question would be a religious organization, he believed that to grant it without compensation would be not only bad public policy but unlawful as well. If there was a bonafide sale, he added, the problem would not exist.

In response to an inquiry by Regent Schilling as to whether counsel had rendered an opinion on the legality of giving land to religious organizations, President O'Neil said his feeling was that each such issue should be reviewed on its own merits because of the difficulty in generalizing about relations between government and religious institutions. There was a basic concern which he shared with Regent Fox in regard to the distinction between transactions involving religious and non-religious entities, even though the religious organization might be nonsectarian. Because a question had been raised which required legal interpretation, he suggested that, unless a critical time pressure was involved, the request be withdrawn and returned the following month, in order to allow time for review.

Indicating that there had been plans to begin construction that fall, Chancellor Weidner noted that it might not be possible to do so after the December meeting.

While he considered it necessary that the legal question be resolved before the matter was finally decided, Regent Schilling suggested that the Board could address the policy issue involved and accommodate the time frame Chancellor Weidner indicated by voting the merits of the transaction and approving it contingent upon advice from counsel.

President O'Neil thought the issues could be explored fairly quickly and a recommendation could be made to the Executive Committee within the next week. By proceeding in that way, he believed it would be possible to act expeditiously, without the need to make a final decision at this meeting.

Stating that the purpose of the transaction was to benefit students, Regent Gerrard pointed out that the Campus Ministry could decide to build the center at a location less convenient for students if the university would not grant the request. He emphasized that 99 percent of the project involved only the Ministry and the Foundation, and that he saw no reason to delay construction.

Inasmuch as a legal question had been raised, it seemed to Regent Erdman that President O'Neil's recommendation should be accepted.

Regent Gerrard said he would withdraw his motion only on the condition that action be taken by the Executive Committee within the next week so that construction could begin. Noting that the Campus Ministry had funds available for the project, he remarked that it would provide jobs which were much needed in the current economy. Regent Hendrickson agreed to withdraw his second.

President Erdman affirmed the understanding that action would be taken within the week.

Although he did not think a final decision should be made on any issue when a member of the Board questioned its legality, Regent Schilling wondered if the Board should not discuss the policy issues relating to the entire matter of giving land away and of giving land to religious organizations.

Indicating that staff would review those issues, Regent Erdman felt they were questions about which counsel was needed.

Regent Schilling said it appeared that the whole issue was being referred to the Executive Committee. It seemed to him, however, that there was a policy question for the Board to decide, which had prompted his suggestion that a decision be made at this meeting contingent upon approval by counsel.

Regent Gerrard thought the resolution might be re-stated to provide that the easement definitely would be granted, either at no cost or at cost, so that the Committee for Campus Ministry could proceed with its plans.

Regent Jesinski agreed with Regent Schilling that overall policy should be determined.

It was <u>moved</u> by Regent Schilling and <u>seconded</u> by Regent Finlayson that the resolution be approved pending advice of legal counsel and subsequent approval by the Executive Committee.

President O'Neil felt all that needed to be done at this meeting was to entrust the matter to the Executive Committee, with the expectation that in a week the Committee would receive a recommendation reflecting the advice of counsel.

Regent Schilling indicated the intent of his motion was that the resolution be approved with the condition subsequent that the easement would not be given if legal counsel advised that to do so would be unlawful.

The resolution should be revised, Regent Gerrard felt, to state that, in the event the easement could not be given away, land owned by the Campus Ministry would be taken in trade. He said that Chancellor Weidner thought the organization would agree to such a provision and that the Board then could make a decision without need for further delay.

Regent Heckrodt did not believe that solution would fully address the questions related to dealing with religious entities.

Regent Finlayson said she had hoped this case would help to establish legal policy for similar requests, which was implied in the motion to approve the resolution pending advice by counsel and final action by the Executive Committee. She did not think the suggested revision would resolve the legal questions which had been raised.

If legal counsel concluded that compensation was required, Regent Gerrard noted, there would be payment for the easement by transfer of an appropriate amount of land, on the basis of two apprisals.

Regent Erdman thought the pending motion should be put to a vote. If it were approved, she added, the Executive Committee could take Regent Gerrard's proposal into account, after hearing from legal counsel.

Emphasizing that the decision should be made at this meeting, Regent Gerrard said he did not believe there was any barrier to granting an easement to a religious organization, as long as the group was willing to provide compensation if necessary.

To authorize the Executive Committee to act, Regent Jesinski commented, would really be to vote against the position taken by Regent Fox. He thought the matter could be resolved by deciding that policy issue and then deferring to the Executive Committee the legal question which had been raised.

Observing that two issues were involved, Regent Schilling said the Board could approve granting of the easement in question, subject to advice by counsel that to do so would not be in violation of the law. He was surprised that there was not a policy on the larger issue of dealing with religious organizations and thought perhaps that matter should be considered in the abstract.

Although a legal opinion could not be rendered without having an opportunity to look carefully at the facts, President O'Neil stated, that could be accomplished within a few days, and action could then be taken by the Executive Committee. While he did not doubt the ultimate wisdom of the UW-Green Bay request, he thought the opportunity to fit it into a larger context would be beneficial in the long run.

The motion was restated by the Secretary as follows:

Resolution 2515: That the resolution be approved pending advice of legal counsel and subsequent approval by the Executive Committee within one week.

Regent Lawton indicated that as a member of the Executive Committee he felt somewhat uneasy about making a decision without knowing the position of the Board. He asked if the motion implied that the Executive Committee could approve a change in the transaction.

Responding in the affirmative, Regent Schilling said there would be no question about the propriety of dealing with a religious organization if just compensation were paid.

Regent Fox inquired as to whether legal counsel reviewed agendas in advance of the meetings, remarking that difficulties could be prevented if that were done.

The item in question, Regent Gerrard noted, had not been on the agenda but had come to the Committee's attention the previous day.

The question was put on Resolution 2515, and it was adopted unanimously.

Regent Heckrodt added that legal counsel should be present to advise the Board at its meetings.

Steps would be taken, President Erdman said, to address the concerns which had been expressed.

At 11:05 a.m., the following resolution, moved by Regent Beckwith and seconded by Regent Jesinski, carried on a unanimous roll call vote, with Regents Beckwith, Erdman, Finlayson, Fitzgerald, Gerrard, Heckrodt, Hendrickson, Jesinski, Knowles, Lawton and O'Harrow voting "Aye" (11) and no regents voting "No."

Resolution 2516: That the Board of Regents convene in closed session to consider personal histories, as permitted by s. 19.85 (1)(f), Wis. Stats.






