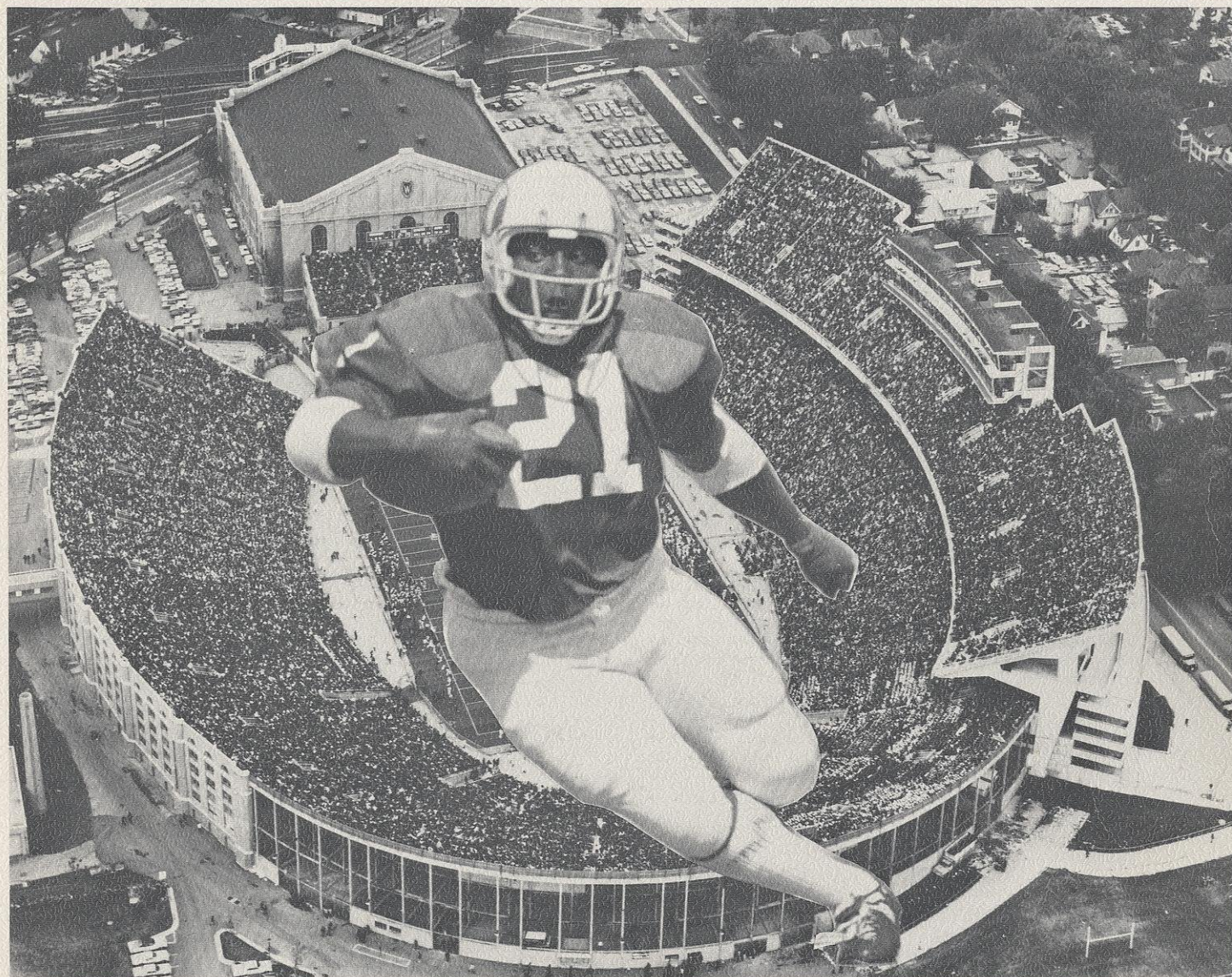

HISTORY OF CAMP RANDALL STADIUM

They call it Camp Randall.

That's important.

Every now and then some hurried out-of-town sports announcer will call it "Randall Field," but he is corrected quickly.

The University of Wisconsin is proud that its sports center is more than just an athletic field—and that the drama and excitement of football seasons are set against a backdrop of colorful Wisconsin history.

In its 79 years of ownership, the University has expanded the facilities there until they include a large stadium, fieldhouse, memorial practice building and football practice fields.

But the University didn't name it. The name was decided long before that by veterans of the Civil War who knew it was a great military camp named for a wartime governor. When the University took it over they insisted that the name be preserved forever as a memorial to their fallen friends.

In the days before the Civil War, the site was owned by the State Agricultural Society whose yearly state fairs attracted holidaying throngs there. With the outbreak of the war, however, the society turned the place over to the government to become the state's major training center.

The display halls were transformed into white-washed barracks and the hall used for flower shows became a hospital. A total of 70,000 troops were drilled—usually about 7,000 being stationed there at a time—and 500,000 relatives and friends came to visit them.

Later in the war part of the camp became a prison where a group of sick Confederates, captured by Gen. Pope at Island No. 10 in the Mississippi, was brought. Many died in the drafty prison hospital on the knoll and were buried in what is now Confederate Rest at Forest Hill cemetery.

The land again became the state fair grounds when peace returned and when Gen. U. S. Grant visited it 15 years later he hailed the transformation as "a symbol of beating the spears of war into the plowshares of peace."

Other visitors to the grounds were Gens. Sherman and Sheridan and Pres. Hayes. When the state fair was moved to Milwaukee and a few years later even the Dane County Agricultural society stopped using it for fairs, the Civil War veterans were furious to learn the land was to be sold for building lots.

Blasting the "sordid sacrilege," they urged the legislature to buy it and in 1893 the state presented it to the University as a memorial athletic field.

When the question of a name arose, the veterans promptly carried the day for "camp" instead of "Field."

Intercollegiate athletics had been started at Wisconsin in 1881 and the University has had a football team since 1889. The school won its first great victory in 1894, defeating Minnesota 6-0 in a game on the lower campus that part of the crowd watched from fringed surreys. The great teams of '96, '97, and '01 were among the first to play at the new field.

Charles Van Hise, who became president of the University in 1903, was a sports enthusiast as well as a great president and he used to ride his horse nightly out to watch the football practice. Games were played before the old wood fairstand and many Madison business and professional men still boast of the holes they found as boys to insure a free look at the fun.

The University had a "real" stadium by 1913 but its stands were still wooden. The legislature declined to pay for concrete—and consequently, was promptly blamed when a large section collapsed Nov. 21, 1915, at the climactic Wisconsin-Minnesota game.

Twenty people were injured, some seriously, and only the fact that the seats fell slowly prevented more casualties among the 1,800 in the area.

So in 1917 the present stadium—following completion of the past year's addition—was started with a grant of \$15,000 from the legislature. The rest of the money was earned by athletic events and the stadium, which now seats 77,280, is the only one in the Big Ten to "pay its own way" that way. Permanent dormitories were built, housing 150 men, but this space now is used as athletic department offices and training quarters.

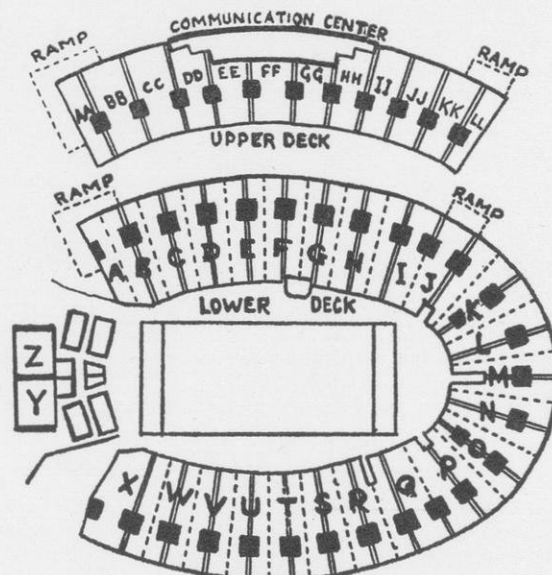
The first game to be played in Camp Randall Stadium was the 1917 homecoming game against Minnesota's Golden Gophers. The Badgers won the game 10-7 to hand the Gophers their only Big Ten loss, relegating them to second place in the final conference standings. A week later, Ohio State visited Camp Randall and inflicted a 16-3 defeat on the Badgers; the Ohioans won the title that year with an unbeaten record. Wisconsin placed in a tie for third place with Northwestern.

The fieldhouse at the open end of the stadium horseshoe was built in 1930 for almost \$500,000 and has a seating capacity of 13,800 for basketball games and other events.

The original capacity of the stadium when first utilized in 1917 was 10,000, with permanent seats being added in stages to increase seating capacity.

The current construction project is the third since the end of World War II which began with the completion of the horseshoe at the north end in 1950 and 1951.

The running track was eliminated in 1958 expansion which saw the playing field of Camp Randall lowered by ten feet to add almost 12,000 seats to the stadium capacity which grew to 63,435 at that time.

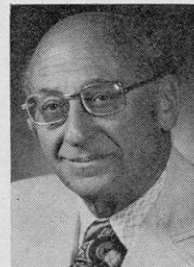

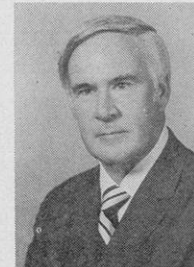

Hirsch Guides Wisconsin Athletic Program

Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch is dynamic, enthusiastic, direct, forceful, and a practical leader.

Now in his fourth year as Athletic Director he is the seventh man to serve in that capacity in the school's history.

Elroy accepted the athletic directorship on February 28, 1969, and was the overwhelming choice of Badger alumni and fans for the job.

In his first year he launched a program called "Operation Turn-Around," a program which took him into every area of the state of Wisconsin and the nation meeting with high school coaches, administrators, athletes, fans and followers on their home grounds. "Operation Turn-Around" carried the Badger leader into over 60 communities encompassing over 80 high schools which he personally visited.

As far as Elroy Hirsch is concerned, "Operation Turn-Around" is now complete. It reached its zenith last season in football as 408,885 fans turned out for six Badger home games at Camp Randall, ranking Wisconsin third in the nation in attendance.

The new slogan under Elroy Hirsch is "The Badgers ARE Back."

He is a living legend to followers of Wisconsin football and to sports fans and people throughout the entire state even though he played just one season — as a sophomore in 1942 — for the Badgers.

His career has been one of success.

Wisconsin fans, especially the older generation, remember him as the great triple threat halfback on Harry Stuhldreher's 1942 football team that won eight games, lost only to Iowa, and tied Notre Dame.

He played at Michigan in 1943, as a Marine trainee, and he not only played football, but basketball, track and baseball. He won his "M" in each sport, the only athlete ever to accomplish such a feat at Michigan.

He had a successful professional football career, first as halfback with the Chicago Rockets of the post-war All-America Conference, and later with the Los Angeles Rams for nine seasons as one of the all-time great ends.

He was a successful executive with the Rams, first as general manager of the team, and later as assistant to the president of the team, a job he relinquished to accept the job as Wisconsin athletic director.

How did Elroy Hirsch receive the nickname "Crazylegs"?

It happened in the Wisconsin-Great Lakes game at Chicago in October, 1942 as Hirsch reeled off a 61 yard scoring run. Francis Powers of the Chicago Daily News coined the phrase which was to remain with him throughout his career in the press box that afternoon.

As Hirsch recalls, "One of my feet was going one way, the other one in another direction on that run. I must have been a sight running down the sidelines."

And now that Elroy Hirsch is Wisconsin athletic director, does he prefer to be called Elroy or "Crazylegs"?

He answered that question easily

for a reporter at a press conference when accepting the job: "Any name is better than Elroy."

Hirsch's play as a 19-year-old sophomore on Wisconsin's 1942 football team carried the Badgers to the brink of the national championship that season. Only a 6-0 defeat by Iowa at Iowa City deprived the Badgers of Big Ten and national championships. The Wausau native rushed for 766 yards on 141 carries — his best was 174 yards on 22 attempts vs. Missouri — and his overall contribution added 226 yards passing, 390 yards on receptions and runbacks of punts, kickoffs, and interceptions plus eight touchdowns, five by rushing and three by passing.

His play on Michigan's 1943 football team helped the Wolverines to a 6-0 conference record and a share of the Big Ten title with Purdue. The team's only loss was to Notre Dame and again the team he played for was ranked No. 3 in the final Associated Press poll behind Notre Dame and Iowa Sea-hawks.

Hirsch signed with the Chicago Rockets of the All-America Conference after the war, but the three years he spent carrying the ball for the Rockets — 1946-48 — were not happy ones. Hirsch suffered a fractured skull, a back injury, a badly torn right leg ligament, and enough other aches and sprains to keep him immobilized on the bench or in the hospital for the major portion of his three years with Chicago.

Hirsch broke with the Rockets in the summer of 1949 and signed with the Los Angeles Rams. Because of his

injury-weakened right knee, Clark Shaughnessy, then Rams' head coach, put Hirsch on a daily running routine, dreamed up a special headguard to protect Hirsch from further injury, and switched him to an end position.

It was at end that "Crazylegs" was to attain new heights in his career. The Rams, in transition to the modern passing game, often split him wide as a receiver and finally moved him permanently to end — establishing him as the first flanker.

Hirsch was one of the athletes — like Otto Graham and Sam Huff and Gino Marchetti — who brought special talents to the sport in the 1950's as it changed from two-way players to offensive and defensive specialists under free substitution.

The flankers have done much to provide glamor for the sport, their lithe bodies racing rapidly downfield to haul in a pass, and Hirsch's talents insured his place in that development.

In 1951, Hirsch displayed all his talents as he put together one of the finest seasons in National Football League history. He gained 1,495 yards on receptions, an all-time record approached only by Bobby Mitchell of the Washington Redskins (1,436 yards in 1963) and Hirsch had only twelve games to set the record, not 14, like Mitchell!

That same season Hirsch caught 17 touchdown passes to tie the league record set by Don Hutson of the Packers in 1942. He also caught at least one touchdown pass through 11 consecutive games over the 1950 and 1951 seasons.

Hirsch grabbed 343 passes for 6,299 yards and 53 touchdowns during his career with the Rams.

He retired in 1957. He was named into the Wisconsin Hall of Fame in 1965 and to professional football's Hall of Fame at Canton, Ohio in 1968.

More recently, he was honored by being named to the all-1950's team commemorating the National Football League's 50th anniversary season and subsequently, to the all-time All-Star NFL team as selected by designated voters in cities holding NFL franchises.

"Crazylegs" also proved himself a talented actor — he made three movies: Zero Hour, Unchained, and the famed Crazy Legs, released in 1953, in which Hirsch played himself.

Hirsch joined the Union Oil Company in 1957 as director of sports and special events. He left Union Oil to accept the position of general manager of the Los Angeles Rams in 1960. When the club was sold to Daniel F. Reeves in 1963, Hirsch became his assistant.

As general manager, Hirsch was responsible for budget, negotiation of all contracts with players and coaches, supervision of the scouting system and college draft, and all other club business.

Elroy was married to the former Ruth Stahmer on June 27, 1946. The couple has two children — Win Stephen, 22, and Patricia Caroline, 14.

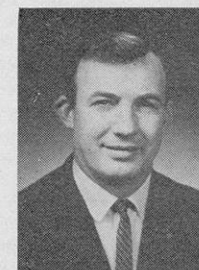

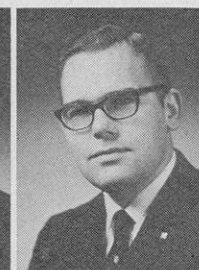

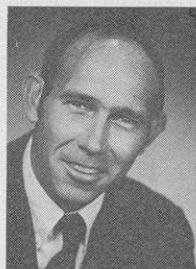
BOB BELL

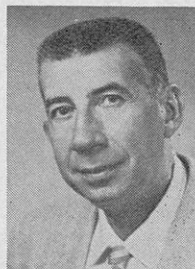

A native of Newton, Kansas, **Bud** prepped at Mason City, Iowa and enrolled at Wisconsin in 1926 majoring in Economics.

He was an All-Big Ten center in the 1929 and 1930 seasons and capped his career by winning All-American honors in the latter year.

Wisconsin teams won 43 and lost eight games during his varsity career.

He was named freshman coach of basketball in 1933 and a year later stepped into the head coaching job when **Dr. Walter E. Meanwell** resigned, and guided Wisconsin to the conference co-championship in his first year on a 9-3 record.

Wisconsin's 1941 team reigned as Big Ten and NCAA champions on a 20-3 record, and the 1947 team won the conference title and lost in the NCAA eastern regionals.

Bud's 25 Wisconsin teams posted an overall 265-267 record with a conference record of 143-182.

He served as president of the National Association of Basketball coaches and was a member of the Basketball Rules Committee from 1957 to 1966.

He's a Hall of Fame member as well — National Basketball, Wisconsin State, Madison Sports, and Helms Athletic Foundation.

Sports Information Director

Jim Mott was appointed Wisconsin's Sports Information Director in March, 1966, after serving as assistant to **Art Lentz** 1954-56 and **George Lanphear** 1956-66.

John Jardine Heads Wisconsin Football Program

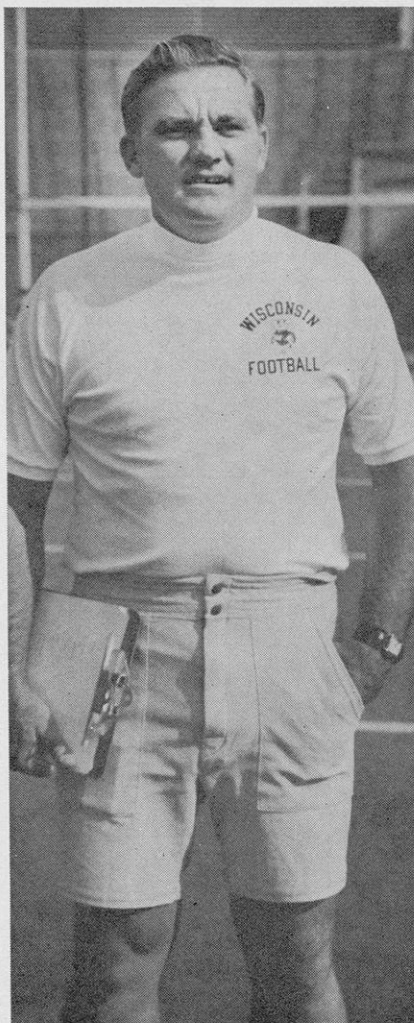
1972 marks the beginning of **John Jardine's** third season as Wisconsin's 23rd head football coach. His two year record of 8-11-2 at Wisconsin belies the enthusiasm he has brought back to Badger football. Wisconsin is now playing an interesting, imaginative brand of football under **Jardine**, and the fans have responded in record numbers. In 1971 408,885 fans turned out to witness six home games in Camp Randall Stadium to rank Wisconsin third in the nation in attendance.

Jardine came to Wisconsin from a highly successful assistantship at UCLA where he was offensive line coach under **Tommy Prothro** for five seasons, a period in which UCLA posted an overall record of 35-13-3.

The 37-year-old **Jardine** prepped at St. George High school in Evanston, Ill., playing in the tough Chicago Catholic League where he lettered in football, basketball and swimming.

He pursued his collegiate athletic career at Purdue, and, although weighing just 186 pounds, **John** was a good, tough guard for the Boilermakers in 1955, 1956 and 1957 and was a starter in both his junior and senior years.

John began his coaching career at Central Catholic High school in Lafayette, Indiana, in 1958 and then moved into the head coaching job at Fenwick High school in Oak Park, Illinois, where in five seasons his teams won 51 games, lost 6 and tied one. He guided Fenwick into Chicago Catholic League title games in 1959, 1960 and 1962, winning in 1959 and 1962. His 1959 team

lost to Lane Tech in the Chicago city championship game, but his 1962 team compiled an unbeaten record and blanked Schurz High school 40-0 in winning the Chicago city title.

He left the prep ranks following the 1963 season to join Purdue's football staff under **Jack Mollenkopf** as offensive line coach, where his assignment covered working with the guards and centers and he was also assigned to recruit the Chicago area.

After spending 1964 at Purdue, he joined **Tommy Prothro** at UCLA in 1965.

The native Chicagoan is the son of **James Jardine**, the city's water commissioner; his brother **Len**, head coach coach at Brown, also played football at Purdue. **John** is married to the former **Janice Ensign** of River Forest, Illinois, and they have four children: **Dan** 12, **Jennifer** 10, **John** 8 and **Jill** 7.

From the moment the new Badger head coach arrived in Madison he was heralded as somewhat of a mixture between **Vince Lombardi** and **Zorro**—a man who in the eyes of most fans could perform the miracle of bringing Wisconsin football back to respectability. An enormous amount of pressure was created by enthusiastic fans talking about winning football, and Rose Bowl, and one local sportswriter seeing him as a young **Knute Rockne**.

Coach Jardine, however, remained more "down to earth" than most of the Badger backers. He emphasized that he is no miracle worker; that it will be a long tough climb toward the top.

A Preview of 1972 Football Season with John Jardine

A solid running attack and an improved defensive alignment are two main reasons that Coach **John Jardine** and his football staff look forward to the 1972 football season and foresee a winning campaign for the Badgers — a feat that has not been accomplished by a Wisconsin football team since 1963.

Jardine commented earlier this summer "Looking at 1972 in a broad spectrum I'd say that we have enough experience and we have some fine young players and we have had a real dedicated effort by our squad during spring practice and in the off season. I just think our 1972 Badgers will be a team with a lot of dedication and desire and if we can fill in some weak spots we should be a fine football team."

He noted Wisconsin's outlook with an analysis of the Badgers strengths and weaknesses:

STRENGTHS

"I'd say the fact that we have experience returning both offensively

and defensively will help us, that's something we haven't had in the past. We have a smattering of experienced offensive linemen and we have a good group of offensive backs with experience. Defensively, our front group will be experienced and we'll have some experience in our line-backer corps."

WEAKNESSES

"Of course we will be worrying about our secondary where we have only one returning veteran, **Ron Buss**, who's done a good job us. Our receiver corps is inexperienced and we have to develop that to a great extent. Probably our third weakness would be a backup quarterback. We're not sure right now who will be our number two quarterback and we certainly have to have that solved by the middle of the season."

A total of 22 lettermen form the nucleus around whom the personable mentor will build this year's team and one of the most exciting runners in Wisconsin gridiron history —

Rufus "Roadrunner" Ferguson — returns for his final campaign ensuring thrills galore to the thousands of football fans who will be watching him in 1972.

The irrepressible **Ferguson**, a 5-6, 190 pound dynamo of energy, romped through and around opposing lines of defense for an all-time school record 1,222 yards in 1971 and crossed opponents' goal-lines on 13 occasions for 80 points.

Ferguson's flamboyant, on and off the field, and the senior from Miami (Perine), Florida, ranks as a solid All-American and Heisman Trophy candidate. His success running the football will determine Wisconsin's offensive potential this year as well as the individual honors that will come his way with each passing Saturday.

His brilliant performances all season long in 1971 gained him national prominence as the 18th-ranked rusher with an average of 111.1 yards per carry. He's the top Big Ten run-

ning back returning from last season's play.

The "Roadrunner" was an unanimous choice for the All-Big Ten football in 1971, and his 3.1 overall grade point average as a business major dictated his selection to the conference's All-Academic team as well.

His two-year total of 1,810 yards and his 1971 scoring output of 13 TD's and 80 points all rank as school records.

He's a versatile performer as exhibited by his career marks of 15 passes caught for 122 yards and 27 kickoffs returned for 507 yards.

Jardine discussed his backfield situation thusly:

TAILBACK

"I think we're in good shape at tailback position. We have Rufus Ferguson (5-6, 190) returning who we certainly feel is destined to have another great year barring injury and provided we give him some blocking. He lends a great deal to our offensive attack. Behind him we have Tim Austin (6-0, 191) who is in his senior year and is kind of a workhorse type player, and, while he hasn't played much, he is a tough kid who could help us. We have sophomore Dan Orvick (5-9, 175) who was impressive in spring drills, and then we have another young man by the name of Tony Davis (6-2, 205) who we have not had an opportunity to see yet but hopefully he will be a good running back." (Note: Davis was not eligible for the Wisconsin freshman team last season.)

FULLBACK

"I'm very pleased with the play of Gary Lund (6-0, 186), this will be his senior year and I think he had an outstanding spring. He is a very quick starter; he's a fine receiver and probably the biggest plus for him is that he is an excellent blocker to lead Ferguson through the holes. We have very good depth behind him with converted defensive back Chuck Richardson (6-1, 195) and at certain times this spring he looked like he's going to be a fine fullback for us. Another young man who blossomed out is Jim Bachhuber (6-1, 200). He was a tailback and played some other positions, but looked as if he might have some good potential as a fullback. At both fullback and tailback I feel we have adequate depth."

QUARTERBACK

"Rudy Steiner (6-2, 215) is going to be in his fifth year of collegiate football, actually he hasn't played that much as he's only played two of those years, but he has the maturity and throws the ball exceptionally well and we think he's going to be a good number one quarterback."

Steiner, in limited action last year, completed 32 of 70 passes for 49 yards and fired three scoring passes. Lund, an exceptional blocker, gained 115 yards on 18 carries and caught three passes for 43 yards. He had a twelve yard scoring run against Ohio State.

Wisconsin was an exciting offensive team in 1971 and the Badgers ranked 19th nationally on total offense — their highest showing since the 1962 conference champions and Rose Bowl participants ranked tenth

nationally — and several of the key performers offensively have departed.

They include quarterback Neil Graff (97 of 186 pass attempts completed for 1300 yards and five touchdowns); fullback Allan "A-Train" Thompson (643 yards on 124 attempts and six scores on the ground and 12 passes caught for 76 yards and two tallies); wide receiver Albert Hannah (39 catches for 608 yards and 2 touchdowns); tight end Larry Mialik (15 receptions for 165 yards and one tally); and split end Terry Whittaker (13 catches for 165 yards).

Tragedy struck the Wisconsin team in early July when wide receiver Tim Klosek — who caught 25 passes for 439 yards including a 75 yard scoring pass against Michigan State last year — was killed in a highway accident on the outskirts of Madison.

Also missing from the Badger cast is ace punt and kickoff returner Greg 'Grape Juice' Johnson, who returned 14 punts for 160 yards and one tally and 19 kickoffs a total of 540 yards. He ranked fourth nationally, and Wisconsin, teamwise was 12th in kickoff returns in 1971.

Jardine made the following observations about Wisconsin's personnel at each of the other positions on the team:

CENTER

"At center I think we have one of the real unheard-of stars of our team in Mike Webster (6-1, 218). He is a great leader, he does a fine job of blocking and he gives us a real fine anchor man at the center position. Behind him we're scrambling a little bit. Mike Passini (6-2, 209) was number two, but broke both wrists during the year and we've worked defensive end Phil Connors (6-3, 193) in there along with Junior John Pagel (6-2, 212). We're experienced at the position if we can keep them healthy."

GUARD

"Bob Braun (6-3, 224) returns for what we hope will be a fine senior year. He had a good year as a junior. He is a big strong young man with good speed. Behind him we have Dennis Manic (5-11, 202) who will be in his first year as a regular, if indeed he makes it as a regular, but he had a good spring. Our third guard is sophomore Rick Koeck (6-1, 210) who will definitely push Manic for that number one position."

TACKLE

"At tackle co-captain Keith Nosbusch (6-2, 212) is back for his third year as a starter. He really gives us great experience at that position. He's probably one of the smallest of offensive tackles in the Big Ten and yet he graded out extremely well against some of the fine defensive players last year. Bob Johnson (6-5, 217) a sophomore, who was most impressive during spring practice, has been given the starting nod at least temporarily at the other tackle position. Chuck Deerwester (6-3, 215) will be in his junior year and will back up Johnson. We'll have to wait until close to the start of the season to determine who the backup man for Nosbusch will be."

RECEIVERS

"This is the position we are prob-

ably concerned about the most. I'd say right now, Art Sanger (5-9, 175) and Mike Haas (6-2, 176) are our two best receivers — at least from what I've seen in spring drills. Sanger is not very big but he has the ability to get in the open and he does catch the ball well. Haas lacks the speed we're looking for but he makes those difficult catches that you like to see a young man make. Rodney Rhodes (6-2, 184) is potentially an excellent receiver. He has tremendous speed, he has the size we're looking for and if he could come through for us he could give us what we're looking for as a receiver. Then, of course, we recruited one of the outstanding receivers in Illinois (Sam Bickford 6-4, 195) and one from Ohio (Bob Leppla 5-11, 170) and we hope that one of these two young men might be able to bolster our receiving corps.

At tight end I think we do have some depth. Jack Novak, (6-4, 215) who will be a sophomore, beat out Tom Lonnberg (6-1, 199) who started the last four games for us. Jack is an extremely big man and he's also extremely quick for his size. He's what you dream about in having a tight end and yet I know that Lonnberg will play a lot of football and at times we might use two tight ends. We are extremely strong at the tight end position."

DEFENSIVE ENDS

"Right now Bob Storck (6-5, 235) and Mike Seifert (6-3, 250) give us two big, strong, quick defensive ends and we should be much improved here, provided both those young men are healthy. Seifert had a knee injury, but from all reports it looks like he'll be ready to go. Behind him I'm really not sure who's going to step in there. We have a young man who did an outstanding job for us at linebacker named Randy Frokjer (6-2, 190) and we are definitely considering him as an end prospect. So, if he would come through and then someone like Angie Messina (6-3, 210) do likewise, we would have four pretty good defensive ends."

DEFENSIVE TACKLE

"We have Jim Schymanski (6-2, 215) returning who had an outstanding sophomore year for us. He is extremely quick and was third on the team in tackles. Mark Levenhagen (6-3, 195) started the Minnesota game for us last year and it's very apparent that he will be a starting tackle for us this year. Brian Harney (6-1, 215), who was switched from linebacker, has moved in at defensive tackle and has done a fine job for us. If he continues to come along we'll have three pretty good defensive tackles."

LINEBACKERS

"This is one of the deepest positions on the team if everyone's healthy. Dave Lokanc (6-1, 220) co-captain of the team, is an excellent linebacker. At an outside linebacker position will be Ed Bosold (6-3, 215) who I think had as good a spring as anyone on our football team. He has good speed and range and should do a good job for us.

"The other outside position looks

Meet Wisconsin's Football Assistants

Low Stueck

Assistant Coach — 3rd Season

Low Stueck, 36, came to Wisconsin from UCLA with John Jardine in 1970 following seven years on the Bruin coaching staff, serving as freshman coach under former UCLA head coach Bill Barnes, as varsity end and linebacker coach, and as administrative assistant to Tommy Prothro. As freshman coach, Stueck had a two-year record of 5-1-1.

Lew will serve this year as Jardine's first assistant in charge of coordinating the defense and working with the linebackers.

He will also be in charge of coordinating the "Badger Bench" organization for the staff.

Prior to joining the UCLA staff, **Lew** was football coach at St. Anthony's High School in Long Beach, Calif., for one year and head coach for five years at Los Angeles Loyola High School where he compiled a 32-12-3 record. His 1960-61-62 teams at Loyola won Catholic League championships and his 1962 team won the Southern California large school prep title.

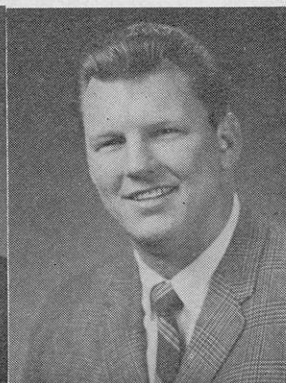

Teteak served for six years as assistant coach at Beloit College, replacing head coach Norm Amundsen when the latter became head coach at



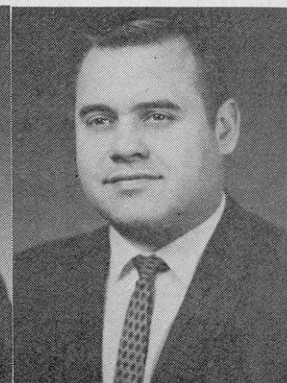

Vern graduated from Kimberly

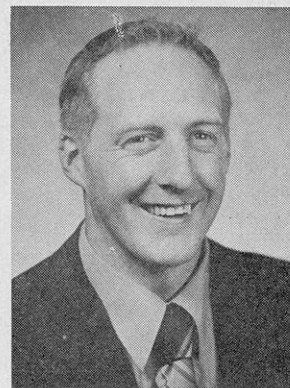

as if it will be manned by sophomore Mark Zakula (6-2, 205). All of us think he is destined for great things to come and he just seems to have a natural feel for the linebacker position.

"Behind them we have Todd Nordwig (6-3, 215) who started almost every game last year until he was injured; sophomore Rich Jakious (6-1, 199) who had an excellent spring practice and who we think is going to play a lot of football; John Hoffman (6-1, 210) will hopefully return from his arm injury and there are a couple of others who will have a good chance — such as Gary Little (6-1, 190) and Mike Jenkins (6-0, 205) who could also play defensive tackle."

CORNERBACKS

"Here we have inexperienced athletes. I think Alvin Peabody (6-1, 174), a sophomore, showed in spring practice drills that he is about as fine a cornerback as we've had since I've been here at Wisconsin. He lacks the experience, and he's going to make some sophomore mistakes, but he's got all the tools I believe to be an outstanding cornerback.

"Randy Safranek (5-9, 173), a senior, has played a lot of off and on football here but he had an outstanding spring game and I think maybe Randy will play a lot of football for us.

"Sophomore Jeff Mack (5-10, 156) was injured a lot during spring practice and doesn't have experience but has great athletic ability. Any one of those three can help us.

"Jim Wesley (6-0, 168) played quite a bit last year and with that experience will hopefully be improved this fall."

SAFETY

"Ron Buss (6-0, 188) returns and he is the real key as far as our secondary is concerned. He's got all the experience and he'll have to help these younger people out. He's had two good years for us and we hope he'll have an outstanding senior year.

"Dan Baron (6-0, 170) a converted quarterback, held down the other safety position all during spring practice, and I didn't think he'd hold it a week. He's done an outstanding job and it looks like Dan will be a tough man to beat out.

"Behind them we have Chris Davis (6-0, 185) and a sophomore named Mark Cullen (5-10, 175). So we lack experience but I believe we have some good athletes back there."

FRESHMEN

He had a pair of scoring passes against Iowa (**Carl** for 13 and **Jerry Witt** for 27) and against **Rice** (**Witt** for 42 and **Bill Hutchinson** for 20) in road games, and connected once against Illinois (**Witt**, 36 yards), Ohio State (**Carl**, 18 yards), UCLA (**Peters**, 16), Northwestern (**Tom Canny**, 22 yards), and Indiana (**Witt**, 35 yards).

Jim's total of twelve scoring passes in a season was equalled by **Ron VanderKelen** in 1962.

Haluska was blanked only in the 1952 season's finale here in that memorable 21-21 tie with Minnesota.

Alan 'The Horse' Ameche, Wisconsin's 1954 Heisman Trophy winner and all-time leading career rusher played in 36 games over his four seasons as a Badger fullback and on sixteen occasions rushed for 100 or more yards.

The Kenosha All-American had his greatest single game effort in the 1951 finale at Minnesota as he totalled 200 yards on 31 carries and tallied a pair of touchdowns in a 30-6 Wisconsin victory.

Ameche rushed for 100 or more yards in six consecutive games during his career — the final four games of the 1952 season and the first two of his junior campaign in 1953. The surge included 162 yards on 20 carries at Indiana in a 37-14 Wisconsin triumph and "The Horse" tallied three times with scoring runs of 43, 31 and one yard.

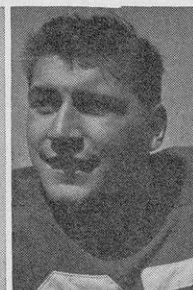

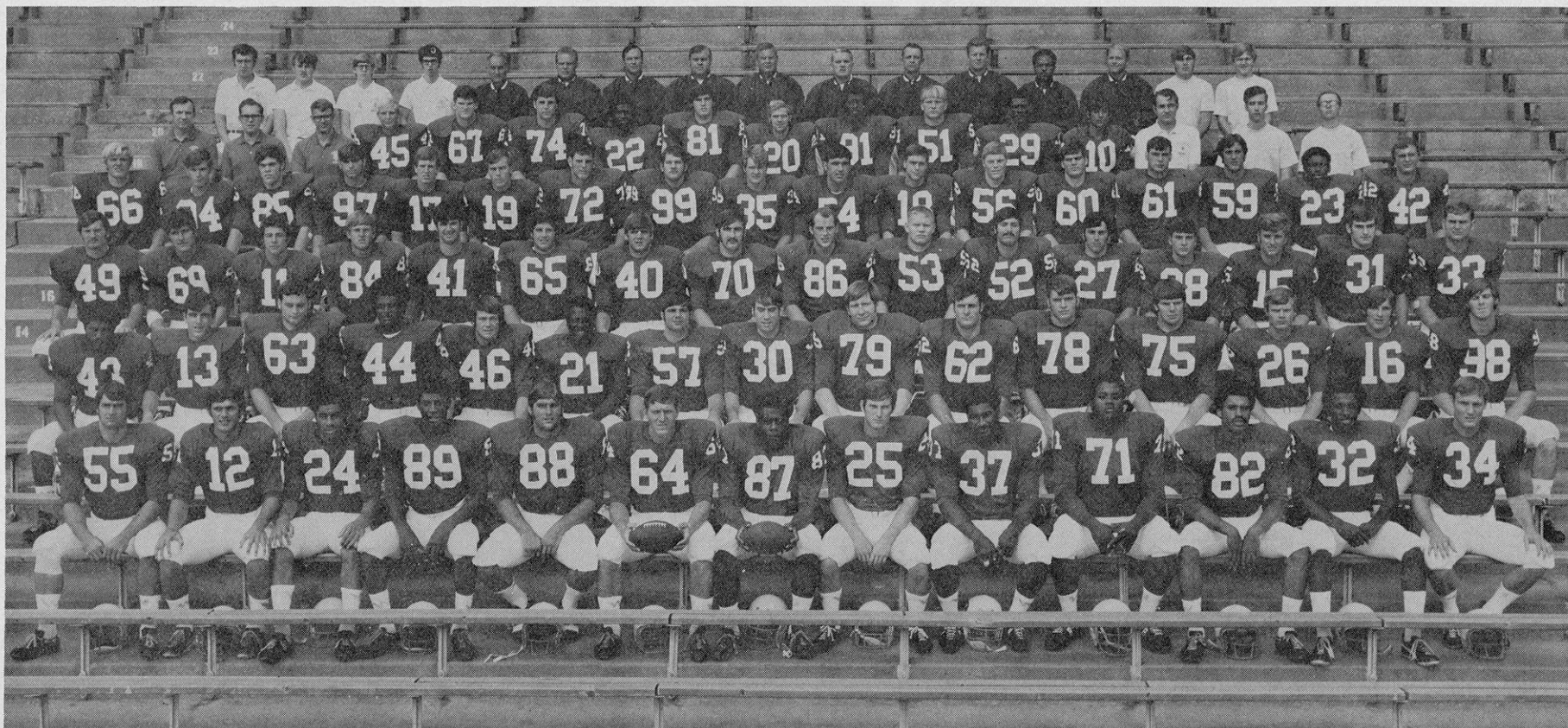
