

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book Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Laird, it was VOTED, That the bequests by the late Frederic A. Ogg of the City of Madison to the Regents of the University of Wisconsin, the Department of Political Science of the University of Wisconsin, and to the Library of the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Regents of the University of Wisconsin in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Frederic A. Ogg, deceased; and that the Secretary be authorized to accept and sign receipts for the bequests in the name of the Regents of the University of Wisconsin, and

do all things necessary to effect transfer of these bequests to the University of Wisconsin.

NOTE: The bequests to the University consist of the following:

- a. The sum of \$15,000 for establishing and maintaining a graduate fellowship in Political Science to be known as the Emma Perry Ogg Fellowship in Political Science in memory of Professor Ogg's wife with preference in awarding this fellowship to be given to women candidates when their qualifications seem approximately equal to those of available men candidates.
- b. Professor Ogg's books and magazine files at both his residence and his office to the Department of Political Science of the University to the extent that the Department may find them useable.
- c. The library of the University of Wisconsin shall have an opportunity to select volumes from Professor Ogg's library after the Department of Political Science and certain individuals, who have been given preference as to making selections, have selected the items which they desire.
- d. Ten per cent of the annual income from the residue of the estate, which is to be set up as a trust, to the University to be added to existing funds employed in making student loans or granting scholarships or other financial assistance as the Regents may determine.

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Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That upon the recommendation of the Union Council all previous actions by the Regents relating to exemption from the Memorial Union portion of the general (incidental) fee for students who are life members in the Wisconsin Union or the Memorial Union Building Association and all previous actions by the Regents relating to the amount to be paid for such life membership be rescinded as of January 1, 1952; that thereafter exemption from the payment of the Memorial Union portion of the general (incidental) fee be granted only to students who have acquired life memberships in the Wisconsin Union or the Memorial Union Building Association, Inc. prior to January 1, 1952; and that students acquiring life memberships in the Memorial Union Building Association, Inc. after January 1, 1952, and within one year after leaving the University at a sum equivalent to the then current portion of the general (incidental) fee for two semesters allocated by the Regents to the operating account of the Memorial Union, be accorded the usual non-student membership privileges and uses of the Memorial Union Building.

At the request of Regent Jones, Vice President Peterson gave an explanation of the recommendation relating to life memberships in the Wisconsin Union (EXHIBIT A attached).

The Secretary reported that the meeting of the Regent-Faculty Conference Committee which had been scheduled for December 7, 1951, would be held on January 11, 1952.

President Sensenbrenner resumed the Chair.

Regent Gelatt presented the report of the Special Regent Committee on the Annual Report of the Board of Visitors. (Members of this Committee - Regent Gelatt, Chairman; Regents Kleczka, Laird.)

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Laird, it was VOTED, That the recommendations and suggestions included in the Summary on pages 18 and 19 of the Annual Report of the Board of Visitors, as attached to the minutes of the Regent meeting of June 14, 1951, be referred for further consideration by the various Regent committees as follows:

1. College Teaching - Educational Committee
2. Fire Prevention and Protection - Business and Finance Committee
3. Moving Picture of Campus and University Life - Business and Finance Committee
4. University Public Relations - Informal Conference
5. ROTC Units - Informal Conference
6. College of Agriculture - Business and Finance Committee
7. The University Athletic Department - Informal Conference
(in conjunction with item 4 above)
8. School of Journalism - Educational Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That, because the Visitors are able to devote more time at their meetings than the Regents to study of any single topic, the Regents suggest to the Visitors that during the coming year they continue to study the topics of better teaching and of student activities and problems, both at Madison and at the Extension centers.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That the members of the Board of Visitors be commended for the efforts which they have devoted to acquainting themselves with many of the problems and activities of the University; and that the Regents express their appreciation to the Visitors for the suggestions and recommendations contained in their annual report.

The question of consideration by the Regents of the recommendation of the Board of Visitors regarding college teaching was discussed. It was suggested and agreed that at subsequent meetings the Regents would meet with deans and some of the faculty members of the various colleges for the purpose of more fully informing themselves as to programs and activities of the various colleges and as to what changes would be desirable to improve the work of each college. Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was

VOTED, That consideration of the improvement of teaching for the undergraduate students, with particular reference to freshmen students, and of the student advisory system be the first topic for consideration by the Regents.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was VOTED, That the appropriate committee of this Board meet with the University administration to see what can be done to provide for more parking space at the Wisconsin General Hospital and the Union and report to the Regents at the March meeting.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was VOTED, That the meeting adjourn.

The meeting adjourned at 10:55 A.M.

STATEMENT BY REGENT JOHN D. JONES, JR. TO THE REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN ON DECEMBER 8, 1951 IN ACCEPTING FOR THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN THE PORTRAIT OF JEREMIAH PATRICK RIORDAN AS A GIFT FROM THE HOLSTEIN FRIESIAN ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA:

JEREMIAH PATRICK RIORDAN

Jeremiah Patrick Riordan was born in Washington County, Wisconsin on February 17, 1873. He died on January 20, 1936 at age 63 in St. Paul, Minnesota.

In 1890 Jerry Riordan graduated from the West Bend High School and entered the University of Wisconsin in 1894. He was awarded the degree of Bachelor of Letters in the Civic and Historical course in 1898.

Riordan received Letters in Foot Ball in the years 1895 and 1897, and was Captain of the team in the latter year. Phil King was his Coach, and some of his team mates were Pat O'Day, John Richards and Dr. Jimmy Dean. As an undergraduate student Riordan was Secretary of the Athletic Association for two years, member of the Board of Directors of that association for three years, and was student representative on the Athletic Council. In the Year Book published in 1898 he was called "The Noblest Roman Of Them All". Riordan was Secretary of his Senior class and his Senior Thesis was on the subject of "Development of Administrative and Executive Departments of Wisconsin".

In 1928 he was appointed to the University Athletic Council as an alumni representative, and served in that capacity until June, 1933. From his student days until the time of his death Jerry Riordan gave evidence of a deep, abiding and affectionate interest in the University of Wisconsin.

It was in the field of Agriculture and Livestock Husbandry that Jerry Riordan became one of the recognized and respected leaders of the industry both in Wisconsin and throughout the Nation. In 1910 he gave up his engagement as faculty member and athletic coach at the South Side High School, Milwaukee, and went to Dodge County to organize and manage "HARVEST FARMS" then owned by the Schlesinger Family in Milwaukee, who had purchased the property because of its underlying iron ore deposits. The surface, however, consisted of the characteristic rich, deep Dodge County soil, and there it was that Jerry Riordan for many years operated the land and bred Holstein cattle and Percheron horses.

During this period he served as a member of the Board of Directors of the Holstein Friesian Association of America, and the Holstein Friesian Association of Wisconsin. He served also as a member of the State Annuity and Investment Board, having been appointed to that position by Governor John J. Blaine in 1924.

When the Schlesinger holdings in Dodge County were sold to the Youngstown Sheet & Tube Company Riordan became Director of the Agricultural Bureau of the Wisconsin Manufacturers Association at Madison.

Looking back at his record it would appear that all of the numerous, varied, and much worthwhile undertakings in which Jerry Riordan engaged prepared him in unusual fashion for that which followed..

In 1933 American Agriculture had descended to the depths of its worst depression. Farm income was pitifully low. Financial distress was widespread among farmers all over the nation.

To assist indebted farmers and to place the basic industry of this nation on a reasonably sound basis, the Congress of the United States in 1933 established a broad rehabilitation program. One of the major features of this program was designed to stop foreclosure of farm mortgages, and thereby enable farm families to continue to own their homes and their land.

The Federal Farm Mortgage Corporation with a capital of Two Hundred Million Dollars was established, and its affairs were placed under the direction of the Commissioner of the Federal Land Bank System. The Federal Land Banks themselves were supplied with additional capital to enable them to join with the Federal Farm Mortgage Corporation in working out the financial problems of distressed farm operators.

In June, 1933 Jerry Riordan was appointed as Agent for the Land Bank Commissioner with the responsibility of extending financial assistance to farmers in the States of Michigan, Minnesota, North Dakota and Wisconsin.

Mr. Riordan addressed himself immediately and vigorously to the job with a rare understanding of farmers problems. As Agent of the Land Bank Commissioner, later as a Vice President of the Federal Land Bank of St. Paul, and last as General Agent of the entire Farm Credit Administration in this Northwest area, he made major contributions to the rehabilitation of thousands of farmers in this area.

All told, Mr. Riordan participated in the loaning of between two hundred and three hundred million dollars in the four states mentioned, to the benefit of debtors, and also to the very great benefit of creditors who, in many instances, because of the frozen condition of their farm loans faced disaster.

From his experience as a boy on a small Washington County Farm, and from that of his later experience in operating a relatively large Dodge County farm, it was his conviction that the so-called family type farm unit is the one which will make the greatest contribution to stability, both in the field of agriculture and as a basic part of the national economy. Many times he mentioned the benefits of farm life. He dwelt frequently on the virtues of industry, thrift, self denial and an understanding of the immutable laws of nature which comes to farm reared boys and girls.

It was with this philosophy definitely in mind that Jerry Riordan, with rare understanding and a deep faith in American farmers and their undertakings, participated in the loaning of millions of dollars in the Northwest.

Fifteen years after his death, it is interesting to note that his judgment and his faith were fully vindicated as demonstrated by the present condition of the Federal Land Bank of St. Paul and the Federal Farm Mortgage Corporation. It is interesting to note, also, that the farmers and livestock men of this state, together with extension workers, and university people generally, recognized the outstanding qualities of Jerry Riordan by providing the funds for a portrait of this subject which was presented to the Holstein Friesian Association of America in the early 1920's. This portrait has now come to the University of Wisconsin, presented by the original recipient.

Certainly the Regents of the University, the Alumni, and thousands of men and women scattered over the state will welcome this gift.

EXPLANATION OF RECOMMENDATION RELATING
TO LIFE MEMBERSHIPS IN THE WISCONSIN UNION

Under present regulations a student may obtain a life membership in the Wisconsin Union on payment of a total of \$60.00. He is then exempt from the Union portion of the incidental fee (this portion is presently \$7.50 per semester).

Under the new plan of life memberships approved by the Union Council and the Memorial Union Building Association, Inc., the above procedures for obtaining life memberships will be discontinued except for students who have acquired life memberships prior to January 1, 1952.

After January 1, 1952, students may acquire life membership status within one year after leaving the University at a sum equivalent to the Union portion of the incidental fee for two semesters, presently \$15.00, but if such students again enroll in the University they will not be exempt from the Union fee which is included in the incidental fee.

The advantages of the new plan include the following:

1. Students who have attended the Extension Centers and the University at Madison will be placed on the same basis as students who have taken all their work at Madison with regard to acquisition of life membership privileges. Heretofore Extension students have had to pay a larger sum than Madison students to complete payment of a life membership.
2. All students on campus who are eligible to use the Union will pay the semester operating fee, and the life membership privileges will be reserved to non-students who generally have less reason than students have to use the building.
3. The finances of the Memorial Union Building Association, Inc., and of the Wisconsin Union, which is a department of the University, will be completely separate -- the Association will receive only gifts, subscriptions, and life membership payments, and the University will receive all fees and receipts related to the operation and maintenance of the Union. This will avoid confusion and possible conflict of jurisdiction under state law.
4. The necessity is eliminated of changing the amount to be paid for a life membership each time the Regents approve a change in the allocation of a portion of the incidental fee to the Union.
