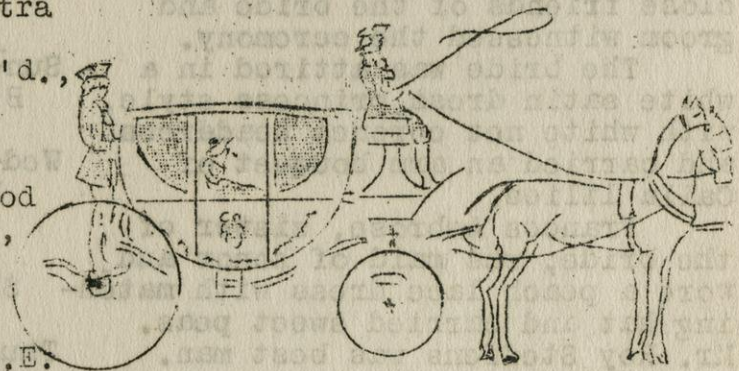

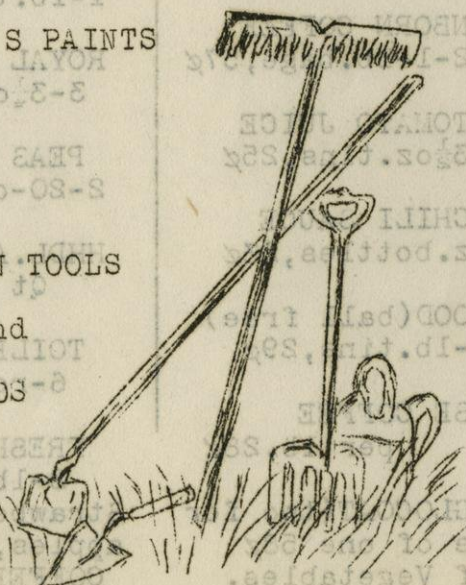

FORTY YEARS AGO IN WILLIAMS BAY

From the Williams Bay
Observer, May 27, 1897

Last week, Friday, was inspection day by the trustees of the University of Chicago for Yerkes Observatory, which is now completed.

At four o'clock, the private car of Marvin Hughitt, president of the Northwestern Railway, left Chicago and in three hours was in Williams Bay station. The following were in the party—President of the Chicago University; Trustees,—C.L. Hutchinson; George C. Walker; and A.K. Parker. Secretary, Thomas W. Goodspeed; A.C. Bartlett; Martin A. Ryerson; Cyrus H. McCormick; Ferd. Peck; H.A. Rust; F.A. Smith; and Jesse Baldwin. Mr. Walker's steamer conveyed the company to the Y.M.C.A. Camp and from hence went to the Observatory. The faculty of the Observatory, Mr. Alban C. Clark, maker of the telescope; Mr. and Mrs. John Johnston, and a few other invited friends completed the party which assembled in the great dome as the magic lenses were for the first time focused upon the starry heavens.

The planet, Jupiter was selected as the subject of observation. President Harper first looked through the tube and beheld the mighty planet magnified to 400 diameters. To say he was pleased with the effect would be far from expressing his feelings.

After all had proven to their satisfaction that the instrument was perfect, the party left and at 9:30 P.M. the train pulled out again for Chicago.

The first faculty of the Yerkes Observatory was as follows—George E. Hale, Director; S.W. Burnham, Astronomer; E.E. Barnard, Astronomer; F.L.O. Wadsworth, Astrophysicist; Ferdinand Ellerman, Assistant; and G. Willis Ritchey, Optician.

Memorial Day was set apart as a day for honoring the memory of the soldiers who fought in the Civil War. May 30, 1868 was ordered by the G.A.R. to be observed in decorating the graves of the dead soldiers.

You will note the name. The publisher has decided to use the name by which our lake is known throughout the world.

There may be arguments for the name " Geneva Lake ". On the large wall map published in 1857 for Walworth County it was used and also in 1873 in the County Atlas. Likewise in 1883. The city of Lake Geneva started out with the name " Geneva Lake " but later changed it to "Lake Geneva".

With the coming of the railroad and the publicity given by it the name Lake Geneva gained usage and for many years the name has clung to the city as well as the lake.

The late Dr. Paul B. Jenkins who supported the original name however used the one of common usage as the title of his book " The Book of Lake Geneva ".

The poem written by Arthur Kaye years ago was entitled " Beautiful Lake Geneva ".

The Lake Geneva Yacht Club and the Lake Geneva Country Club are also evidences of common usage. The camps and Yerkes Observatory use " Lake Geneva " in their literature , scattered throughout the world.

" Bay Leaves " and " Lake Geneva Observer " will be combined and on June 17th copies will be distributed to all homes on the lake shore.

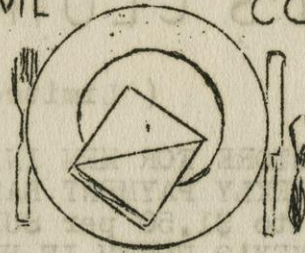
June 10th number of " Bay Leaves " will be omitted and a double sized number published the next week.

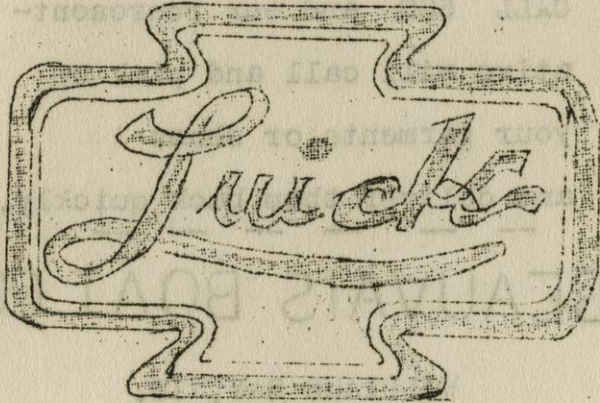

Being one of a large, poor family, he learned at an early age how to work and save. He first went to work when he was thirteen years old for a very small wage. Later, when he became twenty-one years of age, and was working for a very small salary, \$4.50 a week, when he was refused a raise by his employer, he quit and went into business for himself, from which he built up a vast fortune in oil leases.

He learned very young to work, to save and to give. From a diary he kept in his youth, reads-

"I was early taught to work as well as play;

My life has been one long, happy holiday-

Full of work, and full of play-
