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

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INTRODUCTION

My goal in this project has been to take pictures of all of the stained glass windows in all of the churches in the cities of Neenah and Menasha. I started this project to have something to photograph during the winter. I like to take pictures, and I like to take them outdoors. But there are times in the winter when it is not fit to be out or there is little of interest to shoot. November and March are particularly drab. Out of this limitation of my imagination and of my intolerance for bad weather came these pictures.

There is a common theme. Photography and stained glass windows are both tools that use light to communicate. Photography is "writing with light"; stained glass, "painting with light." In my view, the important elements of a photograph include color, line and light. All three are necessarily present in a stained glass window.

As the pictures show, there is a wide variety among the windows. The windows of Our Savior's Lutheran and the Victory Assembly of God are very simple. Those of the Catholic churches in Menasha (St. John the Baptist, St. Mary and St. Patrick) are perhaps the most complex, with many pieces of colored glass making up each window. The windows of St. Gabriel Catholic Church are the most striking; each side of the sanctuary is lined with a wall of windows. I took their pictures late one sunny afternoon. The low light coming through the windows washed the entire area with a bath of many colors. Some of the windows are representational, depicting scenes from the Bible, typically from the life of Christ. Examples include Immanuel U.C. in Neenah, Evangel Worship Center in Menasha and the Catholic churches in Menasha. The windows in the Lutheran churches tend to be more symbolic and abstract. Some, such as those in the sanctuary at the Congregational U.C.C. in Neenah, have no obvious religious theme.

During this project, I have learned that the history of the churches closely reflects the history of immigration into the area. Broadly speaking, the first churches were founded in Neenah by English-speaking immigrants from New York and other areas out east. They formed the Congregational, Presbyterian and Methodist churches. Then came the Irish, the Germans, the Scandinavians and the Poles, who founded Lutheran, German Evangelical, Baptist and Catholic congregations. English-speaking people in Neenah then decided they wanted their own Lutheran and Catholic churches. After World War Two, population growth to the west and south of Neenah led to the formation of new Catholic and Lutheran congregations without specific ethnic roots. The picture is complicated somewhat by local church schisms and national denominational mergers and name changes. I claim no original scholarship to any of the church histories in this book. They are taken from histories kindly given to me by the churches, from Shattuck's 1958 *History of Neenah* and other sources which I consider reliable. Speaking of history, St. Patrick and St. Margaret Mary started construction projects after I took the photos for this book. Those projects are in progress at the time this is written. Perhaps I will shoot an update when the work is complete.

I have, as much as possible, followed a consistent pattern in arranging and labeling the photos in this book. Generally, I start as though one has entered the church and is viewing the windows starting with the wall to the viewer's left, going from the back of the church to the altar and then returning from the altar to the back of the church along the other wall. Special features, such as windows in vestibules, chapels, choir lofts and over doors are appropriately labeled.

Shutterbug stuff. The photos were taken over a three year period with a variety of 35 mm SLR cameras and film. The cameras included a 1987 Minolta 7000 with an f/1.8 50 mm lens, and newer Canon Elan Ile and Elan 7e cameras, both using Canon 28 - 135 mm IS and 22 - 55 mm lenses. Film included Kodak Gold 100, 200 and 400 print films, Fuji 200 HD and Superia 200 print films and Fuji Provia 100 slide film. Overall, the Fuji 200 Superia gave the best results, although it is too saturated to use when a shot has only 1 or 2 colors, especially if 1 of them is white (see, e.g., Martin Luther ELC altar). Second place went to the Fuji HD 200. The ancient Minolta, hand held using 400 speed film and the fast 1.8 lens, returned excellent results - see the office photos from St. Timothy Lutheran. I was not impressed with Kodak Gold 200 for this work, although the Kodak 100 did well. The Provia slide film also performed well (see the Martin Luther windows), but I am biased against slides because print film is so much more convenient. The Canon 22 - 55 mm lens is a huge bargain for anyone looking for a wider - angle lens and was indispensable for getting exterior shots of several of the churches.

Finally, the people. Everyone I met while working on this project was helpful, supportive and genuinely interested. All of the people at all of the churches were so welcoming. More than one pastor took the time to open up his church specially to allow me to come in and take my pictures. Several stuck around to be sure I found all the windows. I thank them all. I also owe thanks to the people who helped me turn the pictures into this album: to the photo department at the Neenah Walgreen's and the people at Photomax in Neenah for their attention to the reprinting of the pictures; to Bill Casper at The Hang up in Neenah for helping me select the paper to mount the photos on; to Dave at Rapid Printing in Neenah for getting the mounted pictures photocopied; and to folks at the Appleton Kinko's for some digital printing work. Perhaps most important, I thank my family for letting me turn the dining room into a workroom for several months.

FAITH UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

The Salem Congregation of the Evangelische Gemeinshaft of North America, was founded in 1856. It was the first German-speaking church in Neenah - Menasha. All the church records were kept in German until 1912. In April, 1905 the church meeting voted 24 to 6 that the church have an evening English church service. Beginning in June, 1916 both German and English were used during communion. The use of German in worship services was discontinued during World War One.

In 1940, the church's name was changed to the First Evangelical Church of Neenah . In 1946, the Evangelical Church merged with the United Brethren and the church became the First Evangelical United Brethren Church. After the E.U.B. and the Methodist Episcopal Church merged in 1968, the church adopted its current name, Faith United Methodist Church.


Like other churches in Neenah and Menasha, Faith U.M C. has continued to grow. After several moves (one occasioned by an arsonist's fire), the present church was cuilt on the corner of Cecil St. and Tullar Road in 1982. In 1996, an addition containing classrooms, office space, a choir room and a gymnasium was completed.









Altar and choir loft

Colored glass dates back to the Egyptians and Mesopotamians of the 3d century B.C. "Stained glass," as commonly understood has its European origins in the times of Charlemagne, 9th century A.D. The art first flourished in 12th century France, when many new, large cathedrals were built. The most popular subjects during this, the Romanesque, period were single standing figures. The style of the 13th century, the height of French stained glass, shows affinities with contemporaneous manuscript illumination. New construction techniques, such as the flying buttress allowed more and much larger windows and a greater variety in stained glass, including spectacular rose windows: huge circles of giass that look like radiating wheels and that usually depict the Virgin and Child. Other subjects include stories from the Bible and the life of Christ, the Last Judgment, prophets and evangelists, legends and lives of the saints, coats of arms, history, the signs of the zodiac, and the labors of the months. The Renaissance of northern Europe, emphasized meticulous attention to realistic detail, and led artisans to paint pictures on glass rather than with glass. By the 16th century, stained glass was declining as an art form, in part due to the influence of the Reformation. During the Gothic Revival of the 19th-century, English and French restorers worked to rediscover older techniques.





FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF NEENAH

The First Presbyterian Church has as much the look of a small college campus as a community church. The church was formally organized on Dec. 15, 1848 with 17 members. It was formed just as the Presbyterian Church, nationally, was splitting over the doctrine of predestination. In 1860, the Neenah congregation separated into two churches over the issue, only to be reunited 10 years later. Who could have guessed? The congregation moved to its current location in 1954. The church building contains many works of religious art and religious symbols. In addition to the main worship area, the church has a beautiful, separate chapel, unique to the churches in the cities of Neenah and Menasha.








FIRST UNITED METHODIST CHURCH OF NEENAH - MENASHA

108 West Doty Avenue Neenah, WI 54956 920-725-0166

The forerunner of this congregation, the Methodist Episcopal church, held its first service in 1849. For nearly 15 years, the congregation met in the upper room of a shop located on East Wisconsin Avenue In 1864, the church bought its first building at the corner of Oak and Doty Streets in Neenah. After 10 years, the congregation moved to a larger building on Wisconsin Avenue. In 1906, a new building was constructed at the church's current location; this building was destroyed by fire in 1937 and was rebuilt by 1939. Several additions have been added since, with the last completed in 1991.

Most of the original congregation were English-speaking settlers. Over time, the church absorbed groups of Norwegian, Danish and Welsh Methodists, as well as smaller country congregations. The church became the First United Methodist Church of Neenah-Menasha in 1968 after the national merger of the Evangelical United Brethren Church and the Methodist Episcopal Church.











GLORIA DEI LUTHERAN CHURCH

The church was organized effective June 4, 1967. There were 176 members, including thirteen families whose membership was transferred from Our Saviors Lutheran Church. By 1970, membership had grown to 537. A new addition was dedicated in 1979. The congregation joined the New Evangelical Lutheran Churches in America in 1987; two years later, the congregation became part of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. Membership has continued to grow and another new addition was completed in 2001. The church's vision is to spread the gospel through faith in action. It supports many missions and charities. Its members are active in a wide variety of charitable volunteer activities.




IMMANUEL UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST



The purpose of Immanuel United Church of Christ is, "the worship of the triune God; the preaching of the gospel of Jesus Christ; the practice of loving service; the furtherance of Christian unity and the promotion of Christian fellowship in the community."

The congregation was organized on January 11, 1874 with 30 charter members. The first worship service was held a month later. Six months after that, the church bought its first building from the Methodist Episcopal Church for \$625.

It is uncertain whether the church had any denominational affiliation during its first 50 years; however, titles appearing on some of the stained-glass windows are evidence that at least a large number of its members were German speaking. In 1925, the church officially associated with the Evangelical Church of North America. That denomination merged in 1936 with the Reformed Church to form the Evangelical and Reformed Church which, in 1962, merged with the Congregational Church to form the United Church of Christ.


Martin Luther Evangelical Lutheran Church was organized on December 15, 1941 as a mission church of Trinity Lutheran Church. The Rev. A. F. Geiger was the first pastor. It included former members of Trinity Church and newcomers from Neenah's west side. The Church met temporarily at the corner of Van and Adams Street. The first Church was completed in November, 1947. The permanent Church was built in 1955; the first Church was then converted into a church school.





OUR SAVIOR'S LUTHERAN CHURCH

809 South Commercial Street Neenah, WI 54956 920-725-3956

Our Savior's is an, "immigrant church," founded by approximately 66 Danes and Norwegians in September. 1872. Two years later, the church called its first full-time pastor, Pastor Thomsen, for an annual salary of \$400. He was a vinegarish fellow, chastising a couple during their wedding ceremony for having lived in adultery up to that time, carping about a successful church bazaar held by the women of the congregation and admonishing wives not to nag their husbands.

The church began to lose its Danish identity in the early 20th-century. The first English sermon was given in 1910. In 1918, all Sunday school classes and half the worship services were held in English. In 1930, the congregation voted to take the word, "Danish," out of the church's name; by 1938 all church services were conducted entirely English.


After several relocations, the current church building was built in 1956. An education and fellowship hall was added in 1969.




PEACE LUTHERAN CHURCH

In September, 1960, 36 people met to discuss the possibility of organizing a Missouri Synod Lutheran Church in Neenah. The result of that meeting is Peace Lutheran Church. Located on South Park Drive, the church grew to 721 members by 1997. The original building has expanded twice to serve its growing congregation. The church stresses a solid Bible tradition and a strong missions outreach. The congregation has an active youth ministry and Sunday school program in addition to its worship services.











SAINT GABRIEL ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH



As Neenah's population grew after the Second World War, the City spread to the west and the south. Several churches were founded to serve the increase. Unlike many of the earlier churches, these new congregations are not tied to a specific ethnic group. St. Gabe's is one of these new churches, started in 1959. Its founding committee included folks of German, Irish, English and Dutch heritage. Ironically, though, St. Gabe's, the newest Catholic church in Neenah and Menasha, is geographically closest to the first RCC church in the area, the St. Malachy Mission Church, started in the late 1840s, to serve a group of Irish settlers in the Town of Menasha. The settlement is recalled to this day by the name of a street in the Town of Menasha, Irish Road.



SAINT JOHN THE BAPTIST ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH

St. John's is Menasha's Polish Catholic church. It was founded in February, 1888, when 75 families of Polish descent left St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church in Menasha to establish a parish of their own. Casmir Weisgerber led the efforts to organize the new church. The church building was built in six months for approximately \$5000. The church moved to its current location on the corner of Fifth and DePere Streets in 1900. By 1901, the congregation had approximately 800 members. The church school was started in 1903 and graduated its first two students in 1917. During World War I, the Ladies Auxiliary did its part for the war effort: sewing and knitting for the Polish Army! The last Polish sermon was given in 1946. The church has continued to grow in a series of building projects. The church celebrated its centennial in 1988, and looks forward to many years of continued service to people of all ethnic backgrounds.

SAINT MARK'S EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCH

In 1957 Pastor Charles Luhn moved to Neenah to organize a new church affiliated with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. He spent the next six months fishing for men, and in August, 1957, 73 people met to begin St Mark's Evangelical Lutheran Church. The first service was held that September; the church was formally founded in February, 1958 with 165 members. At first, it was a peripatetic congregation, meeting in several locations, including a converted laundromat, until moving into its new church building in August, 1960. Further building projects have expanded the church since then.

The windows of St. Mark's were made by Oakbrook-Esser of Oconomowoc, Wisconsin and were dedicated on Sept. 25, 1988.









SAINT MARY'S ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH


St. Mary's was founded in the spring of 1867 as. "Our Blessed Lady" after the Catholic archbishop in Milwaukee ordered that German Catholics in Menasha separate from the congregation of St. Charles Borromeo (the predecessor of Saint Patrick Catholic Church in Menasha) and form their own parish. One year later, the church opened the first Catholic school in the diocese. The church burned down in 1883 and the present St. Mary' was built. Both the church and the school have expanded over the years. The school is now actually three facilities, a grammar school at St. Mary's, Seton Catholic Middle School at St. Patrick's and St. Mary Central High School located on Cold Spring Road in the Town of Menasha.

St. Mary's is the most ornate church in Neenah and Menasha. The stained glass windows, designed and constructed in Austria, were installed in the 1930s at a cost of \$400 each. The stations of the Cross are hand painted on tin and surrounded by hand carvings by William Laemmerich. Mr. Lammerich also carved two side altars, The Blessed Virgin's altar and St. Joseph's altar. These two altars and the main altar feature many statues and paintings. A full description is available from the church.












Windows above the entry doors

SAINT PATRICK'S ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH

St. Patrick's has its origin in the Saint Malachy Mission which was formed around 1848 to serve Irish Catholic families who lived in the, "Irish Colony," located west of Menasha. In 1854, Catholics in different nationalities throughout Neenah and Menasha came together to form the St. Charles Borromeo congregation. This group set about building a new church on Doty Island. In 1868, the congregation built a brick schoolhouse. St. Charles was destroyed by fire in March, 1882 and was replaced by St. Patrick's, in 1883. The old school was sold and a new one built in 1900. The school closed in 1987 and reopened in 1989 as Seton Catholic Middle School, serving all Catholic parishes in Neenah and Menasha.



SAINT PAUL LUTHERAN CHURCH


The history of St. Paul's English Lutheran Church demonstrates the size of the non-English speaking immigrant population in Neenah and Menasha in the early 20th-century. At that time. there were five Lutheran churches in the area: three German, one Danish and one Norwegian. English - speaking Lutherans wanted their own church. The Rev. William C. Stump, who had started the county's first English - speaking Lutheran Church in 1905, came to Neenah to explore the possibilities. He and a group of interested persons arranged for services to be held at a small chapel, owned by the Norwegians, on Bond street in Neenah. Services began in 1912. The new congregation bought the building in 1913. Membership grew rapidly. The building became more crowded each Sunday. Finally, the issue was forced when the weight of the people attending the service one day caused the floor to collapse. The congregation immediately bought land for a new church, which was dedicated in May, 1916. St. Paul's has remained at that location ever since, although the facility has been expanded through a number of building projects. The stained-glass windows which are shown here were, for the most part, installed in 1978. One panel of older windows, the "Oak Leaves," panel remains.























SAINT THOMAS EPISCOPAL CHURCH

Saint Thomas has its origin in the merger of two smaller Episcopal churches, Saint Stephen's which was founded in Menasha in 1859 and Trinity Episcopal Church which began in Neenah in 1869. Neither church was able to make a go of it over the long haul, so in 1914, the two merged under the name of Saint Thomas. The first church was built the following year, on the site of the current building. The first church burned down in February, 1961. The new building was completed in June, 1963.

The church's stained glass windows were made between 1931 and 1938. They were saved from destruction in the 1961 fire, were restored and incorporated into the the new building.







SAINT TIMOTHY LUTHERAN CHURCH

The history of St. Timothy Evangelical Lutheran Church begins in August, 1944, when Pastor Dwight Shelhart began canvassing Menasha hoping to find enough interest to establish another Lutheran church in Menasha. In September, eighty people gathered for the initial meeting; on October 29, 1944, two hundred seventy two people attended the new church's first service. The next week, the Sunday School was organized. The congregation is named after St. Paul's protege, Timothy, because 114 members of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Neenah, were allowed to leave to become charter members of the new church. The construction of the church building and the parsonage began in 1950. The new church building was dedicated two years later, on September 14, 1952. Twenty - one years later, the church expanded by adding extra Sunday School classrooms, meeting rooms, a lounge and a new office for the pastor. In 1987, the congregation became part of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America following the merger of the Lutheran Church in America, the American Lutheran Church and the Assn. of Evangelical Lutheran Church.














TRINITY LUTHERAN CHURCH OF MENASHA



Trinity Lutheran in Menasha began in 1857. The first church building was located on Chute Street between Tayco and Milwaukee Streets. By 1893, it was too small for the congregation's needs, so a new church was built acoss the street. That building served for 60 years, but it, too, was outgrown. In 1952, construction started on the current church; it was completed in 1957. Offices, additional classroom space for the school and a gymnasium were added in 1967.



TRINITY LUTHERAN CHURCH OF NEENAH


In 1857, circuit-riding German Lutheran preachers began holding services in the Neenah-Menasha area. Shortly before Easter, 1859, Pastor C. F. Waldt, was sent from Milwaukee by the Wisconsin Synod to Menasha. He took the steamboat, since the railroad only ran to Fond du Lac. He preached in Menasha and in other local communities and was responsible for founding several churches. In 1862, Pastor Waldt left for a church in Oshkosh. The Menasha congregation spiit. Most of its Neenah members and a few from Menasha were served in Neenah by visits from Pastor Waldt. This group founded Trinity-Neenah in 1865. Pastor Waldt returned to be the church's regular pastor until 1870. During the tenure of its next Pastor, Rev. Hagedorn, "[t]here was a lodge fight," referring, perhaps, to a decision to prohibit members from being Masons. Several members were expelled and, according to the church history, founded what is now Immanuel United Church of Christ. Some time shortly before the summer of 1875, the church started a Christian day school. After World War II, Trinity-Neenah became so large that it was able to spin off two new churches, Martin Luther Evangelical Lutheran Church on Adams Street in Neenah and Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church, west of Neenah.

WHITING COMMUNITY BAPTIST CHURCH

1020 Tullar Road Neenah, WI 54956 920-722-4312

Whiting Baptist Church was organized as the Danish Baptist Church in 1867. In 1898, the congregation merged with the Doty Island Baptist Church, and the combined congregations became the Union Baptist Church of Neenah. In 1916, George Whiting gave the church a parcel of property and a substantial gift of money to construct a new building. The new structure was dedicated in 1917 and the church's name was changed to Memorial Baptist church in memory of Mr. Whiting's wife and mother. The building was severely damaged by fire in 1922 but was promptly restored. Three years later, Mr. Whiting again made substantial contributions to the church and its name was changed to Whiting Memorial Baptist Church. Since then, the church has continued to expand, ultimately moving to its new location on Tullar Road.
