





### 2005-06 Season Outlook

■ ach year under head coach has won more games and has positioned itself closer to a national championship than the previous year. The Badgers wrote program history with its first NCAA postseason berth, March 13, 2005 and though falling in the first round of the tournament (March 19), the team showed they were capable of great things. The Badgers now look to the 2005-06 season with experience and a determination to continue moving closer to the ultimate goal.

"Last year was another step in the right direction in regards to trying to win an NCAA championship," said Johnson. "They got a taste of what it's like to be in the NCAA tournament and you hope that it was a learning experience and it will springboard us as we start this season.

"With the momentum we had going into the end of the season, I thought the last five or six weeks we played as well as we had all year and as well as anyone in the country. It was a good way to finish off. Of course we wanted to win a couple more games, but so did everyone else."

After the departure of five seniors from last year's roster, including All-Americans and Olympic hopefuls Molly Engstrom and Carla MacLeod, as well as Nicole Uliasz on the blueline, power forward Jackie Friesen and all-around athlete Amy Vermeulen, the returning Badgers have large shoes to fill. Stepping into leadership roles this season are seniors Sharon Cole and Nikki Burish as captain and assistant captain, respectively, with junior scoring sensation Sara Bauer also serving as assistant captain. Supporting the captains are three other seniors— Meghan Horras, Grace Hutchins and Cyndy Kenyon—with experience and character to solidify the team's new iden-

"Anytime you have changes and you lose seniors and bring in freshmen, your team identity is going to be different than it was the last year," said Johnson. "So what this team is going to look like—

time will tell. But I think the upperclassmen and the captains understand what it takes to get to where they want to go."

Six players that will change the landscape of the Badger lineup are newcomers, Angie Keseley and Kayla Hagen, two top goal-scorers out of Minnesota; Erika Lawler, a 5-0 forward from Massachusetts; Alycia Matthews and Tia Hanson from Canada and Rachel Bible from central Wisconsin.

"Angie was one of the top scorers in Minnesota, along with Kayla and they are both very gifted players and both very competitive with good skill and good offensive capabilities," said Johnson. "I know they are excited about coming and being part of the program. I know they've worked hard this summer and I'm anxious to see them in a Badger uniform. I think people that come watch our games are certainly going to notice Erika. She may not be tall in stature, but she gets around the ice and is extremely competitive and a fun player to watch. The six

players we have coming in are going to be noticed right away because not only will they competing for spots, they will be playing."

With two years and 88 points, Bauer is the team's top returning scorer and will be complemented by a healthy Burish and Cole as well as younger players like Jinelle Zaugg who led the freshman scoring drive with 26 points in 2004–05. The Badgers will look to these players, among others, to generate goal production.

"It's funny because everyone says we're a defense-oriented team but you look at our
statistics and we were the thirdleading scoring team in the
country last season, forget
about the league, the country,"
commented Johnson. "You just
can't get complacent in this
business. You have to always
try to look for improvement
and try to become better and
hopefully the playing production will increase."

Beyond scoring goals, the team will rely on some junior defenders to keep UW's opponents out of the game. With

the loss of three key blueliners, the Badgers will turn to Canadian U-22 team member Bobbi-Jo Slusar as well as Kristin Witting and co-team rookie of the year Emily Morris to provide experience and guidance for Matthews and Bible.

"It's difficult to immediately replace major player-makers," commented Johnson. "But I think we have a couple people who are capable of getting out of the shadows of those players that are gone and creating their own identity within the program."

As a final line of defense, Johnson's netminders will be competing for minutes. With record-setting senior Meghan Horras, a healthy Christine Dufour and redshirt freshman Jessie Vetter all in the mix, the UW's net is sure to be secure, but with who is the question.

"Obviously competition and playing time is going to be at a premium for the three of them," said Johnson. "We'll have some tough decisions to make, but I think all three players have good character and understand the importance of being a team player and hopefully each of them will be able to bring something to the team."

Johnson is also confident that all three have worked out and conditioned themselves through the summer and will be ready if necessary to stop more pucks that may have been blocked by the departed All-American blueliners in the past.

While Wisconsin prepares through the preseason, the major note around the country is the departure of many schools' underclassmen taking the year away to prepare for and compete in the 2006 Olympic Winter Games in Torino, Italy. On the conference level, the Western Collegiate Hockey Association looks to be as even as it has ever been.

"We lost a couple key players, Minnesota lost a big chunk of their offense, Duluth lost a key player, so top to bottom it will be very close, which is good for the league," commented Johnson. "It is good for the teams and it is going to be very competitive. In years past you might have been able to say, 'Oh yeah, this team will beat that team,' or vice versa, but this year it's going to be interesting because I think we're going to see more splits on weekends series than we have in the history of the league. It will make for a fun January and February as we get closer to the WCHA tournament."

The Badgers jump into league play right away with perennial rival

Minnesota Duluth. Wisconsin knocked the Bulldogs out the WCHA tournament in the teams' last meeting. An intense overtime goal by Cole advanced UW to the championship game and left UMD to play the third-place game. With two of the top teams in the conference facing off straight out of training camp, the Badgers will have to be diligent in training camp.

"We have to come out of training camp feeling good and ready to go," said Johnson. "We don't have any time to experiment and so we'll get off the floor and be running right away. Even though those two games are early, they could really play a big role as you go down towards the end of the season."

All in all, it looks to be a positive season for the Badgers and women's hockey. The U.S. and Canadian Olympic teams will tour throughout the U.S. and Canada in preparation for the February Olympic Games. One tour stop for Team USA includes a series against the WCHA All-Stars. The unannounced roster will be coached by Johnson and is slated to face Team USA in Minneapolis and Duluth, Minn., the final weekend of September.

"The exposure standpoint for women's hockey should be real good this year," said Johnson. "When we get into February, we'll get an opportunity to watch the Games on TV with everybody else in the country. In general, there are a lot of exciting things happening in hockey, the NHL is back playing. It will be a fun winter."



### **Head Coach Mark Johnson**

Tith strong ties to Wisconsin as a coach's son, player and assistant coach, Mark Johnson stepped into the role of head women's hockey coach beginning with the 2002-03 season. In three seasons, Johnson and the Wisconsin women's hockey team have continued to shatter school records and make program history. Johnson's crew has set a new school record for wins each season he has been at the helm (22 in 02-03, 25 in 03-04, 28 in 04-05). Despite a heartbreaking loss to end the 2004-05 season, the Badgers displayed strength and poise throughout the postseason and proved to have what is needed to compete at such a level.

As an accomplished athlete, coach and humanitarian, Johnson continues to be honored with awards year after year. He also received the NCAA Silver Anniversary award, one the most prestigious honors given by the NCAA, in 2005 for his accomplishments in the 25 years following his days as a student-athlete. In 2004 he was inducted into the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame for his individual accomplishments as a player and coach. He was previously inducted as a member of the 1980 U.S. Olympic hockey team in 2003. Vince Lombardi Charitable Funds also honored Johnson's volunteer work by presenting him with the 2004 Award of Excellence.

Named the 2003 WCHA Co-Coach of the Year and also one of eight finalists for the American Hockey Coaches Association Division I Coach of the Year, Johnson guided Wisconsin to a 22-8-5 overall and 14-6-4 WCHA record that season.



In the 2004-05 season, the Badgers made history under the supervision of Johnson, winning a program-record 28 games (28-9-1) and earning the program's first-ever NCAA postseason berth. The team climbed as high as second in the national rankings by defeating then-No. 2 Minnesota Duluth in the WCHA tournament semifinals and dramatically forcing overtime by scoring two goals in the final minute of regulation vs. No. 1 Minnesota in the championship game.



### Leadership

The third head coach in the program's history, Johnson joined the staff after serving as an assistant coach with the men's program from 1996-2002.

During that time, he helped the team to a WCHA regular-season title during the 1999-2000 season, as well as a WCHA Final Five championship in the 1997-98 campaign.

Prior to his time with the Badgers, Johnson coached professionally, directing the expansion Madison Monsters to a 37-30-7 mark in the 1995-96 season and earning Colonial Hockey League coach of the year honors.

He also led a pair of area high schools, serving as the head coach of Verona from 1994-95 and as the assistant coach for Madison Memorial from 1993-94.

Johnson served as an assistant coach with the 2002 U.S. Men's National Team that competed in the International Ice Hockey Federation World Championship in Gothenberg, Jonkoping, and Karlstad, Sweden. He had previously served in a similar capacity for the 2000 World Championship in St. Petersburg, Russia.

Most recently, he spent time in Lake Placid coaching at the 2004 USA Hockey 17-18 Year-Old Player Development Festival.

In September 2001, he served as an onice assistant coach at the U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Orientation Camp in Colorado Springs, Colo., featuring 38 of the top American players in the National Hockey League.

#### On the Ice

In his playing career, Johnson helped Wisconsin to the 1977 national championship during his freshman campaign. The first Badger ever to win WCHA Rookie of the Year honors, he went on to become the school's second all-time leading scorer with 256 points on a school-record 125 goals and 131 assists in just three seasons.

The 1978-79 WCHA MVP, Johnson was a two-time, first team All-WCHA pick and a two-time All-American. In 2002, he was also selected as one of the WCHA's "Top 50 Players in 50 Years."

Johnson has represented USA Hockey as a player in 13 international tournaments, with his most recent appearance as part of the U.S. national team at the 1998 IIHF (A-Pool) World Championship Qualification Tournament in Austria. Most notably, he led the 1980 U.S. Olympic Team's gold medal-winning effort with 11 points, including two goals in the "Miracle-On-Ice" against the Soviet Union and an assist on the game-winning goal against Finland in the final contest.



#### The Next Level

Following his Olympic experience, Johnson embarked on a successful 11-year NHL career. He began his pro tenure with the Pittsburgh Penguins (1980-82), before moving onto the Minnesota North Stars (1982).

He also enjoyed stints with the Hartford Whalers (1982-85), St. Louis Blues (1985) and New Jersey Devils (1985-90). Over his 669 career NHL contests, the forward collected 203 goals, 305 assists and 508 points, highlighted by his 87-point season as captain of Hartford in 1983-84. He also tied an NHL All-Star ame record with three assists that season.

### **A Hockey Family**

A 1999 inductee into the International Ice Hockey Federation Hall of Fame, Johnson is the son of legendary Wisconsin men's head coach Bob Johnson (1966-82) and brother of former men's assistant coach Peter Johnson (1987-91).

One of Wisconsin's most decorated athletes in any sport, Johnson was inducted into the State of Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame in 2003 and is also a charter member of Wisconsin's National W Club Hall of Fame.

Johnson, 48, earned his bachelor of science degree in kinesiology from Wisconsin in 1994.

He resides in Verona, Wis., with his wife Leslie and his five children: Douglas, Christopher, Patrick, Mikayla and Megan.

A shton, Ontario native Tracey Cornell begins her seventh season at Wisconsin. She has been with the program since the drop of the first puck and has done everything from recruiting to co-coaching the team during her tenure.

The energetic Cornell came to Madison after spending the previous year as girls hockey head coach at Cushing Academy in Ashburnham, Mass. Cornell led Cushing Academy to a 24-4-2 mark, the most successful season in the history of the program. Her team captured second during the regular season and advanced to the NEPSAC Championship. Most recently, Cornell volunteered as a Team Leader at Canada's Under-22 Selection Camp in August 2005.


Cornell's playing experiences include four years at Cornell University, as well as one year as a professional in Switzerland for the SC Reinach Lions. While at Cornell, she co-captained the hockey program her senior season and earned Academic All-Ivy honors both her junior and senior years. Cornell helped the Big Red to the Ivy League hockey title during the 1995–96 season and served as assistant captain during the title run. The one-time Cornell rookie of the year also earned team honors as most inspirational player as a sophomore and senior.

Her stay with the SC Reinach Lions was also successful. The Lions placed second overall in the top Swiss hockey league and were crowned Zurich Cup Tournament Champions during her 1997-98 season.

Cornell earned her bachelor of science degree in marine ecology from Cornell University in 1997. In the fall of 2004 Cornell began pursuing her M.B.A. in the graduate program at Wisconsin. In addition to her time with the hockey program, Cornell played forward for a year with the Big Red women's soccer team and is an avid cyclist who has tried her hand competing in triathlons over the past year.

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
an Koch enters his fifth year with the women's hockey program. The assistant helped lead the team as co-coach during the second half of the 2001–02 season and since has been a valuable member of the staff in recruiting and mentoring.

Koch (pronounced Cook) came to Wisconsin following two seasons as an assistant coach with the women's hockey program at St. Mary's (Minn.) University working with the forwards and goaltenders. While also working as a third-grade teacher at Franklin Elementary School in La Crosse, Wis., Koch helped lead St. Mary's to a Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference title during the 1999–00 season and a third-place finish at the national tournament in the 2000–01 season.

Before his experience with the Cardinals, Koch was the head coach of the La Crosse Logan/Central High School boys ice hockey team from 1996–99. He coached all-conference and all-state players during his three-year stint. Koch also coached various ice hockey teams from 1986–95 at all youth levels including park and recreation leagues and travel squads. He also coached soccer in the Madison area as an assistant varsity girls coach at Madison La Follette and as an assistant for the boys team at Monona Grove High School from 1986–90.

Koch earned his master's degree in education, teaching and learning in 2001 from St. Mary's University after earning his bachelor of science degree in elementary education in December of 1991 from the UW. He is a 1985 Madison La Follette High School graduate.

Koch and his wife Jody, a school psychologist, have sons Connor, Jacob and Malik.

Jeff Sanger is a Madison native and 1997 graduate of Edgewood High School, where he posted a 72-13-3 record during his four-year prep career and helped his team win three consecutive Wisconsin Private School state championships.

He earned all-rookie and second-team all-USHL honors with the Sioux City Musketeers in 1997-98 before attending Colorado College. He is CC's all-time leader with 76 victories in

net and 16 shutouts during his collegiate career. His seven shutouts as a senior in 2001-02 also is a school single-season record. Sanger's career goals-against average of 2.48 stood as an all-time best for the Tigers until his successor, two-time All-American Curtis McElhinney, graduated last spring with a 2.32 GAA (2001-05).

Hickman, who graduated in 2002 from the UW with a degree in zoology, serves as director of operations and equipment manager for the Badgers.

Hickman, a native of Oakton, Va., spent three seasons as a student equipment manager with the program prior to his full-time position. A former Reston Raiders goaltender in

Reston, Va., his duties include coordinating team travel, purchasing and maintenance of equipment. Additionally, he worked as the 2003 U.S. Women's Under-22 team's equipment manager during a three-game series against Canada. He worked in a similar capacity for the 2001 WCHA All-Star team, at the 2003 16/17-year-old and 2004 17/18-year-old Girls Player Development Festival in Lake Placid. 
Potenza boasts an assortment of strength and conditioning coaching

### 2004–05 Season Review

In three seasons under head coach Mark Johnson, the Wisconsin women's hockey team has continued to shatter school records and make program history. With 28 wins the team set a new record for wins in a season. The Badgers also garnered the program's first NCAA postseason berth. Though falling to Dartmouth in the quarterfinal round, Wisconsin displayed the strength and poise needed to compete at such a level.

### Goals are a Girl's Best Friend

The Badgers maintained a high standard with an impressive 4.47 goals-per-game average, the third highest output nationally. Their opponents scored just 59 combined goals last season.

The team scored 31 goals in the season's first four games—the most goals Wisconsin has ever scored in any four consecutive games. Two sophomore Badgers collected that hockey rarity, a hat trick, during those games. Sara Bauer earned the first of her career Oct. 8, while Lindsay Macy notched the second of her career against Wayne State, Oct. 9.

Bauer earned her second trick two weeks later against St. Cloud State on Oct. 29. She had an impressive five points that day by adding two assists. Her third triple-goal performance of the season came in the UW's 7-2 rout of Minnesota State on Feb. 6.

All of Wisconsin's 20 skaters—not including the three goaltenders—registered a goal for the Badgers and 17 recorded more than one. Even one of the goalies, Meghan Horras, got in on the scoring with two assists last season.

### **Smart Skaters**

Nine Badgers earned Academic All-WCHA honors for excellence off the ice: Sara Bauer, Nikki Burish, Sharon Cole, Heidi Kletzien, Carla MacLeod, Lindsay Macy, Meaghan Mikkelson, Phoebe Monteleone and Amy Vermeulen.

Demonstrating Wisconsin's additional talents off the ice, all nine Badgers acheived at least a 3.0 cumulative gradepoint average to be selected.

### **National Teams**

Senior assistant captain Molly Engstrom skated with Team USA winning the country's first gold medal at the 2005 IIHF World Championships in Sweden. The title game was vs. neighbor Canada who had enlisted senior captain Carla MacLeod.

Both Engstrom and MacLeod were selected by their native country's teams, respectively, to train for the 2006 Olympics in Torino, Italy.

At the Under-22 level, sophomores Meaghan Mikkelson and Bobbi-Jo Slusar skated dominated the competition with Team Canada's U-22 team at the 2005 Air Canada Cup in Germany.

### **Players of the Week**

Straight off the first weekend of women's hockey action, this season's Badgers began earning league and national weekly honors for their strong performances on the ice.

In total, Wisconsin earned eight WCHA weekly awards, led by four defensive player of the week honors.

Two Badgers were twice honored this season by the league, including back-to-back rookie honors for forward Jinelle Zaugg for the weeks of Feb. 7 and Feb. 14.

Sophomore forward Sara Bauer and junior goaltender Meghan Horras were named USCHO players of the week this season.

Bauer earned the national distinction Oct. 11 following a five-goal, six-point performance in a series vs. Wayne State.

Horras garnered nation-wide honors on Jan. 17 after shutting out Minnesota Duluth 3-0 and nearly repeating the feat the next night holding the Bulldogs scoreless through 55 minutes and 49 seconds of the second game.

### **30 and Counting**

Sara Bauer (55 points), Lindsay Macy (43), Sharon Cole (38), Nikki Burish (34) and Molly Engstrom (32) eclipsed the 30-point barrier in 2004–05. Only 11 Badgers have ever had 30+ seasons. Seven have had 40+ and three 50+, while Meghan Hunter holds the record with 78 points in the 2000-01 season.

Wisconsin boasted two 40-point scorers (Bauer - 55; Macy - 43) in a season for the first time since the 2000–01 season when Meghan Hunter (42-36=78); Kendra Antony (19-31=50) and Kerry Weiland (12-37=49) all collected at least 40 points.

### **Coaching Excellence**

2005 marked the 25th anniversary of head coach Mark Johnson's final season skating with the UW's hockey team. Each year the NCAA recognizes former student-athletes who have distinguished themselves in the 25 years following their playing days with the Silver Anniversary Award.

Johnson was honored, along with the five other recipients, Jan. 9, 2005, at the Honors Dinner during the NCAA Convention in Dallas. The Silver Anniversary Award is one of the highest distinction bestowed by the NCAA.

Johnson was also inducted to the National Shrine of American Hockey in Eveleth, Minn., on Oct. 7. Previously inducted as a member of the legendary 1980 U.S. Olympic hockey team, Johnson was named this year for his individual accomplishments as a player and coach.

#### Polis

After making its debut at third in the USCHO poll and fifth in the USA Today/USA Hockey Magazine poll, Wisconsin remained a constant at fourth in both polls throughout the season. Heading into the postseason the Badgers made a jump to third for three weeks and even climbed as high as second in the USA Today rankings.

After dropping in the first round of the NCAA tournament, Wisconsin fell to sixth in both final polls, its lowest position all season.

UW has been ranked in 72 straight USCHO polls and 75 USA Hockey polls.

# This is the Western Collegiate Hockey Association



ith a noteworthy past that spans six decades and marks its 54th season overall in 2005–06, three characteristics that continue to define the Western Collegiate Hockey Association are history, tradition and success.

In 2004–05, a total of 16 conference players participated in the annual women's IIHF World Championship in Sweden, including five on the gold medal-winning U.S. Team.

The WCHA also continues to lead the way in college hockey attendance—for both men and women—as member teams, who regularly play in some of the sport's finest facilities, regularly top the Div. I ranks in average home attendance. In 2004–05, the women's WCHA marked its sixth straight season at the top of the national rankings while the men's conference drew a total of 1,508,427, the second consecutive season in excess of 1.5 million fans and the 12th consecutive season in excess of one million.

Over the last decade, the WCHA has been able to showcase its exciting brand of hockey to an ever-increasing number of fans, thanks to such impressive facilities as Ralph Engelstad Arena in Grand Forks, Colorado Springs World Arena, the Kohl Center in Madison, Magness Arena in Denver, Mariucci Arena and Ridder Arena in Minneapolis, the National Hockey Center in St. Cloud, and Midwest Wireless Civic Center in Mankato.

Under the leadership and guidance of Commissioner Bruce M. McLeod and Associate Commissioner Sara R. Martin, the Western Collegiate Hockey Association will proudly celebrate its 54th season of men's competition and seventh in women's competition in 2005–06.



# **Facilities**

### The Shell

Wisconsin holds practice at the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center, also know as The Shell, located adjacent to Camp Randall Stadium.

Beginning with the 2002–03 season, the team has had use of a brand new locker room built as an addition to the south end of the practice facility.

Included in the complex is a skate sharpening room, coaches' room, class-room complete with practice goal and boards, as well as dress down and locker rooms. The new area is part of the expanded Wisconsin Athletic Wall of Fame.

### The McClain Facility

The women's hockey team also makes use of the McClain Athletic Facility, just north of the Shell. The McClain houses the 15,000 square-foot Fetzer Academic Center, where student-athletes can take advantage of 40 personal computers, 11 study rooms, open area with 30 study cubicles, a 55-seat auditorium and a full-time advising staff.

The McClain Facility includes a weight room with more than 50 weight machines and 45,000 pounds of free weights, a 90-yard indoor football practice field and one of the finest sports medicine complexes in the nation.

### The Kohl Center


Starting its seventh season, the women's hockey team settled into the Kohl Center as its home ice. After shuttling around various Madison area city rinks in the earlier years of the program, the Badgers played every game of the 2004-05 season at the Kohl Center and will play all their home contests on that ice in the 2005-06 season as well.

The 15,237-seat arena, the second largest college-owned facility in the country, is named after U.S. Senator Herb

Kohl, a 1956 UW-Madison graduate who donated \$25 million to the project.

The \$76.4 million building contains an ice surface 200 feet long by 100 feet wide. The arena is also used for men's hockey, and men's and women's basketball, as well as concerts and other special events.

Artists such as the Backstreet Boys, Shania Twain, Matchbox 20, The Dave Matthews Band, AC/DC and Elton John, among others, have graced the Kohl Center stage.

# History of Wisconsin Women's Hockey

n April 17, 1998, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Board unanimously voted to add women's ice hockey to the intercollegiate athletic program.

The sport was brand new to the athletic department, but it already had a longstanding history at the UW.

A women's hockey club had been on the Madison campus for over 25 years. Founded in 1973 by three women— Marianne (Anderson) Larson, Jill Steinberg and Karen Schwarz—the UW Women's Hockey Club has had hundreds of players take to the ice over the years.

The first head coach for the varsity Badgers was announced on July 9, 1998, when Julie Sasner was introduced to the Madison media and public.

A former member of the first U.S. National Team in 1990, Sasner came from Cornell University, where she had coached for five years and mentored current Wisconsin assistant coach Tracey Cornell. Sasner currenly coaches the MIT women's hockey team.

The Badgers officially opened their history on October 8, 1999, when 3,892 people watched the Badgers face Minnesota Duluth at the Kohl Center.

With Olympic gold medalists Cammi Granato, Karyn Bye and head coach Ben Smith, along with Gov. Tommy Thompson in attendance, the game was televised around the state on Wisconsin Public Television.

Five years later, the team notched its 100th program win during the 2003-04 season. Continuing to exceed the previous year's standard, the Badgers started another chapter in Wisconsin history with the 2004-05 season. After winning a record 28 games during the season, Wisconsin earned its first NCAA tournament berth on March 13, 2005.

The city of Madison is now fortunate to have five rinks and a wealth of enthusiasm for the sport of hockey. Attendance at Wisconsin women's games grows larger every year.

The Wisconsin women attracted an average of 1,190 fans to each game during the 2004–05 season, ranking second in the nation behind Western Collegiate Hockey Association rival Minnesota.

The Badgers had at least 1,000 fans at 11 of 16 home contests, with a season-high 2,583 against St. Cloud State on Oct. 29, 2004.




Top: The view of the state capitol from Bascom Hill.



# Chancellor John D. Wiley

Chancellor John D. Wiley has worked to amplify the Wisconsin Idea and build on the research and teaching strengths that have made the University of Wisconsin so rich in accomplishment and tradition.


Since being named as the UW-Madison's 27th chancellor on Jan. 1, 2001, Wiley has aimed to enhance the university's role in creating a new, more viable economic future for Wisconsin while opening avenues to innovation and learning.

Wiley has presided over unprecedented growth on the west side of campus, which is being transformed into one of the nation's great health-sciences centers.

He also has mapped an east side redevelopment that will create a vibrant arts-and-humanities district to anchor the lower State Street area.

The chancellor has been a leader in efforts to expand on-campus student housing to meet demand, stem high-risk drinking and integrate athletics into the mainstream of university life. Wiley has reached out to the private sector by creating the Office of Corporate Relations to serve the increasing needs of the business community and help to build a more prosperous Wisconsin economy.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964; attended graduate school at UW-Madison as an NSF Fellow and received master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively.



# Athletic Director Barry Alvarez

Barry Alvarez is in his second year as the only person among Bowl Championship Series schools serving in the dual role of Director of Athletics and Head Football Coach. The Badger football coach since 1990, he is in his second campaign as athletic director.

Alvarez has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison. He has guided Wisconsin to three Big Ten and Rose Bowl titles (including back-to-back in 1998–99) en route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (108-70-4 record).

His 7-3 (.700) record in bowl games with the Badgers is among the best in college football history. The 1993 national coach of the year, he is a two-time (1993 and 1998) Big Ten coach of the year and was a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s) honor.

Alvarez is a 1969 graduate of the University of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, are the parents of three grown children: daughters Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson) and Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer); and son Chad (wife Stephanie). Barry and Cindy are grandparents to Joe and Jake Ferguson, and Grace and Jackson Delzer.



Since 1993, the UW has hosted five NCAA championships and an NCAA men's basketball regional. Wisconsin will add another national championship when hockey returns to the Badger state in 2006. Madison will also be the site of a hockey regional in 2008.


The Badgers played host to the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey championship in 1993 and 1997. The 1993 event sold out in three months, the fastest sellout in NCAA hockey history.

Wisconsin played host to the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship in 1993 and 1998. The Badgers shattered the attendance records for the championship match and two-day event both years.

The UW was also the site of the 1998 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship. The event was the first national championship held at University Ridge Golf Course and the first women's championship shown live on national television.

The NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament came to Wisconsin in 2002 when the Badgers played host to a regional in the Kohl Center.

# **Wisconsin Traditions**



### **Badger Nickname**

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

### **Bucky Badger**

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

### **Bud Song**

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

### **Fifth Quarter**

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

### On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

### **Hall of Fame**

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student-athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.

# **Badgers** in the Community

The Madison community is extremely supportive of the University of Wisconsin athletic teams and its many student-athletes. In return for that support, many student-athletes and staff members take time out of their busy schedules to show their appreciation and involvement in the city of Madison and Dane County through their community service efforts.

Volunteering allows student-athletes to have a positive and meaningful impact on the Madison community. Whether it is building home with Habitat for Humanity, visiting sick children at local hospitals, being a mentor as part of Big Brothers, Big Sisters or reading to grade school children with the Bookin' it with Bucky, UW student-athletes make a difference.

Student-athletes are encouraged to assist with community service projects all year long. The student-athlete in each sport who donates the most hours to community service during the year is recognized with the community service award.

The athletic department also donates a number of tickets and memorabilia to local charities for fund-raising purposes.



# Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center

The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center has been helping Wisconsin student-athletes to achieve their academic goals since 1997.

The 15,000-square-foot, state-of-theart facility serves the needs of all studentathletes. The center features an open area with carrels that can accommodate up to 30 students. There are eight study rooms of different shapes and sizes, including a 55-seat auditorium. A state-of-the-art computer lab, under coordinator Jim Eisenmann, is networked to allow access to email, the library system's electronic catalog and the web while the entire center is wired with voice/data jacks and power ports.

Associate Athletic Director David Harris supervises a staff of five advisors, four learning specialists, a life skills coordinator and a tutor coordinator who conduct the academic services offered to the more than 700 student-athletes. The advising staff of Tom Browne, Chris Butler, Jerry Darda, Mary Weaver-Klees and Alan Zussman as well as tutorial coordinator Jill Hadfield work along with learning specialists Doug Tiedt (assistant director), Dan Ott, Toni O'Keefe and Nancy Gatyas to render quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assist coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience. The staff, including program assistant Nancy Kreklow, has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments. Study groups, tutors and a variety of academic and career planning are available throughout the year.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and learning specialists whose offices are located in the center. Sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the student-athlete. Athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The staff takes a personal approach to each student-athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways on the national, conference and university level. The annual Student-Athlete Academic banquet recognizes student-athletes off the field of play.





The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Services Center, a state-of-the-art facility located in the lower level of the McClain Center, opened in 1997. The \$2.1 million center is one of the best in the nation and includes eight study rooms, a computer room, and a 55-seat auditorium.

# **Sports Medicine**

The sports medicine staff provides all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and a full-time nutritionist. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Badger athletes is supervised by a staff of 12 full-time and two graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.

Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Full-time athletic trainers Karen Bloch, Beth Cranley, Chuck Hart, Andy Hrodey, Laura King, Mike Moll, Clark Pearson, Henry Perez-Guerra, Kristen Walker, and Ian Wood as well as graduate assistant trainers Holli Schaible and Nicole Gehrich utilize functional measures, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.

Full-time nutritionist Jeremy Isensee provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.

The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospital and Clinics. Medical director Dr. Ben Graf, an orthopedic surgeon, is responsible for all services provided to student-athletes. Orthopedic care is also provided by team physician Dr. John Orwin and Dr. Lee Kaplan. General medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry, and he is joined by Dr. David Berhardt, and Dr. Kathleen Carr.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in Camp Randall Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House, and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

Strength and conditioning coordinator John Dettmann along with assistants Brian Bott, Ben Herbert, Scott Hettenbach, Bryan Miller, Mike Potenza and Greg Young work with the UW coaches to develop training programs to enhance each athlete's performance.

Badger athletes work on their strength programs in weight rooms in the McClain Center, Kohl Center and Camp Randall Stadium.

The McClain Center weight room is the largest of the facilities and features more than 45,000 pounds of free weights and more than 50 weight machines. The room has seven squat racks, eight bench press stations, eight flat-to-incline benches, six Olympic lift platforms and numerous other free weight stations.

The Kohl Center weight room is equipped with five custom-built free weight power platforms and 4,000 pounds of free weights. The room has nine pieces of cardiovascular equipment and three Vertimax jump trainers.

The Badger Den has five power stations with each station consisting of a platform for Olympic style lifting as well as a squat rack, bench press, incline bench press, pull-up station and a dip station. There are three lat-pull machines and seated row machines, a complete set of dumbbells and a complete set of plyometric boxes.




