


## The Old High School

1876 to 1915






## The New School





Schultz and Delores Walnack. Before we laid down our arms for the summer vacation we entertained all service men at a party.

The crowning event of the year was the Junior-Senior Banquet where all the participants proclaimed to have had an excellent time.

Hiram Cutland who joined us at the beginning of our third year left us again. We put the finishing touches to the events of the year by a picnic at the Maribel Caves.

After the seasons had passed along for three years we found the greatest task still lying before us. Our journey was undertaken the last year with Mr. W. F. Kruschke at the head and Stanley Kuich as our class president. Finally we reached a very attractive land known as the "Land of Seniors" but we soon found out that this place was inhabited by some of the worst barbarians, namely, Physics, American History and English each of which caused us to be on a constant lookout.


By experience we learned that history repeats itself for our Junior celebrities distinguished themselves in such engagements as football, basketball, debate and oratory.

After to-night we shall no longer be united members of the Kewaunee High School's forces with the Purple and Gold waving above us but each shall adhere to our class motto "The door to success is labeled "Push." Let each one be true to the challenge of Browning—"Twas ever a fighter, so—one fight more, the best and the last. Comrades Adieu.





To Miss Hoffman we will all of the good work turned out by the Domestic Science department.


To Miss Partridge, we leave all of the dumbbells, that are in the gymnasium, for her to use in her future Physical Training classes.

## SENIOR NOTES



The season opened with three veterans of the 1921 season, namely, Stanley Kuich, Joseph Matulewitz and Alvin O'Konski. With the addition of nine new candidates, prospects ran high in favor of a team that would be capable of bringing home the bacon.

The question submitted for debate by the Forensic Board of Lawrence College was, "Resolved: That the reduction of national armaments to the status of adequate police forces within a period of ten years is practicable."

The debate try-outs were held on the afternoon of Thursday, December twenty-second in the High School auditorium. The people trying out were divided into four teams and each member of the team was given five minutes to deliver his main speech and two minutes for rebuttal. The first two teams that debated consisted of: Harold Petrie (Chairman), Maynard Doerfler, Erwin Moudry and Vena Albrecht on the affirmative and Joseph Matulewitz (Chairman), Elmer Kuehl, Esther Moudry and LeRoy Oswald on the negative; the next two teams that debated consisted

of: Alvin O'Konski (Chairman), Homer Kieweg, and Frank Knadle, on the affirmative against Stanley Kuich (Chairman), Mary Rice and Walter Buettner on the negative. The members of our high school faculty were judges for the debates. The decisions of the judges in both cases was in favor of the negative team. The members thus chosen for the regular Kewaunee High School Debate Team were: Alvin O'Konski, Mary Rice, Stanley Kuich, Walter Buettner, Esther Moudry and Joseph Matulewitz. Homer Kieweg and Frank Knadle were chosen alternates.

Intensive work on the question was begun immediately after the Christmas vacation. This resulted in the withdrawal of one of our regular members and called to the front our alternate, Homer Kieweg. The affirmative side of the question was upheld by Esther Moudry, Joseph Matulewitz and Alvin O'Konski; the negative, by Homer Kieweg, Walter Buettner and Stanley Kuich.

The local debating league consisting regularly of Algoma, Casco and Kewaunee was slightly changed this year, when Casco was placed in a different league and Sturgeon Bay was placed in the league with Algoma and Kewaunee.

On Friday, February seventeenth, Kewaunee's affirmative met and defeated Sturgeon Bay's negative by a unanimous decision at Kewaunee; our negative was unanimously defeated by Algoma's affirmative at Algoma and their victory over Sturgeon Bay's affirmative entitled them to represent this triangle in the next meet. In spite of the fact that we did not win, we still feel confident that our teams have done very commendable work.

The judges for the Kewaunee-Sturgeon Bay debate were A. J. Oosterhous of Appleton, C. G. Stangel of Manitowoc and P. E. Pfaffman of Oconto; the judges for the Kewaunee-Algoma debate were J. B. Layde of Wausaukee, W. T. Ream of Green Bay, and Professor Farley of Oshkosh Normal School.


Three of the regular debaters will be lost this spring through graduation. The three that will return next fall will form an excellent nucleus for the 1923 team.


The Lakeside Dramatic Club, an organization introduced into the Kewaunee High School last year, was re-organized at the beginning of the school term, admitting large number of new members.

The gym work consists of general calisthenics, drills, volley ball, indoor baseball, work on the parallel bars and various games that are interesting and enjoyed by the students.









## THE 1921 FOOT BALL SEASON

At the first football practice, Coach Leitl found abundant material for a promising year, a year in which it was hoped to develop a team that would be a credit to the institution. Out of twenty-five men reporting for the first call, eight were veterans of last years team: namely, Kuich, Besserdich, Matulewitz, Giese, Teske, Waterstreet, Tirner and Kuehl. This gave the coach a nucleus to develop a good working machine.

### SHAWANO GAME

Two weeks of hard practice enabled Coach Leitl to make a selection for our first game at Shawano. Twice during the first half we reached their five yard line but were held on downs. After another week of hard practice we went to Manitowoc determined to bring back a victory. The first half ended 7-6 in our favor. In the second half our coach objected to the decisions of the referee, and withdrew our team.

### OCONTO GAME

On October first, we played our first home game with the Oconto Highs. Oconto had a very strong and heavy team and came here with the intention of "running the ball clear around Kewaunee." However, they found out what they were up against, after Kewaunee had secured a touch-down in the first three minutes of play. Besserdich, our right-half back, was now put out of the game on account of injuries, and Oconto scored two touchdowns before the half ended. In the second half Kewaunee came back strong, Kuich carrying the ball for thirteen consecutive times for a touchdown. Oconto again came from behind and scored three touchdowns. On the last kickoff Matulewitz received the ball and passed it to Kuich, who went almost the length of the field for a touchdown. The game ended 32-21 in favor of Oconto.




## STURGEON BAY GAME



### DENMARK AT KEWAUNEE



## WEST GREEN BAY DEFEATED




## ALGOMA DEFEATED


