SUMMER WILL BRING MORE REMODELING TO MEMORIAL

The sound of jackhammers and saws will ring out again this summer signaling more remodeling in the 56-year old Memorial Union.

This time the areas of work will be the Rathskeller servery which hasn't been redone since the early 1960s, and the central stairwells which need to be enclosed for fire safety reasons.

In the Rathskeller, only the servery and the exit to the terrace will be changed. Nothing in the historic room will be touched. When finished, the serving area will be more convenient and attractive, will provide faster service, and will have a new deli as well as some new menu items.

Other fire safety projects include a connecting corridor to the Craftshop from the central section of the building, and a handicapped lift in Great Hall.

Funds for the remodeling are coming from operating budgets except for the corridor to the Craftshop, which is being done with Memorial Union Building Association funds.

TRAVEL IS THE WORD FOR SPRING AND SUMMER 1984

Union members — like students and faculty — are a traveling group. And with the arrival of the traveling season, you might want to check out the possibilities available to you through the Union Travel Center and Rhodes/Sager Wilson travel agency.

Special offerings from the Travel Center this year include the 5th annual "Escape to Wabakimi" Canadian canoe trips, a tour of Germany by bicycle, and a "good will" trip to the Soviet Union. In addition to their special trips, the Travel Center also offers special services to the University community and Union members. Among these are: the sale of general Eurail passes for the European traveler; International Student ID cards; and American Youth Hostel Passes.

The Wabakimi trips, scheduled for June 15-24, July 20-29 and August 10-19 range in price from \$279 to \$359 depending on the length of the trip and the itinerary. These high adventure trips in the Canadian Shield country of Northern Ontario include round trip transportation, all equipment (except sleeping bag, pad and personal gear), meals while on the water, experienced guide and lodging enroute.

Information about the Wabakimi trips will be given out at information meetings on Tues., April 3 at 4:30 p.m. and Wed., April 4 at 7 p.m. in the Memorial Union.

The Germany by Bicycle tour begins in Trier and ends in Freiburg after covering the Mosel and Rhine valleys, Franconia, Augsburg, Bavaria, Lake Constance and the Black Forest. The dates of the proposed itinerary are May 26 through June 21. The \$859 price includes accommodations in Youth Hostels and hotels, daily continental breakfasts, three dinners, train transfers, a Rhine River cruise, boat excursion on Lake Constance, entrance fees to museums, and two experienced cyclists who speak German as guides.

An information meeting on the German trip will take place Wed., April 4 at 4 p.m. in Memorial Union.

The Soviet Union trip is planned as a people-to-people experience with emphasis on communication with the Soviet people through the Peace committee and the Soviet-American Friendship Society. The 15-day tour will include Helsinki, Leningrad, Moscow, and Minsk. Transportation includes round-trip air via Finnair and deluxe (continued on P. 4)



MELROSE AND MORGAN DANCE A MADISON FAREWELL

Dancers-choreographers Claudia Melrose and Clyde Morgan have been thrilling Wisconsin audiences for the last fours years with their collaborative efforts. "Melrose and Morgan: A Farewell Concert," will take place at the Union Theater, Saturday, April 14. This will be one of their last appearances together before Morgan returns to teach and do research in Brazil.

A Melrose and Morgan concert in Milwaukee last summer earned such raves as "magnificent," and, "the sinuous strength of Melrose and Morgan was a joy to behold."

In addition to their work together, Melrose and Morgan each had outstanding careers in dance. Claudia Melrose studied with Murray Louis and Alwin Nikolais and has been lead dancer, dance captain and master class teacher with the Nikolais Dance Theatre. She travels widely to give workshops in dance technique. She is presently on the dance faculty at the UW-Madison.

Morgan, currently on the faculty of the UW-Milwaukee, has danced with the companies of Jose Limon, Anne Sokolow and others. He spent several years doing research and choreography in Africa before moving to Brazil, where he directed the Contemporary Dance Group at the Federal University of Bahia. This group was selected to represent Brazil at one of the most important festivals of African and African-inspired art in Lagos, Nigeria.

The April 14 concert will include solos and duets choreographed individually and together, some old favorites, some new to Madison, one of them a world premiere. In Morgan's "Baron Samedi," based on the sardonic Haitian folk character, "the keeper of the graves," spectators will see one result of Morgan's extensive researches into ethnic cultures. It will include live drummers. In the untitled world premiere, Melrose and Morgan will manipulate long plastic tubes, using them for balance and counterbalance.

Tickets are \$4.50 or \$5.50, an incredible bargain these days to see two outstanding dancers in an exciting collaboration. Tickets are available at the Union Theater Box Office.

CZECH PHILHARMONIC WILL APPEAR AT CIVIC CENTER

The Czech Philharmonic, one of the world's finest orchestras, will perform at the Madison Civic Center, Friday, April 13 at 8 p.m. under the sponsorship of the Wisconsin Union Directorate and the Civic Center.

Led by Dvorak himself at their first concert in 1896, they will be conducted here by renowned music director Vaclav Neumann and will feature pianist Ivan Klansky as soloist. They will play a strong program, opening with Smetana's "Bartered Bride" Overture and performing Chopin's Piano Concerto No. 2 in F minor with Mr. Klansky. The concert will close with Dvorak's powerful, dramatic Symphony No. 7. This is the only Madison appearance by a world-class symphony orchestra this season.
