

KEEPING GENEVA LAKE SAFE

The Water Safety Patrol on Geneva Lake is in its eighteenth year. Founded by Mr. S.B. Chapin it has done such efficient work that Geneva Lake is ONE OF THE SAFEST INLAND LAKE RESORTS IN THE WORLD. Mr. H.C. Paterson is in his tenth year as directing the patrol and as director is responsible for 225 piers, four city and village beaches , eight camps and 29 miles of shore line.

Not only does the Patrol watch over the safety of the lake but encourages the youth about the lake to learn to swim and also to learn to save lives . The Red Cross helps in the latter work by giving buttons and emblems for those showing proficiency in Life Saving.

Life Guards are all chosen for their ability to cope with the particular situations found on the lake. A finer group cannot be found anywhere .

The Patrol is always seeking new ways of helping. This year a 125H.P. Motor Garwood Speed Boat replaces the one which had 75 H.P. last year. With the trade in the difference in cost was only \$800, which was furnished by Lake Geneva, Fontana and Williams Bay which felt that more speed was necessary. The new one is faster by 12 miles an hour. Many minutes will be saved and incidentally a life. A two way radio is now being installed in the new boat which is hooked up with the County Police Radio system.

The new hats worn by the Life Guards are quite distinctive.

Let's make the highways as safe as the lake. Over the week end watch out for passing cars. Keep the road laws yourself and give the careless driver the benefit of any doubt in passing.

We are Safety Minded around the lake and should encourage all those working for safety.

BETTER KNOW YOUR LAWS ABOUT

SELLING OR SHOOTING OF

FIRE CRACKERS , ETC.

Mr. G.S. Kessler of State Fire Prevention Bureau was in the Village of Williams Bay last Tuesday checking up on the selling of Fire-works. He stated that the Fireworks Law - Wisconsin Statutes 340.70 will be enforced this year.

Space does not permit publishing the law but some of the outstanding parts are (1) kinds of fireworks permitted : Chinese and domestic firecrackers not more than two in. in length nor more than 3/8 in. in diam; colored fire in covered containers, flowerpots and display wheels throwing a display not more than six feet, and uncolored sparklers not more than ten inches in length over all and 3/16th of an inch in diameter.

The Village Ordinance does not permit shooting of fireworks until Saturday and including Monday this year.

Permit for sale of Fireworks must be issued by Fire Chief Victor Hansen.

Under no circumstances shall any person sell, keep, etc. for use fire balloon, mortars or cannon, or any explosive cane, toy pistol, toy revolver or other contrivance using explosive caps or cartridges, any Chinese firecrackers more than two inches in length or more than three -eighths inches in diameter, or any article containing a compound of mercury or yellow phosphorus.

Persons wishing to have fireworks displays even off private piers using other than allowable fireworks mentioned above should get permit from Village President of Fire Chief.

SOME DON'TS FOR

SWIMMERS ON LAKE GENEVA

Don't swim on a full stomach. Wait at least two hours after eating.

Don't swim if overheated or tired.

Don't swim until exhausted. Rest on your back and then swim ashore.

Don't swim if you have heart trouble.

Don't dive unless you KNOW the water is at least five feet deep.

Don't struggle if caught in a swift current or undertow. The force of the current will bring you to the surface- then work in toward shore.

Don't wade into the water with your arms above your head - you will not be ready to stroke if you step into a hole.

Don't lean backward when wading into the water. Always be ready to fall forward.

Don't fail to learn life saving and resuscitation methods- the knowledge may enable you to save the life of one dear to you.

Don't cry for help in fun. If you fool others they may fool you by not believing you when you really need help.

If the reading and heeding of the above saves one from drowning the " quoting of the above from a safety bulletin" will justify the existence of the " Lake Geneva Observer ".



CORNERSTONE FOR NEW COUNTY HOSPITAL Laid With Exercise

Last Wednesday afternoon, June 22, the cornerstone for the new Walworth County Hospital was laid by J.V. Seymour, chairman of the public property committee of the Walworth County Board. He has been a member of the Board for the past 20 years.

Judge Roscoe H. Luce gave the principal address. The Elkhorn High School Band furnished music. Mr. S.T. Foster, chairman of the Board of Trustees, presided.

Mr. Horace Millis, chairman of the County Board told the need for the new hospital and of the construction and architecture. Remarks were made by Henry P. Plunkett, architect, John V. Seymour; Dr. R.C. Halsey, president of the County Medical Society; Margaret Schloemer, superintendent of the Walworth County hospital; Fred Hemstreet, director of the Walworth County Institution.

The building will be built of Bedford stone and Whitewater brick. Work on the building was begun last March. The skeleton of the building is finished up to the 4th floor and this is now being poured.

R.C. Wierdsma, Milwaukee, is the general contractor, Mr. Henry Plunkett, the architect.

MEMORIAL ROCK TO HONOR SONG COMPOSER

A four-ton granite boulder found on a farm west of Delavan has been placed on the lot of Joseph P. Webster, the composer, in Hazel Ridge cemetery, Elkhorn. It has a bronze plaque attached with the inscription, "Joseph P. Webster, February 16, 1819, January 18, 1875". Below this inscription appears the first few measures of the music of which he composed for the famous song and these words, "In The Sweet By and By, We Shall Meet."

Mr. Webster's two sons, Fred and Lou are living in the old homestead in Elkhorn.

GARDEN CLUB FLOWER EXHIBIT IS
APPRECIATED BY MANY

One of the most beautiful exhibits of flower arrangements and plants ever shown in Williams Bay was the one sponsored by the Williams Bay Garden Club in the Community Room last Friday afternoon. The exhibits, all so beautifully and artistically displayed, made visitors exclaim as they entered. The large room was completely filled with attractive flowers and plants.

Mr. and Mrs. E.N. McDonnell showed moving pictures in technicolor of the Tournament of Roses Parade at Pasadena, Cal. which is held annually on New Years Day. The pictures of the many hundreds of floats, made of roses and some of other flowers, were very beautiful. Many of them representing historical or industrial development of the state.

They also showed moving pictures of the gardens in California and plant development. No soil is needed in this new development. Roots are placed in glass tanks with water soaked excelsior, and eleven chemical elements are essential for the plant growth. Any of the plants thus sown may be transplanted. Gladiolas grow six feet high and are of exquisite colors.

Pictures of the McDonnell's boat trip to the Catalina Islands, the William Wrigley Memorial, a football game played in the Rose Bowl at Pasadena, the famous Santa Anita Race Track and other beautiful scenery for which California is noted, were also shown. 

With its members and affiliates busy with summer outdoor activities, the "Y" turns its building services emphasis in the direction of the "stranger within the gates" during the period when the lake region is crowded with vacationists and transients. The sign of the Red Triangle outside the attractive association building on Main Street across from Library Park in Lake Geneva is a welcome sign to a multitude of travelers and visitors. Whether it is information about the region, or a place to read and rest, or to meet one's friends, or to talk over problems with a friendly counselor, the "Y" doors are open fifteen hours a day, seven days a week for such service.

The YMCA cafeteria is widely known for its good food service. Pioneering in this service eighteen years ago, the Lake Geneva "Y" has attracted many friends to the community because of it and has established an industry appreciated by a considerable number of local workers who are given employment, many of whom in seasons past have been young persons earning money for school or college. All income from the operation is devoted to the educational and service activities of the Association.

With the return of Fall and indoor activities the Association Building again becomes the mecca of young people interested in clubs and hobbies and in the attractions of the gymnasium. Last winter two hundred boys and girls were in training for citizenship and leadership under the guidance of a score of talented volunteer workers. It is through such efforts that the future of the community and the nation is made secure.



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
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


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Horse Back Riding A Popular Sport at Williams Bay
