The libraries provide public access to a wide range of material, including online exhibits, digitized collections, archival finding aids, our catalog, online articles, and a growing range of materials in many media.

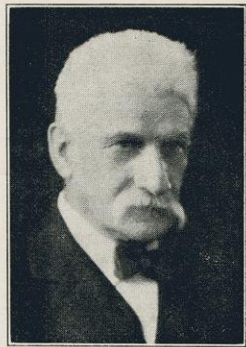

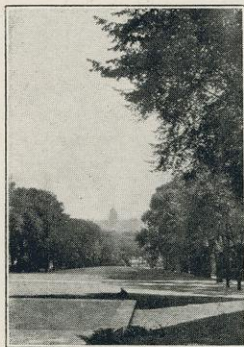

Afternoon—Baccalaureate exercises in the Agricultural Pavilion. Address by President Birge.
