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
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

Some people cannot enjoy themselves celebrating on any occasion unless they make a lot of noise, and of course, when they celebrate on the Fourth of July, they must make even more noise, so they proceed to spend a nice "sum"for fireworks to help the big "noise".

It is alright to celebrate in this way but they should be a little cautious in their handling of explosives and display

fireworks.

Here are some DON'TS for the FOURTH for us all to heed. DON'T hold a firechacker or other explosive in your hand after it is lighted. DON'T throw your firecrackers toward any person or property.
DON'T hold a toy pistol close to a person's ear when you fire it. DON'T shoot sky-rockets from any point but an elevated stand. DON'T throw lighted firecrackers in the grass. This very often causes disastrous fires. DON'T hold your face too close when lighting the colored powders.
