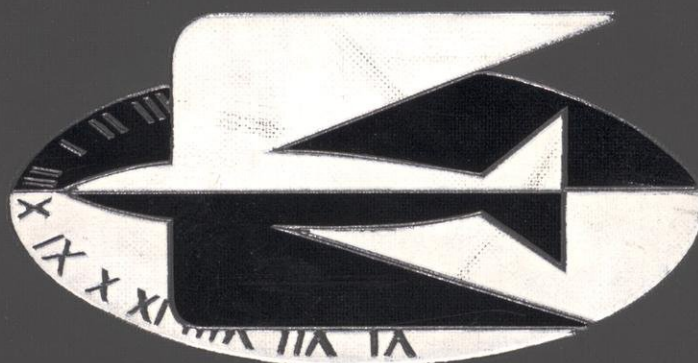

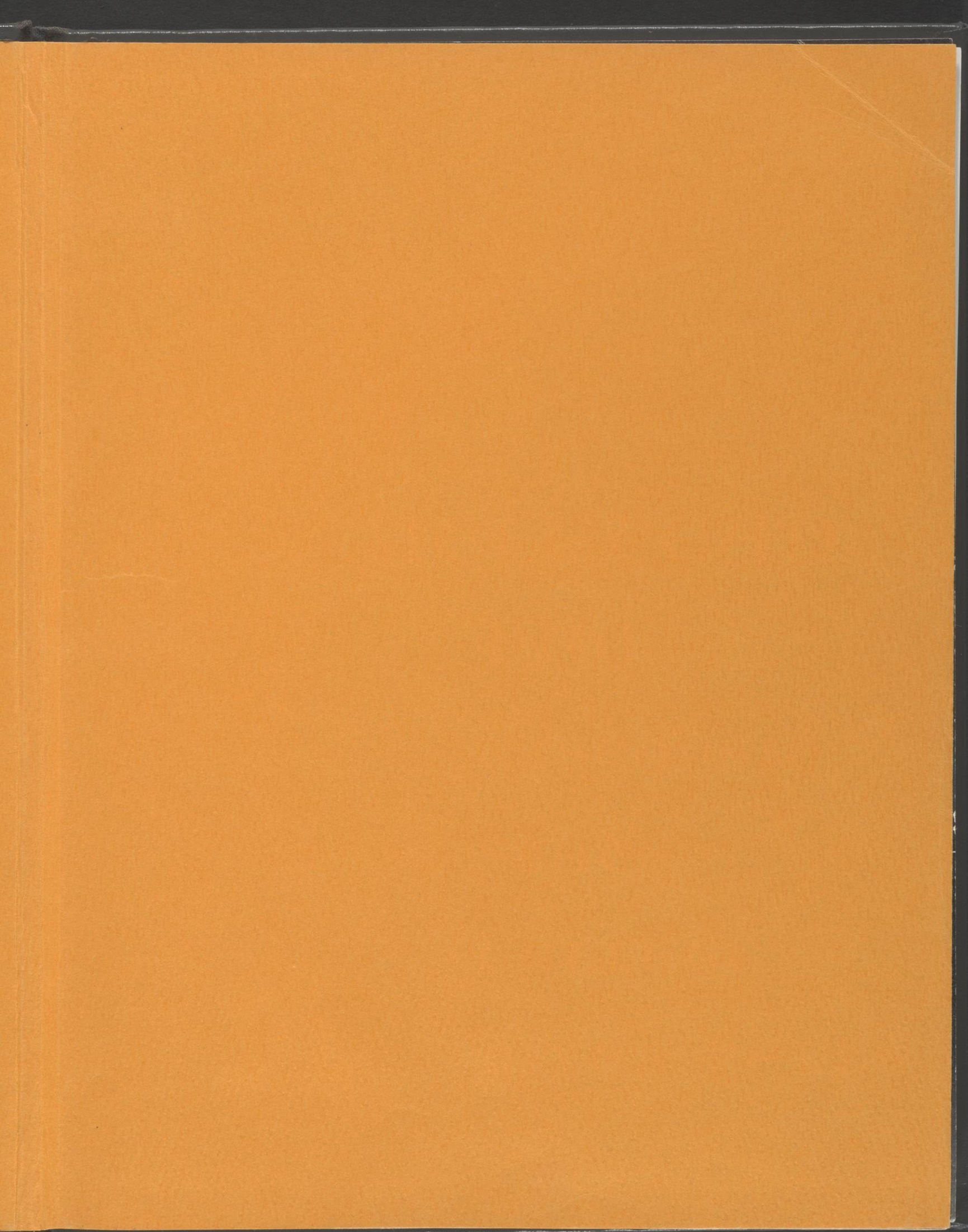

A year of building, rebuilding and progress . . .

As great strides were taken in the world of science with the first launching of a man into space by the United States, the College at River Falls contributed its share to the advancement of future generations by insuring individuals — interested, seeking — ready to become part of society.

The College expanded physically by dedicating the new laboratory farm buildings, R. A. Karges Physical Education and Recreation Center, Prucha Residence Hall for Men and the H. T. Hagestad Student Center. The art, music, science and foreign language departments added to their facilities.

Courses were innovated to stimulate inquisitive minds.

Graduates left with a feeling of accomplishment, mixed with awe and anxiety about going into the outside competitive world, but there was a good basis for beginning . . . learning had been opened to them.

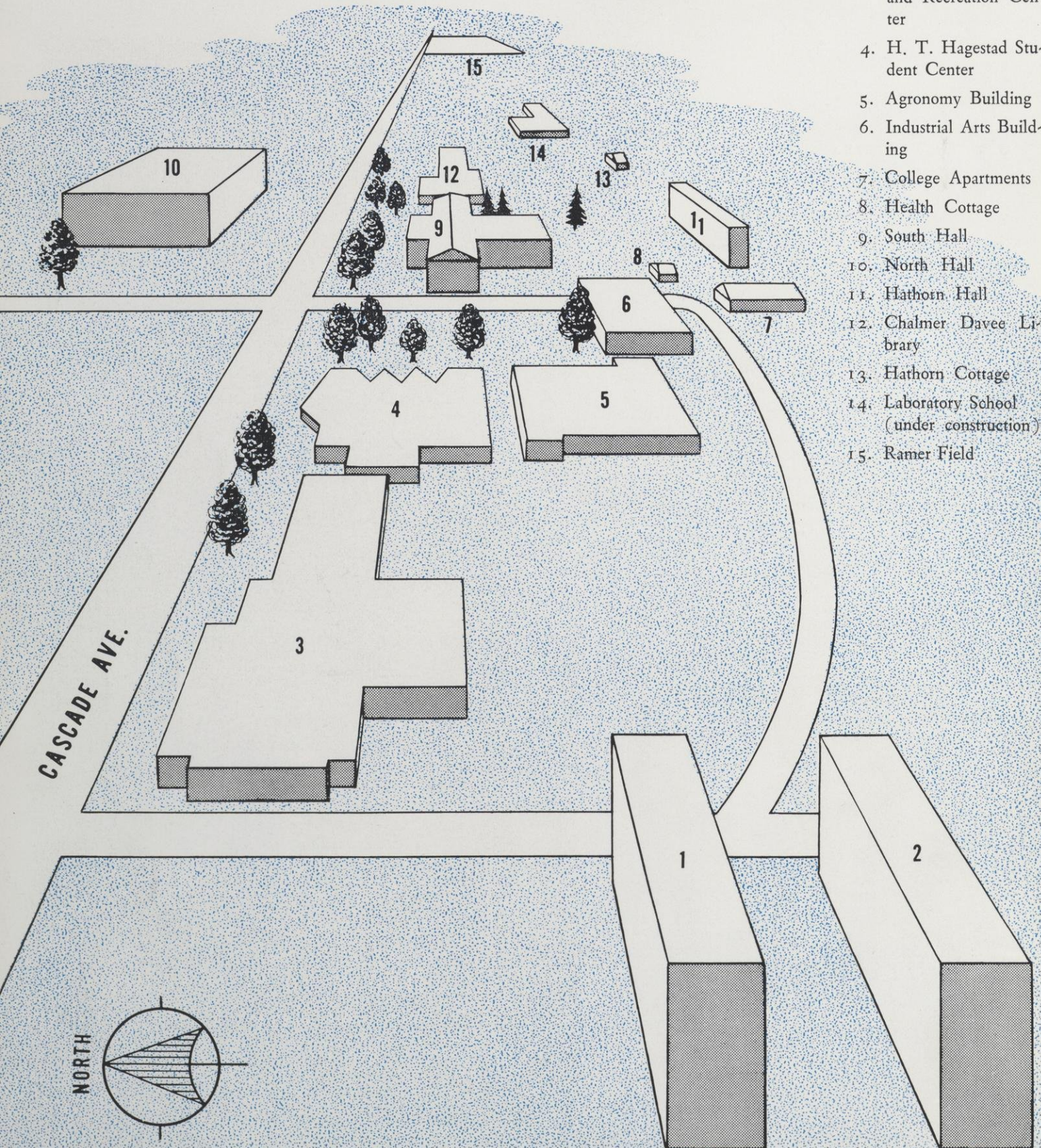

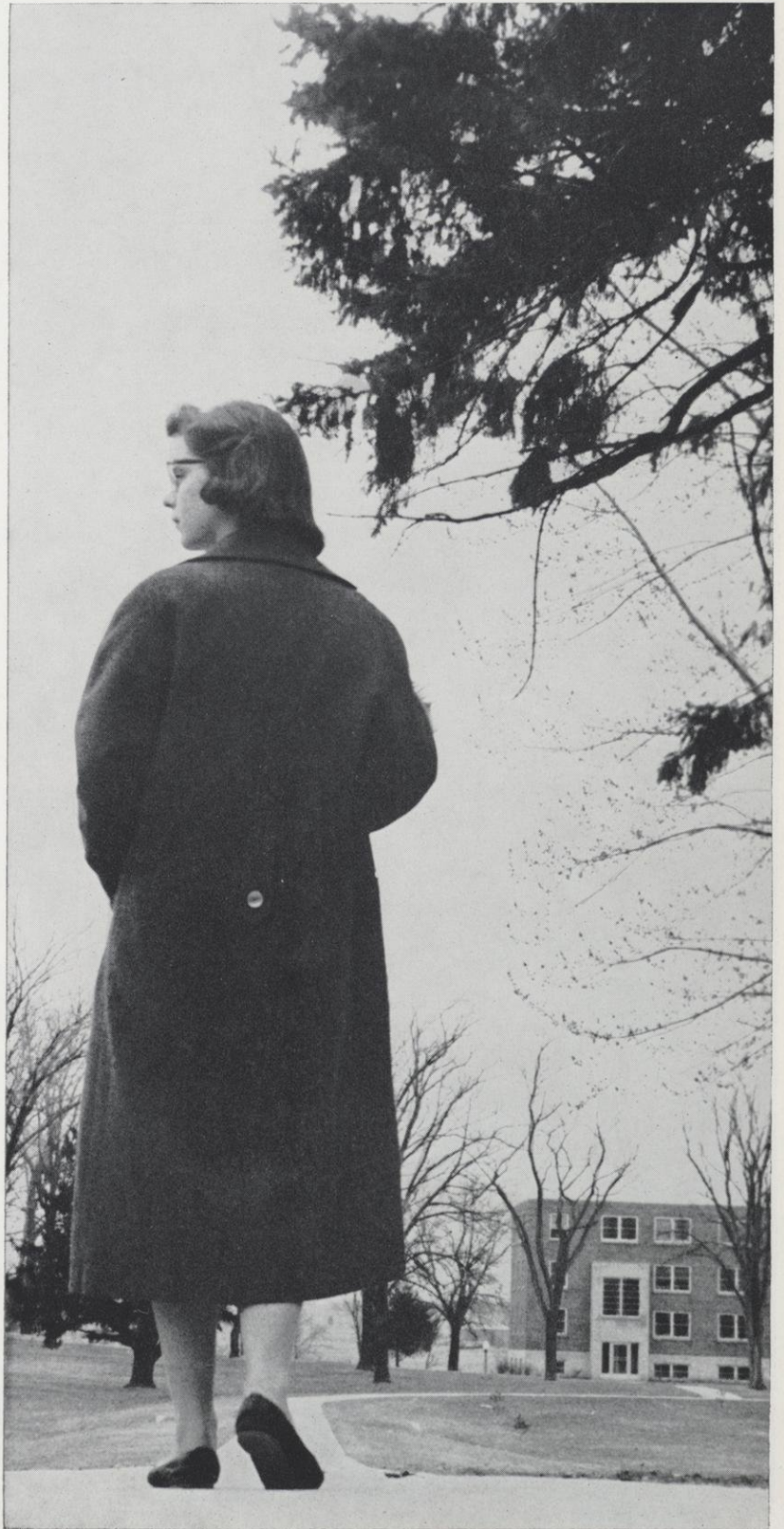
A College

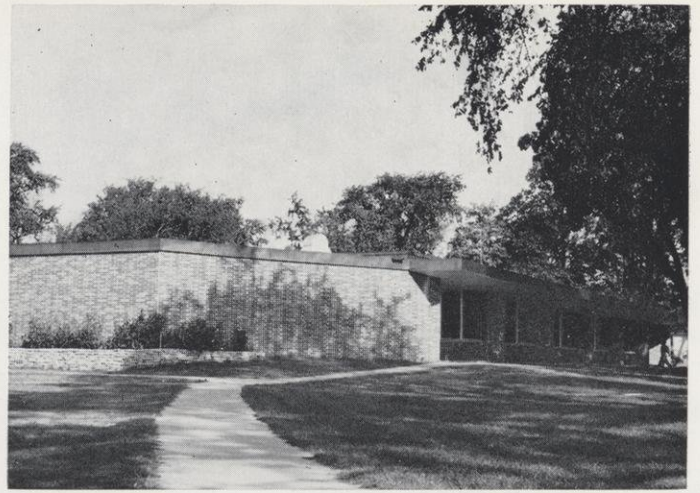
Whatever a college is, there are, according to one survey, more than 1800 such institutions in this country.

Hagestad Student Center

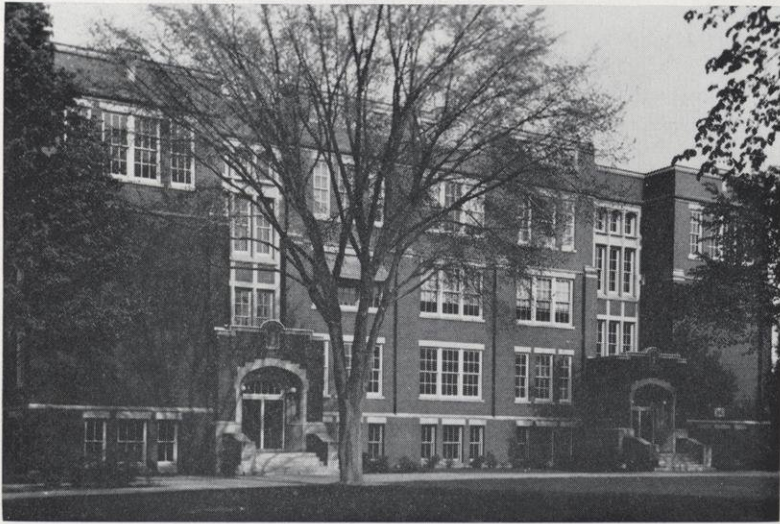
Juliet may have asked, "What's in a name?," but then, she wasn't thinking of our Student Center. For us it's a center in many ways.

Here, this year, we found time and facilities for many things: strong coffee and good talk — and sometimes the other way around — time to read the books bought in the campus bookstore, and more talk: nuclear physics, Winter Carnival, Shakespeare, Time-Space, student elections, spring proms.

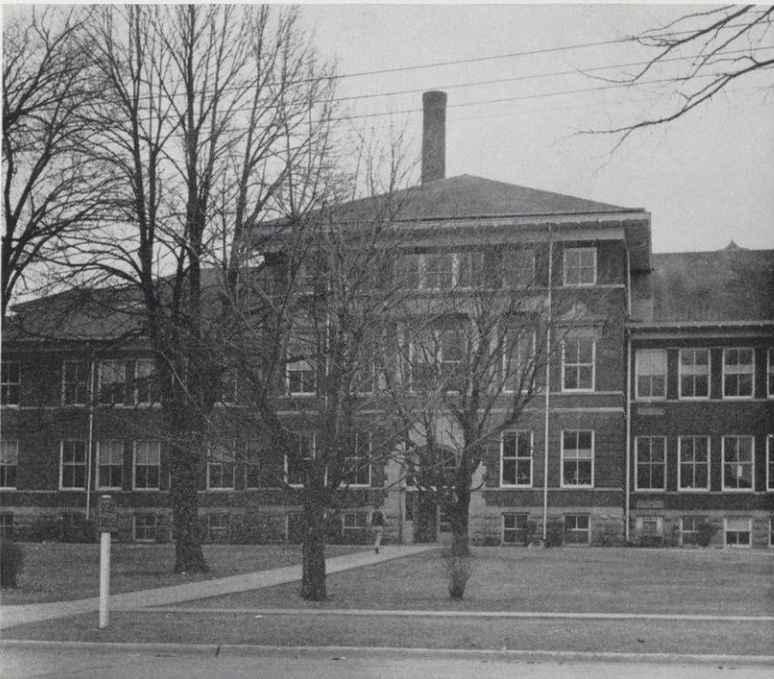

North Hall

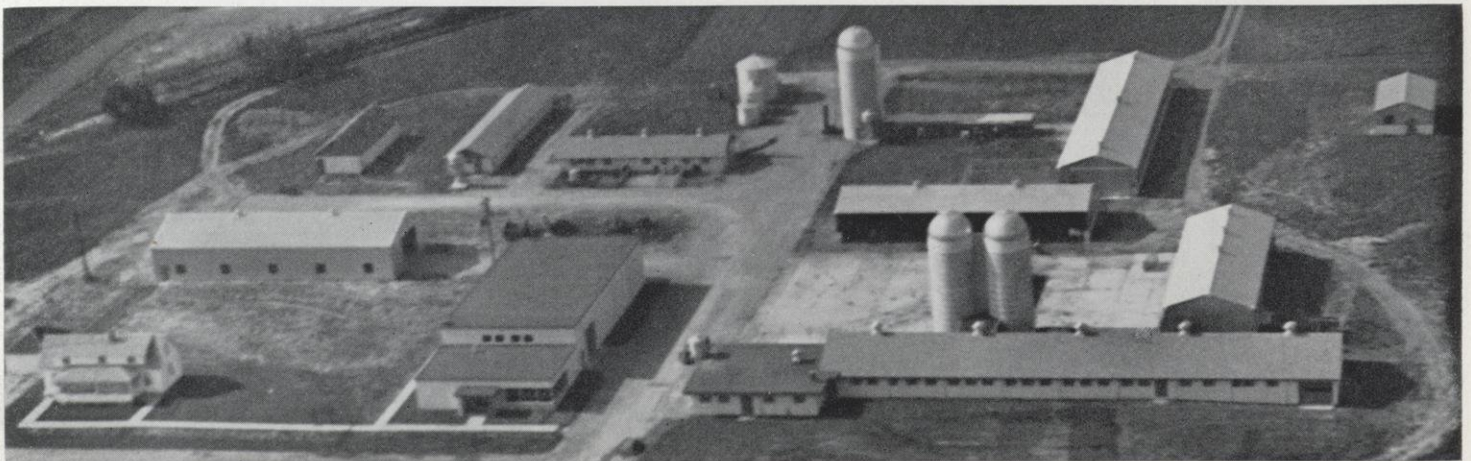

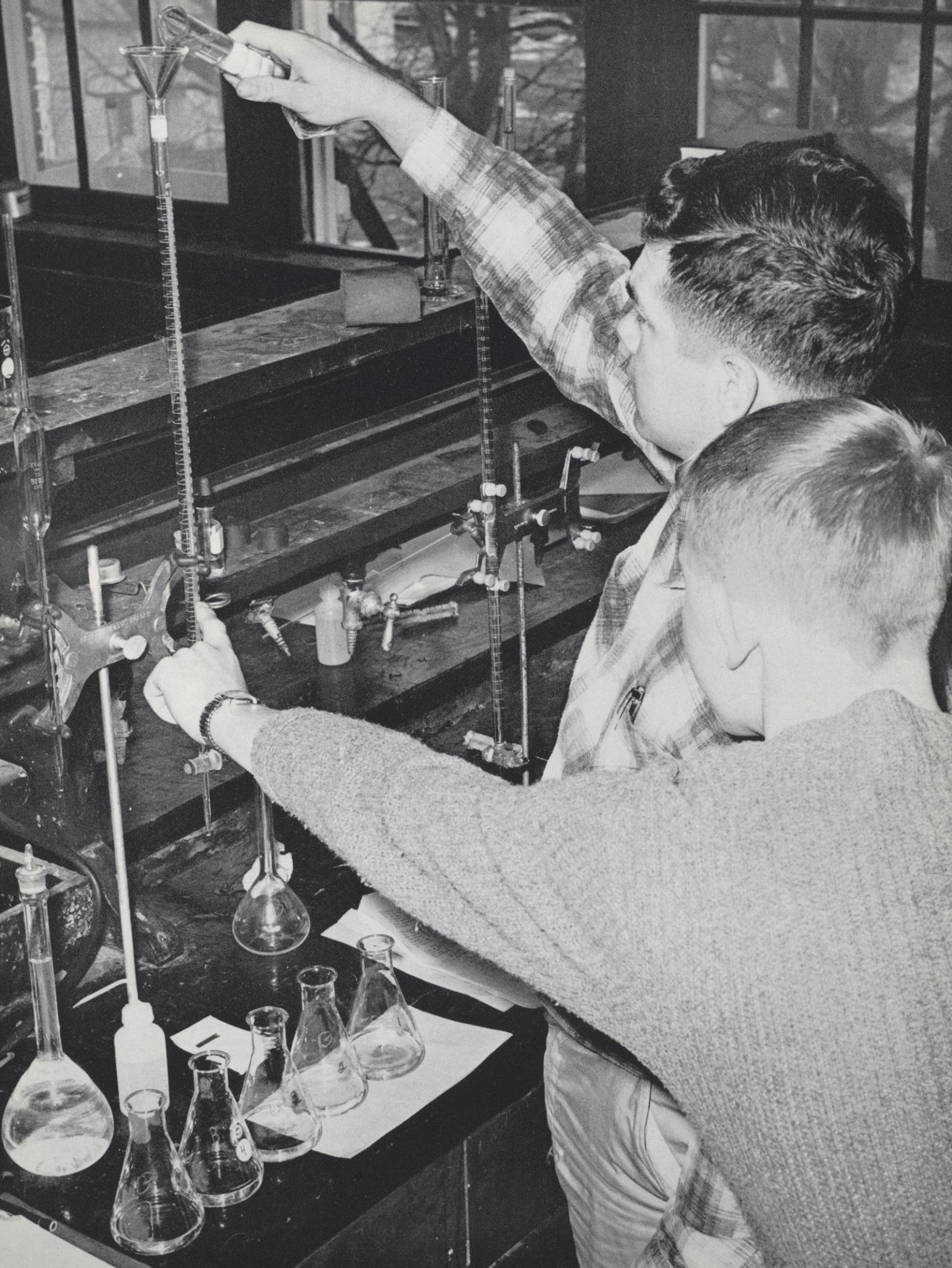
Classrooms & Laboratories

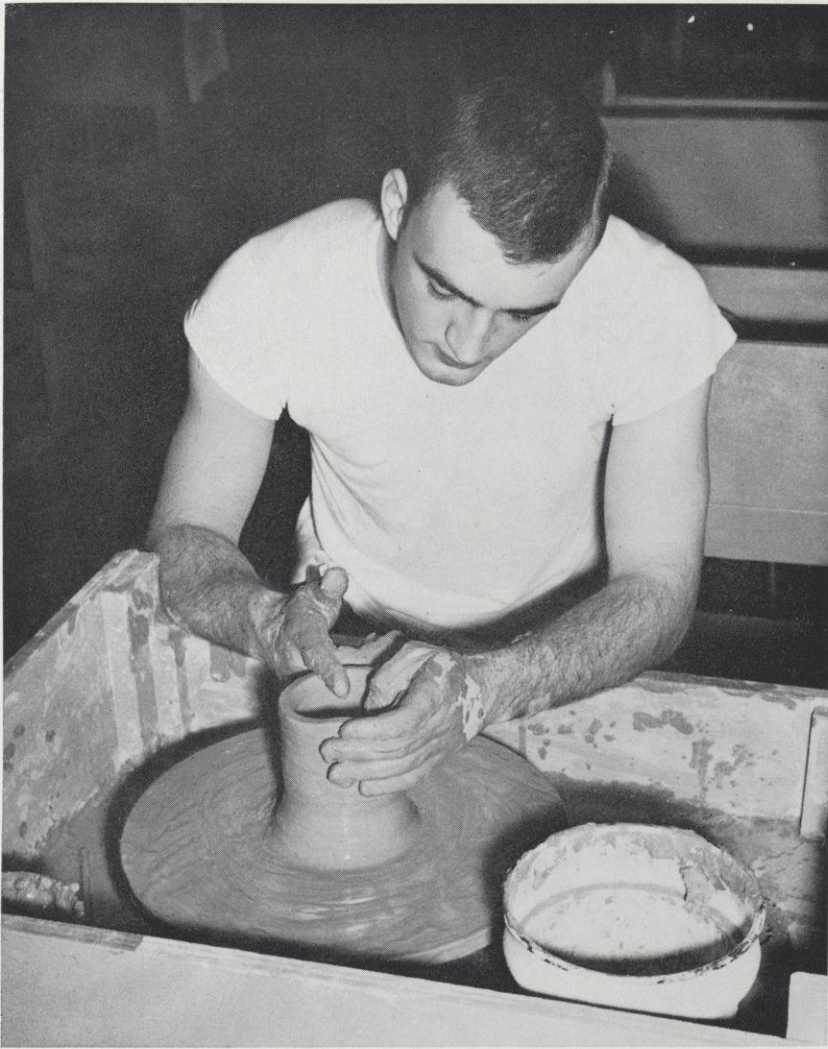
Across the campus, past the flower beds, and over the lawn are some of the classroom buildings. These are the heart of the campus, for despite "learning machines" and other mechanical aids to imparting knowledge, students continue to gain the greater portion of their formal education in the traditional way — from professors talking with students, sharing interests, information, and concepts and demonstrating that ideas can be exciting.

Of course the term "classrooms" means laboratories, too. Besides those in physics, chemistry, biology and the other sciences, there are the agriculture labs, the industrial arts workshops and a soon-to-be-completed language laboratory .



College Laboratory Farm

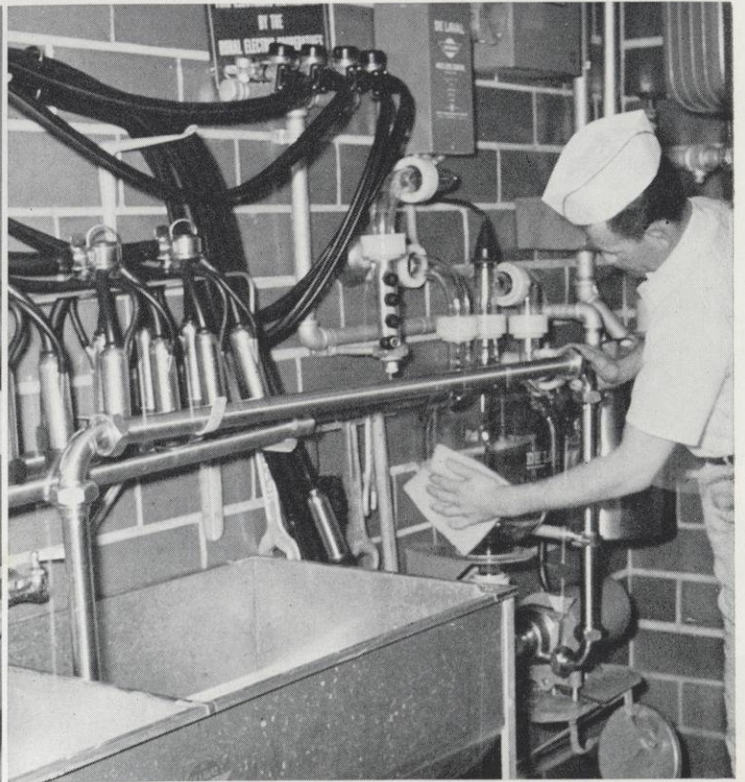




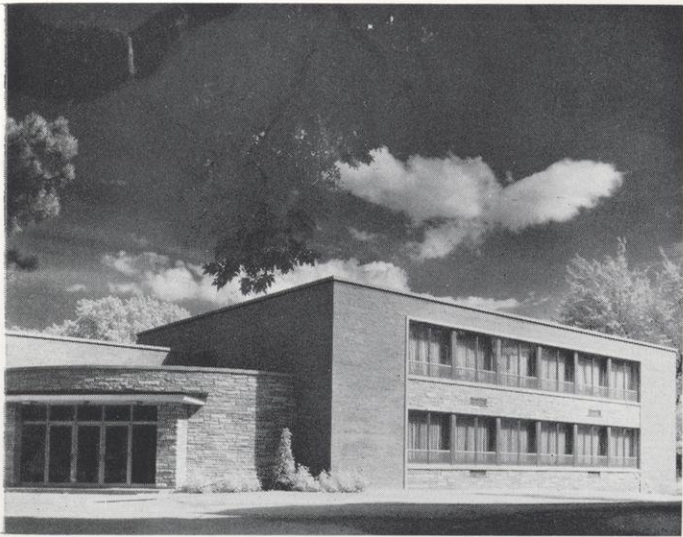
Room to Experiment

Anything academic from modern ballet to modern mathematics has a place on the college campus. There's plenty of stimulation and challenge in the wide variety of subjects at River Falls.

The college library, when you come to think about it, also has many “convertible” features. Other than books—our library still uses them — there are other sorts of records available here.

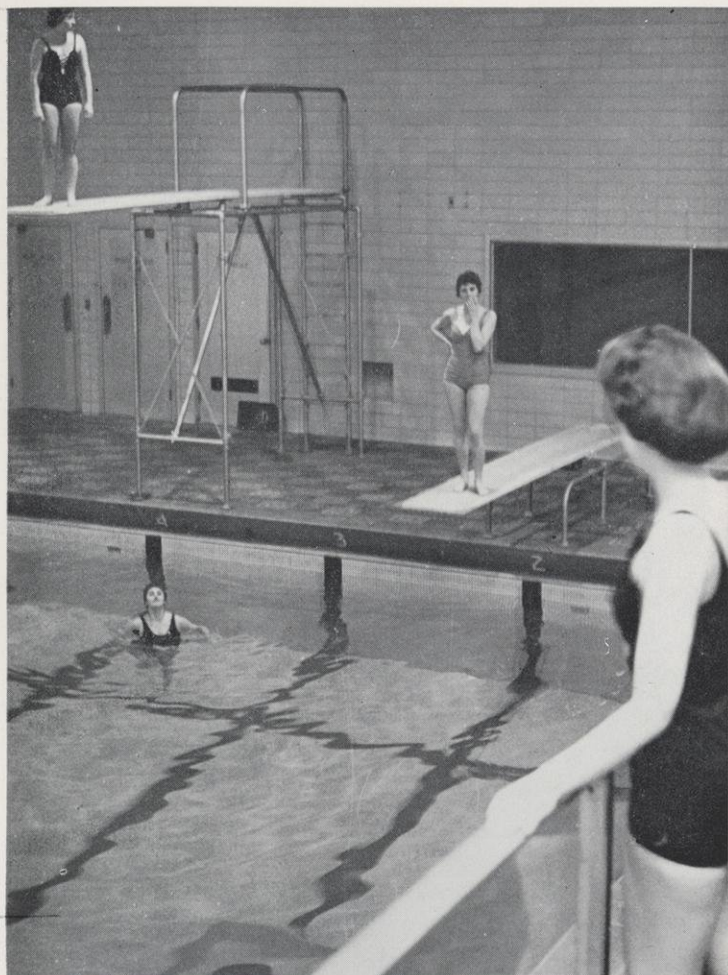
One mustn't forget our Twentieth Century method of storing information and experience: the phonograph record, the motion picture film, and the microfilm. The record library is an admirable one. For “living” records, there's the Little Theatre on the lower floor of this building. The drama department produces its plays here and the works come from all periods and areas of the world.



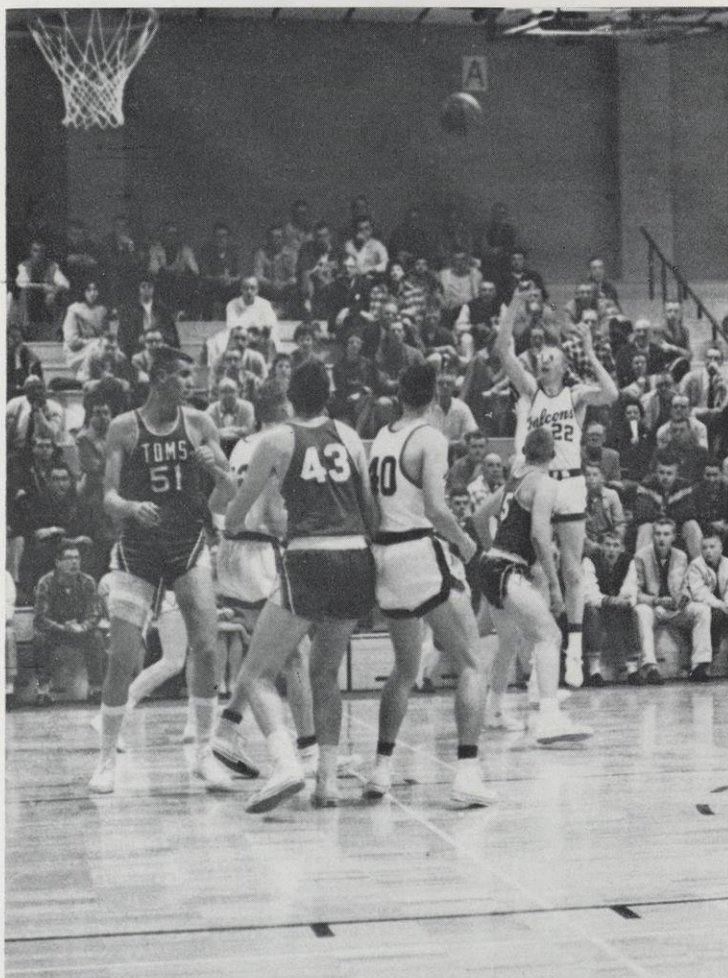

'Feed the Falcon'

With most of the building program on campus completed, the Student Foundation Committee devoted itself this year to putting on the finishing touches.

The Foundation goal was to "Feed the Falcon Fund" to "Bring B.B. to R.F." "B.B." of course, is the Bronze Bird, the name adopted by students and faculty for the proposed sculpture of a Falcon to be done by John Rood, internationally known sculptor, and placed on the north exterior of Karges Center.

Highlight of the Foundation Committee's drive was the fall auction in the Student Center. When auctioneers Ed Schlumpf and Pat O'Connell sold the last live chicken and after the last of the "gambling booths" had been closed, the final tally showed a Foundation Week (November 7-12) profit of \$319.03. A \$309 check from the junior class and proceeds from the A.W.S. Valentine Formal, approximately \$150, added to the fund.

In addition, dances, a "Pennies for Freddy" jar in the cafeteria, the College Bowl, and the Faculty Frolics, which netted an amazing \$826.01, brought the yearly total to more than \$1700 and the Bronze Bird winging closer to River Falls.

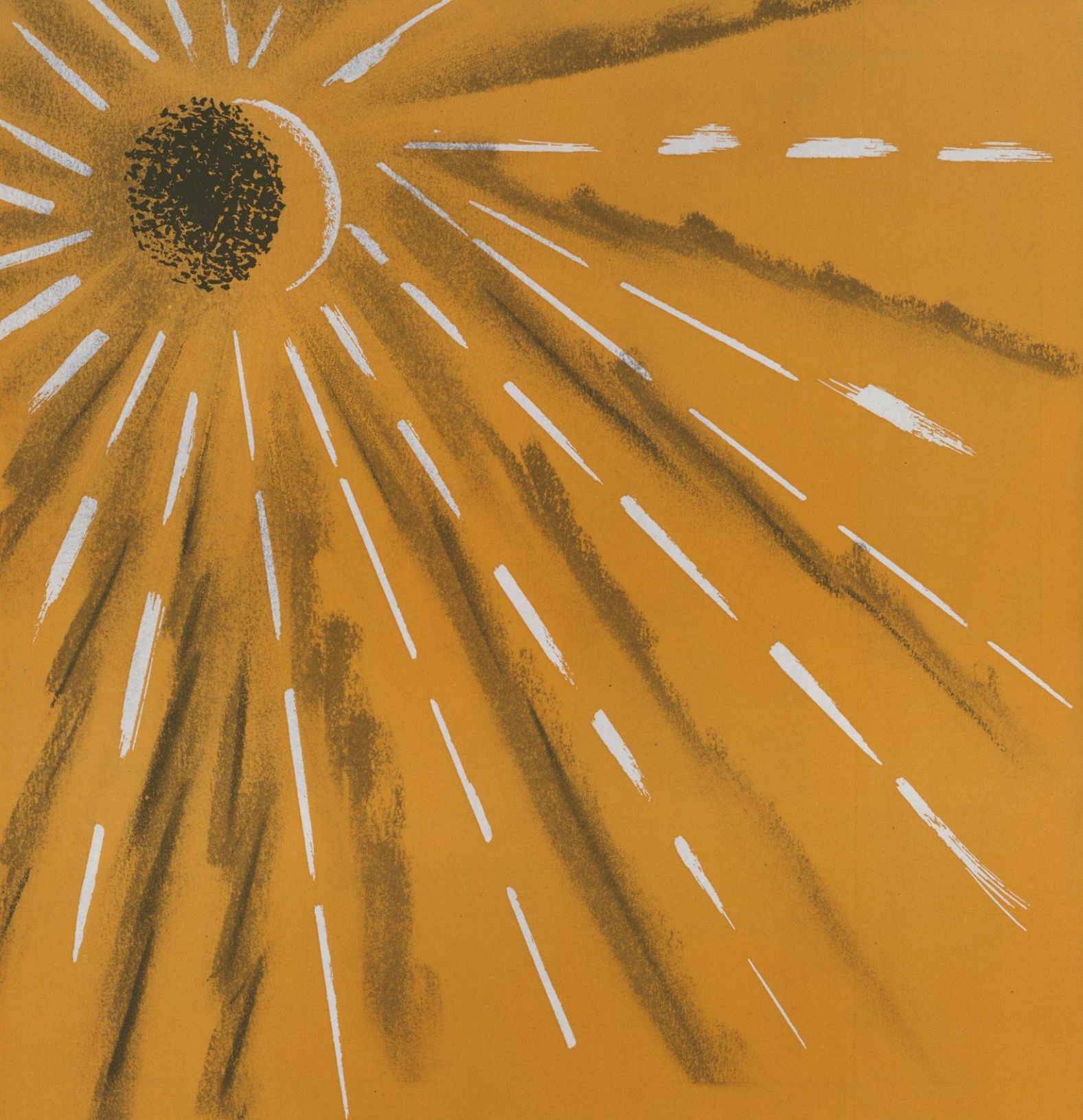

It is the aim of the Student Senate to promote the best interests of the college, and to develop a spirit of cooperation and good fellowship through the school. The Senate then acts as a liaison body between the students and the administration.

The Student Senate consists of eleven members, four of whom are class presidents. The other members are elected annually from the student body at large. This group meets weekly on Monday nights, and all interested students and faculty members may attend.

This year, the Senate reorganized student organizations into divisions of academic professional, academic interest, academic recognition, religious, social, and social interest. This was due to the fact that so many groups had overlapping functions and activities. A point system was developed and instituted in an effort to stimulate greater competition among the larger organizations for major social events on campus. Under this system, the organization compiling the largest number of points at the end of the year is presented with a trophy for this outstanding achievement.

Student Center Governing Board

Students and faculty members work together to determine policies for the operation of the Hagestad Student Center at the Student Center Governing Board meetings.

Three student members, who may be re-appointed following years, are selected by the Student Senate. The chairman of the group must have served on the Board one year previously. Also on the Board are the vice-president of the Student Senate, and the chairmen of the Student Center Activities, Public Relations, and Social Committees.

The faculty representatives, Nancy Knaak, B. J. Rozehnal, Richard Reynolds, Robert Brock, and Earl Lewis, have no voting privileges in Board affairs.

The group works closely with the Student Center committees listed above and the Student Senate.

Prologue

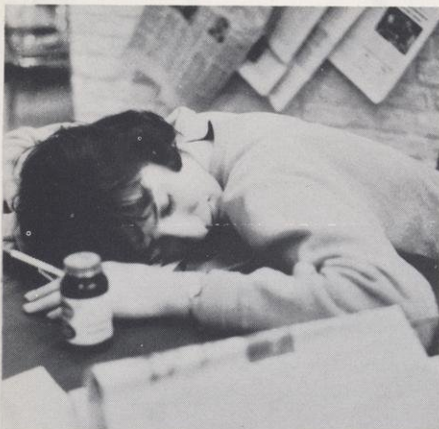

FOR THE SECOND CONSECUTIVE YEAR, Falcon football took on a dismal appearance in the won-lost column. Finishing the conference schedule with a single win, four losses, and a tie, they shared the WSCC cellar with Superior and Platteville.

The inability to come up with scoring plays hurt the gridders as they garnered more total yardage than the opponents and also topped the first downs column.

The unexplainable injury jinx hit the Falcons for the second year as seven regulars suffered crippling disabilities. Indications of the season's future appeared early as Augsburg won the opener 19-7. Facing a supposedly weak Northland squad next, the Falcons needed a 31-yard fourth quarter touchdown by Larry Lloyd to win 7-0.

In their conference opener before a rain-soaked crowd they battled Superior to a 13-13 tie. In a 20-7 defeat by Eau Claire, Head Coach Fran Polsfoot lost the services of veteran guard Tom Sackett.

The most costly defeat was a 13-7 Homecoming loss to Oshkosh as three regulars (Tom Overman, Gary Wagenbach, and Mick Lauber) sustained injuries.

Sour and sweet Saturdays followed each other, for after suffering a humiliating 26-0 defeat at the hands of LaCrosse, they bounced back to knock off title-conscious Stout, 13-6.

Closing out their season the football squad dropped games to Stevens Point 35-25 and to Mankato 27-21 for a 2-6-1 overall record.

Gaining all-conference honors for the Falcons was sophomore end Duane Tollefson. Mick Lauber, closing out one of River Falls' finest careers, was drafted by the Detroit Lions of the National Football League.

RIVER FALLS BASKETBALL remained at a low level this year as the 1960-61 squad could only find the winning combination four times in 20 games. Three of these wins were against non-conference foes, Bethel and Winona, and the sole WSCC victory was at the chagrin of Stout in the season's final appearance and snapped an 11 game losing skein.

Falcon cage fans were optimistic as the season opened with the teams' high scorer, Charley Johnson, returning and flanked by a duo of big men, Toby Garey and Gary Scharfenberg. Returning to patrol the backcourt were veterans John Lauber and Don Koepnick.

Donning the Red and White colors for the final year were Mick Collins and Darrell Hart.





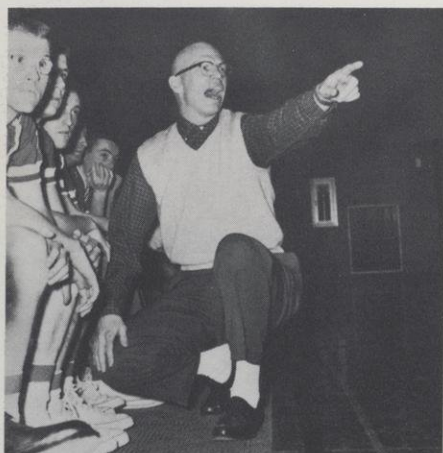

In Chess competition Earl Burton and Roger Karras were the top two winners.

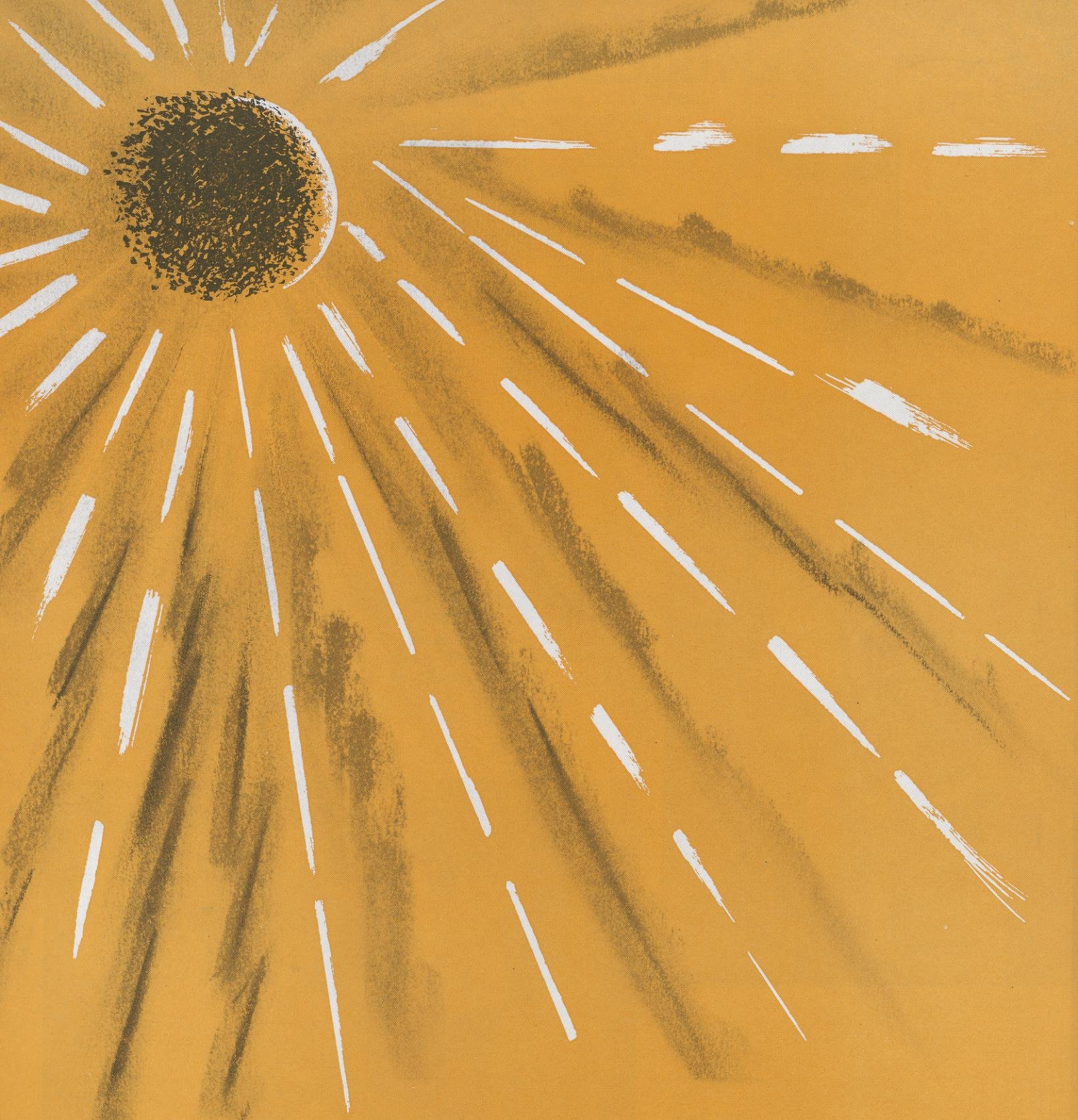
