
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LAST SUNDAY'S CROWD THIS YEARS' JUST ARRIVED AT LARGEST

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THE FIRST FAIR IN THE COUNTY

The number of the coming Walk worth County Fair is given by Secretary F.M. Porter as the Ninety-fourth, dating it from the organization meeting of the original Walworth County Agricultural Society on April 25, 1842, just six years after the first settlement in the County.

Most of the early settlers were from New York and the New England States where the "cattle "show " constituted one of the three big gatherings of the year, the others being the celebration of the 4th of July, and the annual muster of militia.

The Fourth was celebrated as early 1837 in Troy where a dance was given at Othni Beardsley's upper room, a cross between an hall and a garret, with music by the Murray brothers on their violins.

A muster of militia was held on October 5th, 1842, when after a Summer of training under the leadership of Col. Elderkin, Lt-Col. Urban D. Meacham, Troy; Major James A. Maxwell, Bigfoot; Adjutant Abel W. Wright, East Troy; Captains, Lucius Allen, East Troy Company, Jas. Harkness, Sr., La Fayette Co., P.G. Harrington, Sugar Creek Company, -- Palmer, La Grange Company, J.L. Pratt, Whitewater Company and some others, a rendezvous was held in Elkhorn attending which it is recorded that including some companies from Racine County, there were some twelve hundred men.

A great military display it turned out to be. The soldiers came clad diversely, some with hats and coats, some hatless and coatless and as for arms every available shot-gun, long -tom, bell-muzzle, rifle and horse-pistol was put into some one's hands and yet many had to go through the drills with laths, ax-handles or broom sticks.

The field officers were dressed in the full military dress of the day. The Inspection was made by Gen. Bullen, and Col. was highly complimented on the soldierly bearing, excellent drill and fine discipline of his regiment, which he affirmed, surpasses any he had seen in the State.

It is quite likely that this military muster accounts for the fact that, although the Walworth County Agricultural Society had been organized, constitution and by-laws adopted and officers elected, no fair was held that year nor for seven years thereafter.

At that original meeting it was Col. Elderkin who was active in its organization. It was he who presented the resolution for the appointment of a committee on constitution. Some of the names of the promoters are John S. Boyd, Robert Holly, Wm.F. Lyon, Moses Bartlett (Spring Prairie), Gorhum Bunker (Troy), Norman Pratt (Whitewater), John Teets Horn (Richmond), William C. Allen (Delavan), Joseph W. Seaver (Darien), Jas. A. Maxwell (Walworth).

It was not until 1850 that a fair became a reality. Seymour and Homer Brooks, S.B. Edwards, the Furgitt. Brothers, Emery Thayer, John Fearnly, A.M. Perry, Augustus Smith, J.Pike West, S.G. West, S.M. Rockwood, P.G. Harrington and Col. Elderkin with some others put across a fair or cattle show at East Troy on October 16, 1850.

The Wisconsin and Iowa Farmer, an agricultural monthly, then published in Racine, on which F.K. Phoenix of Delavan assisted in the horticultural department commented on the Fair in part as follows:

---- The pleasure of the day was marred by frequent showers. Not-withstanding, the interest in the occasion was such as to call forth a large attendance of people.

The exhibition of stock was not over large, but of a superior quality.

The number of swine was small but also of superior quality. Dairy products limited but highly spoken of by the inspectors. The show room was filled thy threshold manufacturers, such as carpets, caps, bonnets and fancy work. A very fine article of figured gloves was shown by Mrs. John A. Larkin of East Troy reflecting great credit on the manufacturer.

The horticultural products were extraordinary for Wisconsin. Some twenty-five varieties of apples were displayed by F.K. Phoenix, as were many varieties of garden produce".

The report to the committee on October 25, 1850 which was signed by August Smith, President and Seymour Brooks, Secretary gives a list of the winners of cash prizes and ribbons.

The plowing contest which was postponed on account of rain was held on the 25th and it took one hour and two minutes for a yoke of oxen used and owned by a Mr. Petit to plow to quarter acre in a superior manner.

An organization was perfected and officers chosen to promote the fair for next year: President, Wm. Child; Vice- president, Robert K. Potter; Secretaries, Edward Elderkin and Seymour Brooks; Treasurer, S.M. Rockwood; Managers, T. Mower, Jr.; Williams Hollinshead, and Jacob Burgit.

gence required of them.




