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

Before long, the UW band starts playing and the members of the Block Party, the student section, are in their seats. No where else will you find a louder or more enthusiastic crowd.




Wisconsin volleyball is also a familyoriented event where children of all ages line up to greet Bucky Badger or to get ice cream between games.



You'll want to be there!

o what's a match like in the UW Field House? It's exciting, energetic and loud but why don't you find out for yourself?

When you first approach the UW Field House, you're struck by the majesty of the building. The cream-colored brick exterior seems to glow in the evening sun. Its history and grandeur make it easy to see why the building is part of the National Register of Historic Places.

Once inside the building, you'll be amazed at how close the crowd is to the court. The tightness of the facility is one reasons why the building has earned a reputation as one of the loudest volleyball facilities in the nation.

The courtside seats are reserved for season ticket holders, those dedicated Badger fans who come back year after year. The south end zone is the home

of the UW band and the Block Party, the UW student section. You'll recognize them instantly by their wacky dress and enthusiasm! The north end zone is a popular place for families to get up-close-and-personal with the players and Bucky Badger.

Once the Badgers take the court for warmups, the building rapidly fills with enthusiastic fans. During warmups, you'll hear the crowd oohing and aahing over the team's thunderous attacks. The band starts playing and the facility becomes still louder, getting the team and crowd even more pumped up and ready for another win.

Children of all ages line the court to slap the hands of the Badger starters while the crowd starts the "fish" clap, a straight-armed clap used when opponents are introduced. Just before the Wisconsin

> team is ready to be introduced, the band picks up the rhythm and the crowd rises to its feet and the excitement builds.

Once play begins, the crowd is on its feet and yelling "Point Wisconsin!" as the Badgers score another point. Only a timeout can slow down this UW crowd!

The intermission between games two and three is another way for everyone to get involved. Whether it is musical chairs, trike races, remotecontrol car races or other between-game entertainment,



A National Leader in Volleyball Attendance

he first time you walk into the UW Field House during a volleyball match, you feel the excitement that is Wisconsin Volleyball. The band is playing, thousands of fans are yelling "Point Wisconsin," Bucky Badger is dancing and the UW team is on the court winning!

Badger fans make the UW Field House one of the loudest and most intimidating venues for opposing teams in the nation. Wisconsin consistently ranks among the top-four teams in the nation in attendance and Badger fans are known for being very knowledgeable about the sport of volleyball

Since 1990, when the Badgers won their first Big Ten Conference title and competed in their first NCAA tournament, the Field House has become nationally recognized as one of the best collegiate volleyball facilities.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top 10 in national attendance for the last 17 years including second-place rankings in 2003 and 2006. The Badgers have also led the Big Ten in attendance nine years, including in 2006 when they set the conference record for attendance.

A key to winning in any college sport is having a loud and raucous student section. That is the case with Badger Volleyball and the Block Party.

The UW student section, nicknamed the Block Party, dominates the south end of the Field House. From their dress to their cheers, the members of the Block Party truly show their Badger spirit.

When you look at the student section, in addition to the traditional Cardinal and White gear, you may see students wearing volleyballs or fuzzy red and white hats on their heads. Students also paint their faces or chests with the number or name of their favorite UW player.

If you are looking to start a cheer or the Wave, look no farther than the Block Party. The group has taken a number of traditional cheers from other UW sports and made them volleyball specific. For example, "Sieve, Sieve, Sieve" is a famous Badger hockey chant directed at the opposing goalie after the Badgers score a goal. The Block Party uses the chant in their own way, yelling it at an opposing player after the UW team scores a service ace. The group will also try to disrupt an opponent's serve by yelling "Bounce, bounce, bounce, hoooooold" and waving their arms as an opposing player gets ready to serve.

The group also enjoys such traditional songs from the UW marching band as "Roll out the Barrel" and "If You Want to be a Badger." Another tradition is a student running around the court during a drum riff called "Spaz."




Wisconsin Volleyball Attracts National Attention

ver the past five seasons, 27 of Wisconsin's volleyball matches have been televised. That's an average of more than five matches per season. Broadcasting those matches were ESPN, ESPN2, ESPNU, CSTV, ComCast and FOX SportsNet.

In 2006, six matches were broadcast on national or regional television while seven matches were carried live on Madison radio stations. National broadcasts included Wisconsin's match vs. Ohio on CSTV and the Badgers' win over No. 2 Penn State on ESPN2.


As part of the Big Ten Conference volleyball package, the Badgers are one of the top draws in the league. A partnership with ESPN and the new Big Ten Network allows the conference to televise at least five matches per school.

Wisconsin's reputation as the major athletic program in the state also attracts a lot of media attention. Madison is home to four television stations, 18 radio stations, two daily newspapers and two student newspapers. In addition, media from around the state, including the Milwaukee area, also cover the Badgers on a regular basis.



Above: The Badgers celebrated their win over No. 2 Penn State in front of a national television audience on ESPN2.


Below: Coach Pete Waite and Brittney Dolgner are interviewed by ESPN's Cathy Nelson after the Penn State win.



Former Badgers Continue Playing and Coaching

ompeting beyond college is the dream of many volleyball players and Wisconsin is rapidly becoming a pipeline for national teams, foreign professional leagues and moving into the coaching ranks.

U.S. National Teams

Seven Badgers have spent time training with the U.S. National team as a participant in the A-2 program or as part of the training team. The programs allow the players to travel and compete against some of the best teams in the world.

Junior and Young National Teams

Junior and Youth National teams offer student-athletes many of the same benefits as national team members with travel and competition against the best players in the world. Current Badgers Brittney Dolgner, Katherine Dykstra, Nikki Klingsporn, Kim Kuzma and Taylor Reineke were all part of Junior or Youth National teams.

Professional Leagues

Three former Badgers have competed on the Association of Volleyball Professions (AVP) tour, including 2002 graduate Erin Byrd, who is currently ranked among the top 60 players this season.

Five former Badgers have travelled overseas to continue their playing careers overseas. In 2005, Sherisa Livingston won the league championship with her team in Jakarta, Indonesia.





UW Travels the Country

The Wisconsin volleyball team travels across the country for numerous non-conference tournaments and NCAA postseason play. In addition to all of the great college towns and facilities around the Big Ten Conference, the Badgers' non-conference schedule is filled with exciting road trips to all regions of the country.

Within the past four seasons, the UW has made trips to California, Colorado, Georgia, Kansas, Montana and Texas for early-season tournaments. Coming up on the Badgers' schedule for this season are tournaments in Los Angeles and Provo, Utah.

Wisconsin has also made a number of great trips for postseason competition. The Badgers have hosted first and second-round matches in the UW Field House three of the last four seasons. The UW advanced to NCAA regional action in its own backyard of Green Bay, Wis., in 2004, while traveling to College Station, Texas, in 2005 and Austin, Texas, in 2006. The Badgers will host an NCAA regional in 2007.

The Badgers also typically travel during the spring season, spending their spring break in sunny climates. In 2004, Wisconsin traveled to Orlando, Fla., while the 2006 team went to Honolulu.

Wisconsin Travels to Four Countries

The Badgers spent 13 days during the summer of 2007 traveling and competing in Europe. The team enjoyed the sites of Prague and Brno, Czech Republic; Vienna, Austria; Maribor, Slovenia; and Venice and Rome, Italy.

Wisconsin also competed in five matches against some of the top teams in Europe, including two matches against the Italian Junior National team.

"My absolute favorite part of the trip was watching the team mature on and off the court," said coach Pete Waite. "They represented the University of Wisconsin well as they learned to navigate the underground Metro lines and absorb all the culture differences around every corner. NCAA Championship Hosts

UW Hosted Championship Twice

The University of Wisconsin served as the host to the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship twice in the span of six years. Wisconsin was only the third university to play host to the championship more than once.

Wisconsin first played host to the championship in 1993, drawing record crowds to the UW Field House. A thenrecord attendance of 21,085 watched the two-day event, including 11,155 who watched Long Beach State defeat Penn State in the championship match. That figure set the NCAA single-match attendance record and still ranks as one of the top-20 volleyball attendance figures of all time.

In 1998, the UW reset the then-NCAA single-match attendance record when

13,194 spectators watched the championship final. Wisconsin also set the then-NCAA semifinal attendance record of 12,327 bringing the two-day total to 25,521, which broke the championship record of 21,086 set in 1997. The final mark still ranks as the No. 6 attendance figure of all time while the semifinal mark still ranks as the eighth best of all time.

Wisconsin Field House

A Historic Landmark

It's a landmark building in a number of ways. From being listed on the National Register of Historic Places to the record-setting attendances to the momentous wins, the Wisconsin Field House is a memorable place steeped in a rich history.

Since it was built, the Field House has been the site of numerous sporting events including basketball, boxing, track and field and wrestling. It also held UW commencement exercises, speakers including John F. Kennedy and even a carnival.

The first volleyball match was played in the Field House on Oct. 23, 1977, when the U.S. Men's National Team played Cuba. The first women's match followed soon after when Wisconsin hosted the 1977 Big Ten Conference Championship on Oct. 29.

It wasn't until 1980 that the Badgers again competed in the Field House playing host to two tournaments. Wisconsin's play in the Field House was sporadic until 1986 when it became the permanent home of the volleyball team. With the construction of the Kohl Center in 1998, the volleyball team took over sole possession of the Field House in the fall. The building is also used as the competition site for the UW wrestling team.

As the sole occupant of the UW Field House, the Wisconsin has made the building one of the finest volleyball facilities in the country. One significant improvement is a permanent Sport Court for all home matches and practices. The Badgers have two full courts for practices while the eyecatching black and red court provides the perfect background for the winning UW team during matches.


The Badgers also moved into new locker room facilities with a ready room, for relaxing and studying, separate from the team's home locker room. A complete renovation of the locker room area, including a photo display of Big Ten

championship teams, was completed in the summer of 2003. The ready room was remodeled in 2006 and features a projection television, new leather sofas, pub table and chairs and wireless internet access.

The renovation of Camp Randall Stadium also included improvements to the north end of the Field House, including updated restrooms as well as a new media room and opponent locker rooms on the lower level.

The All-America wall on the west side of the building features life-size photos of the Badger greats while banners from the UW's Big Ten championships and NCAA tournament appearances hang over the playing court.

Fans also enjoy the full-service concessions stands and can shop for UW souvenirs in the Bucky's Locker Room store in the facility.

UW Volleyball Offices

The Wisconsin volleyball offices are located on the third floor of Kellner Hall, the new UW Athletic Department office building. The offices are adjacent to the UW Field House so that players can drop in at any time to meet with the coaches or to watch game tape.

The volleyball offices were completed in the summer of 2004 during the renovation of Camp Randall Stadium. The Badgers share a trophy case with women's hockey just off the lobby area of the third flloor. The case commemorates both outstanding programs with a display of trophies, autographed jerseys and other memorabilia. Two of the UW's Big Ten Conference championship trophies as well as the second-place NCAA trophy from 2000 are on display in the case.

As you approach the offices, an etched glass wall, featuring athletes in action, accents the entrance to the reception area. The reception area features a comfortable seating area as well as large photos, recognizing both programs.

The coaches' offices overlook the UW Field House, offering an up-close view of the historic building. It's only a short walk to the practice and competition facility for the Badgers.

The volleyball offices are the base of operations for the staff, offering a central locale for the coaches to break down film and construct game plans. The coaches are surrounded by the rich history and tradition of the program as they work to bring in the next Big Ten title and mold the next Badger legend.




Feeding the Badgers

Quality food and service is provided by the Department of Athletics' food and beverage staff.





Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center

The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center and the satellite Kohl Fetzer Center provide for the academic needs of more than 700 student-athletes at the University of Wisconsin. The state-of-the-art centers, named after Wade and Beverly Fetzer, are home to both the academic advising and learning support staffs of the Office of Academic Services.

The original Fetzer Center is a 15,000-square-foot facility. The center is fully wireless and features a large open study area that is surrounded by nine small to mid-sized classrooms, a 55-seat auditorium, staff offices, a computer lab and a canteen area. The open study area has 30 individual carrels as well as several study tables. The state-of-the-art computer lab, under coordinator Jim Eisenmann, allows student-athletes to work on assignments, access online library or course materials and check their email. The computer lab also has several checkout laptop computers for student-athletes who are traveling for competitions and other team-related activities.

The Kohl Fetzer Center was opened in October of 2006 to serve the needs of the student-athletes who practice and compete on the southeast end of the campus. The KFC, as it is fondly called, is a third of the size of the original Fetzer but still serves all of the needs of the student-athletes. It features five classrooms, an open study area and a computer lab. An academic advisor and a learning specialist are available full time for the teams that use the KFC.

The two academic centers feature a staff of six advisors, four learning specialists, a life skills coordinator and a tutor coordinator. The staff monitors academic eligibility and progress while providing study groups for selected courses, access to tutors and hosting a variety of academic and career planning events throughout the year.


Under the direction of assistant athletic director Doug Tiedt, the advising staff of Chris Butler, Jill Hadfield, Mary Weaver-Klees and Alan Zussman as well as tutor coordinator David Mattison work along with learning specialists Dan Ott, Toni O'Keefe, Denise Kalscheur and Nancy Gatyas to render quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assist coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience. CHAMPS/ Life Skills

Coordinator Kelli Richards oversees programs in career and personal development as well as community outreach.

The staff, including program assistants Nancy Kreklow and Laurel Holgerson, has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin and a permanent line of communication with all university departments.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and learning specialists. Sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the student-athlete. Athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The staff takes a personal approach to each student-athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways on the national, conference and university level. The annual Student-Athlete Academic banquet recognizes student-athletes off the field of play by honoring more than 200 student-athletes with a 3.5 or better grade point average. Additionally, the annual CHAMPS Cup competition recognizes the teams that succeed academically and are involved in community and campus events.





UW CHAMPS: A Program of Excellence

HAMPS (Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success) is a total development program that uses athletics as a preparation for success in life. Under the direction of Kelli Richards, the goal of the CHAMPS program is to support student development initiatives that enhance the quality of the student-athlete experience within the university setting.

The UW's CHAMPS program was selected as one of four 2005 Program of Excellence recipients. The award is presented annually to schools that have displayed a highly effective and pervasive program benefiting their student-athletes in the five components of the program.

CHAMPS provides support and opportunities for UW student-athletes in the following areas:

Athletic Excellence

 The student-athlete advisory committee (SAAC) works with the CHAMPS program to make sure all of the student-athletes' needs and concerns are being addressed.

Academic Excellence

- Through the Fetzer Academic Center, advisors, tutors, mentors and learning specialists are available to all student-athletes.
- A one-credit, 10-week course available to freshman and sophomore student-athletes discusses issues of transitioning to college such as career interests, diversity on campus, as well as identity development.
- Scholarships and internships are available through the NCAA for student-athletes continuing their education.
- The Academic Excellence Banquet is held each April to recognize the many academic achievements of our student-athletes.

Personal Development

- The UW CHAMPS program requires all studentathletes to attend three personal development activities each year.
- Workshops are offered for teams and larger groups on topics such as safe sex, fiscal responsibility, alcohol, peak performance, multiculturalism and many others.
- Opportunities for team and individual leadership development are also available through both the UW and the NCAA.

Career Development

- Workshops on various career topics are offered to student-athletes throughout the year. Topics include writing resumes and cover letters, interviewing tips, networking strategies, dining etiquette and job search strategies.
- Career assessment and career counseling is available for individuals as they work to declare





The mission of the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) is to provide a link of communication between UW-Madison student athletes and athletic department administration and to provide a support system for student-athletes to discuss various issues specific to the rigors of student-athlete life. We also strive to enhance the total student athlete experience by promoting opportunity, protecting student athlete welfare and fostering a positive student athlete image. SAAC is made up of two representatives from each team. They meet monthly to discuss NCAA issues as well as plan student-athlete socials and community outreach events.

Wisconsin Traditions

Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name–Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter


The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student-athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.

Strength & Conditioning

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component in all of the Badger teams' success on the playing field. The program's goal is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.



Badger athletes work on their strength programs in weight rooms in the McClain Center, Kohl Center and Camp Randall Stadium.

The McClain Center weight room is the largest of the facilities and features more than 45,000 pounds of free weights and more than 50 weight machines. The room has seven squat racks, eight bench press stations, eight flat-to-incline benches, six Olympic lift platforms and numerous other free weight stations.


The recently completed Kohl Center weight room is equipped with eight custom-built free weight power platforms and 4,000 pounds of free weights. The room has 15 pieces of cardiovascular equipment and three Vertimax jump trainers.

The Badger Den has five power stations with each station consisting of a platform for Olympic style lifting as well as a squat rack, bench press, incline bench press, pull-up station and a dip station. There are three lat-pull machines and seated row machines, a complete set of dumbbells and a complete set of plyometric boxes.

Sports Medicine

The sports medicine staff provides all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and a full-time nutritionist. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Badger athletes is supervised by a staff of 13 full-time and three graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.


Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Full-time athletic trainers Karen Bloch, Tricia DeSouza, Bill Gierach, Chuck Hart, Andy Hrodey, Jesse Donnenwerth, Mike Moll, Clark Pearson, Henry Perez-Guerra, Ashley Parr, Jen Pepoy, and Kristy Walker as well as graduate assistant trainers Kayla Schipman, Jenna Street and Stephanie Westrick utilize functional measures, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.

Full-time nutritionist Patrick Welscher, RD, provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the studentathletes

The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospital and Clinics. Medical director Dr. Ben Graf, an orthopedic surgeon, is responsible for all services provided to student-athletes. Orthopedic care is also provided by team physicians Dr. John Orwin, Dr. Lee Kaplan and Dr. Geoffrey Baer. General medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry, and he is joined by Dr. David Bernhardt, and Dr. Kathleen Carr.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in Camp Randall Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

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




Student life at Wisconsin is more than books, term papers and exams. Some of the most important lessons learned at Wisconsin occur far from any lecture hall or lab.





A Beautiful Campus




The Memorial Union Terrace is a favorite gathering place of students.


- Madison is one of only a few cities in the world built on an isthmus. Downtown Madison is set on a narrow strip of land between two glacial lakes—Lake Mendota and Lake Monona. A total of five area lakes, plus more than 250 parks and 120 miles of designated bike routes within the city limits provide an abundance of year-round outdoor activities, from hiking, biking, swimming and sailing to cross-country skiing, ice skating, and ice fishing.
- ▶ The Wisconsin State Capitol is the city's signature landmark. No building in Madison may be built higher than the 284-foot white granite dome of the Capitol, which is modeled after our nation's Capitol.
- ▶ State Street, a one-mile pedestrian mall linking the Capitol Square to the beautiful lakeside campus of the University of Wisconsin, is lined with diverse ethnic eateries, eelectic boutiques, galleries, coffeehouses and more.
- ▶ Famed architect Frank Lloyd Wright spent his childhood years in Madison and returned to live in the area at the height of his international fame. The Madison area is home to a generous selection of Wright-designed buildings.
- ▶ Ecologist Aldo Leopold, conservation pioneer John Muir, play-wright Thornton Wilder, novelist Jacquelyn Mitchard, actor/comedian Chris Farley, Olympians Beth and Eric Heiden, composer/performer Ben Sidran, professional golfers Jerry Kelly, Sherri Steinhauer and Steve Stricker and NASCAR's Matt Kenseth are other notable people associated with Madison.





Badgers Have Won Four Conference Titles

Big Ten Champions

isconsin has won four Big Ten Conference championships, including back-to-back titles in 2000 and 2001.

The Badgers won their first title in 1990 with a 16-2 record. Wisconsin won eight straight matches during the middle of the season to hold a one-match lead over second-place Purdue. Wisconsin clinched the title on the road with 3-0 wins at Michigan and Michigan State in the last weekend of the conference season.

Wisconsin shared the 1997 Big Ten title with Penn State as both teams fin-

ished with 19-1 records. The Badgers and Nittany Lions split their season meetings with both teams winning at home. The UW won its last nine matches of the season and clinched a share of the title with a 3-0 win over Iowa at home.

Wisconsin won its third Big Ten title in 2000 and its second outright championship. The Badgers battled Minnesota all season long for the league title with the two teams sharing the conference lead most of the year. The Badgers won 11 straight matches during the season, including two wins over the Golden

Gophers. Wisconsin won four straight matches to end the season and clinch a share of the title. A Minnesota loss at Ohio State the last match of the season gave Wisconsin the title outright with an 18-2 record.

The Badgers won their first back-to-back titles by winning the 2001 champion-ship with a 19-1 record. Wisconsin opened the conference season with 11 straight wins. Its only loss was a five gamer at Penn State. The Badgers won the remaining eight league matches to clinch their fourth Big Ten title.

UW has appeared in 15 NCAA Tournaments


ualifying for the NCAA tournament is the goal of every college team but in volleyball, only 64 of the 312 schools that sponsor division I volleyball make it to the tournament. And of those 64 teams, Wisconsin is one of only 21 teams that has appeared in NCAA play 15 or more years. The Badgers are also one of only 12 teams who have appeared in the "Big Dance" the last 10 years in a row.

Wisconsin made its first NCAA tournament appearance in 1990. The Badgers won the Big Ten Conference that season and advanced to the Sweet Sixteen. The UW returned to the Sweet Sixteen the following year.

Wisconsin advanced to the NCAA championship match in 2000 and has made four other appearances in the Elite Eight. The Badgers have advanced to at least the second round of tournament play in 14 of 15 years and have played in regionals nine times, including the last three years in a row. Wisconsin has an impressive 28-15 record in tournament play, ranking second among Big Ten teams in total wins.






A three-year starter, Simpson ranks fifth on the UW all-time list with 3,880 assists. She ranks third with 12.60 assists per game.



Odenthal earned third-team All-America honors in 2004, only the second UW right-side hitter to be honored.




During her four years, Byrd aided Wisconsin to two Big Ten Conference titles, four NCAA tournament bids including the 2000 NCAA runner-up finish.



Livingston became the first Wisconsin player to earn first-team All-America honors in 2000. In 2001, she became the Badgers' first two-time first-team All-American.

Livingston wrapped up her career as the UW's all-time kill leader with 1,912 and set the career hitting percentage mark at .366. She also ranks among the top blockers, coming in third in total blocks with 580.

During her four years with the Badgers, she aided the team to four NCAA tournament appearances including the 2000 NCAA runner-up finish. Wisconsin also won two Big Ten Conference titles during her career.



Steve Lowe Memorial Scholarship

Then Steve Lowe unexpectedly passed away on Aug. 22, 1991, the University of Wisconsin and the Madison community lost a true friend and a winner on and off the court.

With Lowe at the helm, the Badger Volleyball program burst onto the national scene. In 1989, he directed the Badgers to the inaugural National Invitational Volleyball Championship, their first postseason appearance ever.

The following year he steered Wisconsin to its first Big Ten Conference title, its first NCAA tournament appearance and first national ranking. Lowe also produced Wisconsin's first volleyball All-American with Lisa Boyd earning second-team honors.

Lowe, who had a 108-64 career record in five years at Wisconsin, earned 1990 Big Ten and AVCA Mideast Coach of the Year honors


Every year Wisconsin's Big Ten home opener is designated "Steve Lowe Night" in honor of the former coach. This year's match is Friday, Oct. 5 vs. Purdue.

In addition, a Badger volleyball player who exemplifies Steve's love of the game is named the recipient of the Steve Lowe Memorial Scholarship. This year's recipient is senior Taylor Reineke.



native of the Madison area, Pete Waite is happy to be home and the Badgers are happy he returned. Ever since he became the UW's head coach, Wisconsin has reached a new level of success.

In his eight years at the UW, the Badgers are an impressive 202-62 (.765) with eight 20-plus win seasons. Waite, 47, is the all-time winningest volleyball coach in UW history, both in number of wins and winning percentage. He is also the only Badger volleyball coach to win 100 Big Ten Conference matches. Overall, Waite ranks 14th among active Division I head coaches with a .741 winning percentage (468-164) in 19 years.

With eight straight NCAA tournament appearances, Waite has done what no other UW coach could accomplish. Wisconsin made its first-ever appearance in the NCAA championship match in 2000, finishing second. The Badgers finished among the top eight teams in the country in 2004 and 2005, made sweet 16 appearances in 2001 and 2006, and advanced to second-round action in 1999, 2002 and 2003.

On the Big Ten level, Wisconsin won league titles in 2000 and 2001 with identical 19-1 records. In 1999, 2002 and 2005, the Badgers finished second in the conference. The UW has never placed lower than fourth in the league during Waite's tenure. He is 122-38 (.763) in Big Ten play.

Waite was honored by his colleagues by being named the Big Ten and AVCA



Mideast Regional Coach of the Year in 2000 and 2001. He was also honored by his fellow coaches in 2006 as the Big Ten Coach of the Year.

At Wisconsin, Waite has coached eight All-Americans, 13 AVCA All-Region first-team selections, two Big Ten Players of the Year and 17 first-team All-Big Ten honorees. He has also coached one Big Ten Freshman of the Year and eight members of the Big Ten All-Freshman team. Wisconsin is the only team that has placed at least one player on the Big Ten All-Freshman team each season since the award was begun eight years ago.

Waite came to Wisconsin from Northern Illinois University where he was the winningest volleyball coach in program history. He had an 11-year record of 266-102 (.723 winning percentage) including nine 20-plus win seasons. The Huskies were 81-19 (.810) in his last three years including three consecutive NCAA tournament bids. NIU appeared in four NCAA tournaments under Waite, advancing to the second round three times including in 1997 when it lost to national runner-up Penn State. The Huskies also appeared in the National Invitational Volleyball Championship in 1991, '92, and '94, and declined an invitation to the NIVC in 1995.

Northern Illinois won eight regularseason conference titles and six conference tournaments under Waite. Three times he was named the conference coach of the year. Individually, Waite coached four AVCA all-region players, four conference players of the year, 14 first-team all-conference honorees, one conference newcomer of the year and four members of the conference all-newcomer team.

Prior to being named the head coach at Northern Illinois, Waite spent two years as an assistant coach at Illinois State. In 1984 and 1985, he was the head coach at Moraine Valley Community College in Palos Hills, Ill., leading the Cyclones






to the 1985 North Central Community College Conference championship. Waite was named the conference coach of the year in 1985.

Waite spent one year as the director and coach of the Chicago Power Volleyball Club in Orland Park, Ill., and two years as a coach with the 2nd City Volleyball Club in Chicago. He started his coaching career in 1981 at Muncie (Ind.) Northside High School and spent the next year as a junior varsity coach at his alma mater, Monona Grove (Wis.) High School. Waite also coached one year at Bremen High School in Midlothian, Ill.

Waite played volleyball and graduated from Monona Grove High School. He played volleyball at Ball State University in Muncie, Ind., from 1977–81 with a team that consistently ranked in the top 10 nationally. The 1979 Cardinal squad finished fourth in the NCAA tournament after winning the Midwest Intercollegiate Volleyball Association title with a perfect 14-0 record. Waite received All-MIVA honors his junior and senior years, and was named team co-captain and co-MVP in 1980. He received his bachelor's degree in education from Ball State in 1981.

Waite and his wife, Carrie, have two sons, Ryan, 23, a 2006 graduate of the UW, and Eric, 20, who is a sophomore at UW-Oshkosh where he plays volleyball.



Q&A with Coach Waite

Why should a student-athlete choose to attend the University of Wisconsin?

I've seen a lot of other schools and I think Wisconsin ranks among the best in the nation. Besides having some of the best academic programs, it has one of the most beautiful campuses anywhere. Along with that, we have a very loyal and large fan base that makes the Field House a fantastic place to play. Our program can offer a great education, a beautiful city, a well-balanced social life and fans that many other schools wish they had. It has the whole package!

What kind of student-athletes are you recruiting to the University of Wisconsin?

We are going after players who are high achievers both on the court and in the classroom. We want players who are driven to succeed and who know that hard work pays off; people who want to be well-rounded academically, athletically and socially.

How would you describe your coaching style?

I'm a teacher; it's always been a part of me even before I became a coach. I'm firm and fair, not a yeller. I expect a lot from my players while at the same time, I work hard to help them enjoy their time at the UW. It's a game; it should be fun. I offer them a lot of variety in practices so that time flies by. I want players to love the game, play from their hearts and dare to dream. When they do that, the wins come.

You have almost 20 years of coaching experience. What have you learned in your years of coaching that you bring to the UW program?

I've learned that patience pays off. I enjoy seeing a player learn a new skill just as much as I enjoy the championships. I bring the philosophy that building a quality program means taking care of the players, not taking short cuts and leaving players in your wake.

I know that developing winners is not just about me. There has to be a great staff and we have that. The players need to believe, trust and try. I'm here to guide them and give them the freedom to blossom when they're ready to grow.

What strengths does your coaching staff bring to the UW program and athletes?

Rod brings a wealth of experience from the national team having been a player and a coach. He has a great talent for analyzing skills and improving technique. On top of that, I've never seen a person with more energy and love for the game.

Colleen brings the knowledge of having been a Badger volleyball player. She has walked this campus, played in front of these fans and set for a team that went from fifth to first in the Big Ten. She has won a Big Ten championship and she wants to help this program win it again.

Dave is a real bonus for us. He is a great trainer in the gym and he's coached teams at the highest level.

I think we have some great variety and experience on our staff. Everyone's goal is for our players to make phenomenal improvements in their game and win championships.

What goals have you set for the Wisconsin program and each individual player?

Some goals we set are private, between the players and the staff. That's important in order to keep everyone focused on the task. In general, we ask each player to leave her comfort zone and grow as a person and as a member of the team. We will always aim to be the top team in the Big Ten along with being one of the top teams in the country. Our ultimate goal is to win a national championship and annually be considered one of the premier programs in the country.

The Big Ten Conference is one of the toughest leagues in the nation for women's volleyball. What does it take for student-athletes to compete on the Big Ten level?

Players have to battle and fight to stay on top. That's what makes it great. You have no choice but to play your best because there are so many good players and teams. Those are the players we want to become Badgers; those who love a challenge and are ready to fight. To be the best, you have to play the best.

Wisconsin has appeared in the NCAA tournament 11 straight years. How does the UW continue to be among the top teams in the nation?

It's the combination of bringing in the right players and teaching them to play great as a team. Great players don't guarantee great results. Coaching and creating team chemistry give players the chance to reach their true potential. Badger players and coaches work hard to improve every day and that hard work has paid off over the years.

Wisconsin continually rates among the top teams in the nation for attendance. To what do you attribute this?

We have a great venue to play in and the perfect city to live in. Madison has three television stations, two newspapers and several radio stations that do a great job covering our team. Fans in Madison know our players and they consistently come out in big numbers to support them. The Field House is one of the most electric places to play in the nation and once someone comes to watch, they keep coming back and bringing friends!

What does the city of Madison offer student-athletes that can't be found anywhere else?

I would have to say the lakes and State Street. I don't know of any other campus that has their student union, dormitories and library right on a beautiful lake. Only one block away from the lake is State Street where students can find a wide variety of shops and restaurants.

Our players work hard in the classroom and on the court. Madison lets them enjoy their free time and it really helps them re-energize. Madison is an exciting city next to a great campus.

What do you enjoy most about coaching at the University of Wisconsin?

The players, the staff, the support, the Field House, the Band, Bucky, the huge fan turnout, all the other great sports and coaches, the lakes, State Street, the Capital, the zoo, the Big Ten, my family nearby . . . You name it, I love this place!

Coach Waite on the 2007 Season

What are your expectations for the season?

Our expectations are high, as always. One of the biggest challenges for us is to rebound from a spring season that was plagued by illness and injury. We had a roster of 13 players, but at times we had up to five players out resting. The benefit of that was the extra court time for some of the players. They were able to improve their games and that will make us stronger in the fall. The drawback is that we weren't able to establish our final line-up or experiment with situations as much as we normally might.

What strengths do you look to build on?

We've been known as a strong blocking team with a balanced attack and those are great building blocks. We have a veteran team returning and they've established themselves as one of the strongest teams in the country over the last three years. We've focused on our defense and passing in the off season and this has proven to be a very tight-knit team on the court.


With the loss of three seniors, who do you see filling their roles?

At the outside spots, it will likely be the trio of Dolgner, DuPont and Allison Wack.

Dolgner is coming off a great freshman year where she was named first team All-Big Ten. Caity DuPont showed us some great things off the bench last season and was hitting the ball even harder in the spring. Al Wack brings her "A" game on a regular basis, just like her sister Jocelyn. I'm sure she'll be a factor on the court with us when the matches start up.

In the middle, we have a few players who have shown they can fill the spot. Morgan Salow, Katherine Dykstra and Audra Jeffers are all strong offensive threats and excellent blockers. The great part about all three is their flexibility. We might also see them rotate through the left and right-side spots along with the middle. They give us the option to switch their position for certain situations to help us match up better against our opponents.

At setter, Nikki Klingsporn will initially back up Jackie Simpson. Jackie heads into this season after being named an All-American last year and Nikki has shown us some great things in the off season. She and Jackie have different styles and that helps us change the pace of the game within a match. We like what both setters can bring and our hitters feel the same way.

What does having a six-member senior class mean to the team?

It means we don't have to explain as much to them and we can expand what we try to do as a team. That group has been the core of our success over the last three years and they've each brought something special to the team. They are a very dedicated group and they work hard to improve all the time. When you have this many veterans, they are able to reach new heights because of the tight connections they have together on the court. They know they have just one more season together and they have an urgency on the court to have a great finish.

What are your thoughts about the incoming freshmen?

Kim Kuzma is a dynamic defensive player who is one of the most competitive people I've ever seen. She is a great passer who can turn matches around with her defensive plays. She has the ability to make players around her better and she has a great work ethic. She'll be one of our shorter players, but that doesn't stop her from pushing the taller hitters in the front row to be their best. She's dynamic, feisty and fast. She'll help our defensive core for years to come.

Allison Wack is an outside hitter who has played above her age group for most of her club career. Both her brother Nate (UC Santa Barbara) and sister Jocelyn (UW) excelled in college and she will continue that tradition. Even as a freshman in high school she was recognized as one of the top players in the country. She has a lot of shots at the net and a real comfort on the court. During her senior year in high school, her blocking and defense improved dramatically. She's a well-rounded player who will give us even more depth on the outside.

There were seven Big Ten conference teams in the 2006 NCAA Tournament. How does this impact conference matches for the 2007 season?

That statistic reminds us that we have to improve everyday in practice and we have to bring our "A" game to every match. There are no easy nights in Big Ten play so that gives our players great motivation to be the hardest working team in the conference every day that they walk into the gym. The Big Ten volleyball teams have earned a lot of respect nationally and this year they will be as competitive as ever.

How does the non-conference portion of your schedule prepare you for the Big Ten season and NCAA tournament?

We have three tournaments that will give us the opportunity to try different line-ups and come together as a team. The players know that they have to prove themselves in practice and then when matches start, fight to keep their spot on the court. We'll be seeing a variety of teams, each bringing different challenges to us. To advance deep in the NCAA tournament, you have to be able to win matches on the road. Our two away tournaments give us the chance to prove ourselves away from the Field House before we head into Big Ten play.

What did your summer European trip teach you about the team and how will that help them this fall?

First, the team is tighter because of what they were able to experience together. They had to be independent and solve problems. They came out of this tour stronger and more eager to learn than ever before.

Secondly, the tour gave us valuable training and competition time. The teams we played all had different styles and that made our players step up their games.

I think that we'll benefit in ways that we can't even predict yet, but it will show up as the season progresses.

Assistant Coach Rod Wilde

Rod Wilde, an NCAA champion as both a player and coach, is in his seventh season as an assistant coach at Wisconsin.

Wilde, 50, was an alternate for the United States volleyball team that won a gold medal at the 1984 Olympics. He broke his leg in match against Russia just six weeks before the games. A member of the U.S. National Team from 1982-84 and again from 1989-91, Wilde also served as an assistant coach with the U.S. men's national team from 1993-2000. He was selected as an assistant coach to both the 1996 and 2000



Olympic teams. He also aided the U.S. to a bronze medal at the 1994 World Championships. In 1999, Wilde was the head coach of the U.S. Pan-American team.

The former manager of the High Performance Programs with U.S.A. Volleyball (USAV), Wilde oversaw all aspects of the USAV programs for high school athletes including the Junior and Youth National teams. In 2004, Wilde was recognized by USA Volleyball with a George J. Fisher Leader in Volleyball Award.

Wilde continues to be involved in USA Volleyball, coaching the High Performance Select team since 2004. The team won a silver medal at the High Performance Championships in 2006. He also coached the gold-medal winning team in 2005.

Wilde was a three-time All-American at Pepperdine University, setting the Waves to the 1978 NCAA Championship. Following graduation, he played with the Tucson Sky of the International Volleyball League. He was the league's rookie of the year in 1979, leading the Sky to the team title.

Wilde returned to Pepperdine as the men's head coach from 1985–87 leading the Waves to the 1986 NCAA Championship. Wilde also served as the head men's coach at UC San Diego from 1991–93 and as the head women's coach at Drake University from 1984–85.

Still an active player, Wilde has competed in the USA Volleyball Adult nationals since 1974. He is a nine-time adult All-American and has been named the most valuable player of his division three times. In 2005, Wilde was named the most valuable player of the Men's Masters 45-and-Over division, leading his team to the national championship. His team also won the national title in 2006.

Wilde is a 1980 graduate of Pepperdine University with a bachelor's degree in kinesiology and a minor in physical education. He is a native of Fort Dodge, Iowa, and his wife, Kris (Hey), is a native of Milwaukee. She was an all-state volleyball and basketball player at Wauwatosa East High School and led the Red Raiders to the Wisconsin state high school titles in both volleyball and basketball in 1980.

olleen (Neels) Bayer, a former two-time All-Big Ten Conference setter for the Badgers, is in her third year as an assistant coach at Wisconsin.

Bayer, 30, was a fourvear letterwinner with the Badgers from 1995-98. She played her first two seasons as a defensive specialist and back-up setter. Bayer took over the starting setter job as a junior and senior, earning All-Big Ten honors in 1997 and 1998. She was also a two-time AVCA All-District 2 selection and was named to the 1997 and 1998 NCAA Regional All-Tournament teams, leading the Badgers to top-eight finishes. Bayer



was the Badgers' team captain in 1998 and also earned two Academic All-Big Ten honors. With Bayer setting, Wisconsin won the 1997 Big Ten Championship and finished second in 1998.

Following her collegiate career, Bayer played with the United States Professional Volleyball league. She was a member of the USPV Dream Team in 1999–2000. 






Dave Bayer



John D. Wiley is the 27th chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He assumed office Jan. 1, 2001.


Wiley has served the university community in a variety of roles, including as associate dean in engineering, dean of the graduate school and the university's senior research officer, and most recently, the university's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs.

In his campus-level positions, Wiley has represented the institution for a variety of external constituencies. He also has been deeply involved in fundraising from individual and corporate donors, and charitable foundations.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964; attended graduate school at UW-Madison as an NSF Fellow and received master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He spent a year at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany as an awardee of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Training.

Wiley joined the UW-Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in August 1975. His research and teaching focused on a variety of topics related to semiconductors and other materials and processes important to the electronics field.

Wiley currently serves as the president of the Big Ten Conference Council of Presidents/Chancellors.



Athletic Director Barry Alvarez

Barry Alvarez is in his fourth year as UW Director of Athletics and his second without the additional title of head football coach.

Under Alvarez's leadership, Wisconsin has won eight national titles, including five NCAA championships. The Badgers have also had record-setting seasons academically, with UW student-athletes recording a record-high grade point average in the fall of 2006. The UW has prospered in its facilities with the recently completed Camp Randall renovation and several additions to the Kohl Center as well as record-setting ticket sales.

From 1990-2005, Alvarez guided Wisconsin's football fortunes. He piloted the Badgers to three Big Ten Conference and Rose Bowl titles en route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (118-73-4 record). Alvarez was just the 10th coach in Big Ten history to win 100 games at one conference institution. He was the 1993 national coach of the year and a two-time Big Ten coach of the year.

He is a 1969 graduate of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. Alvarez received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, are the parents of three children, Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson), Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer), and Chad (wife Stephanie). Barry and Cindy are grandparents to Joe and Jake Ferguson, Grace and Jackson Delzer, and Scarlet and Barry John Thomas Alvarez.

Badgers Advance to Regional

Wisconsin Finishes Among Top 16 Teams

Badgers End Season Ranked 11th

Wisconsin ended its season ranked 11th with a 26-7 record in the final CSTV/American Volleyball Coaches Association Top 25 Coaches poll. It was the 11th straight year that the Badgers ended their season ranked among the top-25 teams in the nation.

Wisconsin spent the entire 2006 season ranked among the top 14 teams in the coaches poll. It is only the fourth time in the 33-year history of the UW program that the Badgers have spent the entire season among the top-15 teams nationally.

Wisconsin was also ranked 11th in the final *Volleyball* magazine poll and ninth in the final NCAA RPI.

Simpson Named All-American

Junior Jackie Simpson was named a second-team All-American by the AVCA. She earned her first All-America honor and became the eighth All-American in coach Pete Waite's eight years at the UW.

Simpson also earned AVCA All-Mideast Region honors along with freshman Brittney Dolgner. Junior Jocelyn Wack earned honorable mention all-region honors.

Trio Named All-Big Ten

Dolgner, Simpson and junior Taylor Reineke were named to the 2006 All-Big Ten team. Dolgner was also named to the Big Ten All-Freshman Team.

Waite Named Big Ten Coach of the Year Pete Waite earned his third Big Ten Coach of the Year honor, leading the Badgers to third place in the conference standings. The UW's 16 league wins was the most for Wisconsin since 2001, when the Badgers won the Big Ten title at 19-1. Waite, who won his 200th match at Wisconsin on Nov. 25 at Purdue, was also named the Big Ten Coach of the Year in 2000 and 2001.

NCAA Success

For the third year in a row and for the fifth time in the last eight years, the Badgers advanced to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA tournament. Wisconsin, which earned the No. 10 seed in the 2006 NCAA Championship, made its 15th overall and 11th consecutive NCAA tournament appearance. The Badgers improved to 28-15 in NCAA tournament matches.

The Badgers are now 18-8 in the NCAA tournament in Waite's eight years. Wisconsin is one of only 14 schools who have appeared in the last 10 NCAA tournaments.

Badgers Finish Third in Big Ten

Wisconsin finished alone in third place in the Big Ten Conference standings by winning its last four matches. The UW has never finished lower than fourth in the league in the last 10 seasons.

Penn State won the conference title with a 18-2 record. Minnesota came in second at 17-3 while Ohio State was fourth at 13-7.

Wisconsin Wins 20 Matches, Again

The Badgers recorded their 11th-straight 20-plus win season. Wisconsin has recorded at least 20 wins in all of Waite's eight years at the UW.

Wisconsin's 26 wins on the year is the most for the program since 2001.

Balanced Offense

One of the reasons for the Badgers season success was their balanced offense. Wisconsin featured four players averaging more than 2.5 kills per game.

Freshman Brittney Dolgner led the team with 4.12 kills per game while senior Maria Carlini added 3.38 kills per game. Sophomore Audra Jeffers chipped in 2.79 per game and junior Taylor Reineke pounded down 2.54 kills per game.

The Badgers averaged 16.38 kills per game as a team, while giving up just 13.72

kills per game. As a team, Wisconsin connected on .257 percent of its attacks while opponents hit .166.

Nationally Ranked Stats

The Badgers ranked 11th nationally with 3.31 blocks per game, according to the final NCAA statistics. Individually, junior Taylor Reineke ranked eighth with 1.63 blocks per game.

The UW ranked 23rd in assists per game (15.16), 25th in kills per game (16.38), 28th in overall winning percentage (.788) and 30th in hitting percentage (.257).

Fab Frosh

No other freshman has made as much of an impact on a UW team as Brittney Dolgner. The 6-0 outside hitter came to Wisconsin as one of the top recruits in the country and she definitely lived up to her billing.

Dolgner earned AVCA All-Mideast Region and All-Big Ten honors, becoming the first UW freshman to earn all-conference honors. She led the team with 4.12 kills per game and 0.29 service aces per game. Dolgner also ranked second on the team with 2.51 digs per game and chipped in 0.50 blocks per game.

Carlini Records Kill No. 1,000

Senior Maria Clarlini recorded the 1,000th kill of her career against Iowa State on Dec. 8. She became only the 16th UW player to record 1,000 or more kills in a

The 6-2 outside hitter wrapped up her career with 1,005 kills.

Simpson Tallies 1,000 Assists

For the third season in a row, Jackie Simpson surpassed 1,000 assists. The 6-0 junior has 3,880 assists in her career and is fifth on UW's career assist list.

Simpson finished sixth in the Big Ten, averaging 12.97 assists per game.

Reineke Leads Big Ten in Blocking

Junior Taylor Reineke led the Big Ten with 117 total blocks and an average of 1.72 blocks per game. This average was just short of the UW season record of 1.77 per game set by Heather Dodaro in 1996.

Reineke leads the UW career list for blocks per game with 1.55. She needs just one more block to total 500 career blocks. She has 499 career total blocks, which ranks her sixth on the UW record list.

Wack Moves Into Second

Junior Jocelyn Wack finished the season with 494 digs, which brought her career number of digs to 1,656, ranking her second on UW's list of dig leaders. She needs just 254 digs to become Wisconsin's alltime career digs leader.

Wisconsin Sets Attendance Records

The Badgers ended the 2006 season ranked second nationally for attendance. Wisconsin averaged a UW and Big Ten record 4,328 fans per match.

Wisconsin attracted a record 73,576 spectators in 17 matches on the season, breaking the previous season best of

69,350 fans in 17 matches in 2004. The average of 4,328 fans per match bested the previous mark of 4,294 spectators per match in 2003.

The Badgers also broke their own Big Ten record for attendance in league matches. Wisconsin drew 47,110 spectators to 10 Big Ten matches in the UW Field House, breaking their own mark of 46,489 fans set in 2003. The Badgers average of 4,711 fans per match breaks their own mark of 4,649 per match set in 2003.

The UW has ranked among the top 10 in national attendance for 17 straight years, including the last seven years in a row in the top four. Wisconsin also ranked second nationally in 2003. The Badgers have led the Big Ten in attendance nine years, including five straight years from 2000-04.





Amy Bladow

A 6-2 middle blocker, Bladow was a twoyear starter for the Badgers.

She was named to the 2003 Big Ten All-Freshman team, leading the team in blocks per game. Bladow saw limited playing time her sophomore and junior seasons before returning to the Badger starting lineup as a senior.

In her final season, she played in all 33 matches, starting 32. Bladow finished second on the team and sixth in the Big Ten with 1.21 blocks per game, a career best. She had a career-high nine blocks vs. Illinois on Nov. 11 and tied or led the team in blocks in 12 matches. Bladow finished fifth on the team with a career-best 2.28 kills per game and also recorded a career-high .255 hitting percentage.

She was named the MVP of the UWM Panther Invitational in 2006, leading the Badgers to wins over Northern Colorado and UW-Milwaukee.

Maria Carlini

A 6-2 outside hitter, Carlini was a three-year starter for the Badgers.


She came to the UW as a middle blocker, playing in 31 matches and starting six as a freshman. After switching to outside hitter, Carlini earned a starting role her sophomore season, a role she played her last three years.

She was one of the UW's top offensive players and recorded her 1,000th kill in the second round of the 2006 NCAA tournament vs. Iowa State. Carlini was the 16th UW player to achieve the grand mark. She also ranks among the top UW players in career points per game (13th with 3.16), kills per game (15th/2.62), total attack attempts (15th/2,677), attack attempts per game (14th/6.97) and block solos (T13th/46).

Carlini was a four-time all-tournament selection, including being named the MVP of the 2006 InnTowner Invitational. She holds the UW four-game match record for hitting percentage, connecting on .762 (16-0-21) percent of her kills vs. Indiana in 2005. In her four years, Carlini played in 122 matches, starting 85, and 384 games.

A 6-0 setter, Lorenzen played a key backup role for the Badgers.

After redshirting her freshman season, she played in 38 matches, starting 10, and 70 games. Lorenzen saw the most action her junior season, when she played in 17 matches, starting five.

In her career, Lorenzen averaged 9.10 assists per game, which ranks fifth on the UW career record list. She totalled 637 assists, putting up a career-high 61 vs. Illinois on Oct. 3, 2004. In 2006, Lorenzen recorded a career-high 13 digs vs. Iowa.

She was an academic standout, earning four Athletic Board Scholar honors for having the highest grade point average on the team. Lorenzen is also a four-time Academic All-Big Ten honoree. She was the 2006 team captain and played a key leadership role for the Badgers.

hen you have six seniors, many who have started since they were freshmen, you expect great things from a team. From the setter to the middle blockers to the defensive specialists, the Badgers expect big things from their seniors.

"That group has been the core of our success over the last three years and they've each brought something special to the team," says UW coach Pete Waite of his six-member senior class.

"When you have this many veterans, they are able to reach new heights because of the tight connections they have together on the court. They know they have just one more season together and they have an urgency on the court to have a great finish."

A trio of the seniors have started since their freshman season, giving the UW arguably its most experienced senior class ever.

Setter Jackie Simpson, who earned second-team All-America honors in 2006, is among the key leaders. Simpson, who has recorded more than 1,000 assists in each of her first three seasons, averaged 12.85 assists per game in 2006, which ranked 37th in the nation.

She ran the Badger offense, which last season ranked 30th nationally in hitting percentage (.257) and 25th in kills per game (16.38).

"Both setters bring a unique style to the court that can help us change the pace in our matches, which our hitters also like." said Waite.

With the return of middle blocker Taylor Reineke for her senior season, the UW looks to continue it tradition of strong blocking. The 6-3 middle blocker led the Big Ten Conference and ranked eighth nationally in 2006, averaging 1.62 blocks per game. A 2006 All-Big Ten selection also led the team with a .307 hitting percentage while averaging 2.54 kills per game.

"We've been known as a strong blocking team with a balanced attack and I think those are great building blocks," said Waite. "We've focused on our defense and passing in the off season and this has proven to be a very tight knit team on the court."

The other middle blocker position is open but a trio of players in Audra Jeffers, Morgan Salow and Katherine Dykstra could see playing time in the middle. All three are versatile and may also be rotated in at the right-side or left-side hitter positions.

"All three can be strong offensive threats and excellent blockers," said Waite.

Jeffers, a 6-2 junior, ranked third on the team last season with 2.79 kills per game. She also added 0.88 blocks per game as an opposite hitter.


Salow played both left-side and middle last season while Dykstra spent most of the spring season as the Badgers' starting opposite hitter. Senior Maya Carroll will also play a role off the bench for the UW.

One area that the Badgers expect improvement in this season is their backcourt defense with the return of three senior defensive specialists—Jocelyn Wack, Amanda Berkley and Megan Mills. Junior Faye McCormack and freshman Kim Kuzma will also provide depth in the backcourt.

A three-year starting libero, Wack led the team and ranked sixth in the Big Ten with 4.41 digs per game in 2006. The 5-11 Wack has been the Badgers' ironman, having played in all 342 possible games of her career. Wack has 1,656 digs in her career and needs just 254 more digs to become Wisconsin's all-time career digs leader.

Berkley and Mills have both played key defensive roles the last two seasons while Kuzma comes in with impressive defensive credentials.

Sophomore Brittney Dolgner brings her powerful attack back on the left-side after ranking 10th in the Big Ten with 4.62 kills per game last season. She was the first UW freshman to earn first-team All-Big Ten honors and also earned all-region honors.

Waite expects sophomore Caity DuPont or freshman Allison Wack to fill in the other left-side hitter position.

"DuPont showed us some great things off the bench last season and was hitting the ball even harder in the spring," said Waite. "Al Wack brings her "A" game on a regular basis, just like her sister Jocelyn."

The Badgers also got some additional training time this summer as they traveled to Europe for 13 days, competing five times, including two matches against the Italian Junior National team.


"Our trip was fantastic and it will help us in a number of ways," said Waite. "First, the team is tighter because of what they were able to experience together. They had to be independent and solve problems. They came out of this tour stronger and more eager to learn than ever before. Secondly, the tour gave us valuable training and competition time. The teams we played all had different styles and that made our players step up their games. I think that we'll benefit in ways that we can't even predict yet, but it will show up as the season progresses."

Wisconsin will need to see the benefit quickly as it will play 10 teams that competed in the 2006 NCAA tournament, including seven teams from the Big Ten.


Waite sees this as a motivating factor for his team to be the "hardest working team in the conference every day that they walk in the gym. The Big Ten volleyball teams have earned a lot of respect nationally and this year, they will be as competitive as ever."

Badger Notes

- The Badgers return 11 letterwinners and four starters plus their libero for the 2007 season. Three of the UW starters—Taylor Reineke, Jackie Simpson and Jocelyn Wack—are three-year starters, making this one of the most experienced UW senior classes ever. Wisconsin also has one of its largest senior classes ever with six members. Other seniors include Amanda Berkley, Maya Carroll and Megan Mills.
- Senior Jocelyn Wack is on track to become Wisconsin's all-time career digs leader. She currently ranks second on the UW record list with 1,656 digs, needing only 254 more to pass Susan Wohlford, who had 1,920 digs from 1988-91. Wack, who has played in 342 of a possible 342 games in her career, leads the UW record list with 4.95 digs per game.
- In 2007, Wisconsin will play five teams that were ranked or received votes in the final 2006 USA Today/CSTV Top 25 poll. Among Big Ten Conference teams, four were ranked in the final poll—Penn State (#5), Minnesota (#6), Ohio State (#16) and Purdue (#18). The Badgers will also play BYU, which ended the season ranked 20th. The UW will also play 10 teams,

including seven Big Ten teams, that competed in the 2006 NCAA Tournament.

- Senior Taylor Reineke returns as the Big Ten's best blocker after averaging 1.62 blocks per game as a junior. Her total also ranked her eighth in the nation. Reineke is just one block shy of recording 500 career blocks. The 6-3 middle blocker will become only the sixth UW player to accomplish this feat. She currently leads the Badger record list with 1.56 blocks per game in her career and ranks fifth on the Badger career list with 499 blocks (49 solo blocks and 450 block assists).
- Senior Jackie Simpson returns as the Badgers' starting setter after earning second-team AVCA All-America honors in 2006. The 6-0 Simpson ranks fifth on the UW career list with 3,557 assists.
- Sophomore Brittney Dolgner, who was the first UW freshman to be named to the All-Big Ten team, returns as the Badgers' kill leader. In her rookie season, she lead the team and ranked 10th in the Big Ten with 4.12 kills per game.
- Seniors Taylor Reineke and Jocelyn Wack will serve as the Badgers' team captain in 2007.
- Wisconsin's 2007 freshman class of Kim Kuzma and Allison Wack is one of the best to ever put on a Badger uniform. Both players earned *Volleyball* Fab 50 honors. Kuzma was a 2007 AVCA High School Senior All-American while Wack was the 2006 Gatorade Player of the Year in Wisconsin.

- Wisconsin will host an NCAA Regional for the first time since 2000 and for the first time since the NCAA went to predetermined regional sites in 2003. Two regional semifinal matches will be held in the UW Field House on Dec. 7 with the winners playing on Dec. 8 for the right to advance to the NCAA championship on Dec. 13 and 15 in Sacramento, Calif.
- In his eighth season, Coach Pete Waite is the longest tenured head coach in UW history. He surpasses John Cook, who was the Badgers' head coach for seven seasons from 1992-98.

Waite is Wisconsin's all-time winningest volleyball coach, both in wins (202) and winning percentage (.765). He is the only UW coach to have won 100 Big Ten matches.

■ Wisconsin will make six television appearances in 2006, including a national broadcast on ESPN2. The Badgers will host Ohio State on Oct. 19 in front of a national audience.

The UW will also make five appearances on the new Big Ten Network. The Badgers open their conference season on the road at Illinois and Michigan, with both matches being aired on the league network. Home matches vs. Penn State and Illinois will also be aired as well as a road match at Ohio State.
