
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#### MEMORIAL UNION CAFETERIA REMODELING UNDERWAY

The doors are closed to the Memorial Union Lakefront Cafeteria and the work force is chipping away at the old decor, which has been on the walls, ceilings and floors for over 25 years.

When dinner was over on May 21, the glass doors were closed and they won't reopen until next fall when a fresh, new look will prevail. This is the first step in a project that will eventually include the Cafeteria serving line and food preparation area as well as the Rathskeller serving area.

The new decor will empasize the room's natural setting overlooking Lake Mendota. The prevailing feeling will be of warmth and coziness with earth tones and plenty of wood. There will be wood paneling and wainscotting as well as white oak tables.

The floor will be partially carpeted and new energy-efficient ighting will be installed. An additional cashier station will be added to the existing three so that service can be speeded up during peak periods. To cut the drafts from the door to the terrace, it will be moved to the southwest corner of the room and a vestibule will be added.

The new Cafeteria will have over 570 seats in a variety of combinations. There will be one and two-person seating so that singles or couples need not occupy a full four-person table. Low-backed booths, round tables and a raised platform will provide variety and interest to the room. The platform will provide a better view of the lake for those seated away from the windows and will also double as a mini-stage for the entertainers at special dinners.

Funds for the remodeling project are from Union operating revenues and net income from prior years. There are no state tax dollars involved in the funding plan. It is expected that the first phase of the project will cost approximately \$369,500.

# JULY 1 BRINGS INCREASE IN UNION MEMBERSHIP FEES

A Union membership remains one of the best bargains in town — even though the price for a membership will go up on July 1.

The new rate schedule, authorized by the Union Council and Union Trustees, will increase the annual membership fee from \$35 to \$40. After July 1, the non-student life membership fee, now \$160, will be \$180 if paid in four installments (three at \$40 and the fourth payment at \$60) or \$200 if purchased over five years. All annual membership payments will continue to be credited toward a life membership.

Historically, membership fees for non-students have paralleled student fees. In the past few years, however, the percentage of the student fee allocated to the Union has increased; student members paid around \$40 last year, while the non-member annual fee has remained a \$35 since 1977. This factor, coupled with the increasing costs of maintaining membership services, led to the Council and Trustee decision. The new rate schedule also calls for an increase in the special life membership fee offered to students leaving the campus; that fee will go up from \$35 to \$40.

The Union's current annual members will have the opportunity to continue their payments toward a life membership at the lower fee. Information has been sent to all annual members, allowing them to pledge future payments at the old rate; pledge cards must be returned by September 1.

## OTHER FOOD SERVICES SET TO ABSORB CAFETERIA CUSTOMERS

While the Lakefront Cafeteria is being spruced up in its first redo since 1957, other Memorial Union food units will be providing more food choices during expanded service hours.

Tripp Commons on the second floor of the Memorial Union, will serve dinner four days a week as well as its traditional lunch. The lunch will include the popular Tripp salad bar as well as the full line of hot cafeteria items. A Sunday brunch will also be featured in Tripp. The service hours will be: Monday through Friday, 11 a.m. - 1:30 p.m.; Monday through Thursday, 5 - 6:15 p.m.; Sunday, 11:30 a.m. - 1 p.m.

The Rathskeller will open earlier and offer a wider variety of breakfast items and a fast service breakfast counter. Summer hours will be: Monday through Friday, 7 a.m. - 9:30 p.m.; Saturday, 8 a.m. - 9:30 p.m.; Sunday, 9 a.m. - 9:30 p.m.

The Deli will also help out breakfast seekers. Between 8 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. the Deli will offer Continental breakfast items. More tables and chairs will be available in the Commons lobby for those using this service. The summer Deli hours will be: Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 10:30 p.m.; Saturday and Sunday, noon - 10:30 p.m.

The Stiftskeller will offer beverage service from 11 a.m. until closing Monday through Saturday and noon to closing on Sunday. The Terrace Brat Stand will expand its hours and service during the Cafeteria remodeling as needed.

## THEATER'S 44TH SEASON EXPLORES A WORLD OF PERFORMING ARTISTRY

With programs ranging from the exotic Festival of the Nile to the toe-tapping rhythms of Mississippi riverboat days, the Union Theater's 1982-83 season will offer a diverse sampler of performing artistry. Five series of music, dance, drama and film events will be complemented by a number of special attractions as the Theater celebrates its 44th season.

The Theater's Great Performance Series will open with the colorful Egyptian festival as an acclaimed 40-member folk troupe makes its first American tour. The series will continue with Britain's contemporary Ballet Rambert, also on its first U.S. visit. The New York City Opera National Company will return to the Theater to present Bizet's "Carmen" and, to conclude the Great Performance Series, the sound of another era in the Riverboat Ragtime Revue. Theater-Dance 82-83 will come on stage with the Ballet Rambert. The series brings a return visit from the popular Acting Company, whose members will turn their considerable talents to Moliere's "Tartuffe," while the New Vic Theatre of London promises a lively evening of bawdy stories in Chaucer's "Canterbury Tales." Celebrating the pure poetry of movement, the elegant Erick Hawkins Dance Company will close the series.

The Concert Series, marking its 63rd birthday, once again celebrates the musical virtuosity of renowned solo and ensemble performers. The **Red Concert Series** will open with award-winning pianist Andre-Michel Schub. Other series artists will be Narciso Yepes, guitarist; Calliope, a Renaissance Band; The Tokyo String Quartet; and the New York Chamber Soloists in a performance of the six Brandenburg Concertos. The 1982-83 **White Series** brings a return engagement of four concerts by the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra. Joining the orchestra and conductor/violinist Pinchas Zukerman will be special guests, conductor Alexander Schneider and soprano Jessye Norman.

The Theater's globe-trotting balloon will also be up and away this season with visits to San Francisco, Ireland, Quebec, Labrador, India and Spain slated on the 1982-83 Travel Adventure Film Series itinerary.

Season subscribers to the Red or White Concert Series or to the Great Performance Series or Theater-Dance 82-83 are also eligible to purchase advance tickets for two special attractions, a concert by the distinguished Dresden State Orchestra and "The Villains Still Pursue Me," a discourse on evil and evildoers by actor Vincent Price. #### PARKING TO BE REVAMPED

Parking lot number one to the east of the Memorial Union will be closed for refurbishing in June. In the next couple years the area between the Union Lakefront Cafeteria and the lake will become an expanded terrace adding to the total look.

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## STUDENTS AND FORMER STAFF MEMBER HONORED

Twelve UW-Madison students and a former Union staff member recently received awards from the Wisconsin Union.

Ralph Sandler, Madison Civic Center director, was one of the recipients of the Porter Butts Creative Arts Award. Sandler was Union Theater program director before moving to the Civic Center in January.

A second Porter Butts award was given to Hollis Wormsby, student chair of the Wisconsin Union Directorate Cross Cultures committee, who brought a variety of arts programs to campus in 1981-82 and who is himself a poet.

The Porter Butts Awards are made annually to students or staff members who have contributed to the creative arts programs of the Wisconsin Union. The award was established by the trustees of the Memorial Union Building Association (MUBA) with money contributed by friends and former associates of Butts upon his retirement as Union Director in 1968.

P. Qaadir Islam, student from New York, received the Henry B. Herman Award. He served on both the Art and Cross Cultures areas of the Directorate and chaired the Prison Art Show at Union South during African-American History Month. The Herman award was established by his family and friends as a memorial to the former Program and Associate director of the Wisconsin Union.

Ten student volunteers of the Wisconsin Union Directorate were given special awards by the Memorial Union Building Association.
