
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

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A Commitment to Athletics & Academics at the UW




Inclusion in the Association of American Universities and a pair of recent bowl championships are evidence that academics and athletics do indeed mix at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.




















Every spring the Badger football squad participates in a community outreach activity. Wisconsin gridiron players are also frequent visitors to local hospitals and speakers at area high schools.

Wisconsin Athletics Ranks Among The Nation's Best


The Wisconsin Badgers once again demonstrated that they are one of the NCAA's top all-sports programs in 1995-96.

Boosted by an NCAA title in men's soccer, the Badgers placed 15th in the Sears Director's Cup, which recognizes all-around excellence.

The school claimed Big Ten titles in men's soccer, cross country, indoor and outdoor track and women's cross country, tennis and outdoor track.

Wisconsin's all-sports program ranked 2nd in the Big Ten after winning a school-record seven league team titles.


Camp Randall Stadium Is Home To Badger Football


Camp Randall Stadium, built in 1917, is the home for Wisconsin's football team. The 76,129-seat facility ranks among the nation's largest school-owned stadiums.

Distinguished by its impressive double-deck structure and horseshoe design, Camp Randall Stadium has been the site of 422 Wisconsin football games, which attracted more than 19 million fans.

Besides the field, Camp Randall houses the athletic department offices, lounges and study areas for athletes, as well as film, training and weight rooms and a display of football memorabilia.


The Stadium is the centerpiece of the athletic complex. Located on the same block on the west side of campus are the McClain Athletic Facility and the UW Field House.

THE HISTORY

Camp Randall Stadium and its grounds had a rich history prior to its affiliation with UW athletics.

In the days before the Civil War, the site was owned by the Wisconsin Agricultural Society, which held its annual state fair on the grounds.

When hostilities broke out in 1861, the society gave the land to the government for a major military training center. More than 70,000 troops attended training drills at the Camp Randall complex.

After peace was restored nationally, the land was returned to state fair property. The fair later moved to Milwaukee, and Wisconsin's Civil War veterans urged the legislature to purchase the land. In 1893, the state presented the site to the university as a memorial athletic field.

Intercollegiate athletics began on campus in 1881, and football joined the scene in 1889. The first games were played on the lower part of campus. The stadium was built at its present site in 1913. A collapse of the wooden bleachers in 1915 prompted the UW to make plans for concrete stands.

STADIUM CONSTRUCTION

Two years later, a 10,000-seat concrete stadium was built with a grant of \$15,000 from the state legislature. The rest of the money came from department revenues.

The first game played in Camp Randall Stadium was a 10-7 victory over Minnesota in 1917.

Capacity of the structure has increased several times, jumping to 51,000 by 1951. A revision of the seating in 1955 boosted the capacity to 52,788. In 1958, the running track was removed, the field was lowered 10 feet and capacity increased to 63,435. A deck on the west side was added in 1966, raising the capacity to 77,745. Restructuring in the student section in '94, lowered capacity to its present level of 76,129.

The Communications Center, which is one of the Midwest's best facilities for working media, was built after the 1966 season. The three-level structure includes areas for media, game personnel, department officials and patrons.

Facility improvements have continued into this decade with the installation of an artificial turf playing field in 1990 and a computerized scoreboard and message center in 1992.

Fun & Excitement At Camp Randall Can't Be Topped








First-class Facilities: Indoors, Outdoors & At Preseason Camp

Football practice facilities at the University of Wisconsin are first rate. The Badgers utilize Camp Randall Stadium as well as a grass field adjacent to the Stadium for outdoor workouts. In inclement weather, the UW squad moves into the climate-controlled McClain Athletic Facility.

Wisconsin is one of the few schools in the nation that has an off-campus facility for its fall training camp. The Badgers spend their sessions at the Holy Name Catholic Center in Middleton, Wis.

With its multiple grass fields as well as dining, meeting and sleeping facilities, the Holy Name Catholic Center is the top fall training camp facility in the Big Ten.







The Dave McClain Athletic Facility

The Dave McClain Athletic Facility, opened in 1988, is a symbol of the Athletic Department's commitment to maintaining a first-class sports program.



The 166,264-square foot facility compares favorably with the best indoor training centers in the nation. Named in honor of the late UW football coach Dave McClain, the structure provides a suitable environment for practice during inclement weather.

A 76,380-square foot main floor features an artificial surface field (90 yards) with a ceiling high enough for kicking. The lower level includes locker rooms, training facilities and a spacious weight room.

The second level includes a theater-style auditorium (with seating for 150), class-rooms for individual position meetings and a players' lounge. The facility cost \$9.5 million to build.

McClain, the Badgers' coach from 1978-85, died of a heart attack in 1986.

Madison Is A Capital City In An Energetic University Setting


Madison is home to both the University of Wisconsin and the state capital. One of the Midwest's most vibrant communities, Madison offers an endearing quality of life to its residents and students.

The centerpiece of the city is the State Capitol. The campus is west of the Capitol and offers easy access to shopping malls, restaurants for every taste and popular night spots.


With a diverse population of nearly 200,000, Madison offers the unique combination of big-city excitement and small-town charm.

The 900-acre campus is located among gentle rolling hills and wooded areas between Lakes Mendota and Monona. Filmmakers have selected the campus as the location for films about college life; one was the 1986 summer hit *Back to School* starring Rodney Dangerfield.

One of the best loved and most visited areas of the campus is the Memorial Union Terrace, where students sit and study or socialize against a backdrop of sailboats, windsurfers and swimmers enjoying Lake Mendota.

The University Of Wisconsin-Madison

The University of Wisconsin, founded in 1848, has been recognized throughout its history as one of the nation's leading institutions of higher learning. *U.S. News & World Report*, in a 1993 issue, included UW-Madison in a list of the "Best College Buys."

From the initial class of 17, the student population has grown to a current enrollment of more than 40,000 students, the sixth-largest school in the U.S.

- Wisconsin is one of just 56 members of the Association of American Universities, the most prestigious organization in higher education in the U.S.
- University libraries house more than 5.4 million volumes, 13th-most in the nation according to the Association of Research Libraries.
- The UW had \$372 million in research and development funds in 1994, third-most in the nation according to a National Science Foundation survey.
- According to a *Standard & Poor's* survey, Wisconsin is one of the nation's top producers of corporate executives, ranking second in undergraduate degrees.
- *U.S. News & World Report* rated the UW-Madison's sociology department as No. 1 in the nation. Additionally, the magazine ranked psychology 12th, history 9th, political science 10th, economics 11th and engineering 12th.
- The 1983 Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States reported that 15 departments on campus were rated in the top 10 nationally.
- The University boasts the top-rated Department of Education in the nation according to 1990 and 1994 studies conducted at the University of Illinois.
- Throughout its history, the UW-Madison has produced 12 Nobel Prize winners, 22 Pulitzer Prize winners, 44 members of the National Academy of Sciences, 14 members of the National Academy of Engineering and two members of the National Academy of Education.






Student Affairs Office Oversees Academic Progress

The primary objective of the Department of Academic and Student Affairs office is to ensure the academic success of all UW studentathletes. Counseling and advising services, plus a number of academic help programs, are offered to all student-athletes at the University.

The academic and student affairs staff assists the UW's 700 student-athletes in registration and course selection, monitoring progress toward degrees, in career guidance and to serve as valuable resource people.

Staff members work with student-athletes who desire extra academic help. The department utilizes the services of more than 100 tutors to provide one-on-one assistance or group study help.

The department arranges for exam proctoring, offers advice on resume preparation and coordinates the grant-in-aid program. Support groups are offered to students who become medically or academically ineligible for competition.





Additionally, the Wisconsin Department of Athletics posted its best-ever academic semester in the fall of 1995. Nearly half (48 percent) of the student-athletes posted grade-point averages of at least 3.0. The 21 sports achieved a combined GPA of 2.89.


Building Better Badgers Through Strength Program

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a sophisticated blend of science, technology and one-on-one attention to each athlete. Throughout the year, UW athletes spend more time working on strength and conditioning than any other aspect of their game.

During the off-season, athletes work on strength improvement, speed, power, agility and conditioning. The in-season program is devoted to the continuation of strength gains and performance-related conditioning.

Each year when freshman players arrive, baseline measures of strength, speed, power, agility, flexibility and endurance are collected. Measures of body composition, weight and frame size are also recorded. With this information, goals are set for development and maintenance. Individual programs are established for each Badger player.

The University of Wisconsin also offers a sports nutrition program, which assists athletes in meeting their nutritional needs.



First-Year Gains

When Badger freshmen first report to campus, the UW strength and conditioning staff takes baseline measures of their physical abilities. Frequently, players make their greatest gains during their first seasons on campus when they get an opportunity to use the football program's training regimen. Shown below are several of the Badgers' redshirt freshmen and their physical gains from when they reported in August of 1995 to March of 1996.



Playing college football in the Big Ten and at the University of Wisconsin is an opportunity for success, excitement and exposure.




Coach Barry Alvarez, Badger players and the Wisconsin team were featured in nearly every major metropolitan newspaper during their Rose Bowl run of 1993. The Badgers have performed on ABC or ESPN national television 20 times in the last three years.


All games are broadcast on a state-wide radio network. Home games are replayed on public television's state-wide network each week. Alvarez has a weekly media session that routinely draws 20-plus reporters. Local media members cover Badger football on a daily basis, interviewing players after nearly every practice.

Uniforms & Pads Are CustomFitted At The UW

The Wisconsin equipment staff handles all the ordering and inventory of athletic gear for the football team.

Director Jim McCormick oversees an operation that custom fits all Badger football players for pads, jerseys, shoes and helmets.

The state-of-the-art equipment center is headquarters for the Wisconsin staff. Its unique design and location in the locker room makes it easily accessible to all players and improves its function on both game and practice days.

McCormick and his staff work closely with Coach Barry Alvarez to guarantee that Wisconsin football players have both the safest and most-innovative equipment available to insure peak performance.



Sports Medicine Facilities Provide Total Care

The Wisconsin sports medicine program features first-class facilities and the outstanding services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members utilize Cybex strength-testing devices, provide dietary analyses, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve an athlete's flexibility.

The UW is one of a handful of schools with an on-site X-ray machine, enabling physicians to quickly and thoroughly evaluate injuries and prescribe treatment.


Athletic trainers and physicians work together to design rehabilitation programs for injured athletes. A wide variety of facilities and equipment, including a rehabilitation swimming pool, Cybex equipment, the Impulse Inertial Exercise System, Stairmasters, and Fitron Bicycles, help athletes rehabilitate injuries and minimize the loss of fitness during recuperative time.











Walk-ons Get A Real Chance At Wisconsin

Not all high school football players earn scholarships to compete in college. That doesn't mean there isn't an opportunity for those individuals, especially at the University of Wisconsin, where walk-on athletes have a history of contribution.

Joe Panos became a walkon success story. Panos transferred from UW-Whitewater in 1991. He changed positions at UW, earned a scholarship, became a three-year starter, captained the Rose Bowl team and now plays for the Philadelphia Eagles.

"Walk-ons have that extra drive because they're trying to prove something," said Alvarez. "I love that spirit and determination in my players."


Among the walk-on success stories under Alvarez are academic all-Big Ten selections Korey Manley, Jeff Rasmussen, Sam Veit and Chad Cascadden. Aaron Norvell was the team's leading tackler as a senior and Chris Hein and Rick Schnetzky were starters on the Rose and Hall of Fame Bowl teams.



Alvarez vs. Wisconsin — Coach Barry Alvarez was a linebacker for the Nebraska teams which played Wisconsin in 1965 and 1966. In the 1966 contest, Alvarez intercepted a John Ryan pass at the Nebraska 28-yard line and returned it 25 yards. Nebraska won both games — 37-0 (in '65) and 31-3 ('66) — in which Alvarez participated.

Ameche, Alan — Born in Italy as Lino Dante Ameche, the future Heisman Trophy winner changed his name to Alan at age 16. Lino, in his mind, was not rugged enough.

Widely respected for his strength as a youth, he won the light heavyweight Golden Gloves novice championship of Kenosha by default. All of his rivals dropped out after learning Ameche had entered the tournament.

During his college recruitment, he was being heavily pressured to attend Notre Dame by Fred Miller, the philanthropic owner of Milwaukee's Miller Brewing Co. Wisconsin partisans, however, threatened a boycott against the buying and consumption of Miller beer if Ameche attended Notre Dame. Under threat of boycott, Miller backed off and Ameche signed with Wisconsin.

In 1953, when rules changes made it necessary for him to be an all-purpose player, Ameche played defense with such ferocity that he ended up playing 55 minutes or more in each game, prompting a nickname, "The Iron Horse."

Ameche, drafted by Baltimore, eventually turned down a lucrative offer to join the pro wrestling tour and signed with the Colts. He led the NFL in rushing his first season and was named Rookie of the Year.

Ameche passed away following heart surgery in 1988 at the age of 55.

Artificial turf — The artificial turf at Camp Randall Stadium was first installed in 1968. Wisconsin was the second school in the nation to install Tartan Turf, which was designed by the 3M Company. The \$210,000 project was funded by the UW Parking and Transportation Board in exchange for permission to convert practice fields on the north end of Camp Randall into a 500-car parking lot. That initial surface turned black in some areas when the green fiber tips broke off, so 3M sprayed the field green for the 1969 season.

Badger nickname — The sports program's nickname, "Badgers," was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin. The territory was dubbed the "Badger State," not because of animals in the region, but rather an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Prospectors came to the state looking for minerals. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bakken, Jim — Wisconsin's special events coordinator played 17 years in the NFL for St. Louis, setting almost all of the team's placekicking records and retiring as the team's all-time leading

Bucky Badger





Bucky Badger is the nation's most-popular athletic department mascot. ESPNET SportsZone staged a fan participation poll during last year's Final Four basketball tourney to determine America's favorite mascot. Bucky edged the Orange from Syracuse 50.5-49.5% to claim the first-ever national title. In a bracketed tourney-like format, UW defeated St. Jospeh's and Western Kentucky and Nebraska to make the finals.

scorer. He set NFL records in '70 converting seven of nine field goals in a 28-14 win over Pittsburgh. Bakken was selected by the Los Angeles Rams in the 1962 draft by general manager Elroy Hirsch, the former Badger great.

Band caps — When a Badger team wins an athletic contest, members of the band turn their hats around and wear them backwards. The practice started in the 1920s to symbolize the band looking back at the victory in days when they marched out with the departing crowd.

Bucky Badger — Badgers in various forms have been recognized as the school mascot for decades. The version currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white letter sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by artist Art Evans. At that time, the badger went by names like Benny, Buddy, Bernie, Bobby and Bouncey. Art Lentz, the department's publicity director, had the idea to bring the mascot to life.

The original badger mascot was too vicious to control. On more than one occasion, the live badger escaped handlers before a sideline hero recaptured the animal with a flying tackle. It was decided in the interest of fan and player safety that Wisconsin's mascot be retired to the Madison Zoo. The *Badger Yearbook* replaced the live badger with a small racoon named Regdab (badger backwards) and passed it off as a "badger in a racoon coat."

In 1949, a student in the university's art department, Connie Conrad, was commissioned to mold a paper-mache badger head. Gymnast and cheerleader, Bill Sagal, of Plymouth, Wis., was directed by homecoming chair Bill Sachse, to wear the outfit at the homecoming game. A contest was staged to name the popular mascot. The winner was Buckingham U.

Badger, or Bucky. The name apparently came from the lyrics in a song which encouraged the football team to "buck right through that line."

Bucky Badger has persevered through the years, even surviving a threat by then assistant attorney general, Howard Koop, in 1973. He suggested that Bucky be replaced by Henrietta Holstein, a loveable and productive cow. Koop argued that "kids love cows. A generation could grow up supporting the university and Henrietta Holstein." Koop's effort to overthrow Bucky failed.

Bucky even survived a cameo appearance by *Sports Illustrated* writer Rick Telander. In preparation for a book about the athletic department, Telander wore Bucky's costume at a '91 volleyball game. Telander overcame "terminal claustrophobia" in his appearance as Bucky.

Bud Song — An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've Said It All," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karmen for Budweiser beer commercials. Copyrighted by Sandlee Publishing Corporation in 1970, the song has become legendary at the University because of its polka-like rhythm. Band director Michael Leckrone said the song's popularity got started at a 1975 hockey game. "The crowd wanted to hear a polka," he said. "I didn't have any polkas. We had, just by accident, this beer commercial in the tunes we play. I told the band if we substituted the word 'Wisconsin' for 'Budweiser' it would work."

Leckrone said the song became a football tradition after a 1978 comefrom-behind victory over Oregon. "Wisconsin was behind by three touchdowns, and the crowd was really dead. I played the song to get everyone pepped up. About 20 seconds after that, Wisconsin scored a touch-

down. I played it again, and Wisconsin scored another touchdown. From then on, the band could never play enough 'Bud.'"

Colors — The University of Wisconsin Athletic Department's official colors are Cardinal and White. PMS 200 is the designated color of the cardinal.

Fifth Quarter — The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer with the band as they play traditional favorites, like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song. Originally, the post-game concert was designed to give the fans something to listen to on their way out of the stadium, but it developed into a post-game party as the band built in audience participation.

Foreign-born — Several members of the Badger football team are natives of foreign countries. Three of those Badgers, who were born outside of the United States, attended Kennedy High School in New York City and played for Coach Jerry Horowitz.

Graduating law students — At the homecoming game, graduating law students throw canes over the crossbar of the goal post in a pre-game ceremony. If students catch their cane, legend claims they will win their first case. If the cane is dropped, the case will be lost. The custom originated at Harvard and came to the UW-Madison in 1910.

"Hard Rocks" — The 1951 Wisconsin defense, known as the "Hard Rocks," led the country in total defense (154.8 per game) and was second in rushing defense (66.8). That defense allowed only 5.9 points per game and actually outscored the opponents 58-53 for the season. The defense was so terrorizing that the athletic department received a letter from one fan asking Wisconsin to "punt on first down" so he could see more of the defensive platoon.

Eight of the nine seniors on the "Hard Rocks" scored in their careers. The ninth, Bill Lane, came close. With Indiana backed up deep in its own territory for a punt, the seniors told Lane they would refrain from rushing in order to form a wedge, or "meatchopper," for him to run behind and score. Much to the seniors' dismay, freshman Don Voss missed the call and blocked the punt.


After the season, the defensive platoon challenged the offense in a charity game with one interesting twist. The offensive team could have the ball all the time, since the defense felt it could outscore its opponents even without the ball.

Elroy "Crazy Legs" Hirsch

Hirsch, Elroy "Crazy Legs" — Though he only played one season in Madison, Hirsch's legacy grew through 18 years as Wisconsin's athletic director and many more as a goodwill ambassador.

Hirsch was first tagged "Crazy Legs" on Sept. 26, 1942, after a 60-yard touchdown run vs. Notre Dame prompted a local writer to say, "His crazy legs were gyrating." After leaving Wisconsin, he starred for nine seasons with the Los Angeles Rams.

During those days in L.A., he kept busy by making three movies, including "Crazy Legs, All-

American" in which he portrayed himself. After retiring as a player, he worked in the Rams' front office before returning to Madison as athletic director from 1969-1987.

His No. 40, the number he wore at every stop in his football career but one, is retired at Wisconsin. Because of a mandatory league numbering system he wore No. 80 (double-40) for the Chicago Rockets, but had the No. 40 stitched on the inside of his jersey.

Leckrone, Michael - If the Wisconsin band is the heartbeat of spirit at UW football games, Director Michael Leckrone is its pacemaker. A merciless drill sergeant, he takes the field like a conquering general. During a football trip to Las Vegas, his band's performance earned the headline "Best Show in Town" in the local paper. Leckrone has maintained the dual role of band director and arranger, which are jobs normally divided at other schools. Leckrone is credited with beginning the "Fifth Quarter" ritual, one of the most entertaining post-game celebrations in college football.

Marek, Billy — The three-time first-team all-Big Ten running back wasn't recruited to play high school football because he had Osgood Slaughter disease (a knee ailment that affected teenagers) and didn't play seventh and eighth grade football.

The 5-foot-8 Marek carried the ball only once as a freshman at the UW,

then put together three consecutive 1,200-yard seasons. In danger of falling shy of 1,000 yards in 1974 after missing nearly three full games with injuries, Marek rushed for 704 yards in the final three games, including 304 and five touchdowns in a 49-14 rout of Minnesota. His play earned him *Sports Illustrated's* national offensive back of the week honors.

Marek was at the center of an April Fool's Day joke played by *Wisconsin State Journal* columnist Tom Butler in 1975. Butler wrote a tongue-in-cheek piece about moving the Big Ten's leading rusher to the defensive secondary for his senior season. The article ended with the phrase, "April Fools!" Unfortunately, wire service reporters did not make it to the last line, and called head coach John Jardine's house for confirmation. The AP eventually moved the story on its national wire for about a half-an-hour before the hoax was discovered.

Motion "W" — When Barry Alvarez came to Madison, he decided that the helmet logo needed to be updated to signal a new era in Wisconsin football. He entertained 15-20 different designs in 1990 before Rayovac artist Rick Suchanek developed the "Motion W," which included a tail at the back of the logo. Alvarez thought the tail was a bit much, but when it was removed, decided to go with it. The University bought the rights to the design, and the logo has been adopted by other UW sports.

Mott, Jim — There is no greater authority on UW athletics than former Sports Information Director Jim Mott. His association with the sports information office began as a student assistant in 1953. He was named assistant SID a year later and was appointed director in 1966, a position he held until his retirement in 1990.

He is a past president of the College Sports Information Directors of America and is a member of that organization's Hall of Fame.

Mott's memory is legendary among athletic department staffers. When the question of previous home night

games was being tossed around the sports information office in anticipation of a 1995 contest against Colorado, Mott noted that the UW had two previous home night games in its history. Obvious was the 1986 battle with Michigan. Mott also recalled the 1896 loss to the Carlisle Indians, including the date of the game, final score, and the fact that it was played in Chicago Coliseum. Mott, a former basketball letterman at the UW, is currently writing a book on the history of Wisconsin athletics and is still an active member of the school's football and basketball stat crews.

O'Dea, Pat — One of several Wisconsin greats from the pre-modern era of college football is kicker Pat O'Dea. The Australian-born O'Dea came to Madison in 1896 to join his brother Andy, who was crew coach and football trainer. Known as the "Kangaroo Kicker," O'Dea brought a different style to the American game of football. He learned to play the Australian game where all punting and drop-kicking was done on the run. O'Dea drop-kicked a legendary 62yard field goal vs. Northwestern during a heavy blizzard. He was also credited with a 110-yard punt (fields were 110 yards long) against Minnesota in 1897.

After his playing days, he coached at Notre Dame and Missouri before moving to San Francisco. O'Dea, who essentially had disappeared, was thought to have joined an Australian contingent which travelled through the country. Press releases surmised that he "probably lies beneath an unmarked grave in France."

The truth was, he had moved to California under the assumed name of Charles J. Mitchell, to escape the pressure of being a star ex-athlete. "Probably, I was wrong," he said in an interview with San Francisco sportswriter Bill Leiser after the 17-year exile. "I wanted to get away from my past. As Pat O'Dea, I seemed very much just an ex-football player. I was very happy as Charles Mitchell for awhile."

"On, Wisconsin" — The tune was originally composed in 1909 by Chicago's William Purdy, and the words were written by Carl Beck. Purdy and Beck had been fraternity brothers at Hamilton College (Clinton, N.Y.) and were roommates in Chicago. Purdy was going to submit the song for a \$100 prize the University of Minnesota was offering for a new football song. When Beck heard the music, he offered to write words and suggested that Purdy offer it to Wisconsin, where Beck had once studied. The song was an instant hit on campus and spread throughout the world. It was especially popular with military bands.

Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs. "On, Wisconsin" was sung for the first time at the 1909 homecoming game vs. Minnesota.


The music was adapted by current Band Director Michael Leckrone in 1969. The original version had been played virtually unchanged since its inception. "I got a lot of flak for that," Leckrone said. "The old version was one you had to wait on. I wanted to generate immediate crowd reaction, so I stepped it up a bit."


Paul Bunyan Axe — The most-played rivalry in Division I football continues this fall when Wisconsin and Minnesota meet in Madison. The UW-UM series is the nation's oldest and has been played continuously for 88 years. The neighboring schools have met on the gridiron in 104 of the last 105 seasons (the exception was 1906). The game has alternated sites between the university campuses since 1946. Much prestige was always associated with the game, and the significance




Band Director Michael Leckrone

was emphasized with its place on the schedule. Between 1933 and 1982, the Wisconsin-Minnesota game was always the final regular-season contest for each school.

The series took an added twist in 1948 when more than state bragging rights were on the line. After a 16-0 setback that season, the Wisconsin lettermen's group, the National "W" Club, presented Minnesota with an axe wielded by Paul Bunyan. He was the mythical giant of Midwestern lumber camps. Each year since, the winner of the annual battle between the Big Ten rivals is presented with the axe, complete with scores inscribed on the handle, for display on its campus.

Richter, Pat — One of the most successful athletes in UW-Madison history is Pat Richter, the last ninetime letterwinner in school history. The 6-5 Richter attended Wisconsin on a basketball scholarship, but was better known for his football and baseball exploits. Richter, of course, has been the UW's Director of Athletics since 1989.

Shalala, Donna — Secretary of Health and Human Services Donna Shalala is credited with being a major force in the Wisconsin football program's recent success. When Shalala became UW chancellor in 1988, it was the first time she led a school with a football program. Following the 1989 season, she hired Director of Athletics Pat Richter, who subsequently picked Barry Alvarez as head football coach. Her enthusiasm and support of the program won over many fans. Some boosters even sent roses to her Washington office when the Badgers earned a berth to the 1994 Rose Bowl. She attended the Badgers' Rose and Hall of Fame Bowl games.

Slab of Bacon — The Slab of Bacon trophy was the precursor to Paul Bunyan's Axe as the prize in the Wisconsin-Minnesota football series. Apparently, the trophy was presented to the winning school by a sorority from the losing institution. The trophy was discontinued in the 1940s and was discovered in a storage room at the UW Department of Athletics in 1994. It is currently housed in the football office at Wisconsin. "We took home the bacon," Coach Barry Alvarez said, "and kept it."

"Varsity" — The traditional armwaving at the end of the song,
"Varsity," was the 1934 brainstorm of band leader Ray Dvorak. He saw
Pennsylvania students wave their caps after losing a game. Dvorak later instructed Wisconsin students to salute UW President Glenn Frank after each game.

'96 Outlook

Alvarez likes club's balance and experience

Eight returning starters on both sides of the ball comprise the nucleus

With 18 starters returning, Barry Alvarez has high hopes for his 1996 football team. After fielding a relatively young squad last fall (13 players were first-year starters), the seventh-year coach welcomes back eight starters on each side of the ball plus both kickers.

What's even more exciting to Alvarez is that, despite the returning experience, several first-year players emerged during the offseason. That combination of youth and experience is a promising mix according to Alvarez.

The key, according to the head coach, is a return to the physical brand of football that he relishes.

"We need to control the line of scrimmage on both sides of the ball," said Alvarez. "That means running the football on offense and stopping the run on defense." The veteran mentor is also demanding improvement in all facets of the special teams.

Wisconsin registered a 4-5-2 mark in 1995 against the nation's second most-difficult schedule. Four of the Badgers' five losses were to bowl teams.

Among the key personnel losses from that club is four-year starting quarterback Darrell Bevell. The owner of nearly every passing record at the UW, Bevell guided Wisconsin to 26 wins and two bowl victories. He completed his career as the Big Ten's fourth all-time leading passer.


Bevell's top two targets — TE Matt Nyquist and FL Michael London — also graduated. Nyquist finished with 37 catches, and London led the team with 587 receiving yards and 41 receptions.

The losses on defense include steady linebacker Eric Unverzagt, physical tackle Jason Maniecki and pass rusher Chad Yocum. Unverzagt, who shared team MVP honors with Bevell, was a fourthround NFL pick by Seattle. Maniecki was an all-conference honoree on the field and in the classroom, and Yocum provided a spark as a pass rushing end.

With a year of seasoning, Alvarez expects the Badgers to be improved on both sides of the ball in 1996. "We have a good nucleus of players returning, and I like their sense of urgency and work ethic."

Offense hopes to regain powerful ground attack behind veteran line

The Badgers built one of the NCAA's most-punishing ground attacks during the bowl seasons of 1993 and 1994. Last season, Wisconsin averaged a school-record 221.7 yards *passing* per game. Having to replace 93 percent of the passing yards (Bevell), the Badgers will look to re-establish their prowess in the running game.

Offensive line: After losing three linemen to the National Football League prior to '95, it's a completely different story this year. Seven fifth-year seniors are in the two-deep lineup and four are probable starters.

Right tackle Jerry Wunsch and left guard Jamie Vanderveldt each earned honorable mention all-Big Ten honors as juniors and will return to their posts this fall. That duo has started 40 games in their careers, led by Wunsch's string of 23 consecutive starts.

Wunsch has great size and strength, while Vanderveldt is an excellent athlete and has worked at every offensive line position during his career.

The remainder of the line has been reshuffled. Senior Cayetano Castro started 11 times at left tackle last fall but is No. 1 at right guard now. Senior Derek Engler, who has played both guard and tackle at Wisconsin, emerged from spring camp as the top center. He played primarily right guard as a junior.


The final starter will be redshirt freshman Chris McIntosh. The 307-pound McIntosh was the state's top high school player before a knee injury his senior year shelved him. The staff feels McIntosh could be a special player in the trenches.

Three other multiple-position seniors — tackle James Darby, guard Al Gay and center Mike Rader — are the reserves. Gay and Rader split starting assignments at center as juniors and Darby started seven games at guard.

The Badgers do not have excessive depth on the line and will take a look at several true freshmen in fall camp. Another possibility is Aaron Gibson, the largest player in UW history. The 378-pound Gibson is a sophomore but could redshirt.


Tailback: Carl McCullough was a workhorse and became just the third sophomore in school history to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a season. He had five 100-yard games and was sixth nationally among sophomore runners.

Sophomore Aaron Stecker, the NCAA's top kickoff returner among freshmen, is the backup. Stecker had 100-yard rushing games vs. SMU and Minnesota. He accumulated 258 all-purpose yards, including a 100-yard kickoff return, at Minnesota.



Lanky Donald Hayes, a 6-5 target, led the club with a 19.3-yard average on 17 receptions as a sophomore.

Kevin Huntley may see action on both sides of the ball this season. The former WR is the club's starting free safety, but he could offer help at receiver in '96.

A pair of redshirt freshmen — Charles Williams and Jean Jourdain — were impressive in spring drills. Consensus prep all-American Ron Dayne, a 250-pound tailback, is another intriguing prospect.

Fullback: One of the pleasant surprises last fall was the emergence of Cecil Martin at fullback. Martin, an excellent blocker, also exhibited niftiness as a runner and receiver. He brought some balance to the backfield by gaining nearly 200 all-purpose yards.

Junior Branden Cantrell, a 245pound blocker, excelled in the spring and will push Martin. Sophomore John Waerig, who missed spring training with an injury, will contribute at fullback and as an H-back.

Receivers: The Badgers have one of the most exciting receiver combinations in the league. All-America candidate Tony Simmons has produced back-to-back 500-yard seasons. He has 15 career TDs and averaged better than 21 yards per

reception during his career. The speedy Simmons won the 200 and placed second in the 100 at the Big Ten outdoor track meet last spring. Donald Hayes, a 6-5 athlete from Madison, averaged 19.3 yards and ended the season with a 101-yard effort vs. Illinois.

Sophomore walk-on Travis Hauser along with redshirt freshmen Chris Downs and Demetrius Brown comprise the supporting cast.

Tight end: Sophomore Ryan Sondrup, who earned academic all-conference laurels, caught eight passes as Nyquist's reserve and is the front runner for that slot. Senior Kevin Lyles and walk-on Eric Grams will challenge.

Quarterback: Sophomore Mike Samuel has worked behind Bevell for two seasons and is poised to take the job. Samuel has thrown just 31 passes in his career. He is a bit stronger and more elusive than Bevell, which should give the Badgers a different look.

A pair of redshirt freshmen, Mark Zanders and Marcus White, are battling for the back-up job. Zanders was a prolific passer as a prep, and White is a skilled runner and thrower. Both rookies had productive spring games and enter the fall with confidence.


Front seven aims to stop the run, while experienced secondary is now a strength

Wisconsin's 1995 defense allowed 22.2 points per game last season, but held three foes to single-digit scoring. The Badgers limited five opponents to fewer than 100 yards rushing, including three straight. Alvarez and his staff hope to build upon that foundation.

The No. 1 goal is to stop the run. A much-improved secondary will allow for more flexibility up front with hopes of reaching that ideal.

Defensive line: Any discussion on the defensive line must revolve around senior rush end Tarek Saleh. After leading the Big Ten in tackles for loss, Saleh should receive considerable national attention. The 240 pounder is a relentless pass rusher. Saleh had nearly half (12) of the club's 25 sacks last season.

With Maniecki's graduation, the tackle slots could be filled by Rod Spiller and either Tom Burke or Neil Miklusak. Spiller, a senior, has starting experience and Burke, a sophomore, played as a true

freshman and impressed. Miklusak has been a key reserve in his career.

Another possibility is for senior Bryan Jurewicz to play some tackle. He has shifted between end and tackle during his career but now weighs 278 pounds. Jurewicz will play somewhere up front and needs to be an impact performer.

In the Badgers' substitution pattern on the line, expect sophomore Brandon Williams to see plenty of action.


Senior Azree Commander and freshmen Rob Roell, Marcus Carpenter and Eric Pauly are other possibilities. Commander is a steady leader for the unproven but talented trio of rookies.

Linebackers: Inside linebacker Pete Monty has finished second and third in tackles per game in the Big Ten the last two seasons. A leading candidate for the Dick Butkus Award, Monty stands a good chance of becoming the sixth Badger to join the 400-tackle club. The three-year starter ended last season with seven straight double-figure tackle outings.

David Lysek, a junior, should start opposite Monty. A career reserve, Lysek made 19 stops in '95. Junior Brian Flanigan and freshman redshirt Jamie Spielman should also see time.

Senior Daryl Carter had an impressive debut in his first year at outside linebacker. He finished with 88 tackles, including nine for losses. The former strong safety brings excellent athleticism to the defense. Senior Pete Diatelevi is his understudy, and Carpenter could also see action here.

Defensive backs: The entire starting secondary returns one year after the Badgers had to replace their entire backfield. Junior Jason Suttle, who had 11 passes defended, and senior Cyrill Weems are the

cornerbacks. Weems, a former quarterback, got an opportunity in 1995 and started nine games. LaMar Campbell, who started one game as a true freshmen, will push the incumbents. He was injured in the second game last season.

Junior Kevin Huntley moved from receiver to free safety and started all 11 games. He led the team with four interceptions and made 96 tackles. Huntley had moved into a prominent role at wide receiver during his rookie campaign before moving to the other side of the ball. He also took some turns on offense last spring. National prep high jump runner-up Bobby Myers showed great ability in the spring and adds another athletic body to free safety.

Former junior college all-American Giscard Bernard won the strong safety job in the spring after last year's starter, Leonard Taylor, moved to cornerback. Bob Adamov, a sophomore, is another able SS.

Badgers seek consistency from kickers and return units

Placekicker: John Hall enters his final season hoping to make one of college football's strongest legs also more consistent. Hall, who kicked a 60-yard field goal at Minnesota, led the team in scoring with 48 points. He hit on 7-14 kicks last fall and must improve on that coversion rate. Hall's long kickoffs can be a real asset for the club.

Punter: Hall also edged out returning punter Brian Alexander for those chores. Alexander averaged 36.3 yards per punt in '95.

Returners: Stecker, who was second in the Big Ten with a 24.2-yard average on kickoff returns, and Martin were the top kickoff returners. Suttle was the No. 1 punt returner in the spring and averaged more than nine yards per attempt in the final scrimmage. Alvarez is seeking more consistency, however, on both returns and coverage of returns.

Rugged Big Ten slate highlights Badger gridiron schedule

Wisconsin will face six squads that earned bowl trips last year, including five straight during one stretch. The composite 1995 record of the UW opponents is 73-57-4. Wisconsin must face bowl squads Stanford, Penn State, Ohio State, Northwestern and Michigan State in successive weeks.

The Badgers will play 12 regularseason games for the first time since 1986. Wisconsin ends the year with road games at Iowa, Illinois and Hawaii. The non-league slate includes Eastern Michigan, at UNLV and Stanford.

Barry Alvarez has coached Wisconsin to more bowl game victories than the school won in its entire history prior to his arrival.

Barry Alvarez Record at the UW: 33-31-4 (7th year)



Barry Alvarez is the only coach in Wisconsin history to lead the Badgers to consecutive January bowl game victories. Alvarez, who has served as an assistant coach in the Japan and Senior Bowls, will serve as a head coach in the '97 East-West Shrine Game in San Francisco.

Barry Alvarez, the architect of one of the best rebuilding jobs in college football this decade, enters his seventh season at Wisconsin with renewed enthusiasm.

Alvarez' clubs in the last three years have generated more wins, interest, fan support, television exposure and honors than any era in the 107 years of UW football.

When he arrived in Madison in January of 1990, Alvarez was handed the reins of a program in disarray.

There was fan apathy as the school was coming off its lowest attendance average in

There was a losing attitude since the UW had finished no better than eighth place in the Big Ten and had won just 25 percent of its games in the previous five years.

There was a lack of resources as the school faced the elimination of sports to save money and pay the bills. The pressure was on the football program to prosper and rebuild the department's financial ledgers.

Alvarez, however, had a plan. Through it all, the former Notre Dame and Iowa assistant preached togetherness, toughness, discipline, focus and a no-nonsense approach to winning. He had watched those principles succeed at his former stops.

A new level of success at the UW

What transpired was a dramatic turnaround that rallied the university, unified the state of Wisconsin and made it desirable to "be a Badger" once again.

During his tenure, Alvarez reversed the fortunes of a program that had hit rock bottom. After a 1-10 rookie season, Alvarez guided the UW to a Big Ten co-championship and Rose Bowl triumph in his fourth year.

Only two coaches in Big Ten history -Alvarez and Ohio State's Wes Fesler (1947-49) — took last-place programs their first year and turned them into league champs. Lou Holtz, Notre Dame Coach

The Badgers followed the '93 storybook season, which was the winningest in UW history, with a 1995 Hall of Fame Bowl win over Duke.

Wisconsin's two January bowl wins in the last three seasons puts it in select company. Only four other schools (Florida State, Penn State, USC and Nebraska) have accomplished that feat. The Badgers are also one of only 13 teams that have won two bowl games in the last three years.

Over the last three campaigns, the Badgers have posted a 22-9-4 (.686) record. It took the Badgers 86 games (22-64) to win that many games prior to the '93 season. Alvarez' three-year record includes the most wins (22) in a similar time period in the modern-era of Wisconsin football. His winning percentage (.686) is also tops.

Besides the obvious on-field improvement, home crowds have increased by an incredible 87.4 percent since his arrival. The Badgers averaged 78,222 at their six home games last fall to set a school record and rank eighth nationally. Wisconsin has played in front of 15 sellouts in the last 16 games at Camp Randall Stadium after going 47 consecutive games without a full house at home.

College coaching resume

Alvarez was appointed the school's 27th football coach on Dec. 31, 1989, one day after his 42nd birthday. "My old coach (at Nebraska), Bob Devaney, told me that I should set a goal for myself to take a head coaching job by the time I was 42," Alvarez said. "I missed it by one day."

For three seasons, Alvarez was an assistant for Lou Holtz at Notre Dame. He served as linebackers coach in 1987, was promoted to defensive coordinator in 1988 and to assistant head coach in 1989.

Notre Dame finished 17th, first and second in the final Associated Press poll the three seasons Alvarez was there. The Fighting Irish won an incredible 23 consecutive games in 1988 and 1989.

The 1988 Fighting Irish team won the national championship and posted a 12-0 record. As coordinator, Alvarez' defense ranked third nationally in scoring, 10th against the run and 13th in total defense.

Notre Dame was 12-1 in 1989 and the nation's No. 1 team for 11 straight weeks. Alvarez' defense keyed a 21-6 Orange Bowl victory over top-ranked Colorado.

Alvarez coached all-America linebackers Michael Stonebreaker (a consensus pick), Ned Bolcar, Cedric Figaro and Wes Pritchett in South Bend.

As an Iowa assistant, he coached linebackers from 1979-86. The Hawkeyes went to bowl games the last six years, after 17 seasons without a winning mark.

Alvarez coached five first-team all-Big Ten linebackers at Iowa. His prize pupil was Larry Station, a two-time consensus all-American. An academic all-American as well, Station set the Hawkeyes' career tackle record.

His first head coaching job was at Lexington (Neb.) High School from 1974-75. He compiled a 16-4 ledger and was the Nebraska prep Coach of the Year in 1974. Alvarez then coached at Mason City (Iowa) High School from 1976-78, compiling a 21-9 mark. Included was a 4A state title in 1978, when he was league and district Coach of the Year.

Barry got his coaching start in 1971 as an assistant at Lincoln (Neb.) Northeast High School. The squad won a state title in 1972, his second year there.

The player and the family man

A three-year letterman as a Nebraska linebacker, Barry was the top tackler among linebackers (112) for the 1967 Cornhuskers. That club led the nation in total (157.6 yards) and passing defense (90.1), was third nationally vs. the run (67.5) and created a school-record 40 turnovers. Nebraska led the Big Eight in total defense all three of Alvarez' varsity years on the way to compiling a 25-7 record and gaining berths

in the Orange and Sugar Bowls. He also played in the Blue-Gray game after his senior season.

Alvarez earned his bachelor of science degree in 1969 and a master of arts degree from Nebraska in 1971.

Barry and his wife, Cindy, have two daughters, Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson) and Stacy; a son, Chad; and a grandson, Joe. Alvarez was born Dec. 30, 1946, in Burgettstown, Pa.







A ROSY SEASON

The 1993 Badgers will be remembered as the squad that established new standards. The winningest team in UW history \dots

- was co-champ of the Big Ten and won its first Rose Bowl.
- finished fifth (coaches) and sixth (media) in the final polls.
- posted the NCAA's largest attendance increase.
- improved its record by 5.5 games from '92, the largest gain in school history. For those achievements, Alvarez was named national Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association, the Bobby Dodd Foundation, *College and Pro*

Football Newsweekly and College Sports magazine.

Alvarez also became the first Wisconsin coach to earn the Dave McClain Big Ten Coach of the Year Award. He received 94 percent of the first-place votes.

The team was led by Big Ten and Rose Bowl Most Valuable Player Brent Moss, who rushed for a school-record 1,637 yards. Quarterback Darrell Bevell also set a Wisconsin standard with 2,390 yards passing and his top target, Lee DeRamus, bettered the school's season receiving record (920 yards).


The season was also noteworthy because of the Badgers' Rose Bowl-clinching victory over Michigan State in a game that was played in Tokyo. It is the only game in Big Ten history to be played outside of the United States.

HALL OF FAME CAMPAIGN

The '94 club had to deal with increased expectations, a difficult road schedule and an unusual number of injuries to key players. Through it all, Alvarez and his Badgers met every challenge head on.

For the second year in a row, the Badgers finished strong and, in doing so, won four of their final five games. That included the school's first win at Michigan since '62, a bowl-clinching victory over Illinois and the 34-20 win over Duke in the Hall of Fame Bowl. UW finished 8-3-1.

The Badgers smashed all previous school attendance records, earned seven TV appearances and finished strong with a three-game winning streak to end the season.



A VISIT WITH ALVAREZ

On the task he faced in 1990

"It wasn't just building a program, but we had to get the entire athletic department on solid ground. It was tying a whole state together and rallying people around the state university."

Academics at Wisconsin

"People told me not to take this job because of the strong academics and the fact that you couldn't get all the kids in school. But I felt that you could use that as a positive. You have to go out and get kids who want to go to school. The degree has to be important to them. There are plenty of good football players who are good students."

Academic priorities

"I was fortunate to have coaches looking after me and emphasizing academics. I feel it's our duty (as coaches) to make sure we do everything we can to support our athletes and make sure we give them the help they need to leave Wisconsin with a degree."

Relations with people

"I'm a people person. I like to be around people. I'm never afraid to have friends on the staff. When I became a head coach, people told me I was going to become lonely. I didn't like that and said it wasn't going to happen to me."

A players' coach

"We, as a staff, sincerely care about the kids. Treat them like your own kids. If they do wrong, punish them. But try to offer guidance. I am very honest and approachable and don't take myself too seriously. My door is always open."

Midwestern ways

"I think there's a good chemistry between myself and the mindset of the people in Wisconsin. I go out and mingle with the fans, and I think people can identify with me. What you see is what you get with me."

Long-range goals


"I want to take a school that hadn't won before and build the program and sustain it like (former Nebraska Coach Bob) Devaney did. Then, when you retire, people say, 'He's the among the best who ever coached here.' I want to establish a consistent winner, not a peak-and-valley team. This is that program."

His type of player

"We've made a living on overachievers, kids who like to play football and are hard-nosed. That fits my personality. We are a blue-collar football team, and I am a blue-collar coach."

Alvarez by Year

1995: 4-5-2 (3-4-1 Big Ten)

With the most inexperienced squad in the Big Ten and facing the nation's most difficult schedule (according to the *Seattle Times*), the Badgers posted a 4-5-2 campaign. Darrell Bevell broke nearly every passing record at the UW and Tarek Saleh was a second-team all-American. The 17-9 upset at Penn State broke the NCAA's longest winning streak (20 games).

1994: 8-3-1 (5-2-1 Big Ten)

Wisconsin won its second straight January bowl game by defeating Duke in the Hall of Fame Bowl. The regular season featured a win at Michigan for the first time since 1962, the first shutout in 114 games and a school-record 632-yard total offensive output vs. Indiana. Center Cory Raymer was a consensus all-American. Seven players were drafted by the NFL and five others signed free agent contracts.

1993: 10-1-1 (6-1-1 Big Ten)

The winningest team in UW history was Big Ten co-champ, beat UCLA in the Rose Bowl and was ranked as high as fifth (coaches) in the final polls. UW had the NCAA's largest attendance increase, and its .875 winning percentage was the best by a Big Ten team since '79. The 5.5-game improvement in the win column was the best in school history. A school-record eight players were named first-team all-Big Ten. Tailback Brent Moss was the Badgers' first Big Ten Most Valuable Player since 1962.

The UW was 5-6 and climbed in the Big Ten standings for the third season in a row. The Badgers upset 12th-ranked Ohio State, the first win over a nationally rated foe in eight years. Wisconsin received votes in the polls and ended the year one win short of a bowl bid. Three of the losses were by a total of four points. Inside linebacker Gary Casper set the school's career tackle record.

1991: 5-6 (2-6 Big Ten)

Wisconsin improved its win total by four games, the fourth-largest improvement in the NCAA. Troy Vincent was an all-American and runner-up for the Jim Thorpe Award. A victory at Minnesota broke a 23game road losing streak.

1990: 1-10 (0-8 Big Ten)

The UW was within striking distance entering the fourth quarter in 10 games, although its only victory was a 24-7 triumph over Ball State. Wisconsin had the third-best attendance gain in the NCAA.

Mike Cassity Defensive Backs

Mike Cassity, a defensive coordinator at five previous schools, is in his second campaign as secondary coach at Wisconsin. Cassity's troops, which included four first-year starters, showed steady improvement last fall. The Badger secondary surrendered less than 210 yards passing in six of the final seven games after allowing 263 yards per game in the first four outings.

His area of expertise is the secondary, but Cassity has served as coordinator of defenses at Cincinnati (1994), Georgia Tech (1992-93), East Carolina (1990-91), NE Louisiana (1989) and Western Kentucky (1983-88).

As Cincinnati's coordinator and secondary coach in 1994, the Bearcats' pass defense surrendered just 149.2 yards per game.

Cassity helped build an outstanding tradition at East Carolina, where he was defensive coordinator for Coach Bill Lewis. The '91 Pirates posted the winningest season in school history (11-1), won the Peach Bowl and had the nation's fourth-best turnover margin. Cassity was a member of the National Coaching Staff of the Year as selected by one publication.

Among his players at East Carolina were Dallas Cowboys Robert Jones and Chris Hall. Jones has been an NFL All-Pro selection. He also coached safety Greg Grandison, a Kodak first-team all-American.

Cassity then followed Lewis to Georgia Tech, where he again served as defensive coordinator for two years. The top player on his Tech defensive units was tackle Coleman Rudolph, a second-round draft pick of the New York Jets.


Two of Cassity's defenses at Western Kentucky ranked in the Top 10 nationally for total defense. He spent one year (1989) in charge of the defense at NE Louisiana.

Prior to his stretch of coordinator positions, Cassity was a member of coaching staffs at Morehead State (1982) and Kentucky

(1979-81). He was also a graduate assistant for six months at Kentucky, his alma mater, before joining Fran Curci's full-time staff for two-and-a-half years as secondary coach.

Cassity's first coaching post was at Tilghman High School (Paducah, Ky.), where he served from 1976-79.

The 43-year-old Cassity was a five-time letterman at Kentucky, where he competed in football and wrestling. Cassity earned the Wildcats' 110 Percent award on the gridiron and was SEC wrestling runner-up at 190 pounds as a senior. He was an all-state football player and two-time state wrestling champ as a prep.

Brad Childress Offensive Coordinator & Quarterbacks

After designing the second and third-best rushing offenses in school history in 1993 and 1994, Wisconsin's imaginative offensive coordinator Brad Childress turned his attention to the air last fall. The Badgers averaged 221.7 yards passing and completed 206 passes to establish school records.

Childress, in his fifth year as coordinator of the Badger offense, leaned on quarterback Darrell Bevell to direct fortunes last fall after the loss of three tailbacks — Terrell Fletcher, Brent Moss and Jason Burns — who made NFL rosters in 1995. The result was the thirdrated passing offense in the Big Ten last fall.

Childress came to Wisconsin in 1991 as running backs coach and was promoted to offensive coordinator in charge of quarterbacks his second season.


Childress' 1993 offense set a Wisconsin record by averaging 455.2 total yards per game, then the fourth-highest mark in Big Ten history. That club ranked first in the league in rushing (eighth nationally) and total offense (12th), second in scoring (25th) and fourth in passing. The Badgers established a Big Ten record for completion percentage in a season (.675).

The '94 Badgers averaged 29.8 points per game, the fourth-best mark in school history, and gained more than 5,000 total yards for the second year in a row. Wisconsin set a modern-era school record with a 632-yard total offensive output against Indiana. The Badgers ended the season ranked ninth in rushing and 18th in total offense according to NCAA figures.

His prize pupil at the UW was Darrell Bevell, a four-year starter who concluded his career with 17 passing and total offense school marks. The Big Ten's fourth all-time leading passer (7,686 yards) became only the fifth QB in league history to pass for at least 7,000 yards and complete 60 percent of his passes. He also set league completion percentage marks for a game and season.

Prior to joining the UW staff, Childress was wide receivers coach at Utah (1989) and offensive coordinator at Northern Arizona (1986-89). His quarterback at NAU, Greg Wyatt, passed for more than 10,000 yards and set more than 60 school and NCAA records. Wyatt completed 962 passes, the second-most in college history at the time.

Childress coached quarterbacks and helped with the computerized scouting department of the Indianapolis Colts in 1985 after a seven-year stint (1978-84) at Illinois. He was a full-time assistant with the running backs and wide receivers his final five campaigns in Champaign after two years as a graduate assistant. He coached the Illini's David Williams, who caught a Big Ten-record 101 passes in 1984.

Kevin Cosgrove Defensive Coordinator & Inside Linebackers

Defensive coordinator Kevin Cosgrove, one of the original members of Barry Alvarez' coaching staff at Wisconsin, enters his second season as defensive coordinator and his seventh year tutoring inside linebackers.

The Badger defense last fall allowed 22.2 points per game and held three opponents to single-figure scoring. Wisconsin beat SMU 42-0, just the school's second shutout in the last 128 contests. The Badgers had a string of 100 consecutive shutout minutes vs. Stanford, SMU and Penn State. Wisconsin held five foes, including three straight, to less than 100 yards rushing for the first time since 1982.

Cosgrove, who has built a reputation for developing first-rate linebackers, has coached the Badgers' leading tackler in five of the last six years.

Pete Monty and Eric Unverzagt, the UW starters the last two seasons, recorded more than 100 stops each in both '93 and '94. Both players were accorded all-Big Ten mention last fall. Unverzagt, who was drafted by Seattle, was Badger co-MVP as a senior. Monty led the Big Ten in total tackles (137).

A pair of Cosgrove starters, Yusef Burgess and Unverzagt, were the top tacklers on the 1994 Rose Bowl squad. Burgess was a second-team all-Big Ten honoree after leading the league in fumbles forced.

The linebackers on the 1992 club, Aaron Norvell and Gary Casper, finished third and fifth, respectively, in Big Ten total tackles. Casper left Wisconsin as the career tackle leader (447).


Cosgrove, who has coached collegiate defenses since 1980, was inside linebackers coach for Earle Bruce at Colorado State in 1989. He was defensive coordinator at Southeast Missouri State for one season (1988) and led Illinois' linebackers from 1980-87. He coached in three bowl games with the Illini, including the 1984 Rose Bowl.

One of the midwest's top recruiters, he

signed Jeff George, Moe Gardner and Darrick Brownlow at Illinois. George was the NFL's No. 1 draft pick in 1990, Gardner was a twotime consensus all-American and Brownlow was Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year.

His Wisconsin recruits include Terrell Fletcher, Lamark Shackerford and Monty. Fletcher, the school's career leader in all-purpose yardage, plays for the San Diego Chargers. Shackerford was a two-time consensus all-Big Ten choice, and Monty has a chance to become the UW's all-time tackle leader.

Cosgrove concluded the '95 season by assisting Coach Barry Alvarez at the Blue-Gray all-star game. Cosgrove helped install a defensive scheme which helped the Blue team to a 27-6 win.

Jay Hayes begins his second full season as an assistant coach at Wisconsin with responsibilities for the outside linebackers and special teams. Hayes' appointment in December of 1994, reunited him with Coach Barry Alvarez. Hayes worked previously with Alvarez while both were at Notre Dame.

Hayes is given credit for helping develop Badger Daryl Carter, a first-year starter at outside linebacker last fall. Carter was credited with 88 tackles and was named *Athlon's* National Defensive Player of the Week at Penn State after making 13 tackles.

Hayes' special teams last fall provided two of the longest plays in UW history. John Hall connected on a 60-yard field goal at Minnesota, the fourth-longest kick in NCAA history without the use of a tee. Aaron Stecker had a 100-yard kickoff return vs. the Golden Gophers, and he led the nation's freshmen with a 24.2-yard kickoff return average.

Prior to the UW, he worked three seasons at California. Hayes coached outside linebackers in 1992-93 and added special teams responsibilities in 1994. In his second season at Cal, the Golden Bears posted a 9-4 record and defeated Iowa in the Alamo Bowl.

As a four-year member of the Fighting Irish coaching staff, Hayes helped Notre Dame to a 41-7 record and New Year's Day bowls each season. Hayes joined the Notre Dame staff as a graduate assistant in 1988, the year the Fighting Irish captured the national championship. He received a promotion to full-time coaching duties with the OLBs and special teams the following three seasons (1989-91).


Notre Dame earned berths in the Fiesta (1988), Orange (1989-90) and Sugar (1991) Bowls during his stay. Among the players he coached at Notre Dame were pro draft picks Andre Jones (Detroit), Devon McDonald (Indianapolis), Scott Kowalkowski (Philadelphia) and Karmeelyia McGill (Cincinnati).

A defensive lineman at Idaho, Hayes was a two-time (1980-81) first-team all-league pick. He was team captain as a senior. Hayes received his B.S. degree in history from Idaho in 1984.

Jim Hueber Offensive Line

Jim Hueber, who helped the Badgers establish one of the top rushing offenses in the nation, starts his fifth season at Wisconsin and his second campaign in charge of the offensive line. Hueber coached running backs for three years before switching to the offensive line in 1995.

Hueber's line, which lost three players — Mike Verstegen (Saints), Joe Rudolph (Eagles) and Cory Raymer (Redskins) — to the NFL, allowed just 16 sacks last year. Guard Jamie Vanderveldt and tackle Jerry Wunsch earned honorable mention all-Big Ten recognition in '95. The line, which had only one returning full-time starter, helped pave the way for Carl McCullough's 1,038 rushing yards.

As running backs coach from 1992-94, Hueber worked with Brent Moss and Terrell Fletcher, the school's No. 2 and No. 3 career rushers. Each gained more than 3,400 yards. Moss (1,637 yards in 1993) and Fletcher (1,476 in 1994) have the top two season rushing figures in UW history.

The Moss-Fletcher duo combined for 2,633 yards in the Rose Bowl championship season, the eighth-highest total for a backfield tandem in NCAA history. The Wisconsin pair combined for the second-most yardage in college history for the same tandem in consecutive years. Only SMU's Eric Dickerson and Craig James gained more yardage in back-to-back campaigns.

Fletcher became the Badgers' career allpurpose yardage leader, was MVP of the Hall of Fame Bowl and played as an NFL rookie at San Diego. As a junior, Moss was Big Ten and Rose Bowl Most Valuable Player.

Wisconsin's rushing offense, which averaged less than 100 yards per game in the two years prior to his arrival, finished eighth (school-record 250.8-yard average) and ninth nationally in 1993 and 1994. The Badgers finished first (in 1993) and second (1994) in

Big Ten rushing and had six games of at least 300 yards rushing in those two campaigns.

Hueber came to Wisconsin after an eightyear stint at Minnesota, where he was assistant head coach, offensive coordinator and an assistant coach with the offensive line and running backs. Eight of his Gopher linemen were drafted by the NFL. Minnesota earned two bowl trips during his tenure.

Hueber's lengthy resume before Minnesota includes offensive coaching positions at Memphis State (1983), Temple (1981-82), Wichita State (1979-80), Dodge City Community College (1975-78) and Cincinnati (1974). He was recruiting coordinator at Temple, Wichita State and Dodge City.

Henry Mason Wide Receivers

Henry Mason, who worked closely with the Badgers' record-setting pass offense, begins his second season in charge of wide receivers at Wisconsin. Mason handled similar responsibilities at Western Michigan prior to joining the UW staff.

Wisconsin's passing offense finished fourth in the Big Ten but established school records for average yards (221.7) and completions (206). Senior Michael London, who had 10 career catches entering the '95 season, led the club with 41 grabs. Tony Simmons led the UW in TDs (seven) and moved into 10th in career receiving yardage at Wisconsin after only two campaigns.

The 40-year-old Mason was wide receivers coach for the Broncos for four seasons (1991-94) while WMU posted a 27-15-2 mark. Mason also worked with the kick returners. Western Michigan led the Mid-American Conference in passing three of his four seasons. Three of Mason's former players earned pro contracts. The Broncos had more than 2,700 yards passing his final season on the way to a 7-4 record. Three of his receivers had at least 40 grabs, including team leader Andre Wallace, who caught 68 passes for 758 yards as a senior in 1994.


Prior to joining the staff at Western Michigan, Mason was head coach at Smith-Cotton High School in Sedalia, Mo., for six years. Mason's mark at Smith-Cotton was 31-31, and his 1988 club became the first team at the school in 13 years to post a winning record. That squad earned a playoff appearance. Seven of his players continued their careers in college. Mason was offensive coordinator at Smith-Cotton for three seasons (1982-84) before being named head coach.

Mason started his college career as an assistant at Baker University (1981) in Baldwin, Kan. He coached wide receivers and quarterbacks on a 7-3 club. That team

finished third in the Heart of America Conference for passing.

His initial coaching position was as an assistant at Lexington (Mo.) High School. Mason worked with running backs and defensive backs on clubs that posted a 21-0-1 record and won one state championship.

The Marshall, Mo., native is a 1979 graduate of Central Missouri State. Mason was a second-team UPI all-American in football in 1976 and an honorable mention selection in 1978. John Palermo Assistant Head Coach & Defensive Line

John Palermo is in his sixth year at Wisconsin and his second season in charge of the Badgers' defensive line. Palermo, the team's assistant head coach, handled UW outside linebackers for four years (1991-94) before moving to the defensive line last fall.

Palermo's defensive line was one of the main reasons that Wisconsin held five opponents to less than 100 yards rushing for the first time since 1982. Tarek Saleh and Jason Maniecki were his star players last fall.

Saleh was a consensus first-team all-Big Ten selection and ranked fifth nationally in tackles for loss. Saleh, who was recruited by Palermo, led the Big Ten in sacks. Maniecki, an all-conference pick on the field and in the classroom, was a fifth-round NFL draft pick.


Palermo, a nine-year veteran of the Big Ten, has coached four OLBs — Dwight Reese (1992), Chad Yocum (1992), Chris Hein (1994) and Saleh (1994) — who received all-league mention.

Palermo assisted with the development of the defensive schemes that Wisconsin used when it was nationally ranked in rushing defense in both 1992 and 1993. The Rose Bowl team of 1993 surrendered just 16.3 points per game, the lowest average since 1963. Palermo's two-deep lineup on that team included a pair of walk-ons and two first-year freshmen.

Before joining Alvarez' staff at the UW, Palermo was head coach for one year (1990) at Austin Peay. In two seasons (1988-89) at Notre Dame, Palermo and Alvarez designed the Fighting Irish defense, which ranked 13th and 14th nationally in total defense. The Irish won the national title in 1988 and registered a 24-1 record during his tenure, and the defense held 10 foes to single-digit scoring.

His feature players on Notre Dame's line included consensus all-America choice Chris Zorich, now with the Chicago Bears.

Palermo worked four seasons (1984-87) at Minnesota, helping the Gophers to the 1985 Independence and 1986 Liberty Bowls. He was also an assistant coach at Appalachian State (1983), Memphis State (1980-82) and Austin Peay (1979) and a graduate assistant at North Carolina State (1977-78).

Brian White Running Backs

Brian White, the newest member of the Badger offensive coaching staff, starts his second campaign as running backs coach. The 32-year-old White had served as an assistant working with running backs and wide receivers for the past nine years at four different schools.

For the Badgers, White aided the development of 1,000-yard rusher Carl McCullough. Just the third sophomore in UW history to run for at least 1,000 yards, McCullough was sixth nationally in rushing among sophomores. McCullough and Aaron Stecker had seven 100-yard rushing games in '95.

White came to Wisconsin from UNLV, where he worked in 1994 with Coach Jeff Horton, one of the nation's top authorities in the passing game. The Rebels won the Big West championship and defeated Central Michigan in the Las Vegas Bowl.


As the UNLV passing game coordinator and wide receivers coach, White worked with Randy Gatewood, who caught 92 passes as a senior. He set NCAA records with 23 receptions and 363 yards receiving against Idaho. White worked previously (1990-92) at UNLV, where he coached running backs.

Between assignments at UNLV, White was an assistant to Horton at Nevada-Reno in 1993. As coordinator of the pass offense, he coached quarterback Chris Vargas and receiver Bryan Reeves. Vargas led the nation in total offense, and Reeves was the nation's second-leading receiver with 92 catches. Reeves plays for the Phoenix Cardinals. Nevada-Reno led the nation in total offense with a per-game average of 589.

White spent two years (1988-89) at Notre Dame as a graduate assistant. He worked with the running backs, including pro players Ricky Watters, Tony Brooks, Mark Green, Anthony Johnson and Rodney Culver. His first coaching job was at Fordham, where he tutored runners.

As a player, White blossomed as a quarterback at Harvard, leading the Crimson to a 7-3 record in 1985. He was second-team all-Ivy League and finished his career as the school's second all-time leading passer (2,335 yards). A two-year starter on the field, White also made the ECAC honor roll. White has a B.A. in history from Harvard (1986), an M.A. from Fordham (1988) and an MBA from Notre Dame (1990).

White's father, Don, lettered for three years at Notre Dame and was the Fighting Irish starting QB in 1959.

Bernie Wyatt Tight Ends & Recruiting Coordinator

Veteran collegiate coach Bernie Wyatt begins his seventh season as a member of the Badger coaching staff. He is the lone remaining offensive coach from Barry Alvarez' original staff.

Wyatt is beginning his fifth season in charge of tight ends. One of the nation's most respected and effective East Coast recruiters, Wyatt came to the UW as recruiting coordinator (1990-91) before returning to the field as tight ends coach in 1992. For the last three years, Wyatt has coached tight ends and coordinated recruiting.

As tight ends coach, Wyatt worked with four-time all-Big Ten choice Michael Roan. Under Wyatt's guidance, Roan had 92 career receptions (sixth-most in Wisconsin history). Roan played last fall for the Houston Oilers.

Wyatt's top player last fall was Matt Nyquist, who finished with 37 catches. He set a UW record with 13 catches against Iowa. Nyquist became just the third player in UW history to gain academic all-Big Ten honors four times in his career and signed a free agent contract with Houston in 1996.

Wyatt's recruiting skills are well-documented in the record books. Three of his Badger recruits — Lee DeRamus (Saints), Kenny Gales (Bears) and Eric Unverzagt (Seahawks) — have been drafted by the NFL. DeRamus is the school's second all-time leading receiver despite playing just three years. Unverzagt was co-MVP of the '95 club.

Wyatt, who has 22 years of experience coaching in the Big Ten, worked 16 seasons at Iowa before rejoining Alvarez in Madison. The duo was on Hayden Fry's staff for eight years at Iowa.

Wyatt was the Hawkeyes' first full-time recruiting coordinator (1979). He worked with Hawkeye outside linebackers and tutored several of his own recruits — Andre Tippett and Joe Mott — who went on to pro careers. Tippett, a perennial NFL All-Pro with the Patriots, was a 1981 consensus all-

American at Iowa. Wyatt signed many eventual NFL players at Iowa, including Ronnie and Kevin Harmon, Bob Kratch, Mike Devlin, Quinn Early, Devon Mitchell and Owen Gill.

Before joining the Iowa staff, Wyatt was a high school coach at Iowa City (Iowa) Regina and Lindenhurst (N.Y.) high schools. His Lindenhurst squads were 37-8-1.

The former high school all-American at Amityville (N.Y.) High School broke many of NFL Hall of Famer Jim Brown's prep records. He was inducted into the Suffolk County Hall of Fame in 1995. Wyatt was the Hawkeyes' team MVP in 1960 when the club was 8-1. He played in the Blue-Gray all-star game and continued his playing days for one season (1961) with the Steelers.

Prior to assuming his present duties, Jenkins directed the Space Management and Leasing Bureau at the Department of Administration.


He also was director of the Wisconsin Bureau of Building Management and was a facility manager at the Trammell Crow Company in Milwaukee.

David Ward Chancellor, UW-Madison

Chancellor David Ward, the university's 25th chief executive, is actively positioning the University of Wisconsin-Madison for continued excellence in the next century.

Ward, who assumed the chancellorship in June 1993, insists that the university must anticipate societal changes relevant to higher education, and envisions the university as more of an educational partner with public schools, businesses, industry, and its alumni and friends.

"We have a tradition of excellence upon which to build and much to preserve, but I believe it is time for the university to start doing some things differently - not just doing the same things better," said Ward in his 1995 report to the university community entitled "A Vision for the Future: Priorities for UW-Madison in the Next Decade."

"To achieve these ends, we need to pursue our goals within a shared vision of a university that will be as outstanding in the next century as it has been in the past, and is in the present."

Ward was named chancellor after serving as vice chancellor for academic affairs and, additionally, as provost. As the chief executive officer, he has led efforts to improve the quality of undergraduate education, including improved class access and increased undergraduate engagement in research. He has coordinated efforts to enhance the diversity of the UW-Madison campus and restore support for the university's infrastructure, such as libraries, laboratories and computer facilities. Ward has helped to adapt some of the principles of quality management to academic objectives of the campus.

Ward, who also holds the Andrew Hill



Clark Professorship of Geography, says "changes in our funding, in the public's perception and confidence in higher education, and in the demand for high levels of accountability, require us to demonstrate our skills in strategic planning so that citizens of Wisconsin are able to recognize our commitment to education."

Ward was born in Manchester, England, and received bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Leeds. He earned a Fulbright Travel award to the United States in 1960 and received a doctorate from UW-Madison in 1963. In 1966 he joined the faculty. He later served as chair of the geography department and, still later, associate dean of the Graduate School.

As a scholar Ward is a recognized authority in urban geography. He is a past president of the Association of American Geographers. He has authored two books, edited two books and contributed many articles in leading academic journals. In recognition of his postdoctoral research, Ward was awarded the degree of Litt.D. by his undergraduate alma mater.

Ward is married to Judith B. Ward, who is the executive associate director of the Waisman Center on Mental Retardation and Human Development. They have two sons.

Administration



Pat Richter Director of Athletics

Director of Athletics Pat Richter, the former Badger all-America gridiron star, three-sport letterman and successful business executive, is the man in charge of one of the NCAA's most thriving athletic departments.

During a time of budget tightening, presidential reform and gender equity concerns, Richter has built a model intercollegiate program.

As Director of Athletics, he is responsible for 20 sports, nearly 700 student-athletes and more than 160 employees. Consider that during his administration, he ...

• inherited a division that was \$2.1 million in debt in 1990 and eliminated the red ink on the ledgers in less than four years. That recovery came during a time when three-quarters of the Division I programs in the United States were losing money.

• watched the football, basketball and hockey squads set season attendance marks during his administration. Football attendance has risen every year since his arrival.

• oversaw plans for significant facility improvements, most notably the proposal for the \$72 million Kohl Center. Groundbreaking for the future home of Wisconsin basketball and hockey occurred last spring.

Perhaps one of Richter's most satisfying seasons as Director of Athletics was the 1993-94 campaign when his alma mater won the Rose Bowl and qualified for its first NCAA men's basketball tournament in 47 seasons.

All 20 of the division's sports have competed in NCAA post season play during his tenure, and the UW has placed in the top 20 for total sports success in all three seasons of the Director's Cup. The Badgers have claimed two — hockey (1989-90) and men's soccer (1995) — NCAA championships during Richter's tenure.

Badger playing days

As a player, he earned all-America (1961-62) and academic all-America (1962) honors as an end. He led Wisconsin to the 1963 Rose Bowl and set a record with 11 receptions.

In the first ever college football game between No. 1 and No. 2 ranked teams, Richter and his Badger teammates dropped a 42-37 decision to USC at Pasadena.

Richter led the Big Ten in receiving twice and is still the third-leading receiver in school history. As a senior, Richter won Wisconsin's 1963 Big Ten Medal of Honor.

He earned all-league honors in baseball and led UW in hits, homers and RBI three times. The 6-5 center received his scholarship for basketball.

Professional life

After earning his B.S. degree from the UW in landscape architecture (1964), Pat was a first-round draft pick of the Washington Redskins. He played from 1963-71.

Upon retirement from the NFL, he returned to Wisconsin to earn his law degree (1971). After working at a Madison law firm, he climbed his way to vice president of personnel at Oscar Mayer Corporation.

Honors and awards

Richter was honored with an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award for post-college achievements in 1988. He is a member of the Wisconsin State Athletic and Madison Sports Halls of Fame, the NFL Player and Alumni Associations and the American Bar Association. Pat was enshrined in the Athletic Department and Rose Bowl Halls of Fame in '91 and '94, respectively. In the spring of 1995, he became the second Badger to gain induction into the GTE Academic All-America Hall of Fame. He also became just the seventh Badger in school history to be inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame. He will be recognized at halftime of the Stanford football game on Sept. 21.

Pat and his wife, Renee, have four children: Scott, Brad, Barry and Tim.

'95 Review

Badgers set marks for attendance, passing and long plays in 4-5-2 campaign

Season summary

Wisconsin completed its 1995 football campaign with a 4-5-2 overall record (.455) and a 3-4-1 Big Ten slate. The Badgers tied for seventh (with Illinois) in the conference race.

Faced with having to replace a league-high 12 starters, including five first-team all-conference selections from its '94 squad, the Badgers played one of the nation's most difficult schedules.

The schedule included games with four clubs — Colorado (13th by Associated Press), Penn State (6th), Ohio State (4th) and Northwestern (11th) — that ranked in the nation's top 15 when they faced Wisconsin.

The Seattle Times rated the Badgers' 1995 slate as the nation's most difficult. Seven Badgers opponents were selected to play in postseason bowl games. In the Big Ten's eight-game schedule, Wisconsin did not face last-place Indiana or Michigan.

The Badgers' up-and-down campaign included consecutive wins just once (SMU and Penn State) and back-to-back losses just once (Ohio State and Northwestern). The UW also mixed in two ties for the first time in 17 years.

The head coach

Barry Alvarez finished his sixth season at Wisconsin with a 33-31-4 record. Alvarez has guided the UW to its only January bowl game wins in school history. The Badgers have won two bowls — 1994 Rose and

1995 Hall of Fame — in the last three seasons. Only one UW coach — Dave McClain (1981-84) — has led the UW to three bowls in four years.

The Badgers' win total under Alvarez through 68 games is equal to what the school won in 86 contests prior to his arrival. His teams have a 22-9-4 (.686) mark since 1993. The 22 triumphs in that three-year period are the most wins in a similar time frame in the modern-era of Wisconsin football. Dave McClain posted 21-13 (1982-84) and 21-14 (1981-83) marks during his tenure.

The Badgers, whose cumulative three-year league record is fourthbest in the Big Ten, have registered a 14-7-3 conference mark since 1993. That win total in league play is greater than the UW earned in eight years combined (12-52) prior to '93.

Streak breaker

Perhaps the biggest win of the '95 season was a 17-9 upset at Penn State. The Wisconsin victory ...

- broke PSU's 20-game winning streak, the longest in Division I.
- was the first home loss for the Nittany Lions in two seasons.
- broke streaks of 12 straight Big Ten wins and 17 consecutive September victories for PSU.

Wisconsin held the Nittany Lions, who averaged 208.6 yards rushing in '95, to just 83 yards on the ground. It was PSU's lowest rushing total in four years. Penn State, which entered the game ranked sixth nationally, was the highest rated foe that the UW had beaten in a decade

(Ohio State was third in 1985).

Another important triumph for the Badgers was the 34-27 win at Minnesota, which allowed Wisconsin to reclaim the fabled Paul Bunyan Axe. The Axe, which has gone to the winning school in this rivalry every year since 1948, is back in Madison after a two-year absence.

Defensive items

The UW defenders allowed 22.2 points per game, sixth-best in the Big Ten ... three Badger opponents failed to reach double-figure points ... Wisconsin shut out SMU 42-0 to record the largest margin of victory in the Alvarez era and the 10thlargest in the modern era at the UW ... it was the Badgers' first shutout in 15 games and just the second in the last 128 contests ... Wisconsin had a string of 100 consecutive shutout minutes vs. Stanford, SMU and Penn State ... the Badgers held five opponents to less than 100 yards rushing, including three straight ... those feats had not been accomplished at the UW since 1982 ... Wisconsin opponents did not convert on any third-down plays of more than 10 yards (0-23) ... the Badgers were 6-26 on similar plays ... UW's defensive rushing average was 170 yards per game ... it was unusual, however, that five foes failed to gain 100 yards rushing and six adversaries rushed for more than 200 yards.

Inside the offensive numbers

The Badgers averaged 221.7 yards passing to set a school record ... the old mark was 216.4 yards per game established in 1983 ... Wisconsin set a team record for completions (206) and finished just 14 yards shy of the passing yardage mark ... the 1993 club set the yardage standard (2,453

yards) in a 12-game schedule ... the Badgers were third in the league in passing offense and one of three schools to complete at least 60 percent of their passes ... the 350.6-yard total offense average was the third-best in the last 11 years at the UW ... only the '94 and '95 teams produced more total offense.

The house is filled

Wisconsin, which sold a school-record 60,000 season tickets in '95, eclipsed its home-game average attendance record. The Badgers averaged 78,222 at their six home games. That bettered the mark of 77,328 set in 1995. The UW played in front of eight sellouts in 1995 and has performed before capacity crowds at Camp Randall Stadium in 10 of its last 11 outings.

A crowd of 79,507 fans watched the home game vs. Ohio State. It was the largest home gathering to see the Badgers play during the Alvarez era and was the fifth-largest in Camp Randall Stadium history.

Long-distance dedications

Two of the longest plays in Wisconsin history occurred in the win at Minnesota.

Kicker John Hall booted a 60-yard field goal at the end of the first half. The kick split the uprights and had enough distance to hit the net behind the goalposts.

The field goal was ...

- the longest in school history.
- the fourth-longest in the modern era of the Big Ten.
- the longest in the modern era of the Big Ten without the use of a tee, which was outlawed in 1988.
- the fourth-longest in NCAA history without a tee.

The Badgers got another big play from their special teams at Minnesota when Aaron Stecker returned a kickoff 100 yards. The other 100-yard returns in Wisconsin history were by Ira Matthews vs. Iowa in '76 and by Michael Jones against Northwestern in '84.

Cyrill Weems had a 75-yard interception return at Purdue for a TD. It was the fourth-longest return in school history and the first for a touchdown since Jeff Messenger vs. Duke in the Hall of Fame Bowl.

All-Big Ten honors

Defensive end Tarek Saleh, a firstteam all-Big Ten pick by the coaches and media, led the contingent of Badgers who received league honors.

Quarterback Darrell Bevell and linebacker Pete Monty were secondteam choices by the media. Defensive tackle Jason Maniecki was a second-team pick by the coaches.

Tight end Matt Nyquist, linebacker Eric Unverzagt and offensive linemen Jamie Vanderveldt and Jerry Wunsch were honorable mention.

Academic all-Big Ten mention went to Nyquist (fourth time), Maniecki (third time), DL Bryan Jurewicz (second time), OL Mike Rader and TE Ryan Sondrup.

All-star Badgers

Several Badger seniors played in postseason all-star games. Eric Unverzagt played in the East-West Shrine Game. Jason Maniecki participated in the Senior Bowl and the Blue-Gray Game. Matt Nyquist joined Maniecki in the Blue-Gray game. Barry Alvarez served as cocoach of the North squad at the Blue-Gray Game. Defensive coordinator Kevin Cosgrove assisted Alvarez.

500-yard receivers

Receivers Michael London and Tony Simmons both moved into the 500-yard receiving club. London (587) and Simmons (504) are the third pair of Wisconsin teammates to reach that plateau in the same season. Tom McCauley (525) and Mel Reddick (524) accomplished that feat in 1967; Lee DeRamus (920) and J.C. Dawkins (512) matched it in 1993.

The London-Simmons duo combined for 1,091 yards receiving this season. The top two receiving duos in UW history are DeRamus-Dawkins (1,432) in '93 and Al Toon-Michael Jones (1,162) in '83.

Century club tandem

Carl McCullough and Aaron Stecker each rushed for more than 100 yards in the Badgers' 42-0 win vs. SMU. McCullough rambled for 130 yards, and Stecker came off the bench for 112 yards and two TDs. It was the ninth time in the last three years that a pair of UW running backs went over the 100-yard mark in the same game. Prior to '93, two Badger runners had rushed for at least 100 yards in the same game just 13 times in the previous 44 years.

It's on them

Wisconsin was whistled for just 275 yards in penalties last season. Through preliminary research, that is the lowest total since 1960. The Badgers also had 275 yards in infractions that season, but Wisconsin played just nine games.

The Badgers were the least penalized team in the Big Ten. Wisconsin suffered no penalties in the game vs. Purdue and had just one infraction against Colorado, Minnesota and Illinois.

1901 BIG TEN CHAMPS Coach Phil King (9-0)

Phil King's Badgers won nine straight games to become the first undefeated team in school history. Using a potent offense and stingy defense, Wisconsin defeated every opponent by at least three TDs and recorded eight shutouts to claim a share of the Big Ten title. The Badgers outscored the opposition 317-5, the largest differential in UW history. Wisconsin's slate included two wins over high school teams and just two conference wins (Minnesota and Chicago).







1906 BIG TEN CHAMPS Coach Phil King (5-0)

Although traditional league powers Minnesota, Michigan and Chicago were missing from the schedule due to a faculty reform movement that limited the number of games, Wisconsin claimed a share of the conference championship with the Gophers. Center Ewald Stiehm, Wisconsin's first allleague performer, helped the Badgers to a 5-0 slate. Coach C.P. Hutchins' team posted Western Conference wins over Iowa, Illinois and Purdue by a combined score of 63-15.

1912 BIG TEN CHAMPS Coach William Juneau (7-0)


The Badgers ended their third undefeated (7-0) season with a 28-10 win at lowa. Coach William Juneau's squad was the last Badger team to post a perfect record. Led by consensus all-America tackle Robert "Butts" Butler, the Badgers placed a school-record nine players on the all-Western Conference team. Wisconsin registered four shutouts and allowed only 29 points the entire season.





1952 BIG TEN CHAMPS Coach Ivy Williamson (6-3-1)

Following a 20-6 win over Illinois in the second game of the season, Wisconsin sat atop the polls as the nation's No. 1 team. It is the only time in school history that the Badgers were rated first. Wisconsin lost the following week, but went on to a 6-3-1 record and the school's first Rose Bowl appearance. After losing to USC 7-0 in Pasadena, the Badgers ended the season ranked 10th by UPI and 11th by AP. Led by all-Americans Don Voss and Dave Suminski, Wisconsin brought a share of the Big Ten title to Madison for the first time since 1912.





1959 BIG TEN CHAMPS Coach Milt Bruhn (7-3)

Needing a victory in the regular-season finale to clinch a league title, Wisconsin recovered from an early deficit and beat Minnesota 11-7. It was the Badgers' first undisputed title since 1912. At the Rose Bowl, Washington scored 17 points in the first quarter on the way to a 44-8 win. All-Big Ten QB Dale Hackbart and all-Big Ten guard Jerry Stalcup were stars on a club that finished the season ranked sixth by AP and UPI.

1962 BIG TEN CHAMPS Coach Milt Bruhn (8-2)

Opening the season with a 69-13 rout of New Mexico State, the Badgers rolled to an 8-1 record and the Big Ten title. Although USC defeated Wisconsin 42-37 in perhaps the most exciting Rose Bowl ever, the Badgers finished the storybook campaign ranked second in both the AP and UPI polls. Ron Vander Kelen set a Rose Bowl record with 401 yards passing as the UW scored 23 straight points in a fourth quarter rally. Pat Richter was a consensus all-American after catching 49 passes.





1993 BIG TEN CHAMPS

Coach Barry Alvarez

(10-1-1)

The 1993 Badgers established a new standard of excellence, shattering school records and earning numerous honors. After claiming Wisconsin's first Big Ten title in 31 years (a co-championship with Ohio State), the Badgers defeated UCLA 21-16 in the Rose Bowl. The 10-1-1 club became the winningest in school history and boasted eight first-team all-Big Ten players, including Big Ten and Rose Bowl Most Valuable Player Brent Moss. Wisconsin ended the season ranked 5th and 6th by the coaches and media, respectively.

1953 Rose Bowl

PASADENA, Calif. — Southern Cal scored the game's only points on a 22-yard pass from Rudy Bukich to Al Carmichael in the Trojans' 7-0 win over Wisconsin in the Rose Bowl.

The Badgers dominated the game from a statistical standpoint, outgaining USC by 120 yards. Led by Alan Ameche's 133 yards rushing, Wisconsin had a 211-48 advantage on the ground. However, both defenses rose to the occasion when necessary.

One of Wisconsin's best scoring chances came in the opening minutes of the third quarter. Ameche broke loose for a 54-yard run as the Badgers got to the USC 21-yard line. On third down, Archie Ray Burks fumbled on an end run and USC recovered.

The Trojans then put together the game-winning drive (73 yards), which ended with Bukich's TD pass. Wisconsin countered with a 13-play, 84-yard drive that ended at the Trojan 2-yard line when Jerry Witt was stopped a yard short of a first down on a fake field goal play.

Coach Ivy Williamson's club was the first in Badger history to play in a bowl game.

1960 Rose Bowl

PASADENA, Calif. — Washington scored the game's first 17 points en route to a 44-8 Rose Bowl victory over Wisconsin.

Washington tallied the first TD on a 6-yard run by Don McKeta 10 minutes into the game. George Fleming booted a 26-yard field goal after the Huskies recovered one of four Wisconsin fumbles. Fleming then returned a punt 53 yards for a score on the final play of the period for a 17-0 Husky lead.

Badger fullback Tom Wiesner tallied Wisconsin's only points on a 4-yard run with 5:27 left in the opening half. Dale Hackbart connected with Al Schoonover for a two-point conversion that cut the lead to 17-8.

Washington quarterback Bob Schloredt, who shared game MVP honors with Fleming, tossed a 23-yard TD pass to close first-half scoring. Schloredt completed four passes for 102 yards and was the top rusher (81 yards).

Wisconsin mounted a challenge in the third quarter, but four plays inside the Husky 10-yard line failed. The Badger defense entered the bowl with a defensive average of barely 10 points per game for the regular season.

1963 Rose Bowl

PASADENA, Calif. — A 23-point fourth quarter explosion wasn't quite enough as the Badgers dropped a 42-37 Rose Bowl encounter to Southern Cal. The Trojans had claimed a 42-14 lead on the first play of the fourth quarter before the huge Badger comeback.

USC raced to a 21-7 halftime lead and extended it on the first play of the third stanza, before Badger Ron Vander Kelen led one of the biggest charges in bowl history.

Vander Kelen reached paydirt on a 17-yard scamper to reduce the margin to 28-14. USC responded with a pair of TD passes by Beathard and the Trojans led 42-14.

Lou Holland (13-yard run) and Gary Kroner (4-yard reception) tallied for the Badgers within three minutes. A bad center snap on a punt resulted in a UW safety. After the free kick, Vander Kelen hit three straight passes, including a 19-yard score to Pat Richter for the final 42-37 margin.

Vander Kelen, the game MVP, set both Wisconsin and Rose Bowl records with 401 yards passing. Richter caught 11 of those aerials for 163 yards. The 79 total points was a Rose Bowl record that stood for 28 years.

1981 Garden State Bowl

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Tennessee scored 18 straight points in the first half and held on to defeat Wisconsin 28-21 in the Garden State Bowl.

The Badger defense limited UT to 89 yards rushing, but Volunteer QB Steve Alatorre unleashed a potent passing attack. Alatorre threw for 315 yards. WR Anthony Hancock caught 11 passes for 196 yards.

After Fuad Reveiz booted a field goal in the first quarter, Wisconsin assumed its only lead of the game on a 3-yard run by Jess Cole. Willie Gault returned the ensuing kickoff 87 yards to give Tennessee a lead it never lost.

Reserve quarterback Randy Wright came off the bench to throw a pair of second-half touchdown passes for the Badgers. Wright hit Jeff Nault and Thad McFadden on scoring tosses in the final period.

The game featured two high-powered offenses that combined for 49 points, 793 total yards and 49 first downs.

Wisconsin's fourth bowl in school history and first non-Rose Bowl drew a crowd of 53,220.

1982 Independence Bowl 1984 Hall of Fame Bowl

SHREVEPORT, La. — Wisconsin won its first bowl game with a 14-3 decision over Kansas State in the Independence Bowl.

Randy Wright threw a game-record two TD passes and the Badger defense set a scoring record before 24,684 fans. The anticipated crowd was more than 49,000, but a 23-mile-per-hour wind dropped temperatures to 10 below zero.

Wright, the game offensive MVP, completed nine of 24 throws. However, his 87yard pass play to Tim Stracka was the longest in UW and Independence Bowl history. The UW defense limited Kansas State to 192 total yards in the Wildcats' firstever postseason appearance.

KSU had taken a 3-0 lead on Steve Willis' 29-yard field goal before the Badgers scored 14 straight points. Tim Krumrie was the game Defensive MVP. He helped limit the Kansas State running attack to less than two yards per carry.

Game totals showed five turnovers, 14 punts, 22 completions in 59 attempts (37 percent) and 14 penalties.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — A fumbled snap on a 26-yard game-winning field goal attempt was the deciding play in Wisconsin's 20-19 loss to Kentucky in the Hall of Fame

Trailing by a point after the Wildcats' Joe Worley booted a 52-yard field goal with eight minutes left, the Badgers drove inside Kentucky's 20-yard line.

Todd Gregoire's field goal with 1:55 left never materialized after holder Bob Kobza dropped the center snap. Gregoire, a freshman, had tied a school record with four field goals earlier in the game.

Wisconsin assumed a 13-0 lead on a pair of Gregoire three pointers and a 3-yard TD pass from Mike Howard to Thad McFadden. The Badgers outgained their SEC foe both on the ground and through the air.

However, UW was assessed 13 penalties for 133 yards, both Hall of Fame Bowl records. The Badgers threw two interceptions. Kentucky, which was making its second straight postseason appearance in Birmingham, had no turnovers.

1994 Rose Bowl

PASADENA, Calif. — The Wisconsin defense forced six turnovers, while the offense churned out 250 yards rushing as the Badgers downed UCLA 21-16 in the Rose Bowl. It was the Badgers' first-ever New Year's Day bowl victory.

More than 70,000 Badger fans attended the game and provided a distinct home field advantage in the Bruins' home facility.

Tailback Brent Moss, the Rose Bowl MVP, helped the UW to a 14-3 halftime lead by scoring on a pair of short runs. Moss rushed for 158 yards on a career-high 36 carries.

Wisconsin extended its lead to 21-10 when Darrell Bevell provided the game's most unlikely play. On second-and-eight from the UCLA 21-yard line, Bevell broke containment and weaved his way to the end zone for the game-winning points.

Trailing 21-16, UCLA's final drive made it to the Badgers' 18 before QB Wayne Cook was stopped and the clock expired before the Bruins could run another play.

"The win, as much as it was for our players and coaches, was for our fans," said Alvarez. "They supported us all the way."

1995 Hall of Fame Bowl

TAMPA, Fla. — Senior Terrell Fletcher rushed for a Hall of Fame Bowl-record 241 yards as Wisconsin won its second January bowl game in as many years with a 34-20 triumph over Duke.

Fletcher gained 190 yards and scored two touchdowns in the second half to ice the win. Wisconsin intercepted three passes in the opening half. Jeff Messenger's 19-yard return of one of those pickoffs resulted in the Badgers' first TD.

Duke eventually tied the game in the third period before Fletcher took over the contest. Fletcher broke the deadlock with a one-yard run late in the third period. Jason Burns extended the margin to 27-13 with an 11-yard reception from Darrell Beyell.

After the Blue Devils cut the margin to seven (27-20) on Robert Baldwin's second score, Fletcher turned a critical third-and-one play into a 49-yard touchdown run to clinch the win.

More than 30,000 fans made the trip to Tampa as Wisconsin won its third game in a row to close the season 8-3-1.



Arlie Mucks (1914)

One of Wisconsin's truly great athletes, Arlie Mucks was probably best known for his success as a discus thrower. The 1914 football all-American (as selected by INS) placed second in the discus in the 1912 Olympics as a high school athlete. He was undefeated in college in the discus and shot put and set a thenworld record discus mark of 155-2 in 1916. He is the only person to win national track titles in two events three consecutive years. Selected in 1969 to Wisconsin's all-time football team, Mucks officiated Big Ten football games following his playing career. He is a member of the State of Wisconsin and University of Wisconsin Athletic Halls of Fame.

Robert Butler (1912)

A member of Wisconsin's last undefeated team in 1912. "Butts" Butler was the school's first consensus all-American. He was named to Walter Camp's all-America team as a junior (first-team) and senior (second-team). In the 1912 season finale against Minnesota, the tackle and his 10 teammates played the entire game in a 14-0 victory. He went on to compete professionally for the Canton Bulldogs and played with the legendary Jim Thorpe. Butler was later named to the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame in 1972.

Ray Keeler (1913)

Consensus all-America lineman Ray "Tubby" Keeler was a three-time letterman in both football and track and field at Wisconsin. Despite just a 185-pound frame, he earned all-America recognition in his junior season from the International News Service. He captained the 1914 Badger squad and served on the Athletic Board in 1914 and 1915. Keeler went on to coach the UW-La Crosse football team to a 45-24-15 (.625) record from 1917-1929.

Howard Buck (1915)

A consensus all-America pick, Howard "Cub" Buck was labeled by many as the best college lineman of his era. He also played "roving center" on defense and was credited by several observers with making half of his team's tackles. Former Canton Bulldogs' teammate Jim Thorpe called Buck the finest lineman he ever played with. Buck also played for Green Bay from 1921-25 and is a member of the Packers' Hall of Fame. After his playing career, he became the first head football coach at Miami (Fla.) in 1926.

Paul Meyers (1919)

End Paul Meyers earned first-team all-America honors from Walter Eckersall as a senior. Meyers was an all-Big Ten choice in both 1916 and 1919. The three-year letterman, who played for three different coaches, was Badger team captain and a third-team all-America choice by Eckersall in 1916.

Charles Carpenter (1919)

The two-time all-America center made Walter
Eckersall's honor squads in both 1916 (third-team) and 1919 (first-team). Carpenter, the first all-America center at the UW, captained the 1919 squad. He was a recipient of the Big Ten Medal of Honor in 1919. The Madison native later served as president of the UW Athletic Board.

George Bunge (1920)

Center George Bunge earned all-America honors in 1920 and 1921. He was accorded first-team recognition in 1920 by Lawrence Perry of Consolidated Press. Bunge earned third-team honors by both Charles Parker and INS in 1921. The Badgers posted a three-year mark of 16-4-1, including a second-place Big Ten finish in 1920, during his career.

Frank Weston (1920)

One of the truly great multi-sport athletes of his era, Frank "Red" Weston also carried his talents beyond the sports arena. A letterwinner three times in football and twice in basketball, he was a member of the UW Medical School faculty for more than 40 years. Weston served as senior class president in 1921. On the gridiron, he was captain of the 1920 team and was named all-America by four organizations. He was a member of the school's Athletic Board and was enshrined into the Madison Sports and Wisconsin Athletic Department Halls of Fame.

Ralph Scott (1920)


An all-conference and Walter Camp all-America tackle in 1920, Scott was noted for his outstanding blocking ability on offense. The giant 210 pounder also played tackle on defense for the '20 Badgers who were 6-1 and finished second in the Big Ten.

Marty Below (1923)

A transfer from UW-Oshkosh, Marty Below played tackle for the Badgers and was a first-team all-American by INS, Athletic World and Walter Eckersall in 1923. At UW-Oshkosh, Below was a four-sport star after serving in the Marines during World War I. Inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame in 1988, he was praised by Red Grange who once said, "Marty was the greatest lineman I ever played against."

Milo Lubratovich (1930)

A tackle, who broke his leg against Alabama as a sophomore, Milo Lubratovich rebounded two years later to become a consensus all-American and play in the East-West Game. Lubratovich received all-America mention from 10 different publications, including first-team honors from NEA, UP and Hearst. He also played professional baseball in the Brooklyn Dodgers organization from 1931-35



HOWARD WEISS (1938)

After converting to fullback from halfback three games into his sophomore year, Howard Weiss went on to earn Big Ten MVP and all-America honors in 1938. He was a first-team choice by INS and was a second-team choice by four organizations. He is perhaps best remembered for his 41-yard touchdown run through the entire Northwestern defense in a 1938 upset win at Evanston. Elected class president, Weiss was sixth in the 1938 Heisman Trophy balloting and later played two years with the Detroit Lions.

Dave Schreiner (1941-42)

Wisconsin's first two-time first-team all-American, Dave Schreiner was considered one of the finest ends to ever play college football. Schreiner was a two-time AP all-America choice. He was named conference MVP in 1942, the year he caught three touchdown passes in one quarter against Marquette. He was drafted by the Detroit Lions. A member of the National Football Foundation and Wisconsin State Athletic Halls of Fame, Schreiner died in World War II in 1945.

Marlin Harder (1942)


Junior all-American Marlin "Pat" Harder was one of Wisconsin's greatest fullbacks. Despite a college career that was cut short by his enlistment with the Marines, Harder teamed with Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch to lead the Badgers to an 8-1-1 record that included a 17-7 win over eventual national champion Ohio State. Also a placekicker, he led the conference in scoring in both 1941 and 1942. He was named MVP of the 1943 College All-Star Game after scoring two touchdowns. The second pick in the 1943 NFL draft, Harder played for the Chicago Cardinals and the Detroit Lions. He led the NFL in scoring three years and later served as an NFL official for 17 years.

Earl Girard (1944)

A multi-sport star, Earl "Jug" Girard played two seasons at the UW (1944 and 1947) and earned all-America recognition as a 17-year-old freshman. Regarded as a "triple-threat" quarterback, he was proficient at running, passing and punting. Girard was drafted by the U.S. Army after his freshman season and returned to school in 1947. He holds the school record for most punt return yards in a game with 158 when he scored two touchdowns against Iowa in 1947. Girard was drafted in the first round by the Packers, and he also spent time in the Cleveland baseball farm system.

Ed Withers (1950)

An all-city football and basketball player at Madison Central High School, Ed Withers came to the UW after serving a year in the Army. The aggressive defensive back had eight career interceptions and probably would have had more if opposing quarterbacks weren't instructed to avoid throwing in his direction. Withers' three interceptions helped lead Wisconsin to a 14-0 victory over Iowa in his all-America year. His 103 interception return yards in that game are tied for the most in UW history. The school's first black all-American, Withers was drafted by the Green Bay Packers in 1951.




Harold Faverty (1951)

Like so many other Wisconsin athletes during his era, Harold Faverty sandwiched his playing days around service in the Armed Forces. As a 25-year-old senior, he was one of the most experienced players on the 1951 squad. A roommate of fellow all-American Pat O'Donahue, Faverty played on both sides of the ball. He was a linebacker on the "Hard Rocks" defense, which allowed a school-record 5.9 points per game.

Pat O'Donahue (1951)

A senior on the 1951 team that went 7-1-1 and finished eighth in the Associated Press poll, Pat O'Donahue was a fixture on Wisconsin's topranked defense. He was a quiet player who led by example. A penetrator on the line, O'Donahue played on the 1949-51 teams and was named all-American as an end in his final season. He played with the 49ers and Packers and was inducted into the UW Athletic Hall of Fame in 1993.



Dave Suminski (1952)

All-Big Ten choice and all-American Dave Suminski earned those honors in his first year as a defensive tackle. An anchor on Wisconsin's 1953 Rose Bowl defensive unit, he started the previous two seasons on the offensive line. In his last college game, the Badger defense held USC to just 48 yards rushing. Suminski was taken by the Redskins in the 1953 NFL draft and later played with the Chicago Cardinals and the CFL's Hamilton Tiger Cats.

Don Voss (1952)

Don Voss was one of the top ends in Wisconsin history, even though his football career was ended by a knee injury suffered in the Rose Bowl of his sophomore year. In his first year, he was named to the AP freshman all-America team and was a member of Wisconsin's "Hard Rocks," the best defensive unit in the country. A year later he helped guide the Badgers to Pasadena and their first-ever bowl game and was the youngest member of the 1952 Look all-America team.

ALAN AMECHE (1953-54)

The school's most famed player, Alan "The Horse" Ameche, was a first-team all-American in both 1953 and 1954. He is also the only player in Wisconsin history to win the Heisman Trophy (1954). Ameche set numerous records as a fullback, including the NCAA and Big Ten mark for career rushing yardage.

A two-time academic all-American, he was selected in the first round of the 1955 NFL draft by Baltimore. Ameche ran for a 79-yard touchdown on his first NFL carry and also scored the winning TD in overtime of the 1958 NFL title game against the Giants.

A member of the Wisconsin State and National Football Foundation Halls of Fame, Ameche was voted Wisconsin's all-time greatest player in 1969. Ameche was also inducted into the GTE Academic All-America Hall of Fame in 1992.

Dan Lanphear (1959)

Madison native Dan Lanphear rebounded from an injury-plagued junior season to gain all-America honors in his final year. Also a captain of the UW track and field team, his best game on the gridiron may have been Wisconsin's 12-3 victory over Ohio State in 1959. In that contest, Lanphear recovered a fumble, blocked a punt for a safety, and knocked two Buckeye running backs out of the game with strong hits. He went on to play defensive end for the AFL's Houston Oilers and was a member of their league championship teams in 1960 and 1961.

Pat Richter (1961-62)

Wisconsin's last nine-time letterwinner, Pat Richter earned three letters each in football, basketball and baseball. On the gridiron, the Madison native was a twotime all-America end, earning consensus honors in 1962. He led the Big Ten in receiving in 1961 and 1962 and topped the conference in punting his senior year. He set Rose Bowl records in 1963 with 11 catches for 163 yards, marks that stood for 31 years. A first-round draft choice of the Washington Redskins, Richter played professionally for eight seasons. He is a member of Wisconsin's alltime team and won an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award in

1988. Richter was named the school's Director of Athletics in 1989 and still holds the post. Richter was inducted into the CoSIDA Academic All-America Hall of Fame in 1994.

Ray Snell (1979)

Baltimore native Ray Snell was a first-team all-America pick by *The Sporting News* as an offensive guard in 1979. The 295-pound lineman, known for his speed and agility, blocked for Ira Matthews and Dave Mohapp at Wisconsin. Snell was the 22nd pick overall (by Tampa Bay) in the first round of the 1980 NFL draft.

Tim Krumrie (1981)


An all-Big Ten pick at noseguard his last three seasons, Tim Krumrie earned consensus all-America recognition his junior year. He is second on Wisconsin's career tackles list with 444, more than 100 stops ahead of the closest defensive lineman. Krumrie was a member of UW's 1981 Garden State Bowl team and earned 1982 Independence Bowl Defensive MVP honors. A 10thround draft pick by the Cincinnati Bengals, he enjoyed a lengthy NFL career and played in Super Bowl

Matt Vanden Boom (1981)

Two-time all-Big Ten pick Matt VandenBoom is one of four defensive backs in Wisconsin history to earn first-team all-America mention. He accomplished the feat in 1981 as a junior safety when he intercepted a team-best six passes for the Badgers' Garden State Bowl squad. VandenBoom was also named a second-team academic all-American in 1982. He was taken in the fifth round by the Buffalo Bills in the 1985 draft.

Richard Johnson (1984)

A speedy defensive back, Richard Johnson was named to multiple first-team all-America lists in 1985. He also set the UW career mark for blocked kicks (nine). Johnson was named Sports Illustrated's national defensive player of the week after Wisconsin's 35-34 victory at Missouri in 1984. Johnson blocked two kicks, intercepted a pass and recovered a blocked punt for a TD. Houston picked him in the first round of the 1985 NFL draft.



All-Americans

Paul Gruber (1987)

Wisconsin native Paul Gruber left Wisconsin as one of the school's best offensive linemen. A player with tremendous size, strength and speed, he was regarded by some as the top college offensive lineman in '87. Gruber graduated to the pro ranks in 1988 when he was taken fourth overall by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Gruber earned All-Pro honors several times with the Bucs and played six consecutive seasons without missing an offensive snap.

Troy Vincent (1991)

After playing just one year of high school football, Troy Vincent blossomed into one of the country's best cornerbacks and punt returners. A 1991 all-America selection, Vincent was honored as the Big Ten's co-Defensive Player of the Year after setting Badger season and career records for passes broken up (13 and 31). The UW's record holder for career punt return yards returned punts for TDs his final three seasons. He was taken by Miami as the seventh overall choice in the 1992 draft.

Cory Raymer (1994)

The most celebrated player of the Barry Alvarez era, Cory Raymer was Wisconsin's first consensus all-America pick in 13 years. Raymer earned first-team all-America mention by AP, UPI, AFCA, Walter Camp, The Sporting News, Football News and College Sports magazine. He was a four-year starter who allowed just one-half of a sack in his last three seasons. A two-time firstteam all-Big Ten pick, he played a large role in increasing the team's rushing average from 94 to 244 yards per game during his career.

Alan Ameche was one of the greatest backs in UW history. The 1954 Heisman Trophy winner was a two-time all-American and ended his career as the NCAA's career rushing leader. He led the Badgers to the 1953 Rose Bowl, where he rushed for 133 yards. The five-time Pro Bowl pick was inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame in 1975.

Although he played football only one season at Wisconsin, Elroy Hirsch is one of the most beloved figures in Badger sports history. Hirsch, nicknamed "Crazylegs," rushed for 786 yards for Wisconsin's 8-1-1 team in 1942. He also starred for nine seasons with the Los Angeles Rams before returning to Wisconsin as Director of Athletics from 1969-87.



Each league institution nominates its own MVP for consideration and college football reporters from the *Chicago Tribune* then choose the conference MVP.

Football Hall of Fame

All-America end Richter newest Badger inductee into College Hall of Fame

Seven Wisconsin players have been named to the National Football Foundation's College Hall of Fame. The most-recent addition was current Director of Athletics Pat Richter, who will be inducted into the Hall in ceremonies this December. Richter was a two-time all-America end and led the nation in receiving as a junior in 1961. The other Badger inductees are ...

Alan Ameche (elected in 1975), the 1954 Heisman Trophy-winning fullback, was a two-time all-American in the

classroom and on the field. His jersey No. 35 is retired at the UW.

Pat O'Dea (elected in 1962) was a kicker and fullback from 1896-99. "The Kangaroo Kicker," as he was called, was a two-time all-America punter and team captain.

Marty Below (elected in 1988) played right tackle for three seasons (1918, 22-23), earning all-America praise as a senior. "Below was the greatest lineman I ever played against," said Hall of Famer Red Grange.

Robert Butler (elected in 1972) was a three-year letterman at tackle and won all-conference (1912-13) and all-America (1913) laurels. He played pro football for Canton.

Dave Schreiner (elected in 1955) was a two-time all-America end and the Western Conference MVP after the '42 season. Schreiner has his No. 80 jersey retired by Wisconsin.

Pat Harder (elected in 1993), an all-America fullback, was the league's scoring and rushing champion in 1941. Harder was a three-time NFL scoring champ.

Two former Badger gridiron greats (fullback Alan Ameche and end Pat Richter) have been inducted into the GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-America Hall of Fame.

The Hall is one of the most prestigious academic organizations available to former collegiate student-athletes

To gain admittance to the Hall, student-athletes must be former academic all-Americans who have distinguished themselves off the playing field after graduation.

Ameche, who played professionally after graduation, retired in Philadelphia after his career and became one of the city's philanthropic leaders. He was inducted in 1992.

Richter also played pro football before returning to the UW to earn his law degree. He worked at a Madison law firm and at the Oscar Mayer Corporation before his appointment as UW Director of Athletics.

WHY WAS HE CALLED "THE HORSE?"

In 1953, when the rules made it necessary to be an all-purpose player, Ameche was a workhorse in the drills. His ability to play 55 minutes or more per game in 1953 created his nickname, "The Iron Horse." It was later shortened to "The Horse."



Alan Ameche '54 Heisman Trophy winner

Alan Ameche, the bruising fullback from Kenosha, Wis., is the only Badger football player to win the Heisman Trophy, given to college football's top player.

Ameche, a two-time all-American, won the trophy in 1954 after rushing for 641 yards and nine touchdowns.

Additionally, he made first-team all-America squads by the Football Writers' Association, Look, NEA, Paramount News, All-Academic, Athletic Publications, Catholic Weekly and UNICO (National Italian Association). He was also named United Press National Back-of-the-Year as a senior.

The Big Ten's leading rusher twice in his career, Ameche brought much distinction and honor to the UW. He was an academic all-American as a junior and senior. Ameche also became the first Badger to earn membership in the CoSIDA Academic All-America Hall of Fame. He was inducted in 1992.

Nicknamed "The Horse" for his rugged running style, Ameche left Wisconsin as the NCAA's career rushing leader. His 3,345 yards are currently fourth in Wisconsin history. Ameche led the Badgers to a 26-8-3 record during his career and a berth in the 1953 Rose Bowl.

Gridiron History

1889 — Played first game.

1890 — First win, a 106-0 shutout over UW-Whitewater. Wisconsin played Minnesota for the first time. Except for 1906, the Badgers and Gophers have played every year since. It is the longest running series in Division I-A.

1895 — Wisconsin played a vital role in the organization of the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives, which eventually became the Big Ten.

1896 — Wisconsin claims first outright Big Ten championship on the way to 7-1-1 record for Coach Phil King.

1897 — Coach Phil King produces second straight Big Ten title and outscores opponents 210-14 in 9-1 campaign.

1901 — First undefeated team (9-0) in UW history. Coach Phil King wins third conference title in six years. Eight shutouts highlight the season as UW has 317-5 scoring advantage.

1902 — Lost 6-0 to Michigan, breaking a 17-game Badger winning streak

1906 — Dr. C.P. Hutchins coaches Badgers to 5-0 record and the Big Ten title.

1912 — Last undefeated team (7-0) won the school's fifth Big Ten title for first-year coach William Juneau. Nine Badgers named to Walter Eckersall's all-Western team.

1942 — UW is named mythical national champion by the Helms Foundation after 8-1-1 season. A stunning 6-0 loss to Iowa prevented the Badgers from earning a conference championship.

1951 — The "Hard Rocks" team led the nation in total defense and set five Big Ten records in a 7-1-1 season. The UW defense outscored the opponents' offense 58-53. Four Badgers were all-Americans.

1952 — Wisconsin voted to represent Big Ten in '53 Rose Bowl after tying Purdue for the conference title. USC scores a third-period TD for a 7-0 Rose Bowl victory.

1953 — Badgers upset then No. 1-ranked Illinois 34-7 at Camp Randall Stadium.

1954 — Alan Ameche becomes the only Badger to win the Heisman Trophy, given to the nation's top collegiate football player.

1959 — UW rallies to defeat Minnesota 11-7 and earn second Rose Bowl berth. Badgers lose to Washington 44-8 at Pasadena.

1962 — The No. 2-ranked Badgers make second Rose Bowl appearance in three years. The foe was top-rated USC. Badgers' 23-point fourth quarter rally falls short in 42-37 Rose Bowl loss. Ron Vander Kelen was named Big Ten MVP, and UW led the nation in total offense.

1974 — Billy Marek scores five touchdowns and rushes for 304 yards as Badgers close season with 49-14 win over Minnesota.

1981 — Matt VandenBoom intercepts three passes to spark Badgers' 21-14 victory over No. 1ranked Michigan. Wisconsin earns trip to Garden State Bowl, but falls to Tennessee 28-21.

1982 — John Williams tallies the only score in a 6-0 win at Ohio State, the Badgers' first triumph in Columbus since 1918. Badgers win their first bowl game, a 14-3 decision over Kansas State in the Independence Bowl.

1983 — Al Toon sets Big Ten record with 252 yards receiving in a 42-38 victory at Purdue.

1984 — Fourth consecutive sevenwin season ends with 20-19 loss to Kentucky in the Hall of Fame Bowl.

1990 — Don Davey becomes the first four-time first-team academic all-American in NCAA university division history.

1991 — Troy Vincent is the UW's first all-American since '87 and runner-up for the Thorpe Award.

1993 — The UW shares the Big Ten title and defeats UCLA 21-16 in the Rose Bowl to finish sixth in the AP poll. Brent Moss is the Big Ten and Rose Bowl MVP. Eight Badgers are named first-team all-conference, and three earn second-team all-America honors.

1994 — The Badgers claim their second straight bowl victory, a 34-20 win over Duke in the Hall of Fame Bowl. Terrell Fletcher is game MVP with 241 yards rushing. Cory Raymer is a consensus all-American, and the NFL drafts seven Badgers.

Jerry Wunsch, an honorable mention all-Big Ten selection as a junior, has started 23 consecutive games at right tackle.







Big Ten Fax-on-Demand — The Big Ten and its schools provide 24-hour access to the latest press releases, statistics and notes on Big Ten sports. Media members simply call the Fax-On-Demand phone number (available from the Big Ten Office) and request the information they wish to receive. Requested information will be faxed back immediately. Because of this technology, Wisconsin no longer mails its football release.

Credentials

Press box — Requests for credentials to cover Wisconsin football should be sent on company letterhead to: Steve Malchow, Sports Information Director, University of Wisconsin, 1440 Monroe Street, Madison, WI 53711. The fax number is (608) 262-8184. Requests should be received at least 10 days in advance of the game.

Credentials will be mailed if time permits. Those passes, which cannot be mailed, will be left with the parking attendant (white vehicle) at Lot 18 (southeast corner of the Stadium across the street from the fire station).

Credentials will be issued according to the following priorities: 1) television and radio stations originating a live broadcast; 2) national publications and newspapers filing for the following day's publication; 3) newspapers designated by the visiting sports information director; 4) television and radio stations covering for nightly news; and 5) other requests, which will be evaluated on a space-available basis. Spouses, dates, non-workers and children are not allowed in the media areas as dictated by the NCAA Media Guidelines book.

Photographers—Sideline credentials will be issued only to accredited photographers and TV reporters / camera operators on assignment. You must display both a credential and an armband prominently to be on the field level. Your game credential alone will not give you access to the sidelines. Armbands can be picked up in the

Reinke Room of the Field House. Flipcards and refreshments are available in the Reinke Room two hours prior to kickoff. Media members cannot shoot between the 25-yard lines. Wisconsin follows NCAA and Big Ten guidelines regarding event photography.

Parking — A very limited number of parking passes are available to working media.

Game-day Services

Media services — Working facilities for the press are located on the fourth level of the Communications Center. Flipcards, notes and programs are delivered to each working location prior to kickoff. A complete statistical package will be available after the game.

Fax service — Final game statistics are entered immediately after the game on the Big Ten's Fax-On-Demand service. If you do not wish to use the Fax-On-Demand service, statistical packets can be faxed to your outlet for \$10 (payable at the time of transmission).

Interviews — With approximately four minutes left in the game, media members will be escorted to the interview areas by Associate SID Justin Doherty. Coach Barry Alvarez meets the media in the McClain Lounge (first floor). Requested players are available in the weight room (lower level of the McClain facility). The Wisconsin locker room is closed to the media.

Phones — Several courtesy phone lines on the first and second rows of the press area (level four of the Communications Center) are available on a first-come, first-served basis. Media requiring their own phones should call Wisconsin Bell (800/447-7738) to order lines.



For the third straight year, exclusive radio coverage of Badger football will be heard on the 43-station Wisconsin Radio Network. The University Athletic Department and Learfield Communications entered into an agreement for radio broadcast rights for Wisconsin football and basketball prior to the 1994 season.

WIBA (1310 AM) and WOLX (94.9 FM) are the rights holders in the Madison market, and WTMJ (620 AM) carries the games in Milwaukee (see the accompanying affiliates list for the station in your area).

Entering his third season as football play-by-play announcer is Matt Lepay. He has called Badger basketball the past eight seasons. A 1984 graduate of Ohio State, Lepay was Sports Director at WTSO in Madison before joining WIBA in 1994. He previously served as Sports Director at WNCI in Columbus, and prior to that worked at stations in Athens and Piqua, Ohio.

Joining Lepay on broadcasts for both football and basketball is Mike Lucas, long-time sports columnist at the *Capital Times*. Lucas, who worked on the broadcast team for Wisconsin's delay TV package before assuming color commentary duties on the radio, also provides daily sports commentaries on WIBA.





A native of Benton, Wis., Julie is single and lives in Madison.

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

Directions to Camp Randall Stadium

From the Dane County Airport — Exit airport via International Lane to Packers Avenue (Hwy. 113). Turn left on Packers Avenue, which changes to Pennsylvania Avenue, Johnson Street, Gorham Street and then University Avenue. Stay on University Avenue through campus until Randall Avenue (look for Milan's Sub Shop and McDonald's on the left side of University). Turn left on Randall Avenue. Go approximately three blocks until Randall forks. Take the right fork (Monroe Street). The Stadium is located on the right side on Monroe Street.

From west and I-90/94 (from Minneapolis) — Take I-90/94 to Highway 151 South (East Washington Avenue). Continue on East Washington Avenue to the State Capitol Building. Turn right on Webster Street and complete half a square around the Capitol (Webster to Dayton to Fairchild). Turn right on West Washington Avenue. Follow West Washington to Regent Street. Turn right onto Regent Street. Follow Regent to the Stadium.

From south and I-90 (from Chicago) — Take I-90 to the Madison beltline (Highway 12/18). West on the beltline to Park Street (Hwy. 151). Exit right (north). Take Park Street to Regent Street. Turn left on Regent Street, then approximately six blocks to Camp Randall Stadium.

From east and I-94 (from Milwaukee) — Take I-94 to Highway 30 West. Take Highway 30 to its end at Highway 113 South. Turn left onto 113 South, which becomes Packers/Pennsylvania Avenue.
