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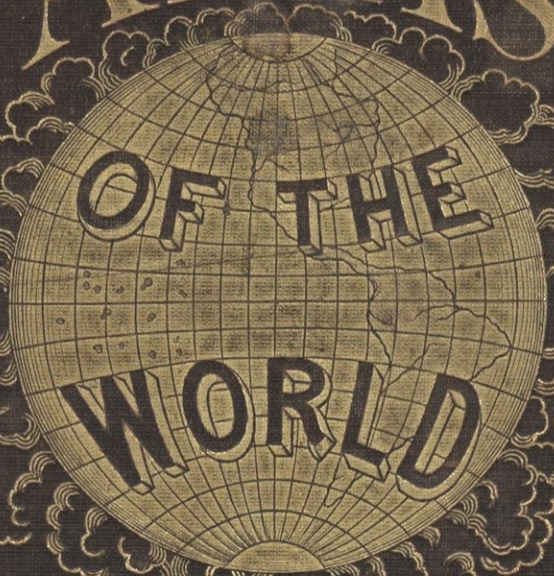

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# HISTORY OF GREEN LAKE COUNTY.

## INTRODUCTION.

In presenting these few sketches of the early settlement of Green Lake County to the public, we do not pretend to offer any thing elaborate or extended. We have advertised to give only a short description and historical sketch of the county and towns, and in doing so, we must necessarily omit much that ought to be mentioned. We find in collecting data for such a work, that the memory of the "oldest inhabitant" is not always reliable; often dates and facts gleaned from one, will be contradicted by another. Under these circumstances, if we are sometimes wrong it need not be wondered at. After having made a careful investigation by personal interviews with the oldest settlers, whom we must say have met us cordially and obligingly, have given us the best information they could. We have given that which we thought was truth, and omitted much that was doubtful.

PUBLISHERS.

Green Lake County is situated between the 43rd and 44th degrees of north latitude. It is bounded on the north by Washara County, on the east by Winnebago and Fond du lac Counties, on the south by Columbia and on the west by Marquette County. Formerly it was a part of Marquette County, and was attached to Brown County for judicial purposes. Marquette County was established in 1836, and detached from Brown and fully organized in 1848, and a county seat established at Marquette. Governor Dewey appointed Enos Moe, Clerk of the Court, and John B. Winchell, Sheriff. The county officers elected in the Fall of 1848 were, Josiah Luce, Sheriff; F. B. Hawes, Clerk of the Court; Paul D. Hayward, Register of Deeds; Daniel R. Shailer, Clerk of the Board of Supervisors. They entered upon the duties of their respective offices Jan'y 1, 1849. In 1853, by a vote of the people the county seat was removed to Dartford, and the county officers brought the records and established themselves there. In November of the same year the board of supervisors forcibly and without authority of law, seized the records and removed them back to Marquette. For some reason the people submitted to this high handed affair, and the county seat remained at Marquette until 1858. At this time Green Lake County was formed by detaching the eastern portion of Marquette County, comprising the Towns of Berlin, Brooklyn, Green Lake, Mackford, Manchester, Princeton, Marquette, Dayton, Kingston, St. Marie and Seneca. Dayton has since been divided and attached to adjoining towns. The county seat of the new county was established at the City of Berlin. In the Fall of 1862, by a vote of the people it was removed to Dartford, where it rested in peace until 1866, when on agitating the vexed subject again, a vote was taken on removing it to Princeton, and a majority of the board of canvassers decided in favor of Dartford. A minority reported however in favor of Princeton, and their decision was supported by the opinion of the attorney general of the state. The citizens of Princeton forcibly took possession of the records and at a very early hour of the morning removed them to Princeton. An appeal was then made by the people of the eastern part of the county to the Supreme Court of the State, and on a ruling in their favor, the county seat was once more removed to Dartford, where it now remains. This migratory county seat seems to have settled at last, although many attempts have been made to dislodge it. One plan was to get the west tier of towns set off from Fond du lac County, and attached to Green Lake, and make Ripon the county seat. The jealousy of Fond du lac and Berlin has prevented that programme from being carried out, and thus little Dartford is left in peaceable possession.

The general face of this county is undulating. A fine stretch of prairie extends along the eastern part. This prairie is one of the richest of the state. The farmers have fine houses and barns, rich fields and well-filled granaries. They use the most improved machinery, and keep fine horses and stock. In fact they are rich and independent. The central and western parts of the county are principally oak openings and meadow lands with large tracts of marsh bordering the lakes and streams. Prominent features of this county, are Big and Little Green Lakes, as they are called. The former is a remarkably fine sheet of water of a greenish color. The lake takes its name from the color of its water, and the county its name after the lake.

This lake is about ten miles in length and has an average width of two miles. The water is very clear and generally deep. The shores are high and wooded, and are irregular, being indented by fine bays. It is only within a few years that this gem of a lake has attracted the attention of pleasure seekers.

About six years ago David Greenway opened the Oakwood House on the northeastern shore. He succeeded in getting a few guests from Chicago, St. Louis, and the South. The fame of Green Lake spread so rapidly that he was obliged to enlarge and improve his place in order to accommodate the many that sought a refuge from the heat and

dust of cities, in the cool shades on the shores of the lake. This year (1875) he had an average of one hundred and fifty guests.

"Sherwood Forest," kept by J. C. Sherwood is situated on the western shore about a mile from Dartford. This is a popular summer resort, capable of accommodating about one hundred and fifty guests. The forest from which it takes its name is one of the most magnificent parks in the world. Situated on high ground sloping to the lake, its massive oaks and green sward, and splendid views of the lake make it one of the most attractive of the many fine places on the lake.

"Spring Grove House" on the south side of the lake, kept by George Cullings, is a delightfully situated pleasure resort, and is capable of accommodating a large number of guests.

The Glen, situated to the south and east, is an attractive spot. It is a second Yosemite Valley on a small scale, and is a favorite picnic ground.

"Cottage Home" is the name of a new place of resort, to the north of "Sherwood Forest," kept by E. K. Bushee. The grounds are really a continuation of "Sherwood Forest," with the same class of trees and green sward.

"Pleasant Point," situated to the east of Oakwood, is a new place just opened. The grounds are pleasantly located, and have long been a favorite resort of picnic parties.

Green Lake constitutes the prominent feature of this county. It is unrivalled in beauty of scenery, fine fishing and hunting, and is now attracting attention as one of the finest Summer resorts in the West. A small steam yacht built this Summer (1875), by William M. Lockwood, makes trips around the lake to accommodate excursionists and pleasure seekers. The several watering places are provided with fleets of sail and row boats, and when filled by their merry crews, these boats, as they flit across the green waters of the lake, add a charm to scenes of unsurpassed loveliness.

Little Green Lake is situated in the southern part of the Town of Green Lake, and has the same distinctive characteristics as its larger namesake. It is about a mile and a quarter in length, and a mile wide. Lake Puckaway, in the western part of the county, an expansion of the Fox River, is navigable. It is about eight miles in length, east and west, and about one-half to three-quarters of a mile from north to south. This lake is bordered by large marshes, and is noted for its numerous fields of wild rice, and the great number of wild ducks that frequent its waters.

## EARLY SETTLEMENT.

The first white man that we have any authentic account of, as having visited this region, was Father Marquette, a French Jesuit, who, in 1673, or about 200 years ago, explored the Fox River on his way through to the Wisconsin, in company with another priest named Joliet.

Marquette stopped at the point now known as St. Marie, so naming that place. Other explorers and traders navigated the Fox, passing through the territory now forming this county, many years before any actual settlement was made. A Mr. Gleason, from Vermont, seems to have been the first actual white settler. He located at what is now known as Marquette, on the Fox River, in 1831. He was an Indian trader, kept a store and cultivated a tract of land. The remains of his stockade were to be seen but a few years ago.

James Powell, a half-breed, settled in what is now the Town of Green Lake, in 1835, and cultivated a tract of land belonging to a half-breed trader, by the name of Poquette. Poquette soon after settled on what is known as the Bellefontaine farm, in the western part of Kingston.

In 1837 Hiram McDonald, formerly soldier of the United State Army, settled in what is now known as Mackford. He built a saw mill on Grand River, at Mackford.

A Mr. McGee settled in the Town of Manchester, in the Fall of 1837.

In 1840 Anson Dart, Wm. Bazeley and Mr. Beals came and settled in what is now known as the Town of Green Lake.

Saterlee Clark, now Hon. Sat. Clark, of Horicon, was one of the pioneers of the county. He lived east of the lake, and was the first postmaster.

J. C. and Wm. Sherwood were among the first to settle at what is now known as the Village of Dartford.

In 1845 F. B. Hawes opened a store at Marquette.

Mr. E. Smith previously had a store in operation one mile north of the Center House, in Town of Green Lake.

Nathan Strong and Thomas Noyes were the pioneers at Strong's Landing, or now the City of Berlin.

Gardner and D. M. Green were prominent among the early settlers of Marquette. They built large warehouses and docks at that place. D. M. Green is now Sheriff of the county.

R. C. Treat was one of the first at Princeton, and laid out the village plat.

We have not space to particularize, our aim has been to touch lightly on points already well shown up in previous

histories, and dwell more at length on others omitted by their authors. The statistics of the county will be given in another place. Many matters of interest and names of early settlers have been omitted through want of space to mention them.

## BERLIN.

Berlin is the northeast corner town of the county. Is bounded on the north by Washara County, on the east by Winnebago County, on the south by Town of Brooklyn, and on the west by Seneca. The City of Berlin occupying about five square miles, lies in the center of the north side of the town, and partially on each side of the Fox River, which passes out to the northward, and thence down the north side of the town. The lands of this town east of the river and south of the city line, are of the finest kind. On the southeastern part of the town is an extensive prairie of the finest soil. Here may be seen many of the fine residences and large barns that are common to our rich prairies. West of the prairies are openings and meadows. Here the soil is lighter, but there are many fine farms. The river southwest of the city is bordered with large marshes.

In 1847 Nathan Strong located on the banks of Fox River, on what is now a part of the City of Berlin. Here, in 1848, he built a ferry and established a landing.

In August, 1847, Mr. Thomas Noyes purchased the undivided half of three fractions of land on the river, of Mr. Strong. At that time the only building was that of Mr. Strong's—a board shanty. Mr. Wilson and Strong were the only settlers.

After Mr. T. Noyes, came P. M. Noyes. The Conauts arrived and located in September, and I. O. Seeley and family in October, same year.

In January, 1848, Joel Day and family settled at the landing. Day built the first frame house.

Early in the Fall of this year, Dr. Merriman, D. R. Shailer, D. W. G. Benham, C. R. Taylor and Mr. Montague, came and joined their fortunes with the little group of pioneers. Mr. C. D. Taylor built the first mill, which was the second frame building. Mr. Montague opened the first store, in Mr. Noyes' meat shop.

The first town meeting was held in the shanty of Mr. Noyes, in the Spring of 1848, when 33 votes were cast.

The first child born was Seeley's, on the Indian land; C. D. Taylor's the first in the city. The first deaths were Mrs. O. Wilson, Martin's child and Seeley's child, all within three days.

The first religious meeting was held at Noyes' shanty.

The City of Berlin was incorporated 1857, and is now a thriving city of inhabitants. It is the terminus of one branch of the Milwaukee and St. Paul R.R.

Among the old settlers of the Town of Berlin, we notice Nicholas Bush, J. C. Burdick, Owen J. Fuller and John McClelland.

## SENECA.

Seneca is bounded on the north by Washara County, on the east by the Town of Berlin, on the south by St. Marie, and on the west by Marquette County. This town is largely marsh. Near what is known as the four-mile house, are some sand hills. The land next to Aysford Isle level opening. The isle consists of several hundred acres of fine timbered lands, mostly oak and hickory. This isle is noted as being the point of first settlement in the town. Mr. Aysford made his home here at an early day. A small creek to the west divides the isle from Rodney's Isle, which is the highest land in this section, and is almost entirely settled by Irish. The isle contains over a thousand acres, and has some handsome valleys. Near its center are some prominent outcroppings of rock. Pine Island has nearly as many acres, but is low and level, and not much cultivated. It has, however, some good cranberry marshes.

Seneca Isle contains over fourteen hundred acres, and is partially cultivated. This town is better adapted to growing grass and raising stock than any thing else. Its hay is of a fair quality, and finds a ready market.

## MANCHESTER.

Manchester is bounded on the north by the Town of Marquette, on the east by Mackford, on the south by Columbia County, and on the west by Kingston. The surface of this town is undulating, prairie, openings and marsh. Soil strong in the eastern and central parts, getting lighter and more sandy towards the west.

This town is watered by Grand River, Lake Maria, and the head waters of one branch of the Fox River.

An old soldier by the name of McGee settled on the farm now owned by Henry Vinz, in 1837, built a log house and broke up the first land in the town.

Next came R. Langdon, in 1843, W. R. Carter, Sawyer Carter, Norman Stewart, James Carter, Robert Robinson and Madison Miller, in 1844. In 1845, came S. W. Mather, A. Barlow, David Jones, Lucius Clark, Walter Burlingame, J. Teal and J. Stickles. A Miner built the saw mill at the

Village of Manchester in 1847, Dr. Hoyt platted the village, and built a flouring mill in 1853.

The Town of Manchester was organized in 1849, A. Barlow, Chairman; J. Stalker and H. A. Millard, Supervisors; M. Lathrop, Clerk. The nearest mills in early days were at Janesville or Watertown.

The first school was organized in 1847. First church organization was by the Methodists in 1847, Rev. Mr. Welcome, Pastor. Baptist organized in 1860, G. W. Freeman, Pastor.

The first white child born in this town was in Mr. McGee's family. The first marriage was a Mr. Bates to Miss Margaret Stalker, daughter of Joseph Stalker. The first death was that of a child of Mr. Stewart.

#### GREEN LAKE.

Green Lake is bounded on the north by Brooklyn, on the east by Metomen, Fond du lac County, on the south by Mackford and Manchester, and on the west by Marquette.

This is considered the richest farming town in the county, and probably is not excelled in the state. A large portion of the town is prairie, and soil of unsurpassed richness. The farm residences are large and tasty, and the out buildings correspond, while groves of timber dot the prairies, planted by the hands of the settlers.

James Powell was the first to settle in this town. He built a log house in the southeast corner of the town near a large spring, still known as the Powell Spring.

The dell or glen situated in this part of the town is a natural curiosity. The walls are nearly perpendicular and from fifty to sixty feet in height. The glen is only a few rods in width, and a small stream runs through its center. This is a favorite picnic spot, and is very picturesque. Mr. Powell cultivated about eighty acres of land here as early as 1835. He had an Indian wife, and was monarch of all he surveyed.

Anson Dart and two sons were the next to locate in this town in the Spring of 1840. They settled near the outlet of Twin Lakes. The Darts came by the way of Fox River from Green Bay, in row boats. Anson Dart afterwards removed to Brooklyn and built a grist and saw mill in connection with J. C. Sherwood.

Mr. William Bazeley came into the town in the Summer of 1840, in company with Lieutenant Governor Beals. Soon after came Oliver Dart, Henry White and James Burt.

The first election was held at Dart's Mills in 1841, when seven votes were cast. The first frame house was built by Henry White in 1842, the second by William Seymour, 1843. Sat. Clark established himself in this town about this time, and was the first postmaster. Mr. Clark was at that time, as he has been since, a leading spirit in his community.

E. Smith established a store east of the center House, which was the second store in the county, there being another at Marquette. The first school was taught by Miss Ellen Lyman, in Mr. Bazeley's log house. The first birth was that of Alice Bazeley, daughter of William Bazeley. Oliver Dart was the first justice of the peace in the county, and at whose house was held the first religious services in this town.

The nearest post-office at this time was Fox Lake, and Milwaukee the market town. The nearest grist mill till 1847, was at Watertown or Columbus. Ten days to two weeks time was no unusual thing for a trip to mill.

#### PRINCETON.

Princeton is situated on the west side of the county, north of Marquette and south of St. Marie. The surface is rolling, and partially timbered with the several varieties of oak common to this region. The soil is a sandy loam and clay, underlaid with limestone. In the central part of the town a chain of limestone bluffs make a prominent feature in the landscape. The Fox River passes through the center of the town. Princeton, a thriving village, formerly the county seat, is situated on this river, and is the terminus of the Sheboygan and Fond du lac Railroad.

The first settlement in this town was made about three miles east of the village, in 1845. The place was kept as a tavern by Mr. J. B. Winchell. The first town meeting was held at this house. The town was organized with St. Marie in 1849, H. Wait, Chairman of the Board. The town separated from St. Marie in 1852, N. P. Smith was elected Chairman, and R. P. Lawson, Clerk.

In 1846, John Knapp, Ezra Rosebrooks, P. Wicks, Sr., N. Lowe, A. L. Holmes and Delos Maxon made their homes in this town. These men in connection with others, who soon followed, opened roads, built school houses and churches, and made other substantial improvements. Among those who located in this section from 1846 to 1850 we will mention William C. Briggs, Dr. T. Millard, Enos Moe, N. M. Parsons and Edward Harroune.

In 1848 R. C. Treat platted the Village of Princeton. H. B. Treat, Anson Randall, John Randall, W. S. Flint and P. M. Knapp were among the pioneers. Thomas McConnell began the publication of the Princeton *Republic* in 1865. The paper is now published by J. C. Thompson.

The railroad was completed to this village in 1871. The first church organized was the Congregational, in 1848, E. G. Bradford, Pastor. The first white child born here was

Jackson Ross. First marriage Mr. W. Glendening to Miss Julia Duane. The first death was that of Mrs. Henry Treat in 1848.

#### KINGSTON

Is bounded on the north by Marquette, on the east by Manchester, on the south by Columbia County, on the west by Washara County. Organized with Town of Marquette in 1849, Charles Waldo, Chairman; F. B. Hawes and R. Williams, side Supervisors; E. Stevens, Town Clerk.

In 1850 the town was separated from Marquette, taking the name of Kingston.

Surface of the town generally level or rolling, with one noted rise, Mt. Moriah. Soil sandy loam and clay. The actual settlement of this town commenced about 1846, when Geo. Bentley, Isaac Fuller, A. D. C. Knowlton, Anson Babcock, Harry Dart, Isaac Hewett, O. W. Bow and Thomas Mozley, came and located their lands.

In 1828 a French half-breed, named Poquette, settled on what is known as the Bellefontain farm, in the western part of the town. Poquette was an Indian trader, and a Government Agent. He married a squaw, and was afterwards killed by the Indians in some quarrel. He is said to have been a man of massive proportions, being six feet and six inches in height, and weighing nearly three hundred pounds. His widow married Judge Waldsworth, of Portage. After Poquette's death the post at Bellefontain was broken up.

The first death of a white person, was that of a young emigrant girl, who fell from a wagon, near Mr. Bow's residence, and was killed.

The first school was taught by Mr. Bow, in 1846-7, while his neighbors turned in and made fence for him to pay their school tax.

First church organized was the Baptist, in 1846, Elder Sergeant, Pastor. Next was the Methodist, in 1847 Elder Stone, Pastor.

An incident of interest is the account of the murder of a little charity boy, by a man named Norton and his wife. The boy had made some statement of some transaction in the family, and they wished him to retract it and say he had lied. He refused to do so, and was whipped to death. The man and his wife were sent to State's Prison for ten years.

#### MARQUETTE.

Marquette is bounded on the north by the Town of Princeton, on the east by the Town of Green Lake, on the south by the Towns of Kingston and Manchester, on the west by Marquette County. This town is very irregular in shape, and is noted for its large marshes and peculiar ridge of granite rock that crops out, about two miles southeast of the village. Then half a mile further north is another ridge of the same kind of rock. The soil is sandy in some places, and in others a sand and clay loam. Lake Puckaway lies north and west of the town, and is eight miles east and west, and a half to three-quarters of a mile north and south. The Fox River flows through this, so that it is really only an expansion of that river.

H. McDonald, of Mackford, states that when he passed up the Fox River with his Company of United States Regulars, on their way to Fort Winnebago, in 1830, they found a white man named Gleason trading with the Indians at Marquette. He had a log store and stockade, and a number of acres under cultivation. He claimed to be from Vermont. Several years after, in passing through, McDonald saw him again. As settlers began to come in he moved further west.

F. B. Hawes opened a store at the point known as Marquette, in 1845. The village was soon after platted by Jewel B. Southerland, James Meyers and Paige.

The town was named after Father Marquette, a French Jesuit, who explored the Fox and Wisconsin Rivers nearly 200 years ago. The village was the first county seat of Marquette County, 1849.

In 1846 Van Valkenburg, John S. Vine, J. M. Crandall, Gardner Green, D. M. Green, Samuel McCracken, M. J. Byington, Alex. Patrick, Akin, Potter, Seeley and Butterfield, came in and secured homes.

The Green Bros. built the large elevator and warehouses. The first birth was that of Lavinia Hunt Akin, daughter of Dennis and Mary Akin, in 1849.

The first marriage in town was that of Mr. Merriton to Miss Rachel Akin, by the Rev. G. R. Bartlett.

The first death was that of a child of John and Rebecca Conley.

For a knowledge of these facts we are indebted to Mrs. Laura Byington, a lady of superior intelligence and remarkable memory.

#### BROOKLYN

Is bounded on the north by the Town of Berlin, on the east by Town of Ripon, Fond du Lac County, on the south by the Town of Green Lake, and on the west by Towns of Princeton and St. Marie. When this town was first settled it was known as Lexington. When organized, January 10, 1849, changed to Arcade. In the Winter of 1850 the name was again changed to that of Brooklyn.

The first election was held April 3, 1849, when 58 votes were cast; B. B. Spalding being elected Chairman.

The surface of the town is rolling, partially timbered with

oak openings. In the eastern part of the town is a fine tract of prairie. The town is indented by Green Lake on the south, one of the most beautiful sheets of water in the state. It is about ten miles in length, and an average of two miles in width, and now a favorite resort of pleasure-seekers. There are five established Summer resorts in this town, of which Oakwood and Sherwood Forest are chief. Each is fitted up in fine style for comfort and pleasure, and will accommodate 150 guests.

Pleasant Point, a celebrated pic-nic ground, has lately been purchased by the Wetmore Bros., and is a favorite resort.

Forest Home is kept by Mr. Bushee, and is situated in a magnificent forest, on the western shore.

The Walker House, in the Village of Dartford, near the lake, is deservedly popular.

The first settler in this town was Mr. Wm. H. Dakin, who settled east of the lake in 1843. He took a prominent part in aiding settlers to locate lands, and his house was a favorite resort.

In 1845 Anson Dart settled where now stands the Village of Dartford. The following year J. C. and Wm. Sherwood, Mr. Marshall, Mr. Thurston, and several others, established themselves at this point. Mr. Dart and J. C. Sherwood built a saw and grist mill in 1847. A village was thus started called Dartford. Ten years after this was a flourishing village. This place has had its reverses, by the loss of its mills and factories by fire. It is now the county seat. The Sheboygan and Fond du Lac R.R. Depot is situated about one mile distant to the north, and called Green Lake.

The first birth in this town was a son of Giles Marshall, named Amos.

The first marriage was Mr. ———, to Miss Eaton; while death claimed Mr. Stearns as the first victim.

A Methodist minister, named Lathrop, preached the first sermon and organized the first church society.

#### ST. MARIE.

St. Marie lies just north of Princeton, and on the west side of the county. Is bounded on the north by Seneca, on the east by Brooklyn. The general features of this town are much the same as those of Princeton. On the north and west sides of the town are extensive marshes.

The first settler in this town was the noted Wisconsin Pioneer, Colonel Shaw. He located here in 1848, and made strenuous efforts to build up the Village of St. Marie; but like many others, circumstances combined against him, and as a village St. Marie is hardly a success.

Among the first settlers were, Mason Whiting, David Rosebrook and Edward D. Dike. The Catholics have a strong organization and a fine church structure at St. Marie. Mt. Tom, situated about two miles north of the village, is famous for its good lime, which is used extensively in the surrounding country.

#### MACKFORD.

This town is situated in the southeast corner of the county. Its surface is gently rolling, interspersed with prairie and openings. Soil, prairie mold and sandy loam. Limestone crops out in places. The town is watered by Grand River and Rock River.

Hiram McDonald has the honor of being the first settler. He located, where he now resides, at Mackford in 1837. His father, Samuel McDonald, came in soon after.

In 1843 Hiram McDonald built a saw mill at his place, and it is a curious fact that twelve out of the fourteen male inhabitants of Waupun were present at the raising. Lyman Austin and George Pratt came in 1844, and in 1845-46 there were quite a number added to the settlement. Among these we notice, Austin McCracken and sons, William Butler and son, James Densmore, William Hare, S. M. Knox, John Larkin, J. L. Millard, Abram Moore, William Shaw and Barlow Swift.

Austin McCracken built a saw mill in 1848, and in 1855 built a large grist mill. In 1850 Messrs McDonald, Carhart and White erected a large four-story grist mill at Mackford Village, but the fire fiend has swept it away, and nothing now remains but the broken walls.

The Town of Mackford was organized in 1849. At the first town meeting there were seven votes cast, Squire McDonald was elected Chairman; L. Wooster and John S. Toby, Supervisors; John Chapel, Justice of the Peace; J. C. Mathews, Town Clerk. The first school was taught by Miss Pauline McCracken, in her father's log house. In 1848 a school house was built of slabs, on the south side of the river, and public school organized.

The first religious services were held at the house of Lyman Austin, in 1846, Dr. Randall, Methodist, officiating.

The first white child born was John McDonald, son of Hiram McDonald. The first wedding was the marriage of Mr. Vadder to Miss Patterson. The first death was that of a Mr. Lyon, who was killed by a tree falling upon him. The first church was built by the Presbyterians, Rev. Mr. Kasson, Pastor.

John B. Seward platted and started the Village of Markesan in 1845, and built a saw and grist mill. Markesan is now a flourishing village.

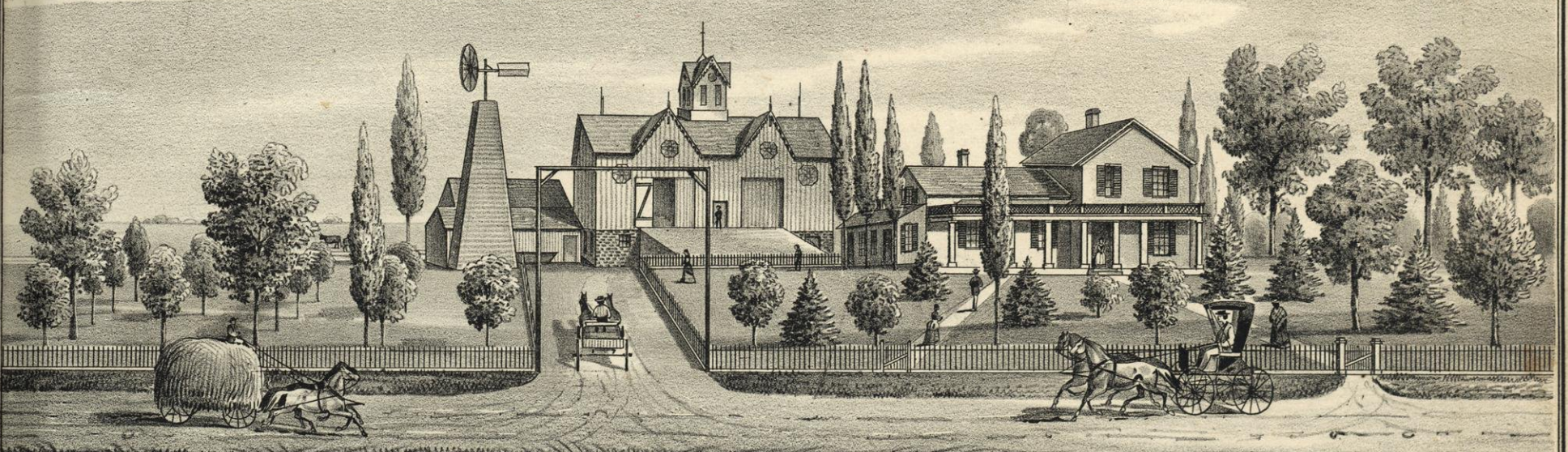

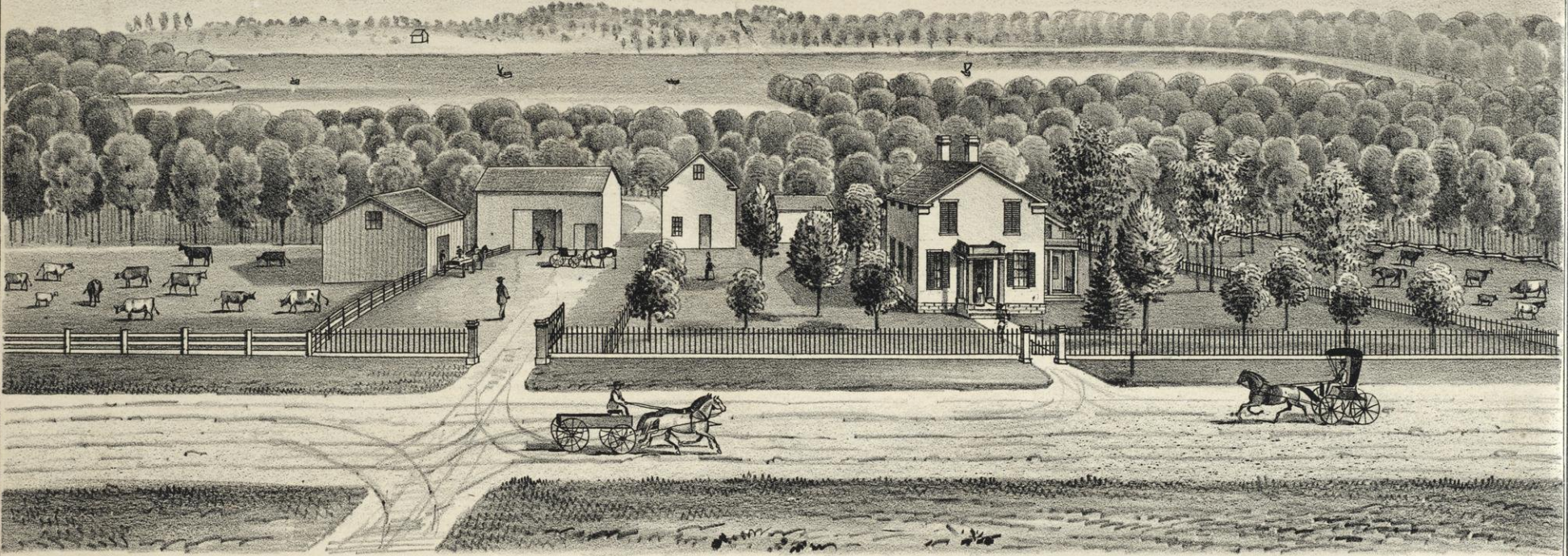

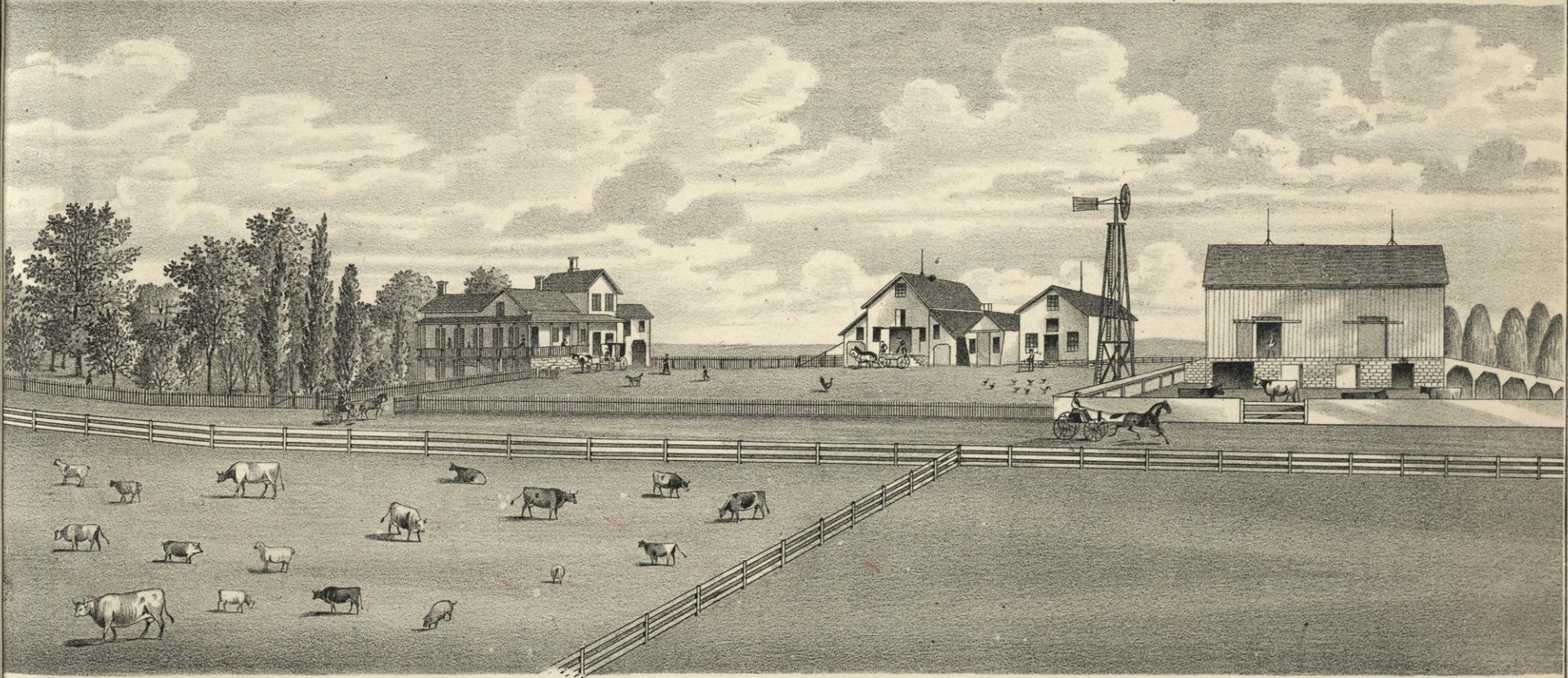

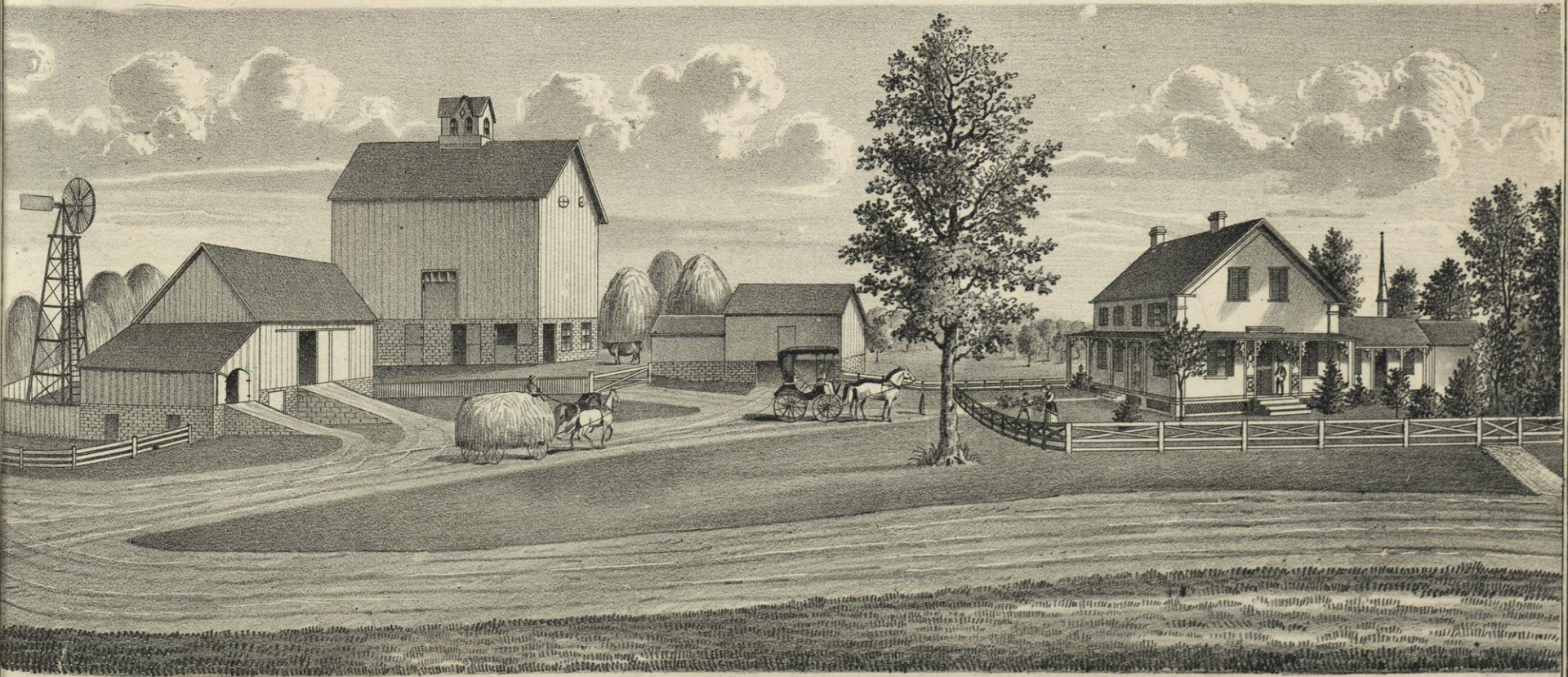

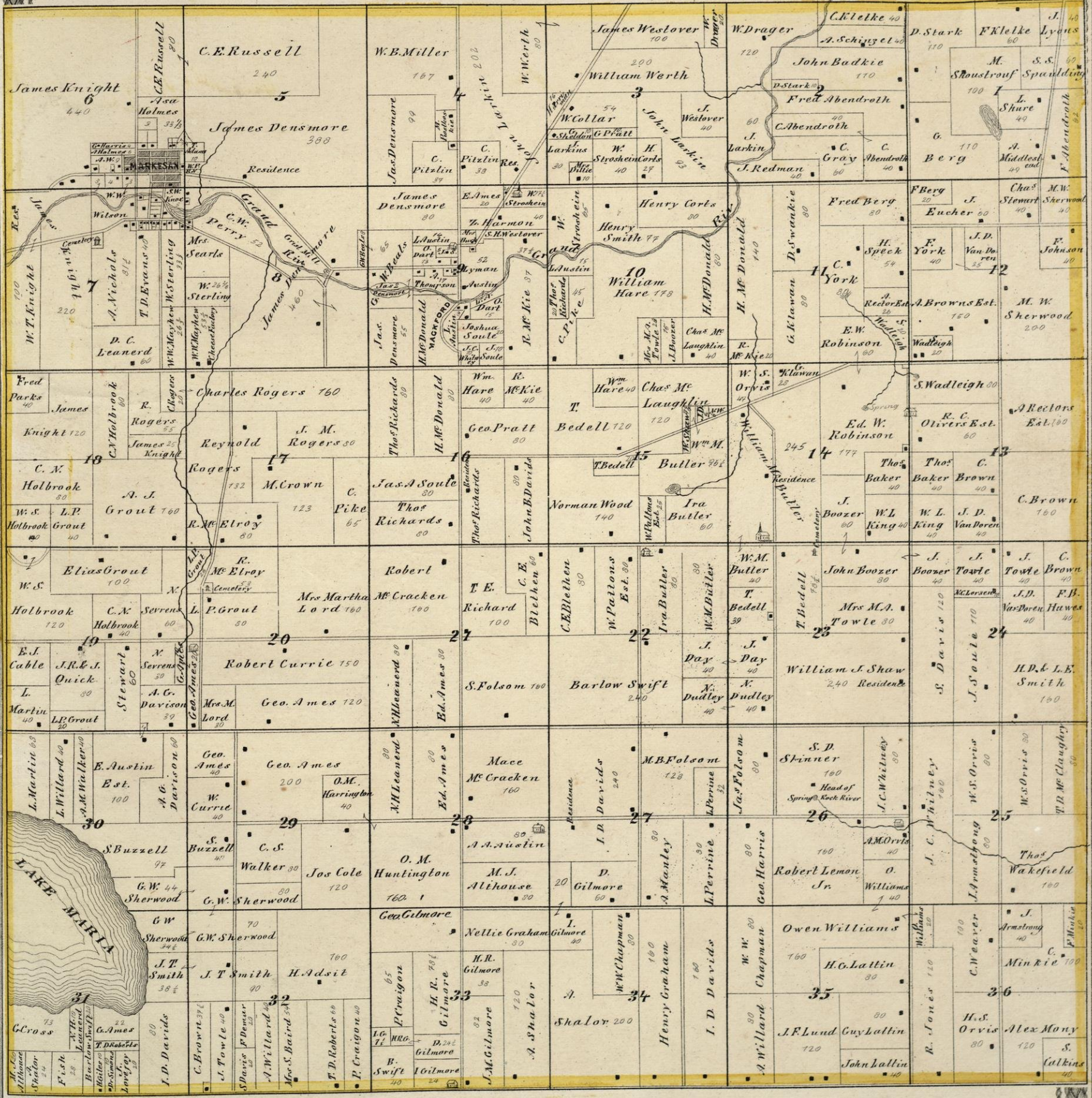

GREEN LAKE Co. WIS.

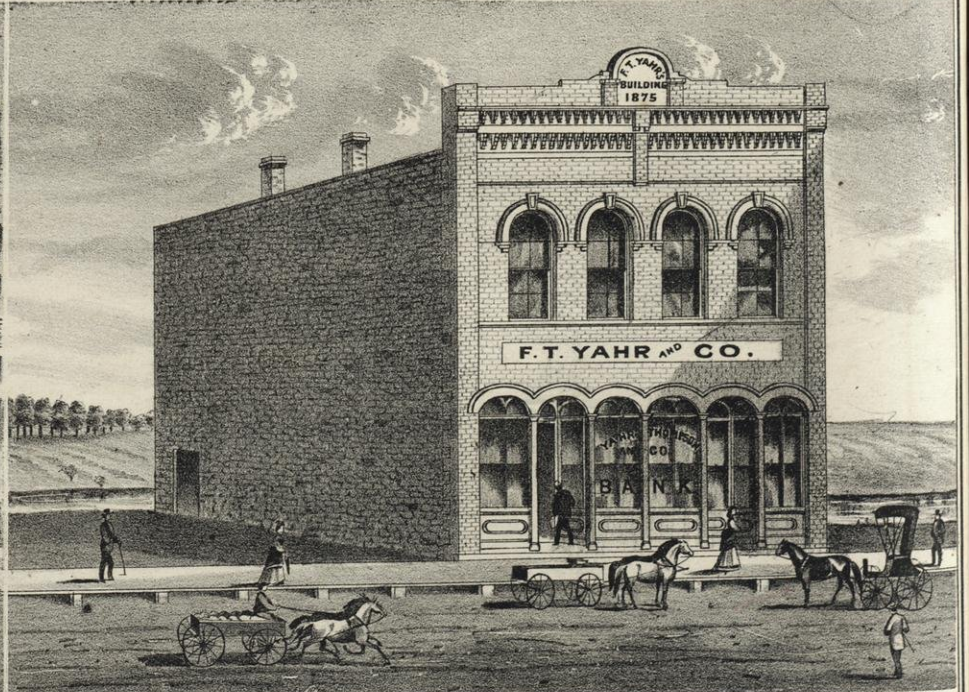

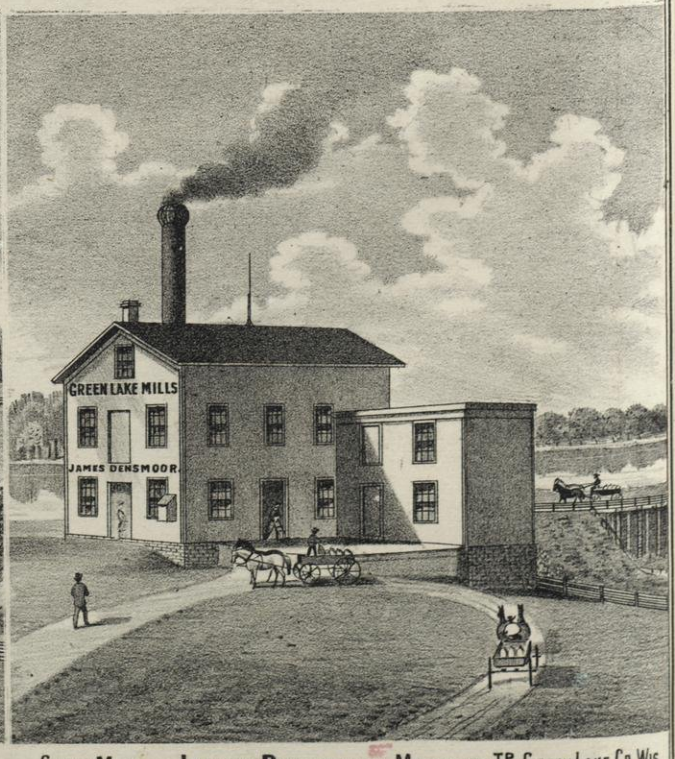

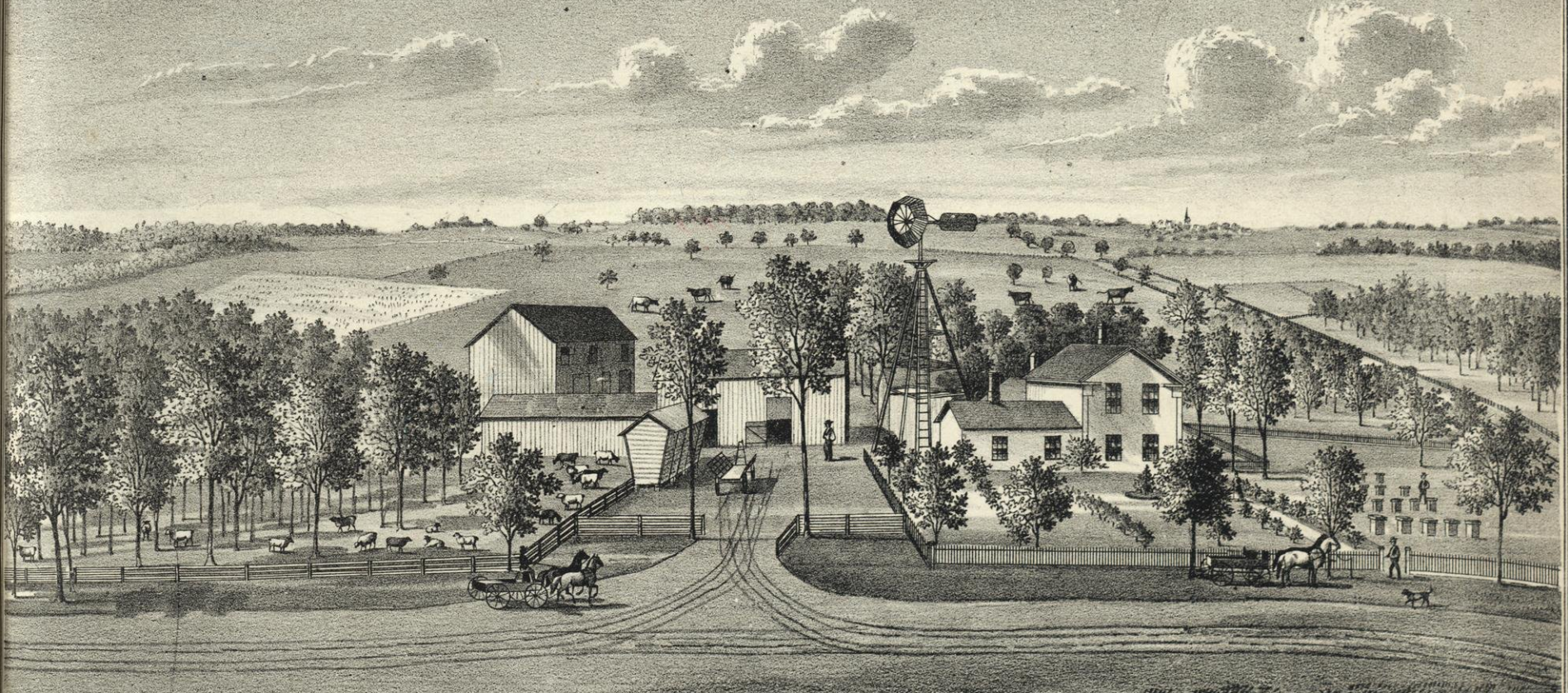

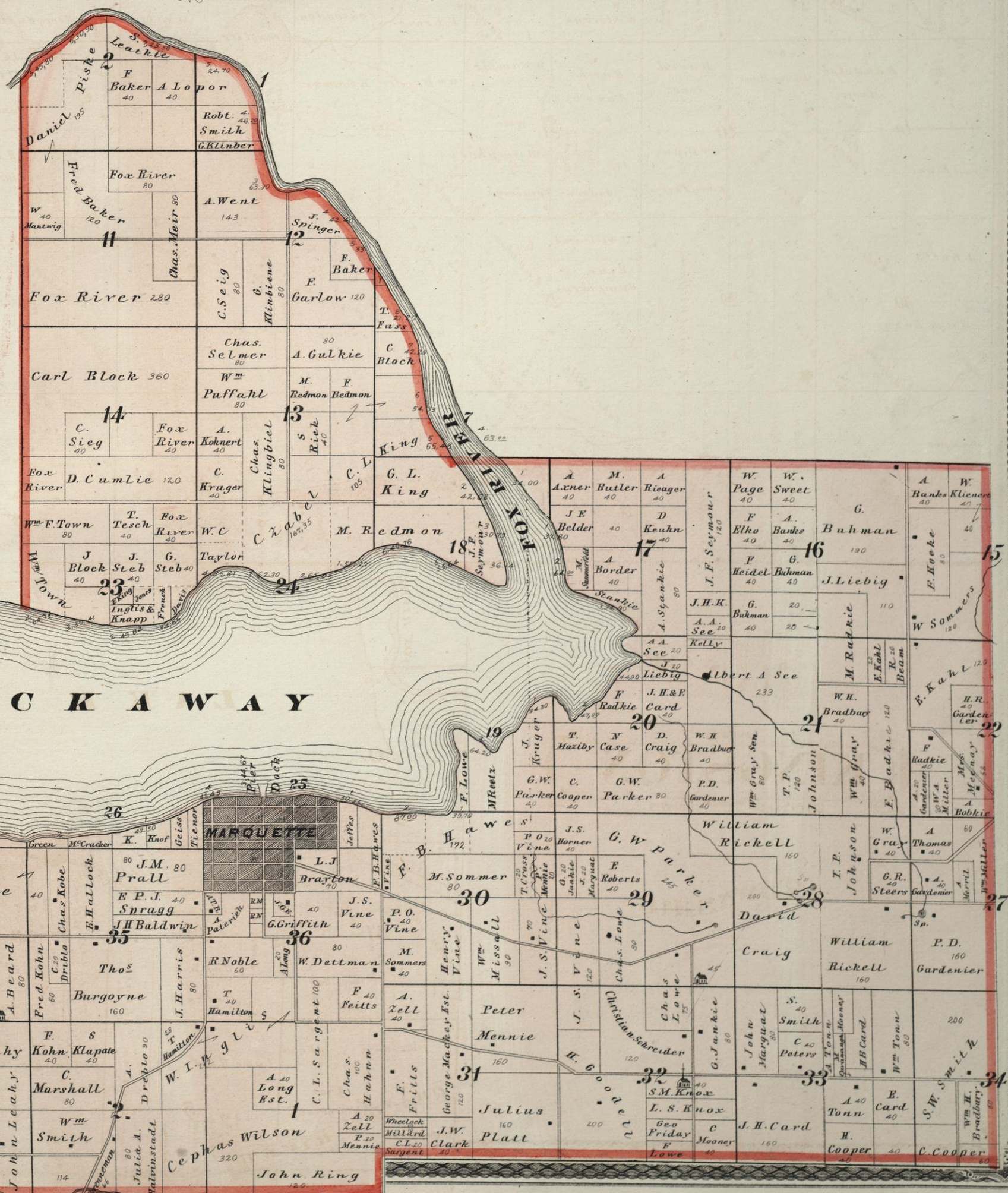

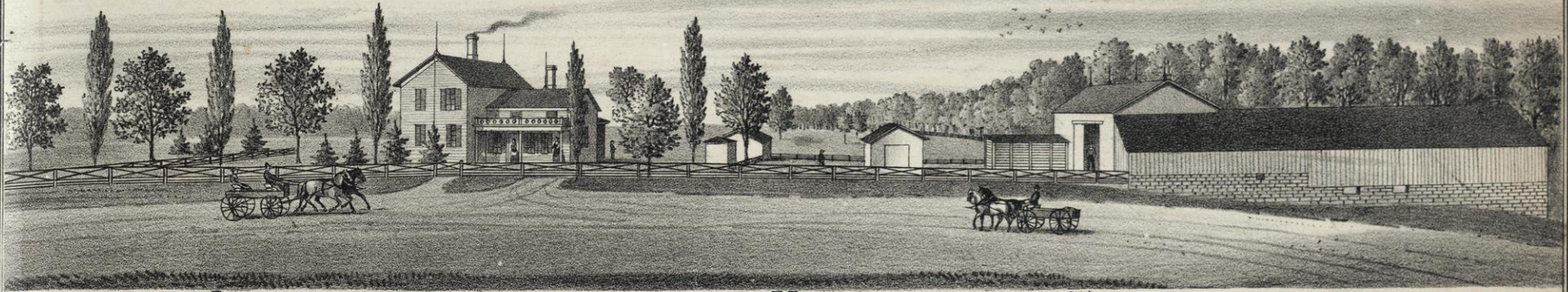


MAP OF **MARQUETTE** TOWNSHIP  
GREEN LAKE CO. WIS.

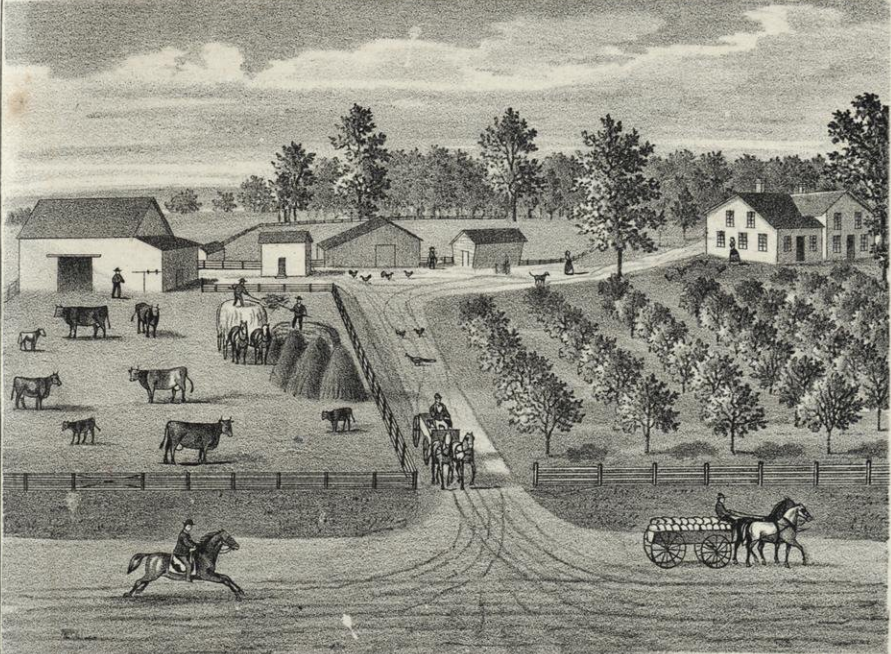


MAP OF **KINGSTON**

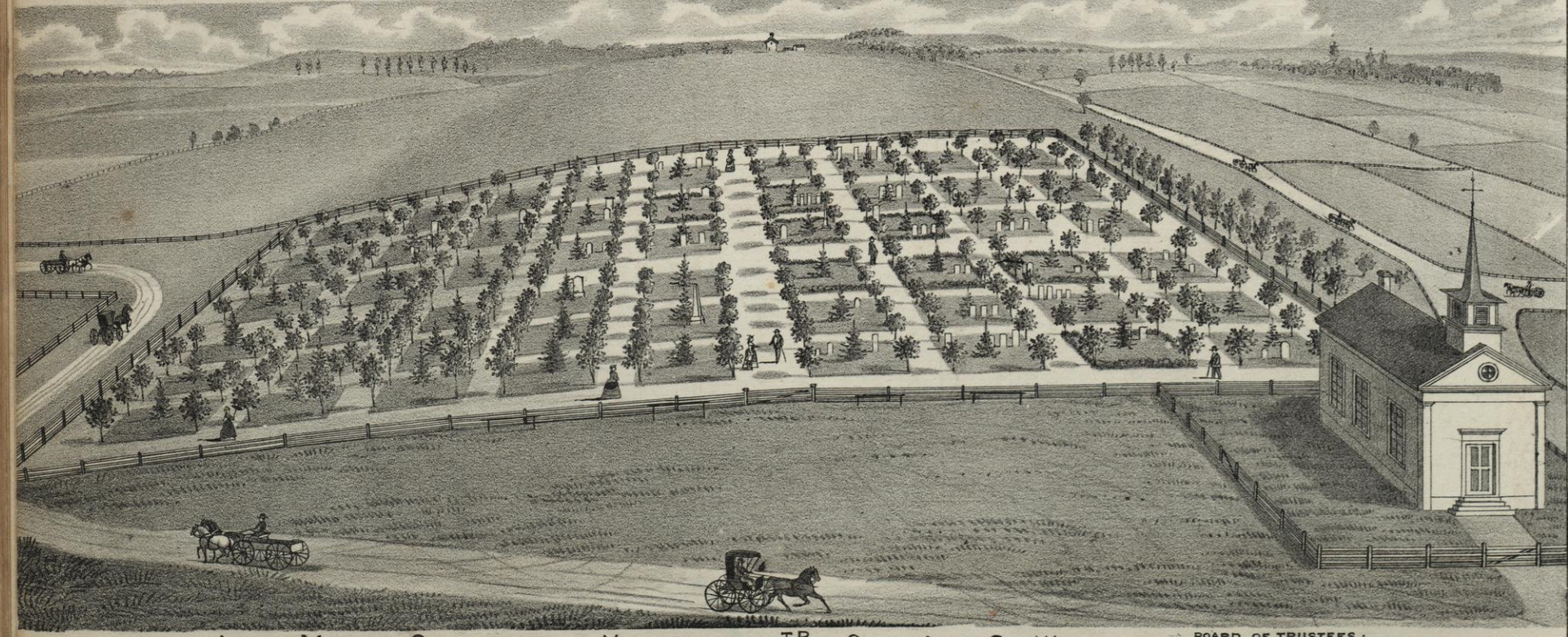

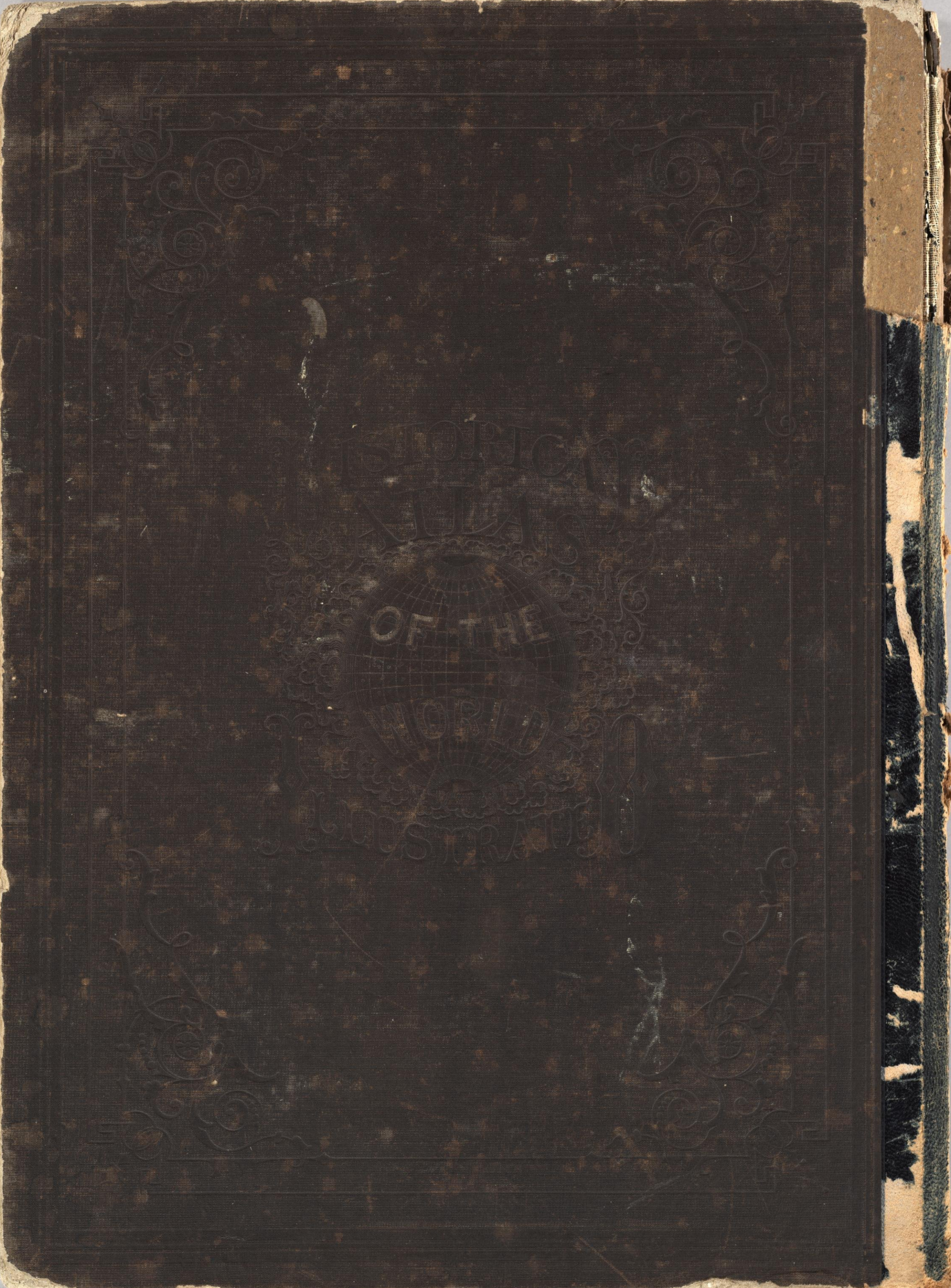
