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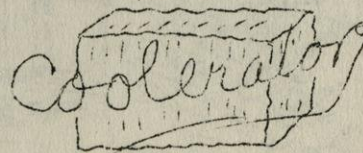

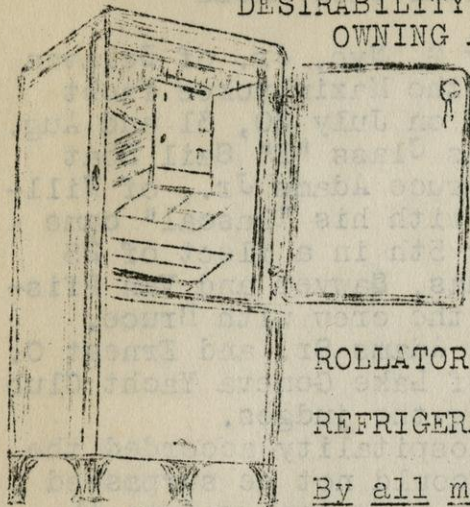

The fall, winter and spring sessions are conducted in a beautiful building in the heart of Minneapolis, Portland Avenue at 17th St. The buildings and grounds represent an investment of \$260,000, of which \$163,000 have been paid by free-will donations.

No tuition fees are charged and all other charges are on a cost basis. The Institute's financing method consists of telling its friends in a general way of its needs and asking God in prayer to move the friends to give.

This year three summer sessions are being held. One, just closed, was held at Lake Geneva, Alexandria, Minn., with an enrollment of over 600. The Cisco Beach sessions will continue for three weeks, and beginning August 10 a two weeks session will be held at Lake Independence, Maple Plain, Minnesota.

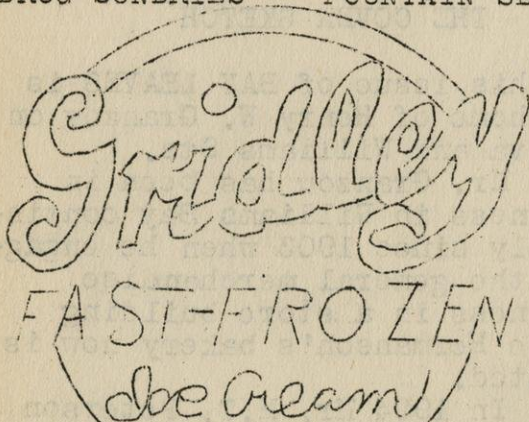

HAY FEVER

Hay fever was first discovered in this country by an Englishman, Dr. Blakeley, a country physician practicing in New Hampshire. Before that time it was called nasal catarrh, in 1873.

With the aid of the microscope, a new instrument at that time, he discovered that the disease came from the pollen of weeds, which was carried by winds and insects for many miles, as many as fifty.

There are two kinds of hay fever, summer and Autumnal. Some people are effected by a very few grains of the pollen from the weeds while others it takes many grains to effect them.

In some victims the eyelids are swollen and the eyes are running water, while in others the eyes may not be effected at all, but the victim suffers much with violent sneezing and coughing and cannot breathe well.

During a good growing season like the present hayfever will be severe because the pollen in the weeds is very prevalent, but if we should get a drouth later in the summer, the disease would abate much. The disease may be forestalled by a change of climate; otherwise it is liable to recur with increasing violence each year and to terminate in asthma. It has been discovered that the pollen from weeds has been found as high as five miles in the air by experimenters riding in airplanes.

Lotus beds in Grass Lake, not far across the state line are now attracting many visitors, as the flowers are in full bloom and cover thousands of acres. The best time to see the blooms is in the morning hours as they close their petals during the heat of the day. Some of the flowers at maturity are 12 inches across.
