#### By-Laws

- 1. That the Laws of the Regents be amended as follows:
- (a) Chapter II, Section 11 (page 134). The registrar has general charge of the registration and records of students. In the performance of his duties he is directly responsible to the seeretary-ef-the-faculty president.

(b) Chapter III, Section 2, Paragraph (4) (page 138). A secretary to the university faculty shall be appointed. Such secretary shall be nominated to the regents by the president of the university, with the approval of the university faculty. He shall be a member of the faculty and shall be an administrative officer of said faculty and responsible to it, and to the president of the university, for the execution of such matters of university faculty character as are administrative or routine in character and as are not otherwise especially provided for. He shall be the educational archivist of the university, and in that capacity, he shall collect, arrange, and preserve in a central office, all educational records and statistics. He-shall-be the-officer-te-whom-the-registrar-is-directly-responsible-in-the performance-of-his-duties. He shall act as secretary to the university faculty and shall cause the educational records and statistics to be codified and indexed at least as often as once The faculty shall provide for such committees and make such rules and regulations in regard to their own proceedings as in their judgment are called for by the best interests of the university.

Upon motion of Regent Faast, seconded by Regent Waters, it

was

VOTED, That Regent Grady be unanimously elected President.

An informal ballot was taken for Vice-President. Fourte ballots were cast, of which Regent Gundersen received one, Regent Waters one, Regent Callahan one, Regent Olbrich two and Regent Faast nine.

Upon motion of Regent Waters, seconded by Regent Hirschman,

it was

VOTED, That Regent Faast be unanimously elected Vice-President.

Upon motion of Regent Callahan, seconded by Regent Schmidt-mann, it was
VOTED, That the rules be suspended and that M. E. McCaffrey be unanimously elected Secretary for the ensuing year.
