INNOVATIVE MINI COURSE PROGRAM PLANNED FOR SPRING

Classes to teach parents and children how to exercise together and special theater courses providing background to performances coming to the Union Theater are among the offerings of the Wisconsin Union Mini Courses spring program.

The exercise classes — "Exercise With Your Child," and "Exercise With Your Preschooler" — emphasize ages 5-12 and 3-5 years and combine stretching and fitness exercises.

The theater courses are "Those Amazing Brandenburgs" and "Background to Canterbury Tales." The Brandenburg program prefaces a performance April 16 by the New York Chamber Solists by explaining the amazing diversity of Bach in writing music for solo instruments accompanied by a chamber group. The Feb. 16 performance of "Canterbury Tales" by the New Vic Theatre of London will be intoduced by a course on the late medieval idea of pilgrimages and some of Chaucer's pilgrims.

Other new courses this semester include: "Coffee, Tea & Victor," "Campus History — Uncensored," "Women: Dress to Suit Your Lifestyle," "Buying Stereos," "Professional Image & Etiquette," and more.

A series of one-time workshops is also planned again this semester. Some of the new titles are "Balloon Sculpture," "Darts Workshop," "Camera Purchase Workshop," "Button Up Your Residence," "Massage Workshop," and "Winter Wilderness Camping."

PARKING OPENS UP ON LOWER CAMPUS NEAR MEMORIAL

With the recent changes in parking lots in the lower campus area, those looking for a place to park will find a less frustrating situation. In total there are now 1602 spaces of which 1173 are available during the day.

Parking lot 1 between Memorial Union and the Red Gym, which was resurfaced and landscaped last summer now has a continuous turn-over since there are 8 thirty-minute meters and 79 two-hour meters (available all day). Other lots and their capacities are: lot 6, upper level Helen C. White Hall, 96 meters; lot 6, lower level, 83 meters (evenings and weekends) and 12 permit spaces; lot 7, corner of Park and Johnson, 267 spaces (evenings and weekends); lot 46, corner of Lake and Johnson, 164 spaces (all day); lot 47, next to University Square Mall, 79 spaces, (available evenings and weekends); Lake Street Ramp, (all day) 532 spaces; Francis Street Ramp, (all day) 294 spaces.

The Youngblood donation center at Union South is celebrating its tenth anniversary this year. On Friday, Jan. 21 from noon to 6 p.m. an open house will be held at the blood center, room 302 Union South, to celebrate the achievement. Since the center was opened in cooperation with the American Red Cross on January 23, 1973, approximately 42,000 pints of blood have been donated there by students, faculty, staff and Union members ... some of the regulars have given as much as fifteen and seventeen gallons.

All of the booths, tables, chairs and lights as well as the new cash registers and wood-encased water stations are in place in the Memorial Union's newly remodelled lakefront cafeteria. A Grand Opening will take place on Jan. 24 and 25 from 7 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. with free cake and punch, menu specials, drawings and give-aways. Come join us for the launching of the New Year and the new lakefront dining room.

Meanwhile work has begun on the next phase of the Cafeteria-Rathskeller rejuvenation project. Plans now call for work on the Rathskeller food preparation area and servery to begin on Dec. 1, 1983. The cafeteria serving and food preparation areas are scheduled for the summer of 1984.

MUSIC AND DRAMA IN THEATER'S SPRING SPOTLIGHT

Outstanding American artists as well as renowned foreign performers will bring a diversity of music and drama to the Union Theater this spring.

Opening the second semester schedule will be a return visit by the New York City Opera National Company on January 27. The troupe, which earned critical praise for its 1980 performance of "La Traviata," offers a colorful new production of "Carmen," Bizet's masterpiece, this season. The production, created especially for the company's 27-city coast-to-coast tour, features performers from the City Opera roster, the country's finest young singers and a 30-member orchestra.

The 1982-83 White Concert Series will continue February 7 as the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, with Pinchas Zukerman as conductor and violinist, returns to present an all-Beethoven program. March 19 will bring the next event on the Red Concert Series as the esteemed Tokyo String Quartet returns for a long-awaited second vist.

A major musical highlight of the second semester will be the February 22 performance by the Dresden State Orchestra at the Madison Civic Center. Founded in 1548, the orchestra is one of the world's most distinguished ensembles, with a musical heritage which includes premiere performances of works by Richard Wagner and Richard Strauss and close association with many other famous composers. The concert, the Dresden's second visit to Madison, will feature music by Udo Zimmermann, Strauss and Beethoven with the orchestra's music director, Herbert Blomstedt, at the podium.

A different musical beat is promised March 12 as the Riverboat Ragtime Revue offers an evening of toe-tapping, hand-clapping entertainment. Mark Twain is the host aboard the River Queen, which boasts the talents of "Fiddler" Williams, the Gaslight Gang and the Mississippi River Songbird.

The art of the actor takes the spotlight on February 16 as members of London's acclaimed New Vic Theatre gather for the annual Geoffrey Chaucer Storytelling Competition—and you're the judge of who tells the bawdiest, the funniest, the lustiest of the "Canterbury Tales." On March 18, archvillain and consummate actor Vincent Price returns with a discourse on the history of evil and evildoers, "The Villains Still Pursue Me."

Other Union Theater programs scheduled through March include Debut Concerts by guitarist Susan Gulick on February 11, and duo-pianists Delphin and Romain, March 11. The 1982-83 Travel Adventure Film Series will continue February 14 and 15 with "Quebec Whales and Labrador Tales," while "India" will be the destination March 7 and 8.

Information about the Theater's April and May events will be featured in the next issue of the *Quarterly*. Ticket information is available from the Union Theater Box Office, 608/262-2201. The Box Office will open for the second semester on January 17; the Box Office will be open from 11:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, and from 1 to 4 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday.

UNION JOINS HISTORICAL COLLECTION AT THE STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

A segment of Union history is being preserved at the Wisconsin State Historical Society across from the Memorial Union. Recently the museum requested several items that would be highly recognizable to Union users, and they have now been added to the collection. Among them are samples of the old china which was sold last fall at Union South, one of the original terrace chairs and a light fixture from the Union cafeteria, which fell to the remodeling crews this past summer.

Thurman Fox, Museums Director of the State Historical Society, explains that right now we may not think about these items as being collectable but as time goes by their value becomes evident.

One of the Union's new terrace chairs manufactured by Wisco Industries of Oregon, Wis. has also found its way into the museum as a part of the collection of Wisconsin-made furniture.



TRAVEL CENTER NOTES SECOND SEMESTER TRIPS

St. Croix in the Virgin Islands is the destination of a Union Travel Center/Sager Wilson sponsored trip led by Jim Blair, a former instructor at Milton and Edgewood colleges.

This tour will spend one to two weeks (depending on the individual member's choice) at the Estate Northside Valley, a small community of two or three-bedroom villas with cooking facilities. The community is surrounded by lush, tropical foliage with private sand and coral beaches and large lanais for sunning and socializing.

The price includes roundtrip airfare from Chicago, seven, nine or 14-nights accommodations, snorkeling, scuba diving, wind-surfing, sailing, horseback riding, tennis, a shared van for side trips, shopping trips as well as excursions to Davis Bay, the Botanical Gardens and a night club. UNION ORGANIZED BY STUDENTS 75 YEARS AGO

The Union observed its 75th anniversary this fall. In 1907 a handful of men students got together to form a "union" where UW students would be able to come together for social, cultural and recreational activities and where they could interact, relax and meet other students.

Until that time there was no such communal life on campus. Students lived in their rooms and attended classes but there was little social life. President Van Hise, in his inaugural address in 1904, had suggested the formation of such a union, saying that "nothing that the professor or laboratory can do for the student can take the place of daily close companionship with hundreds of his fellows."

The fledgling organization moved into the University YMCA on Langdon Street and the newly formed Men's Union Board started operating a reading room and billiard parlor, a soda fountain, shoe shine stand, meeting rooms and offices for student organizations. They sponsored an all-campus social-recreational program including mixers, low cost dances, "smokers" for men, faculty-student mixers and many other activities.

It was not until 1928 that the Wisconsin Union was able

to build its own building next door to the YMCA after making several moves to neighboring houses along that block. The new Memorial Union soon became the center of activity for the campus. Porter Butts, first director of the Memorial Union, recalls ... "We began to see the Union as a means of building a better kind of community — making the University a more human place, doing something about the economic welfare of students, providing a general social-cultural-recreational program — with the Union building the center of campus community life in all its aspects."

The Men's Union Board has long since been replaced by a coeducational programming body of students called the Union Directorate. This group of twelve students oversees all of the programs sponsored by the Directorate's eight committees and the Wisconsin Hoofers outing club — a total of several hundred programs each year. They not only have the 54-year old Memorial Union building in which to stage their activities; but since 1971 they also have a second Union located on the southwestern end of the campus.

Over the years thousands of students have volunteered their time as committee members and chairs to put on programs in the Union, proving that Wisconsin learning does not just occur in the classroom.
