Upon motion by Regent Fish, seconded by Regent Finlayson, the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System, held on December 9, 1983, were approved as mailed to the members of the Board.

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REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

#### Report of the President of the Vocational, Technical and Adult Education Board

Regent Zirbel, President of the State VTAE Board, reported first that President O'Neil had attended the Board's last meeting, at which a resolution of commendation was presented to Elizabeth Simpson, UW-Madison Dean of Family Resources and Consumer Science. This resolution added to the recognition she recently received from the American Vocational Association and also expressed special appreciation for her service to vocational education in the State of Wisconsin.

A major concern of the VTAE Board, Regent Zirbel continued, was the need to increase tuition--ten percent for the college parallel programs offered in Madison, Milwaukee and Rhinelander, and about 20 percent for the postsecondary and vocational adult education programs. It was recognized, however, that these increased rates were a necessity.

The VTAE Board heard presentations by two women representatives of the student organization, one of whom was studying agriculture and the other home economics. Both told of the benefits they received from being members and encouraged continued support by the State Board for such groups. Another presentation dealt with the successful articulation taking place between Waukesha County Technical Institute and the secondary schools within the district. It was felt this program could be used as a model for all technical schools and secondary schools regarding better use of staff, courses and student benefits. In other business, the Board approved a comprehensive development plan for Blackhawk Technical Institute.

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Concluding her report, Regent Zirbel said the VTAE Board was currently involved in adopting a mission statement in cooperation with the Governor's office. The statement was to set forth the VTAE System's mission, consistent with involvement by the district boards.

### Report of the Council of Trustees of the UW Hospital and Clinics

Regent Lawton, Chairman of the Council, reported that at its meeting the previous day, the superintendent had advised the Council of a continuing modest decline in admission and patient days, with the accompanying impact on hospital finances. Personnel had been reduced accordingly and the situation appeared to be under control.

Turning to a report on the public patient program, Regent Lawton noted that the Legislature last year had discontinued the long-time practice whereby the state shared equally with the counties in covering the expenses of welfare patients at University Hospital; instead, more funds were going to the counties for welfare costs. The definition of eligibility had thus become strictly a county function, and the impact on hospital finances and medical education were not yet known, although the situation was being carefully monitored. In answer to a concern previously expressed by Regent Grover, Regent Lawton emphasized that no patients, under any circumstances, were being turned away. When counties did not choose to send indigent patients to University Hospital, Regent Lawton explained, some were nonetheless being advised to go there on their own, in which case the hospital had to bear the expense. He added that if the amount of that loss did not remain in an acceptable range, it would be necessary to seek relief.

Regent Grover felt it was important to consider that the number of indigents served by University Hospital had decreased.

While that was true, Regent Lawton pointed out, it was not by the hospital's choice, since all who came were cared for. Noting that the decision was not within the university's control, he added that the counties had to pay the entire bill for patients they referred to the hospital, and after fifty years of paying only half of it, some of them were not enthused about that prospect.

With regard to another matter before the Council, Regent Lawton reported on a review of the faculty's clinical practice plan, through which physicians' fees collected from hospital patients were dispensed. It was

notable, he pointed out, that the faculty donated more back to the Medical School from those fees than any other clinical practice plan in the country. While the average clinical faculty salary was \$72,492, the average base salary from state funds was only \$19,795, most of the remainder coming from the practice plan. "I think that the misunderstandings that may arise from press coverage of the salaries of some of the physicians are not warranted because actually the state is getting a good deal in paying the smallest part of the salary. The practice plan is really supporting a top-notch faculty

Regent Grover, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, referred to the report of the Task Force on Teacher Preparation, noting that it would affect the university in many ways. Some recommendations could be implemented by rules promulgated by the Department of Public Instruction and some would require legislation, while others would need response by the university and the schools of education. "We think the report is exemplary, that it addresses all of the critical questions. We are very proud of it and we will circulate it nationally. We thank Paul Hassett of the Wisconsin Association of Manufacturing and Commerce for chairing that task force." The report was to be sent to the university for review.

Regent Grover then reported on a recent joint symposium for university and elementary/secondary education personnel, the purpose of which was to identify critical areas in their relationship, as well as to develop common bonds and understanding. It was expected that one result of the symposium would be to foster emerging relationships of System universities with redesigned cooperative educational service agencies.

Observing that some recommendations of the Task Force on Teacher Preparation were quite costly, Regent Beckwith expressed the hope that DPI and the UW System could work cooperatively in preparing for the next state budget and that one educational system would not be in the position of taking funds from another.

Regent Grover replied that the implications of the recommended \$20,000 salary level for teachers were not as threatening as they might first appear, since that salary figure would apply only after a probationary period. In addition, there were career-ladder and other choices that would have to be exercised in order to reach that range, which meant that it would take two or three years for the change to be effected.

#### Report of the Higher Educational Aids Board

President Beckwith noted that the report of the January 13, 1984, meeting of the Higher Educational Aids Board and the Wisconsin Higher Education Corporation had been distributed.

### Approval for Vice Chanchellor to Serve on Board of Directors of a Bank

Presenting Resolution 2973, President Beckwith pointed out that because the First National Bank of River Falls was a depository for university funds sec. UWS 8.03(1)(g), Wisconsin Administrative Code, required specific approval by the Board of Regents for the UW-River Falls Vice Chancellor to accept an invitation to serve on the bank's board of directors.

It was moved by Regent Fish, seconded by Regent Veneman and carried that the following resolution be adopted (Regents Hanson and Nikolay voting "No").

Resolution 2973: That, as required by UWS 8.03(1)(g), Wisconsin elovit - Approvue for Administrative Code, the Secretary be authorized to WW-RF Vice Chuncellow transmit the written approval of the Board of Regents to serve on Bd. ag for Richard J. #### Status Report on Proposed Ethic Code Revisions

It was not known at this time whether the committee would be prepared to make recommendations by the time of the March Regent meeting.

President O'Neil's annual report was presented to the Board. The report, which marked the beginning of his fifth year in office, began with a series of recommendations which he offered for the coming year. In addition to a fervent hope for improvement in faculty salaries, the following efforts were suggested: continuing and even closer relations with elementary and secondary schools; reexamination of undergraduate admission requirements; more rigorous long-range academic planning; renewed emphasis on the liberal arts in undergraduate curricula; a comprehensive, faculty-initiated statement of faculty rights and responsibilities; a coordinated university approach to alcohol abuse on campus and in society; compilation of courses and programs on nuclear war; identification of new ways to retain an international perspective in a time of shrinking horizons and world tensions; consolidation of university relations functions under a new vice president; and exploration of creative approaches to meeting student educational costs. The President then quoted from his report the premise on which those recommendations were founded: "Great universities flourish not by waiting for issues or problems to come to them, or even pass them by, but by anticipating and by reaching out. Most especially the history of Wisconsin's remarkable universities has been so characterized--as much in bad times for the state as in good times." Admission Standards/High School Graduation Requirements

Noting that there had been much discussion in the past month about both topics and their interdependence, President O'Neil said the Governor's proposal for high school graduation requirements envisioned an academic core consisting of eleven units--four of English, three of social science, two of mathematics, and two of natural science, plus two of physical education and health. The DPI/UW System Joint Council on College Preparation had recommended four units of English, three of social science, three of mathematics, three of natural science, and two of foreign language. While the Council's concern was with expectations rather than with requirements, he felt the high degree of consistency between the two sets of proposals was reassuring. Meanwhile, he added, a number of university faculties had been diligently addressing the question of entrance requirements for college. Noting that a full report on the subject was due by summer, he predicted that the Board would be pleased with the results. <u>Competence</u> - report on relationship of proposed high school graduation requirements to recommendations in Joint Council on College Preparation, P.5. #### Retirement and other Benefits

The President then reported that a comprehensive retirement bill, which was in the legislative process, included proposals that would be extremely welcome to the university community. The retirement credit multiplier formula, by which the number of years of state service determined the final annuity, would be increased from 1.3 to 1.6, and credit for military service would be available on a pro-rata basis rather than at what had been a rather high service threshold. The bill also contained a modified early retirement proposal, which was less generous than the open window of the previous year

> but still would be a great improvement over prior policies. Action was being awaited on two other adjustments-one dealing with credit for partial years of service before 1966 and the other to provide opportunities for limited return to work by retired persons. He expressed gratitude to Governor Earl, DOA Secretary Doris Hanson, DER Secretary Howard Fuller, and members of the Legislature for their support of these initiatives. tensor Report in Pending Legislation to remove limit ow sublaticular 6.

In another benefit area, President O'Neil reported that bills were pending which would remove completely the limit on faculty sabbatical leaves and which would permit the funding of promotions in academic rank outside the approved pay plan. He expressed special appreciation to Assembly Speaker Tom Loftus, Majority Leader Gary Johnson, Senator Joseph Czarnezki, and others who had strongly supported an improved benefits package.

Introducing the presentation, Regent Finlayson made the following statement: "I am repeatedly impressed with the many positive formal and informal offshoots of our great University System. None has impressed me more than our prison educational program, which I view as a revolutionary outreach of humanity toward a segment of our society so often looked upon as lost causes and not worth our efforts. By our involvement, our System recognizes that the incarcerated citizens of our society are still human, many in prison because of the lack of this recognition and the failures of our general society. By these on-site programs, we are making a commitment, assuming moral and intellectual responsibility for helping to restore human dignity and provide for maximum alterations in life styles, more meaningful citizen contributions that can make that all-important difference in our society in pursuit of a better world for all. Such involvement of our System is a source of great pride to me personally, and I would hope that we would always work to maintain and improve our position on the on-site prison programs to help fashion a better future for disadvantaged and troubled fellow citizens, to help accomplish some of the great unsolved tasks in human coping and survival. It seems appropriate that we end this introduction with the words of Albert Einstein: 'Strange is our situation here upon earth. Each of us comes for but a short visit, not knowing why, yet sometimes seeming to divine a purpose. From the standpoint of our daily lives, however, there is one thing that we do know: that man is here for the sake of other men, above all for those upon whose smile and well-being our own happiness depends, and also for the countless unknown souls with whose fate we are unmistakably connected.'"

Regent Clusen then made the following statement: "My familiarity with the Green Bay Correctional Institution educational programs goes back quite a way. I have through the years attended graduations, for instance, and have seen a significant change in what happens on that occasion, thanks to the growing involvement of the University of Wisconsin System in the program. For several years UW-Green Bay professors did teach on-site classes as public service at Green Bay. But in 1980 the situation changed dramatically when it became possible for inmates of the institution to pursue an associate of arts degree. For many inmates, this is their first satisfactory experience with any kind of an educational process, and I think it is particularly important

to note that, because, by and large, inmates do not have happy feelings in regard to their experiences in schools at the time they come to correctional institutions. The way in which this has been reversed and the growing demand for inmates to take part in these programs speaks well for what is happening within the correctional institution. I was also present at the PREP program graduation last spring, which I think adds an extra dimension. And if any of you ever have the opportunity to attend any of these, I hope you will do so. It is a moving experience, and I always recall what one inmate said, which is quoted in the sheet advertising the program: 'I never knew I had another choice.' So if the University of Wisconsin System does nothing more than to prove to inmates that there are other ways, that there are other choices, that they can learn, then something significant has really been accomplished.

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"It is certainly a difficult situation for university instructors who must work under the handicap of an ever-changing clientele. Some are there for a few months; some are there literally almost forever. In addition to that, the classes have to be scheduled around their schedule inside, and of course, the university must cope with this other kind of instructional demand. So it takes a special effort on the part of a lot of people. The relationship between UW-Green Bay and the Green Bay institution has been particularly pleasant, and it has been a matter of accommodation on both sides. It is also worthwhile on the day when you go to graduation and you see an inmate with a piece of paper in his hand which signifies that he has an associate of arts degree. I think it is significant to know that many of them continue their college-level education when they leave the institution, and perhaps even more significant is the fact that up to this time only one who has completed this program has ever been returned to the institution."

Ms. Jacqueline Ross, Director of the Postsecondary Reentry Education Program, showed two videotapes, the first of which concerned programs offered at the Oxford Federal Corrections Institution by the UW Center-Baraboo and UW-Stevens Point. It was noted that the Oxford institution, a medium security federal prison, had a population of approximately 670, representing an ethnic mix of 52 percent Caucasian and 48 percent minority, with an average age of 31 and sentences ranging from one year to double life. Since 1974 the UW Center-Baraboo had offered an associate degree program at Oxford, and in 1980 UW-Stevens Point began offering courses leading to a baccalaureate degree.

The unique aspect of the program was that persons who would normally not be encouraged to enroll in college were being educated. While all inmate students must meet the UW admission standard of having a high school diploma or its equivalent, over 80 percent entered the program with a high school equivalent certificate. Therefore, the need for educational support services was critical, and tutorial assistance in reading, basic mathematics and writing skills had been funded since 1977, primarily through federal grants secured by the Baraboo campus and the UW Centers.

The regular semester schedule consisted of 22 courses taught by UW Center-Baraboo and of four courses taught by UW-Stevens Point. Most of

the classes were in the evening since inmates were required to work at a prison job during the day. The Baraboo Center had developed and staffed an on-site library which supported the college program and provided a quiet retreat for students to work and study outside of their rooms.

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Experience indicated that faculty found this type of teaching to be both the most difficult and the most rewarding of their careers. For their part, inmates viewed it as a realistic opportunity for self-development. Faculty who taught at both Baraboo and Oxford commented that inmate students exhibited more candor, curiosity and willingness to participate in discussion than local campus students.

Because of the unusual nature of the setting and students, the annual spring graduation had attracted extensive media coverage. Recent speakers included System President Robert O'Neil and Acting Executive Vice President Reuben Lorenz. The entire educational experience gave the graduates and their families a vital sense of accomplishment and renewed direction.

Inmates interviewed for the videotape expressed satisfaction with the program. Some representative comments follow: "I do not want to spend the time that I have in prison without making good use of it, without having something that I can take with me." "My mother, particularly, is very satisfied. She even said when she went to my graduation this past summer here for a two-year degree that she was almost glad I went to prison." "It makes a difference in the way I react to people in here and in a big way, I think, to people out there." "I've seen guys change their life because of this college program. They have values now; they have goals."

The UW Centers' PREP program and the UW-Green Bay program were described in the second videotape. Together they offered 22 university programs to inmates at state prisons, the earliest of which was an associate of arts degree started by UW-Green Bay in 1971 at the Green Bay correctional facility. Established in 1981, the two-year PREP program served both the Kettle Moraine Medium Security Institution and the Taycheedah Correctional Institution for Women. At the heart of both programs was the concept that some inmates were ready for higher education and that it would have a positive effect on their chances to succeed when they reentered society. Because college study could assist inmates in preparing for the responsibilities of life, it was noted that what they learned could help keep them from later returning to prison and that the cost of education was considerably lower than the cost of housing prisoners. The UW-Green Bay and PREP programs also followed up their work with inmates by providing tutorial, advising and other assistance to those who wished to continue their education after release from prison.

Following are some quotations from the videotape: Walter Dickey, Administrator of the State Division of Corrections: "I think we're basically interested in many of the things that a university is interested in; that is, developing the potential. And that means that when people are at the point where higher education is critical to that potential, we think it is very important to have it available to them." Lorman Ratner, Executive Dean of

the UW Centers: "If you believe that it is a value to society in general, as certainly we do, surely then it must be a value to those people who have had their problems in society." UW-Green Bay Chancellor Edward Weidner: "They are far more attentive as students; they are very careful about preparation. They excel and therefore their professors are really very pleased to teach such students."

Prison administrators: "Many have been denied opportunities in the past. There is no question of that. The educational program provides them with a glimmer of light. And for many of them their life has been devoid of that type of light." "I have seen people who have come in here for some very violent crimes, and I've seen them set some goals and be involved in this program, taking good advantage of it and really settling down. What you can strive for and what you hope will come about in this institution is that men will control themselves. Men who are capable of controlling themselves in an institution, hopefully, when they get outside will continue to exercise those kind of controls."

Inmates: "I would have never killed a person if I would have known then what I know now because then I would have known that I had entirely different choices." "I was out quite a few times, and I went out for nothing. But now I'm going out with something, something to prove that while I was incarcerated I did something with my life." "Figure the cost benefit analysis. A person that goes in here for ten years and does three or four years: he goes back out and he hates society; he doesn't have a good profession; and he wants revenge for all that loneliness he's gone through. Then you take a person who's had a good educational program: he'll probably further himself educationally or go out and get a good job and start producing." "In the ten months I've been here, the more PREP students we had, the less violence there is, and more discussion on any subject without any argument." "Right now it means a chance at a life that I would have never really been able to live because of my being a criminal."

Instructor: "Education is an excellent mechanism by which we can give persons those social skills that are absolutely indispensable to coherent, sane, safe, social function."

Ms. Ross then introduced officials connected with the prison programs: from the UW Center-Baraboo, Dean Aural Umhoefer and Samuel Lind, Program Director; from the Oxford Federal Correctional Institution, L. L. Ketchum, Associate Warden, and L. T. McKnelly, Supervisor of Education; from the UW-Stevens Point, Orland Radke, Program Director; from the UW-Green Bay, Robert Skorczewski, Assistant Program Director; from the Green Bay Correctional Institution, Donald Clusen, Superintendent; from the Wisconsin Division of Corrections, Walter Dickey, Administrator, and Pam Brandon, Assistant Administrator; and from the Columbia Correctional Institution, Oscar Shade, Superintendent.

Regent Fish inquired as to how the cost of tuition for inmate students was funded.

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In the PREP program, Ms. Ross replied, most funds for fees came from financial aids--Pell grants, WHEG grants and the TIP program. In addition, there was funding from the UW System and the Division of Corrections. Mr. Skorczewski added that the UW-Green program was similar, except that the share provided by the Division of Corrections was greater than in the PREP program because UW-Green Bay offered courses twelve months of the year, and students received no financial aids during the summer.

Commenting that the programs were excellent ones, Regent Fish asked if any inmates were denied entrance because of fiscal restraints.

Mr. Skorczewski responded in the negative, but added that there were some limits by reason of total budget amounts.

In the case of the Oxford program, Acting Executive Vice President Lorenz added, there also was federal aid of approximately \$50,000 a year.

In response to a question by Regent Lawton, it was indicated that there currently were 134 students in the Oxford program, 40 in the Green Bay program, and 90 in the PREP program. There had been a sizable increase in the number of participants, Ms. Ross added, due to cooperative efforts which enabled virtually any qualified inmate to pursue an education.

Regent Schilling inquired about having a program at the Waupun prison, and Mr. Dickey replied that to fund such an initiative was a high priority for the Division of Corrections.

Regent O'Harrow asked about measures to protect the safety of those who taught in the prisons.

It was indicated by Mr. Ketchum that teachers were required to be escorted throughout the institution and that there was periodic supervision of the education area by full-time staff. While there could be no guarantee that nothing would go wrong, he felt reasonable steps were being taken to assure the teachers' safety.

Mr. McKnelly said that in none of the prison systems in which he had worked had an inmate assaulted a teacher. "The basic reason for that is they know this program is for them. If they endanger it by assaulting a teacher, either the institution will shut the program down or the university will shut the program down."

There had never been such an incident in the state prison system, Ms. Ross stated, adding that inmates frequently were more courteous than many typical college students.

Dr. Radke explained that, if it appeared a problem might arise, inmates quickly stepped in to control their own group.

Regent Beckwith asked if there were comparable programs in other states.

While there were many on-site programs, Ms. Ross replied, the Wisconsin initiative was unique in its emphasis on reentry into society. The assistance given to former inmates in continuing their education after release from prison included counseling, tutoring, life-coping skills and a number of other educational opportunities which were not part of most programs in other states. Mr. Skorczewski explained that, in the 1960s, prison programs were started nationwide with the aid of federal funding. Many failed, however, because of lack of attention to adjustment to life outside of prison. Other states were now looking to Wisconsin as a model for that aspect of the program.

It was noted by Chancellor Hannah that there also were prison programs in Minnesota and that inmates were sent to a particular institution with the expectation that they had the ability to pursue college-level studies.

Ms. Ross added that Wisconsin's program also included informing incoming prisoners about what was offered. If interested, they were sent to appropriate institutions. The program thus provided assistance from the time of entry into the prison system, through the time spent there, and back into the community.

Ms. Susan Znidorka, President of United Council, spoke first about approval of new academic programs. Noting that the Board had carefully assessed the element of need in considering proposed doctoral programs in nursing at UW-Madison and UW-Milwaukee, she commented that much less information was provided for two other programs which were being presented for a first reading--an M.S. in Integrated Pest Management and a B.S. in Pharmacology-Toxicology, both at UW-Madison. She did not feel documentation of need, demand and estimated cost of these programs was adequate. Expressing the view that this disparity reflected problems inherent in existing approval procedures, she suggested that in the stage one phase (preliminary entitlement to develop a proposal) more information should be provided to the Board concerning the need and demand for programs, and that stage two (authorization to plan) should also require uniform need analyses for all proposals. She thought that such analyses for programs at the approval stage should reaffirm the need assessed during entitlement and would protect against unnecessary program duplication. With reference to comments regarding the great amount of time and effort invested in both nursing proposals before they reached the Board, she felt it was important to adhere strictly to the description of programming required for the approval stage, as outlined in System Academic Information Series Paper #1, which stated that the description was to stop short of demanding extensive faculty and administrative time and energy commitments and that not until after approval should a detailed, comprehensive proposal be developed by the institution.

Turning to current United Council activities, Ms. Znidorka reported on the legislative leadership conference for students held on June 27-29, 1983, at UW-Madison. Of special interest was a symposium on faculty compensation, which featured six panelists answering questions regarding the different aspects of the faculty pay issue. Panelists were Regent President Beckwith; Harold Bergan, policy aide to Governor Earl; Rex Reed, policy analyst for the

Blaney Institute; Anatole Beck, UW-Madison professor; Tim Kelley, past editor-in-chief of the <u>Daily Cardinal</u>; and State Representative Charles Chvala. On behalf of the students, she thanked President Beckwith for his participation and insights regarding the impact of pay levels on educational quality. The conference also included workshops on financial aid, student services, affirmative action, effective lobbying, organizing to prevent sexual assaults, and women's rights. Appreciation was expressed to Regent and Mrs. Lawton for attending a reception following the workshops. Additional activities at the conference were devoted to training in voter registration, publicizing legislative votes on key issues and voting by absentee ballot.

In other business, United Council approved retaining a Madison CPA firm to do an audit which was to include recommendations for internal financial controls. The Council also appointed Mr. John Skare as its executive director.

Concluding her remarks, Ms. Znidorka indicated that student concerns ranged from escalating tuition costs to alcohol awareness, faculty collective bargaining, academic staff review, and child care on individual campuses. ted Chuncil - financial audit to be Conducted, p. 12

While he did not disagree with Ms. Znidorka's comments on new academic program development, Regent Beckwith pointed out that Ph.D. proposals generated considerably more input and documentation than did types of programs.

Chairman Schilling reported for the Committee.

#### Doctoral Programs in Nursing

At a portion of the Committee meeting to which all Regents were invited, Vice President Lyall presented her recommendation that no new doctoral programs in nursing be approved at this time. The Committee then heard lengthy testimony by advocates of the two proposed programs--the Ph.D. in Nursing and Psychology at UW-Madison and the Ph.D. in Nursing at UW-Milwaukee--as well as from those who favored doctoral-level nursing education in general.

Noting that minutes of the Committee meeting would reflect in more detail the nature of the discussion and that copies of the written statements presented were available in the Board office, Chairman Schilling reported that, after Regent discussion in Committee, a number of motions were made and acted on.





It was first moved by Regent Lawton and seconded by Regent Clusen that both Ph.D. programs in nursing be forwarded for a second reading in March, with a recommendation that they be approved for implementation at that time. Regent Nikolay moved that the question be divided and the motion was seconded by Regent Grover. The motion to divide passed on a roll call vote with Regents Beckwith, Fish, Gerrard, Grover, Knowles, Nikolay, O'Harrow, Schilling, Veneman and Zirbel voting "Aye " (10), and Regents Clusen, Conroy, Finlayson, Hanson and Lawton voting "No" (5).

The first part of the motion, that both Ph.D. programs be forwarded for second reading in March, failed on a roll call vote, with Regents Clusen, Conroy, Finlayson, Hanson, Lawton and O'Harrow voting "Aye" (6), and Regents Beckwith, Fish, Gerrard, Grover, Knowles, Nikolay, Schilling, Veneman and Zirbel voting "No" (9).

Regent Beckwith then moved and Regent Veneman seconded that System Administration bring to the Board, at the March meeting or the April meeting at the latest, a proposal for a single Ph.D. program in nursing. During discussion, Regent Veneman withdrew his second and Regent Nikolay seconded the motion. Put to a roll call vote, the motion failed, with Regents Beckwith, Fish, Grover, Knowles, Nikolay, Schilling and Zirbel voting "Aye" (7), and Regents Clusen, Conroy, Finlayson, Gerrard, Hanson, Lawton, O'Harrow, and Veneman voting "No" (8).

Regent Gerrard then moved and Regent Veneman seconded reconsideration of Regent Lawton's motion to forward both Ph.D. programs for second reading in March. The motion to reconsider passed on a roll call vote, with Regents Clusen, Conroy, Finlayson, Gerrard, Hanson, Lawton, O'Harrow and Veneman voting "Aye" (8), and Regents Beckwith, Fish, Grover, Knowles, Nikolay, Schilling and Zirbel voting "No" (7). Reconsideration having been approved, Regent Lawton's motion to forward both Ph.D. programs for a second reading in March was then acted upon again. The motion passed on a roll call vote, with Regents Clusen, Conroy, Finlayson, Gerrard, Hanson, Lawton, O'Harrow and Veneman voting "Aye" (8), and Regents Beckwith, Fish, Grover, Knowles, Nikolay, Schilling and Zirbel voting "No" (7).

It was then moved by Regent Beckwith and seconded by Regent Veneman that usual Regent procedures be waived; that this meeting be treated as a second reading of the Ph.D. in Nursing and Psychology at UW-Madison and the Ph.D. in Nursing at UW-Milwaukee; and that both of these programs be approved for implementation at this meeting. The motion passed on a roll call vote, with Regents Beckwith, Clusen, Conroy, Finlayson, Gerrard, Grover, Hanson, Lawton, O'Harrow, Veneman and Zirbel voting "Aye" (11), and Regents Fish, Knowles, Nikolay and Schilling voting "No" (4).

As Chairman of the Committee which had approved Regent Beckwith's motion, Regent Schilling then moved its adoption by the entire Board, and the motion was seconded by Regent Clusen.

Regent Hanson pointed out that the programs would be reviewed in five years, at which time a determination could be made as to whether expectations were being met.

Although they were fine programs, Regent Schilling felt approval of both was like buying two Cadillacs when only one was needed. "I am disappointed that the Board did not come to grips with the fact that there are going to be times when our good faculties come forward with good programs and, because of our coordinating function, we have to choose between them."

Expressing appreciation for Vice President Lyall's thoughtful and courageous report, Regent Beckwith stated that its excellence was in no way diminished by the fact that her recommendation was not accepted. He also commended the chancellors, deans and their colleagues for the outstanding presentations made at the Committee meeting. Although he thought that the Board would have acted more wisely to approve one program instead of two, he said he would vote for the resolution as a matter of reconciliation.

Although he, too, would have preferred one program at this time, Regent Fish said that, since the majority had voted otherwise, he hoped the Board would now approve both programs unanimously. He cautioned, however, that acting without a second reading should not be viewed as a precedent for future programs because it would not provide the checks and balances inherent in two readings. While he agreed with Regent Beckwith that in this case enough information had been presented and there was nothing to gain by waiting an additional month, he urged that in the future the procedure of having two readings should be followed.

Stating that he could not vote for the resolution, Regent Nikolay said approval of two programs was untimely, given the university's fiscal situation and the inadequacy of salaries for faculty. "You can't have it both ways. What are we going to tell those professors the next time they come around and say, 'Why can't we get a salary increase?' No money? And they are going to say, 'Well, you had money for two new programs; you had money for four new programs. Why don't you have money for our salaries?'" His position was based on lack of dollars, he emphasized, and not on any lack of respect for the nursing profession.

Regent Conroy predicted that the day would come when the state would be very proud of its doctoral programs in nursing and that their benefits would be felt in many ways that could not now be measured. She urged a strong vote in support of the resolution.

Regent Knowles said he would vote against the resolution because he thought it was wrong to depart from the established procedure of having two readings.

Indicating that he, too, would be voting "No," Regent Schilling said he was convinced that there was both need and demand for doctoral education in nursing, but that he favored one program--not two.

In view of Chairman Schilling's statement, President Beckwith ruled that the motion for approval of the resolution would be by Regent Finlayson, Vice Chairman of the Committee.

Regent O'Harrow indicated that he would like to be recorded as a seconder of the motion.

#### Deferral of Agenda Items

Due to the length of time devoted in Committee to discussion of the doctoral programs in nursing, a number of agenda items were deferred. These included phase IV of the Academic Staff Review, a report on faculty sabbatical leave awards, announcement of undergraduate teaching improvement grants, a report on the five-year review of the B.S. in Metropolitan Region Studies at UW-River Falls, a proposed amendment to UW-Madison faculty policies and procedures, proposed amendments to UW-Milwaukee academic staff policies and procedures, a proposed amendment to UW-Stevens Point personnel rules, revision of the UW Centers' constitution, approval of UW-Oshkosh personnel rules for faculty, and a progress report on evaluation of minority/disadvantaged student programs.

#### New Academic Program Proposals - First Reading

Continuing the report of the Education Committee, Regent Schilling summarized review of two new UW-Madison program proposals which were presented to the Education Committee for first reading: A Master of Science in Integrated Pest Management; and a Bachelor of Science in Pharmacology and Toxicology. Both were brought forward with affirmative recommendations from the System Administration Office of Academic Affairs.

UW-Madison Vice Chancellor Bernard Cohen introduced the Integrated Pest Management program, indicating that this degree would focus on cultural, biological, and chemical intervention for pest control and management. Requiring no additional staff, the program would draw on more than 40 faculty from seven departments in the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences. Enrollment of six to ten majors per year was anticipated, and it was noted that there were no comparable programs in Wisconsin nor in surrounding states. UW-Madison Associate Dean George Sledge and Professor John Andrews answered questions regarding the program. It was emphasized that monies were not being reallocated from other programs in order to implement this new major; rather, the program required a shift in faculty attention from one group of students to another within the same department.

Academic Programs-hu-Mon -first reading: M.S. Integrated Pest Management; and B.S. Pharmacology & Toxicology, pp 15-16 yx-neg. Integrated Pest Management, M.S. & Pharmacology & Toxicology, BS

The Committee then reviewed the Bachelor of Science in Pharmacology and Toxicology. It was indicated by Vice Chancellor Cohen that this new major was designed to provide students with a broad understanding of the principles by which chemicals and drugs affected the health of humans and animals, either adversely or beneficially. As a non-licensure program, it would enable students to gain access to courses previously open only to pharmacy majors with the addition of several courses in pharmacology and toxicology to complete the degree's offerings. Enrollment was expected to be approximately 25-30 students, drawn from both outside the university and from the biocore and pharmacy programs. Staffing would be accomplished by reallocation of faculty time and effort based on existing priorities, course demands, and needs within the School of Pharmacy. Resources for one full-time equivalent graduate assistant, a half-time classified staff member, and supplies/equipment would be reallocated from within the School of Pharmacy. It was noted that the Institute for Environmental Studies and the Department of Oncology were also integrally involved in the development and presentation of course work for the new major.

Chairman Schilling indicated that Committee discussion of both programs included considerable attention to the question of reallocation and sources of support.

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Committee's report was presented by Chairman Veneman.

Report of Gifts, Grants and United States Government Contracts

The Committee first reviewed a two-month list of gifts, grants and U.S. government contracts. It was reported that the year's total extramural support in the amount of \$197.5 million was \$43 million greater than last year, due to an increase of almost \$14 million for research (\$10 million from federal resources), a single \$20 million four-year contract (previously reported) and \$11 million more in student financial aid. The two month's activity included \$9.5 million in research grants from the National Institutes of Health for UW-Madison. It was noted that the NIH provided more funds to the university than any other single agency--approximately \$50 million annually--and that President Reagan had proposed a fiscal year 1985 increase of slightly less than 2% for that agency.

The following resolution was adopted unanimously upon motion by Regent Veneman, seconded by Regent Fish:

Resolution 2983: That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the gifts, grants and contracts presented at this meeting (copy on file with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

Mills had no previous University of Wisconsin affiliation but was interested in heart research conducted by the university. The bequest was estimated at \$125,000.

#### Report on the 1984-85 Budget

Regent Veneman summarized a report made to the Committee by Associate Vice President Gene Arnn on the following steps in preparation of the 1984-85 budget:

- 1. Allocation of \$5 million in 1984-85 above the 1983-84 level for improvement of instruction would be distributed to the universities and centers as scheduled in the policy paper approved by the Board in March 1983.
- 2. Continuation of \$4 million of fee income generated by additional student enrollments would be allocated on a one-time basis to the universities and centers for 1984-85. If enrollments were on target and revenue projections were accurate, a contingency reserve of one percent of the total income would be distributed after the actual fall enrollment was known. The spending authorization by the Department of Administration was for 1983-84 and 1984-85, its continuation in 1985-87 being subject to reconsideration in the state's biennial budget.
- 3. Unclassified pay-plan allocations would be distributed at 3.84 percent of the payroll base to each institution, and review guidelines for individual salary adjustments had already been distributed.
- 4. The amount of \$600,000 held in a systemwide account for the automation of library operations and interlibrary loans was being reassigned to current academic equipment purchases, a step which would place the equipment more quickly into the hands of faculty and students. The same amount of funding set aside for academic equipment purchases next year would be then spent on library automation on the basis of the plan now being prepared by a task force of library directors, computer directors and vice chancellors.
- 5. The schedule for annual budget actions by the Board of Regents was traditional for the second year of a biennium: in May, action on academic fee/tuition rates and segregated fees, along with approval of budgets for auxiliary operations and the UW Hospital and Clinics; in June, review of unclassified salary adjustments and other personnel actions; and in July, approval of the complete operating budget for 1984-85.

Approval of Request to the Department of Employment Relations--Service Credit for Retirement Purposes to Unclassified Staff on Leave of Absence

Associate Vice President Wallace Lemon reported on a request to the Department of Employment Relations concerning service credit for retirement purposes for unclassified staff on leave of absence. While such requests normally would be reviewed by the Board prior to submission to DER, this proposal had already been forwarded so that it would be on file prior to a meeting of the Joint Committee on Employment Relations. staff, while on leave without pay from the university, would be credited to the individual's account for retirement purposes. It was noted that retirement annuities were based on a formula, with years of creditable service being a major factor in the calculation, and that the letter which was submitted proposed that the entire contribution to the retirement fund--both the employer and employee share--be made by the employee himself or herself while on leave of absence. There would be no additional cost to the university.

Regent Veneman moved adoption by the Board of Resolution 2986. The motion was seconded by Regent Fish and unanimously voted.

Resolution 2986: That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Board of Regents endorses submission of the request to the Secretary of the Department of Employment Relations, pursuant to Sections 40.02(22)(e) and 230.12(3)(6), <u>Wisconsin</u> <u>Statutes</u>, to authorize the crediting of service for retirement purposes for faculty and academic staff of the U.W. System who are on leave of absence without pay from their employment.

Regent Beckwith inquired about how the retirement formula would operate if pending legislation were approved.

In response, Acting Executive Vice President Lorenz explained that the calculation would be years of creditable service multiplied by the average of the highest three years' salaries multiplied by 1.6 percent. For those in the executive pay plan, the percentage would be 2.0. WC-MURATON - Designation of Citizens Bank and Trust, WHUSHW, as a pushe depository for University funds, R. 2987 pp 21-22

Approval of Bank Depository for UW Center-Marathon County

Continuing his report, Regent Veneman presented a request for approval of a bank depository for the UW Center-Marathon County. The Citizens Bank was six blocks from the campus, while the First American Bank was about two miles away, and since one or two trips were made to the bank each day, the Center was recommending that the contingent fund be transferred to the Citizens Bank. There would be no service charges, check charges or balance requirements, the only charge to be for printing of checks, which was common in most small accounts around the System.

Upon motion by Regent Veneman, seconded by Regent Finlayson, Resolution 2987 was adopted unanimously:

Resolution 2987: That, upon recommendation of the Business Manager of UWC-Marathon and the Vice President and Trust Officer, the Citizens Bank and Trust in Wausau, Wisconsin, qualified as a public depository under Chapter 34 of the Wisconsin Statutes, shall be and is hereby designated, effective January 1, 1984, until further action, a public depository for certain moneys coming into the hands of employees of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for deposit to the appropriate account, and That withdrawal or disbursement from said depository shall be only by check, as provided in Section 66.042(6) of the Wisconsin Statutes, and that all checks be signed by one of the persons certified by the Secretary of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System as having been authorized by the Controller to make deposits to or sign checks drawn on the UWC-Marathon Contingent Fund Account.

Acting Executive Vice President and Trust Officer Lorenz advised the Committee that the Legislative Audit Bureau had started two surveys affecting the University System. One team was surveying student activities and student services across the System, upon completion of which LAB would determine the scope of its evaluation or audit. Four hundred staff days were committed to this project. Similarly, another team from LAB was surveying System Administration to determine if an evaluation or audit would be performed and the scope of such a project if it were to proceed.

It was also reported that the projected year-end uncommitted balance would be approximately \$1.5 million.

REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Chairman O'Harrow reported for the Committee.

UW-Green Bay: Approval of Major Project Concept and Budget Reports

The first item on the Committee's agenda concerned approval of three major project concept and budget reports at UW-Green Bay, the first of which related to energy modifications for five units at a total cost of \$585,000 (\$2.00 per square foot), providing a simple payback of 8.4 years.

The second concept and budget report was for the 1983-85 Student Commons addition at a cost of \$1,310,000--\$820,000 from non-GPR program revenue supported borrowing, and \$490,000 of non-GPR program revenues. The planned addition of 11,927 gross square fee/9,139 assignable square feet was intended to centralize student activities at a location convenient to the academic core and to existing student housing. The design concept was to be accomplished by building on the concourse level in the direction of the existing library and of the proposed buildings for the future School of Professional Studies.

The third concept and budget report involved primary electrical distribution system repairs at a cost of \$874,000 from GPR-supported general obligation bonding-minimum maintenance/health and safety allocation. The three-element scope of work and related estimate of cost needed to correct

deficiencies had been developed by the Division of State Facilities Management based on information provided by a specialized consultant testing firm hired by the Division, an independent examination of the distribution system, and consultation with campus physical plant personnel. Construction would involve the campus substation, the underground distribution system and electrical vault equipment.

After discussing the projects with System and campus staff, the Committee voted separately on each request, with unanimous votes cast for the energy modifications and electrical system projects. The Chairman voted "No" on the Student Commons request because it was to be an underground building, and there had been failures of plazas and underground construction around the System, costing many thousands of dollars. His intention in voting against the project was to call to the Regents' attention the need for more information about future underground building projects, since it was not known at this time what caused the kinds of problems that had been experienced. On behalf of the Committee, Regent O'Harrow moved adoption by the Board of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Nikolay:

> That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Green Bay Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the following concept and budget reports be approved and authority be granted to plan, bid and construct, at the cost and from the funding sources indicated:

In view of the Committee's discussion, President Beckwith divided the resolution so that project (2) could be acted upon separately.

The following resolution was adopted by a unanimous vote:

Resolution 2988: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Green Bay Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the following concept and budget reports be approved and authority be granted to plan, bid and construct, at the cost and from the funding sources indicated:

Stating that he shared Regent O'Harrow's concern about the student commons project, Regent Fish asked if the roof was flat, in addition to being below grade on two sides. The response was that the roof was to be earth covered and nearly level.

Regent Fish then observed that there was great disagreement in the industry about the effectiveness of thermal mass in such buildings because, while thermal mass did contribute to retention of heat during temperature set-back periods, it also contributed to retaining cold. "Thermal mass is not universally regarded. Some people believe that it has some answers, but most people do not in the industry. I am concerned with the design of this, and I will join you in voting 'No.'"

It was noted by Regent O'Harrow that a similar building at UW-Green Bay had not leaked. He reiterated, however, that more information was needed in the future about this type of construction.

In response to a question by Regent Beckwith as to why the building would be constructed that way, Chancellor Weidner referred to the campus plan which reflected the university's interdisciplinary emphasis by providing for a flow of students and faculty between buildings. A key element of that plan was interconnection at the concourse level of the academic core of buildings. Noting that 50 percent of the basic core of the campus had been constructed, he felt it would be dysfunctional to change concept at this juncture. Secondly, he said that the students, who would be the ones paying for the project, were interested in a location where student activity was centered. Since 80 percent of the campus traffic was at the concourse level, he thought that a second-level addition would not receive much use and that student programs located there would be ineffective.

The chancellor further indicated that the land was a story higher than the proposed building and that there would be some excavation to provide a level grade from the library center to the commons. Because there was a slant to the land on which the university was located, the building would be a grade lower than some of the other parts of the campus. While some buildings were on grade, others were on the concourse level at one story below grade. Stating that there was no other alternative to meeting program needs, he noted that the building next to the proposed addition, which was of similar construction, was the only one on the campus which had never leaked.

Pointing out that there had been problems with the campus roofs because they were built with a single membrane, not because they were above grade, Regent Fish felt the problem was now being compounded below grade.

Although UW-Green Bay had no trouble with an adjacent building, he observed that there had been costly problems with the plaza at UW-Milwaukee and with other such construction. He did not see why it was necessary to build an almost level, sod-covered roof below grade, rather than excavating in a way which would allow it to be above grade.

Replying that the students wished to use the roof as an outdoor area which would extend the plaza, Chancellor Weidner explained that the roof would look flat on top, but there would be a pitch underneath. He added that the project had the unanimous support of the student government, the student fee allocation committee and the commons board.

In response to question by Regent Beckwith, the chancellor said the plaza on top of the adjacent building was paved and planted. He added that there had been no problems with the building, which was about eleven years old.

Regent Conroy asked if the students would also pay for any serious maintenance problems, to which the Chancellor replied in the affirmative.

Regent Fish noted that the plaza repair at UW-Milwaukee was not paid fully from parking fees.

It was indicated by Chancellor Horton that part of the UW-Milwaukee project was paid by parking fees because of leakage into the garage, but that the primary problem was leakage into academic buildings.

Regent Finlayson inquired about the impact of not approving the project. Regent O'Harrow replied that the impact would be serious and that he hoped the Board would support the request, since it was a good building, in the right location, and the students were prepared to pay for it. "But the next time one of these projects is underground, whether they call it concourse or plazas or terraces, I'm going to again ask System Administration to reinforce my concerns about buildings underground. That is all I wanted to do."

The question was put on Resolution 2989, and it was adopted, with Regents O'Harrow and Fish voting "No."

UW-Madison/UW-Extension: Approval of Major Project Budget Increases

Continuing the report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee, Regent O'Harrow stated that the Committee approved a \$162,000 budget increase for the UW-Madison/UW-Extension Stores/Services Building Construction, bids for the project being in excess of available funds. The post-bid budget, including negotiated deductions, totaled \$2,484,000, although negotiations were to continue in an effort to reduce this figure prior to consideration by the State Building Commission.

It was moved by Regent O'Harrow, seconded by Regent Fish and unanimously carried that the following resolution be adopted by the Board:

Resolution 2990: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison and UW-Extension Chancellors and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the budget for the 1975-77 UW-Madison Stores/UW-Extension Services Building project be increased by \$162,000, from GPR-General Fund Supported Borrowing, for a revised total project cost of \$2,484,000 and authority be granted to award contracts.

### UW-La Crosse and UW-Stout: Approval of Land Purchases

The Committee then reviewed requests for purchase of two land parcels: one for UW-La Crosse and one for UW-Stout, from funding provided under the systemwide advance land acquisition allocation approved in September 1983. Each parcel was to be acquired at or below the average of two appraisals.

Upon motion by Regent O'Harrow, seconded by Regent Nikolay and unanimously carried, Resolution 2991 was adopted by the Board.

Resolution 2991: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-La Crosse and UW-Stout Chancellors and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, approval be granted to complete the following land purchases with funding authorized under the GPR-Advance Land Acquisition allocation:

UW-La Crosse - Bldgsthunds

Approval to purchase one 5,104 SF residential property located at 618 North 17th Street in the City of R 2991 La Crosse for \$33,750 plus an estimated \$5,000 for appraisal fees, closing costs and relocation expenses.

UW-Stout-Blogs & Wands

Approval to purchase one 8,174 SF residential property located at 1515 2nd Street East in the City of >R 2991, p.26 Menomonie for \$50,000 plus an estimated \$6,000 for appraisal fees, closing costs and relocation expendes.

#### UW System: Approval of Minor Projects

Regent O'Harrow then reported on consideration by the Committee of a series of minor projects. For UW-Eau Claire, there was a project involving the addition of solid waste compactors in nine residence halls at an estimated cost of \$210,000 from non-GPR program revenues. This request was based on a 1980 solid waste management study and was supported by the Eau Claire City/County Health Department and the Department of Natural Resources.

At UW-Madison, there was a request for \$239,500 of non GPR-program revenues for a Parking Lot 60/Observatory Drive extension project, which involved excavation of unstable base material from beneath the existing service drive through Parking Lot 60 (at the far west end of the campus) and extending Observatory Drive to its connection with Willow Drive on the north. Extensive repairs would be required during the summer of 1984 in order to continue using this road for bus traffic.

There were three projects to be funded from the GPR-supported minimum maintenance/health and safety allocation, the first being for \$40,500 to replace the twenty-year-old heating plant water treatment system at UW-Stout. At UW-Whitewater, the request was for \$245,000 to make repairs to the heating plant during the summer of 1984 in order to insure reliable operation of the facility during the 1984-85 heating season. The final project in this category was a \$40,000 systemwide study of hazardous waste management practices/procedures and preparation of an action report for handling and disposing of hazardous waste. A consultant would be retained to perform on-site inspections of present facilities and practices at each System location and to identify needs for hazardous waste management. The campus-specific recommendations resulting from this study would be brought back to the Board for approval.

The last item on the minor project list was a request for an additional \$200,000 from GPR-supported state building trust funds-energy conservation allocation for the 1983-85 small energy conservation projects program.

Adoption of the following resolution was moved by Regent O'Harrow, seconded by Regent Hanson and carried unanimously:

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The Committee was advised that bids for the UW-Madison Biochemistry Building remodeling project were opened on February 1 and appeared to be over budget, with the final figure still being negotiated. Future bid openings included the \$1,487,500 Goodnight Hall remodeling project at UW-Madison on March 1 and the \$650,000 nine-building energy modifications project at UW-Superior on March 8.

It was reported to the Physical Planning and Development Committee that the Joint Committee on Debt Management and the Senate Education Committee had voted unanimously in support of Senate Bill 412, which would provide construction funding for the UW-Stevens Point Treehaven Field Study Station. The Governor indicated at the January 25, 1984, State Building Commission meeting that he had requested legislative action in support of this project. -SP Bildysthand - report on bill to privide construction funding for Treehaven Field Study Stuttor.

In discussion at the Board meeting, Regent Beckwith suggested that the Board be advised of architects selected for major building projects.

Regent Fish concurred, noting that such reports were made to the Building Commission, but only as a total list for the year.

UNFINISHED AND MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

#### Request for Reconsideration of Decision on Personnel Case, UW-Stevens Point

Noting that Ms. Susan Coe had asked for reconsideration of the Board's December 9, 1983, decision not to grant her a formal hearing, President Beckwith suggested that the matter be considered in closed session, there being no request by Ms. Coe or her attorney for open session discussion. There was concurrence with the President's recommendation. <u>UW Centers-Stuff</u> Review of Append by Masud Mufti from Edectsion, not to renew, Mu appointmente at uwc-Maxin ette, R. 2993, PP 29-37 (Kine funk-Maxinute, K. President Beckwith turned to the request of Dr. Masud Mufti for Regent review of the decision not to renew his appointment at the UW Center-Marinette. The denial of tenure had been made by former Acting Chancellor Polk, and his decision was reaffirmed by the Centers Appeals and Grievance Committee. Dr. Mufti's request to the Board of Regents was referred to Regent Conroy, but before her report was presented to the Board, Chancellor Polk's successor, Executive Dean Ratner, asked to review the file. He had done so and had later submitted a report to the Board.

Indicating that concern had been expressed by Mr. Edward Muzik, of The Association of UW Faculties, and Mr. John Williamson, attorney for Dr. Mufti, as to whether the Board was considering review of the decision of Acting Chancellor Polk or the decision of Executive Dean Ratner, Regent Beckwith said his interpretation was that the Board was considering review of the decision of the acting chancellor, as reaffirmed by the executive dean. If that was an issue which had legal implications, he invited Dr. Mufti's representative to bring them to the Board's attention.

With respect to procedure at this meeting, Regent Beckwith proposed that the Board first hear from Dr. Mufti or his designated representatives and that the executive dean then be given an opportunity to respond, after which Regent Conroy would present her report. The Board then would consider the matter in closed session.

Regent Beckwith added that he had advised Dr. Mufti that the issues before the Board were procedural in nature; that is, whether appropriate procedures were followed in making the decision and whether there were any violations of s. UWS 3.08(1). Comments therefore should be restricted to those items and should not deal with the quality of Dr. Mufti's teaching, research or public service, which were not matters before the Board. He then invited Dr. Mufti or his representatives to speak.

Dr. Muzik introduced Attorney Williamson for a statement on behalf of Dr. Mufti.

Indicating that he would later ask the Board to consider the entire matter in open session, Mr. Williamson said he would confine his remarks at this time to the question of violation of s. UWS 3.08, and that he would focus on the decision of Acting Chancellor Polk. In his view, the issue was whether Dr. Polk's decision to deny tenure to Dr. Mufti met the criteria set forth in the Administrative Code. To make that determination, he said it was necessary to look at the response given by Dr. Polk after Dr. Mufti requested the reasons for his decision. He then quoted as follows from the acting chancellor's letter of May 25, 1982, to Dr. Mufti: "In considering the information available to me in the review of candidates proposed for tenure this year, including the accompanying recommendations for promotion in rank as well as tenure, it is my assessment that your recommendations are not sufficiently strong to support a positive endorsement." Stating that it was necessary to have a hearing to determine what information was available to Dr. Polk, he referred to Regent Conroy's report of September 9, 1983, which noted that one of the objections raised by Dr. Mufti was that the chancellor did not have a complete record of Dr. Mufti's experience and evaluations when he made his decision. He then quoted from UWS 3.08 which identified one element of improper consideration of a faculty member's qualifications as lack of consideration of "available data bearing materially on the quality of performance."

As a second point, Mr. Williamson continued, there were three reasons under s. UWS 3.06 why Professor Mufti was entitled or not entitled to tenure, those being the quality of his teaching, his scholarship and his service. From reading the decision, he did not believe the chancellor considered those criteria, since he did not state that he found Dr. Mufti's teaching, scholarship or service to be insufficiently strong. Arguing that the decision was based on an impermissible criterion, Mr. Williamson said Dr. Polk was not referring to the recommendations for tenure, which were overwhelmingly supportive, but instead was referring to a recommendation on promotion--a completely separate decision.

Another ground for setting aside the Chancellor's decision, Mr. Williamson stated, was that procedures required by the rules of the faculty and the Board were not followed, as required by s. UWS 3.08, in that the procedure of the Centers was that recommendations for promotion and tenure were not to be considered together. Therefore, he argued that Dr. Polk acted on unfounded, arbitrary or irrelevant assumptions of fact, also in violation of s. 3.08, because he should not have had the information concerning promotion before him. Pointing out that Dr. Mufti did not have to request promotion at the same time as tenure, he noted that there was often simultaneous consideration of those questions, presumably because the university found it worthwhile to do so. To uphold the approach of Acting Chancellor Polk, Mr. Williamson contended, would be to discourage such requests being made at the same time, since lack of recommendation for promotion could adversely affect prospects for tenure, even if support for tenure was unanimous.

In summary, Mr. Williamson said his position was that a hearing was needed to answer questions about lack of information before the acting chancellor and failure to to comply with s. UWS 3.06, as well as lack of compliance with s. UWS 3.08 by not following the procedures of the campus, not

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considering available data, and acting on unfounded and arbitrary assumptions of fact, all to the material prejudice of Dr. Mufti. If there were other reasons for the decision, Mr. Williamson stated, Dr. Mufti had a right under s. UWS 3.07 to be informed of them, but the reasons as quoted previously were the only ones given.

For the purpose of clarification, Regent Beckwith asked if the letters of May 12 and May 25, 1982, from Dr. Polk to Dr. Mufti were the only ones which might be considered to state reasons.

Mr. Williamson noted that there was also a letter dated July 9, 1982, written by the acting chancellor to Dr. Mufti following reconsideration. However, that letter simply stated that the decision was not changed and did not give additional reasons.

It was pointed out by Regent Hanson that the May 12 letter only stated, "I have considered the recommendations carefully but have concluded I am not able to support them."

President Beckwith asked if Mr. Williamson wished to speak to the Faculty Appeals and Grievance Committee report of December 7, 1982.

Inasmuch as the Board was being requested to review the acting chancellor's decision, Mr. Williamson replied, he thought what was important were the reasons given by Dr. Polk.

Regent Beckwith then inquired about Mr. Williamson's position as to what weight, if any, the Board should attach to the committee's report.

Responding that it should be given such weight as its reasoning justified, Mr. Williamson stated, however, that he did not see how the committee could find that there was not material prejudice when the only recommendations the chancellor had a right to consider were unanimously in support of tenure at both levels. He thought it was impossible to have concluded that the negative recommendation on promotion was not to Dr. Mufti's material prejudice and that one could not go beyond the reasons Dr. Polk himself gave.

Continuing his statement, Mr. Williamson contended that the report of Executive Dean Ratner should not be considered as an affirmation of Acting Chancellor Polk's decision. It was his position that the executive dean's role did not fit into any of the rules governing granting or denial of tenure and that he had no authority to make his own decision on the merits, the process already having been completed with Dr. Polk's decision and the request to the Board for a hearing.

President Beckwith's recollection was that the executive dean asked for the opportunity to review the case and the Board agreed to that request. Had his decision been different from that of Chancellor Polk, Regent Beckwith thought the Board would have viewed that as tantamount to reopening the matter at the campus level.

If Dr. Ratner's review were to be treated as a decision, Mr. Williamson felt it would be necessary to give Dr. Mufti another year's appointment. It was his position, however, that it should not be considered a decision because what Dr. Mufti had requested was review of Acting Chancellor Polk's decision, pursuant to the process required by the rules. He did not think Dr. Ratner had addressed the issue of whether or not the acting chancellor's decision was consistent with the rules governing tenure.

President Beckwith then asked if Mr. Williamson wished to speak to the merits of Dr. Ratner's decision.

Responding in the affirmative, Mr. Williamson stated the executive dean followed none of the procedures required by the rules of the faculty or the Board in conducting his review in that his role did not fit into the rules. Secondly, he thought Dr. Ratner's statement that an appeal from his decision had to be taken within 20 days showed prejudice against Dr. Mufti since Dr. Mufti had followed all the proper procedures and was still appealing the original decision.

President Beckwith thought it was the sense of the Board that Dr. Mufti should not be caught up in "Catch 22" procedural situation, and that lack of a request for a review of Dr. Ratner's decision within 20 days would not be a factor in the Board's decision. For that reason, he had indicated at the outset that the decisions by Dr. Polk and Dr. Ratner should be merged for procedural purposes. Whether or not the executive dean's decision should be considered at all was a matter that the Board would have to determine.

It seemed to Mr. Williamson that if the report by Dr. Ratner were to be considered, Dr. Mufti first should have the right to ask for a statement of reasons, to request reconsideration and then to exercise his right to appeal under s. UWS 3.08. In addition to the procedural issues, he felt there were serious substantive issues involved in the executive dean's report. It was his position that, although Dr. Ratner did apply the three required criteria, he also applied a standard different from that which was used throughout Dr. Mufti's term on tenure track and that which he understood would be applied in making the tenure decision. While Executive Dean Ratner found Dr. Mufti's professional development to be inadequate, Mr. Williamson said, Dr. Mufti had not been so advised when he was on tenure track; rather, he was told that his progress toward tenure, including his scholarship, teaching and service, was satisfactory. Stating that from reading the executive dean's letter he could not ascertain in what respects it was thought Dr. Mufti's performance was inadequate, Mr. Williamson said it would be necessary to follow established procedures to obtain specific reasons.

President Beckwith asked if Mr. Williamson was requesting that the Regents refer the matter back to the Centers so that those procedures could be followed.

Responding in the negative, Mr. Williamson thought the executive dean had become too deeply involved to make an unprejudiced decision at this point.

If the case were referred back to the Centers, Regent Beckwith explained, it would not be to involve Executive Dean Ratner in the decision further, but rather to permit an appeal from his decision to the Faculty Appeals and Grievance Committee.

Regent Conroy felt it would not be fair to expect an answer without allowing Dr. Mufti and his advisors time to consider the matter. For the purpose of clarifying Dr. Ratner's involvement, she explained that, after she prepared her report, it had been suggested that she delay presenting it until the new executive dean had an opportunity to review the case. After consideration, she decided it might be helpful if he could clarify points about which she did not have enough information. "Sometimes those things can work out very well. So I agreed on that basis and on the basis that Professor Mufti and his advisors thought that was a fair thing to do. And I recommended it to them. I wasn't looking for a new decision. My understanding was that he would clarify my points." She did not believe time was running on the deadline for any appeals because she did not believe that process could begin prior to her report to the Board, which had not yet been presented.

Regent Beckwith asked Mr. Williamson if he thought the letter of September 17, 1982, from Dr. Polk to Dr. Mufti was a document which should be considered by the Board.

Mr. Williamson did not think it was relevant since it did not address the reasons for denying tenure but instead responded to a list of questions. The basic point in their position, he stated, was that the reasons given by Acting Chancellor Polk were not adequate, and it was that issue on which they requested a hearing. They further asked that the hearing be before a subcommittee of the Board so the Regents could see first-hand how the tenure process operated in this case. Indicating there was further information not yet provided to the Board regarding the executive dean's review, he said that if the Board decided it wished to give any consideration to that report, it might be appropriate to provide additional material at that time.

Regent Schilling asked if Mr. Williamson and Dr. Mufti wished the Board to completely disregard the executive dean's involvement, even though they had agreed to it at one point.

Responding in the affirmative, Mr. Williamson explained that it had been their understanding that Dr. Ratner would review the question of whether or not the acting chancellor had complied with s. UWS 3.06 and 3.08--not that he would render his own opinion as to whether Dr. Mufti was entitled to tenure. What the executive dean had done, he observed, was what President Beckwith had directed Dr. Mufti's representatives not to do at this meeting--to address his entitlement to tenure on the merits of his scholarship, teaching and service. Stating that he would consider it to be reversible error if the Board were in any way influenced by the executive dean's report in denying a hearing, Mr. Williamson requested that the Board's deliberations be conducted in open session so that he and Dr. Mufti would know what criteria were applied in reaching a decision.

If the Board were to disregard the executive dean's involvement, Regent Schilling asked if it would also be disregarded by Dr. Mufti or if it might later be brought into litigation as part of the harm he felt he had suffered.

Indicating that would occur only if it actually caused harm to his client, Mr. Williamson said he would have no grounds to object if the Board decided not to consider Dr. Ratner's report.

If the Board passed a motion in open session not to consider the executive dean's decision, Regent Beckwith asked if Mr. Williamson would then be satisfied to have the Board conduct its deliberations in closed session.

Mr. Williamson responded in the affirmative.

If the Board decided to grant a hearing, Regent Nikolay asked Mr. Williamson if he thought the Board had authority to grant tenure or to do any more than simply remand the case to the institution.

In response, Mr. Williamson said it was his position that under s. 36.09(3) <u>Wisconsin Statutes</u>, the Board had the right to direct that tenure be granted if denial of tenure was in violation of Board policy.

Regent Nikolay noted that interpretation was in direct conflict with the Administrative Code.

President Beckwith then recognized several other persons who wished to present statements on behalf of Dr. Mufti.

Speaking first was Associate Professor Donald Weast, who was Chair of the Center System Department of Sociology at the time Dr. Mufti's tenure case was decided. Dr. Weast considered the case a classic example of faculty versus administrative judgment. In the department and at the local campus, he stated, the faculty were united in their belief that Dr. Mufti should be granted tenure and that he had met all the rigorous criteria set forth by faculty. Although the chancellor had the power to override that judgment, he said faculty became alarmed when exercise of such power flew in the face of responsible faculty evaluations. Throughout this case, he added, faculty at all levels had also raised questions about procedural improprieties. Stating that the Board of Regents was in an excellent position to demonstrate to faculty its commitment to fairness and truth-seeking, he requested that the case at least be reconsidered.

Dr. John Forde, Associate Professor of Anthropology at the UW Center-Marathon County, emphasized that the matter of tenure was not lightly taken by those involved in making evaluations. Noting that his department scrupulously followed university rules as they applied to that process, he said it was shocking to find that new rules apparently were being implemented through review by a person not involved in the original decision. In addition, he thought a precedent was being established which could have grave consequences for all faculty members on tenure track.

Another point, he continued, was that faculty avoided being involved in decisions related to the tenure of individuals whose expertise was other than their own. While recognizing that judgments must be made, at the same time it was recognized that they should not be made by those professionally unprepared to do so. He was concerned that this principle was being set aside in Dr. Mufti's case and that the executive dean might not believe the department was qualified to judge its membership.

Dr. James Berry, Chair of the Marinette Center Steering Committee, noted that the campus Personnel Review Committee unanimously recommended Dr. Mufti for tenure and the Collegium as a whole passed a resolution indicating unanimous support as well. He expressed the hope of faculty at the Marinette Center that the case would be resolved promptly.

Dr. Allen Bedrosian, Professor of Chemistry at the Marinette Center, asked the Board to consider that during the entire probationary period Professor Mufti was given no indication that his performance toward achieving tenure was unsatisfactory and that reports of the local campus Grievance and Appeals Committee, as well as the Center System Grievance and Appeals Committee, indicated that inaccurate and inappropriate information was transmitted to Acting Chancellor Polk. Stating that another issue was involved which went beyond the case of Dr. Mufti, he commented that termination of a colleague, in spite of the fact that it had been unanimously determined that he met all the requirements of his department and his local campus, would adversely affect faculty morale and would impair the ability to attract competent professionals to the institution.

The following resolution was moved by Regent Knowles and seconded by Regent Schilling:

Resolution 2993: Tha

That the involvement of Executive Dean Ratner, UW Centers, in reviewing the matter of Dr. Masud Mufti, the Dean's decision, his request to make a decision or any instructions or discussions regarding it, shall be no part of the consideration of the Board of Regents; and that the request for review shall be considered only a request for review of the decision by Acting Chancellor Polk and the appeals procedures that followed therefrom.

Regent Schilling thought it was fair at this time to ask Dr. Mufti's counsel what he would agree to since a decision to disregard Dr. Ratner's involvement could be turned to the Board's detriment if the case later went to circuit court and the client wished to argue that the decision somehow clouded the issue. "If this Board expunges from our minds officially a series of letters, is that a two-way street?"

Regent Fish did not think Dr. Mufti could be legally precluded from making such an argument, regardless of what was said at this meeting.

Regent Beckwith noted that the minutes of the meeting would show that Attorney Williamson, representing the petitioner, asked the Board to completely ignore the decision by Executive Dean Ratner. If the motion before the Board passed, he stated that "we will adhere to that in any closed session that follows. We will not discuss, consider or make the Ratner decision any part of our decision whatever."

Put to the vote, Resolution 2993 was adopted unanimously.

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Regent Schilling questioned whether it was proper to discuss a personnel matter in closed session if the individual involved wished it to be considered in open session. He felt a closed session on the matter would be appropriate only if it were requested by Dr. Mufti or if it involved receiving advice from legal counsel.

Senior Counsel Stathas thought it was arguable whether the Board should go into closed session on the question of granting or denying a hearing on Dr. Mufti's request.

Regent Clusen asked Attorney Williamson if, in view of the Board's action on Resolution 2993, he would feel differently about whether deliberation occurred in open or closed session.

Stating that his earlier objection had been satisfied by adoption of that resolution, Mr. Williamson said he believed that decision-makers had a right to decide in private, although he had not had the opportunity to discuss the matter with his client. His assumption was that no other parties, except the Board's attorney, would be participating.

Responding that Mr. Williamson's assumption was correct, Regent Beckwith said he considered the Board to now be sitting as a quasi-judicial body. It seemed to him it was good public policy that such a body be free to discuss its views regarding a decision without it being a matter of public debate.

While Mr. Williamson and Dr. Mufti were conferring about the closed session question, President Beckwith asked Regent Conroy to summarize her report.

Reminding the Board that she had not attempted to do a complete study, Regent Conroy said she had carefully reviewed the statutes, policies and procedure with respect to the Board's obligation in this kind of situation. She then looked at all the documents available to her on Dr. Mufti's case, with special attention to issues that were the basis of his appeal and information that would satisfy those concerns.

After completing this process, she had come to the following conclusions. First, it appeared to her that the acting chancellor did not have a complete record of Dr. Mufti's experience and evaluations when he made his decision. Second, the promotion question should not have been brought to the chancellor's level. This resulted in a debate about tenure and promotion being one question or two, she explained, adding that the Marinette campus had many examples of tenure granted first and promotion granted at a later date, as did other System institutions. Third, she felt the acting chancellor's reason for denying tenure was too broad for Dr. Mufti to prepare a proper response.

Having conferred with Dr. Mufti, Mr. Williamson stated that they had no objection to a closed session on this matter and felt it would be appropriate because decision-making was involved and the Board had the right to do that in private. This position, he noted, left aside the question of a personnel

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matter, in which he thought the decision was the privilege of the person involved when there was a hearing on the merits. He reiterated their request that the Board appoint a subcommittee to look into the case, so that Regents could see for themselves how the system was working.

At 12:55 p.m., the following resolution, moved by Regent Conroy, seconded by Regent Fish, was unanimously adopted on a roll call vote, with Regents Beckwith, Clusen, Conroy, Finlayson, Fish, Hanson, Nikolay, O'Harrow, and Schilling voting "Aye" (9) and no Regents voting "No."

That the Board of Regents recess into closed session to Resolution 2994: consider personnel matters, as permitted by s. 19.85(1)(c), Wis. Stats., Wis.
