Regent Fish noted that the amendment he had intended to introduce was included in the revised document. This change, proposed by the UW-Stevens Point University Affairs Committee, concerned placement in the rules of the section on political campaigning in residence halls.

Put to the vote, Resolution 3517 was unanimously adopted.

Regent Presentations

Presentation on UW-Milwaukee and the Future of Metropolitan Milwaukee, pp 3-5

Acting Chancellor Rees introduced Regent Emeritus Frank J. Pelisek, noting that he had devoted a major part of his life to serving the UW System. As past president of the Board of Regents and a member of the board from 1969 to 1977, he played a leading role in merging the University of Wisconsin and the Wisconsin State University System as mandated by the Governor and the Legislature.

UW-Milwaukee - Presentation to the board on UW-Milwaukee & the future of Metropolitan Milwaukee, pp 3-5

Mr. Pelisek, who was a partner in the Milwaukee law firm of Michael, Best and Friedrich, continued his active support for the university after leaving the Board of Regents. From 1977-80, he served as president of the Board of Directors of the UW-Milwaukee Foundation, which he helped to establish and on which he still served. He also had been a member of the Higher Educational Aids Board and the former Wisconsin Coordinating Council for Higher Education. Among other civic roles, he was a consultant to the Governor's Council on Economic Development and had served as Chairman of the Board of the Milwaukee Regional Medical Center.

He appeared before the board this day to present the report of a task force he chaired on UW-Milwaukee and the Future of Metropolitan Milwaukee. The purpose of the task force, which consisted of key community and university leaders, was to review the many recent reports relating to the future of the Greater Milwaukee area and to examine the role that UW-Milwaukee could play in implementing those recommendations.

Before presenting the task force report, Mr. Pelisek commended Dr. Rees for the exemplary service she had rendered as acting chancellor.

Observing that the work of the Regents Study Group on the Future of the UW System was critically important in this era of scarce financial resources, Mr. Pelisek noted that the task force report also reflected the need to look toward the future. Findings of other studies concerned with the future of all types of activities in the Milwaukee region indicated that the people of the area were determined to take charge of their destinies and that they saw a major doctoral research university located in the region as a necessary resource to achieve a meaningful future.

Summarizing the task force recommendations, Mr. Pelisek noted that they were divided into five principal areas, the first of which focused on the metropolitan mission of UW-Milwaukee and the dynamics of change affecting the Greater Milwaukee region. In that regard, it was recommended that the Board of Regents charge UW-Milwaukee to develop a specific plan to implement the goals set forth in the report, with particular attention to the institution's research and doctoral mission; that UW-Milwaukee thoroughly review and evaluate its array of academic programs, propose modifications, and determine areas of needed expansion; and that UW-Milwaukee increase its ability to meet the growing needs of business professionals, working adults, and other non-traditional students.

The task force then focused on quality education as a major issue in the region. In that regard, it was recommended that the university lead the effort to achieve quality education at all levels with particular emphasis

on the needs of minority students. To do so, UW-Milwaukee was asked to pursue educational quality and teaching excellence at the undergraduate level; work with primary and secondary schools, both public and private, to improve and expand opportunities for quality education at that level; and expand its special role in educational research, curriculum development, and preparation of elementary/secondary school teachers. The task force found strong public support for improving educational quality at all levels, on the basis that quality education from kindergarten through graduate school would be critically important to the economic and social future of the region.

The third area on which the task force focused was the strong and growing demand in the region for the university to play a more direct and supportive role in the area of economic development. Greater Milwaukee's traditional economic base was changing rapidly, and industries demanded help with applied research and technology transfer to develop both new products and new methods of production. The task force therefore recommended that UW-Milwaukee take a leading role in development of research consortia, institutional partnerships, research parks, and business incubator facilities in this region. Because businesses increasingly were responding to global trends and seeking to be more competitive in the international market place, it was recommended that university efforts be directed toward assisting production of a greater volume of business activity from international sources and markets. Specifically, the task force asked that UW-Milwaukee's international efforts be expanded in the following areas: ties to universities overseas, exchange of students and scholars, foreign language instruction, interdisciplinary research, and instructional programs. It was also suggested that UW-Milwaukee help meet the specific training and technology transfer needs of the region by diversifying and strengthening continuing education and outreach functions.

The fourth area on which the task force focused was environmental quality/regional development. Major challenges included housing, transportation, solid waste disposal, air and water pollution, land use planning, urban design/development, provision of municipal services in an era of scarce resources, and rebuilding of the infrastructure. It was recommended that UW-Milwaukee focus on metropolitan and statewide development issues, recognizing the relationship between the state's largest metropolitan area and the rest of Wisconsin; that the university use the "centers of excellence" concept to address basic and applied research needs and public service needs of Wisconsin's communities and institutions; and that with the support of the private sector, UW-Milwaukee develop research consortia and cooperative programs with other institutions of higher education to make the most effective use of knowledge and research to help address the challenges facing Wisconsin's communities and institutions.

The final area on which the task force focused was quality of life. Finding that the creative and performing arts were enjoying a surge of interest which required the involvement of a major university, the task force recommended that UW-Milwaukee's programs in the performing and visual arts be strengthened, with special efforts to develop new sources of community financial support; that UW-Milwaukee cultivate increased opportunities to share with the community basic and applied research of its scientists and scholars, the intellectual wealth of the Golda Meir Library,

the considerable resources of new telecommunications networks, and the highly successful public service/fine arts programming of WUWM-FM; and that UW-Milwaukee initiate opportunities for sponsorship of national seminars and an annual lecture series to bring to the community internationally recognized scholars and authorities on art, politics, the sciences and the humanities.

Another aspect of quality of life in the region involved delivery of health and human services in an effective and affordable manner. Because of the size and diversity of the region's population, there was great demand for a large variety of human service and social programs. In addition, fundamental shifts in society had brought about profound changes, resulting in the need to accommodate greater numbers of single parent families, more mothers of small children in the work force, growing pressures on the traditional family structure, and a steadily increasing elderly population. The task force recommended that UW-Milwaukee help meet these challenges by expanding its professional health care instructional and research programs, with special emphasis on the changing needs of health care professionals and organizations, as well as industrial and occupational health and safety. It also was recommended that UW-Milwaukee provide research, counseling services and quality instructional programs at the undergraduate and graduate levels to public and private organizations which had the responsibility to plan and provide health and human services.

After completing the summary of recommendations, Mr. Pelisek stated: "Our task force offers these recommendations with the knowledge that you face many challenges in your role as regents of this great system. You face the substantial challenge of scarce resources and many competing needs and demands. We do feel, however, that the Greater Milwaukee region is truly different from the rest of the state. UW-Milwaukee as an institution is also different in many ways as it seeks to serve the needs of the people of southeastern Wisconsin who represent 40 percent of this state's population. This region contains the most diverse population in Wisconsin and by far its largest concentration of minorities. It is also the state's center of manufacturing, business and finance. The future of Greater Milwaukee is critical to the future of Wisconsin and the future of UW-Milwaukee is critical to the future of Greater Milwaukee."

Presidents Lawton and Shaw thanked Mr. Pelisek for his eloquent presentation and for the efforts of the task force in identifying these important challenges.

Introduction of Director of Milwaukee Area Technical College

Dr. Russ Slicker, director of the Milwaukee Area Technical College, was introduced by President Shaw.

Business/Industry -

Introduction of New University/Industry Resource Directory, p.6

Presenting the updated and expanded directory of UW System services to Wisconsin business and industry, President Shaw observed that this publication, which listed more than 500 centers, departments, research institutes and consortia, demonstrated the UW System's capacity and commitment to assist significantly in Wisconsin's economic growth. He then called upon Chancellor Swanson, of UW-Stout, who chaired the task group that developed the directory.

Giving a slide presentation on the history and content of the publication, Chancellor Swanson recalled that the project began with a speech by former President O'Neil to the Wisconsin Association of Manufacturers and Commerce, which led to the idea of compiling a listing of projects through which the universities aided business and industry in Wisconsin. The first directory, which covered the period of 1980-82, listed 185 centers, and the number was expanded to 250 in the 1984 edition. The 500 units included in this directory were located in all system institutions.

The first section showed what resources were available at each institution, following which there was an extensive index of key words identifying areas of expertise and the units at which each could be found. Then there was an alphabetical listing of the organized units in the universities that provided service to business and industry. This list included the name of the center, its location, the name of the director, the telephone number, a description of what the center offered and examples of potential users of that service. In addition, the directory listed the UW Centers and the types of service they provided; libraries, museums and reference sources; business outreach services provided by small business development centers and small business institutes; and resources for international business, which included sources for translation of 45 languages and identification of faculty who had expertise in various geographic areas.

Chancellor Swanson then recognized the directory's coeditors: Jean Akhtar, of the UW-Madison University-Industry Research Program, and Shirley Wisner, of the UW System Office of University Relations. Denis Dale, also of the Office of University Relations, was designer of the publication.

In conclusion, the chancellor introduced two members of the task group: Joseph Domitrz, Dean of the College of Business and Economics, UW-Whitewater, and George Keulks, Dean of the Graduate School, UW-Milwaukee. Other members were: W. Robert Marshall, Director of the University-Industry Research Program, UW-Madison, and David Martin, Assistant Vice President, UW System Administration.

President of the University -

Announcement of 1986 President's Award for Student Government to UW-Green Bay Student Assn., pp 6-7

Observing that it had been difficult to select only one student government from among the many examples of excellent performance during the 1985-86 academic year, President Shaw announced that he had chosen the UW-Green Bay Student Association as the recipient of the 1986 President's

Award for Student Government. This organization had been nominated enthusiastically for its mature, intelligent and sophisticated leadership in maintaining vital and effective student representation in institutional policy review, student services and activities.

Although it was possible to have only one winner, the president recognized the particular achievements of two other student government associations: the UW-Eau Claire Student Association, for constructive organizational skills and representation of student interests through an effective working relationship with faculty, administrators and the community in the true spirit of shared governance; and the UW-Madison Wisconsin Student Association, for creative and timely responses to current issues, for developing better communication links between student government and its constituencies, and for continuing efforts to provide services for students.

United Council - Last meeting for Pres. Joanna Richard; UW Center-Waukesha County added to Council membership; UW-Milw. lost 2nd annual Council-sponsored Minority Pre-College Conference, program developed in "Students Taking Action Against Rape, p. 7"

Report of the United Council of UW Student Governments

Making her final report as President of United Council, JoAnna Richard announced that students at the UW Center-Waukesha County had voted to join United Council, bringing membership in the group to 21 of the 26 campuses.

The following week, United Council, the UW System, the Higher Educational Aids Board and several student organizations were to host the second annual Minority Pre-College Conference, at UW-Milwaukee, with an expected attendance of more than 300 students from the southeastern Wisconsin area. The goal was to enhance recruitment of minority students by having currently enrolled students help pre-college students prepare for admission to UW System institutions.

Another United Council project was submission of a grant proposal to the Department of Justice, for a program called "Students Taking Action Against Rape." Based on each campus, with a statewide coordinating body developed through United Council, the program would provide peer counseling for victims of rape on campuses.

Concluding her report, Ms. Richard expressed special appreciation to President Lawton, Vice President Fish, President Shaw and Executive Vice President Lyall for their commitment to students and for the help they had given her as United Council president.

UW-Milwaukee - Ed Emerson's comments as Pres. of UW-Milwaukee Student Assoc encouraging access to university education for poor + minority communities, pp 7-8

Comments by the President of the UW-Milwaukee Student Association

Welcoming the board to UW-Milwaukee on behalf of the student body, Mr. Ed Emerson commented on the significance of the Wisconsin Idea in considering the future of the UW System. "The Wisconsin Idea has at its heart the common citizen. It is only through a strong, low cost, quality, progressive university system that we can assure future prosperity, not only for this university system but for the entire State of Wisconsin." Noting that in Milwaukee one of four children were born into poverty, he expressed

concern about suggestions that the UW System should increase tuition levels from the low-cost to the medium-cost range. Such proposals, he felt, would alter the entire course of the Wisconsin Idea. In that regard, he also thought there should be creative alternatives to a simple choice between quality and access. Observing that the primary purpose of a university was to fulfill the human need for knowledge, he urged the board to continue providing access for the poor and minority communities that surrounded UW-Milwaukee.

Chairman Clusen presented the report of the committee.

Informational Report on Academic Staff Title and Compensation System, p. 9

At a portion of the meeting to which all regents had been invited, Associate Vice President Wallace Lemon introduced the principal Hayes/Hill consultants, Peter Sauers and James Hughes, who presented an overview of the process by which recommendations for the academic staff title and compensation system were being prepared. The final report was to be presented at the June meeting, with time set aside for any persons who wished to appear before the committee to comment on the report.

It was suggested by Regent Clusen that regional briefings be arranged for the regents in order to provide as much information as possible on this complex issue.

Fourth, UW-La Crosse, UW-Stout and UW-Whitewater were undergoing their regular North Central Association reaccreditation reviews, ^{p. 9} Fifth, Dr. Kuepper attended a meeting in Chicago of the AASCU Commission on the Future of State Colleges and Universities, which was to make its final report in the fall. Sixth, the Office of Academic Affairs announced two staff openings to replace Michael Thron and Karen Merritt, who were moving to other assignments.

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The committee's report was presented by Chairman Weinstein.

Gifts, Grants and U.S. Government Contracts

Vice President Case reported that gifts, grants and contracts for the first eleven months of this year totaled \$277.1 million or \$21.6 million greater than the same period last year. The non-federal share was \$58.5 million (an 8.3 percent increase over a year ago), while the federal share of \$218.7 million was 8.5 percent greater than a year ago. The primary increases occurred in research and student aid.

Upon motion by Regent Weinstein, seconded by Regent Hanson, Resolution 3532 was adopted unanimously by the board.

UW-Extension Audit Report

Regent Weinstein reported that Chancellor Boyle reviewed with the committee legislative audits of budget/financial management and the Small Business Development Center. The five areas of budget and management evaluated were fund balances, funding decisions, fund reallocations, budget requests, and legislatively mandated reallocations. While UW-Extension disagreed with certain conclusions, it would comply nonetheless with the recommendations on the status of legislatively mandated reallocations by August 15, 1986, and would also provide clear and adequate justification of future budget requests. The Legislature's Joint Committee on Audit was to hold hearings on both reports later in the month.

✓ Financial Aid - Report on student financial aid in the system; recommendation to HEAB, R 3533,

Report on Student Financial Aid in the UW System

pp 18-19

Reviewing with the committee the report on student financial aid, Assistant Vice President Beaver observed that the most striking trend in student debt was that more than 37 percent of the freshman class now had debt averaging \$3,000, in comparison to 32 percent at that debt level two years ago. Forty percent of the resident students who received bachelor's degrees in 1984-85 graduated with an average debt of \$7,000. While these trends are comparable to the national average, low-income students in the UW System had significantly more debt than their counterparts nationwide.

It was pointed out that total need for student aid continued to increase, with more than 53,000 students receiving aid in 1984-85, while 33,000 were given aid in 1978-79. In an effort to continue to meet this growing need, the committee recommended that the Board of Regents urge the Higher Educational Aids Board to include in its biennial budget submission a request for a substantial increase in the funding level of the Wisconsin Higher Education Grant Program.

The Board of Regents urges the Wisconsin Higher Educational Aids Board to submit a biennial budget request for a substantial increase in the amount of funding for the Wisconsin Higher Education Grant Program. One approach to determining such an increase would be to adjust the average awards given to the neediest UW System students for inflation since 1978-79, and to provide for the increased numbers of students eligible for financial aid.

In discussion at the board meeting, Regent Schenian noted that the Council on Financial Aid also had recommended that awards be increased to take into account the effects of inflation since 1978, as well as possible reductions resulting from Gramm-Rudman Act.

Put to the vote, Resolution 3533 was adopted unanimously.

This lease covers a three-year period from July 1, 1986 through June 30, 1989 at an annual rate of \$34,800 (\$2.90 per square foot) the first year; \$35,148 (\$2.93 per square foot) the second year; and \$35,499 (\$2.96 per square foot) for the third year. Lessor is responsible for the cost of air conditioning (partial) and maintenance of the structure. Funding for this lease will be provided by the Medical School's Operating Funds.

In response to a question by Regent Lawton, Regent Heckrodt explained that the lease rate was low because the building had been improved to a great extent by the university in order to provide the required germ-free environment.

Put to the vote, Resolution 3537 was adopted unanimously.

Research Parks - Approval for funding special assessment for improvements to Tokay Blvd., City of Madison, providing access to undeveloped land for University Research Parks

UW-Madison: Approval of Assessable Improvements

Regent Heckrodt reported unanimous approval by the committee of a request to the State Building Commission for funding a special assessment for improvements to Tokay Boulevard in the City of Madison, in order to provide access to undeveloped land, mainly involving the University Research Park. The assessment was to be paid from the State of Wisconsin general fund, per section 66.60(4), Wisconsin Statutes.

As individual parcels served by the utility improvements were transferred to the University Research Park, Inc. for purposes of development, the university was to reimburse the state's general fund for the appropriate portion of the assessment.

UW-Green Bay: Approval of Budget Increase for Major Project of Concourse/Plaza leakage R 3540, pp 22-23

Regent Heckrodt reported unanimous approval by the committee of a budget increase of \$45,000 for the Concourse/Plaza leakage correction project at UW-Green Bay. After bids received in September 1985 exceeded the approved budget, the project was redesigned and scheduled for spring rebidding, which occurred on April 8, 1986. The construction budget and related design, supervision and contingency expenses resulted in a total project cost of \$592,500 which required the requested increase of \$45,000. The September 1985 bid was considerably higher because it would have involved winter construction. The committee concurred that further reductions in project cost seemed unlikely and that the increase should be approved so construction could take place in the summer.

It was moved by Regent Heckrodt and seconded by Regent Nikolay that Resolution 3540 be adopted by the board.

Resolution 3540: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Green Bay Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, approval be granted to increase the budget for the 1983-85 Concourse/Plaza Leakage Correction project by \$45,000 for a revised total project cost of \$592,500, to be funded from 1985-87 General Fund Supported Borrowing - Minimum Maintenance Program.

In response to a question by Regent Fish, Regent Heckrodt indicated that the State Building Commission had approved this request at its April 23 meeting.

Put to the vote, Resolution 3540 was unanimously adopted.

Approval of Minor Projects

Regent Heckrodt reported that the committee unanimously approved three minor projects, two for UW-Madison and one for UW-Platteville. The first minor project for UW-Madison related to Elvehjem Museum of Art security modifications at a cost of \$100,000 in gift and grant monies.

The second request from UW-Madison was for \$120,000 of general-fund-supported borrowing for a hazardous waste removal project. The funds would be used to supplement the \$30,000 included for UW-Madison in the \$381,100 systemwide request approved by the board in April.

The request for UW-Platteville was for authority to construct a handicapped accessibility and code compliance project for the Student Center at a total estimated cost of \$244,000 from program revenue. In April, the regents approved increasing the scope of the Student Center addition project and proceeding with preparation of a concept and budget report at a revised cost of about \$755,000. At that time, it was indicated that the Building Commission might consider the increases in both scope and budget so substantial as to require reenumeration of the project in the 1987-89 capital budget.

At its April 23 meeting, the Building Commission divided the request into two projects, one for the addition and one for the portions relating to handicapped accessibility and code compliance. The commission further amended the scope of the code compliance work to permit removal of the existing stairs and construction of a new stairway. Authority was granted to complete plans and specifications, bid and construct those portions as a separate minor project, at an estimated cost of \$244,000. The minor project would proceed upon approval by the board of this request. The concept and budget report for the addition, at an estimated cost of \$609,700, was being developed for presentation to the regents in the next few months.

Regent Heckrodt moved adoption by the board of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Nikolay:

In discussion at the board meeting, Regent Fish noted that the State Building Commission deferred consideration of \$381,100 of health and safety funds for hazardous waste removal. He asked if the \$120,000 included in this resolution was in addition to that amount, and Interim Vice President Brown responded in the affirmative.

✓ UW-Platteville - Bldgs + Land - Approval of handicapped accessibility project for Student Center, R 3541, PP 23-25

In reply to a further question by Regent Fish, Mr. Brown said the request would be made at the May Building Commission meeting that the entire \$500,000 be funded from the health and safety allocation rather than operating funds. The request had been deferred for a month because the Governor had not been able to attend the meeting.

Regent Fish observed that hazardous waste removal seemed entirely in conformance with the purpose of the health and safety allocation.

It was explained by Mr. Brown that Building Commission staff recommended use of operating funds because the materials had been accumulated by operations of the various laboratories. System staff responded that there had been no opportunity to request operating budget funds for this purpose.

Regent Fish requested that a report on the May Building Commission action be made at the next meeting.

Regent Heckrodt added that the issue was especially important because there would be no alternative to use of operating budget funds if health and safety funds were not approved. The system was mandated to dispose of the hazardous waste and fines for failure to comply would be about \$2 million per day. Furthermore, the amount requested to date was not the total that would be required to dispose of the hazardous materials.

Put to the vote, Resolution 3541 was adopted unanimously.

Continuing his report, Regent Heckrodt stated that the committee unanimously approved purchase of a 0.2-acre parcel of improved land for UW-Stout at a total cost of \$42,000. This property was one of two remaining parcels on Second Street East not yet owned by the university. After appraisals in March 1986 of \$36,000 and \$36,500, an option had been obtained at \$36,000.

UW-Stout - Bldg & Land - Approval to purchase a 0.2-acre parcel of improved land, R 3542, p. 25
 Resolution 3542 was unanimously adopted by the board, upon motion by Regent Heckrodt, seconded by Regent Nikolay.

Resolution 3542: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Stout Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, approval be granted to purchase a 0.2 acre improved parcel of land located at 1409 Second Street East in the City of Menomonie at an estimated cost of \$42,000, including closing and estimated relocation costs. The acquisition would be funded from the \$1.5 million Advance Land Acquisition allocation released in September 1985.

Report of the Vice President

Interim Vice President Brown presented a report to the committee on post-bid budgets for three major projects and actions taken by the State Building Commission at its April 23, 1986, meeting. It was noted that bids for the UW-Milwaukee union plaza repair and addition were considerably higher than the anticipated amount, reflecting heavy demand for construction in the Milwaukee area.

The committee was also advised of an impending amendment to the original agreement with the Stone family, which donated to UW-Madison the residence hall which was to be dedicated later this month. Upon signing of the amendment by Chancellor Shain, the building would be known as "Merit House."



CHAPTERS UWS 18 and 21

[INTRODUCTORY CLAUSE]

To renumber and amend UWS 18.06(13), to create UWS 18.06(16m), and to create Chapter UWS 21, relating to the use or possession of alcohol beverages on university premises; political campaigning in state owned residence halls; and the use of and access to university facilities.

[PLAIN LANGUAGE ANALYSIS PREPARED BY THE UW SYSTEM]

The rules to be amended and created by this order are promulgated in accordance with s. 36.11 (1) (a), (c), and (cm), Wis. Stats., authorizing the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System to adopt rules to protect the lives, health and safety of persons on property under its jurisdiction; to manage property under its jurisdiction; and to determine the time, place and manner of certain political activities conducted in university residence halls.

UWS 18.06(13) is amended to include beer among regulated alcohol beverages on university campuses. The current rule applies only to intoxicating liquors and fermented malt beverages with an alcoholic content of more than 5% by weight, and thus excludes most beers. This amendment implements a recommendation of the UW System Advisory Committee on Alcohol Education, which suggested that such a change would enhance the ability of university staff to deal with alcohol abuse on campus.

UWS 18.06(16m) is proposed for adoption pursuant to the legislative directive of s. 36.11(1)(cm), Stats., which requires the Board of Regents to prepare rules regulating political campaigning in state-owned residence halls. The rule would permit the residence halls students on each campus to establish policies regulating the time, place and manner in which political literature would be distributed, and political campaigning conducted, in the residence halls. These policies would be subject to approval by chancellors and the Board of Regents.

Rules concerning the use of university facilities are proposed for adoption in a new chapter, UWS 21. Existing policy in this area is set forth in Regent Policy Document 74-15. Analysis of this document in connection with a review of all university policies by the Joint Committee for Review of Administrative Rules suggested the propriety of its promulgation as an administrative rule.

Proposed UWS 21.01 states the policy of the Board of Regents that university facilities are to be used primarily for purposes of fulfilling the university's teaching, research and public service functions, and are not available for unrestricted use for other purposes.

UWS 21.03 sets the parameters on use of university facilities by organizations associated with UW System institutions. Pursuant to UWS 21.03(1), the chancellor must permit such organizations to use facilities for events for staff and students where the use will not interfere with the institutional mission, space is available, and the organization has complied with any applicable institutional procedures. If the use is to be for a public event, the chancellor may permit it, subject to the same conditions. In either case, the organization may be required to pay the costs, if any, incident to the use. Where the event generates revenue for the organization, a rental charge may be imposed.

The use of university facilities by persons or organizations not associated with an institution is subject to the same restrictions applicable to university organizations holding public events. In addition, however, UWS 21.04 would require that the proposed use be under the sponsorship or at the invitation of an organization associated with the institution.

Proposed UWS 21.05 deals with access to public events held in university facilities, in relation to the rights and interests of performers, lecturers, artists and speakers. Where university facilities are used for public events, any conditions or restrictions on access must be embodied in a written agreement and made known prior to the event.

The final section of proposed UWS 21, UWS 21.06, requires UW institutions to develop procedures for securing permission to use university facilities, schedules describing any costs or fees which might be assessed for use of facilities, and a description of any limitations on times of availability and manner of use of facilities.

[STATEMENT OF STATUTORY AUTHORITY]

Pursuant to the authority vested in the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System by s. 36.11(1) (a), (c) and (cm), Wis. Stats., the Board of Regents hereby rennumbers, amends and creates rules as follows:

SECTION 1. UWS 18.06(13) is amended to read:

(13) (title) ALCOHOL BEVERAGES. (a) ~~The use or possession of intoxicating liquors, or fermented malt beverages with an alcoholic content of more than 5% by weight,~~ alcohol beverages is prohibited on all university ~~lands~~ premises, except in faculty and staff housing ~~in student housing units specifically designated by the chief administrative officer, and at suitable times under decorous conditions in conference, meeting or dining facilities, subject to statutory age regulations,~~ and as permitted by the chief administrative officer, subject to statutory age restrictions. The chief administrative officer may generally permit the use or possession of alcohol beverages by promulgating institutional regulations, or in specific instances by written permission.

(b) No person may procure, sell, dispense or give away alcohol beverages to any person contrary to the provisions of ch. 125, Stats.

(c) In this subsection, "alcohol beverages" means fermented malt beverages and intoxicating liquors containing 0.5% or more of alcohol by volume.

SECTION 2. UWS 18.06(16m) is created to read:

(16m) CAMPAIGNING IN STATE-OWNED RESIDENCE HALLS. (a) The residence halls students of each institution, subject to the approval of the chief administrative officer, shall establish policies and procedures prescribing the time, place and manner in which political literature may be distributed and political campaigning may be conducted in state-owned residence halls.

(b) Matters to be addressed in institutional policies and procedures shall include at least the following:

1. The hours of the day and the time of year, if any, to which particular activities shall be limited.
2. The locations in residence halls, if any, to which particular activities shall be limited.
3. Any requirement for registering or obtaining permission to enter a residence hall before engaging in a particular activity.

(c) Notwithstanding s. UWS 18.09, institutional policies and procedures developed pursuant to this subsection shall be reported to the board of regents for approval.

SECTION 3. Chapter UWS 21 is created to read:

Chapter UWS 21

USE OF UNIVERSITY FACILITIES

21.01 **DECLARATION OF POLICY.** It is the policy of the board of regents that the facilities of the university are to be used primarily for purposes of fulfilling the university's missions of teaching, research and public service. University facilities are not available for unrestricted use for other purposes. In order to preserve and enhance the primary functions of university facilities, the board of regents adopts this chapter to govern the use of university facilities.

21.02 **DEFINITIONS.** In this chapter:

(1) "Board of regents" or "board" has the meaning given under s. UWS 1.02;

(2) "Chancellor" means the chief executive officer of a university, the university of Wisconsin centers, or the university extension.

(3) "Facilities" or "university facilities" means the publicly owned or leased buildings and grounds which are subject to the custody and control of the board.

(4) "Institution" has the meaning given under s. UWS 1.06;

(5) "Organization associated with an institution" means that an organization is an officially recognized staff or student group, or an administrative or academic unit, or a state agency.

(6) "Staff" means all employees of the university of Wisconsin system.

(7) "Student" means any person who is registered for study in an institution of the university of Wisconsin system for the current academic period.

(8) "University" has the meaning given under s. UWS 1.07.

21.03 USE OF FACILITIES BY ORGANIZATIONS ASSOCIATED WITH AN

INSTITUTION. (1) The chancellor of each institution, or his or her designee, shall permit organizations associated with that institution to use university facilities for events for staff and students, if he or she determines that:

(a) The proposed use will not interfere with or detract from the teaching, research and public service missions of the institution;

(b) The institution has appropriate facilities available for the proposed use; and

(c) The organization has complied with institutional procedures adopted under s. UWS 21.06.

(2) The chancellor of each institution, or his or her designee, may permit organizations associated with that institution to use university facilities for public events if he or she determines that:

(a) The proposed use will not interfere with or detract from the teaching, research and public service missions of the institution;

(b) The institution has appropriate facilities available for the proposed use; and

(c) The organization has complied with institutional procedures adopted under s. UWS 21.06.

3 Organizations using university facilities under this section may be required to reimburse the institution for the costs, if any, incident to the use of the facilities.

(4) Organizations using university facilities under this section may be required to pay rental charges for use of the facilities if the use is revenue producing.

21.04 USE OF FACILITIES BY PERSONS OR ORGANIZATIONS NOT ASSOCIATED WITH AN INSTITUTION. (1) The Chancellor of each institution, or his or her designee may permit persons, or organizations not associated with that institution, to use university facilities at his or her institution if he or she determines that:

(a) The proposed use is under the sponsorship or at the invitation of an organization associated with the institution;

(b) The proposed use will not interfere with or detract from the teaching, research and public service missions of the institution, or the use of the facilities by organizations associated with the institution;

(c) The institution has appropriate facilities available for the proposed use; and

(d) The person or organization has complied with institutional procedures adopted under s. UWS 21.06.

(2) Persons or organizations using university facilities under this section must reimburse the institutions for the costs, if any, incident to the use of the facilities.

(3) Persons or organizations using university facilities under this section may be required to pay rental charges for use of facilities if the use is for the purpose of revenue producing.

21.05 ACCESS TO PUBLIC EVENTS HELD AT UNIVERSITY FACILITIES.

(1) It is the policy of the board to ensure maximum access to public events held in university facilities, consistent with the legally recognized rights and interests of performers, lecturers, artists and speakers.

(2) Where a person or organization has secured the use of university facilities for a public event, any contemplated restriction or condition on access to the event must be made known prior to the event, and must be embodied in a written agreement with the institution, which agreement shall be open to public inspection. However, such agreements may not deny or restrict access to university facilities in a manner contrary to other applicable laws or regulations or on any basis prohibited by law.

21.06 INSTITUTIONAL PROCEDURES. The Chancellor of each institution, in consultation with appropriate staff and students, shall develop procedures for the administration of this chapter which shall, at a minimum, include the following:

(1) Procedures for securing permission to use university facilities;

(2) A schedule of the costs and rental fees, if any, assessed for the use of facilities; and

(3) A description of any institutional limitations concerning the time of availability and manner of the use of institutional facilities.
