



# What Makes Wisconsin Unique?




Since Coach Murphy's arrival, Wisconsin has set attendance records in three of the past four years with the 1990 team topping previous all-time records setting a single game attendance figure of 2,606 against Michigan State, totaling 1,300 per Big Ten Conference contest, and ranking 37th in the nation with a cumulative attendance average of 1,106.



The Wisconsin program is one of few in the nation that utilizes a sophisticated, on-site computer statistics program to provide the media and coaching staff with a complete analysis of each game.



# Wisconsin Coaching Staff

## ☐ Head Coach **Mary Murphy**

Chicago native Mary Murphy was named head women's basketball coach at the University of Wisconsin-Madison on July 7, 1986. Murphy's proven experience in recruiting, her enthusiasm for re-vitalizing the Wisconsin basketball program, and her emphasis on the importance of having scholar-athletes in the program, are all assets that she has brought to her position at Wisconsin.

Beginning her fifth season at Wisconsin, Murphy's presence in the Badger program has been judged a success by the public and UW administration alike. In February of 1988, she became the first coach of a nonrevenue sport to receive a multi-year contract at Wisconsin.

Murphy's style of play has also been popular with her teams setting attendance records in three of her four years. This past season, record numbers saw the Badgers, despite the 8-20 record, as Wisconsin set cumulative and conference attendance records averaging I300 per Big Ten game, and set a single game attendance record of 2606.



While building a program from the ground up, Murphy has not neglected the academic responsibilities of her student-athletes. Ten of Murphy's student-athletes turned in a 3.00 or better performance in 1990, and the team posted a collective grade point of 3.08.



Murphy's reconstruction of the Badger program has included an infusion of youth, most of whom come from the State of Wisconsin. The current team has just four out-of-staters on a roster of I3. Her I988–89 team, comprised of six freshmen, four sophomores, and two juniors, posted the best season record in six years at I3–I4.

That squad set or tied 3I team or individual records, and two players received All-Big Ten Honorable Mention honors by a vote of the conference coaches. The I989–90 Badger team had one sophomore receive Big Ten Honorable Mention in Michele Kozelka of Prairie du Chien, Wis. Kozelka, a former walk-on, led the Big Ten in rebounding throughout the year, and was named the Big Ten Player of the Week twice.

While building a basketball program from the ground up, Murphy has not neglected the academic responsibilities of her student-athletes. Three members of the 1988–89 team earned Big Ten Academic Team honors, the first ever from the Badger program since the award was initiated in 1985–86. Wisconsin's representation numbered more than any other Big Ten men's or women's basketball program. In addition, Kay Fredrickson became Wisconsin's first women's basketball CoSIDA/GTE Academic All-America District team member.

Murphy's 1989–90 team had 10 people with 3.00 or better in the second semes-



ter, and the team posted a collective 3.08 grade point average last year. Four Badgers made the 1989–90 All-Big Ten Academic team, again more than any men's or women's conference basketball program. The members of this team must be upperclassman who are letterwinners, and who have

cumulative grade points of a 3.00 or better.

Murphy's emphasis on the court and in the classroom is, "To be the best that you can be." The results of that philosophy are evident.

Murphy is a 1980 graduate of Northwestern University in Public Administration/Public Policy. She was a four-year starting guard for Northwestern and a cocaptain her final two seasons. She guided the Wildcats to consecutive Big Ten and Midwest Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (MAIAW) Championships in 1979 and 1980. The Wildcats went to the quarter-finals of the 1980 AIAW National Basketball Tournament. She was also selected a Wade Trophy finalist in 1980, an annual award given to the nation's outstanding female college basketball player.

After completing her playing career at Northwestern, Murphy accepted a graduate assistant coaching position at Notre Dame. She earned a Master's of Business Administration (MBA) degree from Notre Dame in 1982. Murphy served as a head assistant and recruiting coordinator at Notre Dame for six years prior to being named to her first head coaching appointment at Wisconsin.

## Donna Freitag

Donna Freitag, a native of Oregon, Wisconsin, returned to Wisconsin in 1986 as second assistant. Freitag earned most valuable player honors at the University of Wisconsin-Platteville for two years before transferring to the University of Iowa. At Iowa, she was named team MVP and captain during the 1982–83 season. Freitag also won the All-Around Athlete award in 1983 and was named to the all-tournament team at the Sun Dial Classic.

Freitag, a 1983 graduate of lowa in physical education and health, has also worked at numerous basketball camps and has coached at the high school level. She played in Ireland with the women's semi-professional basketball league for two years prior to her appointment at Wisconsin.

## ☐ Mike Peckham

Mike Peckham, a former assistant coach at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, begins his fifth year with Wisconsin women's basketball as chief recruiting and academic coordinator. An assistant at North Carolina from 1980–86, Mike aided the Tar Heels to four NCAA tournament appearances.

Mike serves as the head recruiter, travel and schedule coordinator, in addition to his on-court coaching duties. He has worked at many summer basketball camps, and is the Co-Director of the Mary Murphy Basketball Camps.

A 1982 graduate of North Carolina in recreation administration, Mike and his wife, Bobbi, reside in Madison with their four-year-old daughter, Samantha, and four-month-old Kristin.

## ♦ 1990–91 Badger Basketball Preview

s Wisconsin Women's Basketball Coach Mary Murphy looks at her ■ 1990–91 Badger squad, one word comes to mind—optimism. Despite posting a disappointing 8-20 mark last season (3-15 in the Big Ten), Murphy feels this year's team will be much improved, more experienced and healthier.

Murphy will boast 10 upperclassmen, the most in her five years as coach, a fact she feels could go a long way towards a successful campaign.

"I just think it's a great step to have a senior and junior class," said Murphy. "We'll have some leadership and people who know what they want, and that's to go out and win some ballgames."

One player who gives the Badgers a good shot at improving is Michele Kozelka (Prairie du Chien, WI). The 6-I junior forward led Wisconsin in scoring (15.9), rebounding (8.7) and free-throw percentage (.803) as a sophomore, and set school season records for most free throws (II8) and most free throws attempted (I47). For her efforts, the former walk-on was named Wisconsin's Most Valuable Player, and received Honorable Mention Big Ten honors for the second consecutive season.


"Michele is without question one of the top five or ten players in the conference and I think we're going to see another great season out of her," said Murphy.

Murphy also expects a great season out of sophomore guard Robin Threatt (Cedar Rapids, IA). Threatt led the Badgers in three point goals (29), three point attempts (84), and three point percentage (.345). Her I2.2 points per game was second best on the team, giving Murphy much to look forward to the next three seasons.

"Robin really came on last year and as she continues to gain experience and confidence, the sky's the limit for her," said Murphy. "Robin has tremendous potential. She just needs to continue to work hard and I think she'll develop into one of the best players in the Big Ten by her junior and senior year."

Wisconsin will have one of the conference's top backcourts if junior Amy Bauer (Durand, WI) and senior Gina Edmonds (West Nyack, NY) recover from off-season surgeries.

Bauer, who averaged a team best 4.2 assists per game along with nine points an outing, underwent reconstructive ankle surgery last spring, but is expected to be ready this fall.

Amy Bauer is one of four returning starters. Off-season surgery has repaired the ankle problem which limited her play last season.

"I think with Amy Bauer, you're going to see a whole new player," Murphy said. "All the flashes of greatness she's shown will become more of a regular thing. She was playing on a lot of courage and a lot of guts. She didn't have a lot of ankle."

Edmonds saw limited action in 27 games last season. A pin, put in place because of a stress fracture, was removed from her left foot following the season. Murphy feels keeping the two point guards healthy will go a long way in determining Wisconsin's success in 1990-91.

"I think if we learned one lesson in the last couple of years, it's that if we cannot stay injury free, we're in for a rough ride," said Murphy. "We have to keep Amy and Gina healthy to make us competitive."

Murphy also believes a healthy guard crew will help improve Wisconsin's defense, which gave up 74.6 points per game, second worst in the conference.


"You will definitely see an improved team on defense. Number one, Amy Bauer will be able to play the kind of

defense she did in high school, and hasn't been able to play since because of injuries," Murphy said. "We also have a number of other players who are excellent defenders, and they will continue to improve. So overall, I think our defense will be much


If Wisconsin can keep its guard corps healthy, Murphy can implement a running game, possibly with three guards, that focuses on the three point shot. Wisconsin set school records with 96 three pointers and 303 attempts last season.

"We were able to get out in the lanes and make things happen last year, and I think this year is just going to be better," Murphy said. "I think we'll continue to rely on the three-point shot, because when we're making them, it really opens up our inside game.'

Add junior guard Mynette Clark (Racine, WI) to the mix and Wisconsin's guards look quite dependable. Clark started I2 of the 26 games last season, averaging 6.5 points and 2.4 rebounds. She

also posted career bests with **I6** points and six rebounds.

"Mynette gives us a nice dimension in that she can play either guard or forward," said Murphy. "She made great strides last season and should continue to improve and become a major contributor to our ballclub."

Lisa Lawrence (Milwaukee, WI) will be another key to the inside game. The senior forward started all 28 games for the Badgers last season and averaged 8.5 points and 5.9 rebounds per game. She also earned the team's Most Improved Award.

"Lisa is very important to us," said Murphy. "She gives us a lot of intangibles. She rebounds real well and her offensive game started coming together for her last year. She has worked extremely hard the last two summers and hopefully she'll just continue to blossom."

Another player Murphy expects to shine is sophomore center **Amber Lan**-

drigan (Bridgeport, NE). The 6–5 Landrigan started eight games and led the team in blocks. She finished the season strong with 15 points versus lowa, and 12 rebounds against Michigan. Murphy feels establishing her as an inside threat, along with Kozelka and Lawrence, will give the Badgers a strong inside attack.

"Amber is going to be something," Murphy said. "She's a great force inside, and I think she's beginning to understand that. What she'll bring to the front line will mean a lot to this club. She's worked hard and has gained a lot of confidence, and I think she has three terrific years coming up."

Wisconsin will receive additional frontline help from senior forward **Kay Fredrickson (Durand, WI)**, the 1988 Big Ten Freshman of the Year. Fredrickson played in 26 games last season, averaging 3.6 points and 2.6 rebounds. Murphy expects positive things from Fredrickson in her final season. "I see her coming off the bench and hopefully be a Vinnie Johnson (Detroit Piston's guard) type of player for us," said Murphy. "Someone who can come in, cook a little bit for us and stick the ball in the hole."

Sophomore Jen Waterman (Wisconsin Dells, WI) will also look to bolster the Badger front court. Waterman played in 16 games as a freshman averaging 1.6 points and 1.1 rebounds per contest.

Senior forward **Kim Fredrickson** and sophomore guard **Peggy Shreve** will also battle for playing time this season.

Fredrickson, the third Badger from **Durand, WI**, has lettered three years for UW. She has also been named to the All-Big Ten Academic Team the past two seasons.

Shreve, a former walk-on from **Monroe, WI**, played in I3 games scoring a season high four points against Bucknell. Shreve received the team's Scholar-Athlete award after recording a perfect 4.0 grade

point her first semester and the Capital Square Optimist Teammate of the Year Award.

Not returning for the 1990–91 season are graduating senior **Shelly Rucinski**, **Michele Bourne**, **Jennifer Scotten**, and **Heather Bostrom**. Bourne gave up basketball and elected to pursue her studies at North Carolina. Bostrom, who underwent shoulder surgery last spring, will red-shirt this season. Scotten continues to have problems with stress fractures in her legs, and will sit the year out.

Murphy welcomes freshmen **Dolly Rademaker (Thorp, WI)** and **Rebecca Leet (Oostburg, WI)** to the program this season.

Rademaker averaged 28.8 points and 10.7 rebounds as a senior and was named player of the year in Wisconsin by the Associated Press and the Atlanta Tip-off Club. Rademaker was also the valedictorian of her graduating class after compiling a 3.96 GPA. Despite being just a freshman, Murphy feels Rademaker can contribute immediately.

"You don't want to put too much pressure on a young player, but Dolly has some big shoulders and I think she can handle the responsibilities," said Murphy. "I think her


improvement and emergence will dictate how much of a two or three guard offense we play. If she steps in and does the things we know she has the potential to do, I think we'll be able to play three guards."

Wisconsin enjoyed some success with the three guard format last season before injuries to Bauer and Edmonds. The three guard offense is one Murphy enjoys as it allows the Badgers to get out in the open floor more often and focus their offense on the running game.

"I'd love to play a three guard offense. It helps us use our quickness, and we're a better team when we push the ball up," said Murphy. "We started it last year and it was working real well for us, but then injuries just took their toll. Hopefully we'll be more fortunate with health this season."

The second freshman joining Wisconsin is 6–2 forward Rebecca Leet. Leet led Oostburg to the Wisconsin Class C Championship last season and is expected to provide immediate help in the front court.

"The addition of Rebecca Leet to the front line will mean a lot to this ball club," said Murphy. "She brings size, agility, and a real good offensive game with her. She can shoot the hook with either hand and she'll give us the versatility to relieve the pres-

sure on Michele (Kozelka)."


Although Wisconsin struggled to a ninth place finish in the conference last season, Murphy was pleased by her team's neversay-die attitude.

"The ability of this team to stay competitive throughout a difficult season was definitely encouraging," Murphy said. "For a young team, that's difficult to do. It's easy for people to get discouraged and throw in the towel and we just didn't have those kind of people."

With a solid nucleus of returning players and the strong pair of incoming freshmen, Murphy feels Wisconsin can improve in the conference. She's fully aware it will be a difficult assignment, but one her team can handle, especially if it can remain injury-free.

"You just don't jump to the head of the pack or even the middle of the pack," said Murphy. "We've gotten a lot closer in a lot of games and I think a lot of those games will be victories this year. So much of our problem has been injury-related. We'd have people playing well and then get hurt, and that's very difficult for a young team."

"I think we're getting experience and we finally have a strong senior class. The attitude right now is very positive and very competitive. I think we've come of age and are ready to reap the benefits."

## **A World-Class University**

he University of Wisconsin–Madison, one of the world's leading institutions of higher education, is dedicated to the support of academic freedom.

Established in 1848, the first class of 17 students assembled February 5, 1849. Today, the UW-Madison ranks as the nation's fourth largest university with 43,695 students, 11 schools and colleges, 133 academic departments, 14,000 employees, 5 million volumes in 44 libraries, and a \$1 billion budget. The university's national ranking of third in research and development expenditures supports its reputation as a world-class research institution.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top universities in the United States in every scholarly reputational study since 1910. In what may be the most extensive survey ever done on graduate level education—the five-volume *Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States*—Wisconsin finished eighth in the nation, tied with Michigan and UCLA.


More than 4,100 courses and 12,600 sections are offered at the UW. Majors are available in 151 bachelor's, 191 master's, and 123 doctor's and professional degree programs.

Some of the UW's departments ranked among the top ten in the nation in recent years include Sociology, Mathematics, Chemical Engineering, Economics, Political Science, Zoology, Geography, Statistics, History, Plant Pathology, Molecular Biology, Biochemistry, Spanish and German.

Much of the university's international academic reputation stems from the quality of its faculty. In fact, UW-Madison faculty or alumni have been awarded 11 Nobel Prizes, with Professor Howard Temin receiving the most recent prize in 1975 for his study of retroviruses.

The UW's Center for Health Sciences is one of the Midwest's leading centers for patient care, research and public service, and education of physicians and other health professionals. It includes the professional schools of Medicine, Nursing, and Pharmacy; UW Hospital and Clinics; the State Laboratory of Hygiene; UW Health Service; and the Wisconsin Clinical Cancer Center—one of 21 designated cancer centers in the country.

The Elvehjem Museum of Art, the second largest art museum in the state, houses the university's collection of more than 10,000 paintings, prints, drawings, sculpture, and decorative arts dating from 2300 B.C. to the present, and maintains an active schedule of temporary exhibits.



## **A Scenic Campus**



ocated between Lakes Mendota and Monona, amid rolling hills and wooded areas, Madison is one of the nation's most beautiful campuses.

The city was designed so the university and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of the academic and political life of Wisconsin.

Two major films, including the 1986 summer hit *Back To School* starring Rodney Dangerfield, have been shot on the picturesque UW campus.

Tree-lined Bascom Hill, which features a bronze statute of Abraham Lincoln, is one of the university's most famous landmarks. Others include North Hall (the first building on campus), Van Hise (the UW's tallest building at 19 stories), Library Mall, with its clock tower and fountain, and Picnic Point, a 129-acre peninsula complete with hiking and biking trails—one of the most romantic spots on campus.

One of the favorite areas for UW students to congregate is the Memorial Union and its lakeside Terrace. Here students can study or socialize against a backdrop of sailboats, canoes, sailboards, kayaks and swimmers, while enjoying the sunshine and cool breezes from Lake Mendota.







## The Student Body

ver 43,000 students populate the 900-acre UW campus, including more than 9,500 graduate students in numerous fields.

Although a UW Board of Regents policy limits undergraduate enrollment from outside the state to 25 percent, the university still maintains one of the nation's most diverse student bodies.

Students hail from every county in the state and every state in the nation, as well as from approximately 125 foreign countries. UW–Madison ranks fifth in the nation for total foreign student enrollment.

A greater effort is also being made to recruit and retain minority students. In 1989, African-Americans, Hispanics, Native Americans and other minority groups accounted for 6.53 percent of the student body, an increase from 4.67 percent ten years ago.

The university's diversity also shows in the more than 500 student groups. Organizations ranging from political action groups and student newspapers to recreational clubs, fraternities and sororities allow students to extend their collegiate life beyond the classroom. Film societies show 400 titles a year, and the intramural recreation program services some 35,000 students and staff at five indoor recreational facilities every month.



## The Chancellor



r. Donna E. Shalala is the first woman to ever lead the UW-Madison. She assumed her position as Chancellor and Professor of Political Science and Educational Policy Studies in January, 1988.

One of Shalala's major goals has been rededicating the institution to the "Wisconsin Idea"—confirming a commitment to public service and social welfare, as well as an awareness that the borders of the university extend to the borders of the state and beyond.

Dedication to public service has been a trademark of Shalala's career. She spent two years in the Peace Corps, teaching English and working in community development. While a professor at Columbia University, Shalala served as a Director and Treasurer of the Municipal Assistance Corporation for the City of New York, the agency set up to help solve New York City's fiscal crisis.

Shalala earned her bachelor's degree from Western College for Women in Oxford, Ohio, in 1962 and her doctoral degree from Syracuse University in 1970. She has received 14 honorary degrees, and has been elected to the National Academy of Education and National Academy of Public Administration.



## Athletics at the UW

he University of Wisconsin–Madison offers its students one of the most diversified and complete intercollegiate athletic programs in the country.




## Athletic Director Pat Richter

## Where Wisconsin Ranks

Since 1910, the University of Wisconsin has ranked on the top ten lists in every objective national faculty reputational survey. The quality of Wisconsin's undergraduate, graduate and research programs is recognized worldwide.

One recent survey rated 49 undergraduate programs at the UW–Madison among the top ten in the nation. The university has also ranked third for the last several years in research funding among the nation's universities.

In data taken from the 1983 Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States, Wisconsin tied for eighth in reputation for scholarly quality and second on the basis of faculty publications.

Academic, financial, and other rankings are summarized below to offer a flavor of the quality of the University of Wisconsin-Madison:

## **Funding**

- Federal Grants: The UW ranked eighth nationally in 1987, receiving 1.8 percent of the \$8.6 billion federal budget for university research.
- Research and Development Funds: The UW ranked third in the country for research and development expenditures in 1988, with almost \$286 million, according to the National Science Foundation.
- Tuition: Over the last ten years, tuition for resident undergraduates at the UW-Madison has been consistently lower than the average for public Big Ten schools. The UW-Madison has the second-lowest resident undergraduate tuition, behind the University of Iowa, and the third lowest nonresident undergraduate tuition of the public Big Ten institutions.
- Voluntary Support: The UW ranked tenth in the nation, and second among public institutions, in 1987–88 by receiving \$89 million in private support.
- Wisconsin Money Appropriated for Higher Education: Wisconsin ranked 21st in 1988–89 in the amount of state tax support appropriated for higher education per state resident.

## Research and Programs

- Research Activity Index: In 1986, the UW-Madison ranked second, behind Harvard, in a new multidimensional study that ranked research activity at U.S. universities.
- **Doctoral Degrees:** Between the school's founding and 1989, the University of Wisconsin–Madison awarded 26,928 Ph.D.'s—a number few institutions in the world can match.

## **Departmental Academic Rankings**

- **Broadcast Research:** Broadcast faculty at the UW-Madison rank second nationally in research productivity. Radio station WHA is the oldest radio station in the country. A cooperative program with UW-Extension and the Wisconsin Educational Communications Board, it has broadcast continuously since its founding in 1917.
- Business: The School of Business ranks fifth in the nation in research productivity. The faculty's scholarly output ranks first among business schools at public institutions.
- Forestry: In 1986, the UW's forestry department was named top research department in the country by the USDA.



- Journalism and Mass Communication: The faculty at the School of Journalism and Mass Communication was rated first in the nation in research productivity in 1988 by Journalism Quarterly.
- Plant Pathology: In 1986, the UW's Plant Pathology department tied for a first place ranking with the University of California-Davis.
- **Libraries:** The UW-Madison has the 13th largest university library system in the United States, with 5 million books in 44 locations across campus.
- **Graduates**: According to a 1987 *Wall Street Journal* survey, the UW produced the third highest percentage of CEO's at Fortune 500 industrial companies and at 350 Fortune 500 service companies.



# **UW Traditions**



### **Bucky Badger**

Although badgers in various forms had been the UW-Madison mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as "Bucky" was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans. In 1949, a pep rally contest was held to determine the best name for Madison's mascot. The name Buckingham U. Badger arose at the drawing and credit was given to a randomly selected sorority. The name is said by some to have originated in a line from "On Wisconsin" that exhorts the UW football team to "buck right through that line."

## **Band Caps**

When one of the Badger teams wins a game, the members of the band turn their hats around and wear them backwards. According to UW Band Director Michael Leckrone, the practice started in the 1920s to symbolize the band looking back at their victory in the days when they marched out with the departing crowd.

## **Graduating Law Students**

At Homecoming, graduating law students march down the football field and throw their white canes over the cross bar of the goal post. If they catch the cane when it comes down on the other side, they are supposed to win their first case. If the cane is dropped, the case will be lost. The custom originated at Harvard and came to the UW–Madison in 1910.

#### Halloween

In 1979, the Wisconsin Student Association began sponsoring what for years had been a spontaneous event—the annual Halloween State Street costume party. The party grew in size and fame each year as costumed revelers filled the eight blocks between the Capitol and the Mall. In 1988, WSA sponsored its first non-alcoholic indoor party at the fieldhouse.

### "On, Wisconsin"

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy of Chicago, with words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. The song was an instant hit at the UW–Madison campus and soon spread throughout the world, being very popular with military bands. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs. The copyright to "On Wisconsin" is currently owned by Michael Jackson, who purchased the music a few years ago from former Beatle Paul McCartney.


### "Varsity"

The traditional arm-waving at the end of the song "Varsity" was the 1934 brainchild of then-UW band leader Ray Dvorak. He came up with the idea after witnessing University of Pennsylvania students wave their caps after losing a game. Dvorak later instructed UW students to wave as a salute to UW President Glenn Frank.

#### Abraham Lincoln Statue

Unveiled in 1909 as a gift of the sculptor Adolph Weinman, the statue is the only replica of a statue he had previously erected in Hodgenville, Kentucky—Lincoln's birthplace. However, the inscription attributes the gift to Madisonian Thomas Brittingham, who had paid for the casting of the statue and the pedestal on which it was placed.

Lincoln is considered a patron of the university because he signed the Morrill Act in 1862 that provided federal aid to land-grant colleges such as UW-Madison. Tradition holds that Lincoln stands up when a virtuous coed passes by.



# Historic Buildings at the UW



#### **Bascom Hall**

Bascom Hall was constructed in stages to become the large building it is today. Bascom was originally called University Hall and later Main Hall. In 1920 it was renamed for John Bascom, president from 1874 to 1887. The architecture is of the classic Italian High Renaissance (Federal classic), Wren-modified. The building's original ornate dome was destroyed by fire in 1916. Bascom Hall houses the UW–Madison's main administrative offices including the Chancellor's office, Dean of Students office and Graduate School. It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places as part of the Bascom Hill Historic District.

## Camp Randall

During the Civil War, Camp Randall was used as both a training ground, the state's largest Army staging point, and a hospital and stockade for confederate prisoners. Today it is owned by the university and is the home of intercollegiate athletic and recreational facilities, a small park, and the Memorial Arch, completed in 1912.

## Memorial Library

Dedicated to those who died in our nation's wars, Memorial Library is the main research library. Along with the catalog for the holdings for campus libraries, Memorial houses the Mills Music Library, the official archives of the university, and an extensive rare books collection.

### **Memorial Union**


Memorial Union has been called the "living room of the campus." With additions added steadily over the last half century, the Union now includes several dining rooms, theaters, study halls and game rooms, as well as the lakeside Terrace. In 1933, Memorial Union became the first public university union in the country to sell beer.

#### North and South Halls

North Hall was the first building erected by the university (1851), serving as a dormitory for male students. Later it was converted into a classroom and office space. In 1966, North Hall became a National Historic Landmark.

South Hall has had a wide variety of uses, including housing the old Department of Agriculture and the Hygenic Laboratory. Now it houses the dean and administrative staff of the College of Letters and Science.







# **The Community**

adison is the home of both the University of Wisconsin and the state capital, in addition to being one of the Midwest's most vibrant communities.

With a diverse population of 180,000, the Madison community offers an endearing quality of life, both for its full-time residents and students. It offers the "big city" spheres of politics, arts and entertainment, as well as the attributes of a small town atmosphere. It is a family-, action-oriented community that promotes participation in government, education, the arts, sports and recreational activities.

The May 1989 issue of *Outside* magazine rated Madison as one of the top 15 "great sports towns" in the country, based on such factors as quantity and quality of outdoor activities, the surrounding environment, and the participation of its population in various sports and recreation.



### Red Gym

Built in the Norman style in 1894, with Romanesque arches and heavy turrets, the Red Gym was originally intended as an armory and a gymnasium for men's physical education. A fire during the Vietnam protest era closed the gym for a few months in 1970. The building was included in the Bascom Hill Historic District in 1974. The report of a campus committee studying renovation in 1989 called the gym "a gateway building to the campus because of its central location and its historic architecture—a friendly and welcoming place for visitors, prospective students and their parents, and primarily undergraduates from all our academic schools and colleges."

#### Van Hise Hall

Built in 1967, at 19 stories, Van Hise is the tallest building on campus. The 17th floor houses the administration of the University of Wisconsin System. Van Hise Hall is to the UW System what Bascom Hall is to UW-Madison. Several foreign language departments make their homes here, and classrooms are located in the lower five floors.

cademic excellence is emphasized at Wisconsin. Much of the credit for the impressive academic record behind many Badger athletes is the counseling system available to the men and women student athletes.

Three full-time staff members, Associate Athletic Director Jan Wheaton and Counselors Alan Zussman and Mary Weaver, conduct the Wisconsin Student Affairs program offered to the nearly 900 Badger athletes. The advising staff has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all University departments.

For those athletes who do request assistance, Jan, Alan, and Mary offer counseling sessions on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. Wisconsin athletes are encouraged to be degreeoriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The counseling staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, whether the needs be personal or academic in nature.

# UW Sports Facilities

thletes at the University of Wisconsin benefit from some of the finest sports facilities found anywhere in the country. From practice and competitive areas to athletic and weight training, Wisconsin offers modern and well-equipped facilities for its women athletes.

The basketball and volleyball teams practice and compete in the Wisconsin Fieldhouse, which seats 12,204. The Fieldhouse features four remodeled locker rooms and a modern athletic training area. Other recent additions include a new lighting system and new sound system.


The Wisconsin tennis teams have a competitive advantage in their ability to play year-round at one of the best college facilities in the United States. In 1984, the Nielsen Tennis Stadium was ranked by the USTA as the number one indoor tennis facility. It seats 1500 spectators and is valued at over \$8 million. It features 18 tennis courts (12 indoor and six outdoor), five squash courts, and one squash doubles court.

The stadium, located close to the lakeshore dormitories, is named for Arthur C. Nielsen, founder of the Nielsen television rating system. Nielsen captained the Wisconsin men's tennis team from 1916 to 1918 while a student in electrical engineering.

Wisconsin's track teams benefit from practicing and competing during the indoor season in the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center. Located next to Camp Randall Football Stadium, the "Shell" contains a 220-yard Mondo rubber track, throwing and jumping areas in the infield, and a seating capacity of 2500.

During the outdoor season, Wisconsin track and cross country athletes have the opportunity to use one of the finest tracks in the Midwest. The newly renovated 400meter, Mondo rubber outdoor track is located on the west side of campus. The Dan McClimon Memorial Track, dedicated in honor of the former Wisconsin head men's track and cross country coach, was the site of the 1986 Men's and Women's Big Ten Outdoor Track Championships. Planning and fund-raising are underway for the next phase of construction: the addition of permanent spectator seating with press box and locker room facilities.

The swimming and diving team has the luxury of having two pools where they practice and compete—the Natatorium adjacent to Unit II, and the new Unit III facility, or SERF. The "Nat" contains an

eight-lane, 25-yard racing pool equipped with a fully automatic Colorado Timing System and digital readout score board. The 50' × 40' separate diving well is fitted with three one-meter and two threemeter Dura (Maxi) Flex boards. The recently completed Unit III facility features an indoor long course pool with movable bulkheads that more than double the program's training space.

The Wisconsin men's and women's gymnastics teams train and compete in the renovated Armory located on central campus along Lake Mendota. Better known on campus as the Red Gym, the facility provides over 15,000 square feet of training space and specatator seating. Gymnasts are provided plenty of working space and

equipment, including a large foam training pit, 10 balance beams, four sets of uneven parallel bars, and ample floor exercise practice space.

Outdoor facilities at Wisconsin include soccer fields near the University Hospital. The crew boat house, situated on Lake Mendota, provides the Badger crews with a modern facility, including an indoor rowing tank for year-round practice. Construction was just completed on an additional shell storage area, and other construction plans include a second indoor rowing tank and additional locker room

Our teams also have access to several other facilities on campus. The McClain Athletic Facility offers an indoor practice facility for soccer, as well as lockers for both the women's track and soccer teams. The Natatorium and SERF feature numerous multi-purpose gyms, weight rooms, running tracks, and other athletic facilities for practice and competition.

Other facilities that are an integral part of the athletic program are the coeducational weight training and sports medicine rooms in Camp Randall Stadium. The modern weight training area features Nautilus equipment, free weights, and stereo music in a spacious, fully carpeted room in Camp Randall. Two full-time weight training instructors monitor and advise all Wisconsin student-athletes.

The care, prevention and treatment of injuries to all Wisconsin athletes is supervised by a six-person staff of N.A.T.A.-certified athletic trainers. They are supported by a staff of 25 student trainers and two certified graduate assistants as they care for the nearly 900 men and women athletes at Wisconsin.

The staff utilizes training rooms in the Stadium, Armory, Coliseum, Natatorium, and UW Fieldhouse. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus. Other medical specialists assigned to intercollegiate athletics also assist in the diagnosis and treatment of the athletes.





The SERF or Southeast Recreational Facility features numerous multipurpose gyms, a suspended running track, and an Olympic-size pool.



The "Shell," located next to Camp Randall Stadium, includes a 220-yard Mondo rubber track as well as throwing and jumping areas utilized by the men's and women's track and field teams. The teams have lockerrooms in the adjacent McClain Athletic Facility.



The UW volleyball and men's and women's basketball teams practice and compete in the UW Fieldhouse. Competitions in wrestling and gymnastics as well as special campus events also take place in the II,886-seat facility.

**Photographers:** Photographers may work from any side of the floor, or end of the court.


